"The exclusive Niti Aayog forum will work to identify constraints that stand in the way of achieving accelerated, inclusive and sustainable economic growth in the eight states of the Northeast region," the minister told PTI.

It would recommend suitable interventions for addressing the identified

constraints, he said.

'Sliding Bridge' to span Mantam Lake this week

The North District Administration and the Road & Bridges Department are working on a war-footing to complete the "sliding bridge" being constructed across Mantam Lake before the onset of the monsoons.

The bridge is now ex-

pected to be completed over the next four days, and once completed, it will be have a carrying capacity of 14 tonnes, informs Neytok Lepcha, Junior Engineer, the en-gineer on site overseeing the construction work.

The bridge will finally make the cut-off villages of Tingvong and Sakyong-Pentok GPUs accessible.

The bridge is being constructed on a sliding system which makes it maneuverable to adjust to the erratic nature of the water level in this lake formed by a massive landslide at Mantam.

People from the cut-off areas will have to depend on this bridge until

The current bridge will replace the 140 metre long rickety bamboo span thrown across Mantam lake at present.

GANGTOK, 25 FEB: Sikkim has secured a berth in the semi-final round of the ongoing Dr T Ao Memorial U-21 Football Tournament 2018 at Guwahati in Assam, Sikkim made it through af-ter thrashing Tripura 5-0 today in its last match of

the qualifying round.

Being a very crucial match, Sikkim played an

attacking game right from the start to maintained constant pressure on Tripura.

Noel Darjee finally

broke the Tripuri resolve in the 29th minute and shortly afterwards, goals by Dawa Lhendup Sherpa in the 33rd minute and Prashant Chettri in the 39th took the lead to 3-0.

and the first half ended

with Sikkim 4-0 lead.

In the second half,

Sridevi: The diva who lit up Indian cinema screen

Mumbai, Feb 25 (PTI): Those expressive eyes and the mischievous smile sent hearts aquiver and lit up the cinema screens, making Sridevi Bollywood's first female superstar.

Sridevi's sudden death at the age of 54 in Dubai due to cardiac arrest yesterday has left family and fans in shock and grief. This 'Chandni' left the world too soon.

The actor, wife of producer Boney Kapoor, died late at Saturday night reportedly due to cardiac arrest in Dubai, where she had gone along with her family to attend her nephew Mohit Marwah's wedding.

In an impressive career, spanning five-decades, the actor ruled the commercial cinema space in the '80s and '90s like no heroine

had done before.

In an industry dominated by male superstars, Sridevi reversed the trend by her sheer acting prowess. Her name, most of the times, was a guarantee enough for a film's success.

An extremely shy person in real life. Sridevi came alive in front of the cameras, playing a variety of roles. Such was her popularity that her style and dance moves would be copied by her fans country over. She was 'Miss Hawa Hawaaii' and 'Chandni' for them.

Sridevi started acting at the age of four and made her debut with M A Thirumugham's "Thunaivan".



She continued acting in Tamil Telugu, Malayalam and Kannada films but it was her career in Bollywood that made her a household

name in the country.

She made her Bollywood debut as a child artiste in 1975 hit "Julie" but continued ruling the South In-dian film industry where she established herself as a leading heroine with films such as "16 Vayathinile", "Sigappu Rojakkal", "Meendum Kokila" and "Moondram Pirai".

In Bollywood, she made her debut in 1978 as a lead actor in "Solva Sawan".

cess with the 1983 film "Himmatwala" opposite Jeetendra, which also established her as one of the best dancers in cinema. She was grace-personified dressed as an apsara (a celestial beauty in Hindu mythology) performing on the hit track 'Nainon mein sapna'.

The year 1983 also saw Sridevi give stellar performances in both critically acclaimed and box-office hits such as "Sadma", where she played the role of a woman who loses her memory.

Both she and actor-turned-pol-

itician Kamal Haasan played the roles in the Hindi remake of their 1982 Tamil movie, "Moondram Pirai". The climax of the heart-wrenching movie was deemed as poetic as the entire plot, with the song 'Ae zindagi gale laga le' as an ode to the philosophy of uncertainty in life.

Sridevi followed it up with a

number of commercial hits such as "Mawaali", "Tohfa", "Masterji" and "Nazrana".

In 1987 came Shekhar Ka-r's "Mr India", a film which was produced by her future husband

Sridevi gave a memorable performance as crime reporter Seema Sohni. She was one of the few fe-male actors who left the audience spellbound with both her comic timing and sensuality.

How her undercover scribe transformed into Ms Hawa Hawaaii, thanks to her dancing skills in one of the popular songs, is one of the most memorable scenes of

Owing to the cult status the song went on to achieve, the Kavita Krish-namurthy number has been recreated a number of times in films such as "Shaitan" and most recently in Vidya Balan's "Tumhari Sulu".

And so will 'Kaate nahi kat-te', an iconic sultry number which saw the actor romance an invisible man in a song revelling in a never-be-

fore-seen boldness and fantasy. Filmmaker Yash Chopra cast her in the title role of "Chandni" in the 1989 film, another iconic film of her career. Such was her performance in the film that fans came to recognise

her with the name of Chandni.
Impressed with her performance in the film, Chopra cast her again in "Lamhe" in a dual role, where she played the mother and the daughter.

It did not do well at the box of-fice at that time but has come to be known one the best films of Sridevi.

Chopra and Anil Kapoor's careers The film was said to be ahead of its times as it dealt with a woman falling for an older man who is in love with her dead mother. Her other major box office hits

of the era were "Chaalbaaz", where she played the role of twins, "Nagina", and "Khuda Gawah" opposite Amitabh Bachchan. Her pairing with Anil Kapoor, her "Mr India" co-star and brother-in-law, was particularly success-

ful and she would work with him again in "Laadla" and "Judaai". After "Judaai", Sridevi took a break from acting to focus on her marriage with Boney Kapoor. She had two daughters -- Janhvi and

Khushi -- with Kapoor. The actor made a successful comeback to cinema 15 years lat-er with Gauri Shinde's "English Vinglish", playing a housewife who learns English after feeling left out

in her family. She also had a starring role in Tamil film "Puli" and followed "En-glish Vinglish" with another successful outing in "Mom", which also featured Nawazuddin Siddiqui and

Akshaye Khanna. The actor's elder daughter Janhvi is on the cusp of her own cin-ematic journey with "Dhadak", a remake of the Marathi blockbuster 'Sairat". Unfortunately, Sridevi will not be there to witness it.

Just 7.28 pc women in police forces: Govt data

NEW DELHI, FEB 25 (PTI): Amid a rising graph of crime against women in the country, they constitute just 7.28 per cent of the police force in India and at 2.47 per cent, their presence is the lowest in Naxal-hit Telangana, according to government data.

In militancy-affected Jammu and Kashmir, there are just 3.05 per cent women in a police force which has a sanc-tioned strength of more than 80,000 police personnel, Union home ministry statistics said.

The government data comes amid an increasing graph of crime against women in the country where overall crimes against them rose from 3,29,243 incidents in 2015 to 3,38,954 incidents in 2016.

The situation is pathetic despite the Union home ministry sending advisories in 2009, 2012 and 2016 to all the state governments and Union territories to increase the strength of women police personnel to 33 per cent, a senior ministry official told PTI.

All state and UTs have also been requested to create additional posts of women constables and sub-inspectors and fill up vacancies by recruiting them, the official said.

As on January 1 last year, Telangana had just 2.47 per cent women in the rolls of its police force which has a sanctioned strength of 60,700 personnel, the data said.

In Uttar Pradesh, the country's most-populous state, the police force has only 3.81 per cent women. It has a sanctioned strength of around 3,65,000 personnel.

The percentage of vomen in police forces in Andhra Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh and Meghalaya was also low, the statistics showed.

While Tamil Nadu has the highest number of women police personnel, and Goa was relatively better.

Among the Union territories, Chandigarh has the highest number of women personnel while the Delhi Police, with a sanctioned strength of around 85,000 personnel, had just 8.64 per cent women in its roll as on January 1 last year.

The home ministry has taken a number of steps for increasing the strength of women in paramilitary forces, another official said.

Women are expected to soon account for one-third of constable-rank personnel in the Central Police Reserve Force and around 15 per cent in the border guarding forces-- Border Security Force (BSF), Sashastra Seema Bal (SSB) and Indo Tibetan Border Police (ITBP), he said.

These forces together comprise around nine lakh personnel of whom only around 20,000 are

only around 2007, women now. The CRPF, considered to be world's larg-commilitary force, is est paramilitary force, is mostly deployed for law and order duties and the anti-Naxal operations.

The year 2015 saw

the registration of 34,651 cases of rape in the country and the figure increased to 38,947

Overall crimes against women also rose from 2015 to 2016, according to the data of the National Crime Records

The majority of cases categorised as crimes against women were reported under cruelty by husband or his relatives husband or his relatives, followed by assault on woman with intent to outrage her modesty, kidnapping and abduc-

tion and rape.

The highest number of rapes have been reported from Madhya Pradesh followed by Ut-tar Pradesh and Maharashtra in 2016.

PNB fraud: ED to seek info from over dozen countries on Nirav Modi, Choksi's assets

Mumbai/New Delhi, Feb 25 (PTI): Widening its probe into the PNB fraud case, the Enforcement Directorate will soon send judicial requests to over a dozen countries for obtaining information about the overseas businesses and assets of diamantaire Nirav Modi and owner of Gitanjali Gems Mehul

Official sources said the agency will approach a competent court in Mumbai with a request to obtain Letters Rogatories (LRs) to be sent to about 15-17 countries where the central investigation agency has traced the footsteps of the diamond and gold jewellery business-es of the firms owned by Modi, his uncle Choksi and others associated with them.

The countries where the LRs would be sent include Belgium, Hong Kong, Switzerland, the Unit-ed States, the United Kingdom,

Dubai, Singapore and South Africa.
Some official requests on the
basis of agency-to-agency exchange will also be sent to few countries, the sources said. The attempt of sending these

judicial requests for exchange of information is aimed at obtaining

the details of the overseas financial holdings of Modi and Choksi, who are accused in the Rs 11,400 crore PNB loan fraud case, their bank accounts, assets, partnerships, showrooms, trusts and other assets, they said.

These assets and their sources of income will be investigated and if necessary would be attached under the criminal sections of the Prevention of Money Laundering Act (PMLA) if it is found that they have been created using tainted funds or the proceeds of crime of the alleged bank fraud, the sources

Meanwhile, Modi, his wife Ami, and Choksi have been summoned by the Enforcement Directorate (ED) to appear at its zonal office in Mumbai tomorrow. Sources indicated that if they

skip the summons, the agency may approach a special PMLA court to get non-bailable warrants against

The agency has also asked about 16 other banks, apart from the Punjab National Bank, to share with it the details of loans extended and collaterals offered in the case of Modi, Choksi and their

companies. It has also asked the RBI to share with it audit reports of the PNB conducted by it since 2011.

The total assets seized by the ED in this case are now over Rs 6,393 crore, officials had said, adding that this was being inde-

pendently valued.

Modi, Choksi and others are being investigated by the ED and other probe agencies after the fraud recently came to light, following a complaint by the PNB that they allegedly cheated the nationalised bank to the tune of Rs 11,400 crore, with the purported involvement of a few employ-ees of the bank.

The CBI and the ED have reg-

istered two FIRs each to probe the case. Both Modi and Choski are said to have left the country before criminal cases were lodged against

The ED, a central probe agency under the Union finance ministry, is investigating if the allegedly defrauded bank funds were laundered and proceeds of crime were subsequently used by the accused to create illegal assets and black

Consortium of researchers to turn farming into 'assured' activity

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, FEB 25 (PTI): In a major initiative to apply disruptive technology in agriculture, a consortium of researchers has been formed in partnership with 3 leading institutions in the country, with the aim of turning farming from an 'uncertain' to 'assured' activity.

The platform, the Consortium of Researchers for Disrup-tive Technologies in Agriculture (CDTA), is a joint venture of the academic-cum-research scientists of IIITMK, Thiruvananthapuram, GB Pant University of Agricultural Sciences and Technology, Pant Nagar (Uttarkhand) and Indian Institute Space Technology, a press release here said.

The team will advocate and implement application of technologies like Artificial Intelligence

(AI), Data Analytics (DA), Internet of Things (IoT), Cloud Computing (CC), Aerospace Observation and Miniaturised Sensors in the agriculture domain.

They together present the untapped potential to overcome challenges facing Indian agriculture and to transform it from an Uncertain to Assured one.

Assured agriculture represents a scenario where individual farmers are guided at every stage of crop growth and provided with timely advisories and physical or fiscal assistance, to ensure beneficial returns for investment; with-out compromising on biological diversity in the immediate vicinity.

Towards a Knowledge-**Based Society**

Get informed... then demand better

 $T^{\text{he talk about developing Sikkim into a "knowledge-based" society has been doing the rounds for a while. What it is being said in polite terms is that$ effort is required to draw Sikkim away from the mediocrity of its human resource that infiltrates just about every field of activity here.

Take journalism for instance. No one will praise the media in Sikkim as outstanding. Promising maybe... maybe even prolific, but not outstanding yet. At best, we can be accepted as average. Of course, we in the media will never admit even to ourselves that we compete in mediocrity, but that is for another debate. But why is the fourth estate so mediocre in Sikkim? Not because there is a dearth of committed media-persons in the region, but simply because no demands are made of them for excellence by the readers. Mediocrity flourishes in the absence of pressure and this holds true for every other aspect of life here. Take governance for example. The bureaucracy remains somnambulant because the public representatives don't shake them up often enough. Around election time, they come in for some tongue-lashing, but the behavioral and procedural reforms so necessary are never initiated. Take a look around, administrative basics remain ignored until too late. There are too many delays, too many lapses and way too many excuses, but never any real accountability. Preparatory shortcomings, that getting caught off-guard arrive with enough advance warning but remain unaddressed until only excuses and shifting of blame can be offered where simple outreach and consultations would have worked.

That said, even public representatives are not the most pro-active lot. They prefer to talk down and occasionally hand-hold, but never consult or listen. These primarily because the people don't demand better delivery or even performance from them and appear satisfied with securing favours and indulgence instead

of claiming their rights.
It's a vicious cycle, but not one that is impossible to break. All it requires is involvement.

No one will strive for excellence if it is not demand.

ed of them. Also, no one will strive for excellence if it is not recognized either. And recognition is possible only if the people differentiate between what is downright puerile, what is average and what sets the bar of performance higher. And that brings us back to the need of having a "knowledge-based" society. Simply put, only a society that is "knowledgeable" will be able to demand that its intelligence is respected. This knowledge should not be confused with literacy [Sikkim already does quite well on that front]. Knowledge is about being informed. People who are aware of what is happening around them can take intelligent decisions and once the people think intelligently, then those who serve them [from the media, to the public servant, to the public representative] will have to improve their performance too. The pressure for survival [as professionals] will itself pull Sikkim out of the mediocrity it wallows in at present.

But how does one go about it? It is not really as complicated as it sounds. For people to become more aware, all they have to do is get more involved, ask more questions and demand better answers. The government can contribute towards this transition by making information accessible. It is only after the people have been provided with information that they can mull over it and debate. Although the debates might be immature initially, they will get better eventually. Once that happens, the people themselves will shape the knowledge-based society that Sikkim needs to

Empowering Women is Empowering the Nation



The NRA's journey from marksmanship to political brinkmanship

The mass Day Parkland, Florida, ripped at the hearts of Americans in a way perhaps not seen or felt since the Sandy Hook Elementary School bloodshed in Newtown. Connecticut six years ear-

lier.
The Marjory Stoneman
Douglas High School students who witnessed their becoming outspoken advocates. control They are blaming the Na-tional Rifle Association for thwarting stronger gun laws that might have prevented this tragedy and many others. Many Americans, especially agree with them.

But so far, the largest and oldest U.S. gun group is doubling down on its sweeping opposition to restrictions on gun ownership.

After spending decades researching and writing about how and why the NRA came to hold such sway over national gun policies, I believe it might not be as invincible at this point in its history as the interest group's reputation suggests
THREE PHASES

The NRA's nearly 150-year history spans three distinct eras.

At first the group was mainly concerned with marksmanship. It later played a relatively constructive role regarding safety-minded gun ownership restrictions before turning into a rigid politicized force.

The NRA was formed in 1871 by two Civil War veterans from Northern states who had witnessed the typical soldier's inability to handle guns

The organization initially leaned on government support, including subsidies for shooting matches and surplus weaponry. These freebies, which lasted until the 1970s, gave gun enthusiasts a powerful incentive to join the NRA.

The NRA played a role in fledgling political efforts to formulate state



and national gun policy in the 1920s and 1930s after the Prohibition-era liquor trafficking stoked gang war-fare. It backed measures like requir-

ing a permit to carry a gun and even a gun-purchase waiting period. And the NRA helped shape the National Firearms Act of 1934, with two of its leaders testifying before Congress at length regarding this landmark legislation. They supported its main provisions, such as restricting gangster weapons by creating a national registry for machine guns and sawed-off shotguns and taxing them heavily. But they opposed handgun registration, which didn't make it into the nation's first significant national gun law.

The NRA again opposed a national registry provision that would have applied to all firearms, in the legislative battle held in the aftermath of President John F. Kennedy's assassination and amid rising concerns about crime. Congress ultimately stripped one from the Gun Control Act of 1968.

The NRA remained primarily fo-cused throughout this period, however, on marksmanship, hunting and other recreational activities

A SHARP RIGHT TURN By the mid-1970s, a dissident group

ganization was losing the national debate over guns by being too defensive and not political enough. The dispute erupted at the NRA's 1977 annual convention, where the dissidents deposed the old guard.

From this point forward, the NRA became ever more political and stri-dent in its defense of so-called "gun rights," which it increasingly defined as nearly absolute under the Second Amendment.

One sign of how much the NRA had changed: The Second Amend-ment right to bear arms never came up in the 166 pages of congressional testimony regarding the 1934 gun law. Today, the organization treats those words as its mantra, constantly

And until the mid-1970s, the NRA supported waiting periods for hand-gun purchases. Since then, however, it has opposed them. It fought vehemently against the ultimately suc-cessful enactment of a five-businessday waiting period and background checks for handgun purchases in

NRA influence hit a zenith during George W. Bush's gun-friendly presidency, which embraced the group's positions. Among other things, his administration let the assault-weapon ban expire. **HAVING A WHITE HOUSE** ALLY ISN'T EVERYTHING

Today, the NRA claims 5 million dues-paying members and the Pew Research Center's findings suggest that about 14 million people identify with the group. By any measure it's a small minority of the nearly 250 million U.S. voters.

Like Bush, Donald Trump has a cozy relationship with the NRA, which was among his presiden-tial bid's most enthusiastic backers and contributed \$31 million to his presidential campaign.

When Trump directed the Justice Department to draft a rule banning bump stocks, and indicated his belated support for improv-

ing background checks for gun purchases after the Parkland shooting, he was sticking with NRA-approved positions. He also supports arming teach-

ers, another NRA proposal.
Only one sliver of light has
emerged between the Trump administration and the NRA: his apparent
willingness to consider raising the minimum age to buy assault weapons from 18 to 21.
In politics, victory usually belongs

to whoever shows up. And by showing up, the NRA has managed to strangle every federal effort to restrict guns since the Newtown shooting.

Nevertheless, the NRA does not always win. At least 25 states had enacted their own new gun regulations within five years of that tragedy. Led by the Parkland shooting's survivors, students are now com-

manding public attention with their call for tougher gun laws. The key question is whether this momentum will continue through the 2018 midterm elections. If it does, the NRA

might have to regroup again.

The documentary on No bel laureate Amartva Sen March nine after a beep on the word 'Gujarat' as recommended by the Censor Board, its director Suman Ghosh said

The hour-long documentary 'The Argumen-tative Indian' had courted controversy after the Central Board of Film Certification, Kolkata, asked for muting nine words/phrases, but the CBFC, Mumbai finally let it pass with just one beep on the word Gujarat on July 11, 2017, Ghosh said.

"I started to shoot in 2002-2003 with a group of enthusiastic friends and we shot across three countries - in India, the UK and the USA. Finally in 2017, 15 years since



I started the journey I completed the film," the director said.

Referring to the ini-Censor hurdle mid-July last year when the CBFC Kolkata had asked Ghosh to cut or mute six words/phrases

- 'Gujarat', 'In India', 'Hindu', 'Cow', 'These days' and 'Hindutva' -- from the documentary for a 'U' certification, "At one point last year I thought that it was a losing battle," he said.

"But thanks to the

media support all over the country and abroad it gave me the strength to fight it out. Finally the film is finding the light of day. A special thanks to (CBFC chief) Prasoon Joshi for this," Ghosh

Asking the people to watch the film, the director said "Let's do this to honour one of the greatest living intellectuals of the world and a proud son of India Amartya Sen who received Bharat Ratna, the highest civilian award in India, in 1999.

I sincerely believe that such a "voice" is so needed in the current world scenario, he said.

"On January 12, Ghosh had told PTI, "I recognise that the decision (on removing the word 'Gujarat') is not the best but I strongly believe that the film should be shown to the public without further delay since beyond the controversies, which were unfortunate, I have a larger point in the film which needs to be

CISF headless for over a month; govt yet to appoint DG

(PTI): The country's front line security force against terror threats at civilian airports and strategic nuclear and aero-space installations, the CISF, is working without a regular chief for over a month as the Centre is yet to appoint a Director General (DG). The about 1.80-lakh

personnel strong force has been without a reg-ular DG since January 22 after serving chief O P Singh was repatriated to his cadre, on the request of the Uttar Pradesh gov-ernment, and appointed the state's director gen-

eral of police (DGP).

The process of decision-making and making large policy moves in the force has slowed down owing to the absence of the designated chief, official sources said.

"This is not a healthy

is happening again and again in the Central Armed Police Forces (CAPFs). This shows that the government has utter disregard for the importance of such an importante of such itary force," retired IPS officer Prakash Singh told PTI.

Singh, served as the DGP of the Uttar Pradesh and the BSF, has been an advocate for police reforms in the country and the Supreme Court, acting on his petitions, had issued guidelines on the subject.

"Not only policy mak-ing and decisions but the entire organisation suffers in the absence of a full-time chief. I do not know what is the problem in appointing a regular CISF chief when there is a pool of eligible IPS offrom," he said.

Sources in the Union home ministry said the process of appointing the CISF chief is ongoing

since the last month. "It is not at all good to keep a large and import-ant paramilitary force like the CISF headless for

such a long time.
"Last year, the gov ernment appointed the new CRPF DG after a delay of two months, during which the force suffered two major reverses in anti-Naxal operations," a senior official in the security establishment said.

The CRPF lost 38

troops in two deadly Maoist ambushes in Chhattisgarh's Sukma district when it was without a regular chief, and after these incidents senior IPS officer R R Bhatnagar was quickly appointed the new DG.

State Bank of India set for UK restructuring

LONDON, FEB 25 (PTI): In a strategic shift, the State Bank of India (SBI) will undertake a major restruc-turing of its business in the UK from April and en-sure greater protection for depositors, India's largest state-owned bank has said.

SBI's UK operations will transform into a subsidi-ary named State Bank of India UK Limited from April 1, in compliance with wider ring-fencing of capital re-

quirements by the Bank of England.

The move will mean that all retail branches of SBI in the UK will fall under a new UK-incorporated banking entity instead of their previous status as overseas branches of the Indian entity. "While there will be no visible change, the brand

changes to State Bank of India UK Limited. The 12 retail branches that we have - seven in London and the rest outside London - will become branches of SBI UK Ltd. Apart from that, if we look at the day to day, there will be no dislocation," said Sanjiv Chadha, SBI's Regional Head for UK.

He explains that while customers would be able to carry on using their debit cards and other banking facilities as before, the move marks a strategic shift for the bank with a greater focus on the UK market.

"We will be looking to doing more business in the

UK, expanding the products that are designed for the UK market," he said.

Political parties take the music route to woo voters in Meghalaya

WAHIAJER (MEGHA-LAYA), FEB 25 (PTI): Election campaigning has taken a musical up-swing in Meghalaya with political parties trying their best to connect with the voters by hitting the right notes.

Every evening, for the past one month, Wahiajer and its neighbouring village, Ummulong, in Nartiang assembly constituency, has been witnessing a live soiree with people dancing and singing to some of the liveliest campaign songs of candidates contesting this February 27 elec-

"One will find here young and old, men, women and children participating in the oncein-a-five-year festival of democracy with fervour every evening," a retired government employee and a resident of Wahiajer village, W Shylla, said.

The rallies of candi-

dates and political parties are never complete without good music, she said.

The political battle here in Nartiang is getting intense by the day with sitting MLA and NPP contender Sniawbhalang Dhar trying his best to outsmart his rivals Jopthiaw Lyngdoh of the Congress and Drai-son Kharshiing of the BJP.

The constituency is also home to thousands of people whose coal businesses have been affected badly by the NGT

"Coal ban, lack of employment for the youths, inadequate health care and education facilities are some of the issues that bother people in this part of the state," Donkhian Lyngdoh, a youth leader in the area, said.

Music may not solve the problems of the people but it is a catalyst for change, Jopthiaw told PTI, urging voters to vote for him to ensure better development in the constituency.

Fiery campaign for Feb 27 poll in Meghalaya, Nagaland draws to end

SHILLONG/KOHIMA, FEB 25 (PTI): The high-octane Meghalaya and Nagaland poll campaign during which barbs flew thick and fast among parties ended today.

Voting in the two states, both having 60-member assemblies, will take place on Tuesday. The results will be declared on March 3 along with that of Tripura, where elec-tions were held on February 18.

The BJP is making a determined bid to expand its footprint in the Northeast, buoyed by formation of its governments in Assam, Manipur and Arunachal Pradesh. Meghalaya, in particular, is im

portant for the Congress, which

has ruled it for 10 years.
But, this time the BJP is making a determined effort to throw them out of power and include Megha-laya, a next door neighbour of BJPruled Assam, in its kittv.

BJP's resolve could be gauged from the fact that Prime Minister Narendra Modi himself spear-headed the campaign. Party chief Amit Shah, Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh, Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman, I&B minister Smriti Irani and a host of other leaders also chipped in.
Union Minister of State for

Tourism K J Alphons, a Christian from Kerala, stayed put in Megha-laya as the BJP in- charge of the state with a predominant Christian population.
From the Congress, its presi

dent Rahul Gandhi campaigned in the state. Its media chief Randeep Singh Surjewala and MP Shashi Tharoor extended helping hands.

In Nagaland, the BJP's hope hinges on its alliance partner NDPP (Nationalist Democratic Progressive Party) of Neiphiu Rio which is contesting 40 seats. The BJP is fighting 20.

The Congress, which has given three chief ministers to Nagaland, is contesting only 18 seats, two

less than the BJP.

Voting will take place for 59 seats each in Meghalaya and Na-

"The Kolkata leg of the festival, organised for the first time in India, will end on March 13 after staging 21 theatre productions includ-ing English and other foreign and regional languages in both verbal and non-verbal forms in three venues," NSD Dean (Academic) Shantanu Bose told a press meet here last evening.
The 21 productions in-

clude five foreign theatre groups - Bangladesh (Morshokam), Sri Lanka (Pyramus & Thisby), Spain (The World Around 80 Boxes), Germany (Compassion: The History of Machine Gun), and Azerbai jan (Punishment), he said.

The Union Ministry of Culture has provided Rs 51 crore to host the 'Theatre Olympics,' so named due to its international nature, he

The 'Theatre Olympics' is being held in 17 cities across the country with Delhi, Bengaluru, Chennai, Thiruvanan-thapuram and Bhubaneswar already having staged the

show.

Theatre groups of 30 countries have been staging their globally acclaimed pro-ductions in the 17-city tour, he said.

The last leg of the festival will take place in Mumbai with a concluding show on

Bose said the 'Theatre Olympics' was first held in 1993 in Greece and over the years became a platform for theatrical exchange for stu-dents and eminent actors.

'While English plays will not require any sub-titles, for other foreign and Indian language plays there will be sub-titles of dialogues which will be flashed on side display board during the perfor-

mances," he said.

There will be no Bengali
plays from here excepting the Bangladeshi production.

The 'Theatre Olympics' had been previously held in Japan, Russia, Turkey, South Korea, China, Poland but not

in every year, he said.

Golden finish for Norway as Russian flag barred

PYEONGCHANG, FEB 25 (AFP): Winter Olympics legend Marit Bjoergen lifted Norway top of the final Pyeongchang medals table today, as Russia celebrated a dramatic men's hockey gold --but also saw their flag barred from the closing ceremony over doping.

Bjoergen, 37, won her second gold and fifth medal at Pyeongchang in the wom-en's 30km cross country mass start, extending her record Winter Olympics career tally to 15.

It was a fitting finale as it handed Norway their 14th gold to overtake Germany in the final medal count, after the German team won the four-man bobsleigh earlier on Sunday

Germany also finish on 14 golds, but Norway take top spot with their record 39 medals overall to Germany's 31. Canada are third with 11 golds, while hosts South Korea are seventh.

Norway's celebrations capped a dramatic final day competition that saw the Olympics Athletes from Russia beat Germany 4-3 in a sudden-death, overtime

hockey thriller.

Kirill Kaprizov scored a thumping power-play goal 9:40 into the extra period to trigger wild celebrations and end a 26-year wait for the title to return to Russian

The Russian players were heard singing the Russian national anthem on the ice -- apparently contravening rules governing their participation as neutrals, following a major doping scandal.

However, the Internation

al Olympic Committee had already voted to maintain Russia's ban pending the results of final dope tests from Pyeongchang, meaning the Russians cannot wave their national flag at Sunday's closing ceremony.

Altogether 168 Russian athletes including the ice hockey players were deemed "clean" and allowed to compete as neutrals in Pyeongchang, despite the suspension of Russia's national Olympic

committee.

But two Russians tested positive for doping during the Olympics and IOC president Thomas Bach said as a result, the ban could not be lifted for

the closing ceremony.
"This was hugely disappointing and does not permit the IOC to envisage lifting the suspension of Russia for the closing ceremony," Bach said, referring to the positive tests.

The men's ice hockey win brought Russia's total gold medal haul to two, far behind their dope-tainted haul of 13

Then in the final event of the Games, Norway's Bjoer-gen claimed her second gold in Pyeongchang as she signed off from her record-breaking Olympic career in style.

The cross-country legend won convincingly, 1min 49.5sec ahead of ahead of Finland's Krista Parmakoski with Stina Nilsson of Sweden taking bronze.

Bjoergen had already become the most decorated athlete in Winter Olympics history with her 14th medal on Wednesday, outstripping fellow Norwegian Ole Einar Bjoerndalen, who has 13 in

However, the fairytale of South Korea's smash-hit "Garlic Girls" women's curl-ing team ended in a stinker, as they lost the final 8-3 against Sweden.

More Chinese turning vegetarian

BEIJING, FEB 25 (PTI):

China - the world's largest mar-ket for beef, pork and poultry - is steadily growing wary of meat as health-conscious Chinese are taking to a vegetarian diet that has sparked mushrooming of vegan restaurants in

the world's most populous country.
China's restaurant industry over the past few years is reporting growing number of entrepreneurs looking to capitalise on the popularity of healthy eating, which usually means a meatless, organic and environmentally-friendly diet.

The niche market of vegetarian and vegan eateries has never been more competitive, a recent report from various cities complied by the Hong Kong-based South China Morning Post said. Han Lili, a Shanghai-based artist

who has tracked and mapped vegetarian and vegan restaurants in major Chinese cities including Shanghai, Chengdu, Lhasa, and Hong Kong since 2012, said it had been difficult to accurately count the number in operation in the past year or two be-cause the market changed so rapidly.

In Shanghai, China's largest city, the number of vegan outlets soared from 49 in 2012 to more than 100 last year, she said. In Chengdu, the capital of Sichuan province, almost half the 80 eateries needed updating after her last count.

A report by research firm Eu-romonitor said though China is still the world's biggest market for pork, beef and poultry, the demand showed decline in recent years.

A report by Chinadialogue.net

said sales of pork declined from 42.49 million tonnes in 2014 to 40.85 million tonnes in 2016. A new dietary guideline issued by China's health industry two years suggested eating less meat, poultry and seafood.

The Chinese meat industry adds around 150 million tonnes of carbon dioxide to the atmosphere every year, according to one study.

The growing trend of vegetarianism showed more Chinese turning to fruits and vegetables. China currently consumes 40 per cent of the world's fruit and vegetables, indicating the growing trend of vegetarianism in China. tween 2010 and 2016, China's imports of avocados rose from 1.9 tonnes to 25,000 tonnes a 13,000 fold increase.

According to one study, the vegan market in China is expected to rise by more than 17 per cent between 2015 and 2020. This will be the fastest rate of growth internationally in this time period and suggests a huge shift in consumer habits in Asia.

Health campaigns are also trying to influence people's habits. En-vironmental group WildAid held an event in Beijing in August 2017 to promote vegetarianism.

Popular actor Huang Xuan said his family is eating more and more vegetarian food, a change from the traditional diet in his native province of Gansu in China's northwest. which is high in beef and mutton

He thinks it's because people are more aware of the links between meat-eating, high blood pressure and obesity.

In 2014, state-run Xinhua news agency quoted Public Radio Inter-national, an independent non-profit

multi-media organisation, reporting that China's vegan population has reached more than 50 million. Dr Xu Jia, a dietician who leads

the China programme at the Physicians Committee for Responsi-ble Medicine, a Washington-based NGO, said he estimated one per cent would be closer to the truth.

A study conducted by research

ers from Shanghai Jiao Tong University in 2016 surveyed more than 4,000 people in the city and found that 0.77 per cent were vegetarians.

According to the world vegetarian outfits, India where vegetarianism was rooted in religion and culture estimated to have over 500 million vegetarians who shun meat in their meal.

Significantly, the vegan culture is spreading among young people in China which has a population of over 1.3 billion.

The Shanghai Jiao Tong University study also surveyed eight popular vegetarian restaurants in downtown Shanghai and found that close to half their customers were aged between 20 and 29, even though the average age of vegetarians was 65.

portal has reported that in November last year Hebei University of En-vironmental Engineering in the city of Qinhuangdao has added a vegetarian counter in the canteen at the request of a student organisation called the Lohas Vegetarian Society.

"Sure, it might not be front-page news, but by serving meatfree meals to college students, the college is embracing a heartening trend toward vegetarianism in a society where most square meals contain pork, chicken, or beef," the report said.

Stories like this have played out across more and more Chinese universities, driven by the recently established Universities and Colleges egetarian Association (UCVA)

This organisation for college vegetarians was founded at Beijing's Tsinghua University on World Earth Day last year.

"Alongside the rise of animal protectionism...more and more young Chinese are viewing vegetarianism as a healthy, eco-friendly, and trendy lifestyle," the Sixthtone report said.

Need to explain to people what climate change means in daily life: UN environ chief

New Delhi, FeB 25 (PTI): United Nations environment chief Erik Solheim has said spouting "doom and gloom" while talking about climate change will not work and stressed that there was a need to present it in a "simpler" language that explains to people what it really means for them in their daily lives.

He also noted that plastic pollution is similar to climate change and if steps are not taken to curb it now, reversing it will be "almost impossible".

As far as India is concerned, he said, it views environmental issues very much as a moral obligation and has got what it takes to lead the world into this change.

Solheim said a lot of people find the topic of climate change "boring". "The problem with climate change is that it s a long-term phenomenon involving some quite complex science. It does not surme that a lot of people find the topic boring, and frankly we are never going to bore people into action. And if we continue to spout doom-and-gloom, then people just switch off," he said.

He said that when the issue of climate change is discussed mostly the focus has been on the problem and the risks and that needed to change. "People want to see solutions, and to understand how they can contribute. It is time for a glob al mass movement for the environment, one that has never been seen before."

"For this to happen, we have to speak in a different language that is simpler and breaks down the science to explain to people what

climate change really means for them, in their daily lives, here and now," the executive director of the United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) told PTI.

"We have to make it a dinner table conversation," he said, "in other words, we need to help people connect with this issue in a way that lakes it personal, and not abstract."

It could be about things like

use prices, the cost of insurance policies, the impact on food prices or the link to mass migration, he

Solheim was in India for a week where among others, he signed a letter of intent on India hosting the World Environment Day on June 5.

to change. He said an astounding amount of plastic is produced every vear, much of which is often used a few seconds and discarded.

"Plastic pollution is similar to

climate change. If we don t step on the brakes now, it will be almost impossible to reverse.

He pointed out that this year an estimated 360 million tonnes of plastic will be produced and onethird of this will be non-recyclable.

"So imagine where this plastic is going. It is in our oceans and water bodies. It is in landfills and on our beaches. This year World Environment Day will bring the focus on plastic pollution, calling on people all over the world to 'refuse what you cannot re-use'," he said.

Tackling plastic pollution requires one to make a big push on three fronts, he said.

nat there are many simple steps they can take to reduce their own plastic footprint like "do we really need straws or apples wrapped in copious amounts of plastic? We don t and we can change that."

"Second, 40 per cent of used

plastic currently goes to landfill, when it could serve countless other uses. We need to recycle and reuse whatever we can. Thirdly, and this is where business comes in, we need to look at the whole life of a product and our consumption and trade systems."

"It is no longer possible for us to design products that are thrown away immediately after use," he said. "We need to re-think designs...and there are tremendous opportunities for businesses here."

Talking about efforts being

made in India in this direction he expressed his delight that the country is the global host of World ment Day 2018 and will be leading the push to save the oceans and the planet.

"India has very high rates of recycling, and in recent years, some of the biggest citizen action movements have happened in this coun try- for example, the Versova beach clean up in Mumbai," he said.

"So India has what it takes to lead the world into this change, he said.
"It is a booming economy with

the innovation and business expertise to change the way we make and use products. And it is a country that views environmental issues very much as a moral obliga-tion, to give back to people, nature and the world," he added.

India congratulates China on FATF post, hopes Beijing will be balanced

NEW DELHI, FEB 25 (PTI): India today congratulated China for becoming the vice chair of the Financial Action Task Force (FATF), a global body mandated to combat terror financing, and hoped Beijing would "up-hold and support" the objective of the watchdog in a balanced and objec-

In its plenary meet-ing in Paris on Friday, the FATF extensively deliberated on ways to combat terror financing and money-laundering but did not put Pakistan on its international terror-financing watch list. It gave Islamabad time till June to prepare an action plan against terror groups operating from Pakistan.

"Congratulations to China on its election as Vice President of Financial Action Task Force at the #FATF plenary mtg. on 23 February 2018. We remain hopeful that China would uphold & support the objectives & standards of FATF in a balanced, objective, impartial & holistic way," MEA spokesperson Ra-veesh Kumar tweeted.

China. Pakistan's all-weather ally, has re-peatedly blocked efforts by India, the US and the UK in the UN to designate JeM chief Masood Azhar a terrorist.

The FATF, in a report on Friday, named nine countries with "strategic deficiencies". Among the countries identified were Iraq, Syria, Yemen and Tunisia. Pakistan was on FATF's "grey list" from 2012 to 2015.

The Financial Action Task Force (FATF) was set up in 1989 with the primary goal of setting standards to combat money laundering, but in 2001 its mandate was expanded to include countering terror financing. It can take action such as financial restrictions against any country.

At the FATF plenary meeting, the US and some of its European allies were in favour of placing Pakistan on the list of countries that financially

Support terrorism.

However, Pakistan
has been given time
till June to prepare an
action plan to take action against terror groups operating from its soil following which the FATF would take a call on whether to name it on its terror-financing watch

UN backs Syria ceasefire as death toll in rebel enclave tops 500

UNITED NATIONS, FEB 25 (AFP): The UN Security Council has unanimously demanded a 30-day ceasefire in Syria, as new air strikes on the rebel enclave of Eastern Ghouta took the civilian death toll from seven days of bombing to more than 500.
With support from

Russia, the Security Council adopted a resolution on the ceasefire to allow for humanitarian aid de-liveries and medical evacuations, but the measure did not specify when the truce would go into force beyond saying it should

"without delay."

After the council vote yesterday, Syrian war-planes backed by Russian air power launched new raids on a town in Eastern Ghouta, the Syrian Observatory for Human Rights said.

At least 127 children are among the 519 dead in the bombing campaign



last Sunday on the rebel enclave, just outside the Damascus British-based monitor said.

At least 41 civilians were killed in yester-day's strikes, including eight children. Russia has denied taking part in the

Ouickly following up on the vote, French President Emmanuel Macron and German Chancellor Angela Merkel will speak by phone today with Russian President Vladimir Putin to push for the truce to take hold "in the com ing days," the Elysee palace said in a statement.

To this end France's

Foreign Minister Jean-Yves Le Drian will also go to Moscow on Tuesday.

The UN vote was initially expected to be held Thursday, but was repeatedly delayed as diplomats were locked in tough negotiations to avoid a veto from Russia, which is militarily sup-porting President Bashar Al-Assad.

Russian Amhassa-Vassily Nebenzia rejected accusations of foot-dragging, saying that negotiations were needed to arrive at a demand for a ceasefire that was "feasible."

UN Secretary-General Antonio Guterres, who

has described Eastern Ghouta as "hell on Earth." said the ceasefire must be "immediately" imple-

mented.

To win Russia's approval, language specifying that the ceasefire would start 72 hours after adoption was scrapped, replaced by "without delay," and the term "immediate" was dropped in reference to

In another concession to Moscow, the ceasefire will not apply to opera-tions against the Islamic State group or Al-Qaeda, along with "individuals, groups, undertakings and entities" associated

with the terror groups.

That would allow the Syrian government offensive to continue against Al-Qaeda-linked jihadists in Idlib, the last province in Syria outside the control of Damascus. Russia has vetoed

11 draft resolutions throughout the Syrian conflict to block action that targeted its ally. In November, it used its veto to end a UN-led investigation of chemical weapons attacks in

Syria. In Eastern Ghouta, news of the UN vote on the ceasefire was greeted with a shrug.
"I don't think this de-

cision will be implement-

ed. It will be respected neither by the regime nor Russia," said Abu Mazen, a resident of Douma Eastern Ghouta's main town.

"We can't trust Russia or the regime. We are used to their betrayals," he added.

Control of Eastern Ghouta is shared between two main Islamist factions, while Syria's former Al-Qaeda affiliate is also present. Russia has

pressing for a negotiated withdrawal of rebel fight-ers and their families like the one that saw the government retake full control of Syria's second city Aleppo in December

But all three rebel groups have refused.

The enclave is sur-rounded by governrounded by govern-ment-controlled territory, and its 400,000 residents are unwilling or unable to flee the deadly siege.

High-level N Korean delegates arrive in the South

SEOUL, FEB 25 (AFP): A blacklisted North Korean general arrived in the South today for the Winter Olympics closing ceremony, which will also be at-tended by US President Donald

Trump's daughter Ivanka.

The visit by Kim Yong Chol, who led an eight-member high-level delegation that crossed the Demilitarized Zone in the morning, is the final piece of the Games-led diplomacy that has dominated headlines from Pyeongchang.
The nuclear-armed North

has gone on a charm offensive in connection with the Olympics, sending athletes, cheerleaders and performers to the Games, with leader Kim Jong Un's sister Kim Yo Jong attending the opening ceremony.

Analysts say it is seeking to loosen the sanctions imposed against it over its banned nuclear weapon and ballistic missile programmes, and trying to weaken the alliance between Seoul and Washington.

But Kim Yo Jong had no in-teraction with US Vice President Mike Pence at the opening ceremony, even though the two were sitting just a few seats apart in the same VIP area, and according to the US, a planned meeting between the delegations from Washington and Pyongyang the following day was cancelled at short notice by the North Kore-

South Korean President Moon Jae-in -- who has long pushed for engagement with the North to bring it to the ne-gotiating table -- also did not immediately accept an invitation passed on by Kim Yo Jong from her brother to go to Pyongyang for a summit, saying the right conditions needed to be created.

Washington, which scribes its approach to Pyong-



yang as "maximum pressure and engagement", announced a raft of new sanctions against it on

Pence also condemned Kim Yo Jong as part of an "evil family clique" and "murderous regime" prompting a denunciation from Pyongyang on Sunday, which said it would not talk to the Trump administration for "even

100 years or 200 years". Kim Yong Chol's delegation crossed the heavily-fortified border into the South on Sun-day morning, a spokesman for Seoul's unification ministry said

Television footage showed Kim Yong Chol, wearing a dark long coat, being greeted by Seoul's vice unification minister Chun Hae-sung before getting into a black sedan prepared by the South, while others boarded a bus and a van.

Kim's nomination as the leader of the group is controversial in the South, where he is widely blamed for a spate of attacks in-cluding the torpedoing of Seoul's Cheonan warship in 2010, with the loss of 46 lives. Pyongyang

denies responsibility. Conservative staged an overnight protest near the border with the North,

On Friday the US Treasury blacklisted 28 ships, 27 companies and one person, impos-ing an asset freeze and barring US citizens from dealing with them, in what Donald Trump

described as the "heaviest sanctions ever" levied on Pyongyang. The UN Security Council has

already banned North Korean exports of coal -- a key foreign exchange earner -- iron ore, seafood and textiles, and restricted its oil imports.

Washington is also seeking

to have the United Nations ban 33 vessels from ports world-wide and blacklist 27 shipping businesses for helping North Korea circumvent sanctions, in a bid to cripple North Korea's maritime network.

Kim Yo Jong's trip at the start of the Games -- the first visit to the South by a member of the North's ruling dynasty since the Korean War ended in 1953 with a ceasefire on the divided penin--- made global headlines.

But Pence told an audience of thousands at the Conservative Political Action Conference: "The sister of Kim Jong Un is a central pillar of the most tyrannical and oppressive regime on the planet, an evil family clique that brutalises, subjugates, starves and imprisons its 25 million people."

In the US, he added, "We stand up to murderous dictator-

Pyongyang denounced his comments today, with the official Korean Central News Agency carrying a statement from the North's Korea Asia-Pacific Peace Committee saying Pence would discover "what quagmire his crazy remarks threw the US and himself into".

Trump, it said, should know that the North would "have no dealings with those viciously slandering the dignity of our su preme leadership and govern-

"We will never have face-toface talks with them even after 100 years or 200 years."


