EVERY WORK undertaken in Sikkim will be qualitative from now on," announced Chief Minister Pawan Cham-ling while addressing the State Day celebrations in the capital today.

The CM stressed that

the second phase of de-velopment has started in the State, the basic minimum needs having been fulfilled in phase-1 of development here.

"Now, the aim is to ke Sikkim a Model State for the country and

worldwide," he stressed.

While highlighting
the State's contribution to the country, he said, "Nowhere in the world can a unique history like Sikkim be found where people merged a country with another showing exemplary patriotism to the nation. We, as Sikkimese, should be proud of our In-dian citizenship as we are equal contributors and partners in the process of

nation-building"

He further held that Sikkim should utilise all the benefits enshrined in the State list of the Constitution.

Addressing govern-ment employees, that CM said that State has tried its best to implement

the Pay Commission. He, however, added that the government cannot give arrears at one go and it will be given phase-wise due to paucity of funds and the strain a lump-sum release would cause.

He informed that Rs 2,000 crore is spent from the State exchequer for payment of salaries to government employees. He also urged officers to be sympathetic towards pensioners and respect them for their past contributions and reach out to them for counsel.

As for the development of the State, the growth in GSDP and per capita income of the State is for all to witness and compare since the formation of his govern-ment 24 years ago, he

Highlighting Sikkim's mission on Sustainable Development, he said that Sikkim's revolution to raise forest cover was a message for the world to take care of the Earth.

He also announced the start of Water Security Mission and Food Se-curity Mission in order to make the State completely secure and sustainable in these resources.

added that he wished to make Sikkim like Cuba with regard to infant mortality rate as Cuba has the lowest rate in the world.

He also sternly di-rected concerned officers and stakeholders like Panchayats to properly earnestly on issues of housing as the State has now embarked on a mission to make Sikkim kutcha-house free.

Providing infrastructure an extra push, he also informed that the State Government plans to upgrade connectivity at all four districts through roads and tunnels

He also added that air connectivity will be a reality soon and that the State was pushing for international connectiv-ity to Nepal, Bhutan and Bangkok from Pakyong.

In an impetus to sportspersons, the CM announced annual grants of Rs 12 lakh to A-grade sporting clubs along with 5% reservation in State government jobs to local sportspersons of national and international repute.

The CM further stated that Sikkim will be a self sufficient agricultural State within the next five years and announced that a planting festival will be undertaken in June-July which will see bigger-than-before ded-turn to pg03

How can begging be an offence if govt unable to provide food, jobs: Delhi HC

New Delhi, May 16 (PTI): How can begging be an offence in a country where the government is unable to provide food or jobs, the Delhi High Court today observed while hearing two PILs seeking to decriminalise begging.

A bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Jusice C Hari Shankar also observed that a person begs only out of 'sheer necessity" and not by choice.
"You or we will not

beg even if we are offered a crore of rupees. It is out of sheer necessity that some one puts out a hand to beg for food. How is begging an offence in a country where you (gov-ernment) are not able to provide food or jobs," the court said.

The central government said there were sufficient checks and balances in the Bombay Prevention of Begging Act which criminalises begging.

The government had earlier told the court that begging should not be a crime if it was done due to poverty. It had also said that begging will not be decriminalised

The PILs, by Harsh Mandar and Karnika Sawhney, have sought basic human and funda-mental rights for beggars in the national capital, apart from decriminalising begging.

They have also sought basic amenities such as proper food and medical facilities at all beggars'

homes in the city.

The petitioners have also challenged the Bombay Prevention of Begging Act.

The Centre and the AAP government had in October 2016 told the court that the Ministry of Social Justice had drafted a bill to decriminalise begging and rehabilitate beggars and homeless people. But, later the proposal to amend the legislation was dropped.

The law prescribes a penalty of more than three years of jail in case of first conviction for begging and the person can be ordered to be detained for 10 years in

subsequent conviction.

Currently, there is no central law on begging and destitution and most states have adopted the Bombay Prevention of Begging Act, 1959, which criminalises begging, or have modelled their laws



esterday was State Day, the day marking 43 years Yesterday was State Day, the day marking to join of Sikkim as a part of the Indian Union, time then for a quick recap of events which led to the first State Day back in 1975.

The decade of the Seventies began in Sikkim with a groundswell of aspirations for democracy and a heightened political consciousness among the people. This was not the first time that such sentiments coursed through Sikkim, and similar moments had arrived in the previous decades as well. However, like with most historic occasions, several things had to come together at the right moment for Sikkim to make history and set on course a new destiny.

The right combination of popular leaders, a supportive Delhi and a weakened palace led to the signing of the Tripartite Agreement of 08 May, 1973, with the Government of India, leader of the political parties of Sikkim and the Chogyal as signatories. Nar Bahadur Khatiwada, feted with the Sikkim Ratna on State Day some years back, was a successful youth leader of the movement for democracy in Sikkim and will be able to better explain the passion which inspired the Sikkimese at the time. He will hopefully do that some day, but for now, suffice to say that at the root of the upsurge was a general belief that the elections to the State Council in 1973 were rigged by the palace. Soon, there was anarchy on the streets, police stations even in remote Sikkim were being attacked and the Chogyal invited the Indian Political Officer to take over the administration. The Tripartite Agreement envisaged the Chogyal as a constitutional head, and set things up for the establishment of democracy, rule of law, fundamental rights, independent judiciary and universal adult franchise. As much as this set in place the parity formula for the first Assembly, a system which did not survive when the next election came along, adult suffrage was also a major victory for the subjects, and when the Sikkimese were given their first chance to vote in a democratic environment [in April 1974], the voters gravitated towards the person they saw as the leader of democratic movement in Sikkim – Lhendup Dorji Kazi, whose Sikkim Congress cornered 31 of the 32 Assembly seats.
The Tripartite Agreement, however, did not hold

for long. Its provisions were being ignored and side-stepped within a year, or so the elected representatives believed. On 10 April, 1975, the Sikkim Assembly met for an emergency session and agreed that the Chogyal was violating the provisions of the Agreement and abolished the institution of the Chogyal and resolved to become a constituent unit of India. The Statement of Objects and Reasons appended to the 38th Amendment Bill of 1975 [which subsequently became Article 371F of the Constitution] records that the Sikkim Assembly, on 10 April, 1975, "...inter alia, noted the persistent harmful activities of the Chogyal which aimed at undermining the responsible democratic Government set up..." The Assembly then submitted its Res-

olution to the people for approval.

What Sikkim today calls the "Referendum" is re ferred to as "a special opinion poll" conducted by the Government of Sikkim. This "Opinion Poll" was held within four days of the Assembly's resolution and 61,133 of Sikkim's approximately 97,000 voters shared their opinion – 59,637 in favour of the Resolution and 1,496 against it and this high turnout and the presence of Indian paramilitary forces in Sikkim continue to feed speculations about the veracity of this "opinion poll". Be that as it may, the verdict of the was communicated to India on 15 April and the then Chief Minister and his Council of Ministers were in Delhi the very next day. On 19 April, the amendment to the Constitution was moved and Sikkim became a full-fledged State of India on 16 May, 1975.

With the passage of the Act, Sikkim became the 22nd state of the Indian Union, the institution of the Chogyal was formally abolished and provisions of the Indo-Sikkim Treaty, Tripartite Agreement and the Government of India Act, 1974 were made inoperative. Sikkim's identity within India was to be decided by provisions of Article 371F.

Article 371F is a powerful tool providing Sikkim with its special status within the Indian Union. Unfortunately, it has also become just convenient dodge to rake up the past. The Act was inserted into the Constitution to guide Sikkim's future, not nail it down to the past. One reason why it is not taken as seriously as it should is because Sikkim has been unable to remind Delhi what the Act is all about. Delhi, of course, with larger states to keep happy, rarely does its home-work and bulldozes all over Sikkim. What people need to appreciate is that Article 371F has none of the incongruities of Article 370 and boasts near watertight provisions which allow Sikkim to remain unique while also wholly a part of India. It is a progressive Act and that is how it should be used, not as a political slogan to confuse people or to whip up nostalgia for an imag-

Are dictators on the way outor on the way up?

All around the world, democracy is looking shaky. While consolidated democracies are struggling to stay healthy, many flawed ones have turned into outright authoritarian regimes – most notably Russia under Vladimir Putin and Turkey under Recep Tayyip Erdoğan. But the news isn't all bad: on several continents over the last decade, longstanding dictators have resigned, lost elections, or been deposed.

As the table below indicates, the number of dic-tators who've fallen in recent years for all sorts of reasons is a cause for optimism.

But has their demise led to any kind of demo-ratic reform? It's a mixed picture to say the least. While a handful of promising cases deserve praise, only a few of the dictatorships that have fallen in recent years have given way to lasting, stable de-

The 2010s began with tremendous optimism for the future of global democracy, reaching an apogee with the Arab Spring protests in 2011. Across the Middle East and North Africa, several dictators fell in a row: after Tunisia's Zine El Abidine Ben Ali of Tunisia and Egypt's Hosni Mubarak, Muammar Gaddafi of Libya was toppled in a civil war. Fight-ing also erupted in Yemen, leading to the eventual

flight of longtime strongman Ali Abdullah Saleh. It seemed for a moment that in one fell swoop, a clutch of countries were suddenly shaking off authoritarianism at last. But with the exception of Tunisia – whose situation is still somewhat fragile – none of them have developed into democracies.

Egypt's brief spell under the elected Muslim Brotherhood came to an end in 2013, when a military intervention brought General Abdel Fatteh al-Sisi to power. He remains president today, legit-imised by largely meaningless elections. Libya is still a weak state beset by instability and violence; Yemen has slipped into devastating conflict and humanitarian crisis. Though protests exploded throughout the Middle East, only modest reforms took place elsewhere. And in Syria, the Assad regime's crackdown on the 2011 protests helped spark a nightmarish conflict that has torn the country apart.

Iraq and Afghanistan, meanwhile, saw a change

in leadership with the elections that forced Nouri al-Maliki and Hamid Karzai out of power. But nei-ther country's democracy has notably improved. Afghanistan is still authoritarian and unstable. and in Iraq, Maliki is still very powerful behind the

MIXED BAG

Latin America was home to a clutter of military dictatorships for decades, but since the mid-to-late 1980s, most of its countries have been flawed but functioning democracies.

The two notable holdouts were Venezuela un-

der Hugo Chávez and Cuba under Fidel Castro and in the last decade, the two have diverged considerably. While Cuba has reformed a little under the rule of Fidel's brother Raúl, who has now handed over to Miguel Díaz-Canal, Venezuela is falling apart under the dictatorial leadership of Chavez's hand-picked successor, Nicolás Maduro. Other regimes in Latin America continue to hold free and fair elections, but struggle to uphold the rule of law.

In Asia, meanwhile, a few less-than-democratic countries have made strides towards reform, but most authoritarian regimes have stayed the same Still, some reforms and resignations are noteworthy. In the Caucasus, Armenia's Serzh Sargsyan was recently forced to resign after mass protests against his rule. Almazbek Atambayev of Kyrgyzstan also stepped down after elections, the first peaceful handover of power in the country's history.

In South-East Asia, most of the attention since 2015 has been on surprising events in Myanmar, when the military regime that ran the country for decades allowed open elections for the first time since 1990. Myanmar's military government was oppressive even by authoritarian standards, so it was quite something to see it holding elections, releasing political prisoners and allowing more press freedom. The regime's leader, Thein Sein, stepped down to make way for Aung San Suu Kyi's National League for Democracy.

But the democratic transformation was short-

lived. The regime has continued to violate the human rights of its minority groups, most notably the Rohingya minority, and civil liberties and press freedoms are in serious jeopardy

TURFED OUT

One place where things are looking up for democracy is Sub-Saharan Africa. The last decade has seen the overall standing of democracy in Africa improve. In the early 1980s, only five countries in Africa could be considered democratic: Botswana, Gambia, Mauritius, Senegal and Zimbabwe. The end of the Cold War saw the expansion of elections and civil liberties. But more recent years has seen the fall or peaceful resignation of important authoritarian figures, many of them old men who had clung on to power for decades

Yahya Jammeh of the Gambia eventually fled the country in 2017 after he lost the presidential elections to the opposition. Blaise Compaoré of Burkina Faso resigned after political protests broke out in 2014, following nearly three decades in power. José Eduardo dos Santos of Angola resigned after nearly 40 years in power (though he remains influential in Angolan politics). All three countries have be-come slightly more democratic

as a result.

But the biggest tree felled in Africa was undoubtedly Zimbabwe's Robert Mugabe. In his capacity as president since 1980, Mugabe had become increasingly dictatorial and brutal, and his misguided leadership plunged the country into chaos. When he unceremoniously fired his vice-president Emmerson Mnangagwa at the end of 2017, his previous backers in the military decided they had finally had enough. With par-liamentary impeachment hearings in the offing, Mugabe eventually resigned, and new elections are scheduled for July 2018.

The bloodless Zimbabwean transition was a

heartening spectacle, but there are nonetheless plenty of other countries to worry about. Hunga-ry's Viktor Orban is threatening to constrict his country's democracy by clamping down on civil liberties, even as he wins landslide election victores. China's Xi Jinping recently orchestrated the removal of term limits, giving him power to rule indefinitely. Thailand's military is heading the most repressive government the country has seen in years. Still, while many countries have taken an authoritarian turn, others have made a success of their escape from dictatorship.

As recent events in Armenia attest, citizens the world over are becoming more involved in politics and taking their displeasure to the streets. And while it's true that most dictators who fall are replaced by another dictator, there are enough examples to the contrary to give the defenders of democracy some hope.

Why merely owning land isn't enough to empower Africa's women farmers

In the agricultural sector – the major employer for poor people in Africa – assets like land and livestock are owned and controlled mainly by men.

It makes sense, then, that many donors, national governments and civil society groups believe rebal-ancing asset and land ownership in favour of women will greatly empower women. The argument is that increasing women's access, control and ownership of land will lead to stronger bargaining power and higher incomes. It is also posited as a way to strengthen women's "voice" within households and communities.

But the reality in communities is very different. Our recent book, Agriculture, Diversification and Gender in Rural Africa, drew on a unique, longitudinal data set covering around 2000 households in 15 regions in six countries: Ghana, Kenya, Malawi, Mozambique, Tanzania and Zambia. This data, coupled with more detailed qualitative research carried out in three villages in Malawi, highlights the limitations of approaches that rely on gender based redistribution of land from men to women.

We found that even when women own land, their husbands are still perceived as household heads. As such,

men have better access to public re sources such as subsidised fertilisers and agricultural advisory services.

The findings suggest that genu-inely empowering women and girls within agriculture requires interventions that go beyond the issue of land redistribution. Instead, policymakers and development agencies should adopt a multifaceted approach that includes aspects beyond agriculture. These include issues of sexual and reproductive rights, for instance, and freeing women from the heavy and time consuming drudgery of domes-tic work in poor, rural settings.

OWNERSHIP AND DEMANDS

ON WOMEN'S TIME

Female landholders have less land than men in five of the six countries we studied. This means they have lower access to one of the most important resources in rural Africa.

The quantitative data we collected confirms the existence of gender based gaps in farm sizes - female landholders have smaller farms in all countries except Kenya. And the gaps have grown in most of the regions since 2002, when the study started. In countries where average farm sizes have increased – Ghana, Zambia and Tanzania – men have tended to benefit more from this growth than

In parts of Malawi and Zambia matrilineal systems mean that wom en control and inherit land. But this hasn't made a real difference to women's lives. This is because of their other er responsibilities, as well as societal

bias and pressures.

Then there's the issue of the responsibilities that women bear which interfere with their ability to focus on the business of farming. Through qualitative interviews in the three Malawian communities, we discovered that there are many demands on women's time and labour outside agriculture. Women are expected to care for ill relatives, especially children and infants. Other demands are the need to collect firewood and water.

A woman cannot juggle these demands with participating fully in agricultural production, even if she is the owner of the land. Gender norms around the division of labour enable men to avoid time consuming domestic work.

Women's relative lack of empow erment is also related to their limited mobility, which makes it harder for them to reach markets. Women are fettered by their domestic responsibilities, controlling husbands and by the potential dangers of moving around on their own, especially at

This means that women don't have the actual power to control the income from products sold in agricul-

Men's relative superiority within the household and local communi-ties is compounded by government policies that strengthen the male household head norm. For instance, governments divert substantial public resources into subsidisation programmes that favour household heads.

These programmes also withdraw resources earmarked for agricultural extension services for women. This means that areas that lose funding are those that would empower wom-en – not in terms of land ownership, but in terms of support.

SUSTAINABLE SOLUTIONS
These findings suggest that empow ering women farmers requires more than just ensuring they own land and assets. Women need support to deal with the many demands on their time. For example, addressing poor health among children might free up more time for women farmers who are also mothers. Improving women's ability to get around easily is also

Post-poll alliances were preferred by Gov in Goa, Manipur

Like the Karnataka election, a number of assembly polls in the last few years threw up a fractured mandate and the BJP invariably emerged as the party which- either leading an alliance or being a junior partner- was given the first opportunity by respective governors to form government.

In states like Goa. Manipur and Meghalaya, the Congress won the largest number of seats and also staked claim before the respective governor to form government but the BJP managed to secure a majority there with post-poll alliances and their leaders were sworn in as chief ministers.

The Congress has cited these precedents to claim that the Karnataka gover-nor should invite it and its post-poll ally JD(S) to form

the government and not the BJP, the single largest party, as their alliance enjoys the support of the majority of

BJP president Amit Shah had asserted yesterday that the mandate in Karnataka is in his party's favour and against the Congress as the latter's tally was reduced from 122 to 78 with outgoing Chief Minister Siddaramaiah losing from his traditional seat and scraping through from the second seat he had contested. Over 16 ministers also lost.

The BIP, which has won 104 of the 222 assembly seats where elections were held, has also staked claim. On paper, the Congress-JD(S) combine has the support of 116 MLAs with 112 being the majority mark.

In the Manipur poll held last year, the Congress had

won 28 seats in the 60-member House and the BJP 21. The BJP joined hands with regional parties to claim support of majority of MLAs and Governor Najma Heptulla invited it to form the government, ignoring the claim of the Congress.

The Goa election, which was held along with Mani-pur's, also threw up a hung assembly with the Congress winning 17 of the to-

tal 40 seats while the BJP bagged 13. Here again the saffron party beat its rival in cobbling up a majority with post-poll allies and its leader Manohar Parrikar was sworn in by Governor Mridula Sinha as the chief

In the Meghalava polls held in February this year, the Congress emerged as the largest party by winning 21 of the 59 seats where elecrival National People's Par-ty won 19 while the BJP got two seats. Both joined hands and won over other regional parties and independents to secure a majority.

The Congress also staked claim before Governor Ganga Prasad to form government but he invited the BJP alliance led by Conrad Sangma after they met him and claimed a

10 persons rescued from suspected couriers, 2 held

The two suspected couriers, identified as Rajib Madahi and Hemanta Madahi of Bishnupur Dhanbill village in Baksa district, were apprehended by the RPF.

Duplicate copies of Aadhaar Card, driving license, PAN card, ATM card, two mobile hand-sets, a SIM card of Nepal, besides railway tickets were recovered from their possession.

Both the men claimed during interrogation that a man from Chhaygoan had handed over the minor boys to them to be supplied to another person of Jajiyabari village in Nalbari district, who resides in Nepal now, in lieu of commission, Das

After interrogating them, the RPF handed over the 10 persons and the suspected couriers to the police, he added.

Allow CSR in chief minister's relief funds. Bengal CM writes to PM

KOLKATA, MAY 16 (PTI): West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee has written a letter to Prime Minister Narendra Modi urging him to consider the contribution of business houses to the chief minister's relief funds (CMRF) as money spent on corporate social responsibility (CSR) activ-

The letter, a copy of which is with PTI, point-ed out "one major infirmity in the present CSR framework as provided in the Companies Act 2013", concerning the interest of the states.

While contributions to the Prime Minister's National Relief Fund (PMNRF) was mentioned as an eligible activity un-der the CSR in the 2013 Act, the same made to the CMRF was not considered as an activity "eligible for contribution under the CSR", she wrote in the letter.

"It will indeed be praiseworthy if contribu-tion to CMRF in the states is also made an eligible activity under CSR. The little contribution would be very helpful to all



much-desired assistance and relief to people in need," the letter read.
Stating that the CMRF

is always under financial constraints because of limited donations from the companies. Baneriee has written that if the proposal is accepted by the Centre, the "contributions" will also enable the donors to claim tax breaks.

April 1, 2014 every company, private limited or public limited, which either has a net worth of Rs of Rs 1,000 crore or net profit of Rs 5 crore, has to spend at least 2 percent of its average net profit for the immediately pre-ceding three financial years on corporate social responsibility activities.

Rotten meat will raise awareness of risk of animal food: FIAPO

KOLKATA, MAY 16 (PTI): The Federation of Indian Animal Protection Organisations (FIAPO) today said the carcass meat recovery from dumping grounds in West Bengal would hopefully raise awareness on the health risks of consuming animal products.

"With the extraordinary increase in lifestyle diseases, from kidney disease to heart disease, may be it is time we re-look at our diet...to move towards a greener diet over one including animal products," FIAPO director Varda Mehrotra said in a statement here.

Stating that it has information that

meat consumption in the city is going down, Mehrotra said that many peo-ple were avoiding it after reports that meat was coming from dead animals of dumping grounds.

"Meat being sourced from rotten

bodies of cats, dogs and even diseased animals in unhygienic conditions is not uncommon. Animals bred for the purpose of meat are routinely given anti-biotics, growth hormones and other drugs and their meat may con-tain these drugs with many viruses and bacteria.

"Hopefully this situation can bring awareness... the FIAPO director said.

He said many people could not make the difference between the meat of carcass of dumping grounds and slaughtered animals as they were used to consume the final product with little or no consideration to where it was

Mehrotra said research showed that multiple lifestyle diseases were routinely caused or heightened by consumption of meat, milk and eggs.

Saudis suspend World Cup referee over bribery

RIYADH, MAY 16 (AFP): The Saudi Football Federation have banned referee Fahad al-Mirdasi for life over bribery and urged FIFA to remove him from the pool of referees for the 2018 World Cup in Russia.

Mirdasi was suspended for offering to take a bribe to influence the outcome of a match, the federation's disciplinary and ethics committee

said late Tuesday.

The 32-year-old is one of Saudi Arabia's most prominent refer-ees, having earned a FIFA badge in 2011 and officiating at the Rio de Janei-ro Olympics in 2016 and the Confederations Cup in Russia in 2017.

Mirdasi was chosen to referee Saudi Arabia's Kings Cup final between top clubs Al-Faisaly and Al-Ittihad on Saturday but was pulled from the roster just a few hours

before the game.

In a statement, the disciplinary and ethics committee said Mirdasi had approached the president of Al-Ittihad asking him for a bribe to enable his team to win. "The Ittihad president

Hamad Al-Sanayeh called the Saudi Football Federa-tion to state there was evidence that Fahad Al-Mirdasi had reached out via text messages on WhatsApp. He asked for an illegal sum of money in exchange for helping his team win the game," it said.

The case was referred to the Saudi Football Federation, then the General Authority for Sport -- the highest sports authority in the kingdom -- trig-gering an administrative investigation.

Mirdasi confessed to the charges, according to the statement, and it was decided "to deprive him from participating in any football activity for life"

The committee rec-ommended that Saudi Arabia officially request FIFA to remove Mirdasi from the list of referees participating in the 2018 World Cup and suspend him for life.

"Our integrity is above all considerations," said Turki Al-Sheikh, head of the General Authority for Sport.

The World Health Organisation (WHO) today published its first 'essential diagnos-tics list', a catalogue of tests needed to diagnose the most common conditions as well as a number of global priority diseases.

The step was taken to address the problem of people's inability to access diagnostic services, thus failing to receive the correct treatment.

"An accurate diagnosis is the first step to getting effective treatment. No one should suffer or die because of lack of diagnostic services, or because the right tests were not available, said Tedros Adha-nom Ghebreyesus, WHO Director-General.

The remaining 55 tests

are designed for the detection, diagnosis and monitor-ing of 'priority' diseases such as HIV, tuberculosis, malaria, hepatitis B and C, human papillomavirus and syphilis, the statement said.

Some of the tests are par-ticularly suitable for primary health care facilities, where laboratory services are often poorly resourced and sometimes non-existent.

"Our aim is to provide a tool that can be useful to all countries to test and treat better, but also to use health funds more efficiently by concentrating on the tru-ly essential tests, said Mari ngela Sim o, WHO Assistant Director-General for Access to Medicines, Vaccines and Pharmaceuticals.

For each category of test, the Essential Diagnostics List specifies the type of test and intended use, format, and if appropriate for primary health care or for health facil-

ities with laboratories.

The list also provides links to WHO guidelines or publications and to pre-qualified products.

Similar to the WHO essen-

been in use for four decades, the essential diagnostics list is intended to serve as a reference for countries to update or develop their own list of essential diagnostics. The WHO will update the

essential diagnostics list on a regular basis. It is also expected to issue a call for applications to add categories to the next edition.

The list will expand significantly over the next few years, as it incorporates other important areas, including antimicrobial resistance, emerging pathogens, neglected tropical diseases and additional noncommu-nicable diseases, the statement added.

Anwar, 70, was convicted of sodomy in 2015 in a case he said

was aimed at crushing his alliance, which was making gains against Malaysia's long ruling coalition government. His sentence was set to end June 8 but last week's unexpected election win, which ended the National Front's 60-year rule, led to his swift release.

"Now there is a new dawn for Malaysia," he told a news confer-ence at his house. Anwar said he was grateful to Malaysians "re-gardless of race and religion, who stood by the principles of democracy and freedom." The election result was a demand for change and it's the new government's responsibility to ensure that mandate is honored, he said.

Earlier, Anwar was thronged by scores of supporters and reporters after he walked free from a hospital, where he was recovering from shoulder surgery, and whisked away to an audience with Malay-sia's king. The royal palace said in a statement that the monarch had



given Anwar a full pardon following advice from the Pardons Board

Analysts say his release could cause tensions in the new government led by Mahathir Mohamad, who after leading the four-party alliance in the election campaign has become the world's oldest leader at 92. Mahathir is the chair man of the alliance and Anwar is its de-facto leader.

Anwar sought to allay those concerns, saving he was not in a hurry over from Mahathir. Anwar's wife, Wan Azizah Wan Ismail, is cur-

rently the deputy premier.

Anwar, who needs to contest a by-election to become a member of Parliament said he doesn't want any Cabinet posts yet as he plans to spend time with his family and travel abroad for speaking engagements. He reiterated his full support for Mahathir's leadership and said their po-litical feud has long been buried.

"I have forgiven him. He has proven his mettle. He made his sacrifices and was maligned in the media. I tell you, it is like deja vu," Anwar said. "He has struggled and worked indefatigably hard. He has now supported the reform agenda. He facilitated my release. Why hathir's appointment of three top Cabinet posts, but Anwar said it was only a difference over the consultation process, adding it was Mahathir's prerogative as premier to form the Cabinet.

Mahathir, premier for 22 years until 2003, on Tuesday said that he will run the country for "one to two years" to fix Malaysia's financial problems.

It was Anwar's second spell in prison. Once a high flyer in the ruling party, Anwar was first convicted of homosexual sodomy and corruption after a power struggle with Mahathir in 1998.

Anwar and his supporters have long denied the sodomy allegations, saying they were concocted to destroy his political career. Yet rather than give up, Anwar worked from his prison cell to forge a new opposition alliance by ending the two-decade feud with Mahathir - a gamble that paid off when the alli-

ance won the May 9 polls.

Anwar said the royal pardon was granted to him on the grounds of a "travesty of justice" and a clear conspiracy to kill his political career by Naiib Razak, who was denied a third term as prime minister in the elections.

He said has no malice against Najib but the former leader "has

Anwar said he was touched that his 20-year struggle for reform has finally paid off.

Asked about the new govern-ment's pledge to review large Chinese infrastructure projects, Anwar said like Mahathir, he wel-comed Chinese investment but was concerned about the manner in which they were done. He said there must be transparency and accountability to ensure the deals were in the nation's interest.

"The hope is that Anwar and

Mahathir will find a way to work together especially during this pe-riod of transition," said Rashaad Ali, research analyst with the S. Ra-jaratnam School of International Studies in Singapore.

"This is an opportunity for both of them to move forward for the sake of the country. There may be clashes between these two big per-sonalities but (officials in their) coalition as well as the expectations of Malaysians will provide a check and balance," he said.

Anwar is expected to meet suporters at a rally later Wednesday.

Amnesty International said his

release was a "landmark moment for human rights" in Malaysia and called for repressive laws muzzling freedom of expression and assembly to be repealed.

Indian-Tibetan descent Aftab Pureval wins Democratic primary in US

WASHINGTON, MAY 16 (PTI): Aftab Karma Singh Pureval, an American of Indian-Tibetan descent, has won the Democratic primary for the first congressional district of Ohio, but faces a Himalayan task of defeating a 11-time Republican Congressman.

But for the 35-year-old, who was the first Democrat to get elected as the Hamilton County Clerk of Courts in more than 100 years, says climbing the Himalayas is in his DNA.

Congressman Steve Chabot has represented the seat since 1995 from the Republican bastion

"I am the first Tibetan-American to run for the Congress, Pureval told PTI in an interview.

"My story is improbably American. I am the son of a refugee. My mother was born in Tibet and she was forced to flee her home country along with my grandpar-

ents, he said.

He said, his grandparents and his mother made their way through the Himalayas to Nepal and entered India where

she grew up as a refugee.

His mother studied in a school in Mysore and later went to Delhi for college education, where she met his Punjabi father. "My (paternal) grandfather was in the Indian Army (Brig. Ajit Singh)," he said, adding that after marriage, his parents moved to the US and settled in Ohio, where he was born in 1982.

"They (Tibetan community) are very excited. I am connected with a lot of the community in all parts of the country through social media. They are thrilled to see me run, a Tibetan-American run for the US Congress. It is driving a lot of energy and they have been incredibly support-ing of my efforts," Pureval

WASHINGTON, MAY 16 (PTI): Declaring India a "Major Defence Partner" opens the door for increased mutual cooperation as India and the US have convergence of interests on a range of issues like maritime security. domain awareness, counter-piracy and counter-terrorism, a senior Pentagon official has said.

The US recognised India as a "Major Defence Partner" in 2016, a designation that allows India to buy more advanced and sensitive technologies from America at par with that of the US' clos-est allies and partners, and ensures enduring cooperation into the future. India and the US are

natural partners across a range of political, eco-nomic and security issues. Assistant Secretary of Defence, Asian and Pa-cific Security Affairs Randall Schriver said while testifying before a Senate Foreign Relations Committee's Subcommittee.

"In 2016, the United States declared India a 'Major Defense Partner', which opens the door for increased cooperation on a range of defence issues, most notably defence trade and technology," Schriver told the sub-committee on East Asia, the Pacific and International Cybersecurity Policy yesterday.
With a mutual desire

for global stability and support for a rules-based international order, India and the US have an increasing convergence of interests, including maritime security and do-main awareness, counter-piracy, countering terrorism, humanitarian countering assistance, and coordinated responses to natu-

Facebook shut 583 million fake accounts

PARIS. MAY 16 (AFP): Facebook axed 583 million fake accounts in the first three months of 2018, the social media giant has said, detailing how it enforces "community standards" against sexual or violent images, terrorist propaganda or hate speech.

Responding to calls for transparency after the Cambridge Analytica data privacy scandal, Facebook yesterday said those closures came on top of blocking millions of attempts to create fake accounts every

Despite this, the group said fake profiles still make up 3-4 percent of all active ac-

It claimed to detect almost 100 percent of spam and to have removed 837 million posts assimilated to spam over the same

Facebook pulled or slapped warnings on nearly 30 million posts containing sexual or violent images, terrorist propaganda or hate speech during the first quarter.

Improved technology using artificial intelligence had helped it act on 3.4 million posts containing graphic violence, nearly three times

more than it had in the last quarter of 2017.

In 85.6 per cent of the cases, Facebook detected the images before being alerted to them by users, said the report, issued the day after the company said about 200 apps had been suspended on its platform as part of an investigation into misuse of private

The figure represents between 0.22 and



0.27 per cent of the total content viewed by Facebook's more than two billion users from January through March.

"In other words, of every 10,000 content views, an estimate of 22 to 27 contained

graphic violence," the report said.

Responses to rule violations include removing content, adding warnings to content that may be disturbing to some users while not violating Facebook standards; and notifying law enforcement in case of a "specific, imminent and credible threat to human life".

Improved IT also helped Facebook take action against 1.9 million posts containing

terrorist propaganda, a 73 percent increase. Nearly all were dealt with before any alert was raised, the company said.

It attributed the increase to the enhanced use of photo detection technology.

Hate speech is harder to police using au-tomated methods, however, as racist or ho-mophobic hate speech is often quoted on posts by their targets or activists.

"It may take a human to understand and accurately interpret nuances like... self-referential comments or sarcasm," the report said, noting that Facebook aims to "protect and respect both expression and personal

Facebook took action against 2.5 million pieces of hate speech content during the period, a 56 increase over October-Decemper. But only 38 percent had been detected through Facebook's efforts -- the rest flagged

up by users.

The posts that keep the Facebook reviewers the busiest are those showing adult nudity or sexual activity -- quite apart from child pornography, which is not covered by the report.

Some 21 million such posts were handled in the period, a similar number to October-December 2017.

That was less than 0.1 percent of viewed content -- which includes text, images, videos, links, live videos or comments on posts -- Facebook said, adding it had dealt with nearly 96 percent of the cases before being alerted to them.

Facebook has come under fire for showing too much zeal on this front, such as removing images of artwork tolerated under its own rules.

In March, Facebook apologised for temporarily removing an advert featuring French artist Eugene Delacroix's famous work "Lib-erty Leading the People" because it depicts a bare-breasted woman

Facebook's head of global policy manage ment Monika Bicket said the group had kept a commitment to recruit 3,000 more staff to lift the numbers dedicated to enforcing standards to 7,500 at the start of this year.

of fact, and forged or fraudulently obtained a signature from Lee to give POW! Inc the exclusive use of Lee's identity, name, image, and likeness and each of them knew that their objective was unlawful and they intended to aid each other in achieving that unlawful objective," it added.

The suit also stated that Lee does not recall anyone reading to him the terms of the agreement and that he

did not knowingly sign the document.

It also claims that after the death of Lee's wife, Joan Lee, he became "the target of nessmen, and opportunists who saw a chance to take advantage of Lee's despon-dent state of mind, kind and devotion to his craft - a devotion that often allowed him to overlook the bad intentions in others when it came to his

Lee, who last month filed a case against his former manager Jerardo Olivarez for business fraud, has added him in the suit but not as defendent.

Lee claims that Olivarez used his influence to convince him to sign over powers of attorney.

The suit, filed through attorney Adam DH Grant, seeks to rescind the license agreement as well as "damages in excess of one billion dollars"
