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HC quashes notification that reduced excise duty exemption from 100% to 56%

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 23 Nov: The High Court of Sik-

The High court
kim has quashed the 2008 notification issued by the Centre reducing the excise duty exemption to industrial units set up in Sikkim from 100% to 56%. According to the High Court, the Centre failed to establish the 'superior public interest' that such a cut would serve.

Under the North East Industrial and Invest-ment Promotion Policy (NEIIPP). 2007 known as Industrial Policy, 2007 the Central Government had provided 100% excise duty exemption which was reduced to 56% vide Notifications

No. 20/2008. Sun Pharma Labora tories Limited had filed four petitions challenging the impugned noti-The division bench of the High Court of Sikkim headed by Chief Justice Satish Ku-Agnihotri and Justice Bhaskar Raj Pradhan observed that, "the facts and circumstances of the present writ petitions, squarely falls within the parameters of the doctrine of promissory es-toppel and that it would be unconscionable on the part of the Ministry of Finance, Department of Revenue to shy away from it without fulfilling

by Bengal govt New Delhi, Nov 24 (PTI): Gorkha Janmukti Morcha leader Bimal Gurung today claimed in the Supreme Court that he was being politically persecuted by

the West Bengal government, as the state police sought "reversal" of the or-der restraining it from taking coercive action against him.

Gurung's counsel alleged before a bench of Justices AK Sikri and Ashok Bhushan that West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee was opposed to him "tooth and nail" and has sought a CBI probe in the killings of several Gorkhaland activists during the recent agitation for a separate state.

The West Bengal Police told the bench that the apex court's November 20 order restraining it from taking any coercive steps against Gurung should be vacated, as the "morale" of the entire force was down since there were several cases of serious nature against him

On November 20, the top court had issued notice on his plea and said "in the meantime, no coercive steps shall

be taken against the petitioner".

Senior lawyer AM Singhvi, appearing for the police, said there were a number of cases, including of mur-der and rioting, against Gurung and a 26-year-old police official was also killed during the recent Gorkhaland ag-

He argued that details of these cases were not given to the court at the time when the November 20 order was passed and said, "look at what the state will feel. The state will feel that it is impotent as far as this person is con-

Singhvi gave a list of 53 FIRs lodged against Gurung and said he was facing trial in another 24 cases as well. He also alleged that several incrimi-nating material like AK 47 rifle, live am-

munitions and bombs were recovered by the police from the activists during the protests.

Senior advocate P S Patwalia, ap-pearing for Gurung, countered Singh-vi's submissions and said a number of FIRs were lodged against him which amounted to political persecution.

"It is rather my case that these FIRs



are part of political persecution by West Bengal government against me. I am the President of Gorkha Janmukti Mor cha. The present chief minister of West Bengal is tooth and nail opposed to me and a separate Gorkhaland," he said.
Patwalia also claimed that 21 pro-

Gorkhaland activists were killed during the recent 104-day protest and there should be a CBI investigation in the matter.

When Singhvi referred to the cases lodged against Gurung and said "we want reversal of the order", the bench observed, "we were not aware of all these cases".

The bench also asked Gurung's counsel to file a reply to the application of the police and posted the case for hearing on November 28.

"You (police) have levelled allega-tions (against Gurung) which are serious. So let him file a reply. We will have it on Tuesday," the bench said. The bench also asked Gurung's

counsel to ensure that there is no "pub-lic speech" and "demonstration" till

The GJM central committee had recently suspended Gurung for six months and appointed Binay Tamang as the party's new president.

The police had earlier claimed that

Gurung and some of his aides were absconding after being booked under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act in connection with the violence in Darjeeling hills during the recent agitation for a separate Gorkhaland.

Gurung has approached the apex court seeking an independent probe into the alleged killings of Gorkhaland supporters during the protests.

184 killed in militant attack on Egypt mosque

CAIRO, Nov 24 (PTI): At least 184 worshippers were killed and 125 others injured when militants struck a mosque during Friday prayers in Egypt's restive North Sinai region, in the deadliest terror attack in the country.

The militants launched a targeted bomb and gun attack on the al-Rowda mosque in Al-Arish city during the Friday prayers, the staterun MENA news agency reported.

After the bomb ripped through the mosque, the gunmen on four off-road vehicles opened fire on the worshippers who tried to escape from the site after the explosion, it said.

Engage When Offended

...or live with offensive conduct becoming the new normal

 ${f A}$ n audio tape, supposedly the recording of a tele-phonic conversation of a Minister discussing panchayat election mechanizations with one of his underlings, has been making the rounds for a while now. By Sikkim standards, it has gone viral; but really, the recording is so long and actually quite boring, a combination which is fatal for anything with online fame aspirations, that apart from those who need to hear it, those who like to jeer at such things and those who are required to comment on such things, it is unlikely that too many of the others have listened to the entire recording. Yes, there are bits in it which are offensive not only because they are callow but also for the easy caricatures with which communities and their politics can be pigeonholed in Sikkim. And this comment holds irrespective of the authenticity of the recording itself because the people have accepted the conversation as plausible and no one has really scoffed in doubt over the superficiality with which the recording suggests that politics can be "played" in Sikkim. It also appears that the episode has danced its way out of the public domain for now. Yes there were calls demanding action against the Minister for his alleged comments, but the political momentum has slackened and this incident will most likely return only much later to support political positions and arguments when elections are

The incident, however, is one which requires some continuing conversations. The authenticity of the recording notwithstanding, the fact that it is in the public domain and has largely been accepted as a real conversation and has caused some amount of heartburn requires that it not be just ignored into amnesia. While it is never advisable to sensationalise issues, especially those with potential for communal mischief, to ignore them is even more ill-advised. Whether a reference is offensive or not is a subjective matter, so let us not even debate whether part of the recording was insensitive or not. Moreover, everyone who has commented on the issue, including the Minister in question who has rejected it as a doctored audio, has condemned the communal nature of the references. The focus should instead be on the general response to the surfacing of the audio. Save the Opposition parties and one group claiming to be speaking for the community stereotyped in the conversation, no one and no other agency has engaged in the matter. There are no surprises in the statements coming from the Opposition camp which is almost by-the-numbers routine, but the general absence of any other voices is worrying because it suggests that people's organizations are becoming increasingly only about themselves and their groups. If something offensive or communally sensitive is circulated in the public domain, then everyone with a stake in public affairs needs to make a comment. For Opposition parties, the choice is easy and the condemna-tions quick, for the apolitical however it is not so much about establishing blame and condemning individuals as conveying what kind of conduct is acceptable and which statements unacceptable. The apolitical organizations need to clearly communicate the high standards they desire and this they can do without naming names or taking sides and by simply engaging and conveying what is proper and what offends them. If they do so often enough, the message will get through and those pursuing political careers will become more conscious about how they conduct themselves. The dangers of not engaging when offensive remarks have been passed in casual conversations is there for the entire world to see in how the level of public debate has fallen USA, the Phillipines and even in our country.

Three decades on, stigma still stymies HIV prevention and treatment

There have been great strides and many important victories in the fight against HIV. Scientific innovations and sustained investment have been

the most important weapons in this ongoing battle.

Nevertheless the epidemic retains a powerful grip - especially on people in Africa. In sub-Saharan Africa, 19.4 million are living with the virus. In 2016 an estimated 15 000 new

infections occurred every week

in the region.

Treatment and prevention of HIV are twin endeavours; they rely universally on two elements. The first is the interaction of HIV positive and negative people with HIV services. The second is the willingness of people to modify their risky behaviour and avoid negative health consequences.

Adherence is the cornerstone of these processes: a commitment to taking medication or adopting a risk-reducing be-haviour consistently over time. By adhering to their antiretroviral (ARV) regimens those living with the virus are able to lead

long, healthy lives. They are able to eliminate the chance of passing on the virus to their partner(s).

The concept of an undetectable virus is an untransmissable one is now acceptable.

With good adherence to an HIV prevention pill or pre-exposure prophylaxis (PrEP) or consistent use of condoms, HIV negative people can protect

themselves from infection.

But real and perceived stigma can undermine all these efforts. This is because stigma stops people from getting tested, stops them discussing their test results with intimate partners when they do test, and then staying on their treatment. Unless stigma is addressed, the aim of ending the AIDs epidemic by 2030 – one of the United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals - is unlikely to become

THE LOGIC BEHIND STIGMA

Stigma happens when disgrace and shame becom associated with an attribute, such as being HIV positive. It results in the person with the attribute eing discredited or socially renounced. When

stigmatised beliefs are widely held in a community, hostility and discrimination towards stigmatised people becomes common.

A stigmatised person can start to believe these

views as well and develop a self-depreciating internal representation of themselves. This is known as internalised stigma. It can lead to diminished mental health and emotional distress. Both general and internalised HIV-related stigma can compromise a



person's ability to seek and stay on treatment. And it can prevent people from taking steps to prevent

For instance, a woman living with HIV could choose not to go back for more medication because she's scared someone from her community will see her and learn her status.

Conversely, a sexually active teenager might not sk a healthcare professional how she can prevent HIV if she is afraid of being judged for having sex.

There is evidence that these scenarios still play out. The HIV Stigma Index conducted in South Af rica in 2014 found that about 45% of the respondents experienced internalised stigma. And 39% lived in fear of potential stigma. Young people between the ages of 15 and 24 were particularly affected by all types of stigma

STIGMA ON TOP OF STIGMA

Stigma has the negative psychological consequence of making it more difficult for people to cope and find social support. It also reduces their ability to overcome other barriers to adherence, such a

unfriendly healthcare services or side effects from

The research shows that people who do not ex-perience internalised stigma tend to be more successful in adhering to treatment and more capable of overcoming other barriers to access treatment and prevention services. HIV stigma poses additional difficulties for positive people who already belong to stigmatised population groups, such as men who
have sex with men transgender

people, sex workers, and people who inject drugs. Stigma against these groups

already reduces access to healthcare services and social support. But disclosure of being HIV positive can result in people facing even more stigma, dis-crimination and hostility.

This is especially the case in African countries where homosexuality and sex work are criminalised.

Moralistic support for criminalisation often interferes with public health initiatives. As a result, stigmatised populations are frequently made more vulnerable to HIV infection due to this discrimination and re-

stricted access to healthcare services

CHANGING THE TIDE

The good news is that stigma can be reduced if three basic interventions are put in place.

Firstly, through the implementation of effective and sustained mass media campaigns and health promotion aimed at dispelling the common myths. These campaigns should involve HIV positive people as message bearers.

Secondly, normalising and promoting the interaction with HIV prevention services. What is needed here are more people openly engaging about HIV

testing and taking PrEP (pre-exposure prophylaxis). And thirdly laws and policies that protect those living with the virus from discrimination and promote them being able to access healthcare services. These are especially important for key population groups living in countries where criminalisation disrupts public health strategies.

The way we tell the story of Hollywood sexual assault and harassment matters

Reporter Paula Froelich claims she conce observed Harvey Weinstein assault a woman at a book party. Her editor responded with, "Maybe it's not really a story."

As it turns out, Weinstein and others are becoming a never-ending story, as more women reveal experiences with powerful men - not just in Hollywood, but across multiple in-dustries. This story typically has two acts. First come the women's reports followed by the inevitable dismissal and undermining of them.

As a scholar who has studied violence against women for more than 20 years and watched public outrage over harassment and assault wax and vane, my question is: Could this time be different?

Of course, the volume of reports is new. Never before have we witnessed such an outpouring. It's also new to see organizations such as the newsroom at NPR or the Academy of Mo-tion Picture Artists hold leadership

accountable for failing to act.

But other aspects of this cultural moment are all too familiar. Already, the act of making a report of harass-ment or assault has been termed "Weinsteining," and the collective action of women who have done the reporting has been termed the "Weinstein effect." The use of these terms removes the women from the stories, and maintains a narrow focus on a singular perpetrator.

These cutesy terms also diminish the agony women face when deciding whether to make a formal complaint to an authority. Those who have been victimized report fear of reprisal or of being disbelieved, and feel shame, guilt and embarrassment. These fears and reactions are evident across women's recent accounts. Many spoke of years of torment, fear,

shame and guilt, including physical reactions like nausea when recalling the event.

Let me be clear. Such fears are ra tional. Though some actors allegedly victimized by Weinstein or James To-back continued in the industry and found success, many others were excluded from major films, and a good number left the industry entirely. Other women were encouraged to sign agreements that effectively stopped them from telling their own

Another way of undermining omen's reports is to downgrade the women's experiences from the categories of harassment, sexual assault and rape and instead label them abuse, minor bad behavior or

innocent miscommunication. For ex ample, the claim that Toback engaged in "low-level lechery" and not sexual assault is absurd. What Toback has been accused of – obtaining sexual stimulation or orgasm by rubbing against a person without the person's consent - is a crime called frotteur-

NO WOMAN IS IMMUNE

The victimization of powerful celebrities shows that no woman is im-

Years of social science data underscore the pervasiveness of sexual vio-lation in women's lives. The sad truth is that the number of women who have been raped or assaulted in their lifetime has not decreased during the past 30 years, or longer.

An analysis of different studies of women in academia, government, the private sector and the military - representing 86,000 women in all – documented that 58 percent said they had experienced at least one instance of sexually harassing behavior. Recently, researchers at the University of Oregon were surprised to find that nearly 60 percent of women graduate students reported experiences of sexual harassment. In 2010 the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention estimated that 20 percent of American women overall have experienced rape. Estimates of rape and attempted rape in higher education students has remained at a steady 20 percent since psychologist Mary Koss's 1987

groundbreaking study.

If we look at Hollywood as a microcosm of society, men like Weinstein and Toback effectively exerted a pattern of intimidation, fear and so-cial control through sexual predation. As author Susan Brownmiller wrote in her classic 1975 book, "Against Our Will," the behavior of these men isn't about sex - it's about intimidation. fear and social control.

Diminishing and undermining the process of women bravely reporting experiences of sexual harassment, rape and other forms of sexual assault by calling it "Weinsteining" al-lows predators to hold onto power. Describing women's real experienc-es with words that match the horror they faced is a first step toward dismantling that power and the structures that support it. If more women come forward and name their experiences and others remember that bad manners, assault and harassment are not synonymous, this time may be different. I'm hopeful; but only time

is seemingly a supporter of Chennaiyin FC, making curious gestures to wards a female NEUFC supporter were posted on Twitter, which drew condemnation.

Chennaiyin FC, who had emerged 3-0 victors in the match last night, has condemned the leged "unbecoming be-haviour" by a section of their fans against a group of North-East United FC fans during the ISL game at the Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium and said the club will take strong action.
"Chennaiyin FC has a

very strict and firm policy against racism and any unbecoming behaviour in the stadium. The club strongly condemns any such act. We are looking into any such incidents



and will take strong action against it," Chennai-yin said in their official Twitter handle.

NorthEast United owner, Bollywood actor John Abraham too slammed the incident and said the team stood by the fan who was "victimised".

"It's deeply disturbing to me when sports becomes an unsafe or unharmonious place for anyone. Everything I have taken back from sport has been only pos-itive, from learning to play with people who are different, learning to take loss with a sense of sportsmanship, winning with humility," Abraham

To the girl who was victimized by these insensitive and thoughtless people, 'we stand with you and you will never feel alone you must've felt at that moment. I will personally meet you and

make sure you are OK."

"To the 'fans' who
troubled her, I'll call you fake fans because I know that Abhishek or myself would never condone this behaviour from our own true fans. I will find you and make sure you are punished and apologize for your behaviour," Abraham said.

Illegal logging on the rise in Arunachal

ITANAGAR, Nov 24 (PTI): Despite Supreme Court's ban on timber operations in Arunachal Pradesh, illegal logging at Pasighat Reserve Forest in East Siang district continues unabated.

Hundreds of timber trees have been felled by the mafias during the monsoons, posing a serious challenge to the officers of the for-est department, additional deputy chief conservator of forest (ADCF) Tasang Taga said.

Recently, a team of forest officials, led by Taga, seized heaps of timber logs, especially of Hollock (Terminalia Myriocarpa) variety, from Loki - a riverine island - under Pasighat reserve forest.

"The mafias take advantage

of the flood situation in the area during the monsoon season. We came across 100 stumps in Loki. There could be more in other parts of the reserve forest," said Taga, who is in charge of a mobile squad under chief conservator of forest of central Arunachal circle.

Taga also rued the lack

means for proper patrolling in the reserve forest.

"Hollock trees have a huge de-

mand in the timber market. The mafias use power chain saw and push cart with motor bike wheels to cut down and skid the logs to the Siang River. There they build a raft that could float down the river. But we do not have enough manpower to control the menace," he explained.

Pasighat Range Forest Officer (RFO) Jumgo Geyi said the depart-ment had been trying their best to stop illegal felling in the area, not-withstanding the adverse weather



conditions during the monsoons

"On several occasions, we have arrested people involved in illegal timber operations, but all of them got their bail pretty easily. I have even engaged a local youth, paying him Rs 3000 from my pocket, to keep vigil on such activities," Geyi

Around ninety per cent of staff under Pasighat forest division is women. They keep a tab on the check gates and nursery or engage themselves in administra-tive works. Only a few officials are tasked with patrolling duties, he

"Arunachal lacks its own Forest Act and for tackling such activities, the state still goes by the forest laws of Assam," Geyi added.

Illegal timber operations are also rampant at Mebo reserve for-est in the district, Range Forest Officer Obang Tayeng admitted.

The department was short of

manpower and equipment to deal with such activities, he said.

"At times we are not even in a position to bring the seized logs from jungles to our office for auctioning due to lack of vehicles. Also, it takes time to process funds for auctioning under Suspense Work Advance Recovery (SWAR)," Tayeng added.

According to the forest officials, the easy availability of power chain saws in the market needs to be regulated by the state govern-ment to check the felling of trees. Lok Sabha MP from Arunachal

East constituency Ninong Ering said he had had informed Divisional Forest Officer (DFO) Tabang Jamoh and East Siang SP Pranav Tayal about the illegal logging operations, but not much was done

'No initiatives were taken to stop the illegal activities during the monsoons," Ering added.

Slain scribe's phone recovered from arrested TSR commandant

AGARTALA, Nov 24 (PTI): The mobile phone of slain journalist Sudip Datta Bhaumick has been recovered from the possession of arrested Tripura State Rifles (TSR) commandant Tapan Debbarma, police said today.

Debbarma, who was arrested on Wednesday in connection with the case, had a mobile phone that belonged to the journalist, Superintendent of Po-lice (west) Abhijit Saptarshi told PTI.

Datta Bhaumick, a senior crime reporter of local Bengali newspaper 'Syandan Patrika', was allegedly shot dead on Tuesday inside the headquarters of the 2nd battalion at RK Nagar, 15km from here, when he had gone there to meet Debbarma.

"Sudip was called by TSR 2nd bat-talion commandant Debbarma and shot inside the battalion headquarters. The journalist had written 11 news items about the commandant's misdeeds," Editor of 'Syandan Patrika' Subal Kumar Dey told reporters.

Tripura Journalist Union (TJU) sec-

retary Pranab Sarkar said the Press Council of India (PCI) has taken cognisance on the killing of the journalist.

"PCI Chairman Justice C K Prasad informed me through e-mail that it had suo motu registered a case on the killing of Datta Bhaumick inside the battalion headquarters. After receiving the email, I called him up and requested

for a visit by a PCI team to the state. He assured to do the needful," Sarkar said.

Meanwhile, editors and working journalists yesterday convened a meeting and expressed their deep concern over the safety and security of



journalists in the state. They formed a new platform -- Forum for Protection of Journalist -- to launch a democratic movement here demanding more safe-ty and security for journalists.

"Within two months two journalists have been killed in the state. We have decided to launch regular movements demanding security for journalists. We have also decided to keep in touch with journalists' organisations in Delhi and other parts of the country asking them to raise their voice against the killings," Sarkar told reporters

In September, TV journalist Shanta-nu Bhowmick was killed when he had gone to Mandai in West Tripura district, about 20 km from here, to cover a political event organised by the Indigenous Peoples Front of Tripura (IPFT).

Tomato prices harden, hit Rs 80 per kg in Delhi

New Delhi, Nov 24 (PTI): Tomato prices in retail markets of the national capital soared to Rs 80 per kg today in view of tight supplies, trade data showed.

The key kitchen staple has become equally dearer in other parts of the country.

For instance, tomato

prices in Bengaluru, one of the major producers, are ruling at Rs 45-50 per kg in retail markets. In Aizawl in Mizoram, these are being sold at around

Rs 95-100 per kg.

"The availability of tomato is less at present because the crop has been hit badly due to recent rains in Karnataka and Madhya Pradesh," said Ashok Kaushik, President of Tomato Merchant Association at

Azadpur mandi. Traders could not source it from Madhya Pradesh as 90 per cent of the crop in the state too got damaged. Farmers have sown again and that crop will arrive in the next 15-20 days, he said.

At Azadpur mandi, Asia's largest wholesale market for fruits and vegetables, tomato is being sold at Rs 40-50 kg.

The same tomato is being retailed at a higher

Tomatoes in Delhi retail markets are selling at Rs 70-80 per kg, depending on the quality and locality, whereas it was available at Rs 30-35 in the year-ago period.

According to Kaushik,

tomato supplies in the national capital are less by 25 per cent at present. On an average, 225-

250 tonnes of tomato are traded in six major mandis in Delhi on a daily basis. Now, 170-180 tonnes are being traded. Some quantities are being sourced from Uttara-khand and Chhattisgarh, he added.

North Koreans wash up in Japan: official

Токуо, Nov 24 (AFP): A group of eight fishermen claiming to be from North Korea washed up in northern Japan after drifting there when their wooden vessel devel-oped problems, authorities said today.

Television footage from a pier in the city of Yurihonjo on Japan's northwestern showed a wooden boat rigged with bare light bulbs, used to attract fish and squid.

"We understand that eight individuals are reporting that they came from North Korea for fishing, but drifted there after their ship experienced (mechanical) troubles," said Hachiro Okonogi, chairman of the National Public Safety Commission.

Local police told AFP they were alerted about the group early today and took them into cus tody. The men were able to walk unaided, according to national broadcaster NHK.

Sometimes their occupants have already died at sea, with their vessels delivering headless skeletons and rotten corpses to Japan's fishing ports, with media occasionally calling them

Mnangagwa sworn in as Zimbabwe president

Emmerson Mnangagwa was sworn in as Zimbabwe's president today, marking the final chapter of a political drama that toppled his predecessor Robert Mugabe after a military takeover.

Mnangagwa, until recently one of Mugabe's closest allies, took the oath of office at the national sports stadium on the outskirts of Harare before thousands of supporters, dignitaries and foreign diplo-

Snipers took up positions around the stadium amid tight security as jubi-lant Mnangagwa supporters streamed in, many dancing as music played.

The man known as "The Crocodile" wore a dark suit, red tie and matching hand-kerchief, and a row of medals

Mnangagwa also "assured him and his family maximum security and welfare" for their future as private citizens, the state-run Herald news site

also reported. Presidential spokesman George Charamba confirmed to AFP that Mugabe would not

attend.

Buses brought well-wishers to the 60,000-capacity stadium from the early hours

Leader of the main opposition Movement for Democrat-ic Change Morgan Tsvangirai received rapturous applause as he arrived at the packed stadium for the swearing-in.

Saeed gives Friday sermon after release from house arrest

LAHORE, NOV 24 (PTI): Hours after his release from house arrest, Mumbai attack mastermind and Jamaat-ud-Dawah chief Hafiz Saeed gave an hourlong Friday sermon at the JuD headquarters here, accusing the Pakistan government of taking "dictation from foreign masters" to appease India.

A large number of IuD activists had gathered at the Jamia Masjid Al-Qadsia at Chauburji here.

After Friday prayers, the charged workers greeted Saeed on his release and renewed their pledge for "Kashmir Jihad".



Saeed in his speech also tareted the Pakistani government for "taking dictation from foreign masters" and spoke of "Indian atrocities" in Kashmir.

He told his supporters the "reasons" hehind his 10-month detention, and also as to why Nawaz Sharif was ousted as prime minister.

"Ousted prime minister Nawaz Sharif has been punished for for-saking Kashmiris. Sharif is ousted from the prime minister house be-cause he committed treason with Kashmiris. He wanted friendship with India and completely ignored the Kashmir cause," he said and warned the PML-N government not to bow before the international community for loans.

"The rulers must not take dictation from the US and other countries and take its own decisions," he said.

Saeed walked from house arrest as a free man in the early hours of today after the Pakistan government decided against detaining him further in any case.

He had been under detention since January this year.

The JuD head, who carries a bounty of USD 10 million announced by the US for his role in terror activities, reiterated that he was detained for raising his voice for the Kashmiri people.

He said Pakistan should not hold peace dialogue with India till it withdraws its army from Kashmir.

13 Myanmar passengers killed in Thai van crash: police

BANGKOK, Nov 24 (AFP): Thirteen Burmese people were killed today when their van collided with a truck in central Thailand and burst into flames, police said, the latest gruesome ac-cident on the kingdom's notoriously dangerous

The van was travelling from the border town of Mae Sot, a common entry point for Myanmar migrant workers, to Bangkok when it crashed into the 10-wheeler in Singburi province early this morning, said a local police officer.

"Authorities are still identifying (the victims) as their bodies were heavily burned," the officer said, adding that the Thai driver was also killed in the accident. Thailand's roads are

ne of the most lethal in the region.

Around 24 000 people die on the kingdom's roads each year, a figure well above the relatively prosperous country's neighbours, according to data from the World Health Organisation.

While more than half of accidents involve motorcycles, bicycles and pedestrians, bus crashes involving migrant work-ers and other travellers are also common.

Earlier this month four Japanese tourists and their Thai guide were killed in Ayutthaya province when their van crashed into a truck and was engulfed by flames, leaving no survivors.

Nepal closes border with China, India ahead of Nov 26 polls

Nepal today closed its border with India and China as it gears up for the historic round of provincial and parliamentary polls, eleven years after the country began its journey toward democracy, that many hope will bring much-needed political stability to the Himalayan nation.

Land-locked Nepal is holding provincial and parliamentary elections in two phases on November 26 and December 7.

The elections are being seen as the final step in Nepal's transition to a federal democ-racy following a decade-long civil war till 2006 that claimed more than 16,000 lives

More than 300,000 members of the security forces will be deployed for the two-stage election, with northern provinces voting on Sunday and southern areas and Kathmandu going to the polls on De-

Results are expected a few days after the second vote.

While many hope Nepal's first state elections will hasten regional development, others fear they will spark a fresh wave of violence.

In 2015, when Nepal adopted a new Constitution that



split it into seven states, dozens of people were killed in ethnic clashes over territory

'We created the Constitution after years of struggle, but that is not enough," said Nabindra Rai Joshi, a senior leader of the Nepali Congress, the country's largest political party.

"The most important part is implementation. This election will launch the provincial administration that will turn our achievements into reality."

Following the adoption of the new Constitution in 2015, the ethnic Madhesi group, mostly of Indian-origin, protested for months, saying they were not getting enough territory in one of the states and were also facing discrimination.

Violent clashes not only left ore than 50 people dead, but also left the country with severe shortages of fuel and medicine because protesters blocked the borders with India.

The protesters finally agreed to the elections after some amendments were made to the constitution.

According to officials, the

crossing points with India will be sealed from today till the evening of Sunday.

Nepal-China border crossing at Rasuwagadhi and Kimathan-ka have been closed for 72 hours from midnight, ahead of the first phase of elections scheduled for

According to Rasuwa Chief District Officer Chomendra Neupane, the move is in line with the mandatory requirement to seal international bor-ders ahead of the elections. The borders will remain shut till Sunday midnight.

with the Election Commission. said there have been some incidents where candidates and their supporters have been attacked during the campaign. He said the federal government and security forces have a plan to ensure voting remains peaceful, The Himalayan

Times reported.

The Election Commission has said no political party, candidates, party office bearers, independents, civil society, voters and mass media can be involved in publicity for the polls.

The EC has urged the media

not to violate the election code of conduct during the silence period as that would influence voters of the first-phase polls even though campaigns for the second phase vote scheduled for December 7 continue in the

naining 45 districts.
In the first phase, 3,191,945 voters are eligible to caste their ballot from 4,465 polling centres. As many as 702 candidates--including (266 male and 16 female) for federal parliament and 420 (400 male and 20 female) for the provincial assemblies--are contesting for 37 federal and 74 provincial seats, according to election officials.

With stiff competition expected from the UML-Maoist alliance in the polls, the Nepali Congress (NC) and Madhesbased parties are under pres-sure to forge electoral allianc-es across the Madhes districts neighbouring India even at the eleventh hour, according to political observers.

Party insiders said there was mounting pressure from local level leaders and cadres in various districts to work further on the electoral alliance.

Earlier, the NC and the two Madhes-based parties had been engaged in negotiations, but could not forge an elector-

al alliance. Election campaign will end on Friday mid-night, 48 hours

ahead of the polls.

The polls are taking place under a new Constitution passed by lawmakers in September 2015 as part of a peace process that began with the end of a decade-long civil war.
