That is the effect of cricket in In-

Diplomatic ties between India and Pakistan currently is scraping rock-bottom. Track two diplomacy is not working either as signs of



both nations drifting further apart become more prominent by the day. Cricket against such a backdrop is the only sanity people of both countries can cling to. June 4 will provide such an opportunity for a change.

For the past few days the coun-

try has been on the boil over the debate whether India should play Pakistan in a bilateral series. The majority opinion and that of the Centre's too has been against the idea in view of the simmering tension along the LoC and the Kashmir

situation, which is believed to be the handiwork of Pakistan.

All these lead to the crucial question that if we are policy wise so against engaging with Pakistan socially, then why keep the diplomatic mission open in that country or why allow Pakistani panelists on Indian television talk shows?

In recent times, a certain section of television news channels have been the most vociferous, almost jingoistic in their approach on the issue, but inviting Pakistani guests on their panels at the same time. Speaking of double standards!

So, cross my heart and hope to die, people of both countries have been thirsting for a cricketing tie and that includes those too who are not cricket enthusiasts in particular. That is how infectious a game of cricket between the two countries is.

Just check around the neighbourhood and you will be amazed to find how much preparation has gone in among the people for the June 4 match. Engagements have been cancelled or rescheduled, special menus thought of and despite not being Diwali, there is a sudden spurt in the sale of firecrackers in sweet anticipation of a win.

The country will now fasten its collective seat belt, clear its throat to yell and cheer every time a Pakistani wicket falls or an Indian batsman sends the ball out of the boundary and the youth will make wild dashes riding two-wheelers in the middle of the night after the game on June 4, provided we win.

Just one word of caution – watch the game, enjoy, but do not let your guard down. For with Pakistan you never know.

Survival Sikkimese Party called on Governor Shriniwas Patil at Rai Bhavan on 01 June, a par-ty press release informs, and submitted a "distress petition" regarding what they see as "misrepre-sentation" of the Bhutia, Lepcha and Sangha (BLS) communities in the State ever since the merger.

A press release issued by SSP president, KL Kaleon, alleges that the BLS community is not repre-sented "lawfully" either in the Legislative Assembly or the Parliament of

India. In the petition, the rty has termed the party Home Ministry's recent endorsement of the state government's proposal to expand the number of seats in the State Legis-lative Assembly from 32 to 40 and reservation of 05 seats for the Limboo-Tamang communities as "naked violence and invasion on the sov-ereign rights of the Bhutia, Lepcha and Sangha communities over their motherland."

SSP has further alleged in the petition that this reveals the "failures" of both the State and Centre in their respective

"Our friends want BLS reservation including the Article 371F of the constitution to go. We welcome it. It was indeed a mill stone hung around our neck for preventing us from demanding freedom from the colonial voke," contends the SSP president in the release.

The party has extended gratitude to the Governor for listening to their grievances and expressed hope that the needful is done in the coming days.

India continues to record high child mortality rate due to diarrhoea'

London, Jun 2 (PTI): India continues to record one of the world's high est rate of child mortali ty due to diarrhoea with more than 100.000 under-five deaths reported on account of it in 2015,

a new study has found.

The highest rates of under-five mortality due to diarrhoea were in sub-Saharan Africa and South Asia, with India and Nigeria combined registering 42 per cent of the 499,000 global under-five deaths due to di-arrhoea in 2015, according to medical journal

"Diarrheal diseases disproportionately affect young children," said lead author Dr Ali Mokdad, of the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation (IHME) at the University of Washington.

"Despite some promising reductions in morthe devastating impact of these diseases cannot be overlooked.

Immediate and sus-tained actions must be taken to help low- income countries address this problem by increasing healthcare access and the use of oral rehydra-tion solutions," he noted.

Globally, diarrhoea is the fourth biggest killer of children under the age of five, while India is its

third biggest victim.

According to the analvsis by US researchers. about half of the all under-five deaths occur in only five countries India, Nigeria, Pakistan, Dem-ocratic Republic of the Congo and China.

Over 100,000 deaths under-fiver-year-old children have been reported due to diarrhoea in 2015.

The report also found that mortality from diar-rhoeal disease is dropping faster in India com-

pared to globally.

While overall diarrhoea deaths in children under the age of five dropped by 34.3 per cent globally between 2005 and 2015, in India the rate of reduction was at

43.2 per cent.

The number of under-five deaths in India declined from 3.33 million in 1990 to 1.34 million in 2013.

The number of un-der-five deaths worldwide has declined from 12.7 million in 1990 to 6.3 million in 2013, the study based on data from the 'Global Bur-den of Disease Study 2015' found.However, 2015' found.However, diarrhoea is still the fourth-biggest killer of children globally, with almost 500,000 a year dying before their fifth

an interview

DINESH KUMAR CHETTRI from Soreng Senior Secondary School and DECHENLA KAZI from Tashi Namgyal Academy, both students of Humanities.

So how are you guys reacting to the sudden fame and recognition?

DINESH- I was honestly not expecting these marks, I knew that I had given my best and so I would've been happy with anything. The fact that my results were a cause of happiness to so many such as my teach-ers and my family is what truly made me happy. But I also believe that marks do not define a person because I know many of my friends who didn't score high marks but are great at various other things and that's why I don't give much importance to marks.

DECHENLA- More than the fame, the kind of respect that I am getting is amazing. I have earned respect not only for myself but for my parents too and what more can a child ask for right? At the same time, I am not letting this fame get over my head and I am trying to remain grounded.

What is the one thing you've learnt during this process of preparing for your examinations? Something that you would carry with yourself forever.

DINESH- The most im-

portant thing that I've learnt would be that nothing comes free of cost, hard work is necessary. I was sincere and dedicated towards mv work. Mv biggest strength was that I didn't pressurize myself and worked according to my capabilities. An exam-ple of this is that I never set an alarm and simply woke up whenever my body allowed. **DECHENLA-** What I've

learnt is that it's not about whether you are

and determined to never give up. I know studying is one of the most diffi-cult things in life but at the same time it's totally worth it. Don't take yourself for granted, your hard work can do mira-

Every student has a different reason for studying and working hard, what was your motivating factor?

DECHENLA- I just be lieved in myself and I knew that if I would put in effort like I'd never done before, I would be rewarded.

DINESH- My motivation was a combination of many factors, first of all my school has a very reputation in the sense that we've always had a history of pro-ducing good results. So, all my teachers and seniors had faith in me. My brother was one of my biggest sources of motivation. He studied science but still encouraged me to follow my heart and I knew that I had to prove to everyone that a student studying Humanities too had a great future ahead of them.

There must be so many distractions out there and vou might have also faced certain influences from your peer groups. How did vou keep vourself focused under these

DECHENLA-Honestly speaking, I don't get distracted easily and I think that is one of my strengths. About the in-fluences from my peer group, they were always a positive influence as they would tell me which teachers were good from their coaching classes

DINESH- My answer to this question would be that at the end of the day, we need to have self control in order to not be influenced by what others are doing. I follow a very simple principle which can be explained with the help of an example. When a ship is in the ocean, the ship keeps floating on its own even with all the water surrounding it but once even a small amount of water gets into the ship, it's almost impossible to prevent the ship from sinking. I've always imagined myself as the ship and have made sure that I don't allow the water to get in.

Did you face any shortcomings while preparing for these exams? something you wished your school should offer, some change that would benefit all students? DINESH- I didn't face any



shortcomings while pre-paring for the exams as such. My teachers were extremely supportive and helpful but on the whole I think students in my school would benefit if there were discussions regarding various world events and debates, etc. We do get newspapers ents and debates, etc. and have a wonderful li-brary but a more active participation will help all

DECHENLA- While studying there was no such shortcomings but now after looking at the prospectus of different colleges and understand-ing the kind of courses

they offer, I wish TNA offered Humanities students both economics and mathematics. In school, we have to choose between these two sub-jects. Personally if I had the choice I wouldn't mind taking both.

Would you like to say anything about the intense competition that students today face? Do you find it discouraging or encouraging?

DECHENLA- The competition is not discouraging at all. I always try to use the intense competition around me positively. Just a few days back after the CBSE results, I was thinking if the all India topper can score 99.6% so can everyone else, because god made us all right? I am always trying to find ways to push my-

self harder. **DINESH-** I think compe tition is necessary but the need to compete with others is not. I believe in competing with the person I was yesterday. I give my 100% but I am not bothered about the results, what matters most is self satisfaction.

You are both Human-

ities students and there exists a well established bias against this stream. Was everybody supportive of your choice? And would vou want to change the way people think about it? Cleaning Up, the Singapore Way

And no, we don't mean cleaning of the Swachh Bharat kind

 $S_{\rm ikkim}$ often invokes Singapore when it speaks of its aspirations and plans. The country is taken as a role model more for emulating the "litter and spit free" environs or to underline the growth made possible by stable and unchanged government. May be Sikkim should also look towards Singapore to inspire a cleanliness drive against corruption. Of course, the other comparison that Sikkim draws - with Switzerland - would also work, because where Singapore is the only country from Asia in the top-10 least corrupt nations (it ranks 7th), Switzerland figures two rungs higher at 5 on the same list. Would not be a bad idea for Sikkim to link similarities with these two countries beyond sharing same first letter. But let's stick to Singapore for today.

Yes, corruption is a shared problem between India and Singapore and was also of the same colonial carryover kind of the privileged few and the omni-present government. The latter, however, managed to sweep it away after first accepting that wherever there was development underway, the attendant demand of professionals and the importance of projects, fostered corruption. In a recent conversation with some officials from Singapore, some interesting tidbits were collected about how their country combated this dishonest mode of profiteering. This Singaporean lesson is worthy of duplication here.

The Singapore government effectively cleaned up a corrupt developing society in a very short time through three clear strategies, we are told. These, broadly, were a "strong-arm theory", a "strong-men theory", and a "strong-wage theory". The format has obviously worked for Singapore and Sikkim could do well to borrow another of its tried system and replicate it here. The strong-arm theory included strict laws and efficient anticorruption agencies. These are already in place in Sikkim as they are elsewhere in the country, although the actual enforcement is far from satisfactory in many cases. The investigations are tacky, hence convictions are few and the penalties rarely deterrent enough. The strong men theory is interpreted as an unwavering political will from the top leadership. No matter what we might believe about smart bureaucrats corrupting naive politicians, if the public representatives put their foot down and demand transparency and fix accountability, corruption will start faltering. The next step beyond those forced by groundswells of public opinion need to be taken as well. For instance, the requirement to file property returns while filing nomination papers during elections is welcome, but now, there should have been an independent body of auditors to check whether what is disclosed is a true reflection of assets. The strong wage theory is high wages for the top leadership. This, on the understanding that corruption at high levels is far more difficult to deal with than petty corruption because the former is better connected and more deeply entrenched. Paying them well is an incentive to remain clean. For instance, the Singapore Prime Minister, even after a pay-cut taken some years back, earns more than the U.S. President, the Chancellor of Germany, and the British Prime Minister put together! Little reason left for him to be corrupt then.

Sikkim has already tried out this last trick and has among the better paid officials in the country. Sikkim has already tried out one of the other two options as well, but when will it find the political will to get serious about containing the problem? Of course, these options don't work in isolation, they have to come together. If they do, they can't possibly fail. Will Sikkim be interested?

Of late, there has been another option that desperate people have resorted to; the options which have given us Kejriwal in Delhi, and also, even though they hail from completely different ideologies, Modi in India to a large extent, Trump in the US and Duterte in the Philippines. It is now universally accepted that the interplay of corruption and inequality feeds populism, a populism of a very dangerous kind. When traditional politicians fail to tackle corruption, people will grow cynical and seek out options from the opposite end of the spectrum. People around the world, especially in ill-informed or desperately unequal societies, have been turning to wildly populist and alt-Right leaders who promise to break the cycle of corruption and privilege, win them pride and secure them their place in world. Unfortunately, they almost never deliver. What they end up doing is exacerbating the already vexed situations

Will the Paris Agreement still be able to deliver after the US withdrawal?

In the short term, the United States' withdrawal from the Paris Agreement will certainly have ripple effects globally. But rather than fatally undermine the Paris Agreement, it will likely cause other countries to reaffirm their firm commitment to the full implementation of the climate

We are already seeing this effect in the forthcoming accord between the EU and China on climate and energy, focused on increasing ambition in the Paris Agreement.

In the White House Rose Garden,

US President Donald Trump said he wanted to start to renegotiate to see "if there's a better deal".

"If we can, great. If we can't, that's fine," he added.

LESSONS NOT LEARNT FROM THE KYOTO PROTOCOL

Given the location of today's an nouncement, some might be tempted to draw an analogy with the Kyoto Protocol, which President George W. Bush famously repudiated in the White House Rose Garden, following pressure from fossil-fuel interests, notably Exxon.

The lessons from this analogy do not flatter the United States. Although the Kyoto Protocol did not meet its full potential as a consequence of US non-participation, countries that engaged actively in its implementation not only succeeded in achieving the emission-reduction targets they set for themselves, but are much better positioned now to take advantage of the necessary transition to a low-car-

As a result of the Kyoto engage ment, the European Union's legislative climate policy framework is now the most comprehensive and far-reaching in the world. The EU now has all the tools needed to deliver the greater ambition that will be

Learning from the Kyoto experience, China, Korea, Mexico, Chile and other developing countries are now putting in place emissions-trad-ing systems that will generate the cost-effective emission reductions of

By choosing the Rose Garden for this second announcement, the Trump White House is only under scoring that the lessons from past mistakes may not have not been

earnt. THE US COULD BE LEFT BEHIND

The world of 2017 is a very different place from what it was in 2001. Back in 1997, when the Kyoto Protocol was adopted, the US accounted for 19% of global Greenhouse Gas (GHG) emissions and 20% of the world economy (measured in GDP MER) whereas China accounted for only 12% and 7% respectively. By 2015, when the Paris Agreement was adopted, China had grown to become the largest emitter (23%) and the largest economy (17%), with the USA accounting for a proportionately lower share of global emissions (13%), and a smaller share

of the world economy (16%).

India, a rising power of the 21st century, had nearly doubled its relative economic weight over this period (from 4% to 7% of the world economy). Both China and India are now seizing the future, working to bend their emissions pathways while growing their economies and creatng thousands of green jobs through massive investments in renewable energy and plans to move towards electric vehicles by the end of the next decade.

Leadership and economic growth is now finding a new center of gravity one in which the US risks being left further and further behind.

The scientific understanding of climate change and its effects on natural systems, human societies and economies has also progressed immensely since 1997 and engaged much larger communities including regions, cities and businesses.

Climate change is emerging as a geopolitical issue alongside more traditional geopolitical concerns and, depending on how a country deals with its role and the problem, its geopolitical standing is affected. China has begun to move into the space, tentatively, but nevertheless with effect.

In other words, the US is less important and less fundamental than it used to be in the sphere of climate policy action.

However, in some places, it may empower climate-change delialists to call for a slowdown on action, or even to support the deployment of so-called "clean coal".

But, such risks appear limited at this stage. Russia, for example, has yet to ratify the Paris Agreement, but has recently signalled that it will continue to support the implementation of the Agreement.

Public opinion in many parts of the world may also be invigorated in favour of strong climate action, as a positive effect of the much-elevated attention for climate change as a global problem in the press and social media.

EMPLOYMENT IN THE RE NEWABLE ENERGY IN-

DUSTRY IS GROWING
US emissions have been declining since 2015. Trump's Executive Order aimed at rescinding US domes-tic measures will result in flatlining emissions at around present levels

for the next 5 to 10 years.

Because of the decline in renew able energy and battery-storage prices, natural gas displacing coal, as well as ongoing actions in states such as California implementing the Obamaera Clean Power Plan, methane con-trols and motor vehicle standards, it seems unlikely that US emissions

ould increase again before 2030.

It is also clear that Trump's promises to the coal-industry workforce cannot be met. Coal use and mining is projected to continue declining because of changes in the energy mar-kets, including lower natural-gas pric-es and overwhelming competition on price from renewables and storage.

On the other hand, employment in the renewable-energy industry is growing rapidly in the United States (and around the world), and far exceeds that in coal mining.

The latest review by the Inter-tional Renewable Energy Agency (IRENA) shows rapid growth of employment in the US renewable energy sector, now employing approximately 800.000 people.

The increase in employment in solar energy alone over the past three years is more than twice the total number of jobs in the coal mining industry in the United States (which are declining). This remarkable development contains a lesson and a guide for the future: maintaining the growth of job opportunities requires a continued rollout and expansion of renewable energy. If this does not $happen, job\ opportunities\ will\ be\ lost.$

A GOAL MORE DIFFICULT TO MEET BUT MORE UNITY

President Trump's withdrawal from the Paris Agreement, combined with the repeal of domestic actions re-sulting in halting the decline in US emissions, will likely make it more difficult and costly overall to meet the Paris Agreement temperature goal of holding warming well below 2°C, and limiting it to 1.5°C.

If sustained, the additional US

emissions, above the levels that would have occurred with the full implementation of the Obama-era package of climate policies, could add an additional warming of about to 0.1 to 0.2°C by 2100. This will need to be compensated by larger and faster reductions by others than would otherwise be necessary.

In the longer term, the Paris Agreement temperature goals are likely not be able to be met unless the US rejoins global efforts within the next five to ten; years, so that globally aggregated CO₂ emissions can be re-

duced to zero by around mid-century.

Working against the fossil fuel driven Trump agenda are profound market developments in renewable energy and battery storage, affecting demand for coal-fired power along with the oil demand depressing ef-fects of the ramping up of electric vehicle production.

The effects of rapidly reducing prices of renewable energy technology and battery storage are far-reaching and some argue, may be unstop-pable. Recent industry assessments show that the levelized cost of electricity from many renewable technologies is now lower than gas or coal in the USA. Last week in Arizona, for example, solar and battery storage beat gas power on price for peaking electricity, possibly for the first time anywhere. More broadly, the ongoing cancellation of planned coal-power plants in India, China, Japan, South Korea, Taiwan and other places is indicative of the market transformation that is beginning.
This dynamic of reducing renew-

able energy and storage technology prices driving displacement of fossil-fuel power sources will play a very large role in determining the ultimate positive or negative fallout of US withdrawal from the Paris Agreement and the negociations that Trump seems to want to impose.

In reaction to the uncertainty about US intentions, the EU and China are coming closer together on climate and energy, united around the imple-

mentation of the Paris Agreement.

Many more countries are also be ginning to realise the great risks and costs that climate change will bring unless global warming is limited. In Marrakech, over forty-five countries belonging to the Climate Vulnerable Forum committed to 100% renewable energy goals and are beginning to work on how to achieve this

RISKS AND NEGOTIATIONS AHEAD

Nevertheless, there will be countries, political parties, and fossil-fuel interests that will attempt to use US with-drawal to advance a climate-denialist agenda, or at the least seek ways to defend the market dominance of fossil-fuel industries.

It can be expected that a US withdrawal may lead a number of countries to lag in ramping up their climate pledges (NDCs or Nationally Determined Contributions) under the Paris Agreement or go slow on implementing policies.

Another risk that will be exacer-bated by the US withdrawal relates to the large global pipeline of coal-plant proposals, which – if built and oper-ated – would curtail any chance of holding warming well below 2°C and

limiting to 1.5°C.

Coal is projected to grow rapidly in India, Southeast Asia, Turkey, parts of the Middle East and Africa. It will take concerted diplomatic leadership, as well as courageous domestic action to ensure that this does not come about. Such a task would be difficult even with the US in the Agreement, but a US withdrawal has made it a little harder.

One of the questions now is to know if the US president can find a way to engage any new negotiations.

The longer the US remains idle the harder it will be for all of us. So what are the prospects of the US re-

joining the agreement?

Looking beyond the next 3 to 4 years, rising levels of public concern and anxiety over climate change, the accelerating employment from the renewable-energy industry give

grounds for optimism.

If Trump doesn't come back to the Agreement, we will have to wait 2020 to see what happens. A new president coud seek to reenter the climate deal quickly to catch up with the market leaders, likely China, the EU and In-dia, and to recover its political, technological and economic leadership that will be squandered by the with-drawal from the Paris Agreement.

With this outlook in mind and with California taking a strong lead, many states, municipalities, companies and civic society are expected to move ahead with climate action over the next few years, and if successful the US may well be in a position to catch up quickly once the Trump period passes.

EVM challenge on as scheduled tomorrow: EC

NEW DELHI, JUN 2 (PTI): The Election Commission tonight said its much-hyped EVM challenge is "on" as scheduled tomorrow after the Uttarakhand High Court rejected a plea questioning the constitutionality of

"The EVM challenge is on as scheduled. The NCP and the CPI-M have nominated three persons each for the challenge," a Commission spokesperson said.

He said the two parties will get separate halls to try and tamper with the machines. The challenge will take place between 10 am and 2 pm.
The challenge was organised after

several major opposition parties had

claimed that the faith of people in the machines has eroded.

The BSP and the AAP had alleged

that the machines used in the recent assembly elections were tampered with and favoured the BJP. Later, several other parties had joined the chorus and wanted the EC to revert to paper ballots.

The Commission has pulled out from its strong rooms in Uttar Pradesh, Punjab and Uttarakhand 14 electronic voting machines used in the recent assembly polls there for the challenge.

The NCP and the CPI-M were the only parties which had applied to participate in the challenge. The poll panel

had invited the seven national and 49 state parties recognised by it for the challenge. It had left out smaller parties and Independents who had contest-ed the recent polls from participating. Even foreign experts are barred.

Since the two parties had not given their preference for the EVMs they would like to tamper with during the challenge, the Commission has brought to Delhi 14 machines -- from Ghaziabad and Gautam Buddha Nagar in UP, Patiala and Bhatinda from Punjab and Dehradun from Uttarakhand

While each participating party can use a maximum of four EVMs for the challenge, sources in the commission said extra machines were also kept as back up keeping in mind any eventuality.

The challengers will get four

hours each to tamper with the ma chines. The challenge will begin at 10 am and end at 2 pm.

Members of a technical commitwhich helps the EC evaluate the EVMs would judge the proceedings.

Announcing the contours of the 'EVM challenge', the EC had said it has been divided into two parts. First, the parties will have to prove that the EVMs used in the assembly elections in the five states were tampered with to favour a particular candidate or political party by altering the results stored in them.

118 held for communal clashes in Bhopal

"We have arrested

US quits Paris climate deal cribbing about benefits only for countries like India and China

WASHINGTON, JUN 2 (PTI): President Donald Trump today declared that the US will withdraw from the 2015 Paris climate accord, saying the "draconian" deal unfairly pun-ished America but benefited countries like India and China, drawing strong condemnation from across

"I was elected to represent the citizens of Pittsburgh, not Paris," Trump said, immediately triggering global condemnation on the move by the world's second-big-gest emitter of greenhouse gasses.

"We're getting out," he said.
"And we will start to renegotiate and we'll see if there's a better deal. If we can, great. If we can't, that's fine."

The Paris agreement com-

mits the IIS and other countries to keeping rising global tempera-tures "well below" 2C above preindustrial levels and "endeavour to limit" them even more, to 1.5C. Only Syria and Nicaragua did not sign up to the deal.

He said India would get billions

of dollars for meeting its commitment under the Paris agreement and it - along with China - would double its coal-fired power plants in the years to come, gaining a fi-nancial advantage over the US.

He then citied the example

of China and said that under the agreement, the Communist giant will be able to increase these emis sions by a staggering number of vears - 13.

Trump's decision drew wide-spread condemnation from entrepreneurs, politicians, world leaders and environmentalist for abandoning the single most important international effort to curb global warming.

The Paris Climate Agreement

is a historic treaty signed by over 190 nations and cannot be rene-gotiated on the request of a sin-gle nation, the United Nations's Framework Convention on Climate Change has said.

The UNECCC under which the landmark Paris agreement was negotiated and adopted, said it "regrets" the announcement by President Trump that his government will withdraw from the agreement

The leaders of France, Italy and Germany indicated in a joint statement that the US could not unilaterally renegotiate the agreement.

French President Emmanuel

Macron said Trump had made a historic error by abandoning the Paris agreement.

Trump has "committed an er-

ror for the interests of his country and a mistake for the future of our planet," Macron said, adding: "The

United States has turned its back on the world."

German Chancellor Angela Merkel today vowed "more deci-sive action than ever" to protect the climate after the US pullout from the landmark Paris accord.

"We in Germany, in Europe and the world will band together to take more decisive action than ever to confront and successfully surmount major challenges to humanity such as climate change, she told reporters.

Former US President Barack Obama and other political leaders today slammed Trump's decision to withdraw the US from the historic deal, saying he has squandered America's global leadership and put the country with "a small handful of nations that reject the future."

The nations that remain in the Paris agreement will be the nations that reap the benefits in jobs and industries created. I be-lieve the United States of America should be at the front of the pack." Obama said in a statement.

Tesla founder Elon Musk said

he would quit White House advisory councils on business in protest. "(I) am departing presidential councils. Climate change is real. Leaving Paris is not good for America or the world," Musk wrote on Twitter.

GUWAHATI, JUN 1 (PTI): The 117-year-old historic Cotton College in Guwahati today merged with Cotton College State University to form Cotton University.

Assam Education Minister Dr Himanta Biswa Sarma unveiled the new identity of the institute during a renaming ceremony.

Though the renaming ceremo-

ny was held amid protests by Cottonians, the Cotton College Teachers Association (CCTA) welcomed the decision and announcement of the state government to upgrade Cotton College to a university with effect from today.


Sarma at the ceremony said he wanted the new university to be not only a centre of excellence of the North East region but a front ranking university of South East Asia.

The Cotton College had observed its last foundation day on

It marked the end of the journey in the north eastern region of India that began 117 years ago in 1901.

The Assam government had proclaimed Cotton College, the premier college of Assam and eastern India, as a full-fledged university under the name Cotton University in January 2017 by an Act and merged Cotton College and Cotton College State University together.

The year 2011 saw the declaration of the historic Act of the



Government of Assam whereby the institution was upgraded to Cotton College State University (CCSU) with Cotton College as its sole constituent college.
Cotton College was also de-

clared as a Special Heritage College in 2015.

The journey of higher ed-ucation in the north eastern region had begun in 1901 with prominent public figure of the state Manick Chandra Barooah strongly advocating for setting up of a college in Guwahati with

suitable boarding facilities.
Students of the province had
to go to Kolkata (Calcutta) for

According to historical records, Manick Chandra in his letter (1899) to the British government had stated that Assam was the only province without a college and it would be cheaper for people of Upper Assam to stay at Guwahati than in Calcutta (Kolkata).

On November 3, 1899 in Guwahati, the then Assam province Chief Commissioner Sir Henry Cotton made the announcement to establish a college in Assam, the records state.

In a meeting, the public here had decided to name the new-ly established college after the then Chief Commissioner Sir

Henry John Stedman Cotton.

He had formally declared tton College open under Calcutta University at a public meeting here on May 27, 1901. Prof Fredrick William Sud-


mersen then arrived at Guwahati on that day to take charge as the first principal of the college. After establishment

Gauhahi University in 1948 as the first university of the province, the affiliation of Cotton College was transferred from Calcutta University to Gauhati University in the same year.

All departments of Cotton College were offering post raduate courses since 1994.

"It feels really good but I think I have just crossed a milestone and there is a long way to go. said Eric, who has been confined to a wheelchair since February 2012 fol-lowing a road accident.

"There were many challenges on my way like no toilets, restrooms, shelters or any public place which is wheel-chair- friendly. Neither are people aware about

challenges "Other were instant changing weather conditions, no mobile network, petrol pumps at long distances in hilly areas, poor condition of roads, and land-

Language while getting food and shelter was also a task,"

However, he is happy to have overcome all the

challenges in the journey. including the world's highest motorable road

passes in Leh. Employed with the Taj group of hotels here, Eric said it was import-ant to "believe in yourself and never give up," if one was to take challenges

A passionate driv-er, Eric had last winter completed the 'Golden Quadrilateral' road task of the Limca Books to set

He had driven 6.000 km -- from Delhi to Mum-bai and then Bengaluru and Chennai to Kolkata -- in less than seven days to enter the Limca Book of Records.

The Leh to Kanyakumari drive, published in the Limca Book recently,

is his second record.

A keen follower of Prime Minister Narendra Modi's 'Swachh Bharat Abhiyan', Eric has campaigned for cleanliness during his two expeditions across the country.

Now he is gearing up for another record-setting road trip, while also working towards raising awareness about issues of disabled people.

"I want to see a new India which is accessible for people like me or with any other disability. It is only possible when the whole society comes together and works in this area. I'll try my best contribute towards this." he said.

Fake doctors have spread to different corners of Bengal : CID

KOLKATA, JUN 2 (PTI): Fake doctors have spread to different corners of West Bengal and a number of them are attached to renowned private medical establishments, state CID said today.

"It's like opening a can of worms. Our investigation revealed that these fake doctors are spread all over the state. And there are many who are attached with some of the popular private medical hospitals in Kolkata as well as in the districts," a senior CID

Sleuths suspect that several health department officials, former medical college employees as well as doctors are involved in the racket of forging

documents besides appointing doctors.

The CID had yesterday submitted a report to Bengal Director General of Police (DGP) Surajit Kar Purakayastha stating that there could be around 500

fake doctors practising in the state.

Asked whether these fake doctors are attached to any of the state-run hospitals, the CID sleuth said, "It's still unclear. We have got an idea about the matter. There can be some who are working with state-run medical establishments but we are yet to catch hold of anybody. Our investigation is on and hopefully we will be identify those cul-

The CID has sought assistance of the West Bengal Medical Council (WBMC) in connection with its probe, he said.

'We have evidences that these people are using registration num-bers which are either used by doctors not from that area or of those who have expired. We are trying to nab them tracking the registration numbers," he said.

CID slueths visited the Indian Med-ical Association (IMA) office in the city in connection with the probe.

The officer said there are several fake doctors from neighbouring states like Bihar, Chhatisgargh, Jharkhand, Odisha besides others who have sneaked in and are practising here in West Bengal for quite sometime

"We are trying to monitor their cur-rent location," the CID officer said.

The fake doctor issue surfaced after the CID last month arrested two persons working as doctors with forged documents in north Bengal.

Indian-American girl wins National Spelling Bee title in USA

Washington, Jun (PTI): Ananya Vi a 12-year-old I Indinerican girl, today won the prestigious Scripps National Spelling Bee, taking home USD 40,000 cash prize after correctly spelling "maro-cain" to become the 13th consecutive winner from the community.

A sixth-grader from

Fresno, California, Ananya won the spelling com-petition after numerous rounds against Rohan Rajeev, another Indi-an-American student, underscoring the overwhelming dominance of Indian-Americans in the competition.

Ananya and Rajeev were the last two standing of the initial 291 spellers.

Ananya captured the 90th championship title by correctly spelling "marocain", which is a



dress fabric made from silk or rayon, during the 36th round of the annual competition held at the Gaylord National Resort and Convention Center in suburban Washington.

"It's like a dream come true, I'm so happy right now. I just focused on my word and tried to spell it right," said Ananupon receiving the nner's trophy. In a post-victory in-

terview, Ananya told reorters she was able recognise one of the final words as it had been mentioned in her social studies book.

"You can find words in interesting places," she was quoted as saying by the 'USA Today'.

Ananya is the 13th consecutive an-American winner of the competition and the 18th of the past 22 winners with Indian heritage, a run that began in 1999 with Nupur Lala's victory, which was featured in the documenta-ry "Spellbound."

Ananya honed her skill in highly competitive national bees that limited to Indian-Americans, the North South Foundation and the South Asian Spelling Bee, although she did not Ananya's victory broke the Bee's threeyear streak of ending in a tie. She wins USD 40,000 in cash, a trophy and other prizes, the report said. Asked about her com-

petitor, Rohan, Ananya said, "It was interesting to go back and forth for

so many rounds".

The annual contest opened on Tuesday with a record 291 spellers from across the country and the globe. The field was narrowed to 40 final-ists on Wednesday, based upon two oral rounds of spelling and the results of a written spelling and vocabulary test.

By yesterday after-noon, just 15 spellers were still standing and went on to compete for the championship whose final rounds were broadcast live.

The National Bee is a

high-profile, high-pres sure endurance test as much as a nerd spelling match and spellers spend months preparing for it.

The stress of competing against the dictionary was etched on many spellers' faces as they took their turn at the mi crophone and in front of the television cameras.

'I'm pretty nervous," Nikhil Lahiri, 14, of Painted Post, NY, confessed from the stage, just seconds before correctly spelling "outarde", which is a Canadian goose.

This year's 291 spellers represented all 50 states and the District of Columbia, as well as American Samoa, Guam, Puerto Rico, the US Virgin Islands and the Department of Defense Schools in Europe. 11 came from the Bahamas.

Guha Resignation: Questions Kohli, Dhoni, Ganguly, Gavaskar

New Delhi, Iun 2 (PTI): Indian cricket's "superstar culture", unad-dressed conflict of interest issues and BCCI's "insensitive" handling of coach Anil Kumble- noted his-torian Ramachandra Guha has opened a pandora's box in his resignation letter to the Committee of Administrators.

Guha spared no one and ques-tioned skipper Virat Kohli's role in selection of coach, besides alleging conflict of interest on part of Sunil Gavaskar, Sourav Ganguly, and Rahul Dravid.

The letter also questioned the move to give former skipper Mahendra Singh Dhoni a Grade A Central Contract despite not playing all three formats.

In a seven-page letter. Guha has expressed his disgust to Rai for the "extremely insensitive and unprofessional manner" that the speculated Kohli-Kumble fallout was handled by BCCI CEO (Rahul Johri) and the BCCI office-bearers (Amitabh Chaudhary).

He accused the COA of "silence

and inaction", claiming that the panel was "unfortunately being complicit in this regard."

In his parting shot, he recommended Javagal Srinath's name as his replacement as a former cricketer in the Committee of Administrators

While Guha, in his submission to Supreme Court cited personal reasons for quitting COA, his letter



asks a lot of uncomfortable questions to the powers that be of Indi-

Guha has directly questioned Kohli's "veto power" on decid-ing matters like appointment of a coach and even the commentators panel. It also makes it clear that Kumble-Kohli rift is a reality.

He writes: "If indeed the captain and the Head Coach were not getting along, why was not this attended to as soon as the Australia series was over in late March? Why was it left until the last minutes, when a major international tournament was imminent, and when the uncertainty would undermine the morale and ability to focus of the coach, the captain and the team.

"And surely giving senior players the impression that they may have a veto power over the coach is another example of superstar culture gone berserk? Such a veto power is not permitted to any other top level professional team in any other sport in any other country," he categorically states.
In a veiled dig at Kohli, Guha

writes that on Friday, players are interfering in matters pertaining to appointment of coaches and commentators (Harsha Bhogle was removed for on-air criticism of Virat Kohli), tomorrow it may well be that they would like to have a say on office-bearers.

"Already, in a dismaying departure from international norms, current Indian players enjoy a veto power on who can be the members of the commentary team. If it is to be coaches next, then perhaps the selectors and even office-bearers will follow?'

Guha lambasted the superstar culture prevalent in the Indian cricketing set-up that has allowed Dhoni to retain a 'Grade A' con-tract when he has given up on Test cricket in 2014.

"Unfortunately, this superstar syndrome has also distorted the system of Indian team contracts. As you will recall, I had pointed out that awarding M S Dhoni an 'A' contract when he had explicitly ruled himself out from all Test matches was indefensible on cricketing grounds, and sends absolutely the rong message," he wrote.

He was also severe on the likes

of Rahul Dravid for having dual ntracts with both the BCCI and IPL franchises.

'No person under contract with an India team, or with the NCA, should be allowed to moonlight for an IPL team too," he writes.

Taking an indirect dig at Dravid (India A coach), and R Sridhar (fielding coach), the former COA member questioned BCCI for allowing them to have IPL contracts with Delhi Daredevils (Dravid) and Kings XI Puniab (Sridhar).

An excerpt of the letter states: The question of conflict of interest, which had laid unaddressed ever since the Committee began its work, and which I have been repeatedly flagging since I joined.
"For instance, the BCCI has ac-

corded preferential treatment to some national coaches, by giving them ten month contracts for national duty, thus allowing them to ork as IPL coaches/mentors for the remaining two months."

"This was done in an ad-hoc and arbitrary manner; the more famous the former player-turnedcoach, the more likely was the BCCI to allow him to draft his own contract that left loopholes that he exploited to dodge the conflict of interest issue," Guha wrote with fingers clearly pointed at Dravid, someone whose reputation till date has been unquestionable. Apart from taking on Kohli

and Dravid, Guha also had strong reservations about Sunil Gavaksar's business interests in Professai s business interests in Frotes-sional Management Group (PMG) and his firm managing a current player -- Shikhar Dhawan. He, in fact, told Rai how he had apprised them of PMG signing up Dhawan's endorsements.

"Sunil Gavaskar is head of a company which represents Indian cricketers while commenting on those cricketers as part of the BCCI

clear conflict of interest. Either he must step down/withdraw himself from PMG completely or stop being a commentator for BCCI."

After Gavaskar, Guha then trained his gun on another former captain Sourav Ganguly, who is a TV pundit apart from being current president of the Cricket Association of Bengal.

"Conflict of interest is rampant in the State Associations as well. One famous former cricketer is contracted by media houses to comment on active players while serving as President of his State

Association (read Ganguly)."

Guha urged Rai and his colleagues to take some "bold decisions" on which the credibility of the committee rests.

"COA's credibility and effective-

ness hinges on our being able to take bold and correct decisions on such matters. The 'superstar' culture that afflicts the BCCI means that the more famous the play-er (former or present) the more leeway he is allowed in violating norms and procedures.

"Dhoni was captain of the Indian team while holding a stake in a firm that represented some current India players.

Destitute woman's body put in garbage cart

MUZAFFARPUR(BIHAR). Jun 2 (PTI): A destitute woman's body was taken to the Sri Krishna Medical College and Hospital (SKMCH), here in a garbage cart for autopsy, prompting the District Magistrate to order a probe into the matter.

"We have ordered a probe into the unfortunate incident (corpse of a destitute woman being pulled inside a garbage cart to be tak-en for post-mortem at SKMCH)...strict action will be taken against those found responsible for negligence," District Magistrate Dharmendra Singh said today.

Muzaffarpur District Civil Surgeon Dr Lalita Singh too expressed disgust over the incident and said that a probe was on in the matter.

She said that the SK-MCH has several mor-tuary vans which could have been pressed into service to bring the des-titute woman's body for post-mortem.

The destitute woman had died near a park inside the SKMCH hospital on Wednesday last after battling illness for over two weeks.

After her death, the woman's body was put in a garbage cart by two hospital employees on way to being taken for post-mortem, an incident that has shocked the civil society after several news channels beamed footage of the incident.

A gardener Kanchar Bhagat, employed by SK-MCH, said that he had noticed the ailing woman writhing in pain and had informed doctors about it. He alleged that none of them

paid any attention to her.

After battling illness for two weeks, she died on Wednesday last, Bhagat said.



Beef protesters barge into Kerala House, additional security sought

New Delhi, Jun 2 (PTI): Kerala House Commissioner Resident Vishwas Mehta today sought more security for the state guest house to protect it from "groups with vested interests", who could cre-ate trouble over the ongoing beef controversy.

The development comes after members of a "cow vigilante" group, claiming to belong to the Bharatiya Gauraksha Kranti, allegedly barged into Kerala House last evening to protest the beef festivals recently held in the southern state.

They entered Kerala House around 8 PM and started distributing cow milk as a mark of protest.

"We have written a complaint to the Connaught Place police station, besides urging senior police officials to take action against the protesters and seeking additional security to protect Kerala House from groups with vested interests," Mehta told reporters.

He condemned yes-

terday's incident and said such protests should not take place at Kerala House and its sanctity should be maintained.

"Kerala House should

not be turned into a protest venue.

The issue is political

and Kerala House should not be dragged into it, said Mehta.

He added that Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's office had been informed of the incident

Mehta refused to comment on lapses on the part of the police to stop the protesters from barging into Kerala House, saying he was not present at the time of the incident.

DRI arrests national-level shooter Prashant Bishnoi

New Delhi, Jun 2 (PTI): The Directorate of Revenue Intelligence (DRI) has arrested national-level shooter Prashant Bishnoi, a key accused in multi-crore

gun-running and wildlife smuggling case.

The arrest comes a month after raids conducted by the DRI at Bishnoi's residence in Uttar Pradesh's Meerut resulted in the recovery of about Rs one crore in cash besides over a hundred illegally imported firearms, 117 kg of nilgai meat, horns and skins of leopards and blackbucks.

Bishnoi is alleged to be the kingpin of a global syn-

dicate involved in smuggling of fire arms and wildlife. He appeared before the DRI officials yesterday in response to a summon issued against him. Following interrogation, Bishnoi was arrested, official sources said today. During the interrogation, he was confronted with evidence gathered during the probe. Bishnoi accepted to be the part of the global smuggling racket, the sources claimed.

Three accused including Slovenian national Boris Sobotic Mikolic have already been arrested for their alleged involvement in the case.

The trio were intercepted after their arrival at the

Delhi airport by a Turkish Airlines flight from Slove-nia's capital Ljubljana via Istanbul on April 29. They were carrying 25 illegally imported lethal

we apons and other items worth about $\mbox{Rs}\ 4.5$ crore with them, according to a senior DRI official.

They had incorrectly declared the quantity and value of the arms and ammunition to the customs officials and tried to get these items cleared by misusing the scheme meant for renowned shooters, he said.

The rules permit professional shooters to import a limited quantity of arms and ammunition for practice.

The accused -- Amit Goyal, Anil Kumar Langan and Mikolic -- were arrested for allegedly violating customs rules to evade payment of import duty, the official said.

Following the detention of the accused, the DRI had carried out searches at multiple places including the house of the Prashant Bishnoi, son of a retired army colonel, and seized over hundred illegally imported firearms, 117 kg of nilgai meat, horns and

skins of leopards and blackbucks, he said.
Unaccounted cash of about Rs one crore and two lakh cartridges were also seized during the searches, the official said.

The firearms of various make and models -- Glock (Austria), Italy-made Beretta, Arsenal, Benelle and Blaser (Germany) -- were seized along with expensive cameras, thermal imaging binoculars and cartridges during the raids.

"A police party will be deployed near the school premises and two speed-breakers will also be constructed on either side of the school to check speeding bikers," the ADC assured the students.
