India, China put behind Dokalam, agree

to move on

XIAMEN, SEP 5 (PTI): Putting behind the Dokalam standoff, India and China today agreed to move forward in their ties with Chinese Pres-ident Xi Jinping telling Prime Minister Narendra Modi that he wants to put the relationship on the "right track".

Days after the pro-longed standoff in the Dokalam area of the Sikbukaiam area of the Sik-kim sector was defused, the two leaders held an hour- long meeting which Modi described as 'fruitful".

During their meet-ing here, the two lead-ers agreed that the two countries should make more efforts, including strengthening cooperation between their secu-rity personnel, to ensure that such incidents do

not recur.

"Met President Xi Jinping. We held fruitful talks on bilateral rela-tions between India and China," Modi tweeted after meeting Xi.
Briefing reporters af-

ter the meeting, Foreign Secretary S Jaishankar said the approach was "forward-looking" during the "constructive" meet-ing in which it was reaffirmed that maintaining peace and tranquillity in the border areas was a pre-requisite for the de-velopment of India-China relations. Asked if both the

MHA gives financial powers to it secys

NEW DELHI, SEP 5 (PTI): In an effort to speed-up projects, the Home Min-istry has given financial powers to the joint secretaries who can now spend up to Rs 50 crore for executing works and purchasing land, an official said.

Ioint secretaries have also been allowed to make procurement through open or limit-ed tender up to Rs 20 crore and procurement through negotiated or single tender or propri-etary contract up to Rs 5

crore.

This is for the first

time that such financial powers have been given to joint secretaries to bring greater flexibility in operations, reduce de and facilitate quick decision on matters involving financial expen-diture, a home ministry official said.

The decision has been taken by Union Home Secretary Rajiv Gauba, who assumed charge on August 31.

Three months since ploded in the hills, the Gorkhaland movement is fast slipping into the abyss of an

intra-party power squabble.

The Gorkha Janmukti
Morcha (GJM), which had triggered the movement, is now sharply divided into the Bimal Gurung and Binay Tamang camps and so are the people. The syndrome manifested amply on Tuesday when supporters of both camps brought out rallies at Kurseong opposing the other.

The split in the leadership has also introduced a split in loyalty among the people. While some are rooting for Gurung and his brand of politics, others are cheering Tamang and his prescription of withdrawing the bandh. Worryingly for Gurung, backed by the state government, Ta-mang's remedy is slowly, but steadily gaining momentum.

On Monday it was Mirik that had illustrated courage to defy Gurung's fatwa of the bandh and made serious at-tempts to restore normalcy with a degree of success. On Tuesday, the pattern spread to Kurseong, albeit haltingly.

Gurung must be aware how his absolute control over the hill people is slipping away through his fingers. But, such is the caprice of life that he can do nothing, but tolerate the turn of events simmering in his hideout, wherever The people meanwhile are

showing a change in fealty. Under Gurung when life dealt lemons for them they made lemonade. Now, although not completely under Binay Tamang's camp, when life is dealing them tomatoes, they

are making Bloody Mary.
So which way would the separate state movement lead to from here on? Will the Gorkhaland Movement Coordination Committee (GMCC), the all-hill-party platform that was supposed to give direction to the movement exert authority and navigate the movement, which it has miserably failed to?

Barring the GJM, no single hill party is on date capable of leading the mass or speak for it. The GJM is falling apart and its top

leaders are on the run, the GMCC has proved impotent, the hill parties have trashed the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration (GTA). The mechanisms that could have brought the movement to a logical conclusion have ei ther dried up or are in the process of withering away.

Agree or not, the state
government has outsmarted

the movement protagonists in their own game. There is a time for bluster and there is a time for reconciliation. The proposed September 12 talks would provide yet another

opportunity to call for truce with dignity. The question, would Gurung and his associ-

ates avail of it?

The September 12 talks might fail, which is acceptable since the Gorkhaland issue is a serious one and expecting a hunky dory outcome to such an issue in one sitting would be impractical. Negotiations can continue thereafter, but breaking the ice, engaging in meaningful dialogue and withdrawing the bandh is the need of the hour

The writing otherwise is on the wall.

These financial powers were earlier exercised at the level of Union home secretary, special secretary and additional secretary.

There are around 20 joint secretaries in the home ministry handling different divisions, and the financial powers have been given to them for the first time.

ident Xi talked about inter-governmental mechanisms such as joint economic group, security group and strategic group which can help both countries move forward laishankar said.

The two leaders also emphasised on the need to make efforts to enhance and strengthen the mutual trust between the two sides, he said, adding that it was felt that "the security and defence personnel must maintain strong contacts and cooperation and ensure that the situation which happened recently does not recur."

Jaishankar said it was natural between two neighbours or large powers to have differences but they should be handled with mutual respect and efforts should be made to find common ground in addressing them.

He said that there was a reaffirmation of the Astana spirit that the two sides will not allow differences to become disputes

disputes.

There was a very strong affirmation at the leadership level that it is in the interest of both the countries to keep this relationship on an upward trajectory, the foreign secretary said.

In his initial remarks during the meeting, Modi congratulated Xi on hosting a "very successful" BRICS Summit, saying that the conference was a success in making the grouping more relevant in a fast-changing world.

in a fast-changing world.

Xi told Modi that,
"China would like to
work with India to uphold the five principles
of peaceful coexistence
(Panchsheel), advance
political mutual trust,
mutually beneficial cooperation and move forward the development of
bilateral relations along
the right track," according to Chinese Foreign
Ministry spokesman
Geng Shuang.

Geng, while briefing reporters in Beijing, said that during the meeting, "President Xi stressed that China and India are each others' opportunities not threats."

"We hope India can view China's development in a correct and rational way." Geng quoted Xi as saying. Asked whether the

recent standoff at Dokalam figured in the talks, Geng said, "Xi pointed out that China and India should respect each other, seek common ground and shelve differences to ensure peace and tranquillity in the border areas."

The Modi-Xi meeting comes amid diplomatic efforts by the two sides to overcome the bitterness caused by the 73-day face-off between their troops in the Dokalam area.

The Chinese and the Indian troops were engaged in a standoff since June 16 after the Indian side stopped the construction of a road by the Chinese Army.

Chinese Army.
On August 28, India's
External Affairs Ministry announced that New
Delhi and Beijing have
decided on "expeditious
disengagement" of their
border troops in the disputed Dokalam area.

Geng, in his remarks said, "As far as I know, Prime Minister Modi agreed that the two sides should work together to ensure peace and tranquillity in the border areas."

During the meeting, Xi told Modi that if the bilateral relationship can grow in a sound and steady way it would serve the interests of the two countries and also serve the joint aspirations of the region, according to Geng.

"Xi stressed that Chi-

"Xi stressed that China and India are each other's important neighbours and two important markets and emerging countries," Geng said. The Chinese President said that "in recent years the two sides reached wide consensus on developing bilateral relations including strengthening partnership. The two sides have been moving forward and making headway upholding this principle," according to Geng.

Geng quoted Xi as telling Modi that, "We need to show to the world that the peaceful coexistence and win-win cooperation is the only right choice between the two countries. The two countries should shelve differences and seek common ground and together ensure peace and tranquillity at the borders."

Xi also called for alignment of strategies to expand economic cooperation. "On the economic and

"On the economic and social development, the two countries have great potential for cooperation which should see greater synergy in strategy alignment, expand cooperation in infrastructure connectivity as well as international affairs," the Chinese president said.

"Together we can

"Together we can move the international order in a more equitable and reasonable way," Xi told Modi, according to Geng.

Sports Minister visits Bhaichung Stadium, expresses dissatisfaction over work

NAMCHI, 05 SEPT

Subba, Department Secretary, SD Dhakal along with the Engineering Cell of the department visited the construction site of Bhaichung Stadium at Namchi today.

The visit comes after the state government sanctioned an additional Rs 15 crore for the construction of the stadium, the total cost of which has now reached Rs 48 crore. The highly anticipated project was initially sanctioned at Rs 33 crore and since its construction started in 2012 has faced delay with only 40-50% construction completed till today.

During the visit today, Minister Mr

During the visit today, Minister Mr Subba expressed dissatisfaction over the construction works stating that, "The state government has invested a lot in the construction of Bhaichung Stadium but the results are very disappointing." The Minister also enquired about

The Minister also enquired about the delay in construction works with department engineers and discussed several public complaints with the Department's Engineering Cell. It was revealed that ARC Tech Consultancy Agency, the agency which was paid a whopping Rs 4.6 crore in the initial stage of the construction to render its services to the project coordinators of the stadium is neither in touch with the SYA engineering cell nor the project contractors.

The department engineers and the contractors informed that the SYA engineering cell is yet to rectify the size of the football field to ensure proper road diversion which according to them is the cause of delay in completion of the project.

The Minister then asked the Department of the project.

The Minister then asked the Department Officers to immediately send a notice to ARC Tech Consultancy Agency to consult with the SYA engineers and come up with a plan. He also asked the project contractor to meet the Chief Minister Pawan Chamling and brief him about the construction work.

However, the project contractor said that he has worked according to the directions given by the SYA Department. He has claimed that if the department releases funds he will complete the project by the end of 2018.

Bardewa urges CM to restore

Over 130 pilots. 430 crew members of AI likely to be grounded

Mumbai, Sep 5 (PTI): The Directorate Gen of Civil Aviation (DGCA) is likely to ground over 130 pilots and 430 cabin crew members of national carrier Air India for allegedly skipping the mandatory pre and postflight alcohol test.

These crew members had regularly been "evading" the breath analyser test over a period of time for flights to and from certain destinations such as Singapore, Kuwait, Bangkok, Ahmedabad and Goa, sources close to the development told PTI

Aviation regulator DGCA has already served an ultimatum to the Air India management over the alleged safety vio-lations by the airline's crew members ahead of its enforcement action, they said.

As part of the DGCA's safety regulations, all pilots and cabin crew must undergo breath analy-ser test before and after flights.

The queries e-mailed yesterday on the issue to Air India spokesperson

went unanswered.

Notably, aircraft rules prohibit crew members from taking any alcoholic drink 12 hours prior to the commencement of a

flight. "The DGCA already brought it to the notice of Air India manage-ment that its 132 pilots and 434 cabin crew have evaded the mandato-ry breath analyser test, which is to be taken both before and after operating a flight. It is a safety violation and it (DGCA) is taking a suitable action against these crew members," a source said.

Since the grounding of such a large number of crew members could cripple the airline's narrow body operations, the DGCA is likely to enforce its action in a phased manner, said another source.

Significantly, the DGCA had in February suspended the flying li-cense of Air India's then executive director for operations. Arvind Kathpalia, for three months after an internal probe found him "guilty" of skipping the breath analyser test for one particular flight. Kathpalia is now head of operations and a Board member at the disinvestment-bound Air India

Protecting Children from Sexual Offences

Begin by ensuring that the "compromise" culture does not touch their cases

The Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act has been around for a while, having been notified in June 2012, following which, inadequacies of the existing Indian Penal Code and the absence of any stringent legislation to effectively address and tackle the heinous crime of sexual exploitation and sexual abuse of children was resolved to a large extent. Until POCSO Act was notified, child sex abuse crimes were dealt with under laws framed for rape, outraging the modesty of women and unnatural offences. These laws were clearly not nuanced enough to address the problem or look out strongly enough for victims of such abuse. Meanwhile, child sex abuse was so rampant that the need for a specific law to deal with such violations was finally deemed urgently necessary and was finally introduced in the year 2012. Statistics bear out how desperately such law was required. Across the country, the number of cases registered under POCSO Act increased from 8,904 in the year 2014 to 14,913 in the year 2015. Admittedly, not all cases of child sex abuse are still being reported, but had this Act not been around, nearly 15,000 more such cases would have gone unreported. Sexual abuse of children, however, is not a recent phenomenon. It has clearly been around ever since sexual predators have been around which is why it falls on the entire society to ensure that the POCSO Act is routinely tweaked to plug all loopholes and consistently followed up to check on its efficacy and to inform course correction required to not only punish those who prey on minors, but also to keep more of the children informed and safe.

This brings us to an anecdote shared by a Sikkim Police cop at a recent interactive meeting convened to discuss the POCSO Act. Journalists writing about such crimes are left deeply disturbed despite being several steps removed from the incident and rarely making the effort to speak with the victims. In comparison, the rage, disgust and anguish that cops have to confront when they respond to distress call from children cannot even be fathomed. It was apparent that the cop was deeply affected by the number of cases he has processed under the POCSO Act, but what had left his even more deeply disturbed and disgusted was a conversation he once had with parents of one of the victims. These parents had apparently approached him with a request to "compromise" the case since they were being offered a sizeable "compensation" by the offending party and because of the immense pressure being brought on them to "settle" the case. On that day, his anger was directed at the parents, but stay with the incident for a while, and it becomes clear that it is societal failure at work here. "Compensating" victims and "compromising" cases is too common a response in Sikkim for it to have not been deployed in POCSO cases as well. Furthermore, most of the victims thus far have come from underprivileged families and their abusers have most often been better heeled. The victims are already at a disadvantage, but instead of continuing their trauma, the society at large and the system in particular need to get more involved.

As things stand, there are no specific provisions for

the protection of the victim and his/ her family from "pressure" and intimidation. But that does not mean that no protections exist. Influencing or buying out witnesses is a punishable crime as is perjury, and it is perhaps time that the Courts cracked the whip more strongly whenever such suspicion arises. The agencies charged with effective implementation of POCSO Act can help out by keeping regular tabs on the progress of such cases in the Courts. Even in Sikkim, there have already been instances of accused walking free on technical grounds like witnesses either turning hostile or giving conflicting statements and even victim testimonies not being consistent enough to ensure a conviction. Such aberrations should immediately set off the warning bells and special investigations undertaken to ensure that no coercion or influence was exerted to sink the case. POCSO cases cannot be settled out of court, but that has not proven a strong enough de-terrent for those trying to "settle". They have devised this trick of scuttling cases by influencing witnesses and even victims. This cannot be allowed for any case more so for those booked under POCSO Act, because the victim's PTSD will further deepen as will their feeling of guilt and low self esteem. We already failed the children when we did not see the warning signs of initial abuse, and fail them again when we allow the abusers to walk free. Hence, the conduct of everyone involved - from the investigating agencies to counselors to lawyers to families involved - should be looked into in every acquittal to ensure that there was no foul play. Sikkim has few enough cases to invest resources and manpower to such an exercise, and it should.

Will whoever controls gene editing control historical memory?

In July, Harvard scientists used a gene-editing technology first developed in 2013 to programme bacteria to do something astounding: play back an animation of a galloping horse.

The GIF animation was generated from an iconic image series created in 1878 by the motion-pic-ture pioneer Eadweard Muybridge.

The breakthrough involved the scientists translating image pixels into genetic code, which they fed to the cells one frame at a time. The bacteria incorporated and reproduced the sequence in their DNA, demonstrating the possibility of using living cells as information recording and storage devices.

The tech world was, predictably, agog. But be-yond the hype, scientists' goal of applying the tech-nique to human cells has deep philosophical impli-

A future in which our bodies are used as hard drives could, in effect, change the entire way we conceive of human history and perceive life.

THE ORIGINS OF HISTORY

Today, it is impossible to imagine a world without history: from the vast array of chronicles housed in the world's libraries to the countless traces of the past accumulating in the data farms that support the digital cloud, history surrounds us.

But it wasn't always this way. Starting around

4000 BCE, the rise and spread of city-states, from Mesopotamia to Ancient Greece, radically changed the relationship between humans and our physical

New patterns of governance and information technology produced what's now called "historical time", a regime of truth based on evidence and analysis that's codified in written documents and housed within the walls of archives. These new systems of authority gradually supplanted the sense of time that had previously defined the reality of ancient peoples: the seasons, oral traditions, myths

With the onset of historical time, change no longer appeared cyclical. The concept of progress emerged, establishing a vision of humankind mov-ing forward, shaping the world, building knowl-edge and recording evidence of this journey.


But, of course, the whole notion of progress de-ends on power. Someone (or more likely a certain subset of people) must select the perspectives that count as knowledge. Which events are memori-alised and which disappear from history? Thus history is far from neutral. From antiquity

onward, those controlling history were a privileged few, nearly always men of political power or professional status. Access required literacy and social

questioning of this power. In his 1784 essay "What is Enlightenment?", Immanuel Kant argued the im-portance of challenging the authority and legitimacy of practices and norms that restrict the power to reason for oneself.

Soon after, in 1792, Mary Wollstonecraft published A Vindication of the Rights of Women. Her argument for the education and representation of women in civic life signalled the absence of female voices from history.

The book's emancipatory message was, however, soon subsumed by new forces. The power to systematise reality expanded dramatically in the

19th century, with industrialisation, technological developments and the spread of the scientific

Photography brought a seeming realism to the documenting of history. Charles Darwin transformed our concept of the origins and timelines of the species and Sigmund Freud described how an individual's past shapes their psyche.

These spectacular developments continued in the 20th century. Enabled by modern computing, scientists explored time at a cosmic scale (the theory of relativity) and explained life at a molecular

level (the discovery of DNA).

In this great tide of change, some 180 years after Kant and Wollstonecraft, a wave of critical

movements finally took history to task.

Among these critiques was Michel Foucault's analysis of systems that regulate our physical body and mental states. From The Birth of the Clinic, his 1963 work on the rising authority of medical knowledge, to his 1975 publication on institutions that discipline society, Foucault studied the Western desire for total oversight, famously citing the Panopticon prison model.

From the critical vantage point, the impact of

power - and of the technologies it employs to represent, monitor and control individuals and populations – becomes clear. Feminists spoke of the male gaze. Postcolonial theorists pointed to orientalism. And environmentalists have shown how human progress is destroying the physical world.

Hence the risks of this recent application of CRISPR: envisaging history as a biological resource rather than a space of social memory is a dramatic shift that leaves history open to radical new forms of exclusion and control

FUSING TECHNOLOGY AND BIOLOGY

The scientists' interest in "molecular recording" in humans and the production of "cell historians" promises to take the management of life, time and the visual arena to new levels. In doing so, they raise the prospect of a Panopticon within.

Today, progress is increasingly defined by the

power of digital technologies to integrate different aspects of human life and abolish the gaps between us. We're told that social networks, big data and the digital world make us safer, more productive and

But not everyone agrees. The sociologist Zygmunt Bauman argues that globalisation and the in-

formation economy makes for a liquid reality that fragments our attention span, dissolves relationships and produces cultural amnesia.

The Harvard team proposes an image of history that is not a record of culture – the ensemble of ways of living, transmitted across generations – but a sum of the material states of humans. This removes the record of social life that conditions how bodies live.

The scientists emphasise the technique's use in modelling diseases and creating therapies. Those benefits may be real, but so too is what Foucault describes as biopower: the use of wide-ranging technologies to administer and dominate human

If scientists can embed information in living human cells and extract data, behaviour can be regulated at the deepest levels. Who will decide how the power of molecular recording is wielded, and who has access to the information?

The ways in which history is made, shared and accessed determine how its power operates and reality is produced. As we both subscribe to and are uploaded into the net of digital reality, the issue of control over data raises new questions of agency.

The fact that political and market interests drive the application of science in technology – with their stealthy logic of monitoring, expansion and profit - exacerbates questions of control.

As the Harvard team's use of bacteria shows, we've come a long way since the single-cell, bacterium-like form that in all likelihood spawned the wonder of life on the planet today. Their gene-ed-iting project demonstrates technology's capacity to systematise time in new ways.

It epitomises the conditions of the Network Ages: the compression, acceleration and dispersion of life

But as the richness of life and historical memory demonstrate, culture is more than information, and the diversity of life exceeds technological measure. Can we trust that scientific leaps will produce a future where diversity is supported and divergence is possible?

To answer that question, we must do more than simply laud new technologies like CRISPR. We must examine how power can function commensurate with these techniques' newly expanded reach.

Ancient footprints in Crete challenge theory of human evolution - but what actually made them?

Researchers have discovered some 50 footprints at Trachilos in Crete that are nearly 6m-years-old. It looks like they may be from a hominin – amember of the human species after separation from the chimpanzee lineage. But, as the authors point out themselves, the findings are highly controversial – suggesting human ancestors may have existed in Crete at the same time as they evolved

So what should we make of it all? If the footprints are confirmed to be from a hominin – additional studies are needed before we can know for sure - it is unquestionably exciting.

The oldest footprints confirmed as hominin are the Laetoli series, which date to 3.65m years. The Laetoli series, found in Laetoli, Tanzania, are now known to have been made by the early human ancestor Australopithecus. It was up to six feet tall had foot function pretty much indistinguishable from our own.

THE CANDIDATES

So what kind of two-legged creatures have roamed Europe or nearby countries? We have abundant fossil evidence of great apes in Europe at the time of the Trachilos footprints, but no confirmed cases of hominins. Apes go as far back as 13m years ago, such as Pierolapithecus from Barcelona. Two million years later, the pongine or orangutan relative Hispanopithecus lived in the same region. Excellent skeletons of both indicate they were probably

partially walking upright.

The ape Dryopithecus and the possible hominin Graecopithecus from Greece were also around. The latter is about 7m years old, but unfortunate ly no skeleton has been found except for skull and teeth. Slightly older at about 9m-years-old are the very complete postcranial skeletons of Oreopithe-cus from Italy, which was unquestionably walking on two legs - and probably in trees as well as on ground. We don't know for sure, but it might also

In Kenya, there was Orrorin, also slightly older than Trachilos. It lived in trees but walked on two legs, completely upright. Orrorin was quite likely a hominin or a very close relative of the common ancestor of chimpanzees and humans, although human-like in all ways. Importantly though, we unfortunately lack evidence of the feet, so we cannot

mpare it with the Trachilos footprints.

Slightly younger than the Trachilos prints, Ardipithecus from Ethiopia, is a generally accepted member of the human lineage. Like Orrorin it could have been close to the common chimpanzee-human ancestor, but looked more like a modern human: Homo sapien. It is becoming increasingly clear that the common ancestor of humans and chimpanzees had limbs and trunk (a postcranial skeleton) much more like our own than like those of living chimpanzees

GORILLA PRINTS?

So what or who made the Trachilos prints? They are certainly convincing as real footprints, from the few pictures provided in the paper. The age estimate of 5.7m years also seems correct. The prints do have a narrow heel compared to our general idea of what human footprints look like, as the authors note. But that could easily be matched by the shape of human footprints walking in wet mud,

such as in an estuary - which may have been the case. They have a big toe placed quite close to the others, like our own, but so do the feet of gorillas.

Gorillas now appear to be in some respects a good model for what the gait (and ecology) of the earliest human ancestors might have been like, moving on two legs on the ground as well as in the

The fact is that human footprints and foot function vary enormously between steps as a con-sequence of the complexity of our anatomy and ability to make choices from a large range of func-tional strategies to maintain stability. Human foot pressure, which is the way force is applied over the sole of the foot to the ground, overlaps with that of orangutans and pygmy chimpanzees, and probably even more with that of gorillas. So in some circumstances a human foot could look like that of a gorilla.

If all 50 of the Trachilos prints were made freely available to other scientists as high resolution laser scans, we would have a decent sample to assess their variability and compare them to other fossil and recent footprints and foot pressure records And indeed, the researchers behind the study told The Conversation they are aiming to release all their data at some point.

This would give us a good chance of saying who ade them. As it stands, they could as well be those of gorillas - which separated from us over 10m years ago – as those of a member of our own human lineage such as Oreopithecus or Orrorin.

Power demand in NE to rise by 4,000 MW in 5 years: official

The demand for power in the North East region will rise to the tune of 4,000 MW in the next five years with increase in electrification, North Eastern Council economic adviser W Synrem said

today.

"It is projected that the demand of power in the region will substan-

tially increase to the tune of 3,500-4,000 MW in a span of five years, as we progress towards electrification in villages and increase the number of industries," Synrem said at a conference here.

As of March this year,

he said, 40,140 villages (96 per cent) out of the 42,435 villages in the region have been electrified, even as Sikkim and Tripura have achieved 100 per cent, while in Arunachal Pradesh, it is only 77 per cent.

The North Eastern

Regional Power Committee, in its report for Octo-ber last year, had stated the power requirement for the region was 2,553 MW with availability of 2,525 MW, resulting in a

shortfall of 1.1 per cent

(28 MW).
"Many towns and villages are yet to be elec-trified, and those who are electrified, do not get electricity 24 hours in a

day," Synrem said. He said NEC has contributed to generation of 694.5 MW of power, and another six renewable resources energy projMW are expected to be completed within this financial year

The NEC has also taken up survey and investigation works of potential hydro projects in

the region. "Out of 1,678 MW carried out for investiga-tion, 873 MW have been completed, and 805 MW

are in various stages of implementation," rem said.

He said, the NE region has a long way to go in terms of power generation, as only three per cent potential has been tapped till date, according to the Central Elec-tric Authority, which has indicated that only 2,000 MW has been generated

MACAU, SEP 5 (PTI): Substitute striker Balwant Singh's opportunistic second half double strike helped India beat Macau 2-0 in a group league encounter of the Asian Cup qualifying round, taking their unbeaten run in international matches to 11.

However, the home team managed to defend their citadel in the first half, which that ended goalless. It was Balwant, who replaced Eugenesen Lyngdoh post change of ends, broke the deadlock.

In the 57th minute, it was side-back Narayan Das, who had overlapped down wide right and sent a floater inside the box.

Balwant timed his jump to perfection as he angled his header with a marker on tow.

The second goal in the 82nd minute was more to do with a defensive lapse as Balwant showed his predatory skills, snatching a ball from the opposition defender just outside the corner of the 18-vard box.

From the corner of his eye, he saw that custodian Ho Man Fai was out of charge and his neat placement ensured an unassailable lead for the visiting team.

It wasn't one of the best matches for India's lead strike duo of Sunil Chhetri and Jeje Lalpheklhua as they were man marked by the home team defenders.

In the first half, the only notable scoring chance was in the 37th minute -- a rasping left-footer from Lyngdoh, which hit the horizontal

Germany thrash Norway, England survive Slovakia scare

PARIS, SEP 5 (AFP): Germany fired six past Norway while England fought back after an early scare to beat Slovakia in European World Cup qualifying on Monday.

Timo Werner scored a double in Germany's 6-0 rout of the Norwegians in Stuttgart to leave Joachim Loew's world champions with a perfect eight out of eight record atop Group C.

But with second-placed Northern Ireland beating the Czech Republic 2-0 in Belfast Germany will have to wait until their next match, away to the Irish on October 5, to seal automatic qualification to Russia.

Werner, booed by his own fans in Germany's 2-1 win in Prague against the Czechs last Friday, came off to a standing ovation this time after netting in the 21st and 40th minutes.

Eight years on, Federer has Del Potro record to set straight

New York, Sep 5 (AFP): Eight years after losing to Juan Martin del Potro in the US Open final, Roger Federer locks horns again with the giant Argentine in New York still convinced he should have won the match which ended his five-year reign as champion.

Del Potro was just 20 years old when he downed the Swiss legend 3-6, 7-6 (7/3), 4-6, 7-6 (7/4), 6-2 but Federer believes that he was the dominant force in that 2009 showdown.

"The only time when he was really better, in my opinion, was the fifth set. Obviously that was good enough to beat me that day," said Federer on Monday after seeing off Philipp Kohlschreiber 6-4, 6-2, 7-5 to set-up Wednesday's quarter-final with Del Potro.

"I felt like that I left that match

with a lot of regrets. Probably feels like one of those matches I would like to play over again.

"Feel like I would probably win it somehow because I should have been up maybe two sets to love."

Federer leads Del Potro 16-5 in their head-to-head record although his win in Miami this year represented the first time the pair had met in four years.

Despite his disappointment at losing the 2009 championship match, Federer admits that having also defeated Rafael Nadal in the semi-finals, Del Potro was overall a worthy winner.

Federer had already won the French Open, to complete the ca-



reer Grand Slam in 2009, before going onto to win a sixth Wimble-

He also became a father for the

first time.

"Making the finals here was actually a good run. But it ended my five-year reign in New York," he

Potro remained fit he could have become world number one after that breakthrough.

For Del Potro, beating Federer should have meant he had the world at his feet.

Sadly, it was his wrists which proved the problem as he went on to undergo four surgeries.

At one stage last year, his world ranking, once as high as four in the world, slumped to 1,045 and he

even considered retiring.

Federer said he was happy to see the likeable Del Potro back on tour and the feeling is mutual.

"I admire him, too. Everybody loves him," said Del Potro.

"It's going to be an interesting match to play. It will be the fitst time after eight years again in the central court of this tournament.

"I know how to play if I want to win, but always is a pleasure to play the greatest guy in history."

Vatican clears canonisation process of nun Rani Maria Vattali

BHOPAL, SEP 5 (PTI): The Vatican has cleared the canonisation process to promulgate the "decree of the bless-ed" on nun Rani Maria Vattali, who was stabbed to death in Madhya Pradesh 22 years ago, the public relation officer of MP Catholic Church said today.

A representative of the Pope will come down to Indore Catholic Diocese to officially announce her the "blessed" on November 4, PRO of the Church Father Maria Stephen told PTI. The Blessed, a rare sacred title, is

The Blessed, a rare sacred title, is considered to be a prelude to beatification of sainthood as was the case with Mother Teresa, he added.

In case of canonisation of sainthood, an extraordinary miracle will be required, he added.

The Pope has cleared the Franciscan Clarist Nun to be called the "blessed" recently. She was a member of Syro-Malabar Franciscan Clarist Congregation, the Bhopal-based cleric said. Rani Maria Vattali, popularly known

Rani Maria Vattali, popularly known as Sister Rani, then 41, was stabbed around 50 times on board a bus in which she was travelling in Dewas district on February 25, 1995, the cleric said

said. Hired assassin Samunder Singh stabbed her, as some landlords in MP's Indore region were upset with her work for uplift of landless people, he said. Singh was sentenced to life in pris-

Singh was sentenced to life in prison after he was found guilty of killing the nun. Later, his sentence was commuted due to his good conduct during imprisonment, he added.

In 2002, Nun Paul, who belongs to the same congregation of nuns that Rani belonged to and happens to the biological sister of the deceased as well had visited Singh in jail to accept him as her brother, he said.

Then Indore Bishop George Anathil initiated the cause for Sister Rani's canonisation process of the blessed in 2001 by setting up two panels - historical and theological, to examine her life, he said.

The two commissions submitted their findings to the three-member diocesan inquiry tribunal in June 2005 to carry forward the process, he recalled. She was found to have led a heroic

She was found to have led a heroic life of Christian virtue. Thereafter, her name was sent to Vatican Congregation for the Causes of Saints, which reviewed the gathered information and recommended that the Roman pontiff declare the candidate "venerable", he said.

India set for total domination on Sri Lanka tour

COLOMBO, SEP 5 (PTI): India would aim to cap off their super successful Sri Lanka tour with another ruthless victory in the one-off T20 International here

Any other result than India's resounding win looks highly unlikely tomorrow, consdering the visitors' rampaging run in the preceding Test and ODI series, where they whitewashed the hosts 3-0 and 5-0 respectively.

The game provides India an opportunity to fine-tune team combination ahead of the upcoming T20 home series against Australia and New Zealand. In total, India would play nine T20

Internationals this home season and all contests will be a three-match series.

India are on an experimentation drive ahead of the 2019 50over World Cup and one name they could have tried here is Rishabh Pant, who was not named in the squad.

It is all the more surprising since the selectors had an opportunity to send him for this standalone game when Shikhar Dhawan returned home to tend to his ailing mother this past weekend, leaving Ajinkya Rahane to open the innings in the fifth ODI.

Pant has previously featured in two T20Is against England and West Indies, but was kept out of this tour on account of his poor run for India-A in South Africa, as stated by chief selector MSK Prasad after the team selection.

In the lone T20 against West Indies at Jamaica, Virat Kohli had opened the innings with Dhawan with Pant slotting in at no.3. As such, their dual absence will necessitate atleast a couple changes from the Indian skipper.

Rohit Sharma slots back in automatically, for he didn t travel to the Caribbean earlier whilst KL Rahul and Manish Pandey will be expected to bring up the middle order.

Kedar Jadhav scored a much needed half-century in the final ODI, and he could be afforded another chance to prove his credentials as India prepare for a long limited-overs schedule at home.

Hardik Pandya was rested for that fifth match on Sunday, and he too is expected to return to the playing eleven. Pandya hadn t featured in India

s last T20I against the West Indies, with Kohli opting for five full-time bowlers back in July. His return to the playing eleven could allow for a bowling combination similar to the ODIs, with four full-time options to choose from.

Jasprit Bumrah is a shoe-in of

course, whilst it remains to be seen if Shardul Thakur will get another go after proving expensive in the last match at Bhuvneshwar Kumar's expense.

Kohli does like to field leg-spinners in the shortest format, and he played both Yuzvendra Chahal and Amit Mishra against England at both Nagpur and Bengaluru. He is expected to repeat this trick with Chahal and Kuldeep Yadav this time around.

Even so, there were no sure hints coming forth as the Indian team enjoyed an additional off day ahead of the game and did not practice.

Meanwhile, Sri Lanka have

made a few changes to their original T20 squad after suffering the 5-0 whitewash. Leg spinner Jeffrey Vandersay and seam-bowling all-rounder Dasun Shanaka are prominent additions.

Pacer Suranga Lakmal makes a comeback after injury, as he had been ruled out ahead of the second Test in August. Mystery spinner Akila Dananjay has also been added to the squad. Vandersay had made an im-

Vandersay had made an impression for Sri Lanka in the World T20 last year, but suffered from injury issues since and hasn t been a regular feature of the side.

Surprisingly, left-arm leg spinner Lakshan Sandakan has been left out of the squad.

Pacers Vishwa Fernando and
Dushmantha Chameera have also
been left out after unimpressive
showings in the recently concluded ODI series. Lasith Malinga has

been picked again, however.

The Lankan team management had talked about resting Kusal Mendis as he was fatigued, and he has been duly left out.

The spotlight will be on skip-

per Upul Tharanga though.

This will be his first T20 match in-charge after Angelo Mathews gave up captaincy post the loss to Zimbabwe prior to the Indian tour.

Tharanga was suspended during this ODI series due to poor run-rate, but refused to step down after the ODI defeat.

Instead, he has taken a six-

month sabbatical from Test cricket and was omitted from Lanka s preliminary squad announced on Monday for the Pakistan series.

This is being as a sign that he wants to concentrate on the limit-ed-overs formats and a bid to over-turn Sri Lanka s fortunes in ODIs and T20s at least.

As per the ICC rankings, the gap between the two sides is smaller (ranked no.5 and 8) for once, and the task is cut out for Tharanga to showcase what he can do in this one-off game.

Pak envoys debating foreign policy following new US strategy

ISLAMABAD, SEP 5 (PTI): A group of selected Pakistani envoys, including those in India and China, today began debating key foreign policy issues in an effort to chalk out a response to the new US strategy for Afghanistan and South Asia.
The three-day confer-

ence was inaugurated by Pakistan's Foreign Minister Khawaja Asif. The conference could allow various Pakistani envoys to harmonise their understanding of the foreign policy issues facing the country, particularly after the US president last month publicly re buked Islamabad for har bouring terror groups.

The new US strate-gy, outlined by Donald Trump, seeks a greater development role for India in Afghanistan. Other issues to be discussed at the meet may include the BRICS declaration in China's Xiamen city yesterday, calling Pakistan-based terror groups a security concern in the region.

Pakistan's ambassa-dor and high commis-sioners in the US, Russia, China, Saudi Arabia, Qatar, Afghanistan, Iran, and India were attending the conference, the Foreign Office said. Its spokesman said in a brief statement that the envoys "will deliberate over a range of bilateral, regional and global di-mensions of Pakistan's foreign policy." Diplomatic

here said Asif in his opening remarks said there was no military solution to the ongoing conflict in neighbouring Afghani-stan. He urged the envoys to discuss Pakistan's India ties and the situation in Kashmir, and sugges how Islamabad should highlight the issue

The sources said the envovs would discuss potential strength of Pakistan's foreign policy and options available in view of the "current geo-political and regional situation".

They would also sughensive policy to safeguard Pakistan's interests in wake of new US strategy for the region.Pakistan Prime Minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi will chair the concluding session, when the policy formulations would be presented to him.

Putin warns of 'global catastrophe' over North Korea impasse

XIAMEN (CHINA), SEP 5 (AFP): Russian President Vladimir Putin warned today of a global catastrophe unless a diplo-matic solution is reached over North Korea, but rejected US calls for more sanctions as "useless", widening a split among major powers over how to rein in Pyongyang.

Putin's comments appeared to draw the lines for a clash at the United Nations pitting Moscow and Beijing against Washington and its allies.

The US yesterday demanded the "strongest possible measures against North Korea for detonating what Pyong-yang said was a hydrogen bomb that could be



mounted on a missile

announcement dramatically upped the stakes in its standoff with the international community over its banned weapons programmes, which have seen it subjected to

even sets of UN Security Council sanctions so far.

As well as the US, South Korea and Japan, plus permanent Security Council members France and Britain, have called for stronger measures against it, with several arguing for a potentially

crippling oil embargo.

But Putin made clear that Russia was opposed to further interdictions, and while China - North Korea's patron and clos-

est political and economic partner - has yet to be drawn on the issue, it tends to resist placing pressure on Pyongyang.
Putin, speaking after

international gathering in China, said Russia condemned North Korea's

"provocative" actions.

But he called for dialogue and warned against other actions that could escalate the crisis.

Resorting to just any sanctions in this situation is useless and inefficient." he told reporters in the Chinese city of Xiamen following a summit of the five-nation BRICS club of

emerging economies.

"All of this can lead to a global planetary catastrophe and a great

number of victims."

World powers are rambling to react to the latest ominous advance in the North's rogue weapons programme, which has sent global tensions soaring.

US President Donald Trump has approved in principle the sale of "many billions of dollars" worth of military weapons and equipment" for South Korea, the White House said Monday. South Korea said it

At an emergency meeting of the UN Security Council. US Ambassador Nikki Haley said Washington would present a new sanctions resolution for debate in the coming days.

Declaring that "enough is enough," Haley said exist ing measures not worked and accused North Korean leader Kim Jong- Un of "begging for war" with the country's sixth and most powerful nuclear test.

Seoul estimated the blast's yield at 50 kilomore than three tons, times the size of the bomb detonated over Hiroshispell out what measures Washington was seek-ing, but diplomats said it could target oil supplies to North Korea - poten-tially dealing a major blow to its economy.

North Korea 'begging for war': Haley

WASHINGTON, SEP 5 (PTI): North Korea is "begging for war" with abusive use of missiles and nuclear threats IIS Amhassador to the UN Nikki Haley has said, pushing for the "strongest possible measures" against Pyongyang following its sixth and most powerful nuclear test.

On Sunday, North Korea said it detonated a hydrogen bomb designed for a long-range missile and called it a "perfect success", inviting worldwide condemnation and promises of

condemnation and promises of tougher US sanctions. Haley said North Korean dictator Kim Jong-Un's action cannot be seen as defensive and he wants to be acknowledged as a nuclear power. "But being a nuclear power is not about using those terrible weapons to threaten others."

"Nuclear powers understand their responsibilities. Kim Jong-Un shows no such understand-' Haley told members of the UN Security Council during a meeting on North Korea. The Indian-origin US ambassador to the UN said that his abusive use of missiles, and his nuclear threats show that he is "begging

"War is never something the US wants. We don't want it now. But our country's patience is not unlimited. We will defend our allies and our territory," she said.

The idea that some have suggested of a so-called freeze- for freeze is insulting, she said.

"When a rogue regime has a nuclear weapon and an ICBM (Inter-continental Ballistic Missile) pointed at you, you do not take steps to lower your guard. No one would do that. We certainly won't," she said, adding time has come to exhaust all diplomatic means to end this crisis.

"Only the strongest sanctions will enable us to resolve



this problem through diploma cy. We have kicked the can down the road long enough. There is no more road left," she said.

Haley and her counterparts from Japan, France, the UK, and the South Korea requested the emergency meeting in response to North Korea's latest nuclear test.

"To the members of the Security Council, I must say: enough is enough," she said.

British Ambassador to the UN Matthew Rycroft said North Korea has created a deeply dangerous and unstable situation.

"The UK will work with our partners on this Council and beyond to tackle the challenge," he

Dialogue, he said, will always

be the "end goal".

"But returning to dialogue without a serious sign of intent from Pyongyang would be a set up to failure. North Korea must change course to allow a return to dialogue. Were they to do so the opportunity exists to end

this crisis

Until that moment, we must stay the course on sanctions, and continue, as the Secretary-General has called for, to present a united front," Rycroft said.

Ambassador Koro Bessho of Japan said it was clear how belligerent and dangerous the North Korean actions were, pos-ing a problem, not only for that country's neighbours, but the entire international community

The sixth nuclear test had exhibited a magnitude of explosion far greater than the previous one and had raised the threat to an unprecedented level. In that context, he stressed the need for the Council to swift ly adopt a new resolution with further robust sanction mea-sures Firmly supporting the denuclearization of the Korean Peninsula, the Chinese Ambas-sador Liu Jieyi strongly urged Pyongyang to comply with international measures.

The situation on the Penin-

sula had deteriorated, he said, stressing that China would nev er allow chaos or war to erupt

Haley told the 15-membered body that US will be circulating a draft resolution soon, with the expectation to have it passed by Monday September 11. The South Korean Ambassador Cho Tae-yul said the Security Council must respond to this serious provocation with the adoption of a new resolution containing much tougher measures, corre sponding to the magnitude and gravity of the test.

"Now is the time to take measures that are strong and robust enough to compel North Korea to seriously engage in dia logue. The new resolution must include not only additional mea-sures to further block funds that could possibly flow into North Korea's illegal WMD program, but also truly biting and robust measures such as cutting off crude oil and oil product sup

Over 500,000 Pakistanis deported in last 5 years 2013: 13 in 2014: 10 in

ISLAMABAD, SEP 5 (PTI): have been deported from 134 countries, including Saudi Arabia, the UAE, India and China, in the last five years, according to a media report today.

While it is commonolace for Pakistanis to pe deported from Saudi Arabia, the UAE, and number of European Union member states, many smaller and lesser-known countries have also booted Pakistani nationals for a number of reasons, the Express Tribune reported.

Some of the places where Pakistani nation-als were kicked out from are countries like Laos. Togo, Port Louis, Liberia Guinea, Burkina Faso, Botswana, Burundi, Madagascar, Malawi, Republic of Congo, Dominican Republic, Mozambique, Angola, and Ethiopia

In response to a question put forward by Sena-tor Jehanzeb Jamaldini, the Interior Ministry placed before the Senate a list of countries from which Paki stanis have been deported and their annual breakdown from January, 2012 till June, 2017.

Of the 544 105 Pakistanis deported, 71,723 were expelled in 2012; 79 539 in 2013 78 409 in 2014; 116,185 in 2015; 111.084 in 2016: and 87,165 in just the first six months of 2017. Saudi Arabia topped the overall list, followed by the UAE, Oman, Malaysia, the UK,

Turkey, and Greece.
India deported 12
Pakistanis in 2012; six in

2015; five in 2016; and three by June this year. China deported 240 Paki-stanis. Of these 26 were in 2012; 39 in 2013; 36 in 2014: 46 in 2015: 80 2016; and 13 by June this year.

The Interior Ministry started tabulating rea sons for deportations from 2014. Overstaying lost visas, lost passports, passport retained by visa sponsors or employers, illegal immigration, entry refused, and other illegal entries are the most common of the over 115 reasons for which these people were sent back home by the authorities of these countries.

Data placed before the Senate shows an 280,052 Pakistanis were deported from Saudi Arabia. In 2012, a total of 17,369 Pakistanis were deported from the kingdom in 2012; another 33,351 in 2013; followed by 45,456 in 2014; 61,404 in 2015; and 57,784 in 2016.

The record from 2015 has already been broken this year, as 64,689 have been deported from Jan-uary to June 2017. The UAE did the second-most deportations 10,235 in 2012; 9,597 in 2013; 8,434 in 2014; 8,690 in 2015 and 9 987 in 2016

The Emirates had de ported 5,115 Pakistanis by June 30 this year. Oman was third, having sent home a total of 20,416 Pakistani nation als during this period. It was followed by Malaysia which deported 16,124 Pakistanis in this period.

K-POP LEGEND SEO TAIJI HOLDS 25TH ANNIVERSARY CONCERT, PASSES TORCH TO BTS

K-pop's a fully-fleshed in-dustry in 2017, but in 1992 Seo Taiji (Jung Hyun Chul) & Bays shedred Vernet Chul) & Boys shocked Korea's pop industry into its current state with "Nan Arayo" ("I state with "Nan Arayo" ("I Know"), a hip-hop leaning dance track that ignited the nation's crazy for idol-ori-ented music. On Saturday (Sept. 3), Seo took fans on a trip through his past hits before proclaiming boy band BTS his musical successors during his 25th anniversary Time: Traveler concert.

With 35,000 fans in attendance, Seo, known as the "President of Culture" in South Korea, went through the sonic history of his career, featuring the music of Seo Taiji & Boys,

which served as the prototype for the multi-tude of K-pop acts to follow, which served as

and many of his solo hits. He performed two dozen songs from various eras of his career during the two and a half hour-long concert, reports the Korea Times.The show, part of Lotte Card's Moov Sound Track vol. 2 project, was held on Sept. 2, the same day a special 25th anniver-sary album was released featuring Seo's biggest hits along with remakes of his songs by other Korean acts, including R&B trio Urban

Zakapa -- who served as con-cert openers along with rock band Gukkasten -- Crush, Heize, Suran, Younha, Eddy

Kim, Loopy & nafla, and BTS. With numerous songs of their own that address the hardships facing South Kore-an youth and society and hiphop leanings on par with Seo Taiji & Boys', the latter act served as backup vocalists and dancers for eight songs of the concert, replacing Yang Hyun Suk, now the head of YG Entertainment, and Lee Juno as Seo's Boys for the night. During the show, Seo acknowledged BTS' thematic similarities to his music and their place as one of K-pop's most globally-renowned

acts."This is your generation now," declared Seo address ing BTS, reports the

Seoul Economic Daily.
Throughout his career,

there have been a variety of reiterations of Seo that have led to his reputation as a lead-er of cultural trends in South Korea. Seo pursued rock music early in his career, and became a member of the metal band Sinawe before forming Seo Taiji & Boys in the early '90s, during which he served as the frontman and primary songwriter of the genre-blending crew. The trio made history beginning in 1992, with hit after hit resonating with South Korea's audience and igniting the trend for youthful, dance oriented music from performance-focused groups. Following the act's breakup in 1996, Seo returned to his rock leanings in 1998 and has since released nine studio albums including his most recent album, 2014's Quiet Night.

Despite being recognized as the start of the idol music trend, much of Seo's music, both as a soloist and while in Seo Taiji & Boys, has veered towards alt-rock, electro-pop, and nu-metal. His legacy spans generations in the country, where he's also considered one of the first forerunners of popular music that criticized the South Korean government and addressed societal ills, resulting to being one of the most-censored muost-cen: sicians of his generation.
