Priyanka Chopra apologises for Sikkim insurgency comment

Мимваі, Sep 15 (PTI): Actor Priyanka Chopra Actor Friyanka Chopra on Friday apologised for hurting the "sentiments and pride" of the people of Sikkim by incorrectly describing the state as insurgency-hit.

The state government had condemned the actor and demanded an apology while social media users dubbed her "politically illiterate".

In an interview at Toronto International Film Festival, the actor-producer had said her film "Pahuna" was the first film to come out of the region which was troubled with insurgency.

Hoping to pacify the government and the peo-ple of Sikkim, the "Quantico" star issued a lengthy statement to apologise.

"It saddens me that a

comment I made during a recent interview at TIFF has caused this much pain when that was never the intention at all. I never meant to imply that Sikkim has insurgency. My statement was in context of the film that deals with people who seek refuge after they suffer from conflict," she said.

Describing Sikkim as a "peaceful, green state with peace loving peo-ple", she said, "I know that my statements have hurt the sentiments and pride of the people of Sikkim and for that I truly apologise."

The actor said she took "full responsibility" for her remarks and admitted



that she should have been better informed.

'I have always taken pride as being someone who is informed about the world but this time, some of the statements made were incorrect and while I should have been better informed about certain facts, I take full responsibility for what I said," she said.

Priyanka also retract-ed her statement that "Pahuna", which is produced by her, is the first film to come out of Sikkim.

"I understand now that our film was not the first Sikkimese film to be made, but our aim has always been to provide local talent, both actors and technicians, a global platform to shine.

"I understand the impact of the statements made and hope that the people and Government of Sikkim find it in their hearts to forgive me," the actor said.

She also praised the government and the local people for supporting her during the shooting of the movie.

GJM activists clash with police, 12 GJM supporters arrested

orkha Janmukti Mor Gorkna Janniuku Moi-Cha supporters and police clashed twice here today on the 93rd day of the ongoing indefinite bandh. By evening, 15 GJM supporters had been arrested, agitators lathi-charged, several people, including a journalist (despite having identified herself as a reporter covering the event), injured.

It all started in the

morning when GJM sup-porters vandalized a porters porters vandalized a school jeep at Damber Chowk here. The Morcha supporters had started to gather around Damber Chowk like every day, until at around 11.30 this morning, police arrest-ed 15 GJM supporters, including the ward no 7 councillor Bimla Chhetri from CST Fatak area where they were picket-ing on the roads.

As news of the arrest reached Damber Chowk, they moved to the Motor Stand area from where the police vehicle with arrested GJM workers would have to pass.

The supporters tried to stop the vehicle and raised slogans against the police and situa-tion turned tense. Soon, stones were also pelted which a lathi-charge was ordered and tear gas lobbed at the mobs.

As the situation was returning to normal, Ni-sha Chhetri, the Kalimpong correspondent for the Statesman and the Himalayan Mirror, was attacked by the Addi-tional SP. She was struck despite having identified herself as a journalist covering the incident
The GJM supporters

gathered again at Damber Chowk and the situ-ation remained tense as they burned tyres at the

main road and the street was littered with bottles and stones

Meanwhile, at around 4 pm, a defence vehicle which was going towards Motor Stand was alleged-ly stopped by GJM supporters and a police team moved towards the main road from one side and Motor Stand from the other. Amidst stone-pelt-ing, police fired tear gas shells and rubber bullet to disperse the mob. The clash lasted about an hour until evening police took control of Damber Chowk and market area.

An SKM press re-

lease issued by its general secretary [press & publicity], Bikash Basnet stated that Tourism De-partment invested in Pahuna, a film produced by Priyanka Chopra, to encourage the movie crew but the recent statement by the actress about Sik-kim being 'troubled with insurgency' is a big insult to the people of Sikkim on a global platform.

The party has further alleged that the incident proves that the state gov ernment failed to edu-cate the film's crew about Sikkim.

The state government should send a legal notice to Privanka Chopra for her statement through the Chief Secretary and not a Minister, SKM has said and further demand-ed that the film Pahuna be banned in Sikkim. The state should also take im-mediate steps to ban the film in the nation as well as internationally, the party adds.

Further, SKM has demanded that the state government ask the government ask the producers of the film to refund the financial support extended to them.

If the government fails to do so then SKM will send a legal notice to Priyanka Chopra and write to the Film Censor Board to ban the film.



Disaster Preparedness

Confer with the people on disaster management plans, don't just 'teach' them

Disaster preparedness should nuance the mood next week as Sikkim marks the sixth anniversary of the 18 September Earthquake which pulled a wicked surprise on the State. The surprise came in the realisation that Sikkim harboured tectonic potential to push a 6.8 scale earthquake. Through the recorded history of earthquakes in the region, all the Big Ones past century and a half had been earthquakes with their epicentres at established troublespots at faultlines many hundred kilometres away from Sikkim. In some warped sense of misplaced security, this had convinced people at a subconscious level in these parts that the State could do very little to cushion the impact of the next big one and that Sikkim's distance from the expected ground zeros would dissipate some of the fury and dissipate the impact. This attitude was admittedly wrong because no one can prevent an earthquake, but everyone can and should work towards mitigating it. And now, even that excuse (of distance) is no longer available with the tectonic plates holding Sikkim up announcing that even they can pack a mean punch. In effect then, natural disasters are no longer about "if and when" and have now become "here and now".

As the amplified fury of end-monsoon showers are bringing home, it's not just about earthquakes, but a host of challenges like landslides, cloudbursts, GLOFs etc and if the winter runs dry, there will be forest fires and man-animal conflicts as well. Natural disasters do not play in isolation and when these incidents acquire disaster proportions, they work in combinations. As Sikkim marks a major disaster's anniversary, after it has recollected the experience and taken stock of repairs and restoration, it should test the practicability and resoluteness of its proposed responses for future calamities. Modern lifestyles have a way of blindsiding obvious realities, and if any lesson is to be learnt from the 18 September horror, it should be in rediscovering the traditional knowledge base.

Centuries of living in a particular region grooms people to instinctively respect the brute force of nature and adopt lifestyles which mitigate the impact of the nature of disasters indigenous to a particular region. Sikkim obviously had this instinctive safety calibration, but lost it in the past fifty years or so. These need to be remembered, and all disaster preparedness plans should respect the knowhow of resident populations and reinforce traditional practises with scientific verification and planning. It would be a good idea to begin conferring with people when it comes to drafting disaster preparedness plans instead of talking down to them. Sikkim's planners should try that for

Nearly 3 weeks into Rohingya crisis, refugees still fleeing



Cox's Bazar (Bangladesh), SEP 15 (AP): Nearly thre eks into a mass exodus of Rohingya Muslims fleeing violence in Myanmar, thousands were still flooding across the border in search of help and safety in teeming refugee settlements in Bangladesh.

The crisis has drawn glob-al condemnation, with UN officials demanding Myanmar halt what they described as a campaign of ethnic cleansing that has driven nearly 400,000 Rohingya to flee Rakhine state.

Turkey, the Rohingya crisis and Erdoğan's ambitions to be a global Muslim leader

The emerging humanitarian crisis that has been rocking Myanmar ere an estimated 370,000 Rohingya have been forced out of the country – has prompted broad interna-tional condemnation. But so far it has translated into little concrete action.

United Nations (UN) human rights the Rohingya's plight a "textbook example of ethnic cleansing" following a similar statement from UN Secretary General António Guterres. While Western countries have been slow and hesitant to respond, leaders of Muslim-majority countries - particularly Malaysia, Indonesia, Bangladesh and Pakistan – have sought to place as much international pressure as possi-

ble on the Myanmar government.

The strongest and most vocal response of all has come from Turkey. Indeed the Turkish president, Recep Tayyip Erdoğan, appears to have appointed himself as the international voice of the Rohingya Muslims.
TURKEY'S AID RESPONSE

According to a Turkish government tatement, Erdoğan is the first one that managed to get permission for humanitarian aid to enter Myanmar. The Burmese government had, at the peak of the violence, blocked all UN

aid towards the Rohingyas.

And so, on September 7, Turkey's foreign aid agency, TIKA, became the first foreign outfit to deliver an initial shipment of 1000 tons of basic foodstuffs and medicine to the conflict zone in Rakhine state, where the majority of Rohingyas live.

Turkey simultaneously nounced plans to distribute human-itarian aid to the Rohingya camps in Bangladesh. The move was widely publicised as Emine Erdoğan, the Turkish president's wife visited the camps at the same time

PUBLIC DENUNCIATION

Meanwhile, during a meeting in Astana, Kazakhstan, Erdoğan as the current chief of the Organisation of the Islamic Conference (OIC) formally condemned Myanmar's attitude towards Rohingyas, taking the lead on the topic on behalf of the organisation. He had previously called the ongoing violence a genocide.

Since the crisis broke on August

25, the Turkish president has taken several actions to gather Muslim leaders across the world to put pressure on the Myanmar government. On August 31, he spoke with the leaders of Mauritania, Pakistan, Iran and Qatar urging them to join forces to find a way to stop the violence against the Rohingyas.

Alongside Erdoğan, other Turk-ish politicians have addressed the issue. Remarks by Mevlüt Çavuşoğlu,

the foreign minister, garnered global attention. Mehmet Şimşek, deputy prime minister, even tweeted unrelated images to raise the point, creating a bit of an embarassment.

So how are we to explain Turkey's ambition to take the lead in this cur-

GLOBAL AMBITIONS

The political vacuum prompted by the Trump administration's retreat from global leadership has surely played a part. But, more evidently, Turkey's longstanding pro-West-ern approach has shifted. Turkey is a NATO member and aspired to join the EU for years, but under President Erdogan's lead and the current AKP government, the country's foreign policy has shifted towards the global

south, seeking new opportunities.
Turkey's foreign policy doctrine
now promotes what Bilkent University academics Pinar Bilgen and Ali Bilgiç label "civilisational geopolitics", "an understanding of culture and civilisation as preordained determinants of international behaviour".

As Bilgin and Bilgiç argue, this new doctrine aims at placing Turkey at the core of geopolitical issues between the West and the rest of Asia, justifying this global engagement by its political heritage – mainly based on its Central Asian and Ottoman history.

The shift became most obvious at the end of the 2000s. It has been identified most closely with Ahmet Davutoğlu, a scholar of geopolitics and Turkey's foreign minister from 2009–14. In 2010 Foreign Policy called him "the brains of Turkey's global reawakening".

Under Davutoğlu's watch, Turkey's global diplomatic footprint expanded dramatically, especially in

Asia and Africa. He opened Turkey's first embassy in Myanmar in 2012 both to take advantage of the potential trade opportunities from the country's post-2008 liberalisation and because of the Rohingya issue.

A subsequent trip in 2013 saw him tour refugee camps and call on the Burmese government to extend citizenship rights to the Rohingya people. This new foreign policy coincides with Turkey's decade-long ambition to become a global humanitar-ian power or what Turkish scholars E. Fuat Keyman and Onur Zakak call "humanitarian state".

The Turkish humanitarian ap-

proach has been cast by journalist and former Somali Minister of Planning, Abdirahman Ali, as a middle way beween the Western aid model and its Chinese counterpart. Whereas the former is highly conditional, bureaucratic and often security-focused and the latter tends to bolster corrupt ,au-thoritarian regimes, the Turkish approach - Ali claims - typically bypasses bureaucracy and emphasises "a 'moral' standard anchored in protecting human rights and helping the weak".

Turkey has backed this ambition

with increased funding for humanitarian assistance over the last five years. Development Initiatives – a UK based NGO - recently reported that now Turkey ranks second in the world for humanitarian aid, having spent around US\$6 billion in 2016 (the top-ranked US spent \$6.3 billion).
THE CHAMPION OF MUS-

LIMS' RIGHTS

One of the other factors is domestic politics. Indeed, much of Erdoğan's public posturing on the Rohingya issue is entirely self-serving. The image of a strong Turkey reaching out to Muslim's everywhere in the worldplays very well at home. During his 15-year tenure as Turkey's leader, the country's once-marginalised pi-ous Muslim citizens have become increasingly prominent in media, busi-

ness and politics.

Ardent supporters in Turkey – to mention large segments of public opinion across the Muslim world – thus see him as a champion of Muslim rights everywhere.

Erdoğan has studiously crafted this image throughout other crisis, such as in Egypt's during the 2011-12 Morsi regime or in Palestine. His very public spats with Israel and the West have led some pro-Palestinian columnists in Arabic newspapers to call him the "new Nasser".

COMPETITION AHEAD

Nevertheless, in recent days there has been a modest push back from Saudi Arabia, which appears to be chaffing at Turkey's leadership on the crisis. Saudi Arabia's ambassador to Turkey released a statement emphasising the Kingdom's strong, decades-long support for the Rohingyas. Iran has followed too, promising shipments to reach Myanmar soon.

Erdoğan has promised to raise the Rohingya issue on September 19, at the annual meeting of the UN General Assembly - which Myanmar leader

Aung San Suu Kyi is avoiding.

His calls to protect Muslims
worldwide could be a key moment for Turkey's diplomatic leadership but whether other Muslim countries would follow or not will tell the limits of Turkey's so-called "humanitarian

How everyday language casually stigmatises obesity- and what to do about it

Obesity is a highly stigmatised condition. Those with obesity are frequently subject to prejudice and ridicule at home, school, work and even from health care professionals. Every day, they face social rejection and are deemed lazy, unattractive, unmotivated and unhappy. Alarmingly, many obese individuals feel unable to challenge such stigma, so

they passively accept and sometimes believe it.

We live in a world where we are constantly reminded that obesity is a "crisis", an "epidemic", that it is crippling the economy, and that it is a burden on society. These ideologies are disseminated throughout the news media, social media, by politicians and by health care professionals – and they are the birthplace of weight stigma.

Weight stigma can manifest itself in several different ways. It can be overt, such as verbal and physical abuse, but it can also be indirect and sub-tle. My research focuses on the subtle and subconscious language choices that do not appear stig-matising on the surface and my results are drawn from a data set of 16,500 British newspaper artifrom a data sec concles about obesity.

THE 'EPIDEMIC'

"" was one of the

'Obesity epidemic" was one of the most frequently used phrases in the newspaper articles. And it is not just limited to the press – it's a phrase that is used widely in a range of contexts, often in everyday speech by everyday people.

The word "epidemic" is used as a metaphor to

highlight the rising prevalence of obesity. But the

definition of "epidemic" is the wide spreading occurrence of an infectious disease

I would argue that this generates a level of fear and anguish towards obesity, perhaps suggesting that you should avoid obese people. It also obscures the fact that obesity is incredibly complex. Becoming complacent with such language choices has led to divisive and negative attitudes towards those with obesity.

The "obesity epidemic" is only one of the many negative language examples I have found. Even more subtle, subconscious and potentially stigmatising is the coupling of the words "are" and "obese" in statements such as "One in eight people ARE obese"; "Children who ARE obese", and "How

can you tell if you ARE obese."

THE "ARE" PROBLEM

The word "obese" occurs 24,011 times in my data.
On 28% of these occasions, it is preceded by the verb "are". So what's the problem, you might be wondering?

Well, it can be argued that obesity is a medical condition. Three years ago, the American Medical Association adopted this position and the NHS recognises that obesity can be more complex than just a result of overeating and a lack of exercise.

So if obesity is a medical condition, it is not something that you "are", it is something you "have". It is rare that people are defined by a medical condition they have. You will never hear the phrases,

"you are lupus", or "you are meningitis".

But there are important exceptions. Tellingly, the medical conditions that are used alongside the verb "are" are those that are also unfairly stigmatised.

- You ARE HIV positive.
- You ARE dyslexic
- You ARE a leper. - You ARE obese

Defining people as obese causes severe conflation and it insinuates that that is all they are. It becomes easy to issue blame, it implies that all neg-ative weight related ideologies apply to them, and it creates a very narrow and inaccurate identity for those that have obesity.

These examples were extracted from newspaper articles, but they are language choices that are subconsciously made by the majority of people, not just journalists. It is astonishing that phrases we use without the intention to stigmatise have the power to change the way an entire concept is rep resented and viewed.

I would argue that the language we use when discussing this issue needs to be evaluated and more calculated so that we can use powerful platforms such as news media, that reaches out to a large audience, to educate as opposed to discriminate. The language we use represents the way we think, and the language we read, hear and digest shapes the way we think.

It is a powerful tool and highlighting examples of our complacency with it could be the first step in the right direction towards changing the way we treat this issue and reducing the weight stigmas which are currently so widespread in society.

50 rhino calves swept away in recent floods in Nepal

KATHMANDU, SEP 15 (PTI): Around 50 calves of one-horned rhinoceros from Ne-pal's Chitwan National Park might have swept across the Indian border in the recent

Severe flooding has devastated communities and destroyed crops in India, Nepal and Bangladesh.

"Around 50 calves of rhino are born every year, and that many calves along with their mothers might have been washed away in the disaster," CNP's Chief Conservation Officer Ram Chandra Kandel.

Three rhinos were killed in the flooding, he said.

Chitwan National Park is the largest rhi-no conservation centre of park of Nepal.

So far eight rhinos that were swept away in the disaster were rescued and returned to the CNP, he said.

The Chitwan National Park (CNP) has roposed a rhinoceros count next year breaking the regular routine of conducting a rhino census in every four years. Last time the count was conducted in 2015.

A rhinos, which was washed in the calamity, is stranded in Narasahi in Nawalparasi and another one is at Tribeni with its

The rhinos were swept away by the extensive floods triggered by the incessant rainfall in August. Most of the rhinos were rescued from the Indian area are adult

SC anguished over children deaths in child care institutions

New Delhi, Sep 15 (PTI): The government is "oblivious" to the deaths of children in custody, the Supreme Court said today, expressing "distress" that these kids were not only "voiceless" but seem to be "dispensable" as well.

Voicing disconcert over the lack of docu-mentation on the number of unnatural deaths of children in child care institutions, a bench of Justices M B Lokur and Deepak Gupta asked the Centre and state governments to document such deaths of kids who are in need of care and protection, "with far greater concern than has been shown so far".

"The unnatural death of any child in need of care and protection or in conflict with law and in a child care institution needs attention since it is these voiceless children who need to be heard,

the bench said.

It also said that it is "rather unfortunate that the Central Government and the State Governthe possibility of death of children in custody in child care institutions.

The strong observa-tions by the top court came in a verdict on a 2013 PIL on "inhuman" conditions prevailing in 1,382 prisons across the

country.

"This is distressing. the next of kin of children who pass away in custody is not less, but more than the pain and anguish of the next of kin of any prisoner who suffers unnatural death in custody," the court said, adding that "it seems that apart from being voiceless, such children

are also dispensable".

While passing a slew of directions regarding unnatural deaths and reforms across India, the bench said the dignity of an individual is not a "plaything for those in authority".

It said those in authority must show greater degree of sensitivity towards persons in custody as all forms of custodial

rent" and invite disparagement from all sections of civilised society.

"Like most societies, we are not strangers to custodial violence and unnatural deaths but our vibrant democracy permits us to debate and discuss these issues with rational arguments.

"However, right sounding noises critical of custodial violence (in any form) cannot achieve any useful purpose un-less persons in authority hear the voices of the victims or the silence of the dead and act on them by taking remedial steps, the top court said.

It directed the Ministry of Woman and Child Development to discuss with official concerned of the state governments and formulate proce-dures for tabulating the number of children who suffer unnatural death in child care institutions.

The bench observed at National Human that National Human Rights Commission has an extremely important role to play in cases of un-

natural death in jails and although the NHRC has is-sued detailed instructions from time to time, "it does appear however that these instructions are not being taken seriously but are being followed more in the breach".

"All that we can say in this regard is that while the Central Government may have noble intentions and is perhaps taking steps to improve prison administration and to bring about reforms in prisons, the fact remains that conditions in prisons leave a lot to be de-sired and there are quite a few unnatural deaths in prisons," it said.

It said that suggestions and recommendations made by the Centre do look good on paper but they do not seem to have any remedial effect and the Ministry of Home Affairs must take a proactive interest in prison reforms.

It also said that no state government could "shirk" its duties and responsibilities for providing better facilities to prisoners.

Meghalaya CM slams Centre for delay in examining state govt's proposal

SHILLONG, SEP 15 (PTI): Meghalaya Chief Minister Mukul Sangma today slammed the BJPled NDA Government for the alleged delay in examining the state government s proposal to resolve the National Green Tribunal ban on coal mining.

The chief minister also warned the people of the state about a "misinformation campaign" on the issue.

"What prevents the BJP government from further examining this or are they intentionally blocking it... that means they are conniving to deprive our people from the benefit of the provi-sion of the Constitution," he said.

He was reacting to BJP leaders claim recently that it would resolve the ongoing NGT ban on coal mining in Meghalaya within a span of six to eight months if elected to power in 2018.

The state ment had taken up with the Government of India (GOI) to invoke Para 12 A (b) of the Sixth Sched-



ule to the Constitution in order that the provisions of the Coal Mines Nationalisation Act. 1973 and MMDR Act 1957 are exempted through a presidential notification

"The outcome of such exercise is that Centre has constituted a Committee headed by the Union Cabinet secretary to examine this proposal of the state government as per the provision of the Constitution of India," he said.

The members of the Committee constituted by the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) also include secretaries of ministries of coal, mines, environment and chief secretary of Meghalaya.

He said a number of meetings had taken place and that the state gov ernment was sincere in this regard.

Questioning the delay, the chief minister said, "Are they (BJP) trying to clandestinely deprive the right even if you are delaying and depriving that is also deprivation?".

He also alleged that a misinformation campaign is going on now. Mukul said, "I would like to warn our friend from this misinformation campaign because what does the law of the land pro-vides...".

India, Pak hold talks on Indus Waters Treaty



WASHINGTON, SEP 15 (PTI): India and Pakistan are holding high-level talks on technical issues of the Indus Waters Treaty here, a senior World Bank official has said.

"These meetings are a continuation of a discussion on how to safeguard the Treaty for the benefit of the people in both countries," a World Bank spokesperson told PTI.

The meetings be-

tween India and Pakistan on the technical issues of the Indus Waters Treaty (IWT) are taking place in Washington on September 14-15, the spokesperson added.

The World Bank in

August had said that under the IWT, India is permitted to construct hydroelectric power facilities on tributaries of the Jhelum and Chenab with certain

Pakistan opposthe construction of the Kishanganga (330 megawatts) and Rat-(850 megawatts) hydroelectric power plants being built by India, it had said in a fact sheet issued at the conclusion of sec-retary-level talks between the two countries over the IWT.

The IWT was signed

in 1960 after nine years of negotiations between India and Pa-kistan with the help of the World Bank, which is also a signatory. The World Bank's role in re-lation to "differences" and "disputes" is limit-ed to the designation of people to fulfil certain roles when requested parties, the fact sheet

who fled during the last round of violence in Rakhine state last Oc-tober, Dujarric said "it's estimated that some 40 per cent of the total Rohingya population have now fled into Bangladesh."

An estimated 60 per cent of the Rohingyas arriving in Bangladesh are children, Dujarric said.

The crisis and refugee exodus egan on August 25, when Ro-ingya insurgents attacked police posts. Myanmar's military retaliated with "clearance operations" to root out the rebels, but the fleeing Rohingya say Myanmar soldiers shot indiscriminately, burned their homes and warned them to leave

Others have said they were attacked by Buddhist mobs

Rohingya, and some of the refu-gees have needed treatment for bullet wounds.

Facing growing condemnation globally, Myanmar leader Aung San Suu Kvi will not attend UN General Assembly meetings September 19-25 to instead deal with what the government said were domestic security issues.

UN Secretary-General An-

tonio Guterres told reporters Wednesday that ethnic cleansing was taking place against Rohingya in Rakhine state. The term "ethnic cleansing" is defined as an effort to rid an area of an unwanted ethnic group by displacement, deportation or even killing.

And Amnesty International said yesterday that it has turned up evidence of an "orchestrated

campaign of systematic burnings" by Myanmar security forces tar-geting dozens of Rohingya villages over the last three weeks.

The UN Security Council has called for "immediate steps to end the violence" and ensure civilian protections. Rohingya have faced decades of persecution in Myanmar, and are denied citizenship despite centuries-old roots in the Rakhine region.

North Korea fires missile over Japan

SEOUL, SEP 15 (AFP): North Korea fired a ballistic missile over Japan and into the Pacific today, responding to new UN sanctions with its fur-thest-ever missile flight in what analysts called a demonstration of its ability to target Guam.

The launch, from near Pyongyang, came after the United Nations Security Council imposed an eighth set of measures on the isolated country following its sixth nuclear test earlier this month.

The blast was by far

its largest to date and Pyongyang said it was a hydrogen bomb small enough to fit onto a missile. In New York, the Se-curity Council called an emergency meeting for later today.

The US Pacific Com-

mand confirmed Friday's rocket was an in-termediate range ballistic missile (IRBM) and said it did not pose a threat to North America or to the US Pacific territory of Guam, which Pyongyang has threatened to bracket with enveloping fire".

Seoul's defence ministry said it probably trav-elled around 3,700 kilometres (2,300 miles) and reached a maximum alti-tude of 770 kilometres.

It was "the furthest overground any of their ballistic missiles has ever travelled", Joseph Dempsey of the Inter-national Institute for Strategic Studies said on

Physicist Wright, of the Union of Concerned Scientists, added: "North Korea demonstrated that it could reach Guam with this missile, although the payload the missile was carrying is not known" and its accuracy was in doubt

The North has raised global tensions with its rapid progress in weap-ons technology under leader Kim Jong-Un, who is closely associated with the programme and regularly pictured by state media oversee-ing launches and visiting facilities.

North's last missile launch, a Hwasong-12 IRBM just over two weeks ago, also overflew Japan's main islands and was the first to

Several hurt in 'terror incident' on London Underground train

on an underground train at a busy station in southwest London today left several commuters injured in what the Scotland Yard described as a "terrorist incident". The incident occurred during rush hour on a District Line Tube train as it pulled into Parsons Green station.

Several people are said to have suffered facial burns after the blast in a bucket towards the rear of the District Line train. Some commuters reportedly were trampled and suf-fered crush injuries in the rush to escape. Scotland Yard's counter-ter-rorism squad, SO15, arrived at the scene at Parsons Green Tube station and took the lead in the investigation from the British Transport Police.

Deputy Assistant Commissioner Neil Basu the senior national coordinator for counter-terrorism policing, has declared it a terrorist incident," the Metropolitan Police said

"The Metropolitan Police Service and British Transport Police attended the scene, along with colleagues from the London Fire Brigade and London Ambulance Service. At present we are aware of a number of people who have suffered injuries," the statement said.

"It is too early to confirm the

cause of the fire, which will be subject to the investigation that is now underway by the Met's Counter



Terrorism Command. The station remains cordoned off and we are advising people to avoid the area," it

China 'opposes' NKorea missile launch, urges restraint

BEHING, SEP 15 (AFP): China condemned North Korea's launch of a ballistic missile over Japan today and appealed for restraint to avoid inflaming tensions in the

"The Chinese side opposes the DPRK's vio-lation of the resolution of the (UN) Security Council, and its use of ballistic missile technology for launch activities," foreign ministry spokeswoman Hua Chunying told a regular news briefing.

"The concerned par-ties should exercise restraint. They should not take any further action that could aggravate the

situation on the peninsula and in the region," Hua said. The launch, from near Pyongyang, came after the United Nations Security Council imposed an eighth set of measures on the isolated country following its sixth nuclear test earlier

It was by far its largest nuclear test to date and Pyongyang said it was a hydrogen bomb small enough to fit onto a missile. In New York, the Security Council called an emergency meeting for later Friday.

The United States meanwhile, called on China and Russia to take

'direct actions" to rein in North Korea.

"China supplies North Korea with most of its oil. Russia is the largest employer of North Korean forced labor," Secretary of State Rex Tillerson said in a statement.

"China and Russia must indicate their intolerance for these reckless missile launches by tak-ing direct actions of their

Asked at the briefing if Beijing would change its approach, Hua said China will "continue to comprehensively implement completely the relevant resolutions of the Security Council."

'India pushing Myanmar to take back Rohingya refugees'

DHAKA, SEP 15 (PTI): External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj has expressed solidarity with Bangladesh over the Rohingya crisis and said India is putting pressure on Myanmar to take back refugees who have fled the Buddhist-m ity nation, a top aide of Bangladesh Prime Minister has said.

More than 300,000 Rohing-ya have poured into Bangladesh since the latest flare-up in violence on August 25, adding to around 300,000 refugees already living in Bangladesh, close to the border with Myanmar.

"She (Swaraj) called our Prime

Minister last night and conveyed her country's solidarity with Ban-gladesh over the Myanmar refugee issue." Prime Minister Shiekh Hasina deputy press secretary Nazrul Islam told PTI.

Swarai, he said, told the Bangladesh premier that the crisis by now appeared as an international issue while India was trying to put "pressure bilaterally and multilaterally on Myanmar to stop persecution on ethnic minority Rohing-ya Muslims" and take back the ref-ugees who fled to Bangladesh.

According to the spokesman, Hasina, on the other hand, said Bangladesh was forced to offer refuge to the refugees on humanitar-ian ground as they fled their home at Myanmar's western Rakhine state to evade atrocities.



He said Hasina explained to Swaraj the helplessness and miseries of the refugees, particularly of the minor children and women, and said Bangladesh is trying to address their basic

"She (Hasina) told Swaraj that Bangladesh required external sup-ports to handle the refugee issue and return them to Myanmar," the spokesman said. Hasina said her government

allocated land for makeshift shelters of the Rohingyas "but, it will certainly create a big problem for Bangladesh if they stay for long".

The premier's spokesman said Indian High Commissioner in Dhaka Harsh Vardhan Shringla was present at the Hasina's Ganabhaban residence when Swaraj called. Swaraj's call came hours after the external affairs ministry

issued a statement expressing India's readiness to provide Bangladesh "any assistance" in tackling the refugee crisis.

India, yesterday, rushed 53 tonnes of relief materials to Bangladesh and pledged all help to Dhaka in tackling the humanitarian crisis.

Shringla said India will provide 7,000 tonnes of relief materials to Bangladesh. Dhaka earlier said Bangladesh required India's assistance in its efforts to handle the situation and send the refugees back home.

"The entire world today is worried with the Rohingya issue (and) their (India's) concern and stand beside us is very crucial at this moment," ruling Awami League gen-eral secretary and senior minister Obaidul Quader said earlier this
