### Union Cab clears **Fugitive** Economic Offenders Bill

NEW DELHI, MAR 1 (PTI): In a bid to tighten noose around fugitives like diamond merchant Nirav Modi and Vijay Mallya, the Cabinet on Thursday approved the Fugitive Economic Offenders Bill that provides for confiscating all assets

of absconding fraudsters and loan defaulters. The proposed law aims to impound and sell assets of Niray Modi-type escapees with a view to quickly recover dues. The law will apply to defaulters who have an outstanding of Rs 100 crore or more and have escaped from the country.

Finance Minister Arun Jaitley said the Bill, which will be taken to Parliament for approval in the second half of the Budget session begin-ning March 5, defines a fugitive offender as someone against whom a court has issued an ar-rest warrant for a scheduled offence and who leaves or has left India so as to avoid criminal prosecution, or refuses to return to India to face trial.

The new law is different from the Prevention of Money Laundering Act, which also provides for confiscation of assets of economic offenders

Under PMLA profit of crime is confiscated and that too upon conviction. The new law extends to all assets ir-respective of whether it is acquired as a result of crime or not, he said "This is triggered by the

Satyarthi said that the gov-ernment needed to spend more funds on the safety of children and the participation of the corporate sector was also required.


He lauded the efforts of local Member of Parliament B Vinod Kumar who had introduced a private member bill demanding protection of rights of orphans.

#### Ambition in Women Don't support that, and everything else is just tokenism

 $F^{\mathrm{unds}}$  permitting, expect some awareness programmes, messages, maybe even some seminars or workshops and some more tokenism at the national and state level to mark International Women's Day on 08 March. Do not, however, expect the larger issues to be addressed or even "noticed" in the drum-roll of unbridled male chauvinism which continues to drown out all matters of significance. Expect promises of protection and care, those traditional umbrellas offered to keep women in their place and hobble them from, for want of a better term, reaching their potential. And that is how this will remain because unless the society accepts ambition in women as a normal progression of initiatives like the "beti padhao" undertaking, everything will remain superficial lip-service. The relegation of women as second-class citizens with limited access to identity, ownership, and, ves. even ambition, is unfortunate because that is not how things began and there is no reason why they should be allowed to remain so.

Women have had an eventful march through history. At the start of humankind, women were edified and almost all prehistoric legends refer to a Mother God-dess as the Creator, as their God. We find this in Sikkim too with the Lepcha legend of genesis which speaks of Itbu-Debu Rum, the Mother, the great Creator and sustainer who created everything on earth including 'Mu-tanchi-Rong kup,' [the Mother's Loved Ones] - the Lepchas. Power was first worshiped as a Female Force
- Shakti - even before the Hindu pantheon was fleshed out, and women, because they were blessed with the power to give birth, were loved and respected, even feared. But man remained a hunter-gatherer at heart and as civilization grew, he started embodying the idea of god with traits of himself. Soon, everything that could not be understood was given a female form, perhaps because most aspects of womanhood remained inscrutable to men. It followed soon after that whatever mankind could not understand, it applied a negative female force to. Soon, the woman started getting seen as the corruptor.

This image sustained itself through centuries and at a subconscious level, continues to influence many minds, especially when even the slightest hint of ambition or even self-preservation creeps in. If we were to look at even the modern Sikkimese history, women have been painted in very poor light. Take for example, Pende Ongmu, the half-sister of the third Chogyal of Sikkim, Chagdor Namgyal, who, history tells us, schemed his assassination. While aspirations for the throne would have been more acceptable in a man, in Pende Ongmu's case, she was reviled as the reincarnation of a wicked queen of Tibet because she desired power. More recently, two important figures, Hope Cooke and Elisa-Maria Langford [wife of the first Chief Minister of Sikkim, LD Kazi], have been portrayed in less than favourable light by successive writers. Few have even bothered to give credit where it was due. Hope Cooke for example tried to modernise education in Sikkim and reinforce Chogyal Palden Thondup Namgyal's plans to give the Sikkimese a stronger Sikkimeseness. It was her conviction to motivate Sikkim to celebrate its uniqueness that made India suspicious and her growing prominence must have made some in Sikkim insecure as well. Similarly, Kazini was an important support to LD Kazi's fight for democracy. Neither story ended too well, and both have been victims of male prejudice.

It is this prejudice that occasions like the International Women's Day should strive to eradicate. It has had but limited success and more often than not, ended up celebrating stereotypes instead. This, despite the fact that women are not demanding much. They do not want to be returned to their original position of reverence. All they ask for is an equal standing, but even that is proving difficult. The problem is not with the people at the work-place alone or men at large, it is the manner in which the role of women has been stereotyped even at home that holds women back when so many of them have also internalized the stereotype. It is this stereotype that needs to be broken. Ambition should not be seen as an unwomanly trait. Then, we would be looking at real change and begin the process real empowerment.

# SummitTIMES International adoptions have dropped 72 percent since 2005 – here's why

When Ethiopia stopped allowing its children to be adopted by foreign parents in January, it became the latest country to eliminate or sharply curtail the practice. In recent decades South Korea, Romania, Guatemala, China, Kazakhstan and Russia – all former leaders in foreign adoption – have also banned or cut back on international custody transfers.

In 2005, almost 46,000 children were adopted across borders, roughly half of them headed to a new life in the United States. By 2015 international adoptions had dropped 72 percent, to 12,000 in total. Just 5,500 of these children ended up in the U.S., with the remainder landing in Italy and Spain.

Today, most children adopted internationally

come from China, Democratic Republic of the Congo and Ukraine. But even China, which has been the top sending country since the late 1990s, has de-

creased its foreign adoptions by 86 percent.

Why are international adoptions imploding? Our recent book, "Saving International Adoption: An Argument from Economics and Personal Experience," explores the rationale – both real and invented – that countries use to explain curtailing foreign adoptions. Here's what we found

#### IT'S IN THE CHILD'S 'BEST INTEREST'

When countries with high rates of international adoptions suddenly put an end to the practice, officials usually cite examples of abuse. The policy change, they say, is in "the best interest of the child."

In 2012, when the Russian parliament voted to ban adoptions by Americans, for example, lawmakers named the new law after 2-year-old Dima Yakovlev, who died in 2008 after being locked in a hot car by his adoptive father.

Ethiopian lawmakers likewise recently invoked the 2012 case of a neglected Ethiopian 13-year-old girl who died of hypothermia and malnutrition in the U.S. to justify their new ban on international

Such events, though high profile, are rare. Of 60.000 adoptees from Russia to the U.S., only 19 have suffered from abuse or neglect in the last 20 years, according to The Christian Science Monitor. That's an abuse rate of about 0.03 percent. In Russia, the rate of child abuse is about 25 times higher.

Such statistics call into question whether "the best interest of the child" is really why countries

# ternational adoptions. POLITICS AND HUMILIATION

Our analysis suggests that politics may more strongly influence many countries' adoption policies.

Russia ended U.S. adoptions two weeks after the 2012 U.S. Magnitsky Act, which imposed sanctions on some allegedly corrupt Russian officials. Asked about the new ban. Putin essentially linked the two

events, saying, "The country will not be humiliated."

Political pressures can also be external. As it sought to join the European Union in the early 2000s, Romania – which in 1990 and 1991 sent more than 10,000 adopted children abroad – halted all international adoptions. The EU's rapporteur for Romanian accession to the union, Baroness Emma Nicholson, was famously opposed to the practice.

We also found that embarrassment can spur countries to halt international adoptions. After bad publicity during the 1988 Seoul Olympics, South

Korea – which had been allowing adoptions to the U.S. since the 1950s – temporarily banned overseas adoption. The remark of sports commentator Bryant Gumbel that the country's "greatest commodity" for export was its children likely helped trigger this policy change.

And after Guatemala imposed a moratorium on foreign adoptions – which dropped from 4,100 in 2008 to 58 in 2010 – a former member of the country's National Adoption Council expressed pride. "Our image as being the number one exporter of children has changed," he said. "Guatemala has dignity" again, he added.

Adoption scandals can also lead countries

to rethink international adoptions. Every major sending country has seen accusations of "child trafficking" because some birth parents were paid to give up their children. There have been rare cases, too, where a child was kidnapped and put up for adoption.

Although infrequent, such incidents bring bad press, and with it pressure from international child welfare organizations like UNICEF and and Save the Children to improve - or shut down - foreign adoptions.

WHO'S IN CHARGE HERE
The Hague Convention on International Adoption was supposed to resolve such problems by making adoption safer and more straightforward. This 1993 global agreement, which 103 countries signed by 2016, creates uniform regulations for

adoptions worldwide.

But rather than encourage foreign adoptions, many experts argue that the convention has contributed to their decline.

Poor countries often struggle to meet The Hague's high international standards, which include ating a central adoption authority, accrediting local agencies and tightening approval procedures

Even after Vietnam ratified the international adoption convention in 2008, the U.S. refused adoptions from the country because the State Department found it fell short of Hague rules. Vietnamese adoptions of special needs children to America reopened in 2016.

Rigorous international regulations have also on agencies, adoptive parents, orphanages and countries. We believe that rising costs - which may have increased up to 18 percent in some countries

- will lead to a decrease in the number of interna-

#### THE HIGH COSTS OF NO ADOPTIONS

Critics will likely welcome the current decline in international adoptions, citing concerns that foreign adoptions remove children from their "birth culture", exploit poor birth mothers and enable illicit

child trafficking.

But our book finds powerful – if uncomfortable arguments in favor of foreign adoptions. When the child of a desperately poor family is taken in by parents from a wealthy country, the material bene-fits to that child are significant.

Children raised in rich countries are far more likely to receive a good education, for example. While the literacy rate in Ethiopia is 50 percent for males and 23 percent for females, 100 percent of people in most high-income countries, such as Canada and Norway, can read.

Our research shows that adoption can even save lives. We examined mortality figures for children under the age of 5 in Ethiopia and Guatemala and found that adoptions to the U.S. likely prevented the deaths of more than 600 children between 2005 and 2011.

Studies also show that the emotional costs borne by children of color being raised by white parents - which often occurs with international adoptions – are less dire than critics believe. Such adoptees do about as well on a wide range of indicators of self-esteem and ethnic identity formation

as their non-adopted siblings.

Foreign adoptions can't solve global poverty. But ending them merely punishes thousands of vulnerable kids and their potential parents worldwide. And that's in nobody's best interest.

# The world needs to build more than two billion new homes over the next 80 years

 $\mathbf{B}^{\mathrm{y}}$  the end of this century, the world's population will have increased by half - that's another 3.6 billion people. According to the UN, the global population is set to reach over 11.2 billion by the year 2100, up from the current population which was estimated at the end of 2017 to be 7.6 billion. And that is considered to be "medium growth".

The upscaling required in terms of infrastructure and development, not to mention the pressure on material resources, is equivalent to supplying seven times the population of the (pre-Brexit) European Union countries, currently 511m. With the global population rising at 45m per year, comes the inevitable rise in demand for food, water and materials, but perhaps most essentially, hous-

#### HOUSING NEEDS ARE CHANGING

Average household sizes vary signifi-cantly between different continents and also by country. According to the UN, recent trends over the last 50 years have also shown declines in household sizes. For example, in France, the average household size fell from 3.1 persons in 1968 to 2.3 in 2011, the same time the coun try's fertility rate fell from  $2.6\ to\ 2.0$ live births per woman. In Kenya, the average household size fell from 5.3 in 2014, in line with a fertility decline

from 8.1 to 4.4 live births per woman.
Increasingly ageing populations, particularly in developed countries, are causing a demographic shift in future care needs, but it also means that people are staying in their own homes for longer, which affects the cycle of existing housing becoming available each year. One of the most marked changes has been the rise in one and two-person households in the UK and other developed

Statistics published by the National Records for Scotland, for example, reveal the influence of these changing demographics, with future household demand rising faster than population growth. By 2037, Scotland's population growth is forecast to be 9%, with growth in the number of households forecast to be 17%. This 8% differ ence is in effect the household growth demand from the existing population.
In England, between now and

2041, the population is expected to increase by 16%, with projected household growth at 23%, resulting in a 7% difference in demand.

As people live longer and one and two-person households increase, the number of future households required rises faster than the population. In 2014, urban issues website CityLab dubbed the situation the 'world's ticking household bomb".

As more developing countries deliver infrastructure and progress similar to developed countries – improving the standard of living and extending life expectancy – household sizes will decrease, placing greater demand on supply of new housing. So if this difference between house-hold demand and population growth occurs globally at around 7-8% over the next 80 years, this will require an additional 800m homes.

Taking average three-person household (1.2 billion homes) coupled with that 8% demographic factor of total global popula-tion over the period results in a need for more than two billion new homes by the end of the 21st centur

#### MEETING THE DEMAND

The current and future demand for new housing is compelling governments to push for further innovations in "offsite" - prefabricated - construction to speed up the supply of new housing. The UK Industrial Strategy published in November 2017 has a strong focus on offsite construction for the future. This sector has grown rapidly over the last decade with new markets in healthcare, education and commercial buildings. But for prefab construction to deliver more houses at a faster rate means looking at alternative solutions to the problem.

Things that slow down the rate

that prefab houses are built include the lengthy preparation time required for sub-structures and foun-dations; delays to the installation of utilities and building services; and a utilities and dulining services, and lack of well-trained construction-site managers capable of delivering the complex logistics involved. With more than 65m people displaced by man-made and natural disasters globally, this puts further pressures on countries unable to supply enough new housing as it is.

The issue of availability of materials to meet the demands of constructing two billion new homes emphasises the need for countries to resource them as efficiently as possible. Government policies which encourage the sustainable design of new buildings to maximise future re-use, reduce carbon emissions and manage resources properly will be essential. Over the next 30 years, the countries which promote policies to help sustain and increase new housing provision will be more likely to avoid problems in sourcing materials and price hikes.

For many countries, housing supply is a now a hot topic for national debate and policy strategy. For the rest of the world it will soon become the most pressing issue facing governments this century.



### PNB fraud: ED attaches Rs 1.217 cr assets of Mehul Choksi group

NEW DELHI, MAR 1 (PTI): The Enforcement Directorate (ED) on Thrusday said it has attached 41 properties, valued at over Rs 1,200 crore, in connection with its mon-ey laundering probe in the PNB scam against Gitanjali Gems and its promoter Mehul Choksi.

The central-probe agency issued a provisional order for attachment under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA).

The attached assets include 15 flats and 17 office premises in Mumbai, a mall in Kolkata, a four-acre farm house in Alibaug and 231 acres of land at locations like Nasik, Nagpur, Panvel and

Villupuram in Tamil Nadu. A 170-acre park in Hyderabad's Ranga Reddy district valued at over Rs 500 crore has also been attached, it

Four flats in Borivali (east) area of the Maharashtra capital and nine others in Khemu Towers in Santacruz (east) have been attached as part of the action.

"The total value of the 41 seized assets controlled by Choksi is estimated at Rs 1,217.2 crore," the ED said. Choksi and designer di-

amond jewellery business-man Nirav Modi and others are being investigated by the ED and other probe agencies after the bank fraud recently came to light, following a complaint by the PNB that they allegedly cheated the nationalised bank to the tune of Rs 12,000 crore, with the purported involvement of a few employees of the bank.

The CBI and the ED have registered two FIRs each to probe the case. Both Choksi and Modi are said to have left the country before criminal cases were lodged against them. They have, however, denied any wrongdoing.

The ED, a central probe agency under the union finance ministry, is investigating if the allegedly defrauded bank funds were laundered and proceeds of crime were sequently used by the accused to create illegal assets

# Disappearing world: West Indies, rivals scramble for 2019

lionaire and self-proclaimed 'Uni-verse Boss' Chris Gayle will rub shoulders with a battalion of teenage leg-spinners and a part-time bat designer when the 2019 World Cup qualifying tournament gets underway Sunday. It's the modern phenomenon of the globalisation of sport, although not in the manner that the likes of Gayle, and his estimated annual income of 7.5 million, would normally recognise.

would normally recognise.

The West Indies, world champions back in 1975 and 1979, were the biggest casualties of the International Cricket Council's controversial decision to shrink next year's World Cup to just 10 nations.

Sixteen teams took part the 2007 edition but just 14 graced the 2011 and 2015 tournaments.

India, the sport's financial powerhouse, played just three games in the 2007 competition, a woeful performance mourned by millions of fans and legions of business executives across the sub-continent.

Now, a differently-formatted 2019 and 2023 World Cup guarantees teams at least nine matches.

However, only the top eight nations were guaranteed places in the 48-game, 47-day marathon in England and Wales next year.
So the West Indies, no longer

in the world's top 10, must rough it with newly-minted Test nations Afghanistan and Ireland as well as



Zimbabwe, Scotland, Hon Kong, Papua New Guinea, the Neth erlands, United Arab Emirates and Nepal in a three-week qualifier from which only two will make the finals.

The ICC has long argued that a trimmed down World Cup with 10 of the best -- only two more than the first edition back in 1975 -- is the sensible way to grow the game But not everyone is convinced.

When the decision was an-nounced three years ago, Sachin Tendulkar called it a "backward step", even suggesting that the finals should feature up to 25 teams.

Interestingly, 2019's other globteam tournament, the Rugby World Cup, will welcome 20 nations to its finals in Japan, from a start-ing base of 16 at its inaugural 1987 showpiece. The 2023 Rugby World Cup, to be staged in France, could see even more.

"To develop rugby we need a strong team in the USA, Russia and China, and emerging countries, to increase the capacity of rugby and to involve more people around the world," argued Claude Atcher, who led France's successful bid.

The 10 teams gathered in Zim

babwe from Sunday until March 25 would envy similar enthusiasm from cricket's leaders.

Far removed from the likes of Gayle will be Scotland skipper Kyle Coetzer, a former English county player, who designs bats to top up his cricket income.



New Delhi, Mar 1 (PTI): A long legal battle is in the offing for senior Congress leader P Chidam-baram and his son Karti Chidambaram as the father-son duo are in the radar of the probe agencies in another case concerning the Aircel-Maxis deal.

While Karti was arrested in connection with the INX Media case in which the CBI has alleged that he was paid USD one mil-lion bribe by the media company through foreign entities, Chid-ambaram's role in granting FIPB approval to a offshore firm in the Aircel-Maxis deal is also under investigation by the agency.

Karti is fighting legal battles

in the Supreme Court, the Madras High Court and the trial court here, while Chidambaram has knocked at the doors of the apex court apprehending "continued harassment" to him and his family members through investigations being conducted by the CBI and Enforcement Directorate (ED) in these two

### Mahatma Gandhi's original letter on Jesus Christ up for sale

WASHINGTON, MAR 1 (PTI): A powerful and emotional letter written by Mahatma Gandhi in 1926, in which he discusses the existence of Jesus Christ, is up for grabs in the US for USD 50 000

6, 1926 written by Gandhi from his Sabarmati Ashram in India.

Typed in faint ink and with a bold, unaffected sig-nature, the letter was part of a private collection for the past several decades and is now being sold by the Pennsylvania-based Raab Collection.

"Jesus was one of the great teachers of mankind," Gandhi wrote in the letter to Christian religious elder in the United States, Milton New berry Frantz.

Nathan Raab, principal at the Raab Collection, described the letter as the embodiment of Gandhi's vision for a world of religions at peace. "His belief in Iesus as a teacher of mankind shows his efforts to find commonality with his fellow man," he said.

"It a powerful, emo tional letter," he said.

What makes this let

ter powerful, Raab said, is Gandhi's stated respect for other religions.

"I think his mes sage of tolerance, of not preaching only his feelings, is as important now as it was back then," he

"This is one of the finest letters on religion that Gandhi ever wrote," the Raab Collection said

in a press statement. "Our research discloses no other letter of Gandhi mentioning Jesus to have ever reached the public market," the historical-document dealer

In the letter, Gandhi, pressed respect for all faiths and beliefs.

"Dear Friend, I have your letter. I am afraid it is not possible for me to subscribe to the creed you have sent me. The subscriber is made to believe that the highest manifestation of the unseen reality was Jesus Christ. In spite of all my efforts. I have not been able to feel the truth of that statement," Gandhi wrote in the letter.

"I have not been able to move beyond the belief that Iesus was one of the great teachers of mankind. Do you not think that religious unity is to be had not by a me chanical subscription to a common creed but by all respecting the creed of each?" he asked.

"In my opinion, difference in creed there must be so long as there are different brains. But who does it matter if all these are hung upon the common thread of love and mutual esteem?" Gandhi wrote in the letter.

# Tusk 'absolutely sure' EU will accept controversial Brexit draft treaty

EU President Donald Tusk said today he was "absolutely sure" the bloc's members would accept a draft treaty for Brexit that has stirred anger in London over its provisions for Northern Ireland.

"I am absolutely sure that all the essential el-ements of the draft will be accepted by all," Tusk told business leaders in Brussels, saying EU states would review the text in the coming week.

British Prime Min-

ister Theresa May angrily rejected the draft unveiled on Wednesday, saying she would never allow the bloc to undermine her country's "con-

stitutional integrity".

She took particular aim at a proposal to keep British-ruled Northern Ireland in a customs union if there is no better solution to avoid a hard border with EU-member Ireland



Tusk said if May didn't like the proposal, she should come up with an alternative.

"Until now, has come up with anything wiser than that (plan)," he said.

"In a few hours I will be asking in London whether the UK govern-ment has a better idea, that would be as effective in preventing a hard border between Ireland and Northern Ireland.

Ireland and the EU have called for any Brexit agreement to avoid a hard border including customs checks, in order to pro-tect the 1998 Good Friday agreement in Northern Ireland, which ended three decades of bloody sectarian violence.

The EU's chief Brexit negotiator Michel Bar-

nier insisted the plan to keep Northern Ireland in the customs union was simply a "fallback" option in case Britain's two preferred options -- hi-tech frictionless border con-trols, or a solution linked to a future EU-UK trade

deal -- both fell through. But Tusk warned that Britain's self-imposed conditions for leaving the EU -- that it must quit the

market -- made "frictionless" trade impossible.

"Everyone must be aware that the UK red lines will also determine the shape of our future relationship," the former

Polish premier said.
"I want to stress one thing clearly. There can be no frictionless trade outside of the customs union and the single market. Friction is an inevitable side effect of

Brexit by nature."

The 120-page draft withdrawal agreement withdrawal agreement puts into legal text the details of a provisional deal sealed in December by May and European Com-mission chief Jean-Claude Juncker, which largely

fudged the Irish question.

As well as Ireland the paper also covers issues including the rights of EU citizens living in Britain and the financial settlement Brit-ain will pay as it leaves the EU. AFP KIS KIS

### China lashes out at US over bill promoting Taiwan ties

BEIJING, MAR 1 (AFP): China lodged an official protest with the United States today, saying it was "strongly dissatis-fied" after the US Senate passed a bill promoting relations with self-governing Taiwan.

The US Senate passed Taiwan Travel Act, intended to encourage visits between the Unit-ed States and Taiwan "at all levels", by unanimous consent on Wednesday, following its approval in the House of Representa-

tives in January.

The bill adds that it should be US policy for high-level Taiwanese of-ficials to enter the United States, meet with US officials and conduct business in the country.

President Donald Trump's signature is now all that is needed for the bill to become law something that is not likely to be an obstacle, given that the bill was passed unanimously.

Washington cut formal diplomatic ties with Taiwan in 1979, recognising the Communist mainland rulers in Bei-jing as the sole govern-

Chinese foreign min istry spokeswoman Hua Chunying said that while some of the new bill's provisions are not legally binding, it "seriously violates" the One China principle.

"China is strongly dissatisfied and firmly opposes it," Hua told a regular news briefing, adding that Beijing had made "solemn representations" to the US -- a diplomatic protest.

The United States, she said, should stop of-ficial exchanges with Taiwan and handle Taiwan issues "prudently and properly" to avoid "damaging Sino-US relations".

Under the terms of the 1979 Taiwan Relations Act, Washington maintains an ambiguous approach to the island, maintaining trade rela-tions and selling Taipei weapons.

Trump sparked pro-test from China shortly after his election in 2016 by accepting a phone call from Taiwan's leader Tsai Ing-wen, an action seen as breaking the protocol of the One China policy.



Turkish attack on the Kurdish enclave of Afrin in northern Syria is likely to have the same devastating outcome as the Syrian army siege of Earstra Ghouta, destroying everything but failing to capture the area, says a senior Syrian Kurdish leader. The official says it was inevitable that Afrin would come under siege, comparing it to Eastern Ghouta where hundreds of thousands of civilians have been left without food or humanitarian aid, adding that Afrin has a single supply line controlled by the Syrian government and the Russians "but they could block the way at any moment". Aldar Khalil, co-chair of the Movement for a Democratic Society, the Syrian-Kurdish dominated organisation that controls 30 per cent of Syria, also predicted that the war in Syria may last "another four years until a new balance of forces becomes clear".

### Blow to Trump as Hope Hicks quits as White House communications chief

WASHINGTON, MAR 1 (PTI): Hope Hicks, one of US President Donald Trump's longest-serving and trusted aides, today announced her resignation as the powerful com-munications director, in a major setback to him and the embattled White House amidst the inquiry into alleged Russian meddling in the 2016

election.
The 29-year-old former model and ex-Trump Organ-isation employee has been by Trump's side for years.



Her resignation came before the House Intelligations related to the Russian interference during the presidential campaign. She during her testi-

mony told the panel that in her job, she had occa-sionally been required to tell white lies but had ever lied about anything connected to the investigation into Russia's interference in the elec-tion, US media reported.

Although Hicks maintained an unusually low profile over the past three vears, she recently attracted scrutiny after Spe-cial Counsel Robert Mueller escalated his probe

into potential collusion between the Trump campaign and Russia.

She is leaving the White House after serving Trump for three years in various capacities. This included being his campaign spokesperson and Director of Strategic Com-munication when Trump was sworn in as the president on January 20, 2017.

"There are no words to adequately express my gratitude to President Trump," Hicks said in a statement

"I wish the President

and his administration the very best as he continues to lead our country," she said. President

praised Hicks for her out-

standing work.
"She is as smart and thoughtful as they come, a truly great person. I will miss having her by my side but when she approached me about pursuing other opportunities, I totally understood. I am sure we will work together again in the future," he said.


