Martyrs Day observed in Darj, indefinite shutdown on

DARJEELING (WB), JULY **27 (PTI):** The GJM and other hill parties today observed 'the Martyrs Day' and paid tribute to pro-Gorkhaland activists killed here in the Darjeeling hills in clashes since the agitation for a sepa-

rate state began in June.
On the 43rd day of the indefinite shutdown today, the agitators took out rallies in various parts of the hills and paid tributes to nine pro-Gorkhaland activists, allegedly killed in police action since the agitation started on June 8.

A monument in mem ory of the agitators was erected at Chowkbazar in Darjeeling town, where activists, locals and students paid floral tributes and vowed to intensify the stir.

There was no report of any violence and arson

from anywhere in the hills.

The police, however, have claimed that only two persons have died in the agitation so far.

The 43-day-long in-definite shutdown, which started on June 15, is the second longest so far in the picturesque hill station which had witnessed a 40-day bandh in 1988 by Gorkha Na-tional Liberation Front and a 44-day shutdown in 2013 by Gorkha Jana-mukti Morcha on the statehood issue.

The ban on internet services which was imposed on June 18 has already been extended by the district administra-



In all. 1.200 lives were lost in the Hills in the Aandolan of the 1980's, and the Shaheed Diwas, even though it marks the infamous firing of 27 July 1986 by CRPF on protestors in Kalimpong which claimed 15 lives, also seeks to remember all those who laid down their lives for the eventual formation of the Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Council with which some semblance of normalcy returned to the Hills at

Gorkha National Lib-eration Front had constructed a park here in the memory of the mar-tyrs during the DGHC years. Shaheed Diwas has since been traditionally observed here. Now, however, the observance extends to all parts of the Darjeeling Hills and remembers all lives that have been lost in the ovement for statehood. Jan Andolan Party, for

instance, also observed Shaheed Diwas at its party office here today.

Meanwhile, the Ka-limpong MLA, Satita Rai off the GJM, said today, "Everything is happening at once. Internet is down, local channels are blocked, people are dy-ing but our government is mum. Most importantly, our own MP is quiet which is very disappointing."

Doval, Yang hold talks amid Sikkim standoff

Yang met separately with senior security rep-resentatives from South Africa, Brazil and India. state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

Yang separately ex-changed views with the three senior representatives on hilateral relations, international and regional issues and multilateral affairs, and set forth China's position on bilateral issues and major problems, the report said, without giving fur-

Doval arrived here yesterday to take part in the two-day Brazil, Russia, India, China, South Africa (BRICS) NSAs meet-

His visit has raised expectations about the likelihood of India and China finding a solution to the over a month-long standoff at Doklam area in the Sikkim sector on the trijunction between India, China and Bhutan.

Chinese and Indian troops have been locked in a face-off in the tri-junction area for more than a month since Indian troops stopped the Chinese army from building a road in the area. China claimed that it

was constructing the road within its territory. India protested the construction.

The ugly underbelly of Indian politics exposed yet again

SILIGURI, 27 JUL:

As a child, I often won-As a child, I often won-dered, and probably you did too, what the phrase "the King is dead, long live the King", meant. Diametrically opposite sentences spoken in the same breath always confused me. But now I have cracked the paradox for which I am grateful to Bihar chief minister Nitish Kumar.

Last evening, the news alerts went crazy informing Nitish Kumar had resigned as the Bihar CM, which he had. By midnight he was back in the seat with backing from his former bête noire, the BJP. Now that is what you might sav 'Nitish Kumar is out. Nitish Kumar is in'! So much for morality in politics!

The high octane drama will have its usual fallouts in Bihar's state politics, but what the developments since Wednesday night have essentially done is advanced the BJP's 'mission east India' agenda and set back the Op-position's plans for a united fight against the Narendra Modi-Amit Shah combine in the 2019 Lok Sabha elections.

Naturally, questions are being raised if the Bihar dra-ma was scripted by the saffron brigade. The chain of events prior to and after Nitish Kumar's resignation and re-claim are curious.

The Governor in-charge of Bihar Kesrinath Tripathi, who took charge after Ram Nath Kovind resigned to contest the President election, was in



Patna on Wednesday which allowed Nitish Kumar physical access to serve his resignation and stake the claim simultaneously. A convenient arrangement? Well, the Opposition is alleging so.
Wasting no time, the BJP

moved in swiftly praising

Kumar's stand and providing him with the all-important letter of support to form government with him at the helm. Such rounding off of events with no lose ends can only suggest the sequence of events might have been stage-managed.

No wonder then, Prime Minister Narendra Modi took to social media forthwith commending Kumar's decision to fight corruption 'in favour of honesty and integrity.' Another state after all was under the belt without a vote cast. Some achievement that!

The BJP has been particularly good in outsmarting the Opposition without contesting at the hustings. Take for instance Arunachal Pradesh. Last year the BJP peoched Arunachal Pradesh poached Arunachal Pradesh chief minister Pema Khandu and 33 of his People's Party of Arunachal MLAs to form government in the politically unstable state.

It was Goa's turn next and the BJP with 12 MLAs and second to the Congress, orches-

trated the support of three MLAs each from the Maha-rashtrawadi Gomantak Party, the Goa Forward Party, three Independents and a National-Congress Party legislator in favour to form government.

Bihar is the latest to join the list of states falling to BJP maneuverings. So what the move makes a mockery of the five-year mandate the people of Bihar had given to the RID. JDU and Congress alliance against the BJP? So what Modi had once expressed suspicion over Nitish Kumar's DNA and the two had hurled a barrage of bitter and unsavoury accu-sations at each other? Have We Failed the Young?

Of course we have. Now, to make amends

outh evolve from the societies they grow in. They Youth evoive from the societies and of are after all, products of what they are exposed to, groomed from influences they are surrounded by. Juvenile delinguency, like teen rebellion, is expected; but when the lines delineating youthful experimentation from criminal malefaction get blurred and digressions

into darker aberrations surface, it is time to worry.

Some months ago, there was a rash of bag snatching and assault with intent to rob incidents around Gangtok. Those incidents have stopped now, but from what the victims recalled, the assailants were all "young" boys, fresh out of their teens. More recently, a "gang" attacked a motorist in Gangtok and left him s verely battered. Across the state borders, although the cases of arson and overnight attacks have gone down, it would not surprise if these were commissioned to "young" people, youth who should ideally be more moved by ideas of sacrifice and idealism than assault and mindless arson. Agreed, these isolated incidents are not representative of the entire generation, but they are still worrying signals. Worry, in fact, might be too mild a reaction, it's probably time to panic. Panic, not against the young who crossed over into near morbid criminality, but a society that has so disassociated itself from the grooming of its young that it did not even notice the spiral it has pushed innocence into. And there have been other incidents in between, some got reported, others were covered-up. So, yes it is time

It is inexcusable that such incidents should transpire. Harrowing as it is for the victims, Sikkim's collective failure in addressing the issue - not as individual cases or in terms of victims and perpetrators, but in terms of figuring out how the young can be counseled better and kept safe – is shameful. The young are obviously growing in a vacuum, untouched by proper nurture despite all the talk of moral education. The schools perhaps concentrate too much on regimented teaching to have time for grooming, and parents too obsessed with other priorities to notice how an entire generation is coming unhinged. Teenagers are committing suicide in Sikkim, some are falling to fatal over-doses of substances of abuse, still more are buying substances of abuse on the streets and as they grow more asocial, some have lost the faculties to differentiate between right and obvious criminality.

Slightly older, and these juveniles would have been dismissed by the society at large as 'no-good, anti-social elements'. But in many cases, the perpetrators are still "young" enough to have the need for their parents/guardians to be informed of their actions. What we hence end up staring at is a reflection of our failings. For this situation, there are no prescribed soluons or government-funded interventions to bring NGOs crawling out of the woodwork to implement The young, the victims and the perpetrators, need to be saved from our failings. A good place to begin would be to accept that we have failed collectively. Then can begin the process of figuring out how the right counseling and right inspirations can be dispensed to ensure that innocence grows into maturity in Sikkim, and does not derail into antisocial excesses as is obviously happening at present..

Homage to the Heroes of 1973

His joint leadership with Late Sherab Palden Lepcha during the protest infused a sense of courage in the youth of Sikkim to stand up against the might of the Indian Government on the issue of Sikkim's merger. Along with them, there were several youths who sacrificed their futures for their motherland. Their sac-rifice should be etched in the annals of Sikkim's history and referred to whenever the merger is talked about. Their stories, however, remain largely anonymous and unheard of. Today's generation needs to know that not all Sikkimese were 'Desh Bechuwas' and countless opposed the merger at risk to their collective futures. We need to remember those who came out in protest against the merger. Their names remain unknown and their deeds forgotten but their sacrifice will always be remembered.

The six year period from 1973

to 1979 was full of turmoil as Sikkim entered into a democratic set-up, merged with India and elected into government, a leader who led a demerger campaign. Until the seven-ties, Sikkim had hardly any links with the outside world. Its only fame was that the Guinness Book of World Re-cord recorded it as the only country where murder was unknown. The events preceding the political up-heaval in 1973 led Sikkim to the arena of geo-politics for which it was un-prepared. The Government of India under Mrs. Indira Gandhi had already planned to merge Sikkim with India taking into consideration the geo-po-litical scenario of the growing influence of China in the neighboring ar-eas. Indians feared Chinese intrusion in Sikkim. The web of plot leading to the merger was well planned with intelligence bodies like RA&W, which later claimed that the merger of Sikkim was its greatest achievement.

The discontentment arising out of

the assembly elections of 1973 gave the Indian government the pawns it



needed for the chess of deception to fuel political uprising in Sikkim. The anti-monarchy fire was stoked and leaders connected with this move ment were supported tactically by Indian government leading to the referendum seeking merger with India. The years of turmoil saw courage and determination of the people of Sikkim who stood up to the might of the Indian government in a losing battle for independence.

The first martyr in this fight was the Sikkim Guard soldier, Basant Ku-mar Chettri, who refused to lay down his arms until ordered by the Chogyal himself. He was shot dead by Indian troops at the palace gate in 1975. The other casualty at the same spot was Nima Sherpa, another Sikkim Guard soldier, who was wounded in the arm by the Indian army. His arm had to be amputated later.

The uprising against the merger was spontaneous with the youth and students at the forefront. Leading the battle was Nar Bahadur Bhandari along with Sherab Palden Lepcha, assisted by many young leaders and advisers. Nar Bahadur Bhandari's fiery speeches ignited the nationalistic sentiment of the masses, especially the youth and students who plunged into the struggle against the merger. Amongst the prominent students who led the struggle was Tsewang Norbu, commonly known as Nadu, who was expelled from the school when he refused to apologize for joining the struggle. He was beaten up and stabbed by the CRPF and left to die at Ranipool where he was rescued by other students. He was also sent to



jail with other leaders for standing up

against the merger.
Phurba Lepcha, alias Danny, was another youth leader who was feared by the CRPF and was a marked man by the security forces. He was severely beaten by the CRPF and later died from the injuries sustained. He had also been sent to Gangtok jail along with leader Sherab Palden Lepcha and others.

Girls were not far behind in the struggle and students from Palior Namgyal Girls High School were at the forefront of the encounter with CRPF forces. School girl leader Tsher-ing Yuden, alias Balil, along with Nirlata Rai, Kunchuk Barphungpa, Usha Theengh, Yangchen Doma and numerous other girl students were beaten by the CRPF. These young students were lovingly referred to as 'Mero Sipahi Haru' by Mr Bhandari.

People from all walks of life joined the agitation. For example, the Lachen Gomchen, in his monk's gown, headed the stone-pelters in Gangtok. Gey-long Netuk Lama was attacked by a mob for his nationalistic beliefs. Sang Phurba Maila was shot dead.

Youth writers like Jeevan Theengh wrote patriotic poems and articles to inspire the people. People of Lachen and Lachung must be commended for their patriotism for rushing to Gangtok leaving everything behind to fight the forces of merger. Uniformed men like Captain Yongda in spite of being jailed several times never gave up their love for Sikkim and soldiers of Sikkim Guards who were disbanded and jailed at Sirwani never surren dered in spite of being offered jobs in



Indian armed forces

The greatest hero of the merger was Chogyal Palden Thondup Namgyal, who, after losing his kingdom and facing numerous humiliations, never gave up on his country. The tribute paid to him by Deputy Speaker LB Basnett in the Sikkim Legislative Assembly on his death sums up his

"During the hour of his trial, when his very throne was at stake, Chogyal Palden Thondup Namgyal stood like a rock and sacrificed petty consider-ations for the lofty ideal he had espoused. He lost, but in the very pro-cess of losing his throne and status, he rose to his full stature. For when 'little men' who rule the roost in Sik-kim will have been consigned to dust, posterity will look back with awe and respect upon the last representa-tive of the House of Namgyal on the throne of Sikkim and say that Palden Thondup Namgyal bowed out of the political stage of Sikkim with the grace of a ruler and with the courage of a real man. He lost his Kingdom, but gained a martyr's halo. And his descendents will be able to walk with their heads held high whatever their circumstances in life happen to be."

The MLAs, who signed the deed of merger later regretted their ignorance of signing away the kingdom, but the deed could not be undone. Today, we salute the bravehearts along with our beloved leader, the Late Nar Bahadur Bhandari on his Anthyesti Kriya. [the writer retired as Sec-

Arundhati Roy's new novel lays India bare, unveiling worlds within our world

Wearing two hats at once can be an uncomfortable fit, but it does not seem to bother the author Arundhati Roy, who for most of her life has railed against state excesses and corporate exploitation while also wielding the pen.

Maybe she does not think of these two jobs as different, but rather as extensions of each other.
This, at least, is the impression Roy gives her

readers in her latest novel, The Ministry of Utmost Happiness (Hamish Hamilton), which came out in early June. Two decades in the making, the book records the story of India as it transpired over those 20 years.

This contemporary history is told and retold by myriad voices: those of hijras, people who identify themselves as belonging to the third gender or as transgender; of a dalit man (of the low-est castes) who pretends to be Muslim; of Kashmiris, of Indian civil servants, cold-blooded killers and puppet jour-nalists; of adivasis (tribal populations) and of artists, of owls and kittens and of a dung beetle named Guih Kyom.

Locales are similarly wide-ranging.

Roy takes readers from a graveyard in Old Delhi to civil war-torn Kashmir and to central Indian forests, where Maoist insurgents

fight India's army. Some of the book transpires too in the 18th-century astronomical site, Jantar Mantar, the only place in Delhi where people are allowed to protest.

Those are just a few of the backdrops in this pan-

oramic novel, which touches on the various Indian social movements that have captured global atten-tion in recent years, from the 2011 anti-corruption Anna Hazare protests to the 2016 Una dalit struggle.

Roy uses the internal contradictions of the movements and the locales to mirror her meandering plotlines, which knit all these skeins together

into a kaleidoscopic larger narrative.

It's an uneasy fit, and the book often feels like it is about to burst at the seams. Still, Roy somehow holds it all together, clumsily yet passionately, leav-ing no one and nothing out.

BETWEEN A GRAVEYARD AND A VALLEY

Both the margins and the marginalised speak in the Ministry of Utmost Happiness, a feat Roy has also sought to achieve with both her activism and



her non-fiction work.

The story follows two characters: Anjum, nee Aftab, a hijra who rejects the politically correct term "transgen-der", and Tilo, a Delhi-based architect turned graphic designer who kidnaps a baby from Jantar Mantar.

Anjum's life is a lens onto an alternate duniya, or world, one where hijras live and learn together, cloistered, following their own rules, regulations and hierarchies.

That changes forever when An-jum travels to Gujarat, a western Indian state that is known for its recent history of religious violence between Hindus and Muslims, and witnesses a

massacre. Shortly thereafter, Anjum

moves to a graveyard in Old Delhi.

As always, Roy's brilliance shines most in her choice of locales and the imagery they invoke.

In The God of Small Things (1997),

the banks of the Meenachil River in southern Kerala served as the space of deviance for the protagonists, where Ammu and Velutha have their escapades and Estha and Rahel

get up to mischief.

In The Ministry of Utmost Happiness, the author gives us two contrasting, contradictory settings: a graveyard that becomes a place of life and the verdant Kashmir valley, a space of death and misery.

Anjum starts a guesthouse in the old graveyard, with each room enclosing a grave. Holding feasts for festivals, she invites her friends over to dine regularly at the graveyard-guest house. Later, Tilo moves in permanently with the baby.

The reader understands this resplendent

graveyard, which features not just living humans but an impressive stock of animals too, as an ode to tolerating (or, more correctly termed, to accom-modating) plurality, a blunt contrast to the truth of modern-day India, with its increasing intolerance towards religious and social differences.

For this, for trying to etch out a semblance of hope, for showing broken things and shattered people coming together to carve out a niche of their own, Roy deserves applause.

DISPARATE AND INTERTWINED TALES At times all these voices, places and problems es-

calate into a dissonant cacophony that leaves the reader perplexed, exhausted and grasping at the multiple threads of the plot. But the novel's brilliance lies in how it captures subtle moments, with attention to detail and sharp compassion.
For instance, the Ustad (master) Kulsoom Bi takes

Anjum and the other newly initiated hijra residents to a light and sound show at the Red Fort in Delhi just so they can hear the fleeting but distinct coquettish giggle of a court eunuch. She explains to them that they, the hijras, were not "commoners, but members of the staff of the Royal Palace in the medieval period."

These nuggets of everyday history and poetry keep readers hooked, gradually lowering us through each of the story's many layers and offering moments of clarity in an otherwise tangled mesh.

Some have called Roy's novel a "fascinating mess", but frankly when one decides to write a shattered story about all things, the narrative(s) is bound to get fuzzy.

The book may be difficult for those who

have not been following Roy and her causes in the long years since God of Small Things. But those who get her intellectual moorings and understand her role as a voice of dissent in today's climate of "saffronisation

- the spread of extreme-right Hindu values across India, a nation veering hazardously towards authoritarianism, know that the author and her work are one.

Roy's novel, much like her role as a public intellectual, is a reminder that the world we inhabit is a composite one – a duniya of duniyas – where invisible people, their unrepresented struggles and their unacknowledged yearnings have the right to exist. The Ministry of Utmost Happiness tells their story, extolling everyone's right to be heard, even if only fleetingly, in the coquettish giggle of a court eunuch.

Post Manipur flood -Outbreak of disease looms large

IMPHAL, JUL 27 (PTI): After the flood, spread of vector-borne and other diseases looms large in various parts of Manipur particularly in Imphal Valley and Churachan-dpur district, a state Health department offi-

cial said today.

The official said latest available report stated that "as of today morn-ing, at least more than individuals have tested positive for Jap-anese Encephalitis (JE), Dengue, Swine Flu and the recent Scrub Typhus."

Vector borne and other diseases spread in the valley area following the flood, the sources said.

Officials attributed contamination of stagnant water bodies, improper access to potable water and lack of safeguarding from mosquito bites and other insects as the main reasons behind the outbreak of these diseases.

The first case of Japa-nese Encephalitis was first detected on June 5 at New Lamka in Churachandpur district while the first case of Dengue was first detect-

ed on May 4.

Officials said on July 24. a 44-year old person died due to Swine Flu while the medical test results of another patient, suspected to be affected by the Flu,is still being awaited.

On July 15, Health Minister L Jayanta Ku-mar had remarked that death was indeed to Swine Flu and that the government has set up isolation wards at the state run Jawaharlal Nehru Institute of Medical Sciences (JNIMS) and RIMS.

Meanwhile, a person from Imphal East district died on July 25 last as a result of Scrub Typhus caused by insect bite.

16 dead, 20 lakh affected in WB floods

At least 16 people died while nearly 20 lakh were affected in over 160 villages, which were inundated due to heavy rains and the water released by Damodar Valley Corporation (DVC) in the state, a senior official said today.

According to the se-nior official at the state secretariat 16 people have lost their lives so far in the heavy rains in about 12 districts of the state since Saturday.
"So far 16 persons

have died and 20 lakh affected in floods since July 21. As per our reports nearly 165 villages are under water," the official at the state disaster management said. department

Out of the 20 lakh, over four lakh people were affected in the last 24 hours alone, while 2,301 people were evacuated from their houses and 2.02.957 hectre of agricultural land was sub-



merged, the official said. Around 7,868 houses were entirely destroyed while 44,361 were partially damaged, he said.

Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee along with state Urban Development minister Firhad Hakim, Chief Secretary Malay Dev. Home Secretary Atri Bhattacharya and principal secretary of disaster management department took stock of the situation in inundated areas of Amta and Udaynaryanpur block in Howrah district. The current flood-like

situation was mainly be-cause of release of water by DVC, Banerjee said.

"They (DVC) are re-

leasing water without informing. The water released takes around three days to reach this place so we are asking the people to be alert.
We assure the people that the administration is with them," she said.

Reiterating that she had been asking the Centre to carry out dredg-

ing in the reservoirs of DVC dams and barrages so that they could hold more water, Banerjee said that inundation was a problem which the state has been facing almost every year.

"If dredging had been one then another two lakh cusec of water could have been stored and this situation would not have come about," she said, adding she has spo-ken to the Union Power minister to look into the dredging issue. Howrah District Magis-

trate Chaitali Chakraborty said one person died in the flood today and 1.5 lakh people were affected by inundation in the district.

The state govern-ment has started supply-ing dry food and water pouches to relief camps and distributed 6,73,000 tarpaulin sheets to the displaced in the districts, officials said, adding that over 50 relief centres have been also opened in the affected districts.



Govt of extortionists running West Bengal: BJP

(PTI): BJP West Bengal president Dilip Ghosh today termed the Trinamool Congress regime "a government of extortion-ists" and asserted that the party would defeat Trinamool Congress in the panchayat election to be held in the state next

year.
"Money is being extorted from the unem-ployed in the name of giving jobs, money is being extorted from busi-

Trinamool Congress has converted the government into a government of extortionists," Ghosh said.

Women are being raped in the state and angry people are just wait-ing for an opportunity to oust Trinamool from power, he told reporters after a party workers' meeting at Kushmandi in North Dinajpur district.

They would get their first such opportunity during next year's panchayat election, he said.

He described the panchayat election as quarter final, Lok Sabha polls of 2019 as semifinal and assembly election of 2021 as final.

"In the quarter final of panchayat election, BIP will show Trinamool which one is the number one party," Ghosh told reporters after a party workers' meeting at Kushmandi in North Dinajpur district.

People of the state had never seen such a below-standard government, Ghosh alleged and claimed that BJP will also win the semifinal and the

He claimed that senior leaders of Congress and Trinamool are going to join BJP very soon.

IIM Shillong proposes to set up Abdul Kalam centre for Policy Research & Analysis

SHILLONG, JUL 27 (PTI): The IIM-Shillong has proposed set-ting up of Abdul Kalam centre for Policy Research and Analysis at the institute to remember the people s president, API Abdul Kalam, who died while delivering a lecture at the institute here on this day two years ago.

The centre will work towards designing developmental models for tourism, business process outsourcing, logistics, handicraft, handloom, and horticulture in the entire NE region, IIM-Shillong director Amitabha De said.

He also announced that the ew institute campus will house a 2000 square meter auditorium that will be named after the for-mer President.

Celebrating Kalam s life, the institute today organised a series of lectures which was attended mostly by students from different educational institutions.

In the evening, members of

the public lit candles at the temporary campus to mark the occasion of Kalam's death anniversary.

Earlier, former chairman of Indian Space Research Organization (ISRO) G Madhavan Nair spoke on "Space and Society: the Indian scenario".

He narrated the history of human space endeavour, and about its progression from the days of 12-inch rockets to the technolog ical marvels of the day and took the attendees through ISRO s developmental journey from infancy to modern day glory.

Recalling Kalam s contribution to the nation, he underscored how the former DRDO chief who later became President adopted a different approach towards work, and towards fulfilling his commitment to the society.

Recalling the days when they orked together, Nair talked about the former president s exemplary leadership qualities, and his sense of ownership.

"It is the dream that comes to you while you are awake that is important", he said while reminiscing about Kalam s religious commitment to his work. The for-mer president had died on July 27, 2015 while delivering a lecture at the institute

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13 thoroughfares across Indo-Bangla border for jumbos

SHILLONG, JULY 27 (PTI): India and Bangladesh have agreed to create 13 thoroughfares across the border fences in Assam and Meghalaya to let elephants make to-and-fro movements between the two countries,

the officials said here today.
"Trans-border migration is a natural process and we have identified certain points (30 initially) but we have zeroed down to 13 points to allow to-and-fro migration of elephants in their natural habitats," India s Di-rector General of Forests and Special Secretary to the Government of India

Siddhanta Das told reporters.
At these identified thoroughfares for the jumbos, the fence would be broken and special gates would be built for their safe passage, he said. Both the countries have also decid-

ed to constitute a Joint Working Group to draft protocols and Standard Operating Procedures for trans-boundary conservation and management of ele-phants and their movements between the two countries.

Das said 12 of these points are in Meghalaya and one in Assam and we do not want to create a barrier against the natural movement of the

The opening of the border fenc-ing along the Indo- Bangladesh bor-der for elephants is one of the 18 agreed points of action signed by top

forests officials of both the countries at the 2nd Indo-Bangladesh dialogue for trans- boundary conservation of elephants here.

The other agreements included the one to discourage and regulate erection of electric fences for protec-tion of agriculture and horticulture crops in the areas falling in the identified migratory corridors to prevent death of elephants from electrocution, he said.

District deputy commissioners of both the countries will also be empowered to permit trans-boundary movement of elephant rescue teams.

With both the countries having similar concerns for elephants. Das said, "Within 60 days, we will constitute a Joint Working Group to evolve and develop protocols and Standard Operating Procedures for trans-boundary conservation and management of elephants in India-Bangladesh landscape."

He said the agreed action points

should lead to signing of an official protocol between India and Bangla-desh on trans-boundary conservation of elephants, Das said.

The third round of dialogue is expected to take place in Bangladesh by June next year.

The forest officials from states of Assam, Meghalaya, West Bengal and Tripura and an 11-mem

ber team from Bangladesh attended the 2nd Indo-Bangladesh dialogue for trans-boundary conservation of elephants here and discussed at length on how best to coordinate the free, to-and-fro movements of the pachyderms across the international border and prevent their poaching.

"It was agreed (in 2015) to develop an operational guideline to handle trans-boundary movement of elephants and as a follow up action of this, dialogue is on and the pro-tocol or else a Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) between the two countries is expected soon," Bangladesh Chief Conservator of Forest, Md Shafiul Alam Chowdhury said.

Kashmiri youth detained for ʻanti-national' Facebook posts


KOLKATA, JUL 27 (PTI): A Kashmiri youth staying in the city has been detained for allegedly posting anti-national remarks on his Facebook wall, the police

Arshad in his early 30s, has been staying at a guest house in south Kolkata's Anwar Shah Road area and was detained by the Lake Police Station after local residents complained about his anti-national posts on his Facebook wall, the police said.

"Arshad has been coming to the city for the last 12 years for his garments business. Every time he used to stay at this particular guest house and became friends with some locals who noticed his activities on Facebook and informed us," a senior officer of Lake Police

Arshad's posts started appearing after India lost to Pakistan in the Champions Trophy final in June, he said adding, the youth came to the city a couple of days back, when some local residents caught hold of

him and handed over to him to the police.
"We are running a check on whether this person has any link with any terror outfit or not. We are also scanning his activities on social networking sites," the officer said. The Kolkata Police STF is also probing the matter, he said.

Youth gets heart of 25-year old deceased man

NEW DELHI, JUL 27 (PTI): A 24-year-old man has received a new lease of life after undergoing a transplant surgery for heart that was donated to him by a person who died in a road accident here, hospital officials said today.

The organ was ferried from Fortis Hospital at Vasant Kunj to Fortis Escorts Heart Institute (FEHI) on July 25 night through a 14 km-long green corridor in a span of 18 minutes passing through south Delhi's busy Outer Ring Road.

"According to the hospi-tal-wise data decided by the NOTTO (National Organ and Tissue Transplant Organisation),

Vasant Kunj, one kidney to BLK Hospital and the liver was given to the Sir Ganga Ram Hospital,"

the Fortis Hospital Group said.

The donor, a 25-year-old man, was brought to the emergency ward of Fortis Hospital Vasant Kunj at 3.58 am on July 24, with multiple fractures and multiple organ failure, and was later declared brain dead the next day, the hospital authori-

ties said.
"Starting at 8:43 pm, the Fortis Organ Retrieval and Transplant (FORT) unit transported the heart via Outer Ring Road (on July 25) from Fortis Hospital at Vasant Kunj to FEHI at Okhla, via Aruna Asaf Ali Marg, IIT Flyover, Malviya Nagar, Nehru Place and Modi Mill. reaching by 9:04 pm," the hospital group said in a statement.

The recipient, suffering from congestive heart failure, under-went a life-saving surgery that went on for four hours and the patient is recovering well.

Meanwhile, Dr Rajeev Sood,

Director, Urology, Robotics & Kidney Transplantation per-formed a kidney transplant on a 59- year-old man at Fortis Vas-ant Kunj.

"The patient had end-stage renal disease and was on dialy sis for the past three years. The transplanted kidney has provided him a new lease of life and is generating urine since the time of transplant. The patient is doing well and recovering well in the post-op ICU," he said.

"The organ donation rate in the country has increased over 10-fold over the last 5 years from 0.05 per million population to 0.8 per million in 2016. "People from all walks of life

are increasingly saying 'yes' to organ donation," said Dr Avnish Seth, Director, Fortis Organ Re-

trieval and Transplant (FORT).
Sandeep Guduru, Facility
Director, Fortis Hospital at Vasant Kunj said, "This is the third deceased organ donation at our hospital."

As Saffron spreads across India, 2019 poll prospect looks rosy for BIP

New Delhi, Jul 27 (PTI): Prime Minister Narendra Modi's bid to retain power in 2019 looks stronger than ever, with the BJP now reigning over the north, west and the east, quite the way the Congress did in its heyday.

With JD(U) chief Nit-

ish Kumar forming a gov-ernment with the NDA in Bihar today, the BIP and its allies now rule over 70 per cent of the country's population, marking an unprecedented saffron footprint.

What's more, the BIP overwhelmingly domi-nates the major states in the country, as its alliance is in power in seven of the 12 states which send 20 or more MPs to

the Lok Sabha.

In the remaining five non-BIP-ruled states, regional parties such as the AIADMK and BJD, which overn Tamil Nadu and Odisha respectively, have been favourably disposed to the saffron camp

As the BJP expands the Congress has shrunk significantly in the last few years. The 130-yearold party now rules only in one big state, Karnataka, where the BJP under B S Yeddurappa is working overtime to upstage it in

the 2018 Assembly polls. With Nitish Kumar switching sides, the first half of its mission is almost complete as it rules the vast territory between the two regions barring West Bengal, where Mamata Banerjee is firmly in the saddle

The BJP is also present in southern India, which is the weakest link in the BJP's formidable armour. The party along with its ally TDF is in power in Andhra Pradesh. The BJP enjoys friendly ties with the rul-ing parties of Telangana and Tamil Nadu.

Kerala and West Bengal are the only major states where the saffron tint is still to strengthen.

HLL to implement 'She Pad' project by mid-August

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, JUL 27 (PTI): HLL Lifecare Limited has teamed up with the Kera-la government for launching the 'She Pad' project in state-owned schools by mid-August to promote healthy menstruation practices.

dents and teachers will benefit from the 'She Pad' project," HLL

Chairman and MD R P Khandelwal said in a release here. "Due to some technical diffi-

culties, we were not able to implement this project soon after its launch two months ago.

We have completed all for-

malities now and the project is ready for implementation," he

An awareness camp for boys for creating a healthy mindset on menstruation will also be conducted in the schools as part of the 'She Pad' project.

As many as 106 local self-government bodies, which provide funding for this project, have handed out Rs 1.5 crore to the Kerala State Women's Development Corporation

A trial project, which drew positive response from the students and teachers, was implemented in 110 and 623 government schools in Thiru-vananthapuram and Kozhikode, respectively.

The sanitary napkins to be distributed will conform to the standards set by Kerala Medical Service Corporation and Bureau of Indian Standards (BIS), the release said.

HLL has been already pro-viding sanitary napkins to

US reaffirms support to India's NSG bid; seeks others' backing

Defence Authorisation Act (NDAA) 2017, the Trump administration also re-affirmed its support for In-dia's membership in the Australia Group and Wassenaar Arrangement as soon as India meets each group's

membership criteria.

The US and India share a commitment to preventing the proliferation of weapons of mass destruction and their eans of delivery, the report said.

China has been opposing India's bid on the grounds that it is not a signatory to the Nuclear Non-Proliferation Treaty (NPT). China's oppo-sition has made India's entry into the group difficult as it is guided by the consensus principle.

A plenary meeting of the NSG in

Bern last month had discussed India's membership bid and decided to hold another meeting in November to discuss the issue.

"Since 2010, the US has supported India's membership in the four multi-lateral export control regimes -- Wassenaar Arrangement, NSG, Australia Group, and the Missile Technology Control Regime -- as India prepared to take the steps required for membership in each one," it said.

The US, the report said, welcomed India as a member of the Mis-sile Technology Control Regime and its subscription to the Hague Code of Conduct Against Ballistic Missile Proliferation in June 2016.

The report notes that the future leadership of Defence Technology and Trade Initiative (DTTI) will consist of an individual with experience in defence acquisition and tech-nology to reinforce and ensure the success of the US-India Defence Relationship. This individual will help resolve remaining issues impeding bilateral defence trade and other co-

The NDAA for FY 2017 also directs the Department to reorganise the Office of the USD (AT&L) into two new Under Secretary positions one for Research and Engineering (USD (R&E)) and one for Acquisition and Sustainment (USD (A&S)).

"This change will take effect no later than February 2018. The organisational responsibility for DTTI will be determined as part of the reorganisation of AT&L; however, this determination will not affect DTTI's ongoing work," the report said.

The US defence industry has pro-vided India with proposals for F-16 Block 70 and F/A-18 Super Hornet fighter aircraft, the report said.
"These proposals will help create

and maintain jobs in both countries and demonstrate the depth of our commitment to defence coopera-

Since 2008, the US and India have concluded more than USD 15 billion in defence trade, including the transfer from the US to India of C-130I and C-17 transport aircraft, P-8I maritime patrol aircraft, Harpoon missiles, Anache and Chinook heliconters, and M777 light-weight Howitzers.

India operates the second largest C-17 and P-8 fleets in the world, recently using its C-17s to deliver humanitarian assistance to Nepal and evacuate civilians from Yemen, the report added.

The US had designated India

a "Major Defence Partner" in June 2016 intending to elevate defence trade and technology sharing with India to a level commensurate with that of its closest allies and partners.

"The Major Defence Partner designation reflects the readiness of the United States to facilitate the export of goods and technologies for projects, programs, and joint ventures in support of official US-India defence cooperation," said the report.

In 2012, the US Department of Defence and India's Ministry of Defence established the Defence Technology and Trade Initiative (DTTI) as a means of strengthening industrial cooperation and moving away from the traditional "buyer- seller"

The US-India defence relationship has matured and strengthened significantly over the past 15 years. Our strategic partnership rests on our strategic partnership rests on our shared democratic values, se-curity interests, and strong peo-ple-to-people ties," the report said. While India has garnered the support of a majority of the group's

members, China has stuck to its stand that new members should sign the NPT. India is not a signatory to the NPT.

US-backed Syria force ousts IS from half of Raqa

backed alliance has ousted Islamic State group jihadists from half of their Syrian bas-tion Raga a monitor has said tion Raga, a monitor has said, as the escalating fighting drove up the civilian death toll to 29. The Syrian Democratic Forces have been fighting for several months to capture the northern city, which has become infamous as the Syrian heart of IS's so-called "caliphate." The SDF "are now in con-

trol of 50 percent of Raqa city despite the fierce resistance mounted by IS", Rami Abdel Rahman, head of the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights, told AFP yesterday. The SDF assault has been backed by air strikes, special forces advisers, equipment and weapons from the US-led coalition fighting IS in Syria and neighbouring Iraq.

Yesterday, a barrage of US-led air strikes across the city left at least 29 civilians dead, the British-based Observatory

said.
"At least eight children are among the dead," Abdel Rahman said.

The SDF's Arab and Kurdish fighters first entered Raqa on June 6, seven months after launching their flagship offensive for the city -- called Operation Wrath of the Euphrates.



They have since steadily advanced in a pincer-like motion, closing in on the city centre.

But IS has fought back us-ing a slew of car bombs, suicide attacks, weaponised drones and with improvised explosive devices scattered across the city. The spokeswoman for the SDF's Raqa operation told AFP that just under half the city was under SDF control.

"Forty-five percent of Raqa has been liberated. Our forc-es are advancing on all sides," Jihan Sheikh Ahmed said late yesterday. "The tighter the

noose grows around Daesh (IS), the more strongly it reacts and the tougher it fights, Ahmed said

IS first seized Raqa in early 2014, and the city has since become synonymous with the group's most gruesome atrocities. The jihadists carried out public beheadings there and is also thought to have used Raqa as a hub for planning attacks overseas

Tens of thousands of civilians have fled the escalating violence in recent months, but the United Nations estimates that up to 50,000 people remain trapped inside the city. Those who have managed to escape have told harrowing tales of dodging sniper fire and mines or paying smugglers to lead them out.

Once IS is ousted from

Raga, a body called the Raga Civil Council is expected to run the city's administrative affairs. But much of Raga's infrastructure has been devas-tated by years under jihadist rule and bombing by various parties in Syria, including the coalition. With yesterday's

deadly raids, at least 325 civilians, including 51 children, have died in the city since the SDF penetrated Raqa less than two months ago, according to

the Observatory.

Another 467 IS jihadists and 219 SDF have also been killed in the fighting. A deputy commander of the international coalition said Sunday it would have "a great deal more" to do in Syria even after Raqa is captured.

"Daesh is not defeated with the liberation of Raqa. The defeat of Daesh was not completed with the libera-tion of Mosul" in Iraq, British Major General Rupert Jones told reporters, using an Arab acronym for Islamic State. More than 330,000 people have lost their lives in Syria since the country's conflict broke out in March 2011 with anti-government pro-tests. The widespread popular demonstrations have since evolved into a complex war drawing in world powers on all sides

Yesterday, at least 14 civilians were killed when unidentified warnlanes hombed territory east of the IS-held town of Mayadeen, the Britain-based Observatory said. Five children were among the dead.

Indian in US jailed for illegally selling silencers for guns

Washington, Jul 27 (PTI): An Indian in the US has been jailed for 30 months for illegal-ly selling gun silencers and planning to smug-gle more, an American attorney has said. Mohit Chauhan, 31, a resident of Pitampura in New Delhi, was also sentenced to three years of supervised release, the Department of Justice said.

The sentencing came after he pleaded guilty before US District Judge Elizabeth Foote in Louisiana to one count of dealing firearms without a license. According to the guilty plea dated April 20, 2017, Chauhan was contacted by someone wishing to buy silencers.

Chauhan discussed by email and phone calls manufacturing silenc-ers for the potential client and importing more silencers and parts by labelling them as "auto parts" to evade US Customs. After they set up a meeting, he arrived in Shreveport on December 1 last year to meet the buyer and brought

silencer parts with him.

He travelled to a restaurant in Louisiana's Bossier City to discuss the sale details with the buyer. Agents recorded the meeting. Chauhan did not have a license to deal or conduct a business involving silencers and parts as required by law, and the silencers and parts had travelled in foreign commerce, ac-cording to a statement by the department.

Sikh family challenges Aus school's ban on boy's turban

MELBOURNE, JUL 27 (PTI): A Sikh family in Australia has launched a legal battle against a Christian school in Melbourne for denying admission to their five-year-old son be-cause he wears patka, a chidren's turban, according to a

media report.
Sidhak Singh Arora was due to start prep at Melton Christian College, in Mel-bourne's north-west, this year. But his patka does not comply with the school's uniform policy which prohibits students from wearing any type of religious head covering, ABC news reported.



His family has taken their fight to the Victorian Civil and Administrative Tribunal (VCAT), claiming the school

had breached the state's Equal Opportunity Act by discriminating against their son on religious grounds. The boy's father Sagardeep Singh Arora said he was surprised the school would not make an exemption for his son.

"I was very surprised in an advanced country like Austra-lia, they are still not allowing us to wear patka in the school,

he said.
"On the basis of that they are not giving enrolment in the school. I believe students should be allowed to practice their religion and should be allowed to wear their article of faith," he said.

Sidhak has enrolled at another school, but his parents hope Melton Christian College will be forced to change its policy so he can enrol there instead. The VCAT hearing was told the college had an open enrolment policy which allowed children of all faiths

college council Former member Stephen Liefting told the hearing they were inclusive of people of all faiths.

"As long as they don't wear clothing that promotes other religions," he said.

Principal David Gleeson gave evidence that a number of Sikh students attend the school but do not wear the

zest.""Hot wheat cornbread with orange Pie's Direwolf loaves are a favorite for Game of Thrones fans, and people are always ask-




