### Agri Minister interacts with West Sikkim farmers

CONSTRUCTION OF 2 VEGETABLE COLLECTION CENTRES AT THARPU

GANGTOK. 10 IAN [IPR]: In his ongoing interaction with farmers of West Sikkim, the Minister for Agriculture & Horticulture Department, Somnath Poudyal today announced that two collection centres for vegetables will be constructed at Tharpu and that milching cows will be provided to progressive farmers of the area.

The Minister interacted with

farmers of Soreng-Chakung constituency today at the community hall at Tharpu in West Sikkim. He was accompanied by the area MLA and HRDD Minister, RB

In his address, Mr Poudyal stated that farmers play a big role in taking the State and nation ahead further adding that farmers should work hard on the policies of the state govern-

ment for organic farming.
Stating that middlemen have been eating into the profits of farmers, he stated that the government has been trying to change this and provide full benefits to farmers.

Further, the Minister said

that legal action will be taken against those using chemical fertilizers and pesticides in

farming.

He added that farmers could



work with Patanjali for the mar keting of turmeric, ginger and

Mentioning the 25% subsidy on loans for farming he urged the youth to work in organic farming and assured to provide all required support from the government. Mr Poudyal sug-gested that young farmers could make use of technology and sell vegetables online.

He also directed departmen-

tal officials to provide seeds and facilities to farmers on time.

HRDD Minister, RB Subba

stated that organic produce of the State will fetch better prices in the market and encouraged farmers to increase their production.

He mentioned that the gov-ernment has also provided vegetable collection vehicles for the convenience of farmers. He urged Panchayats and people to work together for further development of their respective areas.

In the interaction session. farmers placed the issues of water shortage and damages to crop by wild animals and others. In response, Mr Poudyal informed that the CM has already directed the concerned department to address the issue of wild animals damaging crops. On water shortage, he assured to immediately work on finding solutions for the benefit of local

On the occasion, the Minister also distributed tokens of poul-try to 10 beneficiaries, piglets to five beneficiaries, low cost green house to five beneficiaries and power tiller to one beneficiary.

### Aadhar-generated Virtual ID to address privacy concerns

New Delhi, 10 Jan (PTI): In a bid to address privacy concerns, the UIDAI today introduced a new concept of 'Virtual ID' which Aadhaar-card holder can generate from its website and give for various purposes, including SIM verification, instead of sharing the actual 12-digit biometric ID.

This will give the users the option of not sharing their Aadhaar number at the time of authentication.

The Virtual ID, which would be a random 16-digit number, together with biometrics of the user would give any authorised agency like a mobile company, limited details like name, address and photograph, which are enough for any verification.
Officials said a user can

IDs as he or she wants. The older ID gets automatically cancelled once a fresh one is generated.

The Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) has also introduced the concept of 'limited KYC' under which it will only provide need-based or limited details of a user to an authorised agency that is providing a particular service, say, a telco.
The Virtual ID will be

a temporary and revocable 16 digit random number mapped to a person's Aadhaar number and the Aadhaar-issuing body will start accepting it from March 1, 2018.

From June 1, 2018 it will be compulsory for all agencies that undertake authentication to accept the Virtual ID from their

Agencies that do not migrate to the new system to offer this additional option to their users by the stipulated deadline will face finan-

cial disincentives. "Aadhaar r number holder can use Virtual ID in lieu of Aadhaar number whenever authentication or KYC services are performed. Authentication may be performed using the Virtual ID in a manner similar to using Aadhaar number," a UID-

Addinant fulliber, a OID-Al circular said. The move aims to strengthen the privacy and security of Aadhaar data and comes amid heightened concerns around the collection and storage of personal and demographic data of individuals.

### Supreme Court to form fresh SIT to monitor probe into 186 anti-Sikh riot cases

NEW DELHI, JAN 10 (PTI): The Court today Supreme said it would constitute a fresh three-member SIT, to be headed by a former high court judge, to monitor probe into 186 anti-Sikh riot cases that followed the assassination of the then prime minister In-dira Gandhi in 1984, in investigations were closed.

A bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra asked the Centre to suggest names today itself for its consideration and appointment in the proposed Special Investiga-

tion Team (SIT).
The bench, comprising justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, said the proposed committee will be headed by a former high court judge and consist of one retired and one serving police officer.

It also made it clear

the retired police officer shall not be below the rank of DIG at the time of superannuation.

The apex court said

a supervisory body, appointed by it has found that out of 241 cases, 186 cases were closed without investigation.

The apex court today perused the report of the supervisory body which was submitted before it in a leather box with number-lock system.

The supervisory body, which had sub-mitted the final report, comprised former apex court judges Justice J M Panchal and Justice K S P Radhakrishnan.

On August 16, last year, the apex court had appointed the supervisory panel to examine the SIT's decision to close 241 cases in the 1984 anti-Sikh riots matter and asked it to submit report in three months.

The Centre had ear-lier said that out of the 250 cases which were investigated by the SIT, closure reports were filed in 241.

It had said that nine cases were still being investigated by the SIT, while two are being

probed by the Central Bureau of Investigation.

The apex court had

on March 24, 2018, asked the Centre to place be-fore it the files pertaining to the 199 cases of the anti-Sikh riots which the special investigation team (SIT) set up by the Home Ministry had decided to "close". The SIT is headed by

Pramod Asthana, an IPS officer of 1986 batch, and has Rakesh Kapoor, a re-tired district and sessions judge, and Kumar Gyanesh, an additional deputy commissioner of Delhi Police, as its members.

The anti-Sikh riots after the assassination of the then prime minister Indira Gandhi claimed 2,733 lives in Delhi alone.

The government had earlier filed a status report on the probe conducted by the SIT in the cases.

Kahlon, a member of the Delhi Sikh Gurdwara Management Committee, had sought the court's direction for setting up an SIT to ensure speedy justice to riots victims.

Dubbed to be the next big thing in Indian Football due to his impressive performances at junior level, Uttam Rai from Sikkim could not live up to that billing after he grad-uated to senior level football but this tough lad is still undeterred and wants to prove his mettle once again.

"Competing in the junior level for my country was one of my best memories in football till now. My club performances have not been good enough due to many major injuries for the last 2-3 years. I am determined to focus on my fitness and play as many matches as possible," said Uttam.

Uttam Rai born in Chumbung, West Sikkim quickly moved up the ladder of junior football after joining Namchi Sports Hostel in 2007. He played in Subroto Cup and in one of the matches playing for Namchi Sports Hostel he scored four goals in 35 minutes. After the impressive performance in the tournament he got a scholarship with Air Force Academy. Uttam played three seasons in Subroto Cup scoring 32 goals. In 2010 he got scholarship to train at the IMG Soccer Academy in Florida, United States along with 14 other players from India Under-16 team. He played in Dallas Cup but got injured. A year later he scored six goals in 4 matches in the AFC U-16 Championship Qualifiers,

In the Under-16 level Uttam scored five goals in a match against Kyrgyzstan in the AFC U-16 Championship qualifiers. Then he moved to the Under-19 India and made three appearances. He is yet to get a senior team call up.

Uttam made his professional debut with Dempo Sports Club, Goa in 2015. Then he played for Chennaiyin FC in the Indian Super Location the Indian Super League af-ter which he moved to Minerva Punjab FC on loan then he signed for Mohun Bagan AC. In all these clubs he could not per-

form to the best of his ability.

Currently he is playing for Churchill Brothers in the I-League and has started a lot of games for them upfront though Churchill sits at the bottom of the table with just

"I have been hearing about

Uttam Rai ready to bounce back after a series of injuries Churchill Brothers since I was young so I'm very happy that I'm playing here this season. We didn't start very well in I-League but we are getting better match after match," said Uttam about his experience so far with Churchill Brothers, the only Goa based Club in the

I-League this season.

Footballers like Uttam prove what an injury can do to young players but this boy from Sikkim comes across as a strong individual and we should not doubt his ability to once again set Indian Football

GANGTOK, 10 JAN: Two men, a 50-year-old from Melli, South Sikkim and a 27-year-old Sikkim and a 27-year-old resident of Turuk, South Sikkim were arrested and booked by Melli Police on 09 Jan under Protection Of Children from Sexual Offenses Act, 2012 for sexually assaulting a 17-year-old girl. The accused persons were reported to the po-lice by the victim's aunt who said that her niece confessed that both the accused persons sexually assaulted her many months back resulting in a pregnancy. The minor girl has been sent to hospital for medical ex-amination while the accused persons have been formally arrested by the

police.
On the same day at Namchi, South Sikkim, a 51-year-old man was arrested under POCSO Act, 2012 for sexually assaulting a 14-year-old girl on 09 Jan. The victim was rescued by the Child Line Namchi on 05 Jan from a hotel in Namchi. The victim further revealed that she was also sexually assaulted by her own father when she was 12 years old. The victim has been sent to a med-ical center for medical examination while the accused has been arrest-ed by the police.

Users can go to the UIDAI website to generate their virtual ID which will be valid for a defined period of time, or till the user decides to change it.

They can give this Virtual ID to service agencies along with the fingerprint at the time of authentication. Since the system generated Virtual ID will be mapped to an individual's Aadhaar number itself at the back end, it will do away with the need for the user to share Aadhaar number for authentication.

It will also reduce the collection of Aadhaar numbers by various agencies.

As per the UIDAI, agencies that undertake authentication would not be allowed to generate the Virtual ID on behalf of Aadhaar holder.

The UIDAI is instruct-ing all agencies using its authentication and eKYC services to ensure Aad-haar holders can provide the 16-digit Virtual ID instead of Aadhaar number within their application.

As many as 119 crore biometric identifiers have been issued so far and Aadhaar is required as an identity proof of residents by various government and non-government entities.

For instance, government has made it mandatory for verifying bank account and PAN to weed out black money and bring unaccounted wealth to book. The same for SIM has been mandated to establish the identity of mobile phone users.

KATHMANDU, JAN 10 er in Nepal has claimed six more lives, taking to 30 the death toll due to severe winter conditions over the past week across the country, according to a media report.

Two persons each died in Rautahat, Parsa and Banke districts over the past 48 hours, according to the police.

Over the week, near ly 14 people were killed from Saptari district while five each in Rautahat and Siraha districts in the Tarai region, it said.

In Saptari district. seven persons, includ-ing a 7-month- old child, were killed due to excessive cold in various municipalities.

Life has been severe ly affected by the cold waves that hit mainly southern Nepal districts over the past one week In Kathmandu the mercury fell to minimum zero de gree Celsius in the past two days.

Replying to a question on what message he wants to give in the wake of violence at Koregaon Bhima in Pune district on January 1, the spiritual leader said, "Religion is a personal business. Whether you follow this religion or that religion, it is personal matter. We should not mobilise...as we Buddhist, we Hindus, we Muslims. That is not

Dalits visiting a war memorial at Koregaon Bhima were attacked here on January 1 that led to a state-wide shut-down in Maharashtra two days later.



In his speech at the conference, the Dalai Lama hailed the Indian society for accommodating diverse religious

"The largest democracy in the world, India is young and yet a complicated nation. The country has remarkable tolerance when it comes to safeguarding religious faiths of different religions," he said. He also said that In-

### Internet speed far below what service providers claim: study

NEW DELHI, JAN 10 (PTI):

A study conducted by a voluntary action group working for consumer rights has found that the internet speed provided to users the country is far below what is claimed by the service providers, and is amongst the lowest internationally.

The study, conducted by the 'Consumer Voice', has also concluded that consumers are not able to distinguish among poor, average and good quality

"A striking finding was that the internet speed the service providers are giving to the users are far below what they claim and amongst the lowest internationally," the group said in a

The study has found out that it is not just the provision of service that will help the country become 'Digital India' rather quality of internet service that determines the sustainability of this vision.

"It is for this (reason) that the stakeholders are urged to take corrective and timely measures that ensure promising future for internet service by serving the mutual interest of all," it

The audit of wireless internet speed was also conducted in eight states across four telecom circles and it was found that users get much lower speed than what is claimed through this mode also

The study also shows a wide

gap between 3G and 4G speed claims of internet service pro-viders and their actual performance.

"The poor level of internet speed requires the government and the telecom regulator to devise mechanism to improve internet speed in one way or another," the study said.

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#### Branding Identity Work on image, not on slights

dentity, as in the perception others hold of us, has always been a touchy issue among communities inhabiting the margins. The margins in this case, as much geographic as social and class/caste defined. People of the Northeast, those from South India and the Kashmiris, as also the Dalits all over the country and the tribals of Central India who find themselves surrounded by the "civilized", all have many experiences to share of how stereotyped prejudices hound them whenever they are away from home.

The ill-informed clichés, the pedantic, and thus of-

fensive, generalizations remain sore points for the of-fended communities and we live in a region that has lived with such broad-brush impoliteness for ever since we started interacting with the mainstream. While it is easy to take affront and tempting to draft fresh introductions to correct the perceptions, it is definitely not okay to allow the ignorance of others to become chips on our shoulders... that becomes a burden heavier than is healthy. But too many of us lug it around. The more perceived slights are allowed to fester, the more they divert energy from pursuits that take us forward. One refers to a "perceived slight" here because the clichés that hurt are a product of ignorance [theirs, not ours] and one should not really allow ignorance in others to convince us to withdraw into cocoons. And defensive shells are not the best habitations to plan forward from because they keep thoughts and ideas rooted in a past that has lost its relevance for everyone except those who obsess in its fermented confusion. Also, while so enclosed, one fails to recognize changes elsewhere. The more a community jumps at every instance of prejudice, the more it tires itself from other, more consequential pursuits. The angrier it gets, the more it allows its leaders to grow lazy and mouth platitudes to identity and pride while burning bridges to ensure their own relevance by feeding off the paranoia of a people kept fearful because they have been shut in.

When we mistake ignorance for conscious offensiveness, we end being so on guard that we see only slights and boorishness and not the changes in perception which are evolving slowly and rendering issues which offered umbrage earlier, obsolete. The lazy radio jockey who many years offended all hill people with a joke that was too many decades stale is actually a rarity, the mainstream sees the hill folk in a new avatar. To get a grip on this metamorphosis, a visit to the metros can be very illuminating. Hill kids, who would be heckled with calls of "kancha or bahadur" [nothing demeaning in the words, but irritatingly offensive in how they are used elsewhere], are now called out as "Aye Bhaichung!" The branding is already changing, and with it the nuances of how the people, that's us, are seen. Sure, an anecdote enjoyed in passing is hardly the yardstick by which one can measure changes in attitude, but they are still reasonably reliably representations of how the majority responds and pigeonholes identities. For those to whom such branding, and thus enhancements to it, are important, the lesson here is that exporting achievers who stun all with their brilliance is more important than claiming and announcing introductions in their own backyards. We need to groom stronger contenders for universal glory, because apart from inspiring the young among us, they also burnish the image we project.

## China steps into soft power vacuum as the US retreats under Trump

Soft power is the ability of a country to shape other countries' views, attitudes, perceptions and actions without force or coercion. Its importance has been acknowledged for centuries, though the term was only coined by American political scientist and author Joseph Nye in the late 1980s.

A country's soft power depends on many factors, including its performance, global image and international reputation. A state can use soft power to attract supporters and partners towards its policies, views and actions.

Take, for instance, the case of China's giant

In 685 AD Empress Wu Zetian of the Tang Dy-nasty presented two giant pandas to the Japanese emperor. More than a millennium later, in 1941. Chinese leader Chiang Kai-Shek gifted another pair to the Bronx Zoo in appreciation of the US's wartime help. Pandas remain a hallmark of Chinese soft power even today. These animals have become symbols of China's

efforts in wildlife preservation and environmental protection. They are a way for China to communicate a caring and genial approach and culture.

And soft power will remain a key strategy for China into the coming decades. In October 2017, at the governing party's national congress, President Xi Jinping outlined steps to enhance China's soft power and make its culture more globally appealing:

"We will improve our capacity for engaging in international communication so as to tell China's stories well, present a true, multi-dimensional and panoramic view of China, and enhance our coun-

try's soft power."

China is stepping into a soft power vacuum cre ated by the US's new administration. Since Donald Trump was elected president, the US has eschewed soft power. It's withdrawn from a global climate change agreement; renegotiating a number of bilateral treaties and taken an openly "America first", and somewhat isolationist stance. Its cordial relations with many traditional allies have become

strained.
China has spotted the gap and is attempting to woo many countries whose US relations are waver-ing. One of China's key weapons is the "One Belt, One Road" programme, a USD\$900 billion initiative that aims to strengthen land and sea transportation links through major investments in transport infrastructure in Asia, Europe and Africa.

This is the equivalent of the US's Marshall plan, which significantly improved West European countries' economies after World War II. This help was not altruistic: nor is China's "One Belt, One Road" programme. Assisting other nations through economic growth is a way of wielding soft power and advancing a country's global standing. This will be important for China, which needs to counter its reputation as a one party state with hegemonic in-

#### HOW SOFT POWER HAS FEATURED

China's economic success, massive infrastructural development, academic and research progress, cul-tural heritage and success in sports will continue to increase its soft power in the future.

Culture and tourism are always important ascts of soft power. Some 138 million tourists visited China in 2016, a growth of 3.5% over 2015 Similarly, 122 million Chinese visitors went abroad in 2016, a growth of 4.3% over 2015. This increasing interchange of the visitors will give foreigners an insight into Chinese culture, history and its economic might - all of which will further enhance China's soft power.

China is also emerging as a global leader in

terms of academic and research progress. High income countries' share of global research and development (R&D) expenditure fell from 88% to 69.3% between 1996 and 2013.

China alone filled this gap. It increased its share from a paltry 2.5% to 19.6% in 17 years. Recently, China's average annual R&D expenditure growth has been 18.3%, compared to an anaemic growth rate in upper and middle income countries of 1.4%.

Increased educational and research activities have ensured that the number of foreign students in China is increasing rapidly. China now ranks third in attracting foreign students, after the US and UK. Its universities are climbing the global rankings. This, along with rapid internationalisation, policies that support foreign students, and affordability of study and living costs compared to the West, means China could soon become the top destination for international students.

And the reverse is also true. Of some 5 million international students pursuing higher education outside their countries, nearly 25% are Chinese. It's another form of cultural interchange that will contribute to China's soft power, as are the many Confucius Institutes set up around the world to showcase China's culture, history, language, economic and social development. The idea is somewhat similar to the UK's British Councils, Germany's Goethe Institutes and France's Alliance Fran-

#### CHINA FILLS GAP LEFT BY US

The asymmetry of views between leaders of the world's two soft powers has made Xi the poster child for globalisation, free trade and international

operation.

During the Asia-Pacific Economic Cooperation Summit in November 2017, in Vietnam, Trump reconfirmed his "America first" policy. This approach will further decrease America's soft power.

Meanwhile, Xi is singing from a different hymn sheet. Also in Vietnam, he noted in his speech that globalisation is an "irreversible historical trend"

and championed multilateral trading regimes.

He presented a vision of the future that is interconnected and invited "more countries to ride the fast train of Chinese development."

China's rise as the world's leading soft power will not be without hurdles. It must tackle border issues with its neighbours; navigate the current South China Sea disputes and find solutions to its extensive environmental pollution problems,

among other things.

Despite these challenges, the US's many missteps and China's demonstrated social and economic success – as well as its increasing use of soft power – mean that the Asian giant is on the rise. [Asit K. Biswas is Distinguished Visiting

### Iran's reformists have sided with the hardliners - and doomed their cause

or a few days at the start of 2018, nationwide For a few days at the start of 2010, nationwise protests hit the streets of several Iranian cities, blindsiding the government and briefly drawing the world's attention. The government sponsored countries of the status que but anti-government. er-protests in support of the status quo, but anti-gov-ernment protests continued. It all signals that the arrangement of Iranian politics has radically changed – and in particular that the mainstream political project known as reformism is no longer the decisive force it

Until now, the only visible protests on the streets of Iran since 2013 revolved around economic issues. They have mostly been organised by Iranians lower down the social ladder; the bus drivers' union, teach-ers, and those who lost their savings to fraud and embezzlement by top officials or financial institutions affiliated with the Revolutionary Guard.

The largest demonstrations since the the 2009 Green Movement came in November 2016 and were held by workers against the government's bill to reform labour laws. In May 2017, hundreds who lost their deposits to Caspian financial institutions protested in front of the Iranian parliament wearing white shrouds - implying they were ready to die for their cause. Union leaders, meanwhile, have made enough political trou-ble to become the largest group of political prisoners during Rouhani's presidency. In January 2015, 17 gold miners from Agh Darreh were arrested and lashed on orders of the judiciary for protesting the firing of 326

The signals of discontent these protests sent were completely ignored by the government and the pro-government elite, who forgot that Rouhani's first campaign revolved around the idea that economic hardship could be ended through the nuclear negotiations. But even though he was re-elected president



in 2017, he has ultimately never lived up to his initial

#### STATE OF DENIAL

He offered a last slap in the face for Iran's lower middle and working classes with his 2018 budget bill. With workers in state-owned factories and pensioners facing months of delayed wages and the victims of recent earthquakes still sleeping in tents during west-ern Iran's deadly winter, the bill allocated billions of dollars to numerous religious institutions owned by high-ranking clerics, mostly focused on missionary

In one case, the government channelled IRR280 billion (about US\$7.8m) to a religious institution owned by Ayatollah Mesbah Yazdi, a radical cleric who was allegedly behind murders committed by Islamist fanatics in Kerman. This institution has been receiving annual allocations since the second term of the last reformist president, Mohammad Khatami. Ayatollah Khomeini called the 1979 Islamic Rev-

olution a "revolution of the barefooted", a powerful

image that helped the regime establish its hegemony and eradicate leftists from Iran's official political spectrum. But three decades later, pro-government reformists too are using the epithet "barefooted mass-es" in quite a different way: to deni-grate and scorn anyone who protests against the established order

In total denial about their economic and political failures, the maiority of reformists tried at first to blame the most recent protests on their conservative rivals. This was not true. From the beginning, the most recent protests were aimed not just at economic problems, but

at the very foundations of the Islam-ic Regime and its religious leaders.

A week before the main wave of the current protests, pensioners in the pro-Rouhani city of Isfah-an gathered in front of the office of the governorate chanting "pensioners' wages are under the mullahs' cloak" and "revolution, our mistake". Then came the protests in Mashhad, Iran's second-largest and most religious city: in less than a day, the protests flared up and spread to 14 cities across the country. On the sixth day, at least 21 people were killed on the streets.

The reformists' response was all too predictable.

DECLINE AND DECAY

Mohajerani, a former minister of culture and a pro-government reformist living in exile, has called the protests a rootless movement, attributed them to Israel, and reproached the media for covering them. Reformist journalist Ebrahim Nabavi, meanwhile, nocked the protesters as "beetroot sellers and cherry

Once a democratic and civil movement, reformism

in Iran has now been totally absorbed into the hardthird force in Iran's bipolar political spectrum, they chose to become one with their former adversaries on the hardline religious front. Once outraged when former president Mahmoud Ahmadinejad called the Green Movement protesters "dust and dirt", they are borrowing the same rhetoric to describe the new movement - right down to the shop-worn cliche of

tying them to the hostile US.

In the last several elections, reformists successfully mobilised dissident middle and upper middle-class Iranians. This they did mainly through fearmonger-ing; the fear of hardliners and of war got many, even among the most radical opposition of the regime, to the ballot box.

But the truth is that since Khatami's second term, Iranian reformism has been constantly backing away from its own principled demands to the point that it is now almost unrecognisable. In a same way, the apparatus of the Islamic Republic of Iran has now lost any legitimacy as a "revolution of the barefooted". The regime, as professor of political science Fatemeh Sadeghi puts it, "is no longer a system, but a pure reign without any justification".

The diversity of today's protesters looks set to become a pattern for the reconstruction of the op-position, whose prominent figures and leaders have been systematically assassinated over the last four decades. For the first time in the history of post-rev-olution Iran, an opposition is at the verge of forming a real and functional coalition of all the country's secular forces, from socialists to liberals and all the factions in between. As the reformists' agenda shrivels into cynicism, that opposition's time may just be

### Aanchal hopes ski medal ends govt apathy for winter sports

BHARAT SHARMA New Delhi, Jan 10 (PTI): Aanchal Thakur has just one wish after becoming the first Indian to win an international medal in skiing -- an end to the government's apathetic attitude to wards winter sports.

The response to her bronze medal winning performance in Turkey has been overwhelming to say the least. She still can't believe that none other than Prime Minister Narendra Modi congratulated her on the achievement in a sport that usually begs for attention.
"I never thought the Prime Minister

would tweet for me.

It is unreal. I just hope we are finally treated at par with athletes of popular sports. As of now, there has been no support whatsoever from the govern-ment," Aanchal told PTI from Turkey where she secured the bronze in Alpine Ejder 3200 Cup organised by the Federation Internationale de Ski (FIS).

"I just want to say that we too are fighting, working hard day in and day out for India," she said.

Skiing runs in her blood but it has not been an easy ride thus far for the the 21-year-old, who is a student of DAV College in Chandigarh.

Her father Roshan Thakur, who happens to be the secretary at the Winter Games Federation of India, always loved skiing and therefore it was natural for his children, Aanchal and Himan-



While Aanchal has grabbed attention now, brother Himanshu, also an alpine skier, competed in the Sochi Winter Olympics alongside luger Shiva

Aanchal says if it was not for the efforts of her father, there was no way she could have pursued skiing.

"I have been skiing in Europe since I was in seventh grade. Papa always wanted me to ski and he has been spending out of his pocket all this while. Without any government help, you can imagine how much he has spent on me

"What makes it more challenging for us is that it doesn't snow in India for the major part of the year, so we have to go out and train," she savs

Her father Roshan adds that existing skiing venues in India, at Gulmarg and Auli, are the only world-class during competitions and are not looked after well otherwise.

"The Europeans get to train 10 months in a year where our athletes can do two months at the max, considering the huge cost involved in training overseas," says Roshan, who owns ap-

The equipment, comprising ski boots and clothing too is expensive and costs around Rs 4-5 lakh, says Aanchal.

With a historic medal in the bag, the next target for this wushu player-turned skier is the qualification mark for the Winter Olympics to be held in Pyeongcing, South Korea next month.

While her brother Himanshu is clos-

er to the qualification mark, making the Winter Games cut seems unlikely for

"To qualify, we need to score less than 140 points in five races and I have not been able to that even in one race.

Yesterday was a very challenging course and even the gold winner could not qualify for Olympics with her score heing more than 140"

On Monday, a Pentagon spokesman said the US had conveyed to Pakistan to take "concrete steps" against ter-ror groups to earn hundreds of millions of dollars in aid.

Referring to his conversa-tion with the US Ambassador to Pakistan, Goldstein hoped that Pakistan will join the US in its effort with regard to fight against terrorism.

"The Pakistani people have suffered greatly from terrorism, and its security forces have been effective in combating the groups that target Pakistan's interest. So, it s to their benefit to join with us in helping resolve this matter," Goldstein said.

'We always look at that; but again, it's a suspension and not a cutoff. We haven't reprogrammed the funds. We re honeful that Pakistan will come back to the table and do what they told us that they would do," he said.

The US and others have long complained that Pakistan offered safe haven to the Afghan Taliban and their allies, the Haqqani Network, allowing them to carry out cross-border attacks in Afghanistan.

### US revokes citizenship of Indian native; faces deportation

WASHINGTON, JAN 10 (PTI): The US has revoked the American citizenship of an Indian-ori-gin man who reportedly defrauded the authorities, making it the first denaturalisation case under a government initiative designed to clamp down on fraudulent immigration, the Justice De-

partment said.

Baljinder Singh alias Davinder Singh, 43, who married a US citizen, has now been reverted to the Green Card status which leaves him poten-tially subject to removal proceedings at the Department of Homeland Security's discretion, the Justice Department said.

The Department of Justice, which moved a petition in this regard before a US court last Sep-tember, said that Singh in his citizenship appli-cation concealed prior orders of exclusion and his deportation under different identities than the identity under which they naturalised.
"Singh's denaturali-

sation is the first arising out of a growing body of

cases referred to the Department of Justice by United States Citizenship and Immigration Services (USCIS) as part of Operation Janus," the Department of Justice said in a statement.

The action against Singh was filed contemporaneously with two other Operation Janus cases, as announced by the Justice Department on September 19, 2017

A US District Court in New Jersey on January 5 had entered an order revoking his naturalised US citizenship and cancelling his Certificate of Naturalisation.

Under Operation
Janus, the Department
of Homeland Security
has identified about 315.000 cases where some fingerprint data was missing from the centralised digital fingerprint repository.

Among those cases, some may have sought to circumvent criminal record and other background checks in the naturalisation process, said the Department of Homeland Security.

### World Bank projects 7.3 per cent growth for India in 2018

WASHINGTON, JAN 10 (PTI): India's growth rate in 2018 is projected to hit 7.3 per cent and 7.5 per cent in the next two years, according to the World Bank, which said the country has "enormous growth potential" compared to other emerging economies with the implementation of comprehensive reforms.

India is estimated to have grown at 6.7 per cent in 2017 despite initial setbacks from demonetisation and the Goods and Services Tax (GST), according to the 2018 Global Economics Prospect released by the World Bank here yesterday. "In all likelihood India is going to reg-

ister higher growth rate than other major emerging market economies in the next decade. So, I wouldn't focus on the short-term numbers. I would look at the big picture for India and big picture is telling us that it has enormous potential," Ayhan Kose, Director, Development Prospects Group at the World Bank, told PTI in an interview.

He said in comparison with China, which is slowing, the World Bank is expecting India to gradually accelerate.

"The growth numbers of the past three years were very healthy," Kose, author of the report, said.

India's economy is likely to grow 7.3 per cent in 2018 and then accelerate to 7.5 per cent in the next two years, the bank said.

China grew at 6.8 per cent in 2017, 0.1 per cent more than that of India, while in 2018, its growth rate is projected at 6.4 per cent. And in the next two years, the country's growth rate will drop marginally to 6.3

and 6.2 per cent, respectively.

To materialise its potential, India, Kose said, needs to take steps to boost investment prospects.

There are measures underway to do in terms of non- performing loans and produtivity, he said.

"On the productivity side, India has enormous potential with respect to sec-ondary education completion rate. All in all, improved labour market reforms, education and health reforms as well as relaxing investment bottleneck will help improve India's prospects." Kose said.

India has a favourable demographic profile which is rarely seen in other economies,

"In that context, improving female labour force participation rate is going to be important. Female labour force participation still remains low relative to other emerging market economies," he said.

Reducing youth unemployment is critical, and pushing for private investment, where problems are already well-known like bank assets quality issues...If these are done, India can reach its potential easily and exceed, Kose asserted.

"In fact, we expect India to do better than its potential in 2018 and move forward," he

India's growth potential, he said, would be around 7 per cent for the next 10 years. The Indian government is "very serious" with the GST being a major turning point and banking recapitalisation programme is really important. Kose said.

"The Indian government has already rec-ognised some of these problems and undertaking measures and willing to see the outs of these measures," he said.

"India is a very large economy. It has a huge potential.

At the same time, it has its own challenges. This government is very much aware of these challenges and is showing just doing its best in terms of dealing with them," the World Bank official said.

The latest World Bank growth estimate for 2017 is 0.5 per cent, less than the previous projection, and 0.2 per cent less in the next two years.

"It is slightly lower than its previous

forecast, primarily because India is undertaking major reforms," Kose said.

These reforms, of course, will bring cer-

tain policy uncertainty, he said, "but the big issue about India, when you look at India's growth potential and our numbers down the road 2019 and 2020, is that it is going to be the fastest growing large emerging market."

"India has an ambitious government un-

dertaking comprehensive reforms. The GST is a major reform to have harmonised taxes, is one nation one market one tax concept.

Then, of course, the late 2016 demonetisation reform was there. The government is well aware of these short-term implications." Kose said.

ast week, Taylor Swift's second Lescond all-pop record Reputation was revealed to be the bestselling album of 2017 (though not the biggest), and while it moved hundreds of thousands of digital copies, it's really in the record shops and big-box retailers that she and her electroclash collection shined.

According to Nielsen's year-end report that looks at how well the biggest songs and albums did in 2017, Reputation ended up as the only title that sold at least one million physical copies. The



album, became her fifth consecutive

leader on the Billboard in November, just barely passed that important milestone, as it sold 1,035,000 physical copies in the U.S That's an impressive showing for two reasons, and both highlight just how powerful Swift remains.

The majority of those physical copies of Reputation that were sold in 2017 were CDs, as the title doesn't appear on the list of the biggest vinyl releases of 2017. Swift's accomplishment is notewor-thy, and in both 2015 and 2016, there was also only one title that managed sales of one million physical units, though it was the same both years—Adele's 25.
