Since Mr Lachungpa did not withdraw his papers - no surprises there - and since no other indepen-dent or party candidate was fielded for the lone Rajya Sabha seat, Mr Lachungpa now begins a second term representing Sikkim in the Upper House of the Parliament.

His return to the Parliament was formalized here at the Sikkim Legislative Assembly today with the Returning Officer for the Rajya Sabha elections in Sikkim, LM Pradhan, handing him the election certificate.

The special function was also attended by Deputy Speaker, So-nam Gyatso Lepcha, who was also nominated the special observer for



the RS elections in Sikkim the Elec-State's Chief Electoral Officer Tenzing Golay. Also in attendance were GMC chairperson Ashish Rai, Gangtok Mayor Shakti Singh and officials

engaged with the election process.

4 arrested with musk pods and live snake

Sashastra Seema Bal today arrested 04 persons who were in possession of musk pods and a live

Following a tip off, the team raided the rented room at Tadong where the four were currently residing in. On searching, the team recovered 05 musk pods and a live snake kept inside a poly-

thene bag.

DFO, N Jaswant informed that the musk pods recovered can fetch a price of Rs 25-30 lakh.

Bimal Subba and Krishnaman Chettri of Chandey, North Sikkim along with Jordan Lep-cha of Dzongu and a girl have been taken into custody under the Wildlife Protection Act. Investigations are on to find out where and how the accused got hold of the musk pods and snake and what they were plan-

ning to do with them.

Musk deer is a protected animal under
Schedule I of the Wildlife Protection Act. Male musk deer have a scent sac or nod which becomes active when they are about two years old. This sac secretes a substance known as musk; the stag uses it to mark his territory and to attract females. Each musk pod weighs about 15 gm. For thousands of years this deer had been killed in small numbers for the scent and the medicine industry.

The Archery Championship will be held from 15-16 Jan and Football league tournament will start from 10 Jan with the finals to be held on 17 and 18 Jan.



AAP to contest 35 seats in Meghalaya Assembly election

SHILLONG, JAN 8 (PTI): The Aam Aadmi Party (AAP) today said it will contest at least 35 seats in the Meghalaya Assembly elections.

Elections to the 60-member Meghalaya Assembly are due in the first half of this year as the term of the present Assembly expires on March 6.

"We are hoping to field 35 candidates for the next election as we have good chance of winning," AAP state president Wanshwa Nongtdu told reporters here.

He claimed the chances of the AAP is "good".

The AAP leader also exuded confidence that the party will form the next government by fielding "common man" as its candidates.

"We are Aam aadmi and we will have common man as candidates, we have few retired officers, few intellectuals who want to contest and we prefer our candidates be to be AAP candidates," he said.

severe cold wave conditions prevailed over Sub-Himalayan West Bengal as Jalpaiguri recorded the lowest night temperature in the state's plains at 3.8 degrees Celsius at 5.30 am.

Coochbehar followed closely at 3.9 degrees Celsius, according to the Met department.

Sriniketan recorded 6.8 degrees Celsius, the lowest in Gangetic West Bengal, while Krishnagar's lowest temperature stood at 7.8 degrees Celsius.

The minimum temperature of Kolkata was recorded at 10.5 degrees Celsius, the city's lowest

mercury count this season.

3 Dzongu GPUs demand fresh Gram Sabha on Forest Rights Act for Teesta Stage-IV

The Panchayats of three Gram Panchayat Units of Dzongu Lum-Gor-Sangtok, Lingdong-Barfok and Hee-Gyathang have placed a memorandum to the District Collector [North] for again conducting the Gram Sabha on Forest Rights Act (FRA) for 520 MW Teesta Stage IV hydro electric project of Dzongu, North Sikkim.

A memorandum on halting the land acquisition process for the said project was also placed stating that the process be stopped immediately as three out of four GPUS on the right bank have rejected the project.

The memorandum also al-

The memorandum also alleges that documents were forged during the second Gram Sabha held for Lum-Gor-Sangtok GPU.

The document, which has

been the reference point for the environmental and social assessment (SIA) and planning of multiple hydro power projects, has been the carrying capacity study of Teesta basin completed in 2008.

That study has already recommended that the 520MW Teesta IV should have no "pondage" of any duration. Therefore it has said it should not have a reservoir. Teesta Stage-IV HEP,

however, has a bigger reservoir submerging over 4.3km of Teesta and 600 metres of Rongyong Chu. Therefore, the land sought to be acquired for the reservoir violates the recommendation of the carrying capacity study, it is being argued.

The memorandum also demands that this stretch of the river between two mega projects, 1200 MW Teesta III and 510 MW Teesta V, should flow free.

Give due seriousness to PIL for barring convicts from running parties: SC to Centre, EC

New Delhi, Jan 8 (PTI): The Supreme Court today asked the Centre and the Election Commission to consider with "due seriousness" a plea seeking that convicted persons be barred from forming political parties and becoming their office-bearers for the period they are disqualified under the election law.

A bench comprising Chief Justice Dipak Misra and Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud directed the Centre and the poll panel to file their response.

"Please take this matter with due seriousness," the bench observed while noting that the government and the Election Commission have not filed their reply despite notices being issued to them.

The top court has posted the matter for further hearing on February 12.

ruary 12.

It had earlier agreed to examine the constitutional validity of Section 29A of the 1951 Representation of the People Act (RPA) which deals with the power of the poll panel to register a political party.

panel to register a political party.

The plea claimed that under the statutory schemes, the poll panel was empowered to register political parties, but it lacked the authority under the RPA to de-reg-

ister them

The petition, filed by a lawyer and Delhi BJP spokesperson Ashwini Kumar Upadhyay, has said that if a person on conviction in a criminal case was barred from contesting elections, it would be incongruent to allow such person to form or head a political outfit.

The plea said convicted pol-

The plea said convicted politicians, who are barred from contesting elections, can still run political parties and hold posts in them, besides deciding as to who will become a lawmaker.

It has sought a ban on convict-

It has sought a ban on convicted persons from forming a political party and becoming office bearers for the period they are disqualified under the election laws.

It has sought a direction to declare Section 29A of the RPA as "arbitrary, irrational and ultra-vires" to the Constitution and to authorise the poll panel to register and de-register political.

de-register political.

The plea has also sought a direction to the EC to frame guidelines to decriminalise the electoral system and ensure inner party democracy, as proposed by the National Commission to Review the Working of the Constitution (NCRWC).

The petition said that current-

ly, even a person who has been convicted for heinous crimes like murder, rape, smuggling, money laundering, loot, sedition, or dacoity, can form a political party and become its president or office bearers.

The petition named several top political leaders who have been convicted or have charges framed against them and were holding top political posts and "wielding political power".

It said the proliferation of political parties has become a major concern as Section 29A of the Representation of of the People Act, 1951, allows a small group of people to form a political party by making a very simple declaration.

making a very simple declaration.

"Presently, about 20 per cent of registered political parties contest election and remaining 80 per cent parties create excessive load on electoral system and public money," the plea said and sought implementation of the 1990 Goswami Committee on Electoral Reform.

The plea also claimed that in 2004, the poll panel had proposed amendment to Section 29A, authorising it to issue apt orders regulating the registration or de-registration of political parties.

CBI's SIT not serious about Manipur fake encounters probe: SC

New Delhi, Jan 8 (PTI): The Supreme Court today said it appeared that the matter relating to probe into extra-judicial killings, alleged fake encounters by the Army, Assam Rifles and police in insurgency-hit Manipur was not being taken up seriously by a Special Investigation Team of the CBI.

The apex court observed this after it was informed that despite its order in July last year, only 11 FIRs out of a total of 92 cases have been registered by the SIT in the matter.

"It appears to us that the matter is not being tak-

en up by the CBI and the SIT with the seriousness which it deserve," a bench comprising Justices Madan B Lokur and U U Lalit said and directed the CBI's DIG, who is in-charge of the SIT probe, to remain present before it on January 16.

The bench also asked the DIG to file a status report of the progress made in the investigation in these cases. The top court had on July 14 last year set up an

Cases. The top court had on July 14 last year set up an SIT comprising five CBI officers and ordered registration of FIRs and probe into the extra-judicial killings in Manipur.

It had asked the CBI director to nominate a team of the officers for the SIT who will lodge the reasonable.

five officers for the SIT, who will lodge the necessary FIRs and complete the investigation into alleged fake encounters by December 31 last year.

During the hearing, the lawyer appearing for petitioners, said that the court had ordered lodging of FIRs

till December 31 but as per the office report, only 11 such FIRs have been registered in a total of 92 matters. "The SIT is dragging its feet," the counsel said after which the bench asked Additional Solicitor General (ASG) Maninder Singh about it. The court also asked Singh as to whether any one from the SIT was present

in the courtroom for the hearing.
"Our experience is that if an SIT has been set up, somebody from the SIT should be present in the court for two things. One to tell us what is going on and second is to instruct the lawyers. SIT cannot and should not say that our job is only to investigate." the court said.

Meanwhile, the ASG, who initially said that the matter was listed for only an application, told the bench the DIG would be present in the court on the next date of hearing.

Senior lawyer Colin Gonsalves, who was appearing for the petitioners, said that former head constable of the Manipur police Herojit Singh, who was an eye witness to fake encounter cases, has filed an application in the court.

He said that CBI team had raided Herojit's residence and in 2010 seized his three diaries, in which he had recorded details of such fake encounter cases.

Gonsalves also said the SIT has not yet recorded the statements of witnesses. However, the ASG said that Herojit's case has nothing to do with the matter pending before the court and it was not maintainable.

He contended that Herojit was an accused in one of these cases in which trial was going on and he should have moved the lower court or the high court on the issue of these diaries. Regarding the ASG's submissions, Gonsalves said Herojit was accused in a case in which he had allegdly shot at an unarmed man on the instructions of his senior officer.

The apex court, which is hearing a PIL seeking probe into 1528 extra-judicial killings, had in July last year ordered registration of FIR in 81 cases including 32 probed by a Commission of Enquiry, 32 cases investigated by judicial enquiries and high courts, 11 cases in which compensation has been awarded by the NHRC and six cases probed by a commission headed by former Supreme Court judge Justice Santosh Hegde.

Media Should Invite More Criticism

There can, after all, be no improvement without analysis

 $\mathbf{T}^{ ext{he}}$ news media is introduced as the fourth estate, the fourth pillar holding up the shelter of democracy.

Interestingly, while the other "estates" of democracy - the judiciary, the executive and the legislative have a screening process to get where they do and are also occasionally held accountable for their actions in a formal way in the public domain, the news media is an equal opportunity sector where anyone can get in and appears to work unfettered and is technically answerable to no one. In a perfect world, this is how things should be with "open access" graduating to meritocracy and excellence in this estate. The watchdog in a true democratic system should not be subservient to anyone or anything if it is to deliver on its responsibilities properly. It is, however, not a perfect world that we live in, so checks and balances are required at every level. One could argue that the readers are the best agency to rein in the media when the power of the pen goes to their head. And, in a way they are. No matter how sensational its content, a newspaper, news channel or any other vehicle of information loses credibility in the reader's mind if it keeps reporting rumours for facts and highlighting trivialities as issues. Readers might turn to them for entertainment, but will take the information with a pinch of salt. And, with so many other modes of entertainment available nowadays, even that USP becomes a liability very fast. So, yes, readership/ viewership (or followers if you are more SocialMedia inclined) is the one factor that fixes accountability on newspapers.

Obviously, sometimes, just this much is not enough. Readership is not respected to the extent it should be - neither in Sikkim nor in India as a whole. While simple numbers are enough to decide readership in Sikkim, at a national level it becomes slightly more complicated. The numbers game that media houses indulge in to inflate circulation is no secret and it is perhaps for this reason that an editorial post common in West is now being toyed by some newspapers in India too. The Hindu had started the ball rolling with the offer to appoint a Reader's Editor, an Ombudsman of sorts. This was a brave decision as the Reader's Editor, the in-house critic, is expected to be scathing in her/his analysis of the newspaper. That experiment has played out to mixed results, but is worth exploring on wider scale. A Reader's/ Public Editor does not only question and challenge the veracity of news-reports, but also pulls up the intents and vested interests behind the highlighting, prominence and display of certain stories. That is not all, s/he is also allowed to question journalistic ethics of the newspaper and also air opinion when some stories are downplayed or dropped. S/he does all this not in internal memos, but in a space allotted in the newspaper. In the public domain, Reader's Editors in the West have been known to be extremely sharp in their criticism. Their performance in India leaves a lot to be desired but is a necessary undertaking. It is also unlikely to happen with any significance because media criticism/ analysis is still a rare animal in media circles. Some online platforms are trying to correct this, but their reach is still limited.

The reason this is being shared here is to highlight the fact that there can be no improvement without criticism. And, there is no such thing as "positive criticism." Criticism is criticism, its positivity or negativity depends on the target of the criticism and how it is used. Newspaper reports are not the final word. Everyone knows that, and since there is still a lot of room for improvement as far as our conduct is concerned, we, in the media, should invite more responses. To begin with, there will be crude and poorly informed outbursts, but if we give it time, discussions on newspapers in the public domain will soon become more coherent and, yes, "constructive"

Alternative currencies are the future: why it matters for development

When I began to teach in 2012, I decided to start my course with an analysis of how money affects social order. What my students found particularly fascinating was the then-nascent world of cryptocurrencies, which I described at length as a crucial feature in the future of money.

Some colleagues criticised my approach. They accused me of indirectly encouraging students to invest in what they saw as a shady, crime-ridden financial underworld. But I

was simply exposing young minds to a fast-evolv-ing, complex phenomenon that in my view would have a major impact on power distribution in the

Behind most cryptocurrencies is a simple technology known as "blockchain", a system residing in multiple computers that allows for peer-to-peer financial ledger recording of all transactions occurring in a network.

This results in a transparent open-access reg-

istry of monetary flows which makes the interme diation of banking authorities unnecessary. Thus it challenges the conventional belief that money can only work through central planning.

As I explain in my book, Wellbeing Economy: Success in a World Without Growth, money systems are undergoing an unprecedented transition from centralised authority to decentralised networks.

Conventional money is managed by states and banks, with users on the receiving end of monetary policy decisions. By contrast, most alternative curren-cies are peer-to-peer. That means they are managed by users themselves and do not require intermediaries. Some of them have global outreach thanks to digi-tal technology, while others are locally based.

Take BitCoin, the most popular peer-to-peer currency in the world, with a market capitalisation above 40 billion US dollars. A person buying the equivalent of \$1 in BitCoin in 2009 would now possess roughly \$25 million. One BitCoin is currently equivalent in value to two ounces of gold. Other rising stars include Ethereum, Litecoin and Ripple.

TAKING THE WORLD BY STORM

of these currencies remain quite volatile in the short term. Their upward and downward swings reach over 10% of the value on a weekly basis. But the long-term trend is impressive. States are warming up to them.

In April 2017, Japan accepted BitCoin as a legal payment method for retail markets. After threatening digital currencies last year, the Russian government took a U-turn. President Vladimir Putin me the developers of Ethereum and committed to recognising cryptocurrencies in 2018.

Following an initial freeze, the People's Bank of China readmitted withdrawals in BitCoin in June 2017, catapulting the currency to new heights. In the US, cryptocurrencies are becoming increasing-ly accepted as both a method of payment and store

The Australian government will soon make it easier for new innovative digital currency businesses to operate, exempting traders and investors from goods and services tax

It's clear that cryptocurrencies will in the near future become much more common as methods of payment for a wide range of purchases, from online shopping to the local supermarket.

DEVELOPING COUNTRIES ARE LEAPFROGGING

Developing economies, too, are opening up to cryptocurrencies. In Venezuela, BitCoin has become the leading parallel currency. It provides millions of citizens with an opportunity to perform trans-actions and generate livelihoods, including buying food and other basic necessities in a country where official money is worth almost zero. It also allows them to purchase goods from overseas, overcoming ever-stricter capital controls.

In East Africa, local innovators have introduced cryptocurrency systems to support cross-border transactions, as exemplified by initiatives like BitPesa.

In South Africa, cryptocurrencies are becoming particularly popular. In Nigeria, local traders and activists believe this new money presents an op-portunity to democratise the economy. This is pro-pelled by the fact that people in Nigeria have been

failed by conventional money.

According to my colleague Verengai Mabika, founder of BitFinance in Zimbabwe, the collapse of his country's formal financial system has made BitCoin an attractive alternative. This is especially the case for online payments, which are restricted by banks, and for remittances, which constitute the

A growing number of Zim babweans are also using crypnism (37% of all Bitfinance cus tomers use it for that purpose), Verengai tells me. This is after the massive loss of personal savings during the hyperinflation period of 2008, which led to the collapse of the country's

DECENTRALISATION AND LOCAL ECONOM-IC DEVELOPMENT

The decentralisation of mon-ey is indeed at the core of this new trend, with potential re-

percussions in other fields. For instance, Ethereum is designed as a smart contract platform, that is a trading system completely based on peer-to-peer rights. FairCoin was developed as the preferential currency for cooperatives, social economies and fair trade networks around the world.

Cryptocurrencies are just the tip of an iceberg. According to recent estimates, there are over 6,000 complementary currencies in the world, over 50 times the number of conventional money systems. Most of these are user-controllled and are interest-free. One cannot make money by simply trading

Hoarding makes no sense in this new world. This is because value is not in the accumulation but in the exchange.

The scope is often limited to certain territories or types of transactions (for example, personal care, sustainable mobility and local trade). This creates an incentive to support local economic development and forms of exchange that are valued by communities of users.

Regiogeld, a network of local currencies which I studied when I was a researcher in Germany, has pro-liferated throughout the country. It has become the world's largest system of local currencies, supporting

small businesses and empowering communities.

In the near future, we will have a variety of money with different qualities and different purposes. This will make economies more resilient against shocks and will support more equitable and sustainable development, by putting users in the driver seat and reinforcing local economic development. As my research demonstrates, a combination of

regional, national and local currencies could also be the best way forward for the European Union, engulfed by its monolithic and unsustainable euro, and for any other process of regional integration, from Africa to other continents.

Kim Jong-un is a gangster: Here's how to sort him out

U.S. President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong-un should never talk to each other on the phone, or through Twitter, Two unpredictable, nuclear-armed egotists are a threat to themselves and to the world, regardless of the size of their buttons

Fortunately, cooler heads are now communicating between North and South Korea. Still, this is no time for South Korean President Moon Jae-in, nor the international community, to get comfortable with Kim Jong-un

North Korea flouts internation-al agreements, bolsters its economy through sordid means and is responsible for ghastly human rights abuses.

As a researcher on social justice and human security in North Korea, I have a reminder for Canadian For-eign Affairs Minister Chrystia Freeland and U.S. Secretary of State Rex Tillerson as they prepare to meet in Vancouver next week to discuss North Korea: Kim Jong-un runs a feu-dal gangland, not a nation state. The rules of diplomacy do not apply to the Hermit Kingdom

North Korea is isolated, hungry, without power and without allies. Yet Kim gathers resources for nuclear proliferation, missiles and prison camps. This is thanks to his business partners. The international commu-nity has mistakenly ignored them.

How to deal with Kim's belligerence? View him as a thug. And like any gangster, understand how he makes money and what really scares him.

First, target those who profit with Kim. Second, empower defectors who can speak to North Korea's grim reality. Their voices matter both within and outside of North Korea.

Kim acquires weapons by sea, he pays for them with narcotics, cy-ber-attacks and cryptocurrency. Masterful smugglers, North Korean ves-





shell companies process the funds, and other vessels entering North Korean waters deceptively turn off their broadcast identifiers

'PROTECTOR' OF NORTH KOREANS I interviewed numerous North Korean defectors for three years. I also tracked vessels doing business with Mr. Kim. From this work, I make two conclusions about how the international community should approach North Korea.

First, Kim holds power through a projected image of ordained invincibility. He is the protector of the North Korean people. He may not provide enough food, and he may send them to prison camps, but only he can protect against pending violence from the United States.

Missile launches and nuclear tests

pose little threat to the West. They are symbolic demonstrations of power for his compa-

Second, in order to prop up his image as the Great Marshal, Kim collects his military resources below the radar, Illegal smuggling, counterfeiting, insurance scams, weapons sales,

cyber attacks, narcotics production and forced labour abroad bring in cash. And there are global markets for all, accessed through shady diplomats and shadowy shell companies. They skirt sanctions with impunity.

Formal diplomacy fails as North Korea relies more on the illicit, rather than the legitimate, international

community. Until now.

Recent sanctions by the United
States, the United Nations and the European Union are smarter. They target Kim's financial environment. Instead of sanctioning the target, new sanctions attack the banks and maritime operators that help him.

Already, maritime traffic into North Korea has dropped signifi-cantly and the regime is taking to sea-to-sea transfers to acquire goods

a high-risk, low-return operation Kim's options are getting fewer.

It's a start, but not enough.

Targeting Kim's markets for mis-sile tests and nuclear proliferation is good policy. It is easier, and safer, to prevent missiles getting in to North Korea than it is to shoot them down once they're flying out.

However, North Korea's trading partners are widespread and include businesses around the world, notably in Europe, India, Africa and even New

Recognize that Kim's greatest fear is having his compatriots and the world know how weak he is. The missiles are more show than threat. It's why Kim is not fazed by Donald Trump's half-baked tweets. KIM NERVOUS ABOUT

DEFECTORS'S STORIES

He is, however, deeply frightened of defectors telling their stories. Their testimony will shatter his reputation and possibly land him in the International Court of Justice.

North Koreans are unlikely to oust Kim themselves and rebel against Juche, the regime's rigid social control system. China also fears the thought of any civil conflict in North Korea that could lead to a massive refugee crisis at its borders.

Strategic sanctions against North Korea are starting to put Kim in a bind. Winter is a hungry time in North Korea, and Kim will blame sanctions

for upcoming food shortages.
Freeland, Tillerson and Moon
must remain vigilant with smart sanctions and not trust Kim to make good on any agreement.

Instead, they must identify those who finance Kim, block their revenues and deal with him like an international criminal, not as a head of state.

Rail roko, fog disrupt train movement in West Bengal

A call to disrupt rail traffic by a Jharkhand-based party, coupled with dense fog disrupted train movement in vari-ous parts of West Bengal today, causing inconvenience to thousands of passengers.

A number of express and passenger trains were either cancelled or diverted, owing to the ag-itation by supporters of Jharkhand Dishom Party, which has a presence among tribals in various parts of West Bengal.

The party had called a strike opposing land acquisition in tribal ar-eas and other issues, following which its sup-porters blocked railway tracks at Indrabil, Kantadih, Madhukunda and Maluka stations.

In South Eastern Railyay (SER), the rail roko affected train movement from 6.05 am with blockfrom 6.05 am with block-ades at various stations in Adra and Chakrad-harpur divisions, SER spokesperson Sanjoy Ghosh said.

The blockades were lifted at 1.20 pm, he said, adding 18183 Tatanagar-Dhanbad Express, 58025 Kharagpur-Hatia passenger and seven MEMU passenger trains were cancelled.

Ghosh said two other



trains -- 228 Shalimar-Adra 22861/22862 iva Rani Express and 63595 Bokaro Steel City-Asansol Express were short terminated.

The 12801 Puri-New Delhi Purushottam Express would run on diverted route via Chan-dil-Muri-Bokaro Steel City instead of Chandil-Purulia-Bokaro Steel City, while the 22811 Bhubaneswar-New Delhi Rajdhani Express would run on diverted route via Kharagpur-Tatana-gar-Chandil-Muri-Bokaro Steel City instead of Kharagpur-Adra-Gomoh, the spokesperson said.

Supporters of the party also blocked railway tracks from 6.00 am at Adina, Dalkhola, Araria and Buniyadpur stations in Katihar division of North East Frontier Rail-

way, resulting in several and express trains being held up at different stations for several hours, railway sources said.

WB to install speed limiting devices in commercial vehilces

KOLKATA, JAN 8 (PTI): The West Bengal government will install speed-limiting devices in all commercial vehicles registered in the state to check accidents and to ensure that they maintain stipulated speed limits while moving through the national and state highways.

A senior official of the state transport department told PTI that the state transport department has also decided to install the speed-limit devices in all vehicles registered for use by the state

The decision is a part of the West Bengal government's 'Safe Drive, Save Life' campaign, he said adding the move would also increase safety on the roads and highways passing through West

The transport department has decided that speed-limiting

devices will be installed in all commercial vehicles registered in West Bengal. This device will ensure that stipulated speed limits are not violated on major thoroughfares here, including the national high-ways, state highways and on the local roads in urban areas," he said.

It has been decided that on certain stretches of national highways, the speed limit would not be more than 80 km per hour, 60 km per hour on the state highways and 40 km per hour on local urban roads.

"The department has also decided that the fitness certificates for a commericla vehicle will not be issued until the speed-limiting device is not installed in it, he said.

The transport department has also decided to set up signages specifying speed limits and other steps taken to ensure road safety.

"There will be signboards by

the side of the roads and highways to make drivers aware of the speed limit on a particular stretch. Signboards will also be put up to make restrictions for slow-moving vehicles on the highways and measures against illegal parking," the officer said.

"We are also designing fines likely to be imposed on vehicles flouting the norms. Strict actions will be initiated against them," he

A data released by the state transport department showed the number of road accidents in West Bengal in the last one year has gone down by 16.06 per cent while the number of deaths due to road accidents saw a fall of 13.34 per cent during the period.

The number of people injured in road accidents also went down by 12.10 per cent, the data said.

Women from across the vast Gulf kingdom may be able to take advantage of this new freedom as the first match will be held in the capital Riyadh, the second in Jeddah on the Red Sea and the third in the eastern city of Dammam.

The kingdom, which has some

of the world's tightest restrictions on women, has long barred women from sports arenas by strict rules on segregation of the sexes

Under Saudi Arabia's existing guardianship system, a male family member -- normally the father, husband or brother -- must grant



But the conservative kingdom has in recent months eased some of its most notorious restrictions on women, including the lifting of a driving ban -- set to go into effect

In September, hundreds of women were allowed to enter a sports stadium in Riyadh, used mostly for football matches, for the first time to mark Saudi Arabia's

The easing of social controls

comes as Crown Prince Mohammed bin Salman looks to repackage the oil-rich nation as more moderate and welcoming.

The powerful crown princes' Vision 2030 programme for a post-oil era stems partly from an economic motive to boost domestic spending on entertainment as the kingdom reels from an energy

Saudis splurge billions of dollars annually on entertainment in the neighbouring tourist hubs of Bahrain and Dubai.

Safe havens to terrorists in Pak not acceptable to US: CIA

US President Donald Trump has asked Pakistan to "cease" being a safe haven for terrorists that threaten the US, the Central Intelligence Agency (CIA) Director said yesterday. The US has suspend-ed about USD 2 billion in

"We see the Pakistanis continuing to pro-vide safe harbour, havens inside of Pakistan for terrorists who present risks to the United States of America," Pompeo was quoted as saying by the

Moshe, 11, was two when his parents were killed in the Mumbai attacks at Nariman House (also known as Chabad House) by Pakistan-based

Lashkar-e-Taiba terrorists.

The attack on the Nariman House and other locations like the Taj Hotel

left 166 people dead.

The boy, standing and crying between his dead parents' bodies, was saved in a daring move by his Indi-an nanny, Sandra Samuels, who was hiding in a room downstairs when the attack happened.

"Moshe is very excited and at the

same time emotional as he gets ready to leave for Mumbai on January 15. He is returning to his birthplace and is waiting to see many things connected to his late parents that he has heard about from us and his nanny. There are lots of memories," an overwhelmed Rabbi Shimon Rosenberg, Moshe's grandfather, told PTI.

In an emotional meeting with Prime Minister Narendra Modi on July 5 in Jerusalem, the young boy had expressed his wish to visit Mumbai.



"I hope I will be able to visit Mumbai, and when I get older, live there. I will be the director of our Chabad House," Moshe had told the Indian Prime Minister.

Modi had responded by saying, "Come and stay in India and Mumbai. You are most welcome. You and your all family members will get long-term visas. So you can come anytime and go anywhere".

Netanyahu then promptly asked Moshe to join him when he travels to India, a promise he did not forget

and has invited the family to join him in Mumbai during his forthcoming visit to India starting on January 14.

"Moshe says that he was touched

by the warm embrace he received from Prime Minister Modi when he met him in Jeursalem during his July visit to Israel. He says that he felt like it was one of his own people giving him a warm hug," Rosenberg said adding, he is hoping to meet the Indian Prime

Minister again during his India trip".

"He is waiting to host Prime Minister Netanyahu and his wife Sara,

and hopefully PM Modi 'at his home in Mumbai," the grandfather said.

The young boy will be accompa-nied by his grandparents, Shimon and Yehudit Rosenberg, nanny Sandra and a psychologist during his trip to Mumbai.

"During a meeting with the psychologist, who has been mentally preparing him for the visit, Moshe gave him an account of places in Mumbai he would like to visit. He has done his homework and knows about not only the site seeing places but also other places where his parents carried out works related to their assignment," Rosenberg noted.

Moshe's parents, Rabbi Gavri-el and Rivka Holtzberg, who were serving as Directors at the Chabad House, were killed along with six others when the place also came under attack by Pakistani terrorists during the November 2008 Mumbai attacks

'It is heart warming to see that the Indian leadership and the people of India haven't forgotten us and share our pain. It gives us strength and makes us feel one", Rosenberg said. In a brief telephonic call, Sandra,

who was in Afula in the north of Israel where Moshe and his family lives, said that the boy is excited and told her be fore leaving for school on Sunday that it is like "homecoming" for him.

The family also plans to celebrate

Moshe's bar mitzvah in Mumbai. Bar mitzvah is a ceremony performed for Jewish boys at the age of 13 which some Israeli scholars compare with

upnayana, or the thread ceremony.

India issued ten year multiple entry visas to Moshe and his grandparents to ease their travel to the country in August. Prime Minister Modi is said to have personally followed up on the matter as promised to Moshe during their meeting.

Sandra also now lives in Israel and has been felicitated with an honourary citizenship by the Israeli



Trump has to keep Kim 'on his toes': Haley on 'nuclear button' tweet

WASHINGTON, JAN 8 (PTI): Nikki Haley has defended US President Donald Trump's re-cent "nuclear button" tweet warning Kim Jong Un of America's might, saying it was required to keep the North Korean leader "on his toes".

Trump last week warned that his "nuclear button" is "much bigger and more powerful" than the one controlled by Kim, days after the North Korean leader said that Pyongyang's nuclear weapons can reach anywhere in the US and threatened that he has a nuclear button on his desk.

Haley, the Indian-American US Ambas-sador to the UN said that the North Korean regime needs to take a series of steps for talks, a day after Trump said that he is open

The steps include stop testing missiles and nuclear weapons and be willing to talk about banning their nuclear weapons, Haley was quoted as saying by ABC News yesterday.

Asked if the tweet was a good idea, she said: "I think that he (Trump) always has to keep Kim on his toes. It's very important that we don't ever let him get so arrogant that he doesn't realise the reality of what would happen if he started a nuclear war"

Asked if Trump's statement at Camp Da-vid on Saturday meant any reversal of the stated US policy with regard to talks with North Korea, she said "There is no turn-

Golden Globes 2018: A night of many beginnings and first wins

Los Angeles, Jan 8 (PTI): Oprah Winfrey, Sterling K Brown, and Aziz Ansari were some of the first-timers who were honoured at the Golden Globe Awards

Celebrated host-media mogul, Winfrey, became the first African-American woman to be honoured with the annual Cecil B DeMille Award, named after the Hollywood producer-director behind "The Ten Commandments".

She gave a rousing address at the ceremony paying her tributes to the women who courageously spoke out against sexual abuse.

She used her acceptance speech to give a searing rebuke of racial injustice, sexual abuse, and attacks on the integrity of the press.

"I want all the girls watching here, now, to know that a new day is on the horizon!" Winfrey, who was introduced to the stage by Reese Witherspoon, said to a standing ovation. "And when that new day finally dawns, it will be because of a lot of magnificent wom en, many of whom are right here in this room tonight, and some pretty phenomenal men, fighting hard to make sure that they become the leaders who take us to the time when nobody ever has to say 'Me too'

In another first, "This Is Us" star, Brown created history as he became the first African-American to win a Golden Globe in the Best Actor in a TV Series, Drama category for his performance as Randall Pearson on the NBC hit series.

Ansari, the Indian-origin actor, finally bagged the trophy as he was named the winner in the Best Performance by an Actor in a Television Series Musical/ Comedy category for his role in "Master Of None". He was nominated in the same category for the Netflix show in 2016.

The 75th awards ceremony also ended the dry spell for many recognised names such as Gary Oldman and Frances McDormand at the event.

Oldman won his first Globe as the Best Actor in a Motion Picture - Drama for his portrayal of Winston



Churchill in "Darkest Hour". It was his first nod as well. The veteran actor, interestingly, has been critical

of the Globes in the past.

McDormand took home the trophy for Best Actress in a Motion Picture - Drama Golden Globe for her performance in "Three Billboards Outside Ebbing,

The six-time lucky actor played Mildred, a grieving mother of a young woman whose rape-murder has gone unsolved in her small-town American commu-

nity.

The actor has been nominated for a Globe in the past, including for her Oscar-winning role in "Fargo,"

but had never won an individual award.

Alison Janney was named the Best Supporting Actress in Motion Picture category for her role of LaVona Fay Golden, the mother of infamous figure skater Tonya Harding in "I, Tonya".

This was the actor's sixth Golden Globe nomina-

The Globe for the Best Actress in the Musical or Comedy category went to Saoirse Ronan for her role in "Lady Bird", both written and directed by Greta Gerwig. The actor earlier received nominations in 2008 and 2016

While Ewan McGregor won his first Globe as Best Performance by an Actor in a Television Limited Series or Motion Picture Made for Television for his role "Fargo".

This was his fourth nomination

Guilermo del Toro, Martin McDonagh, Sam ckwell, Rachel Brosnahan and Alexander Skarsgard struck gold in the first nod at the award ceremony.

While del Toro took home the Golden Globe for

Best Director for Motion Picture ("The Shape of Water"), McDonagh scored a win in the category of Best Screenplay for "Three Billboards..." Both were nomi-

nated in these two segments

Skarsgard, who plays Nicole Kidman's abusive husband in HBO's "Big Little Lies", won his first Globe as the Best Supporting Actor in Limited Series

Rockwell won the golden title for Best Supporting Act in Motion Picture for his role in "Three Bill-

Brosnahan emerged Best Actress in a Television Comedy Series for playing the protagonist, Miriam 'Midge' Maisel in "The Marvelous Mrs Maisel", who admitted backstage that she had blanked out after saying 'hi' to Winfrey in the middle of her acceptance speech.

As the first award show in the new year, Golden

Globes 2018 set a precedent by addressing the sexual harassment scandal that rocked Hollywood late last year and the winners speeches reflected the shift in Hollywood.



According to a release, the movie will be screened at an annual festival of Indian films in Yerevan, Armenia




