Temi Tea fetches record price of Rs 4000 per kg at public auction

GANGTOK, 03 AUG:

For the first time ever, Temi Tea sold for a whopping Rs 4000 per kg at a public auction held on 02 Aug. Star Tea, Kolkata made a sucof Temi Tea in the auction which was held under aegis of J Thomas & Co. Pvt. Ltd., the largest and oldest existing tea auctioneers in the world, handling about 200 million kg of tea annually.

The normal whole leaf from summer second flush usually sells at an verage of Rs 2000-2800 per kg so the price of Rs 4000 for a large quan-

tity of 135 kg is a huge achievement.

Experts believe that while the scarcity of Darjeeling tea could have contributed to this hike yet the J Thomas tea experts have in their reports shown Temi as one of the best in its category of high elevation or-thodox black tea.

It may be noted that public auctions are different from private tea estate level auctions wherein specialty and small quantity teas are picked up, for instance, white tea 5 kg sold earlier by Temi at about Rs 25,000 per kg.

Wholesale onion price soars to Rs 25/kg at Lasalgaon

NEW DELHI, AUG 3 (PTI): Onion prices today rose more than two-fold to Rs 25/kg at Lasalgaon in Maharasthra, Asia's largest wholesale market for bulb crop, due to tight supply of old stock and likely fall in output of the new kharif crop.

Maximum wholesale onion price stood at Rs 9.20/kg in the year-ago period in the same market, as per the data maintained by a government research body NHRDF.

Lasalgaon sets price trend for other mandis across India. Already, retail rates have inched up in the national capital, ruling in the range of Rs

30-35/kg today. Nasik-based National Horticultural Research and Development Foun-dation (NHRDF) Director P K Gupta said: "There is tight supply situation." The existing demand

Deferment of Kailash Mansarovar vatra affected 392 pilgrims: Govt

New Delhi, Aug 3 (PTI): A total of 392 pilgrims se-lected to travel to Kailash Mansarovar via the Nathu La route in eight batches were affected due to the deferment of the yatra, the Rajya Sabha was in-formed today. "The Kailash Man-

sarovar Yatra via the Nathu La route has been deferred this year after the Chinese government cited unfavourable conditions to ensure the safe and smooth conduct of the yatra on this route. The government is engaged with the Chinese government on this matter." Minister of State for External Affairs V K Singh said in a written reply.

There were 4.442 applicants who registered this year for the Kailash Mansarovar Yatra.

which 1,454 applicants were shortlisted against existing slots, he said.

Beijing denied permission to the pilgrims to undertake the yatra from the Nathu La route, demanding it will only allow it if India moved its troops from the Dokalam

area near Sikkim.

There is 'Superman', 'Batman', 'Ironman' and even 'Antman'- the man-made celebrated saviors of humanity They have their own movie franchises and they are cele-brated around the globe with little kids aspiring to be a 'Peter Parker' or a 'Clark Kent' in their own rights. However, there are many real-life heroes who have selflessly dedicated their lives to saving and nur-turing animals in Sikkim. Their work and humanity are the best introduction they could or should ever have. While there are several renowned organizations working for the welfare of animals, these citizens are selfless groups of animal lovers who have stood by their cause and have helped countless animals survive. Meet the 'Animal' fathers and 'Animal'

They call themselves 'The Guardians'. A group of people who believe heroism lies in nurturing and taking care of animals including stray dogs, 'The Guardian' was formed in 2015 and since its establishment the group has helped 50-60 dogs in and around

mothers of Gangtok!



12-15 active members now donate their pocket money to the cause to vaccinate, feed and treat animals, especially stray dogs and cats.
"Our members also sell Do It

Yourself (DIY) items to generate funds for the cause. Besides that we also collect donations," says Deepika Tamang, one of the active members of the group.

Apart from a few animal

loving donors, the group gets no aid from the government and the members donate their own pocket money to keep the

group functioning. From collecting funds to buying med-icines to feeding the animals, the group manages every single activity all by themselves.
"We have so much to achieve

but financial constraints have held us back. We are trying our best to help as many strays with the little fund we have," Deepi-

The group has been also turning savior for pedigrees and dogs who are lost or, at times, run away from home. They treat them, get the fear out of their minds, make them fit for adoption and get them re-adopted through Sikkim Anti-Rabies and Animal Health (SARAH) Programme in the capital or through their Face-book page.

"We love dogs regardless of their breeds. If someone wants to adopt one they can contact us through Facebook. We then give them options from which they can choose. They can come to SARAH or we take the dog to their new parents," informs Deepika.

When asked about the trend of people buying expensive dogs of a foreign breed she says, "We do admit that peo-ple are obsessed with foreign breeds but we do not think it is the real reason for their preference. People do not keep pets at home for security these days. Keeping foreign breeds has become more of a fashion rather than a social need."

'The Guardians' recently volunteered for two activities. The group participated in a road vaccination and sensi-tization drive from Saramsa Garden to Ranipool last week. With help from SARAH, the group vaccinated 56 stray dogs and 06 pet dogs.

On the occasion of Drukpa Tshezhi the group volunteered in a de-worming and feeding drive from District Court to Namnang. Organized with the help of animal lovers, the group fed 35 dogs and sensitized the residents of Gangtok about brutality against animals.

"Man is a gregarious animal and cannot survive alone. The most important thing that peo-ple can do is to know the roles (economical, socio- cultural) played by animals in the society. For that matter stray dogs act as social bodyguards," Deepika says (mic drop*).

In a press release is-sued today, the ADGP has cited the example of a lady who was cheated of Rs 3 lakh through Facebook by a person who claimed to be a UK resi-dent. Sikkim Police Department has appealed to the public not to get lured and tempted by lucrative offers online


Tuberculosis, especially the multi-drug resistant variants of the disease, has been a serious cause for concern in the State and in order to facilitate early detection and monitoring of the disease, the District TB Centre conducted a two-week long survey of active case finding.

The survey covered a population of 3828 combining Adarshgaon under Tokal Bermiok Primary Health Centre and Daragaon under Jorethang Community Health Centre. From the covered population, 2575 were screened out of which 28 people were found to be symptomatic.

The team was divided into three groups wherein

the first group was headed by District Programme Coordinator-Revised National TB Control Programme [RNTCP], Riwang Bhutia, second group by TB HIV Coordinator-RNTCP, Gyan Prasad Pradhan, and the third group by District Public Private Mix Coordinator-RNTCP, Prajit Gautam.

The 3rd phase of the survey will be held at Ravangla from 04-18 Dec

The Investigation, nalism Award Com-The Investigative Jourmittee, Sikkim held a board meeting today at Rumtek chaired by the committee's chairperson, S. K Bardewa. The meeting was called in view of the warning issued by the Gorkha National Liberation Front of accelerating the Gorkhaland movement from 08 Aug onwards.

The meeting passed various resolutions regarding the harassment faced by Sikkim vehicles in Siliguri and the apathetic attitude of the Centre towards the State, a press release from the IJAC chairperson, S.K Bardewa informs.

With regard to the economic impact of the unrest in West Bengal, IIAC board members decided to suggest to the Government of Sikkim to make the State economically self-reliant by adopt-ing the following measures at least in the field of tourism and educationits own infrastructures. The IIAC board mem-

proposal for onward submission to the state government for urgent plementation that all the Sikkimese proprietors of all tourism infrastructures within Sikkim like Hotels, Resorts, Casino, Restaurants, Parks etc. should be stopped from leasing out their prop-erty to outsiders mainly those from West Bengal.

Such a step would also rejuvenate the employment sector as well as tourism in the state, the release adds.

Therefore the present agitation in Bengal should be taken as a blessing to help us infuse ideas that can accelerate the state's economy to help us become self-reli-

ant, reads the release. Mr Bardewa suggested that the government should immediately decide to introduce 50-seater tourism heliGangtok and another for Namchi or Pelling as deemed fit on subsidized tourism promotion tariff rate basis in collaboration and agreement with the Central government.

Thirdly, the board members suggested that the tourist entry point to Sikkim, which is currently Rangpo, needs to be diversified to Uttaray, Maney Bhanjyang in West Sikkim areas adjacent to the Western Nepal border and another from Rhenock Aritar route (Khasa) in East Sikkim adjacent to the Bhutan border should be opened up without further delay in conso-nance and agreement

with the Centre.

Lastly, the IJAC, has suggested that all the MLAs of Sikkim should rush to Delhi before 08 Aug and officially present Aug and officially present the economic grievances of Sikkimese people un-der the guidance of the Governor, Shriniwas Patil, before it is too late, reads the release.



There is trouble at Doklam. How things change. A decade ago, Sikkim's border with China was the venue for a new beginning, rather a new introduction to Sino-Indian relations when trade across Nathula was resumed after a hiatus of over four decades. It was a significant development not only for the op-portunities it opened up for Sikkim which continues to enjoy exclusive access to this border trade, but also for the immense shift it registered in how China viewed Sikkim. China, it may be recalled, has not recognized Sikkim's merger with Sikkim and would continually record Sikkim as a separate country in all its maps. In 2006, when, following a pact between India and China, border trade was opened between Tibet-an Autonomous Region of China and Sikkim, it was de facto acceptance of the merger. The thorn that China would occasionally twist in India's side had been removed. That was the case eleven years ago. The engagement improved further when the Kailash–Mansarovar Yatra was opened through Nathula as well. Then Doklam happened. And while this might have thrilled the hawks and reinforced their paranoid projections, it has reflected rather poorly on MEA's preparedness and threatens to derail the gains Sikkim had made riding on the backs of the bonhomie that was coursing through Nathula.

This section has already spoken about the trouble and the situation at Doklam and media across the country continues to generate commentary and analysis, so, this time, we change course and muse a bit, especially since Sikkim has a lot of time at its hands now, on the positives that this border was once preg-nant with. Hopefully, that potential has not been terminated and will resuscitate soon.

There will be very few who support the Chinese system, but even fewer will be able to deny the business acumen of Chinese people. Communist China may deny its people democracy as we know it, but there is no dearth of success stories born out of the free hand given to innovation and enterprise behind the bamboo curtain. China has also done what India ignored - played to its strengths. India made the mistake of launching into industrialization when it was agriculture that needed to be firmed up first. The migration this shift in priorities triggered to urban areas is now manifesting in dwindling agricultural growth in the country. China on the other hand focused on agriculture and building commune lifestyles for half a century. Then, when it was time to open the economy, it played to its strengths again. The biggest [and at that perhaps the only] asset that China had was its captive [take a pun if you will] workforce. China became the developed world's sweat-shop, the manufacturing backroom that produced anything on order, delivered on time and did it for a pittance. Dollars flowed in, industries came up. Now, China has switched to the next level. Just as its size was a current asset, China had its innovative skills and scientific institutions as strengths from posterity. This region after all gave the world pa-per, gun powder and the concept of paper currency when Europe was still in medieval times. The country is now pushing research, its scientists were the first to segregate the rice genome, research into cloning is big business in China now and the country is eyeing the IT sector which is why they want a direct link with Bangalore (again, the ethics is problematic, but that we will leave for another time).

Sikkim can learn from this template. In fact, it

should. Just like India outpaced China fifty years ago, Sikkim was also much better placed than the neighbouring Himalayan kingdoms of Bhutan and Nepal at that time. Somewhere along the way, the State stopped grooming its human resource in a planned manner. The State's planners have already initiated an ambitious skill-enhancement drive. What this move needs to be complemented with is serious introspection on what Sikkim has by way of assets in human resources, ecology, land etc. so that these assets can be worked to contribute to the economy. Hydel and tourism potential are too obvious; the planners need to look deeper Sikkim has to look back, into history, and understand its traditional skills. A great repository of knowledge is getting lost and in reviving the connection Sikkim will not only save a way of life, but also gain economically. Biotechnology, herbal science, organic cultivation, high altitude survival, these are Sikkim's traditional strengths and popular mantras of the modern world. Sikkim can either re-educate itself, or wait till some university student researching the topic arrives here to teach the Sikkimese the same and embarrass everyone with the ignorance the State has grown so com-

Why do human beings speak so many languages?

he thatched roof held back the sun's rays, The thatched root net a but it could not keep the tropical heat at bay. As everyone at the research workshop headed outside for a break, small groups splintered off to gather in the shade of coconut trees and enjoy a breeze. I wandered from group to group, joining in the discussions. Each time, I noticed that the language of the conversation would change from an in-digenous language to something they knew I could understand, Bislama or English. I was amazed by the ease with which the meeting's participants switched between languages, but I was even more astonished by the num-

ber of different indigenous languages.

Thirty people had gathered for the workshop on this island in the South Pacific, and all except for me came from the island, called Makelua, in the nation of Vanuatu. They lived in 16 different communities and spoke 16 distinct languages.

In many cases, you could stand at the edge of one village and see the outskirts of the next community. Yet the residents of each village spoke com pletely different languages. According to recent work by my colleagues at the Max Planck Institute for the Science of Human History, this island, just 100 kilometers long and 20 kilometers wide, is home to speakers of perhaps 40 different indige nous languages. Why so many?

We could ask this same question of the entire

globe. People don't speak one universal language, or even a handful. Instead, today our species collectively speaks over 7,000 distinct languages.

And these languages are not spread randomly across the planet. For example, far more languages are found in tropical regions than in the temperate zones. The tropical island of New Guinea is home to over 900 languages. Russia, 20 times larger, has 105 indigenous languages. Even within the tropics, language diversity varies widely. For example, the 250,000 people who live on Vanuatu's 80 islands speak 110 different languages, but in Bangladesh, a population 600 times greater speaks only 41 languages.

Why is it that humans speak so many language


es? And why are they so unevenly spread across the planet? As it turns out, we have few clear an-swers to these fundamental questions about how

SOME IDEAS, BUT LITTLE EVIDENCE

Most people can easily brainstorm possible answers to these intriguing questions. They hypothesize that language diversity must be about history, cultural differences, mountains or oceans dividing populations, or old squabbles writ large – "we hat-ed them, so we don't talk to them." The questions also seem like they should be fun-

damental to many academic disciplines – linguis-tics, anthropology, human geography. But, starting in 2010, when our diverse team of researchers from six different disciplines and eight different countries began to review what was known, we were shocked that only a dozen previous studies had been done, including one we ourselves com-pleted on language diversity in the Pacific. These prior efforts all examined the degree

to which different environmental, social and geo-graphic variables correlated with the number of languages found in a given location. The results



People currently speak 7,000 languages around the globe varied a lot from one study to another, and no clear patterns emerged. The studies also ran up against many methodological challenges, the biggest of which centered on the old statistical adage – correlation does not equal causation.

We wanted to know the exact steps that led to so many languages forming in certain places and so few in others. But previous work provided few robust the ories on the specific processes involved, and the methods used did not get us any closer to understanding the causes of language diversity patterns. For example, previous studies pointed out that at lower latitudes languages are often spoken across smaller areas than at higher latitudes. You can fit more languages into a given area the closer you get to the equator. But this result does not tell us much about the processes that create language diversity. Just because a group of peo-ple crosses an imaginary latitudinal line on the map doesn't mean they'll automatically divide into two different populations speaking two different languages. Latitude might be correlated with language diversity, but it certainly did not create it.

CAN A SIMPLE MODEL PREDICT REALITY?

A better way to identify the causes of particular patterns is to simulate the processes we think might be creating them. The closer the model's products are to the reality we know exists, the greater the chances are that we understand the actual processes at work.

Two members of our group, ecologists Thiago Rangel and Robert Colwell, had developed this simulation modeling technique for their studies of species diversity patterns. But no one had ever used this ap-proach to study the diversity of human populations. We decided to explore its potential by first building a simple model to test the degree to which a few basic processes might explain language diversity patterns in just one part of the globe, the continent of Australia.

Our colleague Claire Bowern, a linguist at Yale University, created a map that shows the diversity of aboriginal languages – a total of 406 – found in Australia prior to contact with Europeans. There were far more languages in the north and along the coasts, with relatively few in the desert interior. We wanted to see how closely a model, based on a sim-ple set of processes, could match this geographic

pattern of language diversity.

Second, rainfall will limit the number of people that can live in a place; Our model assumed that people would live in higher densities in areas where it rained more. Annual precipitation varies widely in Australia, from over three meters in the northeastern rainforests to one-tenth of a meter in the Outback.

tions have a maximum size. Ideal group size is a trade-off between benefits of a larger group (wider selection of potential mates) and costs (keeping track of unrelated indi-viduals). In our model, when a population grew larger than a maximum threshold - set randomly based on a global distribution of hunter-gatherer population sizes – it divided into two populations, each speaking a

distinct language.

We used this model to simulate language diversity maps for Australia. In each iteration, an initial population sprung up ran-domly somewhere on the map and began to grow and spread in a random direction. An underlying rainfall map determined the population density, and when the population size hit the predetermined maximum.

the group divided. In this way, the simulated human populations grew and divided as they spread to fill up the entire Australian continent.

Our simple model didn't include any impact

from contact among groups, changes in subsistence strategies, the effects of the borrowing of cultural ideas or components of language from nearby groups, or many other potential processes. So, we expected it would fail miserably.

Incredibly, the model produced 407 languages, just one off from the actual number.

The simulated language maps also show more languages in the north and along the coasts, and less in the dry regions of central Australia, mirroring the geographic patterns in observed language diversity.

And so for the continent of Australia it appears that a small number of factors – limitations rainfall places on population density and limits on group size - might explain both the number of languages and much of the variation in how many languages are spoken in different locations.

APPLYING THE MODEL ELSEWHERE

But we suspect that the patterns of language di-versity in other places may be shaped by different factors and processes. In other locations, such as Vanuatu, rainfall levels do not vary as widely as in Australia, and population densities may be shaped by other environmental conditions.

Undoubtedly, a wide variety of social and environmental factors and processes have contributed to the patterns in language diversity we see across the globe. In some places topography, climate or the density of key natural resources may be more critical; in others the history of warfare, political organization or the subsistence strategies of different groups may play a bigger role in shaping group boundaries and language diversity patterns. What we have established for now is a template for a method that can be used to uncover the different processes at work in each location

Language diversity has played a key role in shaping the interactions of human groups and the history of our species, and yet we know surpris-ingly little about the factors shaping this diversity. We hope other scientists will become as fascinated by the geography of language diversity as our re-search group is and join us in the search for understanding why humans speak so many languages.

The abandoned route through India, Myanmar and China: why the Stilwell Road should be restored

Aderelict border crossing steeped in history cuts across the rolling mountain ranges from India to Myanmar. It is at the junction of three distinct geographical regions: the Eastern Himalayas; the verdant floodplains fed by the Brahmaputra river; and the Patkai hills. This route meanders towards the Chindwin river, the largest tributary of the Irrawaddy, which defines the plains of Myanmar.

The Pangsau Pass stands at this border crossing between India and Myanmar, bearing witness to waves of migrations over the centuries. Across the Pangsau Pass, in the Sagaing region of present-day Myanmar, lies Pangsau village. The residents there are a mix of ethnic Bamars,

mainly considered Burmese (the dominant eth-nic group in Myanmar), ethnic Tangsa Nagas who also inhabit parts of the Indian state of Arunachal Pradesh, and some other Eastern Naga tribes.

The nearest proper town inside Myanmar from

the village is about 60km away. It is connected by a dirt road, the old Stilwell Road, which is now almost inaccessible during the rainy season.

At Pangsau Pass, every Friday is designated as "Burma Day", when the villagers can cross to India. They visit the market in Nampong to buy essential items for the week. Some people cross on foot, others on rickety motorbikes.

Indian citizens are allowed to visit Pangsau vil-

lage on the 10th, 20th and 30th day of every month, on what are known as "India Days". Most Indian visitors are tourists, and there is a market held in

Pangsau village on these days. The Arunachal Pradesh state government and the local market coordination committee decide on these access days in consultation with the Indian Army, which patrols the border. Pangsau market sells a host of local Burmese products and vegetables, and there are local eateries with Burmese

with sticky rice and rice noodle soups

Burmese sticky rice is very popular among the border communities in India. Many Indian tourists also visit the Lake of No Return, where several Allied Forces warplanes crashed during World War II.

Men roam in longyi (male attire), trying to sell

their products. Women and children wear bright patches of thanaka on their faces, a yellowish-white cosmetic paste, made from ground bark, a common sight in Myanmar.

The Stilwell Road was constructed under the leadership of General Joseph Stilwell of the US Army between 1942-45. It began in Ledo, Assam, and ended in Kunming, in the southwestern province of Yunnan in China, spanning 1736 kilometres.

This provided an alternative route for Chinese soldiers fighting the invading Japanese during the concluding stages of the war.

The section of the road that links India and Myan mar has been disused ever since the war ended, and is described by the Chinese as "barely useable".

But the origins of the route go back long before Joseph Stilwell. This was the way Chaolung Sukapha, the first Ahom king, entered the plains of Assam in 1228 AD. He established the Ahom kingdom (1228-1826), which began a period of stability and prosperity in present-day Assam, Several waves of migration happened after that, and they included the six major Tai groups of Assam. The Singphos have also used the route for centuries.

The many ethnic groups of the region have this route etched in their collective imaginations. The Tai-Phakey community, which numbers about 2,000 people in Assam, migrated from Hukawng Valley in Myanmar through the Pangsau Pass. They have man-aged to preserve the old form of Tai language, and medieval scriptures in their Budhhist monastery.

According to several members of the community

that I met during fieldwork, they have been able to

cause the closed borders make them feel isolated

from their culture. So they preserve all they have left.
As you approach Ledo, a huge billboard announces the beginning of the Stilwell Road to Kun-ming, installed by a former Assam minister. This is indicative of the shared aspirations of

the people of this region to open up to Myanmar and southwest China. The Pangsau Pass Win-ter Festival, held intermittently over the past few years, has also demonstrated strong cultural links

across the region.

The main rationale for re-opening the road is connecting people across these shared borders, along with the exchange of ideas and goods. But there is less interest shown by the Indian government.

The presence of several insurgent groups in northeast India deters New Delhi from restoring the road. Some Indian insurgent groups are based across this border in Myanmar, with active cross-bor-der operations. The Kachin insurgency against the Myanmar government is also based there.

China has shown interest in opening up the route, but India's hesitation is also based on the fact that some part of it involves the contested territory of Arunachal Pradesh. Boundary talks between India and China about the status of Arunachal Pradesh have been going on for years now, with 19

rounds of talks completed in 2016.

It may be complicated, but it is imperative for both New Delhi and Yangon to work towards opening up the road, given China's continued strategic engagement in the Kachin region of Myanmar.

A joint development of these borderlands, which have historically been hubs of migration and exchange, will augur well for the region as

"The crisis in Darieeling cannot be resolved through bullet. Repres-

ities of police are not the solution," he said, making an appeal to the state's Trinamool Congress government and the GMCC for bringing peace and ending violence

This 50-day long crisis can only be resolved through political dialogue and for that peace was needed to be restored in the town, he said, requesting GMCC members to end their fast and call off their strike.

"Gorkhas are known for their honesty and loyalty for the country. They never hesitate in sacrificing their life for the nation. So I would also request them to call off their fast and end the strike," Ahluwalia said.

As the MP of Darjeel-ing, he will submit a memorandum on behalf of the GMCC to the prime minister and the home minister.

phase will start at 10:52 pm. The partial eclipse ends at 12:48 am while the penumbral eclipse ends at 2:20 am on August 8.

A penumbral lunar eclipse occurs when the Sun, the Earth, and the Moon align in an almost straight line. In this scenario, the

Earth blocks some of the Sun's light from directly reaching the Moon's surface and covers all or part of the Moon with the outer part of its shadow, also known as the penumbra.

"The interesting

thing about lunar eclipse timings is that anywhere on Earth from where the Moon is visible during eclipse, the time will be the same. This is in contrast to a solar eclipse in which the timings of the contacts change as the location changes on Earth." Rathnashree said.



Of the 230.8 million 150.03 million were 65 or above, or 10.8 per cent of the total population, according to a report released by the ministry.

By international stan-dards, a country or region is considered to be an "ageing society" when the number of people aged 60 or above reaches 10 per cent or more. China's old age pop-

ulation above 60 years will reach 255 million by 2020 putting heavy stress on geriatric care services, China's planning body said earlier.

Bracing for the de-mographic crisis China last year relaxed the four decades old one child policy by permitting two children for couples.

The ministry said China has 140,000 nursing homes holding a total more than 7.3 beds at the end of 2016, with a year-on-year in-crease of 20.7 per cent and 8.6 per cent respectively. However, there are only 31.6 beds for every 1,000 senior citizens.

According to the re-rt, China had about 460,000 orphans at the end of 2016, with 88,000 living in government-funded agencies with the rest being cared for by relatives or private orphanages.

Some 19,000 Chinese orphans were adopted by domestic or overseas families in 2016, the ministry said.

India may face deadly heat waves within decades: study

BOSTON, AUG 3 (PTI): Nearly 1.5 billion people in India, Pakistan and Bangladesh are likely to face deadly heat waves within the next few de-cades due to climate change, exposing them to unsurvivable temperatures and widespread food crisis, an MIT study has warned.

Scientists predicted that by the end of this century climate change could lead to severe sum mer heat waves in South Asia, a region of deep poverty where one-fifth of the world's population resides.

There is still time to avert such severe warming if measures are implemented now to reduce the most dire consequences of global warming, researchers said. However, without significant reductions in carbon emissions, the heat waves could begin within as little as a few decades to strike the fertile Indus and Ganges river basins that produce much of the region's food supply, they said. The areas likely to be

hardest hit in northern India, Bangladesh and southern Pakistan are home to 1.5 billion people. These areas are also among the poorest in the region, with much of the population dependent on subsistence farming that requires long hours of hard labour out in the open and unprotected from the Sun.

"That makes them very vulnerable to these climatic changes," said Elfatih Eltahir, from MIT.

While the projections show the Persian Gulf may become the region of the worst heat waves on the planet, northern India is a close second. Eltahir said, and eastern China, also densely populated, is third. The highest concentrations of heat in the Persian Gulf would be out over the waters of the Gulf itself, with lesser levels over inhabited land.

The new analysis is based on recent research showing that hot weather's most deadly effects for humans comes from a combination of high temperature and high humid-ity, an index which is measured by a reading known

as wet-bulb temperature.
This reflects the ability of moisture to evaporate, which is the mechanism required for the human body to maintain its internal temperature through the evaporation of sweat.

Trump endorses merit-based immigration system

WASHINGTON, AUG 3 (PTI): US President Donald Trump has endorsed a legislation that would drastically cut the number of legal immigrants allowed into the country and implement "merit-based" visa scheme which could benefit highly-educated and technology professionals from countries like India.

The Reforming American Immigration for Strong Employment (RAISE) Act would scrap the current lottery system to get into the US and instead institute a points-based system for earning a Green Card.

Factors that would be taken into account include English language skills, education, high-paying job offers and age.

If passed by the Congress and signed into law, the legis-lation could benefit highly-educated people and technology professionals from countries . like India.

"The RAISE Act will reduce poverty, increase wages, and save taxpayers billions and hillions of dollars. It will do this by changing the the US issues Green Cards to nationals from other coun-Green Cards provide



permanent residency, work authorisation, and fast track to citizenship," Trump said at a White House ever announce his support to the RAISE Act.

bill, Trump said, would represent the most significant reform to our immigration system in half a century."

Standing along with two top authors of the bill -- Sen-ators Tom Cotton and David Perdue -- Trump said the RAISE Act ends chain migration and replaces the lowskilled system with a new points-based system for re-ceiving a Green Card. This competitive application pro-cess will favour applicants who can speak English, financially support themselves and their families and demonstrate skills that will contribute to our economy, he said.

The RAISE Act prevents new migrants and new immi-grants from collecting welfare and protects US workers from being displaced, he added.

'That's a very big thing. They're not going to come in and just immediately go and collect welfare. That doesn t happen under the RAISE Act. They can't do that. Crucially, the Green Card reforms in the RAISE Act will give American workers a pay raise by reducing unskilled immigration," he said.

"It has not been fair to our people, to our citizens, to our workers," Trump said of the current immigration system.

Trump said this legislation

will not only restore America's competitive edge in the 21st century, but it will restore the

sacred bonds of trust between America and its citizens.

"This legislation demon strates our compassion for struggling American families who deserve an immigration system that puts their needs first and that puts America first," he said.

Noting that the current system is "an obsolete disas-ter", Senator Cotton said that it is time for it to change.

"First, we bring over a million immigrants into this country a year. That's like adding the population of Montana every single year; adding the population of Arkansas every three years. The vast majority of those workers -- or those immigrants come here not because of their English-lan-guage abilities or their job skills, or their job offer, or their educational attainment,"

"In fact, only one in 15 out of a million new immigrants come here because of their iob skills and their ability to succeed in this economy," Cotton said.

The RAISE Act will be re-orienting Green Card system, he added.

Senator Perdue said the current system does not work.

"It keeps America from being competitive, and it does not meet the needs of the economy today," he said.

"Today we bring in 1.1 million legal immigrants a year.

Over 50 per cent of our households of legal immigrants today participate in our social welfare system. Right now, only one 1 out of 15 immigrants who come into our country come in with skills that are employable. We've got to change that," he

Perdue said he looked at the at best practices before drafting the legislation.

"We looked at countries like Canada, Australia, and others. What we're introducing today is modelled on the current Canadian and Australian systems. It's pro-worker, it's pro-growth, and it's been proven to work. Both have been extremely successful in attracting highly skilled workers to those countries," the Senator said.

"We can all agree that the goals of our nation's immigration system should be to protect the interests of working Americans, including immigrants, and to welcome talented individuals who come here legally better life for themselves. Our current system makes it virtually impossible for them to do that" said the Senator

According to Attorney General Jeff Sessions, the higher entry standards established in this proposal will allow authorities to do a more thorough job reviewing applicants for entry, therefore protecting the security of the US homeland. The additional time spent on vetting each application as a result of this legislation will also ensure that each application serves the national interest, he observed.

The American people de-serve a lawful immigration system that promotes our national interest. The RAISE Act would give us a more merit-based immigration system that admits the best and the brightest around the world while making it harder for people to come here illegally," Sessions said.

"The bill would end programme known to be rife with fraud and abuse and finally improve the vetting pro-cess, making our country and working class wages much safer and stronger," said the

Pak EC bars Shehbaz Sharif from campaigning for by-election

ISLAMABAD, AUG (PTI): Punjab Chief Min-ister Shehbaz Sharif has been barred by the Eleckistan from taking part in his own by-election campaign to a National Assembly seat left vacant after the disqualification of his elder brother and former Prime Minister Nawaz Sharif.

According to the code of conduct issued by the the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP), constitutional dignitaries, including the President, the Prime Minister and the provincial Chief Ministers have been barred from visiting the constituency or a polling station after the issuance of the schedule for the September 17 polls.

"All these public office-holders, including the Punjab chief minister who is a potential candidate for the by- election to Lahore National Assembly seat (NA-120), have been restrained from visiting the constituency or a polling station after the issuance of the poll schedule," it said.

The ECP also told candidates that their



not exceed Rs 1.5 million and they must use a dedicated account for all transactions related to poll expenses, the Dawn newspaper reported.

The code of conduct came into effect this week immediately after the ECP announced the election schedule for La-hore National Assembly seat. The ECP warned that legal action would be taken against any individual found violating the rules.

Terming the ECP code of conduct "confusing", political observers wondered how the holder of a public office could be barred from taking part in his own election campaign even though the law permitted a legislator to contest election for

tendering resignation.

A senior official of the ECP said a clear picture would emerge after the submission of nomination papers by 65-year- old Shehbaz for the by-election.
"This is a unique situ-

ation because if the Chief Minister of Punjab files nomination papers, he will not be campaigning for somebody else but for himself and this right can in no way be taken away from him," the official said.

Nawaz Sharif was disqualified by the Supreme Court on Friday in connection with the Panama Papers scandal. The 67- year-old veteran politician resigned from his position that evening.




