## DC East visits Dikchu project site, inspects warning systems in place

#### WANGCHUK BHUTIA Mangan, 01 Jun:

Pollowing complaints made by the people living downstream of 96 MW Dikchu Hydel Power Project dam that water from the reservoir was being released randomly without issuing prior warning, District Collector-East, Prabhakar Verma, today inspected the project site along with the officials to check if the sirens are being installed.

The DC made his first

The DC made his first inspection at the power house site where he was also assisted by the Panchayat President, BB Gurung, SDM Gangtok and other officials from the company. Later, the DC visited the



dam site at Lingdok

It may be recalled that people of the area had complained after four youth who were at the riverside below 12th Mile were nearly washed away when water was suddenly released from the dam without any warning.

The DC inquired about whether the company had followed the necessary safety norms. He also checked whether

warning boards had been placed at different locations of the project site.

It was found that one siren was being installed

at the power house site while no siren is being installed in the area that falls between the dam and the power house since there is no electricity in the area. The sirens are being installed only at the power house site at Dikchu and the dam site at Lingdok.

However, the project

However, the project developers, Sneha Kinetic Power Projects Limited have informed that they will be installing new model of siren which runs on batter in the area falling between the dam and the power site.

During the visit it was found that the project developers were not following many of the safety norms.



## Sikkim girl Henuka Rai cracks UPSC 2017

"It is a result of my hard work and dedication. My mother always taught me to stay focussed. She believed in me and has always been confident about me succeeding in the Indian Administrative Service exams," says Henuka Rai, the Sikkin girl who has successfully cracked the UPSC 2017 examination.

One of the few from the state to crack the toughest exam of the country, Henuka secured a national ranking of 931 in UPSC results declared on 31 May. To get a sense of the kind of competition she has waded through, sample this: slightly over 11.35 lakh candidates applied for preliminary exam of whom 4.60 lakh took the exams in Au-

gust last year. Of these, 15,452 candidates qualified for appearance in the written (main) examination that was held in December, 2016. Only 2,961 candidates qualified for the personality test, of whom 1,099 have been selected -846 males and 253 females.

Speaking to Summit-Times over the phone, Henuka who is presently pursuing her PhD from Indian Institute of Agricultural Research in New Delhi said that it was hard to believe at first that she had cracked the exam so she requested one of her juniors to recheck the UPSC result to confirm her selection.

## South admn confirms illegal dumping into Teesta by pharma cos, directs clean up

NAMCHI, 01 JUN [IPR]: A team led by Additional District Collector, South, visited Samardung area in South Sikkim today with regard to the complaint made by Director of Sikkim Manipal Institute of Technology about illegal dumping of earth in the Teesta by various pharma companies of the area.

Colonel (retd) Balwant Singh, representing SMIT and General Manger and HR of Aishwarya Healthcare, Merck Life Science Pvt Ltd, Arti, Intas and Himgange, and Panchayat-Lower Maneydara were present during the visit.

The complainant had informed that due to dumping of earth by private companies in the river bed, there was the possibility of the river getting diverted towards SMIT which had happened earlier in the year 2010 wherein LAN-CO had also constructed protection wall to safeguard the other end of river bed along the SMIT compound

It was quite evident that dumping had taken place in the river bed. Therefore, all the five



companies have been directed to remove the earth dumped in the river bed immediately as the river bed can change its course and affect the low lying belts culminating in a serious disaster.

The field inspection started at Merck Life Sci-

started at Merck Life Science. The ADC-S directed the Revenue Supervisor-Namthang to conduct survey of Merck Life Science. After the survey, it was found that Merck Life Science had illegally dumped plastics and other materials in the forest reserved portion of the river. They have been directed to clear the area by 02 June without fail. The Forest Guard

The Forest Guard present also informed that he had intercepted one truck carrying earth to be dumped in the same area but was unclear as to whom the

vehicle belonged to. After the incident, dumping has not been allowed in the area.

Additionally, there are many electric poles at the river bed supplying electricity to various companies. The poles were precariously positioned posing threat to people going for fishing in the river bed which would also lead to

usaster. Merck Life Science is also using the road belonging to the Forest Reserve and has constructed a gate in the path of that road. They have been directed to shift it to another location and dismantle the gate for open passage of vehicles. The plastic bags and other items dumped by Merck Life Science were within the Forest Reserve.

## Political movements on questionable issues can be tricky

Awhiff of political disturbance breaking anew in the Darjeeling hills can be sensed.

Resisting the West Bengal government's perceived decision to make the Bengali language compulsory in the educational institutions of the hills, the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) advised all hill institutions to remain closed on June 1 and June 2. All institutions, including those in Mirik, which is significant, complied.

The Darjeeling district administration has rejected the GJM's apprehension and stated it had not

received any such instruction from the government. But, there was no stopping the GJM from executing its agenda, which reveals, the GJM is in reality spoiling for a show-down since the loss of the Mirik civic body. The current conditions may have provided it with just the opportunity.

Looking for a window to rekindle the Gorkha sentiment against the burgeoning Trinamool, the GJM seized the opportunity to grow confrontational ever since the ticklish issue of 'Bengali to be compulsory in all schools of the state' policy hit the headlines

And to prove that it has chosen

the conflict route against the Trinamool-run state government, the GJM has also decided to demonstrate on the issue from June 4–June 8 when chief minister Mamata Banerjee intends to hold her cabinet meeting in Darjeeling.

The state government has hinted

The state government has hinted of a stern response if the GJM upsets normal life in the hills through its political programmes. That for the GJM could be welcome news. Chaos in the hills now could serve the GJM's purpose of reviving the Gorkhaland call and bring the deserting flock back home. Fishing in troubled waters is what it is known as.

There might be one major prob-

lem for the GJM, however. Launching a movement and sustaining it are two different things. Gone are the days when responding to the call of the principal political party in the hills, the hills remained closed for days at end. These days voices of dissent are heard from different corners against such acts.

There is potential for a revived movement in the hills and areas adjoining the hills on the issue picked by the GJM, provided it is genuine. Even hill Trinamool activists will back off from supporting the state government's decision if what the GJM claims is true.

But, a movement on the issue

could conversely go against the GJM if it is finally proved that the state government has no such intention as is being projected by the GJM.

In that event the GJM will have fired blank shots by launching a movement on a non-issue and lose face. The situation therefore is tricky for the GJM.

Whether the GJM intensifies the current stir or not is for all to see, but what is incomprehensible is its decision to force all education institutions in the hills shut for two days when the issue it is fighting for is education oriented. Painting it with the identity brush is probably an

## 29 lakh children got married between 10-14 years of age

in 10 yrs: Report

New Delhi, Jun 1 (PTI): About 29 lakh children in the age group of 10-14 years were reported married between 2001 and 2011, according to a report released by the country's apex child rights body today.

The report by the National Commission for Protection of Child Rights (NCPCR), based on Census 2011, is a statistical analysis of prevalence of such marriages, their genesis and geographical spread.

It was released by Supreme Court judge Justice A K Sikri

It states that despite the decline in child marriage, particularly in the age group of 10-14 years, there are 1.1 million boys and 1.8 million girls who were reported married in this age group between 2001-2011.

"Child marriage violates the dignity of the child and is a major hu-man rights violation. There are incongruities

## Star Hall complex to make way for grander infrastructure

#### ARPAN PRADHAN GANGTOK, 31 MAY:

**W**e are hopeful that we will start construction work this year at the Star Hall site where the government has plans to develop beautiful amenities with modern facility," said Secretary of Urban Development & Housing Department, GT Bhutia.

The State Government is planning to bring down the existing structure and devel-op a more robust and bet-ter-planned facility replacing the Star Hall situated here at the New Market in Gangtok.

Speaking to Summit-Times, the UD&HD Secretary said that the government is coming up with a "beautiful. practical and useful" infra-structure there.

He details that plan is to construct a multi-storey mul-

tipurpose complex which will include parking space, a cinema hall, shopping mall and other amenities.

The department has taken up the project in earnest as it will benefit the general public of Sikkim, especially Gangtok, and will solve the parking problem to some extent as well, he added.

informed that after various hurdles and complications, the state government has now acquired the property making it possible to utilise

more effectively.

The 25 families which have lived in the Star Hall complex as tenants for many years now, are being relocated and the Government has prorangements. While 18 house-holds have been provided accommodation in Arithang, similar arrangements have been made for the remaining seven families at Lingding in

On the business setups that has been established at the premises, the Secretary said that the permission had been granted on purely temporary basis and the business owners will have to vacate the premises upon completion of the provided term.

The Secretary further added that if the construction is delayed due to unavoidable situations and the authority feels to extend the permission, the business owner may get a relaxation of one month or so. However, ultimately they will have to vacate the

He has informed that the department has invited Expressions of Interest [EPI] through various means of advertisements from the com-panies which are interested in the construction works

The department has re-ceived many EPIs and the evaluation of various offers is under process, he added.

The department has formed an Evaluation Committee which has been notified by the department. The committee will evaluate dif-ferent companies who have submitted their EPIs and will prepare a report on the same.

It will be further submitted to the state government for approval, he informed.

Speaking to SummitTimes, Bijay Subba and Gyurmila Bhutia who run a restaurant in the

Star Hall complex said that they are ready to vacate the premises and hand it over to the concerned department as it is for the betterment of the people.

"We are thankful enough to the government and the department that they have pro-vided us with the opportunity to do business and earn a livelihood even if it was for a limited period. "Recently Karnataka
has amended the Prevention of Child Marriage Act, 2005 to make child marriage void and hoped that other states will follow suit. The NCPCR should conduct seminars and workshops in collaboration with the governments in the 13 states where child marriage is markedly prevalent," said Srivastava

Analysing the reason behind child marriages, the NCPCR report states that girls in particular are married off because they are considered as 'paraya dhan' or somebody else's wealth, and

is often used by families to ensure that the girls is protected from premarital sex, pregnancy outside of marriage and the need to preserve 'family

honour'.

"Girl children from poor households are at poor nousenoids are at higher risk of becom-ing child brides. Where resources are limited, gendered social risks become more acute and opportunities more con-strained, forcing parents to make decisions which disadvantage girls," the report states.

The report has also made a slew of recom-mendations to combat child marriages. Promoting free and compulsory secondary education, compulsory registration of marriages, mobilisa-tion of religious leaders and community elders are some of the interventions proposed in the

### Ban Ki Baat

Banning things should be the nuclear option, not routine

H ow messed was our country for the past seventy years that when it finally got itself a Pradhan Se-

vak it had to ban so many things?

Someone should take the current dispensation in Delhi aside, sit them down and tell them that just because they hold the reins of power for now does not mean that history will never get around to judging them. Irrespective of the applause from their echo-chambers or what their tom-toms are messag-ing out on social-media, there will come a time when the adrenaline rush will subside and testosterone will calm down and the inanity (insanity for some) of things will slam home. That will not be a pretty moment. They should realize that banning notes is not the same as banning women from wearing jeans to college – one requires planning and data while the other requires just some goons at one end and pliant administrations at the other to be pulled off. These instincts might be born from the same patriarchal insecurities and inadequacies reinforced by narrow worldviews, but play out at entirely different levels when, instead of being the obsessions of fringe groups, become the passion of elected governments.

We can dismiss, even ignore and scoff at such expressions when the neighbourhood fundamentalists go about trying to stare it down into people's lives, but that is not really possible when the government for a billion people does the same. So, when the Planning Commission is "banned", every single of the 29 states and seven union territories suffers a budgetary setback, and after they have memorized what Niti in NITI Aayog stands for, have to begin finding their way around this new wrap of red tape. They are still running circles. When gangs of single men roam the streets looking for couples to terrorise, we can work around that problem by avoiding those territories, but there is no escaping the government when it bans notes and won't do enough either by way of replacing them or explaining why it was done and what it achieved. When our government places embarrassments to head institutions of finer and higher learning, it is effectively banning learning from the campuses. And then it also tries to ban free thought by making the nationalism ke thappad ki goonj reverberate into every ear which has a mind of its own Then we blunder into liquor being banned out of highways but ended up suddenly losing many highways themselves so that we could have our booze and we still don't know whether instances of drunk-

en driving have come down.

And while all this was happening, a militia was on security detail in the service of Gau-Mata, humiliating people who might look like that they were beef-eaters and targeting groups because they appeared to mean ill to the cow. They lynched, mobbed and terrorized people even as cows placed under their care died of starvation in gaushalas. Now, they have been rewarded, with an order as scatter-brained and potentially much more damaging than demonetization – the ban on sale of cattle for slaughter at animal fairs. This one has the potential to upend the entire rural economy without differentiating between vegetarian farmers or meat-eating leather traders. The worst hit will be the caste segment and religious group which has al-ready been at the receiving end of much violence in our country.

## The Third Gender

us are aware of the existing communi-Most of us are aware of the existing community of the transgender in India, commonly referred to as hijras. But how many of us are aware of the exploitation and abuse faced by them almost every day in our country?

The word hijra is an Urdu word derived from the ni-Arabic root hjir which means leaving one's tribe

and has been borrowed into the Hindi language.

When we glance at the history of the transgender community in India, it is intertwined largely with religion. It is interesting to learn that in ancient India they were considered mystical beings, revered and an integral part of society for over 4,000 years, finding mention in most Ancient Hindu texts. For instance, in the epic Ramayana, Ram, impressed by the devotion and loyalty of the transgenders grants them the boon to confer blessings on people during auspicious occasions like child birth, weddings etc. This is the origin of badhai in which the people of the Transgender community till date sing, dance and give blessings to the members of the family of the new born or the newly wed.

Sadly, with the coming of the British in India, the transgenders were criminalised under the Criminal Tribes Act 1871. The British saw the transgender community as a breach of public decency. This was the beginning of the change in the outlook of the Indian society towards the transgender community which began regarding them primarily as criminals and as objects and not human beings. Even though the Act was repealed after India's Independence, the stigma surrounding the transgenders estab-lished by the law of 1871 continues.

They face discrimination in all walks of life not only in India but also in most parts of the South Asian countries in terms of employment, healthcare, ostracism from society, extortion by authorities and many get pushed into the flesh trade ei-ther by choice or misfortune. They are physically, mentally and sexually abused by people, criminal elements and delinquents.

When we take a look at Section 377 of the Indian

Penal Code, 1860, which came into existence 156 years ago (during the time of the colonial rule in India), the Code criminalises Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender community (herein referred to as the LGBT community). In 2009, there was a ray of hope for the LGBT community when the Delhi High Court in the Naz Foundation case decriminalised the same sex Act and declared Section 377 of the Indian Penal Code as violative of the Fundamental



Rights. But, in 2013, this judgment was overturned by the Supreme Court which opined that amending or repealing Section 377 was a matter to be left to and not the judiciary and that Section 377 of the IPC does not violate the Constitution and is therefore valid. The Supreme Court is yet to hear a curative petition on this matter.

A year later, in 2014, the Apex Court took a step to redress the depressing conditions of the trans-gender community by recognising the transgender community as the "third gender" in the landmark case of National Legal Services Authority v. Union of India. The Apex court further declared that non recognition of the third gender in both criminal and civil statutes such as those relating to marriage, adoption, divorce etc would amount to discrimination against the third gender and ordered that they be categorised as "socially and economically backward" This ruling was celebrated by the transgender community as public acceptance that they would no longer face discrimination, that there would be a paradigm shift in how society viewed them, but unfortunately this was not to be as the ruling is yet to be implemented. A token step was taken when the Election Commission introduced the choice "other" in the voter's registration form in 2014 to give the transgenders an option concerning their gender but which went largely unheeded due to the choice of word.

Apart from the judiciary's steps to redress the desolate condition of the transgender community,

many transgender activists and corporate houses have taken steps to make the public aware of the rights of the transgender community such as adoptive rights. The Procter and Gamble owned cold and cough brand 'Vicks' has produced a 3 minute video clip titled 'Touch of Care' which highlights why family and motherhood should go beyond the biological ties and covers the adoptive rights of the transgender community. This video, which went viral as soon as it was uploaded with 9,507,414 views on YouTube, tells the story of a young girl adopted by a transgender mother - a Mumbai-based transgender rights activist Gauri Sawant.

So, let us ponder as to how, we, as a society, can help create awareness regarding the Constitution-al rights of the transgender community. We need to do away with our prejudice towards them and end the stigma which surrounds them. We need to learn to embrace their unconventional exotic ways, as India is a country united with all its exquisite diversity of culture, languages and traditions. We need to understand that they, with their society induced complexities, are human beings too. It is time we try and empathise with their situation and circumstances and try and look at the world from their perspective and help them in every little way possible. We should not forget that their lives are as precious as any other life existing in this world. We need to learn to live and let live.

## **Lipstick Under My Burkha: When real** women take over Indian screens

see many films on male bonding, "but hardly any on female bonding award-winning Indian filmmaker Aparna told Indian television news channel NDTV at Cannes, just after the screening of her latest film, Sonata.

Sonata, which has already been released in India, explores the lives of three middle-aged women and their friendships, a rare narrative in Indian cinema.

ankrita Shrivastava, got the green light for release after a struggle with India's film censors, owing to its feminist positioning and "risque" storyline. Shrivastava's first film has already featured in

## be announced. CENSORED FOR BEING "LADY-ORIENTED"

The film has been stalled as the Central Board of Film Certification, (CBFC) refused to give it clearance. On

February 23, the government institution stated:
"The story is lady oriented, their fantasy above life. There are contanious [sic] sexual scenes, abusive words, audio pornography and a bit sensitive touch about one particular section of society." Lipstick Under My Burkha explores the life of

four Indian women living in small-town India: a burkha-clad college girl, a young beautician, a mother of three and an ageing widow. The film follows these women as they recognise their desires and negotiate their sexuality within the claustro-phobia of controlling familial relationships and invasive small-town life

The stories of the four women are interspersed with each other's as they carve out small windows of freedom for themselves within which they discover their "other" selves.

The arguments issued by CBFC foreground deeper issues. They exhibit the organisation's complete inability to understand a film that questions the deeply patriarchal nature of storytelling in In-

#### NO REAL WOMEN

For many decades now, commercial cinema has robbed Indian film audiences of countless women's stories. Over the years, real women characters have existed mainly in non-commercial, art-house films with limited funding and audiences. These include titles such as Ankur (1974), directed by Shyam Benegal, Arth (1982) by Mahesh Bhatt, Mirch Ma-



ala by Ketan Mehta (1987), Fire by Deepa Mehta (1996), and Astitva by Mahesh Manjrekar (2000).

Like most cinematic cultures including main-stream Hollywood, Indian cinema, and especially Hindi films – largely produced from Mumbai – discriminate against women in front and behind the camera. So much so that misogyny is routinised and normalised.

The film censor board regularly clears sexist and misogynistic films such as Indra Kumar's Masti series. The poster of 2016 release in the series, Great Grand Masti, is itself evidence of how they "use" women in the filmic text. The film includes vulgar and sexist comments, ageism, rape jokes and it objectifies women throughout.

In fact, the ease with which these films get censor

clearance shows the obtuse and inverted definitions the board uses to determine what is objectionable.

## ITEM NUMBERS

Real women have been rendered invisible at the cost of their bodies. The omniscient presence of a certain kind of song (to which women actors dance), often called "item number", is the most ob-

dance), orten caned item number, is the most obvious sign of their objectification.

The "item number" exists largely to titillate audiences. It can be dropped anywhere in the film with no narrative justification. A scantily-clad woman appears, dances to a cheesy song, often with double meaning, and is never seen again.

It is, at best, product placement to get the cash registers flowing at the box office. And the product, in this case, is the female body. Rarely does the censor board touch these songs.

In this environment, Lipstick Under My Burkha not only challenges the status quo within the Indian film culture but also questions CBFC definitions of "good" and "watchable".

#### CHANGING INDIAN CINEMA

Several factors have, however, been changing trends in Indian cinema for over a decade now. Demographics show an increasing number of women with buying power in urban India and they have different expectations of cultural representation.

New business models, such as the entry of corporations into the film business, are appearing. Previously, production was dominated by families or independent pro-

Small cinema halls can also now show-case independent films as well as a big commercial movies. And young filmmakers such as Shrivastava are challenging older ways of storytelling.
A few Indian films have recently por-

trayed strong women as protagonists. We can think of No One Killed Jessica (2011), Kahaani (2011), Queen (2013), Mary Kom (2014), Bobby Jasoos (2014), Piku (2015) and Neerja (2016).

The fact that top women stars choose to play lead roles in these films demonstrates the need for

such narratives in popular culture. The steady rise of films such as Angry Indian Goddesses (2015) by Pan Nalin, Parched by Leena Yadav (2016), Pink (2016) by Aniruddha Roy Chowdury and Sen's recent Sonata (2017) is palpable.

These films explore the complexity of women's

lives, their fears and yearning through the idiom of friendship and camaraderie. Their portrayal of "sisterhood" is somewhat akin to the male-buddy genre, which has a number of cult classics, such as Dil Chahta Hai, Three Idiots and Zindagi Na Milegi

It is noteworthy that many of these "sisterhood" films have been directed by women and are sidestepping the old ways of seeing women and men - be it through the use of camera or the way they use song and dance.

They are questioning traditional ideas to invent a new women-friendly gaze, as opposed to the male gaze. First identified by the feminist theorist Laura Mulvey, the male gaze is being wholeheartedly inverted and rejected in these films.

Sen's Sonata and Shrivastava's Lipstick Under

my Burkha may lead to a sustained change in mainstream Indian cinema so women's stories don't get labelled and pushed to the limited category of "Women's cinema". Like all films, women's stories also need to be tested against the same yardstick of good cinema or bad.

This genre would surely also gain colour and strength from its diversity. Women's stories can sure-ly get more fun, adventurous and innovative as they show the various sides of their complex existence.

It's time India's censors enable this change by modernising, so it can keep up with the evolving needs of audiences and the film community, and

not make themselves completely redundant.

## Nepal Prez asks political parties to form majority government

KATHMANDU, JUN 1 (PTI): Nepal's political parties have failed to meet a seven-day deadline to pick a consensus candidate for the post of Prime Minister, prompting President Bidya Devi Bhandari to issue another appeal to them today to initiate the process quickly.

The president issued the call as per Article 298 (3) of the Constitution after the seven-day deadline given to form a consensus government ended today without any result, the Office of the President said.

Last week. President Bhandari had issued a call to the parties to form a consensus government within a week to choose a new Prime Minister on the basis of political understanding as per Article 298 (2) of the Constitu-

tion of Nepal.

President Bhandari initiated the Constitutional process to form the new government after Prime Minister Pushpa Kamal Dahal 'Prachanda' resigned on May 24 after a brief stint of nine months, honouring a power sharing understanding with the Congress to hand over the country's leadership to the largest



party in Parliament.

Prachanda resigned as per a deal reached in July-August last year with Nepali Congress President Sher Bahadur Deuba, who is expected to take over as the prime minister.

The deal was to run the government on a rotational basis until elections to the parliament

are held in February 2018.
Prachanda is the only Communist leader to become the

Prime Minister of Nepal twice.

During his first tenure a During his first tenure as the prime minister from 2008 to 2009, Prachanda was not on good terms with India.

However, during his second tenure, he had chosen India as his first overseas destination rather than China.

Indo-Nepal ties, which were strained during Prachanda's predecessor K P Oli's regime, also improved under the Maoist leader's second stint.
Prachanda was to hold office

till local polls were held and remaining two elections provincial and central - were to be conducted under Deuba.

Millions of Nepalese on May 14 voted in the first local- level polls in two decades as the Hi-. malayan nation took a crucial step towards cementing democ racy amid political turmoil.

Local-level elections could not be held after 1997 largely as a result of the decade-long Maoist insurgency that claimed more than 16,000 lives in Nepal.

The elections should be held in every five years but due to the political instability, they were

halted since May 1997. Prachanda, who led the Mao ists during the armed struggle from 1996 to 2006, is credited with transforming the rebel movement into a political party after a 2006 peace deal.

## Iadhav will not be executed until mercy pleas exhausted:

ISLAMABAD, JUN 1 (PTI): Days after the Interna-tional Court of Justice (ICJ) stayed Kulbhushan Jadhav's death sentence, Pakistan said today that the Indian national would not be executed until he has exhausted

his mercy appeals.
Foreign Office spokesman Nafees Zakaria released a state-ment which he claimed was aimed at addressing "certain misrepresenta-tions/false statements/ allegations" made in the Indian media following the ICJ's provisional measures order of May 18 in the Jadhav case.

Zakaria asserted that

irrespective of the ICJ's stay, Jadhav would remain alive, until he has exhausted the right to request for clemency, initially with the Chief of the Army Staff (COAS) and later with the Pakistan President.

He accused the Indian government of misusing the media to create a "false impression of winning" Jadhav's case in the ICJ.

media, "Indian backed by the official quarters, misled people in the two countries by propagating that India has won" in Jadhav's case, he said.

"The discussions that ensued in the two countries showed a complete lack of understanding of the matter," Zakaria said.

He said the Indian media, based on the re-ported briefing by offi-cial quarters, called ICJ's letter dated May 8, 2017, the day India filed its petition, to the Pakistan

government as a "stay on Jadhav's execution". "This is a lie. The ICJ noted that lie," he claimed.

Jadhav, 46, was in April sentenced to death by a Pakistani military court on charges of "in-volvement in espionage and sabotage activities"

against the country.

The ICJ on May 18 stayed the execution of

Zakaria said that the ICI stated clearly that its decision on provi-sional measures was not concerned with "juris-diction/ merits" and it considered that Jadhav would not be executed until the full hearing.

This is nothing un usual," Zakaria asserted.

He said that a full hearing will take place after the court sets down a timetable on June 8 at

the Hague.
"We have given the court our arguments on merits and jurisdiction. It has not ruled on any of these arguments," he

Zakaria said that the case at the ICJ concerns whether Jadhav is entitled to consular access.

Asserting that Pa-kistan's position in this matter has been made clear, Zakaria said, "We had sought information from India" on January 23, 2017, on the basis of Jadhav's confession and statements. "India has not responded despite reminders," he said.

## Tickets of concert for Manchester victims sold out in minutes

LONDON, JUN 1 (PTI): Tickets of a tribute concert by US pop star Ariana Grande for the Manchester bombing victims were sold out within 20 minutes of their release today.

The "One Love Manchester" concert is being organised by Grande, who was per-forming at the iconic Manchester Arena when a 22-year-old Libyan-origin bomber, Salman Abedi, blew himself up, killing 22 people and injuring over 100 others.

The concert will take place on Sunday at the Emirates Old Trafford cricket ground near Manchester Arena, with proceeds going to the Red Cross Manchester Emergency Fund.

Grande will be joined by a long line up of high-profile acts, including Robbie Williams, Take That and Justin Bieber.

Fans who were present at her concert on May 22 are eligible to register for free tickets, while the tickets on general

sale were snapped up within minutes.

Ticketmaster, in-charge of the tickets for the show, said its website experienced "remarkable demand" when tickets went on sale this morning.

The company said it was aware that some fans, who were at the original show. have not yet been able to claim their places for the Sunday's event, and extended the registration period until afternoon

Ticketmaster said: "We understand that there are a number of fans who didn't receive an email this morn-ing with regards to free tickets for 'One Love Manchester'. We worked through the night and verified thou-sands of original bookings although there were some we could not verify.

"We want to give all fans who were at the show regardless of where they bought their tickets, every opportunity to register for 'One Love Manchester'

The concert will be broadcast on BBC

and is expected to raise more than two million pounds for the Red Cross fund.

The Black Eyed Peas, Coldplay, Usher and Pharrell are among some of the stars confirmed to perform.

Fans have been asked not to bring bags to avoid delays going through se-curity.Meanwhile, Greater Manchester Police have released six persons arrested in connection with the bombing in the city last month without charge and continue to question 10 remaining suspects.

"As it stands, 16 people in total have been arrested in connection with the investigation, of which six people have since been released without charge. A total of 10 men remain in custody for questioning," a police statement said.

They have also released CCTV images of suicide bomber Abedi who was seen hours before the blast at Manchester Arena as part of their public appeal for information

## Syria activists say ISIS founder Aamaq killed in airstrike

BEIRUT, JUN 1 (AP): The founder of the Islamic State group news agen-cy was reportedly killed in an airstrike in eastern Syria, activists and his brother said.

The militant group itself has not reported the death of the founder of Aamaq news agency, Baraa Kadek. But his

Hozaifa, posted on his Facebook that Kadek and his young daughter were killed in an airstrike in Mayadeen town in Deir el-Zour province.

Other Syrian oppo-sition news outlets, in-cluding Halab News Network and Oasioun news agency, reported Kadek's death late yesterday. But it was not immediately clear where Kadek was killed or when. His brother said he was killed in

his home.
Halab News Network, an activist-run media platform where Kadek previously worked, said he was killed with his daughter in his car. All said he was killed yes-



suspected airstrike by the US-led coalition fighting IS in Syria and

Iraq.
There was no immediate comment from the coalition. Last week, the co-alition told The Associated Press it had carried out a series of airstrikes on May 25 and 26 targeting IS media infrastructure and "propaganda facilities." Aamaq news agency has become the group's fastest and most reliable source of information, using it to post videos and claims of attacks. It has remained online despite bans from social media platforms.

Mayadeen has become a refuge for IS leaders as the group comes under attack in Mosul in Iraq and their de-facto capital Raqqa. Some Syria watchers said the group's media operations have moved to Mayadeen as the USled coalition and allied Syrian Kurdish-led forces close in on Ragga.

Kadek became known as a media activist covering the outbreak of protests in 2011 then rebel fronts. Originally from Aleppo province, he later joined IS in 2013 and set up the group's flagship

## **HRW** criticises Army rewarding officer who used civilian as 'human shield'

New York, Jun 1 (PTI): A human rights organisation has criticised the Indian Army for awarding a commendation to one of its offiwho used a civilian as a human shield in Kashmir, saying support for such "lawless action" will lead to future lawlessness by security forces and protesters.

"The Indian Army's rewarding of an officer for actions that included serious human rights violations undermines accountability and the stature of the military," Hu-man Rights Watch (HRW) said in a statement yesterday.

It was referring to Maj Nitin Leetul Gogoi being commended for evacuating security personnel and election staff who were threatened by a mob in Jammu and Kashmir, in which he used a bystander unlaw fully as a "human shield."

The Indian Army has defended Gogoi's action.

In a recent interview to PTI, Army chief Gen Bipin Rawat, de-fending the episode, said the Army was facing a "dirty war" in Kashmir which has to be fought through

"innovative" ways.

HRW's South Asia director Meenakshi Ganguly, however, said,

Kashmir and should be rewarded for saving lives, but not by deliberately placing others at risk and violating their rights."

"Support by senior army and government officials for a lawless action merely fans the flames of future lawlessness by security forces and protesters," Ganguly

"Public praise by senior officials for an act of outrageous cruelty should put to rest any belief that the government is serious about holding security force personnel to account for serious abuses.'


