have confirmed their participation, it informed.

This was nounced during a Sikkim Football Association press conference here on Sunday by SFA president, Menla Ethenpa accompanied by general secretary NT Bhutia and assistant publicity secretary Shyam Pradhan.

This year, the tournament will feature Mohun Bagan from Kolkata, Patha Chakra Football Club, Kolkata, ONGC-Mumbai, Air India-Mumbai, Indian Army [Red], Manang Masangdi Club and Nepal Army Club from Nepal, Calcutta Customs, Tibetan NSA, ARC Shillong, Royal United Sikkim Football Club and Sikkim Himalayan Sporting Club.

"This year, we managed to rope in Mohun Bagan Club after a long gap of

almost 14 years. Mo-hun Bagan became champion's of the tournament by defeating Arambagh Club, Bangladesh in 2001," Mr Ethenpa stated.

He informed that in its 11 appearances in Governor's Gold Cup so far, Mohun Bagan has lifted the champions' trophy nine times and was runner's-up twice. He further informed

that Indian Army [Red] and Nepal Army Club were participating for the first time in the tournament.

"We have given direct entry to the champion and runners-up of this year Sikkim premier division league in the boost the morale of the youth of the State and inject more enthusiasm and interest in the game," Mr Ethenpa said. SFA general secretary, Mr Bhutia in-

formed that the tournament will carry a cash prize of Rs 2 lakhs for the winners and Rs 1 lakh for runners-up team.

The inaugural match is scheduled to be played under floodlights on the evening of 05 October.

Books on Indian culture. morals now 'must' at railway platform kiosks

New Delhi, Sep 24 (PTI): Books on Indian culture and morals are now to be displayed for sale at all platform kiosks, a new stall policy to all zonal railways has mandated.

In a commercial cir-In a commercial cir-cular dated September 5, the Railway Board instructed all general managers to ensure that such books are found in railway stalls under the new Multi Purpose Stall (MPS) Policy.

"Zonal railways shall ensure that all MPS must display and sell books pertaining to Indian tra-dition, culture, values, morals and history," the circular, a copy of which is with PTI, stated.

All miscellaneous curio stalls, bookstalls, chemist stalls will now come under the multi purpose stalls, it said.

The policy super-sedes the Bookstall Policy of 2004 which man-dated that stalls will keep books on varied subjects like literature, history, children's literature, fiction, travel, light reading, art, culture, current affairs, professional interests, national integration, etc. in English, Hindi and regional languages.

The MPS Policy was drafted after it was felt that there was a need to have a single outlet at platforms from where passengers can purchase turn to pg03

FIFA U-17 World Cup: the springboard for future stars

NEW DELHI, SEP 24 (PTI): From the planet's costliest player Neymar to 'tiki-taka' kings Xavi and Iniesta to the ultima sorcerer Ronaldinho, the FIFA Under-17 World Cup has been the cradle for many of world football's household names.

India is hosting the 17th edition of the mega-event, the country's first-ever FIFA tour-

nament, from October 6 to 28.

Before they mesmerised millions of fans of the beautiful game, many of them took the 'baby steps' to stardom by taking part in this tourna-ment. Some of them -- Ron-aldinho, Iker Casillas, Xavi, Iniesta, Toni Kroos and Mario Goetz would go on to win the ultimate prize in world foot-

ball -- the FIFA World Cup. Ronaldinho played exactly 20 years back in 1997 in Egypt winning the trophy

for Brazil the first FIFA II-17 World Cup triumph for the South American football powerhouse. Casillas took Spain to the semi-final of the same tournament. He was not the team's only star in the mak-ing, as Barcelona and La Roja ace Xavi was handling the playmaking duties.

Four years junior to Xavi, Injesta was the midfield general of Spain in the 2001 edi-tion of FIFA U-17 World Cup in Trinidad and Tobago, along with Fernando Torres.

Xavi and Iniesta later

paired to mesmerise the world with their now-famous 'tiki-taka' football, forming the core of FC Barcelona and Spain midfield to help the two sides rule club and world

Opp flay **AIADMK** over 'lies' on Jaya's health; seek CBI probe

CHENNAI, SEP 24 (PTI): Opposition parties led by the DMK today pressed for a CBI probe into the death of former Tam-il Nadu chief minister Jayalalithaa, citing a state minister's recent remarks that AIADMK leaders "lied" about Jayalalithaa's health during her hospitalisation last vear.

The opposition called for "unravelling the mys-tery" behind the death of the AIADMK supre-mo, who passed away on December 5 last after 75 days of hospitalisation.

Forest Minister Din-

digul C Srinivasan, whose comments about the "lies" have drawn flak from the opposition, sought to make light of Stalin's demand by statfrom ing "it was not new for him to seek such a probe"

Addressing a public meeting in Madurai on September 22, Srinivasan had claimed that party leaders had "lied" Jayalalithaa's health, fearing her aide V K Sasikala, and sought the pardon of the public.

"No one was allowed to meet the late chief minister. Whoever came, would be briefed by Sasikala's relatives that she was all right," he had said.

"We were afraid of Sasikala at that time and lied about Javalalithaa's health condition," he had claimed

As the opposition latched onto his state-ment, the Tamil Nadu minister said they (AIAD-MK leaders) conveyed to the outside world what-ever was told to them by Sasikala. "Sasikala

and her family would tell us she (Jayalalithaa) ate idly, had coffee, was given sweets, did that and this...

we told what she (Sasikala) said," he said.

Speaking to reporters at his native Dindigul, Srinivasan said, "I do not care even if a CBI inquiry is ordered".

The minister also urged sidelined AIAD-MK leader and Sasikala's nephew T T V Dhina-karan to release "video proof" of the treatment given to Jayalalithaa as being claimed by him.

The enquiry commis

sion ordered by Chief Minister K Palaniswami in the matter would soon start its probe, and Dhinakaran would have to submit whatever proof he had in his possession on the matter before the commission, he said.

DMK working president M K Stalin stated that it was also the "responsibility of the Cen-tre" to get to the bottom of the "mystery".

"Since the central

government had assisted in the treatment of Jayalalithaa, it has a responsibility to unravel the mystery surrounding her death. Therefore, us ing its authority, it should immediately order a CBI probe into the matter," he said. The DMK leader said he was making the plea in his capacity as the Leader of Opposition in the state assembly.

IndiGo grounds one more A320 neo plane

MUMBAI, SEP 24 (PTI): Budget carrier IndiGo has grounded one more Airbus A320 neo plane after it was forced to return to Bhubaneswar following high engine vibrations experienced by the aircraft on the way to Bengaluru.
Since their induction

in March last year, the A320 neo planes in Indi-Go fleet are going out of operations at a regular interval due to the frequent glitches in the Pratt & Whitney engines, which power these planes. The airline currently

has 140 A320s, of which 23 are A320 Neos.
Though the US engine

maker has started supplying new engines to the country's largest airline by market share which has helped it put some of the grounded planes back into flying, many of such planes remain out operations, including the one which was grounded in Bhubaneshwar on September 20.

Last week, a senior official at the Directorate General of Civil Aviation (DGCA) had said that as many as six A320 neo planes of IndiGo were on ground and awaiting en-gine replacement.

"On September 20, IndiGo flight 6E-3869, which took-off at 8.50 pm for Bengaluru from Bhubaneswar, was diverted

due to the high vibrations in one of the engines of the A320 neo plane. The flight later made an emergency landing," an

official source said.

The aircraft is on ground since then, he said. Repeated calls and queries sent to IndiGo remained unanswered.

"The vibrations were caused due to the sudden rise in the exhaust gas temperature of an inter-nal combustion engine.

As the increased temperature could have burnt other engine components, the pilot was forced to return the flight back to Bhubaneswar," the official said.

Promoted by Rahul Bhatia and Rakesh Gangwal, the airline had taken off nine A320 Neos from its fleet in the June quarter

owing to engine issues.

After the media reported the grounding of nine planes, the airline issued a statement saying, "We have faced some issues with the neo en-gine, causing operational disruptions

Both Pratt & Whitney and Airbus are working to address the issues."

However, during the analysts call on Q1 earnings on July 31, airline Indi-Go's president and whole-time director Aditya Ghosh admitted that nine of their planes were on ground.

The stalls will also

sell artefacts and items of local and regional impor-tance, proprietary article depot items, drinking water, over-the-counter medicines and non-phar macy items like dry milk

powder, the circular said.
The policy also states that it will be mandatory for all such stalls to display and sell prominently the zonal railway timetable as well as the 'Trains at a Glance' publication and any other of-ficial publications of the railways.

Retailers, individuals, self-help groups can apply for a licence to run these stalls. The allot-ment will be done after a tendering process, the policy states.

The new policy has

also made it mandatory for such stalls to have a point of sale or swipe machine for acceptance of credit and debit cards from all customers with out charging any additional transaction charge for any sale above Rs 100. For amounts below Rs 100, payments through e-wallet would be acceptable, the policy



and FIFA World Cup stars are associated with the India event as brand ambassadors of the world



No Longer About If

...but planning still stuck for scenarios after 'when'

m hen}$ natural disasters stop being about 'if' and get reinforced with the certainty of a 'when', you know that it is time to get worried. As far as Sik-kim is concerned, this 'when' has been a 'now' for a while. When it comes to nature, it is obvious that its violent turns cannot be prevented. However, centuries of living in a particular region grooms people to instinctively respect the brute force of nature and adopt lifestyles which mitigate the impact of natural disasters. This preparedness of indigenous communities needs to now be resurrected and used to guide how the deployment of the best available modern technology can make Sikkim more natural disaster resilient. The urgency to wake up to such a realisation is rung in every year when the monsoon holds Sikkim hostage to its ferocity. In the recent years alone, this urgency should have entered the red band of alarm of public consciousness with the monsoon-imposed landslides of 1997 in the heart of Gangtok and then the temblor trailer of Valentine's Day 2006 which bookmarked the destruction which followed on 18 September 2011 with the rattle of an earthquake and the rumble of landslides. Sikkim has suffered extensive devastation to slides and quakes through history but has preferred a head-buried-in-the-sand approach towards preparedness of late.

This is not an attempt to instigate panic - although a little panic for the right things might not be a bad idea for disaster preparedness - but a wondering aloud on when the realization will arrive that development need not always involve the destruction of something and ignorance is not something that only government-sponsored awareness programmes can dispel. One wonders what happened to the hill people's pragmatism which streamlined lifestyles over centuries to bring it in sync with nature, only to lose it all in less than half a century of concrete-delivered develop-ment. The people of Sikkim have traditional identified the best and most secure ridges to settle their villages in, and in the past five decades, gone ahead and assaulted everything in the neighbourhood to compromise the stability of their own settlements. Reckless construction - of buildings and roads – has delivered traps which spring every monsoon and collapse too often. Neither landslides nor earthquakes are new to Sikkim; they have been around since much earlier than these hills were populated and people learned to live with it and survive the occasionally furious events. In the very recent, pre-2011 rattle, that of 2006, several buildings were damaged, and although suggestions were made to retrofit all important buildings – religious, cultural and administrative - of Sikkim, that idea found no takers. At that time, only structures which had suffered substantial damage and were too significant to be allowed to remain weak were retrofitted thanks to some aggressive lobbying by those who matter. In Gangtok, the Raj Bhavan [which had to be vacated after Valentine's Day 2006] and Enchey Monastery received this technological assistance. These works completed just in time, it appears, to validate the use when the 18 Sept need for refitted reinforcements, because 2011 quake rattled Sikkim, even though a building near Raj Bhavan collapsed and huts in the Enchey compound came down, both structures made it through the 18 September earthquake with no noticeable damage. Similarly, the State Archives Building which had been retrofitted after taking damage in the 1988 Bihar earthquake, weathered the 2006 earthquake rather well despite its proximity to Raj Bhavan which suffered substantially at the time. Tashiling Secretariat should have been considered for such reinforcement after the 2006 earthquake, but was ignored and now an entirely new building had to be constructed after the 2011event left the secretariat to unstable.

There is still time for some other structures. The Government should invest in retrofitting the more important buildings and then promote them as examples of what can be done. The technology can then be passed on to private citizens to adopt for their own constructions.

Five ways ancient India changed the world - with maths

It should come as no surprise that the first recorded use of the number zero, recently discovered to be made as early as the 3rd or 4th century, happened in In-dia. Mathematics on the Indian subcontinent has a rich history going back over 3,000 vears and thrived for centuries before similar advances were made in Europe, with its influence meanwhile spreading to China and the Middle

As well as giving us the

concept of zero, Indian math-ematicians made seminal contributions to the study of trigonometry, algebra, arithmetic and negative numbers among other ar-eas. Perhaps most significantly, the decimal system that we still employ worldwide today was first seen

THE NUMBER SYSTEM

As far back as 1200 BC, mathematical knowledge was being written down as part of a large body of knowledge known as the Vedas. In these texts, numbers were commonly expressed as combinations of powers of ten. For example, 365 might be expressed as three hundreds $(3x10^2)$, six tens $(6x10^1)$ and five units $(5x10^0)$, though each power of ten was represented with a name rather than a set of symbols. It is reasonable to believe that this representation using powers of ten played a crucial role in the development of the decimal-place value system in India.

From the third century BC, we also have written evidence of the Brahmi numerals, the precursors to the modern, Indian or Hindu-Arabic numeral system that most of the world uses today. Once zero was introduced, almost all of the mathematical mechanics would be in place to enable ancient Indians

THE CONCEPT OF ZERO

Zero itself has a much longer history. The recently dated first recorded zeros, in what is known as the Bakhshali manuscript, were simple placeholders – a tool to distinguish 100 from 10. Similar marks had already been seen in the Babylonian and Mayan cultures in the early centuries AD and arguably in Sumerian mathematics as early as 3000-2000 BC

But only in India did the placeholder symbol for nothing progress to become a number in its own right. The advent of the concept of zero allowed numbers to be written efficiently and reliably. In turn, this allowed for effective record-keeping that

meant important financial calculations could be checked retroactively, ensuring the honest actions of all involved. Zero was a significant step on the route to the democratisation of mathematics.

These accessible mechanical tools for working

with mathematical concepts, in combination with a strong and open scholastic and scientific culture, meant that, by around 600AD, all the ingredients were in place for an explosion of mathematical discoveries in India. In comparison, these sorts of tools were not popularised in the West until the early 13th century, though Fibonnacci's book liber abaci.

SOLUTIONS OF QUADRATIC EQUATIONS

In the seventh century, the first written evidence of the rules for working with zero were formalised in the Brahmasputha Siddhanta. In his seminal text, the astronomer Brahmagupta introduced rules for solving quadratic equations (so beloved of second-ary school mathematics students) and for computing square roots

RULES FOR NEGATIVE NUMBERS

Brahmagupta also demonstrated rules for working with negative numbers. He referred to positive numbers as fortunes and negative numbers as debts. He wrote down rules that have been in-terpreted by translators as: "A fortune subtracted from zero is a debt," and "a debt subtracted from zero is a fortune".

This latter statement is the same as the rule

we learn in school, that if you subtract a negative number, it is the same as adding a positive num-ber. Brahmagupta also knew that "The product of a debt and a fortune is a debt" – a positive number multiplied by a negative is a negative.

For the large part, European mathematicians were reluctant to accept negative numbers as meaningful. Many took the view that negative numbers were absurd. They reasoned that numbers

numbers. Indian and Chinese mathematicians recognised early on that one answer to this question was debts.

For example, in a primitive farming context, if one farmer owes another farmer 7 cows, then effectively the first farmer has -7 cows. If the first farmer goes out to buy some animals to repay his debt, he has to buy 7 cows and give them to the second farmer in order to bring his cow tally back to 0. From then on, every cow he buys goes to his positive total.

BASIS FOR CALCULUS

This reluctance to adopt negative numbers, and indeed zero, held European mathematics back for many years. Gottfried Wil-helm Leibniz was one of the first Europeans to use zero and the negatives in a systematic way in his development of calculus in the late 17th century. Calculus is used to measure rates of changes and is important in almost every branch of science, notably underpinning many key discoveries in modern

But Indian mathematician Bhāskara had already discovered many of Leibniz's ideas over 500 years earlier. Bhāskara, also made major contributions to algebra, arithmetic, geometry and trigonometry. He provided many results, for example on the solutions of certain "Doiphantine" equations, that would not

be rediscovered in Europe for centuries.

The Kerala school of astronomy and mathematics, founded by Madhava of Sangamagrama in the 1300s, was responsible for many firsts in mathematics, including the use of mathematical induction and some early calculus-related results. Although no systematic rules for calculus were developed by the Kerala school, its proponents first conceived of many of the results that would later be repeated in Europe including Taylor series expansions, infinitessimals and differentiation.

The leap, made in India, that transformed zero from a simple placeholder to a number in its own right indicates the mathematically enlightened culture that was flourishing on the subcontinent at a time when Europe was stuck in the dark ages. Al-though its reputation suffers from the Eurocentric bias, the subcontinent has a strong mathematical heritage, which it continues into the 21st century by providing key players at the forefront of every branch of mathematics.

How Taylor Swift became a femme fatale... with a little help from Sylvia Plath

In the opening shots of the video for her record breaking new single "Look What You Made Me Do", we see the zombie formerly known as Taylor Swift claw her way out of a grave. This shovel-wield-ing revenant is a far cry from the "girl next door" who, in the video for her 2006 debut single "Tim McGraw", innocently frolicked with a Chevy-driving, chisel-jawed high school heartthrob.

But even then there were clues that this coun-

try princess would grow up to become a shrewd pop culture queen. In that song's lyrics, she was swift to puncture the well-worn hyperbole of the

country love song: He said the way my blue eyes shined Put those Georgia stars to shame that night

I said 'That's a lie'
And she was also able to converse knowingly with the tropes of the genre – the "Dear Johnny" letter she leaves on her beau's porch references nu-merous country hits about the "Dear John" break-up note, typically left by a woman for her former lover.

Fast forward 11 years and Swift is again conversing with songs that have gone before. This time, though, it is her own back catalogue that she revisits through a series of visual clues for the eagle-eyed fan.

If the undead Swift's diaphanous dress looks familiar, that's because it's the one she wore in the video for her 2016 single "Out Of The Woods". This is not mere thriftiness on her part, as the legend on her recently vacated grave – "Here Lies Taylor Swift's Reputation" – makes plain.

Later, the song is punctuated with the spoken

I'm sorry, the old Taylor can't come to the phone right now

Oh, 'cause she's dead!

BAD ROMANCE

That this new single (her first solo material since her 2014 album 1989) comes hot on the tail of a series of media controversies is no coincidence. After well-publicised romantic breakups with Harry Styles, Calvin Harris and Tom Hiddleston, and celebrity feuds with Katy Perry, and the Kar-dashian-Wests, Swift has also recently won a civil case against a US radio DJ who sexually assaulted her in 2013, winning symbolic damages of US\$1 and raising awareness of the chronic underreporting of sexual violence against women.



The message is clear: no more Miss Nice Girl the new Taylor Swift will give as a good as she gets.

Swift is by no means the first young woman dramatically disown her wholesome image; for many child stars, it is a predictable (and often PR-choreographed) rite of passage. What makes Swift's rebranding particularly interesting, though, is the way in which she draws on literary figures for inspiration as she self-consciously cites herself in a long tradition of "good girls gone bad".

Perhaps the most famous of these women is that totem for 20th century female anguish, Sylvia Plath (whose Collected Letters will be released in October 2017).

As famous for her suicide at the age of 30 as for her small but searing body of work, Plath was creatively preoccupied with ideas and images of doubleness, death, rebirth, and reinvention. The young Plath, like the teenage Swift, was an obliging All-American blonde, who coyly posed for cheese-cake shots of swimwear fashions for the Cambridge University newspaper Varsity in 1956.

It was this unthreatening image that she was later to violently reject in famous poems such as "Lady Lazarus", "Daddy", and "Electra on the Azalea Path", in which a powerful female protagonist emerges, phoenix-like, from the ashes of trauma, to wreak vengeance on male oppressors.

Swift has been likened to Plath before. Lena Dunham, creator of the seminal HBO series Girls and a member of Swift's "squad", tweeted back in

Swift's "Look What You Made Me Do" is startlingly Plathian in a number of ways. Just as in Plath's poems we see a diverse cast of female figures drawn from myth, legend, and Jungian archetype (murderess, virgin, queen, lioness, lady and Godiva) all vying for position, at the end of Swift's video, 14 Taylor Swifts, old and new, line up to take their final bow, and the antipathy between them couldn't be clearer

Will the real Taylor Swift please stand up? LADY LAZARUS

As literature graduates everywhere could tell you, one of the most disquieting aspects of Plath's poem "Daddy" is the naive nursery rhyme patterning juxtaposed with Nazi and Holocaust imagery, coupled with the repeated crooning "ooo" sounds, suggestive of both baby talk and pillow talk:

I have always been scared of you,

With your Luftwaffe, your gobbledygoo

And your neat mustache

And your Aryan eye, bright blue.
In Swift's chorus, too, we hear this knowing breathiness – "Ooh, look what you made me do / Look what you made me do" – as she nonchalantly crashes a gold supercar into a jewellery store, writhes in a bathtub filled with diamonds, and mobilises an army of latex-clad fantasy girls ("living dolls" straight out of Plath's poem "The Applicant").

It is in the refrain, though, that Swift identifies herself most confidently as one of Plath's risen women. Echoing the Lady Lazarus with nine lives who asserts, "Dying / Is an art, like everything else / I do it exceptionally well", Swift recounts, "But I got smarter, I got harder in the nick of time / Honey, I rose up from the dead, I do it all the time

Both women acknowledge the rapacity of blic interest in their lives. Swift's 2014 singles "Blank Space" and "Shake It Off" satirise the media portrayal of her as "a girl who's crazy but seduc-tive but glamorous but nuts but manipulative", and Plath's Lady Lazarus turns the tables on "the peanut-crunching crowd", exploiting them as they seek

There is a charge
For the eyeing of my scars, there is a charge
For the hearing of my heart.

The woman formerly consumed by the male

gaze becomes the consumer as she warns: "Out of the ash / I rise with my red hair / And I eat men like air." Swift similarly warms to her new role as a femme fatale as she half-threatens, half-promises: "I'll be the actress starring in your bad dreams."

So what's next for Taylor Swift? If the chart performance of "Look What You Made Me Do" is anything to go by, it's even bigger things. Having clapped back to her haters with this self-reflexive single, she's now got the ticket touts in her sights.

They would do well to heed the lines from Plath's "Lady Lazarus" – "Beware / Beware".

BSF uses local intel, language skills to check Rohingya influx

The BSF has enhanced patrolling along 22 sensitive and vulnerable spots in West Bengal and is us-ing local language skills as well as intel to check the influx of Rohingyas into the country.

In most cases, the Rohingyas try to pass them-selves off as Bangladeshis if they are apprehended by the BSF, officials said.

To counter this. jawans adept in Benga li language are used for questioning.

"If a person crossing

the border illegally is apprehended, he is questioned by the jawans. And although Rohingyas try to identify them-selves as Bangladeshis, in most of the cases their accent of Bengali betrays them. The accent of Bangladeshis and Rohingvas are a bit different," said a senior BSF official.

A detailed questioning reveals their identity.

The 22 spots are spread across North

Trump travel ban expires Sunday; new restrictions expected

WASHINGTON, SEP 24 (AP): President Donald Trump is expected to announce new restrictions on travel to the United States as his ban on visitors from six Muslim-majority countries expires today, 90 days after it went into effect.

The Department of Homeland Security has recommended the president sign off on new, more targeted restrictions on foreign nationals from countries it says refuse to share information with the US or haven't taken necessary security precautions. Officials haven't said which or how many countries will be affected by the new restrictions, which could take effect as soon as today.

"The acting secretary has recom mended actions that are tough and that are tailored, including restrictions and enhanced screening for certain countries," said Miles Taylor, counselor to acting Homeland Security Secretary Elaine Duke.

The current han hars citizens of Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen who lack a "credible claim of a bona fide relationship with a person or entity in the United States" from entering the US.

Unlike Trump's first travel ban, which sparked chaos at airports across the country and a flurry of legal challenges, officials said they have been working for months on the new rules, in collaboration with various agencies and in conversa-tion with foreign governments.

The recommendations based on a new baseline devel-oped by DHS that includes factors such as whether countries issue electronic passports with biometric information and share information about travelers' terror-related and criminal histories.


The US then shared those

benchmarks with every country in the world and gave them 50 days to comply. The citizens of countries that refused could now face travel restrictions and more stringent screening measures that would last indefinitely, until their

governments complied.

Trump last week called for a "tougher" travel ban after a bomb partially exploded on a London subway. "The travel ban into the United States should be far larger, tougher and more specific-but stu-pidly, that would not be politically correct!" he tweeted.

Critics have accused the president of overstepping his authority and violating the US Constitution's protections against religious bias. Trump had called for a "total and complete shutdown of Muslims entering the United States" during his campaign.



Meghnad's book explores Modi, Trump rise; 'collapse' of old world order


In "Politic Shock: Trump, Modi, Brexit & the Prospect for Liberal Democracy", Desai makes a study of how Modi and Trump won the elections.

Desai, who sits as a Labour Peer in the UK's House of Lords, navigates the issues of populism and nationalism which he savs now are cast as "undesirable" tendencies and adds it is "presumptuous" to cast either as an "unmitigated bad".

Talking about Modi, the author brings to fore his penchant for using social media "imagina-tively" to attract youth, a "quality elusive to Con-gress leader Rahul Gandhi, then 40, who was pitted against the threetime Gujarat chief minister in the race for the prime minister's office".

"Modi won because he had a message which carried to the new voters who were children when the riots had taken place

They did not read newspapers but relied on social media. Modi had



dia technology. He used Twitter imaginatively, made himself accessible online with a campaign team ever ready to respond to queries. This was the new technology of campaigning which the other parties were slow to replicate," Desai

"Rahul Gandhi, the leader of the Congress party and the son, grandand great-grandson of prime ministers. was younger than Modi but had no penchant for social media. Rather like (Hillary) Clinton the Congress and Rahul Gandhi had a sense of entitlement. Power right-fully and due to historical primacy belonged to him. Modi was an interloper," says the book, published by Rupa.

While tracing Modi's journey from a small town in Gujarat to Delhi, Desai defines him as less of an outsider in political terms, but more in social terms as they are defined

"The elite is upper caste, anglophone anglicized.

Modi speaks in Hindi, as his first choice, though he can speak in English and has mastered it much more since he became the prime minister and began to travel abroad extensively," he writes.

"He (Modi) became

the prime minister at the same time as he became a member of Parliament (MP). Unlike previous prime ministers of India, he was not familiar with the Delhi political scene He has shown a tremen dous capacity for hard work and has been effective in consolidating the position of the BIP as a ruling party across the different regions of India in the three years as the prime minister," he adds.

Internet searches NEW DELHI, SEP 24 (PTI): Want to know more about secrets of people? Just analyse their Internet searches, says a book by Seth Stephens-Davidowitz, who has used Google data to measure racism, self-induced abortion, depression, child abuse and hateful

Internet searches also have lots of information that is missed by the polls that can be helpful in understanding, among many

other subjects, an election, he says.
"Everybody Lies: What the Internet Can Tell Us About Who We Really Are", published by Bloomsbury, explores the secrets embedded in Internet searches.

Everybody lies, to friends, lovers, doctors, pollsters - and to themselves. In Inter-net searches, however, people confess their secrets - about sexless marriages, mental health problems, even racist views

Seth, an economist and a former Goo gle data scientist, shows that this could just be the most important dataset ever collected.

He explains how we can use information to change our culture, and the questions we're afraid to ask that might be essential to our health - both emotional and On polling and voting, he writes, "There

is information on who will actually turn out to vote. More than half of citizens who don't vote tell surveys immediately before an election that they intend to, skewing our estima-tion of turnout, whereas Google searches for 'how to vote' or 'where to vote' weeks before an election can accurately predict which parts of the country are going to have a big showing at the polls."

Seth says there might even be information on who they will vote for.

"Can we really predict which candidate people will vote for just based on what they search? Clearly, we can't just study which candidates are searched for most frequently. Many people search for a candidate because they love him. A similar number of people him," he says.

Book explores

secrets embedded in

A large percentage of election-related searches contain queries with both candidates' names, he says.

"During the 2016 US election between Donald Trump and Hillary Clinton, some people searched for "Trump Clinton polls'. Others looked for highlights from the 'Clinton Trump debate'. In fact, 12 per cent of search queries with "Trump' also included the word 'Clinton'. More than one-quarter of search queries with 'Clinton' also included the word 'Trump'," he writes

Seth says he also found that these seemingly neutral searches may actually give some clues to which candidate a person supports.

"The order in which the candidates appear. Our research suggests that a person is significantly more likely to put the candidate they support first in a search includes both candidates' names.

"In the previous three elections, the candidate who appeared first in more received the most votes. More

interesting, the or-der the candidates were searched was predictive of which way a particular state would go. The order in which candidates are searched also seems to contain information that the polls can miss," he writes.

So did Google predict Trump?
"Well, we still have a lot of work to do

- and I'll have to be joined by lots more researchers - before we know how best to use Google data to predict election results. This elections for which this data exists," Seth

"I am certainly not saying we are at the point - or ever will be at the point - where we can throw out public opinion polls complete-

y as a tool for helping us predict elections.

But there were definitely portents, at many points, on the Internet that Trump might do better than the polls were predicting," he adds.

During the general election, there were clues that the electorate might be a favour able one for Trump, he says.

"Black Americans told polls they would turn out in large numbers to oppose Trump. But Google searches for information on voting in heavily black areas were way down.

On election day, Clin-ton would be hurt by low black turnout There were even signs that supposed-

undecided voters were going Trump's way," he writes. Seth says he has spent just about ev-ery day of the past

four years analysing Google data. This included a stint as a data scientist at Google, which hired him after learning about his racism re

data.

Follow the leader: meditation takes AAP by storm

New Delhi, Sep 24 (PTI):
Cilence is not just golden, but seems to She catching as well.

Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Keiriwal's trusted aides are known to follow him in hours of crisis and turbulence. And now it

appears for peace and quiet as well.

Kejriwal's tryst with vipassana - a regimen of meditation and silence -- has had a cascading effect on his party, with many other leaders treading the path of the ancient Buddhist practice.

The chief of the Aam Aadmi Party (AAP), who returned recently from one such session, tweeted after the course, "Jst finished Vipassna meditation course. Its bliss. Hope someday, me n my wife will fully immerse ourselves in meditation (sic)."

He has also sparked an interest in na-ture cure. Like Kejriwal, who often turns to natural therapy to heal ailments such as high blood sugar, his lieutenants are attend-ing naturopathy courses, traditional Indian systems of cure entailing meditation, yoga

and well-balanced vegetarian diets.

Vipassana is quite the rage in the AAP. Among its adherents are Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, Kejriwal's close confidant since his activist days Delhi Commission for Women (DCW) chief Swati Maliwal, former Delhi unit convenor Dilip Pandey, former Punjab co-in-charge Durgesh Pathak and Atishi

Marlena, who is executing the Delhi government's flagship initiatives in the education sector. A host of other middle-rung leaders and volunteers are also enrolling them-selves in vipassana sessions where par-

ticipants have to maintain full silence for

usually a period of 10 days.

Clearly, for leaders of a party that is less than five years old, has formed a government in Delhi twice and is the princi-pal opposition force in Punjab, meditation helps in tackling the stress that politics and power to say nothing of organisational problems and recurring dissent -- pres-

Party leaders say that Kejriwal, an ardent practitioner of vipassana, has com-pleted over 35 sessions of the 10-day meditation course over a span of ten years or so. "After every session, he is back with new fervour and enthusiasm," says an aide.

Kejriwal's recent vipassana session at Igatpuri in Nashik was also attended by Maliwal and a mid-rung AAP leader.

"Five volunteers also joined in when people got to know that Arvind (Kejriwal) is attending the advanced vipassana course, which was meant for those who have completed at least three sessions in the past. It was only after the completion (of the course) that we got to know about them," a party leader said.

AAP's national convenor makes it a

point to attend a vipassana session before or after every major election the party

He joined one after the hectic 2014 Lok Sabha polls, in which AAP performed poorly, losing all seven seats in Delhi and to Prime Minister Narendra Modi in Varanasi. Since then he has been attending the course every year. Before the Punjab polls, Kejriwal and

Pathak attended a 10-day course in Dharamshala in Himachal Pradesh in August last year. After the session, Kejriwal was involved in a hectic campaign in Punjab and Goa till the state elections in February

"I owe my success and what I am today it because of vipassana. It helps me get over defilement and anger, and increases my focus. It simply renews my passion towards my work. The best part of it is that the practice is non-sectarian," said Maliwal, who was introduced to the meditation practice by Kejriwal in 2008.

Since then the DCW chief, who has

been associated with Kejriwal since his activist days, has attended 17 such sessions.

AAP leader Naveen Jaihind, Maliwal's

husband, the party's Haryana convenor and vipassana practitioner, said the meditation system made one "mentally strong" and reduced stress.

"It removes hate and animosity filled within oneself. It gives new ideas and in-creases mental strength to deal with challenges," Jaihind, another of Kejriwal's close sociates, said.

Kejriwal, a diabetic, started attending naturopathy courses at Bengaluru after his blood sugar shot up considerably soon after the 2015 Assembly polls victory in Delhi.

AAP leader Sanjay Singh said Kejriwal did not ask anyone to practise silence and meditation, but they followed him after seeing the "positive changes".

Singh, who had accompanied Kejriw-

al for a naturopathy course in Bengaluru after the Punjab polls, said the session helped him reduce stress and his weight by six kilograms. He had done a similar course in 2013 after the party tasted power in its maiden polls in Delhi.

Apart from Singh, Pathak and AAP's Sangrur MP and Punjab convenor Bhag-want Mann also accompanied Kejriwal for the course in Bengaluru.

3.5-magnitude quake rattles N. Korea near nuclear test site

BEIJING, SEP 23 (AFP): A shallow 3.5-magnitude earthquake which hit North Korea near the country's nuclear test site today was likely an aftershock from the hermit state's missile test on September 3, a nuclear test ban watchdog and other experts said. Lassina Zerbo,

ecutive secretary of the Comprehensive Nuclear Test Ban Treaty Organisation (CTBTO), tweeted the quake was "unlikely Man-made! Similar to 'collapse' event 8.5 mins after DPRK6" a reference to the second tremor that followed the September

The most probable hypothesis at present is that this is a consequence of the previous event, which was of a significant magnitude and may still have repercussions in a fracture zone,

Zerbo told AFP.

The China Earthquake Networks Center (CENC), which initially spoke of a "suspected explosion," also said it believed today's tremor was not the result of a fresh test, Xinhua news agency reported after the China Earthquake Administration, of which CENC is a part, studied infrasonic data of the lat-

est quake.
The CENC said the epicenter was at 41.36 degrees north latitude and 129.06 degrees east latitude, similar to another quake on September 3 after the North Korean

nuclear test that day. South Korea's Yonhap news agency quoted the Korea Meteorological Agency (KMA) as saying "there is no possibility that this could be an artificial quake."

The quake came after days of increasingly bellicose rhetoric between US President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong-Un's regime, as international alarm mounts over Pyongyang's nuclear ambitions.
The United States

Geological Survey (USGS) said the quake struck around 20 kilometres away from the North's nuclear test site, where earlier this month Pyongyang detonated its sixth and largest device, which it claimed was a hydrogen bomb capable of being launched on a missile

"This event occurred in the area of the previous North Korean Nuclear tests. We cannot con-clusively confirm at this time the nature (natural or human-made) of the event. The depth is poorly constrained and has been held to five kilome-tres by the seismologist," USGS said in a statement.

The North's last test, on September 3, was the country's most powerful detonation, triggering a much stronger 6.3- magnitude quake that was felt across the border in China

A second tremor soon after that test was possi-bly caused by a "cave-in", CENC said at the time.

The test prompted bal condemnation, leading the United Nations Security Council to unani-mously adopt new sanc-tions that include restrictions on oil shipments

Trump warns N.Korea; says "they won"t be around much longer"

New YORK, SEP 24 (PTI): US President Donald Trump has warned North Korea, saying if the country's foreign minister was echoing thoughts of his supreme leader Kim Jong-Un in his threatening speech at the UN, "they won't be around much longer."

North Korea's Foreign Minister Ri Yong Ho yes-

terday attacked Trump at the UN General Assembly deriding him as a "mental-ly deranged" leader whose threats had increased the chances of military con-frontation. "Just heard Foreign Minister of North Korea speak at UN.

If he echoes thoughts

of Little Rocket Man, they won't be around much longer!" Trump tweeted last night. In his speech, Ri had said that the US and its allies "think twice" should before threatening his country.

He said that by repeatedly calling Kim "Rocket Man," Trump is making "our rocket's visit to the entire US mainland inevitable all the more."

The foreign minister also said Trump is a

gambler who grew old using threats, frauds and all other schemes to acquire a patch of land."

Ri jumped into the nickname game as well, saying Americans call saying Trump the "Commander in Grief," "Lyin' King," and "President Evil."

Trump and Kim have traded increasingly threat-ening and personal insults as Pyongyang races to-wards its goal of developing a nuclear-tipped missile capable of reaching the US.

Tensions have dramatically risen on the Korean peninsula after North Korea early this month conducted its big-gest nuclear test, which its state-run KCNA news agency described as a hydrogen bomb.

Int'l community must call on India to halt aggressive acts: Pak

24 (PTI): Pakistan today accused India of adopting a posture of that of a "predator" and said if the international community wishes to avoid a dangerous escalation between the two neighbours, it must call on New Delhi to halt its provocations and

aggressive actions.

Terming India as the "mother of terrorism" in South Asia, Pakistan's Ambassador to the UN Maleeha Lodhi accused it of sponsoring terrorism in various parts of her country.

Exercising her right to reply after External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj yesterday hit out at Pakistan for creating terror groups like LeT, JeM, Hizbul Mujahideen and the Haqqani Network, Lodhi alleged that "in her vitriol she (Swaraj) deliberately ig-nored the core issue" of

Swaraj in her remarks

did not mention Kashmir. "If the international community wishes to avoid a dangerous esca-lation between India and Pakistan, it must call on India to halt its provo-cations and aggressive actions. It must end the ceasefire violations along the Line of Control.

It must halt its sponsorship of terrorist groups against Pakistan," sponses are normally given by a low level foreign service official, it was quite significant that the top Pakistani dip-lomat took up the floor to launch a verbal dual against India.

India did not imme diately exercise its right to response to Lodhi s remarks, in which Pakistan for the second time accused the National Security Advisor Ajit K Doval of interfering in Balochistan.

Lodhi said if the par-

ties fail to resolve a dispute, the UN and the in-ternational community has not only the right but the obligation to intervene and help to resolve

the dispute.
"UN Security Council resolutions do not lapse with time.

Or are 'overtaken', as the Indian foreign minister put it. Law has no expiry date. Morality has no sell-by date. India's posture is that of the predator. It cannot escape its legal and moral obligation to abide by the resolutions of the Security Council," she said.

Referring to Swaraj's remarks on terrorism and her push for a definition, Lodhi said the UN should actually define terrorism.

"In that definition, we should include 'state terrorism'.

Mattis' India visit aimed at taking Indo-US defence ties to next level

WASHINGTON, SEP 24 (PTI): US Defence Secretary James Mattis will seek to take the India-US defence ties to the next level during his visit to India this week, with discussion on F-16s and the security situation in the region likely to dominate the

Firmly of the view that a stronger India both in terms of military and economy is in America's national interest. Mattis would meet his Indian counterpart Nirmala Sitharaman, National Security Advisor Ajit K Doval and also call on Prime Minister Narendra Modi.

This is the first Cabinet-level visit to India under the Trump administration.

Informed sources familiar with the preparations of the visit told PTI that the trip would be used to develop new institutional mechanisms to elevate the status of India-US defense relationship, showcase enhanced strategic co-operation in Afghanistan and strengthen maritime security and rule of law in the Indo-Pacific region.

While no specific defence trade deal is likely to be announced during Mattis India visit on September 26-27, sources said there would be discussions on two specific proposals of



F-16 and F-18A under Modi's Make in India campaign, along with efforts to identify new projects under the ambitious Defence Technology and Trade Initiatives (DTTI).

The Trump administration wants to sell F-18 and F-16 fighter planes

to India, built by American companies Boeing and Lockheed Martin respectively. Both companies have offered to assemble these planes in

Ahead of his visit, Mattis met In-dian Ambassador to the US Navtej

est of the rare gesture, Mattis came down to the River side entrance of down to the River side entrance of the Pentagon to receive Sarna. The Indian envoy said meeting was "very positive and cordial." And after the meeting, the De-

fense Secretary came down to see him off. This is also the first follow up visit by a US cabinet official after Modi's June trip to the US. During the visit, the two countries are expected to review the defence and strate-gic decisions taken by Modi and US

President Donald Trump in June.
During his India visit, Mattis is likely to talk with Sitharaman and other Indian leaders on the new Afghan strategy and the Indo-Pacific region.

Trump while announcing his new Afghan policy had asked India to do more to help Afghanistan with its developmental needs. According to officials, Mattis is interested in accelerating the pace of India-US defense co-operation and making it an effective tool in achieving the goal of peace and stability in the entire region ranging from South Asia to Indo-Pacific region.

Mattis, it is learnt, is taking along with him some of his own ideas in this regard, which he would like to discuss with the Indian leadership and get their feedback.

And to take the relationship to the next level, including more exercise and sale of high-tech defence equipment, the Pentagon instead of the foundational agreements is now looking for some India specific documentation that would provide institutional mechanisms, address India's concerns and meet the Congressional-mandated legislative requirements in this regard.

This could be seen major climbdown, as India had been resisting from signing any foundational agreements for the past several years because of sovereignty

In his interaction with the Indian leaders, Mattis is also expected to discuss how to advance and Major Defense Partnership, a designation given to India by the previous Obama Administration which has been continued by the Trump Administration.

Mattis' India visit comes in less

than a week after External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj had her first bilateral meeting with US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson in New York on the sidelines of the UN General Assembly session.
