Sikkim, Chhattisgarh adopt direct selling guidelines: Centre

New Delhi, Nov 22 (PTI): Sikkim and Chhattisgarh have adopted model guidelines on di-rect selling while Karnataka, Maharashtra and Tamil Nadu are in the process of implementing the same, Union Con-sumer Affairs minister C

R Chaudhary said today. He said the government will consider the industry's proposal to frame a separate law to regulate the direct selling sector, which industry body Assocham expects to hit Rs 45,000 crore by 2025, from the

current Rs 7,770 crore.

The sector needs to be developed further as it has high potential to generate jobs in the country, he added.

"We had come out with model guidelines on direct selling in Sep-tember 2016. So far, Sik-kim and Chhattisgarh have adopted (them)," Chaudhary said at an Assocham event.

CM announces a stop to import of vegetables from March 2018

PANCHAYATS **URGED TO** DELIVER NOT **JUST ON THEIR DUTIES, BUT ALSO ASPIRATIONS OF** THE PEOPLE

GANGTOK, 22 Nov:
Addressing the newly Panchayat members at the State Level Panchayat Sammelan in the capital today, Chief Minister Pawan Chamling announced the doubling of salaries of the Panchayats in tune with the pay commission



Among other big announcements was a complete stop on import of vegetables from outside the State starting from

31 Mar, 2018.

The Chief Minister stated that food items imported from outside the State contains high

usage of chemical fertilizers which according to him is 'slow poison' that accumulates inside the human body. He fur-ther asked the Panchayat members to promote organic products in their respective areas.

He also stressed on occupying barren and va-cant lands with as much crops as possible.

He added that no facilities from the state government shall be provided to those land owners who have barren fields.

Terming organic farming as a sustainable and life saving occupa-

tion he urged all to work towards making Sikkim a self sustaining State in food grains by 2020.

While congratulating the elected members the Chief Minister also urged the Panchayats to do more than their obligation and assigned duties for not just materialis-tic growth but also the dreams and aspirations

of Sikkimese people.

Calling the Panchayats "PM, CM" of villages he asked them to forget the election rhetoric and campaign and work for the entire village. He also instructed the

Panchayats to give ben-

efits to poor on a need based criteria.

Tearing into parties

and individuals, the Chief Minister strongly advo-cated and spoke on the secular ethos of the state.

"Panchayats should t look at people through the prism of religion and caste," he stated. He also stressed that

he leads a secular government and belongs to a secular party.

Stating that safeguard-ing the rights of all com-munities with inclusive development as a policy, he held that equal rights for all Sikkimese is the agenda of the government.

He also added that the 12 Bhutia-Lepcha seats in the state will not decrease in future compositions of the State Assembly.

On the functioning of Panchayat units, he has appealed to the elected members to make the units self sustaining and result oriented with the chief aim of empowering the poor.

The Chief Minister also announced a Panchayat Standing Committee and District Panchayat Standing Committee which will comprise of SDF Panchayat candidates who lost in the recent elections, for-

Union Cabinet approves setting up of 15th Finance Commission

New Delhi, Nov 22 (PTI): The Cabinet today approved the setting up of the 15th Finance Commission which will assess the tax resources of the nation and suggest a formula for their devolution among states.

The members of the Commission and its terms of reference will be notified in the due course of time, Finance Minister Arun Jaitley said after the Union Cabinet meeting.

Its recommendations will have to be in place before April 1, 2020, he said. "Normally, it takes 2 years for Finance Commission to give its recommendations.

As per Article 280 of the Constitution, the Commission is required to make recommendations on the distribution of the net proceeds of taxes between the Centre and the states.

The Commission also suggests the principles which should govern the grants in aid of the revenues of the states out of the Consolidated Fund of India.

This time it will have to take into account the impact of the Goods and Services Tax, which kicked in from July, on the resources of the central as well state governments.

On who will head the 15th Finance Commission, Jaitley said: "The members of Finance Commission will appointed very very soon."

asked 15th When whether the Commission also allocate will resources to the states, he said: "I think let us not pre judge the situation. India is a Union of states, the Union also has to survive."

Butcher of Bosnia found guilty of genocide

THE HAGUE, Nov 22 (AFP): UN judges today sentenced former Bosnian Serbian commander Ratko Mladic to life imprisonment after finding him guilty of genocide and war crimes in the brutal Bal-kans conflicts over two decades ago.

The trial of the man dubbed "The Butcher of Bosnia" was the last before the International Criminal Tribu-nal for the former Yugoslavia (ICTY) and comes as the court prepares to close its doors next month.

The court found him guilty on 10 counts including genocide, war crimes and crimes against humanity committed during the 1992-1995 war that killed 100,000 people and displaced 2.2 million as ethnic rivalries tore apart Yugoslavia. But they found him not guilty of genocide in the municipalities.

"For having committed

these crimes, the chamber sentences Ratko Mladic to life imprisonnement," presiding judge Alphons Orie said, adding the crimes were "amongst the most heinous known to human kind".

After rum not attend the hearing, the for-mer general, 74, who once cut a swathe of fear against Bosnia, gave a thumbs-up as he entered the courtroom in The Hague.

But in extraordinary scenes he was ordered to be dragged from the court, when in an outburst he accused the judges of lying, after they re-fused to adjourn because he had high-blood pressure.

"The circumstances were brutal. Those who tried to defend their homes were met with ruthless force. Mass ex-ecutions occurred and some victims succumbed after being beaten," Orie said, out-lining the facts of the case against Mladic.



"Many of the perpetrators who had captured Bosnian Muslims showed little or no respect for human life, or dignity."
Today's verdict has been

long awaited by tens of thousands of victims across the bitterly-divided region, and dozens gathered early outside the courtroom in The Hague, many clutching photos of loved ones who died or are

among the 7,000 still missing Bosnia and Herzegovina:

No impunity for war criminals!", read one banner, while another had a picture of Mladic with a human skull saying: "Guilty of all!"

"We will see today. Will he be found guilty or will he be seen as a hero?" Munira Sub-asic, president of the Mothers of Srebrenica, told AFP before

Prosecutors said Mladic and his political counterpart Radovan Karadzic sought through ethnic cleansing to "permanently remove" Bosnian Muslims and Bosnian Croats from areas claimed by Bosnian Serbs.

Caught after 16 years on the run, Mladic was found guilty of the 1995 massacre in northeastern Srebrenica where troops under his comslaughtered almost 8,000 Muslim men and boys

The killings, in which the victims were marched away shot in the back and dumped in mass graves, was one of the darkest episodes in the con-flict, and has been called the worst atrocity on European

soil since World War II.
Once a brutish military commander who strode around in combat fatigues, Mladic was also found guilty of "personally directing"

44-month campaign of sniping and shelling to terrorise citizens in Bosnia's capital Sarajevo, wh 10,000 dead. which left about

Mladic was also found guilty of taking hostage more than 200 NATO military personnel and keeping them as human shields to prevent NATO air strikes against the Bosnian Serb army.

Prosecutors had called for a life sentence, after a five-year trial in which almost 600 witnesses testified and more than 10,000 exhibits were presented.

But defence lawyers --who in the past few days filed a flurry of requests to have their ailing client's health as-sessed -- have slammed his trial as "political", had called

for an acquittal.

After suffering at least three strokes, Mladic has been left with "part paralysis of the entire right side of his body," lawyer Dragan Ivetic said.

Mangan protestors plan campaign against Health Department

GANGTOK, 22 Nov:

The core group that organised the rally on 17 Nov, protesting against the engineering cell of Health Department for granting the Rs 14.09 crore contract of the up-coming district hospital to a local contractor, met at the Mangan Nagar at the Mangan Nagar Panchayat Office today to discuss ways to en-sure that the demands of the people are met. They have chalked out the pro-test campaign and have started the background work for the campaign, a press release informs.

It may be recalled that on 17 Nov, the peo-ple of Mangan walked to the District Secretariat demanding that the pro-posed new district hospital be given to a profes-sionally run private com-pany with the capability to construct the structure on a turnkey basis.

In the memorandum submitted to the office of the District Collector [North] and the press release accompanying it, it was clearly stated that the public was dissatisfied with the way the old hospital building [abandoned within ten years of commissioning] was designed, constructed and monitored.

The concerned peo-of North Sikkim therefore demanded that the recent tender notice stipulating that only local contractors are eligible be cancelled. It was demanded that another tender be floated on a turnkey basis with stipulation that only technically competent profes-sionally run construction companies with a proven record in designing and constructing such structures be eligible for con-

sideration.

The release adds that the people of North Sikkim are still await-ing a response to the memorandum which encapsulates the genuine demands of the long suffering "common man" of North Sikkim.

It is further informed that the public of North Sikkim will initiate a protest campaign which will include relay hunger strike and mass mobilisation campaign and that they are also exploring legal and other avenues if there is no response from the concerned depart-ment by 05 Dec in order to ensure that their voice is heard.

The KISS Humanitar-ian Award 2017 was presented to the 14th Dalai Lama at Kalinga In-stitute of Social Sciences (KISS). Bhubaneswar on 21 Nov. President, KIIT & KISS, Saswati Bal and founder, Prof. Achyuta Samanta presented the award before an audience of 27.000 indigenous students of the institute and a host of dignitaries, a press release The award citation

recognized his "concern for the oppressed human beings from all over the world in need of com-passion". He is a beacon of hope, aspiration and inspiration for the mil-lions of people across the world, it mentioned, while noting his strug-gles and sacrifices for the people and universal

In his acceptance speech, the Dalai Lama



called for making this century a century of compassion and peace.
"Previous centu

century was marred by violence There were world wars in which atom bombs were also used. Brains of brilliant scientists were uti-lized for destruction. Let the 21st century be the century of compassion and peace. Peace does not come from outside. rather it comes from inside. We need to destroy anger, aggression

and jealousy. Anger and violence always bring disaster and creates a fearful atmosphere. World peace can be achieved only by inner peace," the 1989 Nobel Peace Prize

winner said. "Past is past, but fu-ture is in our hand. Your generation is the custodian of 21st century. You are the people who can create new shape of future. You have the oppor-tunity and responsibility to create a new world,

"Compassion is intrinsic in human nature. All seven billion people of the world have come from mothers. Our lives start with mothers' love. So we all must share love. All human beings are same - mentally, physically and emotionally. Division of people on the basis of caste, colour, etc. is totally wrong. Underprivileged people should not have inferiority complex. You should be self confident and work hard," the Dalai Lama

Deliberating on the role of education, he stated, "Existing modern education is inadequate as it focuses on material value and fame. Secular education should include moral education. Research is now going on to figure out how best to do it." He suggested KISS to carry out experiments to include moral education.

"India is the most pulated democratic populated populated democratic country and an ancient civilization. This country has produced most brilpeople, including Buddhist masters. Buddia. Modern world lacks moral principles and knowledge to tackle our destructive emotions. Ancient Indian psychology was very advanced and still very relevant to deal with this problem. You should feel proud of your rich history, heri-tage and traditions," he told the students.

The literal meaning of the title Dalai Lama is 'ocean monk' and he is regarded as 'the ocean of compassion', said Prof Achvuta Samanta introducing the recipient in his presentation speech "We feel fortunate to get turn to pg03



Tamil Nadu are in the process of implementing the norms. "We can-not force states to adopt the guidelines. However, we hope more states will implement it," he added.

The guidelines, which offer clarity on the direct selling sector,

has prohibited pyramid as well as money circulation schemes in the garb of direct selling business.

On industry's demand to frame a separate law, the minister, on the sidelines of the event, said: "We are going slow on this. We will do it gradually. First, we have issued guidelines and the next step is framing a law. We will certainly think on these lines." Earlier addressing the event,

the minister said a progressive legislation is required as there is still some "drawback" in the system.

Any business can grow if the regulatory systems are in place to facilitate production to marketing of products, he added, highlighting the government schemes, including Start-Up India launched to en-

courage entrepreneurs.
Assocham Consumer Affairs
Council Chairman Vijay Sardana said, "Enterprise spirit has been evoked by the government by launching schemes like Start-Up India and Stand-Up India.

These schemes will not be successful unless direct selling industry is strengthened and promoted."

Much of the focus of these schemes is on boosting production and there is no policy to facilitate marketing, he observed.

So, the Suicide Rate is still high in Sikkim

And there are still no real initiatives to arrest the development

The latest data of the National Crime Records Bureau is of year 2015 vintage. Those stats have been spoken about earlier as well, but given that suicides continue to remain a largely unaddressed and disturbingly regular occurrence, the problem requires to figure routinely in our conversations as well.

With 241 lives lost to suicides in the year 2015, Sikkim posted a suicide rate of 37.5 suicides per one lakh population, worryingly more than three times the national suicide rate of 10.5. It continues to hold the ignominy of being the State with the highest suicide rate. The only other place with a higher suicide rate being the Union Territory of Puducherry with a suicide rate of 43.5%. For those looking for any consolation in the statistics, the only glimmer comes when 2015 is compared against year 2010 when Sikkim recorded 280 suicides - astounding 45.9 suicides per lakh of population. What needs to be borne in mind is that the ignominy of being the suicide capital of the country comes Sikkim's way even with the official records. Everyone who has suffered a loss to suicide in the family or among friends will know that not all suicides end up getting recorded as such. Given the low numbers [in absolute terms] one is dealing with here, it becomes obvious that should every suicide get recorded as such, the suicide rate [worked per lakh of population] would spike substantially, making the numbers even more distressing.

Such distress should not be necessary any more to invite the attention of everyone concerned, should it?

It is unanimously accepted that the Sikkimese society faces a major challenge in the growing tendency among its people to take their own lives, so rankings [in suicide rate lists] and statistics should not be required any more to shock people and their representatives into action. What should be making headlines and feeding public discourse should be the corrective action that is being planned and not just how Sikkim is scoring when it comes to suicides. The public domain should not still be discussing the high incidence of suicides in Sikkim because that has been an established fact for a while now and the outcry should instead be directed at building pressure on policy makers and people's organisations to do something about it. That, unfortunately, is still not happening. By now, the State should have set up a task force to study suicides and inform the next course of action on how to arrest the

It should also be recognised that suicides are a social challenge, and state intervention alone will not suffice and a solution will require extensive collaboration of the community and its representative organisations. Also, in the absence of adequate public pressure, the State intervention will end up being typically token and expectedly superficial. Given the nature of the challenge, what could prove to be even more effective is initiative. Should a group of professionals with adequate expertise agree to collaborate on assisting Sikkim in addressing the challenge of suicides, State support would obviously follow. These experts need not necessarily be from Sikkim and could be contacted and approached by NGOs and other civil society organisations based here which could play the role of the facilitators. Should a group here take up the issue in the right earnest, finding the experts will not be difficult, and should State endorsement and funding be committed, Sikkim could finally begin the process of addressing the issue in earnest. One must bear in mind that while the NCRB might have placed Sikkim in the top position in as much as suicides are concerned. it is not an issue which will attract the Centre's attention because when it looks at the figures, it will not be unduly disturbed by the numbers – 241 deaths by suicide in Sikkim (in 2015) against the 16,970 suicides in Maharastra.

So, when it comes to tackling suicides, it will have to be Sikkim and its people who will have to take the initiative.

From Ayurveda to biomedicine: understanding the human body

What is a human body? This may seem a facetious question, but the answer will be very different ac-cording to which medical tradition you consult. Take Ayurveda, a traditional system of medical knowledge from India which has enjoyed a re-naissance of popularity in the West since the 1980s - and is the subject of a new exhibition at London's Wellcome Collection.

Walking round the show, one is couraged to explore different ways of understanding and visualising the human body. The Ayurvedic body dif-fers significantly from that of Europe-an biomedicine, which is based on dissection. The Ayurvedic body is a body of systems. It is conceptualised as being composed of five constituent parts (mahābūta), seven body substances (dhātu) and three regulating qualities (dosa). According to Ayurvedic theory, by attending to imbalances between these principles in a body, health might be promoted and illness avoided. The Ayurvedic concepts of the dosas – vata, pitta and kapha can be seen in the West today promoting teas, soaps and massages.

But of course, there are many other different conceptions of the hu-man body. There is the tantric understanding, often conflated with that of Ayurveda. Tantra focuses on the concept of energy channels (nāḍīs) which have particular centres of con-centration along a line in the centre of the body (chakras). The traditional Chinese model, on the other hand, emphasises the dynamic principles of ying and yang as being paramount for ensuring health. Meanwhile, in-digenous healing in many traditional cultures identifies problems between the individual and the greater so-cial and metaphysical context as the cause of illness

COMPETING MEDICAL SYSTEMS

So what, then, has determined the dominance of one medical system of thought over another? The answer is far more complex than the "correct" or "most accurate" one.

This complexity is epitomised by the central piece of the exhibition, one of very few illustrations of the classical Ayurvedic systemic descriptions of the human body. This 16th-century drawing, as Dominik Wujastyk's research has shown, was probably produced at the request of a rich, Nepalese patron by a schol-ar-physician, a scribe and a painter, none of whom were fluent with the original Sanskrit source. The Nepal-ese artist was clearly influenced by Tibetan medical illustrations.

We don't know how this image was originally used or how influential it was, but its creation was dependent upon patronage and intercultural exfrom local Indian populations, to serve what were considered to be the greater needs of the British Empire.

As I have argued elsewhere, reactions to the tragic deaths of millions of Indians transformed yoga. Swami Vivekananda was inspired by the effects of famine and plague to rede-fine Karma Yoga as a social-service mission. Many leaders of the Indian independence movement, including Mahatmas Gandhi and Mohan Malaviya, promoted Indian approaches to medicine and health. dicine and health.

And so the establishment of the

modern Indian nation was closely linked with the health of millions of



change. It was out of this mix of cultures, then, that came one of the m iconic visual presentations of the "In-

dian" Ayurvedic body.

Economic and political powers are strong influences on the shape and popularity of Indian concepts of the body today. Yoga is currently the most widespread Indian approach to promoting the health of the body. It is flourishing globally. Millions attest that yoga makes them feel better and Ayurvedic concepts are often presented as integral to yoga practices.

But it is not well known that the contemporary global interest in Ayurveda and yoga is partially a result of colonial mismanagement of India. This point is creatively illustrated in the Wellcome's new show through an interactive commission by the artist Ranjit Kandalgaonkar. Millions of lives were lost throughout the colo-nial period due to forcible redistribuindividual Indian bodies through "Indian" systems of healing. This contin-ues today as the prime minister Narendra Modi demonstrates through his association with Indian's popular "yoga-televangelist" Swami Ramdev and the elevation of traditional medicine to that of an independent government department.

The promotion and preservation of Indian medicinal knowledge is laudable. But it is important not to oversimplify complex and sophisti-cated descriptions rooted in different worldviews. Economic imperatives often flatten traditions into market-able exports – and intercultural ex-changes both enrich and confuse our models of understanding

MANY UNDERSTANDINGS

So should there be one answer, one dominant understanding of the body? I'm currently part of a team researching the overlaps between

yoga, Ayurvedic medicine and Indian longevity practices (rasāyana) over the past 1000 years. Our research emphasises a plurality of under-standings through time. Both yoga and Ayurveda are characterised by a diversity of practices, as well as by internal conceptual coherency. Millennia of intercultural exchange has created problems for asserting national ownership of traditional medical knowledge.

All medical systems have shared

interests in promoting human health and longevity. But it is important to understand the differences as well as the similarities. As early as 1923, Indian commentators were expressing concern about the potential biomedical "mining" of traditional remedies for single active ingredients. One commentator in the Usman Report, a pan-Indian survey of over 200 in-digenous medical practitioners, asks: "Does this amount to quackery" by

biomedical physicians?

Today, our mental image of our bodies is largely picture built up from dissection and, more recently, x-rays and various other scans. Yet in practice, we understand our bodies as a changing system. We monitor our energy levels. We adjust how we feel with food, drink, sleep, exercise and drugs. The Ayurvedic, system-orient-ed body, then, is perhaps not that far from most people's daily experience. So how might we better visualise our bodies based on our lived, somatic

understandings?
Ayurveda is a rich and complex tradition that has always encompassed influences from a variety of cultures as well as retaining very specific, local applications. Ayurveda cannot be reduced to a simple definition, marketing slogan or quantifiable national export. The Wellcome's new show explores these complicat-ed relationships and raises important questions. If we are not to become "quacks" ourselves, we must contin-ue to resist reductions of the human body into a single visual model.

Kazakhstan is changing its alphabet - here's why

Kazakhstan is to adopt a new alphabet, replac-ling the Russian Cyrillic script with the alpha-bet you are reading at the moment. This was announced in October by the Kazakh president, Nur-sultan Nazarbayev, who signed decree Number 569, which also sets out an expanded version of the Roman alphabet – to be introduced in schools in 2018. The aim is for full transition by 2025

The Cyrillic script currently used for Kazakh has 42 symbols (33 derived from the Russian alphabet plus nine for additional Kazakh sounds). Because the Roman alphabet contains just 26 letters, additional provision has had to be made. The new Ka-zakh script will use the apostrophe to extend the number of letters to 32. According to The Guardian the official name of the country, Қазақстан Республикасы, will henceforth be rendered Qazaqstan Respy'blikasy.

The proposed switch of alphabets has been in the pipeline at least since 2006, so this pronouncement should have caused little surprise. The plan

was announced in April, building on propos-als put forward in December 2012 as part of the president's Kazakhstan-2050 strategy, where the political rationale comes across unequivocally: "For the sake of the future of our children we should this decision

[adopt the Roman alphabet] and create it as a condition of entry for our wider global integration." Another reason why Nazarbayev's decree should

have come as no surprise is that periodic language reform is very much part of the landscape in Kazakhstan. Kazakhstan, which has a population of 18.2m people, is a multilingual country with 117 spoken languages. Russian remains the dominant language of communication – but the prestige of Kazakh is increasing. The official policy is one of societal trilingualism (Kazakh-Russian-English), with particular support for "the state language" – what the Kazakh-stan-2050 strategy calls "the spiritual pivot".

Kazakhstan occupies a strategic position in Central Asia and shifting allegiances can be clearly charted in the history of script reform. Early Runic scripts were gradually replaced by the Arabic script following the introduction of Islam in the 8th century. In 1924, the inherited Arabic script was modified to better reflect the sounds of Kazakh. which gave way to a Roman-based script in 1929. This, in turn, was replaced by Cyrillic in 1940, un-

der the Soviet-era policy of russification.
Following the break-up of the Soviet Union, neighbouring Uzbekistan and Turkmenistan quickly adopted the Roman script, Kazakhstan, the last of the former Soviet republics to declare indepen dence, was politically more cautious. The economic situation in the early 1990s didn't permit the lux-ury of alphabet reform, but a rapid upturn in the economic fortunes of the nation since 2000 has meant an increasing commitment to Western ideals, to communication with the West, to learning English and to adopting its script

TONGUE-TIED

The English-speaking world is not used to state-lev el intervention in the language, meddling in how it should be structured and how it will be used. Pro-posals for an official language body have come and gone over the centuries, but English - unusually in

the international context

- is relatively unplanned.

Language planning (sometimes referred to as language manage-ment or cultivation) ment - and the associated development of language policies – is not just a state-level matter but also characterises how relationships play out

at other levels: in education, in religious groups, in business, even within families. Wherever language practices are controlled or modified by those in authority (parents, teachers, religious or business leaders) we have language planning.

Sticking to state-level planning for now, there are plenty of examples: German was subject to orthographic reform in 1998 including limiting the use of the ß symbol and relaxing its rules about the use of commas. Meanwhile, Icelandic vocabulary is closely scrutinised and monitored to keep it free from foreign borrowings. The role of the Académie française in moderating the French language is well known.

Is the direction in language planning always and inevitably top-down? Is it always the ideology of the dominant party (government, teacher, parent)

which dictates language practices and prevails?

The term "language planning" was coined in the 1960s to describe the ongoing process of state-lev-el intervention in Norway. Successive reforms in the spelling and structure of both standard forms of Norwegian – the "Bokmål" (book language) and "Nynorsk" (New Norwegian) – were introduced as part of a process which would ultimately lead them to converge into a single standard variety of the language ("Samnorsk", or Common Norwegian).

Generations of Norwegians objected to the constant changes but seemed powerless to prevent further reform coming down from Norway's Language Council. However, it appears now that the will of the people has prevailed in Norway and the official policy has shifted from direct engineering of the written forms of Norwegian to leaving them alone to develop organically. Norway will continue to write the two forms of the language into the foreseeable future. The "success" of language poli-

cies depends crucially on their political context WATCH YOUR LANGUAGE

In Kazakhstan, it is unlikely that the direction of influence in language planning will change very soon. Language policy will continue to be pursued in the post-Soviet regions "as a central vector for change in the reconfiguring sociopolitical constellations for some time to come". In other words, it's more about politics than language.

Despite the enormous practical challenges inherent in the wholesale replacement of one script with another in a country of massive linguistic variety, we can be sure that Decree 569 will be made to work, heedless of "a swell of indignant reactions among nationalistically inclined commentators in Russia".

While such top-down intervention in language practices may stick in the craw of monolingual English speakers, used to a decidedly bottom-up approach to managing the national language, the Kazakh policy of trilingualism (the "three-language policy") is one we should respect. As Britain pre-pares to leave the EU, like Kazakhstan, Britain wil have cause to reconsider its international political

In pursuit of "wider global integration" Britain would do well to cling to the official EU language policy of multilingualism and the recommendation that "every European citizen should master two other languages in addition to their mother tongue".

Nepal prepares for 1st phase of provincial, parliamentary polls

SHIRISH B PRADHAN KATHMANDU, NOV 22 (PTI): Nepal today geared up for the first round of provincial and parliamentary polls seen as the last step in the country's transition to a federal democracy, with all the parties making all-out efforts to convince voters by holding rallies and doorto-door campaigning.

his party to safeguard democracy. He said that the Nepali Congress will emerge victorious in the elections despite an alliance forged among the CPN-UML, CPN-Maoist Centre and other fringe leftist

Speaking at an election rally in Solukhumbu district, he said that

selfish interest, and it would collapse soon after the elections.

The leftist electoral alliance would endanger democracy in the

country," he claimed.

Meanwhile, CPN-UML Chairman KP Sharma Oli has said the upcoming elections are vital for the economic prosperity and political stability in the country and the alliance between his party and CPN (Maoist Center) is essential.

Speaking at another pro-gramme in Nawalparasi district, Oli alleged that the Nepali Congress leadership could not bail the country out of the current political crisis.

Earlier, the NC and the two Madhes-based parties had been engaged in negotiations, but could not forge an electoral alliance.

Meanwhile, police arrested five cadres of Netra Bikram Chand led Nepal Communist Party (NCP) from Syangja district in western Nepal and three from Ilam district in eastern Nepal today.

The police said that the NCP cadres were arrested for carrying out anti-poll activities.

Around half a dozen small bombs were exploded in various parts of the country over the weekend targeting candidates, in which at least a dozen people were injured. The role of the NCP is suspected in some of these incidents.

Election campaign will end on

Friday mid-night, 48 hours ahead of the polls.

The polls are taking place under a new Constitution passed by law-makers in September 2015 as part of a peace process that began with the end of a decade-long civil war. The polls are a major step toward implementing the new Constitution.

Sinha also announced a direct bi-weekly Air India flight from Delhi to Imphal from January next year, which he said would be made a daily service when the demand picks up.

No-frills private air lines Indigo will soon start services from Guwahati to

Silchar and Aizwal, he said yesterday He also announced that Spicejet will be procuring seaplanes that could seat 9-10 passengers and land on smaller

The carrier is buying a large number of these seaplanes and is looking to operate in the Northeast, connecting smaller airstrips. These planes will accommodate about 9-10 people

This will also improve connectivity in the Northeast," Sinha said.

He was speaking at the inaugural session of the 'North East Development Summit', a two-day event organised by India Foundation, a think tank with links to the BJP, and the Government of Manipur.

Sinha also informed that the construction of the Pakyong airport in Sikkim was complete and it will make reaching the northern part of the state especially tourist attractions such as Nathu La Pass, easier.

The Code, which became operational in December last year, provides for a market-deter-mined and time-bound insolvency resolution process. It is implement-ed by the corporate af-

fairs ministry.

The Cabinet today The Cabinet today approved bringing in an ordinance to make "some changes" in the Code, Jaitley told reporters

Details about the proposed changes could not be immediately ascertained.

The move also comes at a time when there are concerns in certain quarters about various aspects of the law, in-cluding the possibility of promoters wresting back control of a compa-ny under the insolvency process.

The ministry has al-ready set up a 14-member committee to identify and suggest ways to address issues faced in implementation of the

"The adjudicatory chamber found Mr. Lai, Mr. Rocha and Mr. Esquivel guilty of having violated article 21 (bribery and corruption) of the FIFA Code of Ethics," said a statement from the ethics watchdog of world football's governing body.

"The officials are banned for life

from all football- related activities...

at national and international level," it added.

The three are among the 42 officials and marketing executives who have been indicted by the United States justice department as part of its sprawling probe into football corruption.
Esquivel, who also served as the

vice president of South American governing body CONMEBOL, plead-ed guilty to racketeering and wire

He admitted to taking bribes in exchange for the awarding of football media and marketing rights. Rocha, who once headed Nicara-

gua's football association, pleaded guilty to similar offences in Decem-Lai, in addition to his FIFA role,

also led the football association in his native Guam.

He pleaded guilty in April to a va-



Govt approves wage policy framework for CPSE workmen

NEW DELHI, NOV 22 (PTI): Th government today approved a policy framework for central public sector enterprises (CPSEs) to ne-gotiate the next round of wage revision with their workmen.

The move is likely to impact 9.35 lakh unionised workmen in central public sector enterprises.

The decision to clear the 'Wage Policy for the 8th Round of Wage negotiations for workmen in central public sector enterprises (CPSEs)' was taken at a meeting of the Union Cabinet chaired by Prime

Minister Narendra Modi here.

There are nearly 12.34 lakh employees of 320 CPSEs in the country, of whom some 2.99 lakh employees are board level and below-board level executives and



non-unionised supervisors. The remaining 9.35 lakh belong to the unionised workmen category. Wage revision in respect of unionised workmen is decided by trade unions and managements of

CPSEs in terms of guidelines issued by the Department of Public Enterprises (DPE) for wage negotiations.

"The wage revision shall be subject to the condition that there shall be no increase in labour cost

per physical unit of output. In exceptional cases, where CPSEs are already working at optimum capacity, the administrative ministry/department may consult the Department of Public Enterprises considering industry norms," an official statement said.

According to the decision taken, the management of CPSEs would be "free" to negotiate wage revision for workmen where the periodicity of wage settlement for 5 years or 10 years "expired generally" on December 31, 2016, keeping in view the affordability and fi-nancial sustainability of such wage revision for the CPSEs concerned.

"No budgetary support for any wage increase shall be provided by the government. The entire financial implication would be borne by the respective CPSEs from the internal sources.

"In those CPSEs in which the government has approved restructuring or revival plan, the wage revision will be done as per the provisions of the approved restructuring or revival plan only." the statement said.

Besides, CPSEs must ensure

that any increase in wages after negotiations does not result in in-crease in administered prices of their goods and services.

"The management of the CPSEs concerned has to ensure that negotiated scales of pay do not exceed the existing scales of pay of exec-utives/officers and non-unionised supervisors of respective CPSEs.

"To avoid conflict of pay scales of executives/non- unionised su-pervisors with that of workmen, CPSEs may consider adoption of graded DA neutralisation and/or graded figment during the wage negotiations," said the statement. The validity period of wage settlement will be for a minimum

5 years for those who opted for a 5-year periodicity and a maximum 10 years for those who have gone in for a 10- year periodicity of wage negotiation with effect from January 1, 2017.

CPSEs will implement the ne-gotiated wages after confirming with their administrative ministry or department that the wage settlement is in conformity with approved parameters.

2 Indianorigin men killed in UK air collision

LONDON, NOV 22 (PTI): An 18-year-old Indi-an-origin trainee pilot an-origin trainee pilot and his compatriot in-structor were among four persons killed in a mid-air collision be-tween a light aircraft and a helicopter in southeast England, police confirmed today.

Savaan Mundae aeronautics student from Buckinghamshire student New University who was training to be a commercial pilot, died with his instructor Jaspal Bahra in the Cessna 152 on No-

vember 17.

Both Mundae and 27-year-old Bahra were British citizens.

The two others killed in the crash in a field in Buckinghamshire another British flight trainer, 74-year- old trainer, 74-year- old Michael Green and his 32-year-old Vietnam-ese trainee pilot Thanh Nguven, who were in the helicopter on a training session.

"The air accident is being investigated by the Air Accident Investigation Branch (AAIB), Our thoughts remain with the families of those involved in the accident. Our family liaison officers con-tinue to offer support victim's families. Thames Valley Police said in a statement following formal identification of the victims.

Both aircraft came from Wycombe Air Park, also known as Booker Airfield, near High Wy-combe, which offers flight training.

They crashed shortly

after takeoff in woodlands in Upper Winchendon in the village of Waddesdon.

"These amazing peo-ple lost their lives but they both died doing what they love and what they believe in... I fly with these guys and being a pilot is what I've want-ed to do since I was very young, but it's hit me hard," Benjamin Hant, who studied air transport with commercial pilot training along with Mundae, said in a social media tribute.

Air accident experts are still investigating the cause behind the collision. Both aircraft disintegrated on impact and

plummeted to the ground.
The wreckage from both aircraft have now been taken to the AAIB headquarters in Hampshire while it continues its investigation.

Bangladesh sentences to death six 1971 war crimes accused

ANISHR RAHMAN

Dнака, Nov 22 (PTI): A special Bangladeshi tribunal today sen-tenced to death six hardline Islamists, including a former lawmaker, for committing crimes against humanity and siding with the Pakistani troops in car-

rying out the genocide in 1971.
A three-judge panel of Bangladesh's International Crimes Tribunal (ICT-BD) handed down the capital punishment to the six members of the Jamaat-e-Islami saying, the charges against them were "proved beyond doubt." "They be convicted accordingly and sentenced there under to death under section 20(2) of the International Crimes (Tribunals) Act, 1973," pronounced chair of the panel Justice Shahinur Islam.

The verdict came as Bangladesh nearly completed the long-delayed trial of 1971 war crimes since the high-powered tribunal was established in 2010.

The tribunal is charged with the task to try persons responsible for committing genocide, crimes against humanity, war crimes and other crimes under international law committed during the country's 1971 Lib-eration War.

The six men sentenced to death hail from northwestern Gaibandha and belong to fundamentalist Jamaat-e-Islami, the party which was opposed to Bangladesh's 1971 independence and joined hands with Pakistani troops in carrying out

But only one of the six convicts faced the trial in person while the rest, including former Jamaat lawmaker Abu Saleh Mohammad Abdul Aziz Mia, were tried in absentia as they were on

Under a special law, the convicts, however, could challenge the judgement before the apex Appellate Division of the Supreme Court.

Bangladesh has so far execut-ed six 1971 war crimes convicts, five of them Jamaat leaders and one Bangladesh Nationalist Party leader, the main Opposition since the trial process began in

Skype joins list of apps on China blacklist

SHANGHAI, Nov 22 (AFP): Skype has apparently joined the lengthening list of internet tools on China's blacklist, disappearing from download stores with Apple saying today it was ordered by the government to re-

move certain apps.

Skype is no longer available for download from the Chinese Apple Store or popular An-droid sites, with Chinese web-users saying it had been gone for weeks.

"We have been notified by the Ministry of

Public Security that a num-ber of VoIP (voice over internet pro-tocol) apps

do not comply with local law, therefore these apps have been removed from the App Store in China," Apple said in an emailed statement.

"These apps remain available in all other markets where they do business."

The company did not specify which laws such apps were found to have violated.

China has tightened its already stringent on-line policing this year, including enacting new rules that require tech companies to store user data inside the country as well as imposing fresh restrictions on what is permissible content.

Chinese authorities appeared to severely disrupt the WhatsApp messaging app as they ratch-eted up security ahead of a Communist Party congress in October that saw President Xi Jinping consolidate his hold on

the country.

The moves have prompted speculation on the Chinese internet that authorities were moving against services with effective encryption, like WhatsApp and Skype that make them less vulnerable to government monitoring. The change does not seem to have af fected use of previously downloaded versions of Skype, which appeared to work normally

Also, Skype Business, a separate app tailored for corporate use, was still available for down-load in China.

Skype's removal fol-lows Apple's August decision to strike out so-called VPN apps, or virtual private networks,

which allow users to skirt the so-called "Great Firewall of China"

system of online censorship.

Both cases under-scored the dilemma faced by US tech companies seeking to uphold principles of web freedom while holding on to their Chinese market

"We would rather not remove the apps, but like in other countries, we obey the laws where we do business," Apple chief Tim Cook said after the VPN move.

China has for years blocked leading foreign websites or services including Facebook, Twitter, Instagram and a number of news organ-isations, largely to prevent content that could challenge party rule.

NOV 22 (PTI): The US is opposed to any alteration or expansion of the veto power enjoyed by the permanent members of the UN Security Council, but supports a modest expansion of the 15-member apex wing of the world body, a top official has said. The State Department spokesperson said a reformed council must reflect the realities of the 21st century and be able to meet the challenges of this century.

The US remains open in principle to the idea of UN Security Council reform, including a modest expansion of the Securi-

ty Council, the official said.
"We believe a reformed council must reflect the realities of the 21st century and be able to meet the challenges of this century with enhanced - and not diminished - effectiveness and efficiency," the spokesperson told PTI yesterday.

The official added that the



US remained opposed to any alteration or expansion of the veto power enjoyed by the perma-nent members of the UN Security Council.

The spokesperson was asked about reform of the UNSC in view of the differences that emerged between the Gener-al Assembly and the Security Council during the just concluded election to the International Court of Justice (ICJ).

IRANIAN HACKER CHARGED FOR LEAKING GAME OF THRONES SEASON 07

Remember the 'Game of Thrones' leak? An Iranian hacker was charged with stealing HBO scripts to raise bitcoin

The HBO hack that gave 'Game of Thrones' fans a tantalizing taste of unaired Season 7 episodes has a culprit: A former Iranian military hacker who was in it for the

money.

U.S. prosecutors charged Behzad Mesri with stealing material including scripts to 'Game Of Thrones' this summer, saying he demanded \$6 billion in untraceable digital currency as extortion.

Mesri is believed to still

be in Iran but the charges should send a message to everyone who attacks U.S. targets, said officials.

"He will forever be look-ing over his shoulder and if he isn't, he should be," said U.S. Attorney Joon Kim in a press conference Tuesday in the U.S. Attorney's Office for the Southern District of New York in New York City.

Mesri once worked for the Iranian government as a hacker, where he attacked nuclear software systems and Israeli infrastructure, according to the grand jury indictment released Tuesday

In this attack, however, it appeared he was only hoping for an enormous payout for his hacking, paid in untraceable bitcoin. When HBO didn't pay, Mesri begin leaking the shows on July 30.

According to emails re leased in July HBO offered to make a good faith payment of \$250,00 as part of the negotiations. HBO would not

he began leaking videos of the shows. Some of the material Mesri is alleged to have leaked included the HBO logo with

an image of Game of Thrones Winter King superimposed over it, with the words "Win-ter is Coming. HBO is Falling," added in.
