The SP also informed that the post mortem examination of Dawa Bhutia, who was allegedly shot by the WB police personnel on Friday along Bhanjyang-Sadam road, was conducted to-day at Namchi District Hospital in the presence of his family members.

In the meantime, the

residents of Bhanjyang village have filed a com-plaint against the West Bengal police for threat-

ening the residents and conducting raids in civil dress and fully armed without any official permission. The WB police allegedly threatened the residents of 'consequences' if they have supported the GJM members. "We are feeling in-

secure as West Bengal police opened fire and killed a man in our area without anyone know-ing. They are continuously patrolling the village and threatening us for no reason," said Roshan Rai, a Bhanjyang resident.

NAMCHI, 02 SEPT:

Two under trial in-Two unuer
mates who were under judicial custody at Namchi District Prison, South Sikkim staged a daring escape from the district prison this morning. The two escaped through a tunnel dug un-

der the jail's walls. Yogesh Bardewa (21) of Jarong, South Sikkim, was under judicial custody at Namchi prison since 11 Feb 2017 and Kishan Gurung (26) of Jaldhaka, Darjeeling district was in the prison since 29 Nov 2016. Both were booked under POSCO Act and the case is under trial at the District Session Court

Namchi.

SP Jail, SK Shresta informed that the jail personnel found the two inmates missing at 6:40 a.m. this morning when they were carrying out their usual counting of inmates. On enquiry it was learnt that the two had been sent to dispose of garbage and had not returned thereafter.

Jail authorities imme diately started a search operation and found a tunnel dug under the jail's wall through which the duo had escaped. A complaint has been filed at Namchi PS and search is on to trace the duo.

As per the SP, all check posts in the border towns of Sikkim have been alerted and search operation is underway. He also said that due to continuous rainfall the soil under the walls had become pliable and the two prisoners took advantage of this managing to dig a tunnel under the wall.

Interim bail granted to GJM sabhasad 'arrested' by Bengal police in Sikkim

Sikkim Police FIR against Kpg SP records details of fatal firing SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 02 SEPT:

Mamchi District Session Court has granted three days interim bail to Gorkha Janmukti Morcha party sabhasad, Sabitri Chamling, today as West Bengal police failed to produce relevant evidence to support the arrest made by them on 01 Sept at Melli, South Sikkim.
It may be recalled that Sik-

kim Police had, on Friday, prevented West Bengal police from taking arrested GJM leaders and also filed a murder charge against the Kalimpong Super-intendent of Police for shooting Dawa Bhutia, a GIM party worker from Kalimpong who along with several other party workers is said to have attended a GJM party meeting in Namchi. Meanwhile, GJM Organisa-

tee, Francise Dewan, and MLA Kalimpong, Shanti Savita Rai today met with media persons here at Namchi and condemned the act of WB police and WB government initiating such operation in another state and killing an innocent and unarmed supporter of Gorkhaland agita-

Mr Dewan informed that GJM was conducting a high level confidential meeting here at Namchi in Seven Hills Resort.

While the meeting was in while the meeting was in progress, they received informa-tion that WB police was carrying out raids and arresting support-ers in the area, following which they concluded their meeting. However, some of the support-ers got arrested and one youth was shot dead by WB police. He alleged that the Kalimpong SP had shot the youth himself.

Mr Dewan further said that theirs is a peaceful protest de-manding their constitutional right but the Bengal government has always tried to suppress their protest by killing innocent people of the hills. The shooting of GJM youth on Friday proves that the West Bengal government can go to any length to suppress the Gorkhaland move-ment, even break interstate rules, he added.

This is truly an act of police terrorism against hills people of Darjeeling, said Mr Dewan. He has urged the state government of Sikkim to intervene and arrest the SP Kalimpong and help them to give justice to the de-ceased youth, Dawa Bhutia.

Similarly, Kalimpong MLA, Savita Rai said that the lives of those fighting for Gorkhaland are in danger. The West Bengal government has directed its police force to act like terrorists in

uniform, she alleged. She thanked the Sikkim gov ernment for their immense support to the cause and the people of Namchi for providing safe passage on Friday. She has appealed to the state government of Sikkim to launch a state level investigation into this murder.

According to the First Information Report (FIR) filed by Sub Inspector (Namchi), Kunchok N Wangdi at Namchi Police Sta-tion, one of the party workers, Lalit Poudyal had brought the deceased with a gunshot wound to Namchi District Hospital for emergency medical attention The Medical Officer on duty however declared the patient 'brought dead'.

Interrogation of Mr Poudy-al revealed that the deceased had boarded an SUV vehicle along with him and three other GJM workers after the meeting wrapped up. The deceased was reportedly heading towards Pe-

According to Mr Poudyal they came across two SUVs with WB number plates and Bengal police logo at Long Kholcha near Bhanjyang Bazaar. While cross-

Deb accuses Sikkim govt of helping Gurung 'flee', ignores Bengal posse's extrajudicial misadventure here

Deb today accused the
Sikkim government and police administration of protecting GJM supre-mo Bimal Gurung, who has cases under UAPA against him, and helping him "flee". He, however, completely ignored the extrajudicial actions of the Bengal police which ventured into Sikkim without jurisdiction or sanction or even valid arrest warrants yesterday.

"Whatever Sikkim government and their police department are doing is totally uncon-stitutional. When the unrest in the Darjeeling hills started, they sup-ported the GJM's de-mand of separate state of Gorkhaland," Deb, who is elected from north Bengal, told a Bengali TV channel.

The Sikkim govern-

ment might have a hidden agenda behind its move to help Gurung flee during a raid by West Bengal police in the

Senior police officials in Sikkim, meanwhile, highlight that the Bengal police acted way beyond all established protocols and interstate policing rules when they entered Sikkim yesterday armed to the teeth in three

groups and ran riot.

The Bengal Minister preferred to leave the criminality of Bengal po-lice's actions in Sikkim unaddressed and further vented, "They have been helping GJM. The Sikkim government and the police administration had helped Bimal Gurung and his associates to flee. They are giving protection to Gurung."

"How can they provide protection to a per-son like Gurung who had cases against him under UAPA? A lookout notice has been issued against Gurung and instead of helping the West Bengal police to nab him, they are helping him to flee. I think the Sikkim government has some motive behind it," Deb alleged.

Gorkhaland agitation continues; massive hunt underway for Gurung

DARJEELING (WB), SEP 2 (PTI): A massive search operation was launched by the West Bengal Police today in the Darjeeling hills and adjoining areas for the absconding GIM supremo Bimal Gurung, even as the indefinite shutdown for a separate Gorkhaland entered its 80th day. West Bengal Minister

West Bengal Minister Gautam Deb has accused the Sikkim government and police administra-tion of helping Gurung and his associates to flee.

"They (Sikkim gov-ernment) have been help-ing the GJM. The Sikkim government and the po-lice administration have helped Bimal Gurung and his associates to flee They are giving protection to Gurung," he told a

Bengali TV channel today. The Sikkim govern-ment might have a "hidden agenda" behind its alleged move to help Gurung flee during a raid by the West Bengal police in that state yesterday, he said.

"Whatever the Sikkim government and their police department are doing is totally unconstitutional. When the unrest

in the Darjeeling hills started they supported GJM's demand of separate state of Gorkhaland." he said.

A lookout notice had been issued against Gurung, who has cases un-der the UAPA against him, on Friday for his alleged involvement in various cases, including a bomb blast in Kalimpong police station in which a civic volunteer was killed.

Gurung had described the issuance of the lookout notice against him as a "conspiracy" by the West Bengal government. "I had condemnded

the bomb blasts. We are holding the agitation in a democratic manner," he said in an audio message from an unknown loca-tion which was broadcast by a TV channnel.

The shutdown in the

hills is on after Gurung revoked party convenor Tamang's decision of suspending it till September 12, when the next round of dialogue with the state government is scheduled.

In a press release issued by vice convener-SSC, Nawin Kiran, the committee has appealed to the state government and the Sikkimese people to come forward to oppose such illegal act by the West Bengal authorities.

The committee has further suggested to the West Bengal Government to keep their house in order further adding that India is governed by the Constitution and should not forget about territorial jurisdiction.

"If at all the West Bengal Government finds out that there are any fugitives wanted by the

law in Bengal, the Ben-Government should follow the process of law. Crossing the jurisdiction and killing [allegedly] people in Sikkim is not at all acceptable to us," Mr Kiran has expressed in the release.

The committee has urged Sikkimese people to stay united on this is-sue without politicizing the matter and has appealed for precise investigation by the Central Bureau of Investigation on the death on Dawa Bhutia who was allegedly shot dead by WB police on Friday.

Mr Kiran has further

cautioned the masses of both Sikkim and Darjeeling/Kalimpong that there are some agents who have been going around talking about Sikkim-Darjeeling merger and has appealed to keep away from such rumors.

Still Blind on Suicides

engage, and understand

When the suicide rate spikes in the Vidarbha region of Maharastra or in southern Andhra Pradesh, the reasons are known - crop failure and mounting debt. When teen suicides climb in June-July across the country every year, experts know the reason - the board exam results and academic pressure. Across the country and the world, the reasons prompting suicides are understood in reasonable detail and it naturally follows that efforts are mounted to suppress the triggers. The massive crores released to waive farmer loans, the grading system introduced for board exam results and the no failures in schools policies (now being unfortunately reconsidered) emerged as corrective measures undertaken to curb suicides in the country.

Suicides, meanwhile, remain a worry in Sikkim but informed corrective measures cannot even be speculated upon because no enquiry has been invested into understanding why so many in Sikkim take their own lives. It does not take an expert to inform us that sui-cides are born from depression; that much is obvious Everyone knows that untreated depression festers to manic levels triggering suicidal tendencies. We know that, and if we don't, a simple Google search will tell us so. What we do not know is what triggers are pushing people from teenagers to octogenarians to such levels of depression that they commit suicide when the family thinks they are away at tuition classes or out collecting fodder?

A suicide always makes disturbing news and the psychological health of a State dregs low when a State as small as Sikkim sometimes reports up to 5 suicides on the same day. If official records can be taken seriously, the suicide pattern is already changing in Sik-kim. The number of suicides by senior citizens has noticeably fallen even as suicides by the very young [teens and even pre-teens], as also victims in their thirties, are registering disturbingly high numbers. It is no longer enough to be told that psychiatric counselling needs to be reached to more people at more places. That should already have happened by now. Awareness camps will no longer suffice, the concerned agency should start investing more of its training in trying to understand and explain why depression is so pervasive in Sikkim and where Sikkim is failing, as a State and as a society, in trying to contain depression from turning morbid and fatal.

There have been some surveys and some data computation to understand suicides in Sikkim, but nothing comprehensive has been undertaken thus far. It is important for the State Government to commission a team of experts to carry out exhaustive research into suicides in Sikkim to pin down the reasons. Only after such a professional exercise is undertaken, can any thing of consequence be explored to arrest the suicide rate in Sikkim and save lives. More agencies, from the social to the religious to sports associations, need to be involved in the remedial measures as and when they are undertaken, and these should be undertaken at a more earnest level than the tokenism which central missions and state events like Beti-Bachao, Beti Padhao initiatives receive. The government should play the role of the facilitator and extend logistical support to civil society organizations which should be invited in to address the issue, understand it and then engage in the task of saving lives.

How Nazis Twisted the Swastika into a Symbol of Hate

he images from Charlottesville, Va., of white The images from charlottesville, va., or white supremacists marching with Nazi banners reminded us, as if we needed it, that the swastika remains a potent symbol of racist hate.

In Germany, where neo-Nazis also march, it's illegal to display the swastika, and citizens there initiate private or neighbourhood efforts to remove

it from graffiti and other street art.

But attempts to eradicate the swastika can sometimes misfire, as happened recently in Quebec. Corey Fleischer, known by the Instagram han-dle erasinghate, was stopped by police when he tried to blot out swastikas embossed on salvaged anchors on public display in the small St. Lawrence River community of Pointes-des-Cascades.

Plaques suggested that the anchors were from the Third Reich, but a Radio Canada correspondent reported that they were made by the English company W.L. Byers before the Nazis came to power. The company used the swastika as a symbol of good luck, a common practice in the early 20th century.

Fleischer remained unmoved by this historical explanation. As he told CityNews: "The swastika is no longer a sign of peace. It's a sign attached to a party that literally almost wiped out an entire culture."

I come across this obsession with swastikas

time and time again. In my university courses on German cultural history, students are repelled yet fascinated by the horror it symbolizes. When I ask whether the swastika should be banned in North America the way it is in Germany, some say yes, whereas others point to its innocent use in other

The debate is similar to the dispute between Pointes-des-Cascades and Corey Fleischer. Should the 25 years it was a symbol of Nazi racism outweigh its millennia-long use as a talisman of good

A DIVERSE AND ANCIENT HISTORY

The swastika wasn't always an odious symbol of hate. Far from it. The word svastika is Sanskrit in origin and means "conducive to well-being."

As a symbol, the swastika's power resides in its simplicity and balance. Graphic designer Steven Heller notes that "the swastika's geometric purity allows for legibility at any size or distance, and when on its axis, the whirling square gives the illusion of movement."

Its form, according to Heller, is "sublime," so it's no wonder that it has found a place in so many cul-

In Buddhism, the swastika is thought to represent the footprints of the Buddha. It takes on a liturgical function in Jainism, and in Hinduism the clockwise symbol (the swastika as we know it, with the arms pointing right) and the counterclockwise symbol, the sauvistika, pair up to portray opposites such as light and darkness. In Mesopotamia it was used on coins, and the

Navajo nation wove it into blankets. It has been found on ancient pottery in Africa and Asia. It was sometimes used as a single element, but often it was repeated as a series of interlocking swastikas to form a border on a garment or in architecture, as was common in Roman times.

It made an appearance in Germanic and Viking cultures, and you can find it in medieval churches and religious vestments across Europe.

In the late 19th and early 20th centuries, the swastika became well-established in western cul ture as a good luck symbol, similar to a four-leaf clover or a horseshoe.

Companies used it as logo; it adorned birth an nouncements and greeting cards. American Boy Scouts could get a swastika hadge and the Girls' Club published a magazine called The Swastika Finland, Latvia and the United States have all used it as a military insignia.

In Canada, a mining community in northern

Ontario was named Swastika, just as you might name a town New Hope or Bounty. Windsor, N.S., and Fernie, B.C., both had hockey teams called the Swastikas. In 1931, Newfoundland issued a \$1 stamp commemorating important moments in transatlantic aviation; each corner had a swastika. The late 19th century saw the newly formed

German empire caught up in an era of unrestrained nationalism. Some nationalists sought to prove German racial superiority, subscribing to a now discredited idea that an ancient Aryan race — the original Indo-Europeans — were their ancestors. Evidence was needed to connect the Germans with

the Aryans. NAZIS APPROPRIATED THE SYMBOL

The swastika provided the necessary link.

In the early 1870s, when German businessman and archaeologist Heinrich Schliemann thought he had discovered the ancient Greek city of Troy, more than 1,800 instances of the swastika were unearthed. Since the swastika was also present among the archaeological remains of the Germanic tribes, it didn't take long for nationalists to jump to the conclusion that the Germans and the Greeks were both descendants of the Aryans.

And if you believe that Germans form a separate

'race" superior to other ethnic groups around it, it becomes easier to claim that you need to keep that 'race" pure. In that context, anti-Semitism followed.

The Thule Society, an anti-Semitic organization promoting the superiority of German Volk (folk in English), was founded at the end of the First World War. It used a stylized swastika as its logo. The society sponsored the fledgling Nazi party, and in a bid for greater public profile, the party created a banner that incorporated the swastika as we know

it today.

Hitler was convinced that a potent symbol would rally the masses to his xenophobic cause. With a black swastika (called the Hakenkreuz in

a white circle set against a red background, the Nazi banner modernized the ancient symbol while evoking the colours of the recently defeated Ger

Military Communication

In Mein Kampf, Hitler took sole credit for the design and attempted to give it meaning: "In red we see the social idea of the movement, in white the nationalistic idea, in the swastika the mission of the struggle for the victory of the Aryan man." Tortured symbolism aside, the swastika banner did what it was supposed to do —it gave visual identity to the Nazi movement.

When the Nazis assumed power in 1933, they sought to unite the country behind their racist Ary-an ideology, and the use of their symbol infiltrated all aspects of German life.

You can still see it sometimes, including in osaic ceiling tiles at Hitler's Haus der Kunst in Munich. The banner became the official flag of the country in 1935, and although it wasn't every-where as Hollywood might have you believe, it was very much present

THE WAY FORWARD
Steven Heller subtitles his book, The Swastika, with a simple but pertinent question: Symbol Beyond Redemption? In those cultures where it's been used for centuries in religious practices or in the decorative arts, this question is unnecessary. The symbol doesn't carry any negative connotations there.

But objects like the swastika do not have any inherent meaning; the symbolism is constructed by the people who use them. In our western society, the swastika is tainted. The Nazi movement's violent crimes against humanity gave the Hakenkreuz a meaning that can't be concealed or erased.

In places like Pointes-des-Cascades, where pre-Nazi swastikas exist, extra care must be taken to contextualize their presence. But in all other instances the symbol really must be shunned.

Its hate-filled racist intentions are clear. It wasn't an innocent symbol for the Nazis, nor is it for latter-day neo-Nazis and white supremacists.

Mumbai Floods: What Happens When Cities Sacrifice Ecology for Development

As the storm that was hurricane Harvey
deluged the areas around Houston, Texas, large parts of northern India, Nepal and Bangladesh also experienced heavy rains.

And the city of Mumbai was hit by an-other major flooding espisode. Several people have died in the city, many in the collapse of a four-storey building that is be-lieved to have been weakened by the rains. OVERCROWDED CITIES

Such loss of life in urban areas is often blamed on India's overcrowding. Cities are growing at unprecedented rates. From a population of 2.86 million in 1950, Mumbai is now home to more than 21 million people, and is expected to have almost 28

million by 2030.

Built along the coastline on a series of islands, the city is surrounded by water: in mudflats, lakes, creeks, rivers, and the ev-er-present coastline.

Given the astronomical land prices in many parts of Mumbai, and the extreme scarcity of land, it is no surprise that Mumbai has sacrificed its ecology for development. Real estate projects, industry, and state infrastructure (railways, roads and the city's airport) have built over, and



choked, the city's water networks at varous strategic points. Every monsoon, the

Mudflats, wetlands, floodplains, mangroves and wooded vegetation once clowed down the flow of storm water. The mangrove's complex root systems and the branching architecture of trees acted as a natural barrier to reduce the force of water flow. But now, they are built over. Garbage spread everywhere clogs the waterways. Most channels and waterways that connect water bodies have been built

over too, resulting preventing streams from easily reaching the sea – forcing it to spread out into the low lying areas of the city, adding to the severe flooding.

Mumbai's extensive wetlands and mud-flats, which had connected parts of the city since the early 19th century, have disap-peared. Their presence would retain the rain water and soak it into the ground, re-

charging the wells and ground water table.

Today, with nothing but concrete all around, the city's land surface does not allow water to flow through it. In especial-

ly intense periods of rain, the devastation is extreme – at least 5000 people are be-lieved to have perished in the infamous floods of 2005, and the economic damage was estimated at 30 billion rupees (US\$690m).

THE NEED FOR INTROSPECTION

After the 2005 floods, a committee co tuted by the government investigated the reasons for the devastation, concluding that there was an urgent need to restore Mumbai's wetlands and water systems. In 2007, the municipality formulated the Greater Mumbai Action Plan, which among other efforts had a major focus on the restoration of the city's main river, the Mithi, which had become little more than a sewage channel in parts.

Yet around the same time, the chair of the committee overseeing the plan, water expert Madhav Chitale spoke publicly about the lack of progress in implement-ing its recommendations. He said that the city lacked basic topographic data which were essential to build pathways for rain-water flow – which could have prevented flooding in subsequent rains.

In recent years, climate scientists, urban specialists and civic society groups warned repeatedly that Mumbai was

heading for another heavy flood. A combination of the greater likelihood of high rainfall events because of climate change, and an even more inadequately prepared city, created a situation ripe for a disaster in the making. These warnings came true this monsoon season.

Mumbai's planners know that climate change is leading to increased likelihood of extreme rainfall, and that restoration of the city's wetland, river and floodplain networks is central to flood control. Yet the rush to develop construction projections in the city has often disregarded these factors. Money cannot replace nature in cities. A careful reading of Indian urban history shows that cities have historically grown with nature providing a support system When this system is eroded – as is seen in so many Indian cities today, including in Delhi, Bangalore and Chennai - the very survival of the city is placed in question.

The story of Mumbai today is a reflec-

tion of the ills that plague many Indian cities – and those in other parts of the world as well, such as Miami and Houston. In a wetter future, it is clearer than ever that cities need ecology to grow.

Modi in China for BRICS Summit post Doklam standoff

(PTI): Prime Minister Nar-endra Modi will arrive here tomorrow for the BRICS Sumnit, where he is likely to meet Chinese President Xi Jinping, days after the two countries ended their 73-day standoff in the Dokalam area.

The three-day summit in Xiamen, a southeastern Chinese city in Fujian province, will begin tomorrow even as authorities declared a high alert with Typhoon Mawar ex-

pected to hit the coastal region.

The summit will be the first gathering when the leaders of Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa will meet after New Delhi and Beijing decided on "expedi-tious disengagement" of their border troops in the disputed Dokalam area on August 28. It is likely to provide Modi

and Xi their first face-to- face opportunity to discuss the standoff, which had started on June 16 after the Chinese military tried to build a road would allow India feared Beijing to cut off its access to



India and China have not ruled out a Modi-Xi meeting during the summit. India's External Affairs Ministry has said it was a common practice to arrange bilateral meetings on the margins of such multilaterals, while the Chinese Foreign Ministry has said it will make arrangements "if time allows".

Ahead of the summit, Chi-

na has also said BRICS was

not an appropriate forum for India to raise the counter-ter-rorism record of Pakistan, its "all weather" ally.

While External Affairs Ministry Spokesman Raveesh Kumar yesterday refused to "preempt" as to what Modi will speak during his inter-vention at the Summit on Monday, sources said India is expected to flag concerns over

At the BRICS Summit hosted by India last year, Modi had described Pakistan as a "mothership" of terrorism world-wide and sought decisive global action against terror outfits.

The summit was also ex pected to discuss the course of the BRICS grouping of emerg-ing economies for the next 10 years as it has completed its first decade in existence.

The Xiamen city, which is geographically close to Taiwan and separated by a narrow strip of Taiwan Straits has been decked up for the high-profile summit.

China has projected high expectations from the Xiamen summit, which will be attended hy Russian President Vladimir Putin, South Africa's Jacob Zuma and Brazil's Michel Temer.

The BRICS nations are key players in the world economy and in global governance. Together, the five accounted for 23 per cent of the 2016 global economy, almost double their share in 2006. They contrib-uted more than half of world economic growth in the past 10 years, becoming the strongest engines of the global economy.

BRICS countries account for 44 per cent of world pop-ulation and have abundant natural and human resources.

In a commentary, China's state-run Xinhua news agencv said these BRICS countries have shown no fear of the lacklustre world economy but demonstrated to the world

what they can achieve more by staying united.
Established in 2006, the

economic bloc has been making steady progress since as its five members have been cementing cooperation, building trust and seeking mutual benefits.

"Although the mechanism has seen ups and downs over the past years and each member faces its own set of challenges, they are like five fingers: short and long when extended, but a powerful fist when clenched ether," the commentary said.

China has invited leaders from five other emerging markets - Egypt, Guinea, Mexico, Tajikistan and Thailand - to the summit under its "BRICS Plus" concept.
Chinese Foreign Minister

Wang Yi said the five countries were not permanent invitees but they will participate only this year. He compared their presence to India's invitation to BIMSTEC (Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic) leaders for last vear's Goa summit.

intendent of Police (SP) Pratap Pradhan had said, "We do not have any official communication re-garding such operations being conducted inside Sikkim by the West Ben-gal police."

Meanwhile, Tamang today questioned Gu-rung's decision to expel him lashed out at him and party general secre-tary Roshan Giri. "I do not need to

take lessons from them. I am a son of the soil and am fighting for the interests of my Gorkha brothers. I want to ask Gurung and Giri that if they are so concerned about fighting for Gorkhaland why did they send their families

Underground dark matter laboratory inaugurated in uranium mine

JAMSHEDPUR, SEPT 2 (PTI): An underground dark matter lab-oratory for conducting experi-ments in fundamental physics involving rare event searches was today inaugurated in the oldest uranium mine at Jaduguda in Iharkhand.

Dr Sekhar Basu, Chairman, Atomic Energy Commission and Secretary, Department of Atomic Energy (DAE), inaugurated the facility at a depth of 555 metre in the Uranium Corporation of India Limited (UCIL) mine at Jadugoda, 30 km from here.

Speaking to reporters later at Jadugora mine premises, Basu said. "We knew of an estimated five per cent of the possible 30 per cent matters existing in the universe and this new facility will help us to research about the unknown matters.

"We have started working on it but it does not mean we will be successful,"he said.

"However, we will progress step by step to achieve the desired result," he said

The laboratory has been

set up by the UCIL and Saha Institute of Nuclear Physics (SINP), Kolkata by utilizing the available infrastructure and underground facilities of the Jaduguda mine.

This new physics laboratorv at UCIL will be the first of its kind in the country after closure of a similar facility at Bharat Gold Mine in Kolar (Karnataka) in early 1992.

The present depth of Jaduguda mine is 905 metre. It is the second deepest operating underground mine of the country after Hutti Gold mine which is more than 1000 metre deep.

Asked about the projects the DAE was working on, Basu said, the department has plans to develop four cancer hospi-tals on the line of Tata Memo-rial Hospital, Mumbai, which he described as one of the best institutes of the world and the

The hospitals are proposed at Vishakhapatnam , Mohali, Sangrur and at the BHU campus in Varanasi, he said adding that

the investment proposal has to be cleared by the government,

Emphasizing the need for participation of state govern-ments, he said a small hospital with the co-operation of the Punjab government has been established at Sangrur.

Punjab government has provided the infrastructure including building, land and electricity to set up the hospital equipped with three modern operation theatres and six speciality

The DAE has provided manpower, equipment and is bearing the regular expenses, he

The DAE has also been asked to develop a hospital in the campus of Banaras Hindu University (BHU) and a Railway hospital, which were not in a good shape,

Basu also offered technology support to the Tatas, for their proposed ten hospitals across the country.

On the nuclear energy front,

partment has plans to generate an additional 14,000 Mw electricity by 2030. "We have an installed ca-

the DAE Chairman said, the de-

pacity of 6780 MW from 22 reactors in operation and additional 21 reactors are in various stages of installations", he said expressing hope that the denartment could produce 14 000 Mw of electricity from these reactors in 10/12 years.

About the uranium production in the country, C K Asnani, chairman-cum-managing director of UCIL said, the UCIL has plans to enhance the production capacity of uranium by ten fold by 2030.

Apart from its proposed mine in Rahil, Rajasthan and Gogi in Karnataka, he said the production capacity would be increased by two/three fold at Turampalle mine in Andhra Pradesh and expansion of operations would be carried out at Narwa Pahar mine in East Singhbhum district.

impaging India will fancy their Achances of completing a 5-0 whitewash of Sri Lanka when they face the be-leaguered hosts in the fifth and final Oneday International match here Sunday.

The visitors already swept the Test series 3-0, and given their dominant run on this trip, would like to sweep the ODI series as well.

Sri Lanka are in danger of losing a

second successive ODI series to India by a 5-0 margin. The last time these two sides played a bilateral series in November 2014, a depleted Lankan side lost 5-0 in India.

Their fortunes haven't changed

much since and another loss would be a serious body blow for the hosts in what has been a traumatic summer of cricket. They have already foregone the opportunity to automatically qualify for the 2019 ODI World Cup by failing to win two matches in this series

That 5-0 win in 2014-15 was India's last ODI series whitewash. Since they have beaten Zimbabwe 3-0 twice, as also beating them 5-0 in 2013.

Considering sterner opposition, India previously beat New Zealand and England 5-0 in 2010-11 and 2012-13 respectively, both series' wins coming

In fact, England are the only side to lose 5-0 twice to India (in 2008-09 as well) in the last decade, so the Men in Blue will be eager to add another entry to this short list.

Given the heat and humidity here, and the exertions of what has been a long if not arduous tour, the Indian team enjoyed an additional day off ahead of the fifth ODI.

There are no injury concerns and



the same playing combination can expect to be retained tomorrow, with the likes of Manish Pandey, Kuldeep Yadav and Shardul Thakur given a further op-

portunity to impress.
Additionally, coach Ravi Shastri had spoken yesterday about the need to carefully manage workloads of bowlers across formats. It remains to be seen if Hardik Pandya will be given a break in this light, and Kedar Jadhav afforded another chance to impress, ahead of a

long limited-overs' schedule at home.
In light of the team's experimentation and rotation policy, Ajinkya Rahane is the only batsman not to get game time in this series. With Rohit Sharma coming back and scoring runs, and Shikhar Dhawan in good form, the team management has so far not toyed with the opening combination.

Rahane, on the other hand, had won the man-of-the-series in the last ODI engagement in West Indies with 336 runs from five matches including a hundred and three half-centuries.

There is a chance that he could be given a game ahead of Dhawan in this final ODI, even if only to cement his spot as the designated third-choice opener.

This also puts the spotlight on KL Ra-hul who was given a middle-order role in the current ODI series, specifically keeping the preparation for the next World Cup in mind. So far that experiment hasn't worked with Rahul returning scores of 4,

17 and 7 in his three outings.
Oddly enough, Rahul has fallen to Akila Dananjay in all three matches. While it will be a matter of concern for the team management, they will also want to afford him further opportunities to strengthen the case for a middle-order berth.

Manish Pandey's half-century in the

fourth ODI gives the team additional leeway in this regard.

Meanwhile, Sri Lanka are expected to

make at least one chance to their playing XI. Skipper Upul Tharanga will be back in charge of affairs after sitting out the last two games owing to his suspension for slow-over rate. He is expected to slot into the middle order once again and Lahiru Thirimanne might be asked to open the innings instead.

It remains to be seen if the Lankan captain can inspire a serious challenge in this fifth ODI after a lacklustre summer.

Most of all though, after two suspensions in three months, Tharanga will be looking to complete the 50 overs within the stipulated time.

Hockey India sacks chief coach Oltmans

NEW DELHI. SEP 2 (PTI): Hockey India on Saturday sacked national coach Roelant Oltmans after a string of unimpressive outings at the international level.

High Performance Di-rector David John will be in charge till a suitable replacement is found for smooth transition of the the men's team.

The decision was tak-en during the three-day meeting of the Hockey India High Performance and Development Committee, which concluded today.

Though the federation did not say it in as many words, it is appar-ent that the HI bosses are not impressed with the Dutchman.

"Key decisions tak-en included Chief Coach Roelant Oltmans to step down," Hockey India said in a release.
"While Roelant Olt-

mans role as Chief Coach in improving the teams' overall fitness and cohesiveness has been anpreciated, the results are what matter and the performance of the team has not been consistent or up to the desired levels."

The power-packed meeting to assess the way forward for Indian hockey was attended by over 24 members over the last three days.

Harbinder Singh,

chairman of the Hockey India Selection Commit-tee said, "The Committee was convened since we are collectively not satisfied with the Indian Men's Hockey team's performance in 2016 and 2017 and feels that wins in Asia can't be a benchmark for success any more.

"We need to show results beyond intent in key international tournaments where the spo-radic success over the last two years is more in-cidental than deliberate. To make results a reality, we need to make hard decisions for the great-er good of the future of Hockey in India.

"The current for-mat of coaching was not showing results be-yond a certain level. The Committee unanimously agreement that immediate action was required to be taken and while change may not always be comfortable it is essential if we want to position ourselves as a serious global contender for the upcoming critical tournaments in 2018 including the Asian Games & World Cup and 2020 Olympic Games."

Late payment fees waived for delayed July GST returns filing

NEW DELHI, SEP 2 (PTI): The government has waived late payment fees for delayed filing of GST returns and allowed businesses to correct errors in the initial form while submitting final returns by September 5.

Businesses were required to file the maiden Goods and Services Tax (GST) returns for July and pay taxes by August 25 by filing GSTR 3B. The final returns for sales for July are to be filed by September 5 and returns for purchases by September 10.

In a circular, the finance ministry said late fee for all taxpayers who could not file GSTR 3B for July has been

waived, but not the interest on late payment of dues.

As per the CGST and SGST

Acts, an interest at the rate of 18 per cent will be levied for delayed payment of tax.

"Since the payment was not made on or before the due date, the registered person shall be liable for payment of interest on delayed payment of tax starting from August 26, till the date of debit in the electronic cash and/or credit ledger, but will not be liable to pay any late fee," the CBEC said.

The GST law provided for a nominal fee of Rs 100 per day on Central GST and an equivalent amount on State GST in case of late filing of returns and payment of taxes.

The Central Board of Excise and Customs (CBEC) also pro-vided for correction of erroneous details furnished in form GSTR-3B

Now, businesses who intend to make changes or amend the initial return (GSTR 3B) can do so at the time of filing final returns in forms GSTR-1 or GSTR-2, as the case may be.
"This will get reflected in

the revised output tax liability or eligible ITC (input tax credit), as the case may be, of the

registered person. The details furnished in form GSTR-1 and GSTR-2 will be auto-populated and reflected in the returns in form GSTR-3 for that particular month," the CBEC said.

In cases where the taxes paid as per the initial return filed in GSTR-3B is less than the amount due post reconciliation as per GSTR-1, the additional amount of tax can be paid by debiting the electronic cash or credit ledger.

However, interest on delaved payment of return will e levied on the amount of tax that was due.

Suicide bombers kill 7 in attack on Iraq power plant SAMARRA, SEP 2 (AFP): Suicide bombers killed succide bombers killed seven people and wound-ed 12 in an attack on a power plant north of Baghdad today, an Iraqi security official said.

Armed with grenades and wearing explosives belts, three attackers en-tered the facility in Sa-marra, about 100 kilometres (62 miles) north of the capital, at 2:00 am, the official told AFP.

"They attacked the plant's workers, killing

seven and wounding 12, according to an initial as-sessment," said the offi-

cial, who spoke on condi-tion of anonymity.

Security reinforce-ments then arrived on the scene, killing two of the bombers and evacuating the employees. The attack comes as Iragi Shiites mark the first day of the Eid al-Adha feast.

There was no immediate claim of responsibility for the attack, but the Islamic State jihadist group frequently carries out sui cide bombings in Iraq. In 2014, IS captured almost a third of Iraqi territory in a lightning offensive. It now only holds two pockets of territory in the country.

Kenneth Juster to be nominated ambassador

Hawking's mission to find alien life detects mystery signals


Amission to explore intelligent alien life in the universe has recorded some mysterious signals coming from a galaxy three billion light years away, according to an Indian-origin scientist working on the ambitious project co-founded by Stephen Hawking.

Vishal Gajiar is part of the team working under the Breakthrough Listen project set up by Hawking, one of the world's best-know tists, and Russian billionaire Yuri Milner to discover the truth about the universe.

The latest fast radio bursts

(FRBs) prove their equipment is working well and ready to pick up signs of life if they exist.

"We really have no idea about where they come from," Gajjar, one of the scientists



from the University of California Berkeley Research Centre,

told The Daily Telegraph.

He noted: "If some form of life would like to produce a signal that is detectable to an-

other civilisation this could be a way to do it, but I don't think they are coming from intelli-

gent civilisations.
"There are more theories than the number of sources. We have opened more questions than answers. do more study we find more

weird things," he said. Breakthrough Listen is a USD 100-million global astro-

nomical initiative launched in 2015 by Hawking and Miller and has teams around the world using their telescopes to look for evidence of life.

The initial 10-year programme will survey the 1,000,000 closest stars to Earth, scanning the entire galactic plane of the Milky Way

Beyond our galaxy it will listen for messages from the 100 closest galaxies at 10 billion different frequencies.

Announcing the project at the time at a press conference in London, Hawking said it was time to commit to finding the answer to life beyond Earth.
"Somewhere in the universe

intelligent life may be watching the lights of ours aware of what they mean," he said.

Explanations for the latest signals detected range from rotating neutron stars with extremely magnetic fields, to energy sources used by extraterrestrial civilisations to

power spacecraft.
Whatever they are they left their galaxy when our Solar System was just two billion years old and life was just get-

ting going on Earth. At first scientists thought the signals were the fallout from a catastrophic event in space, like a supernova, but then they repeated again in 2015 and 2016 suggesting the whatever object produced them was still there.

In the fresh experiment, which will be elaborated upon in scientific journals in future, University of California, Berkeley, experts scanned the same galaxy at a higher frequency than which had been used to see the original bursts, and found 15 more.

Indian-origin consultant sentenced to 15 months in jail in US

m n\ Ind}$ consultant was today sentenced to 15 months in prison and ordered to pay a USD 10,000 fine for his role in funciling over USD 600,000 in illegal foreign campaign contributions in a San Diego mayoral election.

Ravneet Singh of Illi-nois and former CEO of ElectionMall Technologies was ordered by US District Court Judge Michael Anello to report to prison in October to begin serving his sentence.

Singh, 45, was sentenced for his role in funnelling more than USD 600,000 in illegal foreign campaign contributions campaign contributions from Mexican citizen Jose Susumo Azano Matsura to candidates in the 2012 San Diego mayoral election.

In September 2016, after six weeks of trial, a federal jury in San Diego returned guilty verdicts against Singh, Azano and Azano's son Edward Susumo, who were convicted of felony counts associated with a series of illegal campaign con-tributions by Azano to the campaigns of Bonnie Dumanis and Bob Filner.

"American elections are not for sale," said Executive US Attorney Blair Perez.

"We will not allow our sacred electoral process to be compromised. This prison sentence underscores an important mes-sage: Anyone who tries to manipulate the American electorate will pay a high price," Perez said.

According to evidence presented at trial, Azano, Singh, and others conspired to inject hundreds of thousands of dollars in cash and in-kind consulting services to the Bonnie Dumanis and Bob Filner campaigns, despite the fact that Azano's foreign national status made such contributions illegal.

To conceal his connection to these contributions, Azano arranged

with his son Edward Hester and others to funnel this illegal foreign money through corporate and third person "straw do-nor" contributions.

The conspirators also arranged for at least USD 267,000 worth of Singh's in-kind consulting services to be secretly fun-nelled to the campaigns.

Ultimately, with Azano's help, Filner won the election, though he was forced to resign shortly thereafter. For his part, Singh used his specialised skills and knowledge to facilitate the crimes.

US, S. Korea discuss coordinated response against NKorea

The US and South Korea today vowed to strengthen their alliance through defence cooperation to fight the threats posed by North Korea with President Donald Trump giving a "con-Trump giving a "conceptual approval" to sell Seoul American military equipment worth bil-lions of dollars.

On Tuesday, North Korea fired a missile over Japan, prompting Trump to insist that "all options were on the table" in an implied threat of pre-emptive military

Trump in a phone call with his South Korean counterpart Moon Jae-in discussed a coordinated response to deal with the "destabilising and escalatory behaviour" of North Korea, the White House said.

"Trump and Moon pledged to continue to apply strong diplomat-



sure on North Korea and to make all necessary preparations to deter and defend against the growing threat posed by North Korea," it said.

The two leaders agreed to strengthen the alliance through defence cooperation and to strengthen South Korea's defence capabilities.

"Trump provided his conceptual approval of planned purchases by outh Korea of billions f dollars in American military equipment," the White House said.

Trump spoke with Presient Nursultan Nazarbavev of Kazakhstan to disiss the two countries'



his recently announced South Asia strategy.

"Trump expressed appreciation for Kazakhstan's regional and global leadership, including its upcoming tenure as Chair of the United Na-tions Security Council in January, and congratulat-ed President Nazarbayev on hosting the Astana Expo 2017," the White House said.

Trump also spoke with President Juan Manuel Santos of Colombia.
