New Delhi/Darjeeling, June 13 (PTI): The Centre today despatched 600 paramilitary personnel to assist the West Bengal government in restoring normalcy in violence-hit Darjeeling hills which witnessed incidents of stone pelting on the second day of GJMsponsored bandh. indefinite

Rs 61.7 cr compensation recommended for Pakyong airport affected

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 13 JUN:

ub-Divisional Strate of Pakyong, Yadav Sharma, has submitted a detailed report on dam-ages suffered and compensation recommended for people affected by the ongoing construction of Pakyong airport. The SDM has projected compensa tion to the tune of Rs 61.78 crore. The report was submitted to the High Court of Sikkim on 10 June. As directed by the

High Court on 10 Apr ear-lier this year, the SDM-Pakyong completed the assessment of damages caused to lands and properties by the airport project in the past five years. These are above and beyond lands acquired for ed area radius originally

marked out.

As per the report,
42 families have lost all their land and properties while 24 families have incurred partial damage to

their properties.

The 66 affected families had approached the High Court last year petitioning it to direct the concerned authorities to release compensation for damages to their land and properties due to the on going construction work

of the Pakyong airport.
They stated the They stated that earth cutting on western side of the airport, vibra-tion due to blasting and use of heavy vehicles had caused the damages

The assessment was carried out as per the Land Acquisition Act 2013 and assessment of the crops for the last five years.

The SDM-Pakyong

in its compliance report

stated that during the field verification damages of each and every plot of land of individual petitioner was assessed in terms of physical damage as well as annual agricul-ture and horticulture loss.

The report further states that the total annual monetary loss incurred by the 66 petitioners due to damage of land amounts to Rs 70.95 lakh.

However, there is no such prescribed rate or yardstick to calculate damages and in such cases, the assessment of land which is found totally unfit for cultivation has been calculated as per the 2013 Land Acquisition Act, the SDM has said in his report.

As per the 2013 Land

Acquisition Act, price of agricultural land is four times the normal rate for rural land. The Act also states that affected families have to be rehabilitated and resettled along with provision of one time grant and employment in the airport project, all of which are yet to be provided to those affected

It may be mentioned here that SDM-Pakyong has also brought to the notice of the court that apart from damaged lands of the petitioners assessed by the office of the SDM, there exists other lands within the same area which are also damaged but the same have not been assessed as those land owners are not petitioners.

Strike evokes mixed response in north Bengal

Jalpaiguri (WB), June **13 (PTI):** A general strike called by the Tea Garden Labourers Joint Forum in some blocks and four districts of north Bengal today evoked mixed response.

The impact of the strike was felt in Alipur-duar, Kalimpong, Darjeeling and Jalpaiguri as well as parts of Coochbehar, Mathabhanga, Mekhliganj and Islampur block of North Dinajpur. Normal life, howev-

er, remained unaffected in Siliguri and Jalpaiguri

Altogether 215 persons were detained by

the police at Hasimara, the police said.

The effect of the shut-down was also felt in Birpara, Mal, Nagrakata, Banarhat, Naxalbari, Ku-margram, Kalchini and Madarihat with most of the shops closed, private vehicles off the roads and offices witnessing thin attendance.

The joint forum com-

prising 27 organisations including CPI(M), Congress and BJP, had called a two-day tea garden strike since yesterday de-manding Minimum Wages Act and benefits as per

a general strike today to ress their demands. Gorkha Janm

Janmukti Morch has also extended support to the strike.

Zia-ul-Alam, secre-

tary of the joint forum, claimed that almost 300 tea gardens of Terai and Dooars were closed.

The strike was also ob-served in 45 tea gardens of

Darjeeling, he said.

Demonstrations and protests were held in front of the tea gardens.

Protesting tea garden labourers had blocked NH 31 for some time at

CITU leader Ajay Mahali claimed that Trinamool Congress supporters were forcing tea garden labourers to work in the tea gardens at Banarhat.

Around 200 tea gar-

den workers of Dengua-jhar and Karala Valley tea gardens had put up blockade at Goshala More on NH 31 in Jalpaiguri town in support of their demands.

A police team led by Additional Superintendent of Police Indira Mukherjee tried to per-suade them to lift the roadblock, but they did

First there were just the black flags, then the party's green; yellow and white started rearing amidst the multitude of black. And now, it is the National Tricolour. That is how the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) changed stages of its ongoing movement in the Darjeeling hills. Very indicative!

The change in the colour of flags is significant. The black flags at the start of the agitation were merely a mark of protest, the party colours next were a mark of claim and the Tricolour now is a mark of identity. Reflect carefully, the movement proceeded exactly in sync with the change in flags.

How intense is the movement? That it has brought the GJM and the GNLF on the same plane indicates quite. Let us not forget the GNLF was the Trinamool's poll partner in the recently held civic elections in the hills. By attending an all-party meeting convened by the GJM in Darjeeling on Tuesday, the GNLF has indicated blood is thicker than politics.

How far would the movement

to to fetch Gorkhaland or not time will tell, but it has put the brakes on the Trinamool's rapid progress in the hills. And now taming a movement born out of the identity issue with force will further antagonize the people against the ruling dispensation. It happened so in the past and it would happen again. Gorkhaland or not, the GJM's purpose looks served.

A protracted stir will only inconvenience the people, set back whatever little trade happens in the hills by miles and usher a period of general uncertainty.

This patch of field, it may be re-

called, is considered the northern most extremity to which paddy is grown in Sikkim and has religious

significance for the Sikkimese because it is believed that paddy started growing till this elevation when Guru Rinpoche sprinkled rice on this patch of land during his visit here in the 8th Century.

This field, located in the heart of town, now almost hemmed in by constructions on all sides, is a sacred space and sits next to the holy rock and the Gurudwara in Chungthang. "The paddy grown here is harvested in the end of September or sometimes in October and we usually get around 08 to 09 sacks. Half of the paddy is distributed among the public of Chungthang as Tsog [Prasad] and Chungthang as 1sog [Frasad] and the rest is kept at the Chungthang Monastery to be served during an annual prayer," informs former North Zilla Adhyakshya, Khamsoong Lepcha.

Shops downed shutters as the violence broke out.

GJM chief Bimal Gu-rung said that he was in constant touch with the Centre and was hopeful that its ally the BJP would consider its demand for a separate state "compassionately".

"I am constantly in

touch with the central government and various ministers. I am very hopeful that they will understand our pain and struggle and will consider our demand for a separate state of Gorkhaland.

"The government at the Centre is our ally and they will surely consider our demand compas-sionately," Gurung said. BJP, he said, has al-

ways been in favour of small states.

The GJM chief slammed West Bengal chief minister for calling out the Army to coning out the Army to con-trol the situation in the hills and advised her to stay away as "the peo-ple of Darjeeling are well equipped to take care of themselves"

"My advice to Mamata Banerjee is please stay away from the hills. We don't need your charity. The people of the hills will not accept TMC's he-gemony," he said.

Hitting out at the chief minister for call-ing the Army to control the situation in the hills, Gurung said, "Mamata Banerjee is just pursuing opportunist politics.

"In December last year she had accused the Army of trying to attempt a military coup. She can do anything for the sake of cheap politics," he alleged.

"We are not like her. We respect the Indian Army. Every year hundreds of youth from the hills join the Indian army," he said.



Traders stop buying in mandis, oppose compulsion to buy at MSP

INDORE, JUN 13 (PTI): Traders in several man-dis (wholesale markets) in Madhya Pradesh have stopped purchase of food-grains, pulses and oil-seeds following the Chief Minister Shivraj Singh Chouhan's announcement that purchasing below the minimums support price would be considered an offence.

The announcement should be withdrawn, traders demanded today.

Chouhan's announce-ment was one of the measures he promised in a bid to mollify the farmers in west Madhya Pradesh who were on the warpath since June 1, demanding better prices for farm produce among other things.

"The business has become difficult for traders as it has become manda tory to purchase the farm produce at MSP. So we have decided to shut the mandis till the withdrawal of this announcement, Sakal Anaj Dalhan-Tila han Vyapari Mahasangh Samiti president Gopal-das Agrawal told PTI. The Samiti had a

state-level meeting ear-lier today. Agrawal said that business in almost 85 percent of mandis has come to a standstill in response to the call given by his organisation.

SGC students demand fixed fee policy for Sikkim colleges

Students of Sikkim Government College, Tadong have demanded that the Human Resource Develop ment Department formulate a fixed fee policy for colleges in the State.

The sudden announcement of fees creates lots of confusion like the examination fees that the students had to pay recently. We had informed about the fee issue to HRD Principal Secretary and he had said that a letter would be sent to the College Princi-pal. Sikkim University has the right to charge us fees but the same needs to be reimbursed by the government. We demand that the State HRD set a fixed fee policy," said Students Representative Council president, Bishal Subba while



It was informed that a group of students met the Director of Higher Education [HRDD], DK Pradhan on Mon-day to discuss the fee issue along with various other issues. The students were given an HRDD press statement

which said that "the students had to pay the examination fees this year due to online registration form introduced by Sikkim University. From the upcoming academic session, the details of the fee to be paid by a student in the

3 year course will be issued".

The students were also told that the Directorate will seek the details of fees to be reimbursed from all the colleges and the reimbursements

statement has said that Sikkim University being a Central University is beyond the administrative control of the Department, yet it has assured of discussing the matter with SU. Another issue brought up by

the students is the introduction of online admission procedure, which according to them, is causing a lot of inconvenience to the students. The students also stressed on the need for the State to provide 50% seat reservation for students of the State.

The SRC president also alleged that many students who participated in the protests were made to give written apologies by the college. They have threatened to stage another protest if their demands are

Chhetri strike seals India's 1-0 win over Kyrgyzstan

BENGALURU, JUN (PTI): Captain Sunil Ch-hetri stamped his class yet again as he scored the match-winner to fire India to a 1-0 win over Kyrgyzstan in a fast-pace entertaining Asian Cup qualifier match here

Chhetri drilled a lot shot with his right foot off a fine pass from Jeje Lalpekhlua in the 69th minute to lead India to a crucial win in the home leg tie of the Group A third round qualifiers of

the 2019 Asian Cup. Chhetri, who scored his 54th goal in his 94th match, led from the front throughout the match. Playing behind the lone striker Jeje, he was in the thick of things, at times falling back deep to help the defenders, setting up his team-mates and also taking shots on his own.

With the win, India sat atop the group with six points -- from two wins -- ahead of Kyrgyz-stan and Myanmar who both have three points from two matches. Macau are yet to open account from their two matches.
All the four teams

will play home and away matches and the two top sides will qualify for the 2019 AFC Asian Cup to be held in United Arab Emirates.

The hosts, who had beaten Myanmar 1-0 their first match of the qualifiers, notched up their seventh official international match on the

wanting in their finish-ing. The Indian back-four of Sandesh Jhingan, Anas Edathodika, Pritam Kotal and Narayan Das were also superb in defending.

The visiting side were denied by the upright in the second half while Indian goalkeeper Gurpreet Singh Sandhu made at least three brilliant saves to ensure that the hosts walked away with all three points.

Kyrgyzstan, who are ranked at 132 as against India's 100, suffered a jolt as soon as the match started with their key midfielder Anton Zemilanukhin being stretchered out after a collision with Gurpreet in the fourth minute. Edgar Bernhardt

took his place.

The 15th minute was all about Kyrgyz onslaught which kept the seizable crowd at the Sree Kanteerava Stadium

During this period, the visitors had most of the ball possession with the Indians leaving a lot of space in the midfield. It was due to the brilliance of Gurpreet India did not concede a goal in the 15th minute.

Bakhtiar Duyshobe-kov had a low shot from a nice buildup but Gurpreet brilliantly saved diving to his right.

India slowly clawed their way back into the match and even threat-ened to take the lead

In the 23rd minute, Jakichand Singh was on the clear at the right top edge of the box after being released by Chhetri but he was in two minds

whether to shoot or pass and wasted a fine m

Three minutes later, Kyrgyz goal was under threat as Jackichand sent a nice long pass to Chhetri whose first touch inside the box with his left foot was out of control but Holycharan Nazary was there but he shot straight to the goalie.

India had another chance in the 31st minute, off a quick throw-in from the left flank by Eu-genson Lyngdoh but Jeje's left-footed shot was brilliantly saved by the goalkeeper.

India were lucky not to concede a goal in the 55th minute as Ahlidin Israilov's left-footer hit the upright. India re-sponded immediately on the counter but Chhetri could not put his shot down in front of Kyrgyz goal off a Nazary delivery from the left.

The Kyrgyz were doing all the attacking after the resumption and the Indian defence was in tatters in the 60th minute and Jhingan had to make a last-ditched clearance in front of the goal after Gurpreet was out of line.

But it was India who took the lead in the 69th minute against the run of play. In a quick counter-attack, Chhetri got the better of at least three Kyrgyz players at the middle of the park and then sent the ball for Jeje.

The Mohun Bagan striker lobbed the ball beautifully over a Kyrgyz defender to find his darting skipper, who made no mistake in firing his shot past the goalkeeper to send the crowd into a

India could have won the match with a better margin but for the two chances they wasted in the additional injury time of four minutes.

Chhetri sent Robin Singh, who substituted Jeje in the 80th minute, on the clear in the first minute of the injury time but the striker shot over vith the goalkeeper at his mercy.

In the final minute of the added time, Chhetri himself was on the verge of scoring his second of the night but he also shot over in haste.

India's next match is against Macau, an away game, on September 5.

Darj, Take a Pause

There is too much confusion and suddenly too much hurt for anything worthwhile to come about

The Darjeeling hills appear to be in free-fall mode, hurtling down a potentially dangerous path and every bruise it collects along the way makes the anger even more resentful. There was always a suspicion that with the GTA elections in the offing and the increasingly aggressive and dismissive attitude of Kolkata, Hill politics would also become more confrontational. Mamata has been poking at that bear for a while now and has to shoulder part of the blame for the confusion that grips Darjeeling at present. It is unfortunate that the attitude she accuses of the Centre of harbouring against West Bengal, she reflects on the hills - displaying only two approaches, appeasement (which many see as luring) and rejection. Things might probably have not come to such a pass if she had tried out some mutual respect, after all, the GTA, even if most of it is staffed unopposed, is the product of a democratic process, and democracy demands respect and consultation. These have been noticeably absent from how Kolkata has engaged with Darjeeling and both sides have remained disinclined to engage in earnest. Both prefer to let their actions speak and none of their actions have really been reasoned or transparent. And so we have a situation in the Hills where there is a lot of anger and hurt, a lot of name-calling and jingoism but really no effort at finding a way out and moving forward. And no, "not until Gorkhaland" is neither a practical condition nor fair on the masses who have yet again invested their time, livelihoods and even lives to yet again pursue their aspiration for statehood.

As far as statehood is concerned, the people of

the Darjeeling hills have every right to raise the demand and even have history and precedence in their support. That said, nothing has changed on ground, and the TMC ambition in the hills is not really a new development, to explain this sudden escalation in hostilities. If it really was the language chauvinism of West Bengal which demanded a taking to the streets, then that battle was won the moment the WB CM was forced to issue a clarification. But GIM ignored that opportunity to celebrate a victory and continued pushing the same agenda and things collapsed fast after that. Both sides allowed the posturing to continue for too long. It is almost as the latest $\mbox{\sc Aandolan}$ is playing in reverse, because really, an indefinite bandh should be the final deployment from the arsenal of options, not the very first in the pursuit of statehood. Now, both GJM and the TMC government have painted themselves into their respective corners and it will be very difficult for them to reach out and allow normalcy to return without losing face or walking all over the paint. There is too much confusion, too much hope and, dare we say, too much at stake for either of them to appear weak. It is really now that come backroom channels need to opened and a pause agreed upon. Just pause for a while, take stock, let the adrenaline subside and return to the fight with at least a POA. Don't do that, and very soon this will disintegrate into a series of unfortunate incidents and avoidable mishaps and misadventures

How arts heal and galvanise the youth of Timor Leste

**Courtey station.com

**Courtey is one way of describing this art space" writes the Lonely Planet about Arte Moris. But Arte Moris (or Living Art) is much more than an art gallery or a fine art school.

Established in 2003, the centre offers a place for young Timorese to express themselves through art while helping them bond and share positive values about their country. World famous freedom fighters posters usually popular with the youth, such as those of Che Guevara and Bob Marley, surround teenagers who come to learn the practice of the arts – sculptures, murals, canvas print and

Initially a project by Swiss artist Luca Ganss-er and his wife, Gabriela Gansser, with a group of young people, Arte Moris has slowly turned into a well-recognised - and the only - art centre in the country. In the year of its inception, Arte Moris was awarded the UN Human Rights prize for its advocacy of freedom of expression.

But Arte Moris' aim is not just to promote the

arts. It hopes to help East Timorese people rebuild their lives after the long bloody independence struggle of one of the world's newest countries, which was founded on May 20, 2002.

VIOLENCE IN TIMOR LESTE

The Southeast Asian island was first colonised by the Portuguese in 1515. The country eventually gained independence from Portugal in November 1975 through the Revolutionary Front of an Independent East Timor (Fretilin). But that only lasted a brief nine days before it was invaded by the Indonesian military.

The country remained occupied until August 30 1999, when an independence referendum saw 78.5% of the East Timorese people vote for separation from Indonesia. The result led to widespread violence by pro-Indonesian groups that required

the intervention of UN peacekeepers.

That led to a UN Transitional Administration in East Timor (UNTAET) in 1999 to 2002, when

Timor Leste restored full independence.

The bloody struggle against Indonesian occupation brought the East Timorese together. But a political-military crisis erupted in 2006 after members of the army were dismissed.

The incident escalated into a set of clashes between the police, army, rebel soldiers and urban youth, with over 100 people killed in 2006 and over 150,000 displaced.

The crisis revealed a deep tension between the old and young generations of the country.

YOUTH IN CRISIS

Timor Leste has one of the most youthful populations in the world. Its rapid population growth has

drawn attention to the position and plight of the youth in the country.

According to a 2007 World Bank report titled Timor Leste's Youth in Crisis: Situational Analysis and Policy Options, the involvement of youth in widespread violence was one of the most visible elements of the crisis. And the generation gap is now a key feature of the contemporary social discourse in Timor Leste.

Two generations witnessed the country's long struggle for independence. The first is the "Generation of '99" or Geração Foun born during the period of Indonesian occupation, some of who emerged as national leaders in the 1980s and 1990s. They are distinct from the "Generation of "75" who are Poruese-speaking older leaders and mostly dominate the government.

The groups find themselves in disagreement over certain matters. But their relations are crucial for the transmission of cultural values and for the country's social cohesion. Timor Leste's youth suffer from a lack of job

opportunities and the poverty rate) remains high at 41.8%. The promises of independence seem far away as basic rights such as education, employ-ment and political participation still lag behind.

MURALS FOR PEACE

The youth of Timor Leste has been so scarred by this recent history that it has taken up the habit of venting on the walls. Parts of the nation's capital Dili look like an open-air art gallery.

After 2006, recognising that murals and graffiti were one of the most inclusive means of communication in the country, Nobel prize-winning former president Jose Ramos-Horta and several NGOs commissioned artists to paint the walls across the country and to convey messages of national unity

Murals and graffiti are now distinct part of the landscape. Arts help the young ones express their resistance to the legal and political authority in the

Many of the artists come from the "Generation of "99" and faced exclusion after the 2002 independence. They seek today to legitimise their role in the resistance movement against Indonesia but also to remind today's generation of their history while engaging in debates on post-independence identity.

The Gembel Art Collective is another such initiative, established in 2003 like Arte Moris. Gembel Art offers free arts classes and also proposes to have theatre, music and traditional performances. Similarly to Arte Moris, its classes and spaces are

Artists such as those associated with Arte Moris or Gembel Art Collective are also actively involved in human rights issues. These include fighting for land and for finding the children "disappeared" during the Indonesian occupation; an estimated 4,000 children were secretly taken to Indonesia

The artists voice their dissatisfaction and discontent over government policies such as the lack of job opportunities for the youth. They may also support campaigns, such as the Hands Off Timor Oil initiative, with the government. Through the arts, they urge people to think about the issues affecting their country.

MUSIC FOR HUMAN RIGHTS

In another attempt to bridge the generations that have parted ways because of various crisis Timor Leste has known, music bands have taken over public spaces as well.

One example is Galaxy Band, which was established in 1999 just after the referendum. The band received popular support among the younger generation as their lyrics criticised human rights shortfalls, as well as land, national and social issues

and those related to nationalism

According to its lead vocalist, Mely Fernandez, whom I met in Dili, the late 1990s were a new beginning for Timorese youth, but also foretold an

uncertain future.

During the 2006 internal crisis, the band incorporated social and political messages into their songs and poems. Occasionally, they face govern-ment interference but for Mely, that's a positive sign because it means the government is listening.

ISSUES AND CHALLENGES

Despite achieving the highest democracy index in the Southeast Asia region in a 2016 report by the Economist Intelligence Unit (EIU), the artists' use and enjoyment of public spaces is not without chal-

While Ramos-Horta was a strong supporter of the arts in Timor Leste, today public spaces are not well looked after by the government. In the Arte Moris gallery, broken ceilings are

not repaired because maintenance is not a priori-ty anymore. One of the possible reasons for this is the political messages the artists are sending to the

people.

Facing the challenge of not receiving much supadvocating the arts. Now and then, Arte Moris and Gembel Art Collective receive assistance from international NGOs and not much is coming in from

the national level.

Gembel Art Collective offers free arts courses to children as non-formal education. Students from both Arte Moris and Gembel Arts come from different districts. There are currently six districts that offer free art classes, set up by former students. They need government support for a long-term sustainability as they cannot rely on international

Another key issue that the artists advocate is the promotion of local languages and dialects. Tetum and Portuguese are both the official languag-es of Timor Leste. Bahasa Indonesia and English are defined as working languages, as stated in the Constitution. For some Timorese, these latter are considered economic languages as they are not the mother tongues of the country.

For artists in Arte Moris, dialects are important but they are gradually being forgotten and are now only used in districts. Osme Gonsalves from Lospalos, a former guerilla fighter during the Indone occupation works today as an artist and a poet. He promotes the use of local languages such as his dialect, Fataluku. According to him, dialect has an important role in the construction of national and social identity.

Asked about what they wish for their future, the artists said, "We will never stop and we will keep doing what we do. Hopefully we can influence more of our people especially younger brothers and sisters to also appreciate arts for the future of Timor Leste.'


DARJEELING, 13 JUN:

At around 11:15 a.m. a Gorkha Janmukti Morcha rally after going through the streets of Darjeeling arrived at the Darjeeling Bus Stand. The rally started moving towards the Darjeeling District Collectorate. A large police team led by top cops arrived at the stop asking the rally to return and stopping them for going towards the Collectorate.

Some of the agitators squatted on the road. At that point the Police resorted to baton charge to scatter

"There were incidents of stone pelting and we were compelled to drive away the crowd," stated Super-intendent of Police, Darjeeling, Akh-



ilesh Chaturvedi.

From the Bus stand the focal point of the agitation then shifted

to Singamari, the GJM stronghold on the outskirts of Darjeeling town. A Morcha rally tried to move towards

Siddhi Nath Gupta (ADG&IGP.) Jawed Shamim (IGP) along with the SP.

The CRPF was also present at

the scene along with the Army. A stand-off ensued with the police barricading the demonstrators and the demonstrators resorting to pro-Gorkhaland slogans. This continued till the protestors returned. Another rally was stopped by the police near the Darjeeling Zoo.

ISL expanded to 10 teams

New Delhi, Jun 12 (PTI): The Indian Super League will be expanded to 10 teams this season with the organisers today announcing two more franchises after a bidding process, with Bengaluru FC set to ply in the three-year-old ISL by leaving I-League

The ISL announced that Tata Steel Limited & JSW Group won the bids for the two new teams. The teams will be based in Jamshedpur and Bengaluru.

"Football Sports Development Limited

the joint venture between IMG-Reliance & Star India today announced the addition of two of India's largest conglomerates Tata Steel Ltd -- a USD 18.12 billion company and subsidiary of Tata Group (USD 103.51 billion 2015-16) and Jindal South West (JSW) -- USD 9 billion corporate into the fold of Indian Super League," the ISL said in a statement.

"The inclusion of two new clubs came cess floated by FSDL last month.

An independent panel along with consulting firm EY evaluated the bids to present its report today to the panel, in the presence of All India Football Federation General Secretary Mr Kushal Das," it said.

"The ISL in its fourth edition will witness an expanded five-month module with num-ber of participating clubs increasing to ten from its original eight founding member city

JSW Group, which owns Bengaluru FC through its subsidiary ISW Sports, won the right to participate in ISL from Bengaluru.

Tata Steel Ltd, which has won the bid to

participate from Jamshedpur, is the pioneering Indian corporate to have provided na-tional football with perennial pool of young footballers since 1987 through its Jamshedpur based facility -- Tata Football Academy.

The announcement of the increase in the number of teams in the ISL from eight



to 10 came amid uncertainty and discontent among I-League clubs regarding the domes-tic football structure chalked out by the All India Football Federation.

Bengaluru's decision to join the ISL meant that the AIFF could have agreed to granting an AFC Cup play-off slot to ISL champions as the club has continental ambitions. They have won two titles in the three years they competed in the I-League and were the runners-up in the AFC Cup last

The other top clubs - Mohun Bagan and East Bengal - also wanted to join the ISL, which has been a hugely successful product in the three years of its existence, but did not do so after their request of doing away with the entry fee of Rs 15 crore was shot down.

According to the roadmap of the AIFF, which though is yet to be finalised, the Indian domestic football structure will have three tiers with the ISL being the top league and the current I-League and second division I-League being christened as League 1 and League 2.

After protest from clubs like Mohun Bagan, East Bengal and Aizawl FC which felt that I-League will lose it relevance by being overshadowed by the cash-rich ISL, the AIFF has maintained that I-League will be the top

league in the country, a proposition few are willing to buy.

The ISL said that after successfully establishing Indian football in the glob-al arena and achieving the rare milestone of being the third most attended football league globally, the league is positioned to provide exponential growth to the sport in the country.

Sunil Bhaskaran, vice president corporate services, Tata Steel and chairman TFA, said: "This is a momentous occasion for Tata Steel, which has always been a pioneer in the development of sports in the country, especially football.

"Our entry into coveted Indian Super League reinforces our commitment to provide a fillip to the development of football in the country. We are extremely excited to have won the bid for our hometown Jamshedpur and will provide the best of facil-ities for football to prosper in the eastern part of our country."

Parth Jindal, CEO JSW Bangaluru FC, attributed JSW Group's decision to bid for an ISL team to the "interest of long-term future of Indian football".

We are glad that our bid to be part of the ISL has been accepted. A lot of time and thought has gone into our decision of wanting to be part of the Indian Super League. The biggest factor has been the interest of the long-term future of Indian football. A longer league is the right road ahead," he

Das expressed satisfaction on the bid evaluation process.

"The interest shown by India's two large corporates to be part of ISL and Indian foot-ball growth story is an indication of the growing popularity of the sport in the country. Their contribution to Indian football has been immense and will only set the high

tar's World Cup preparations continue "as rations continue "as normal" and organisers remain confident that construction deadlines will be met, a source close to the 2022 tournament has told AFP.

Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, Bahrain and others accuse Qatar of supporting extremist groups, a claim vehementgroups, a claim veh ly denied by Doha.

As a result, these countries and allies have severed transport links to Oatar, closing its only land border, airspace and denying it to transport cargo via the UAE.

The isolation of Qatar

Doha political leaders also has potentially severe economic implications.

Although he has said he expects to go on playing for at least another five years, Ronaldo is already preparing for the future.

"Many footballers end their careers without knowing what they want to do. For me it's clear, I want to look after my brands," Ronaldo told AFP in 2015.

Formerly of Manchester United, whom Forbes say are the world's most valuable club, Ronaldo is a "global megaphone" according to Mi-guel Plantier, the manager of the CR7 hotel in Lisbon.

Pestana Group marketing anager Leonor Costa added: "Cristiano is not a novice. Having grown up on a tourist island like Madeira, he knows the sector."

Lanka President pledges to release lists of disappeared

Lankan President Maithri-pala Sirisena has pledged to release the lists of those who had surrendered or were detained by the armed forces during the last phase of the brutal 30-year civil war that ended in 2009.

During a meeting be-tween representatives of the families of the disappeared from across all eight districts of the north-east and President Sirisena, the families handed over a memo laying out five key demands including releasing a list of all those who had surrendered or were detained by the Lankan



armed forces during and af-

They also demanded re-

leasing a list of all detainees held under the Prevention of Terrorism (PTA) and in detention centres.

The meeting was arranged as a result of demands by the families at demonstrations on the 100th day of their protest on May 30.

demanded that Thev these lists be handed to a representative of the families of the disappeared and their lawyers and also to release in public domain findings of all state probes conducted in the past on the

subject of disappearances.

A Tamil civil society spokesman K Guruparan said the demands were read to Sirisena at the meeting and the president has promised the families that he would issue directives to the national security council to release lists of surrendees, detainees, and political prisoners that families were demanding.

The protest by the relatives came amidst the gov-ernment's action to set up an office for the missing persons.

Despite being legally set up, the rest of the administrative and logistical action on the office is yet to be completed. Another amendment to the Act is to be debated in the Parliament this month.

While the affected Tamil minority is seeking justice for their disappeared relatives,

the opposition groups mostly Sinhala majority nationalists say the entire office of missing persons would betray the government troops who had successfully countered the terror of the Liberation Tigers

of Tamil Eelam (LTTE).

According to the UN figures, up to 40,000 civilians were killed by the security forces during Mahinda Rajapaksa's regime that brought an end to nearly three-decades long civil war in Sri Lanka with the defeat of LTTE

Government troops and the Tamil Tiger rebels are both accused of war crimes.

DHAKA, JUN 13 (PTI): A series of landslides triggered by torrential rains have killed at least 53 people, including two army officers, in northeastern Bangladesh, officials said today amid fears that the death toll could rise as many people remain buried under tonnes of rubble.

The highest 36 deaths were reported from Rangamati hill district where at least two army officers were also killed by the landslides

'So far we can confirm to you at least two of our officers were killed and several other personnel injured as they were on duty," an army spokes man in Dhaka told PTI.

He said an army de tachment was deployed to clear the road linking the port city with Ran-gamati as it was blocked by an overnight landslide but while they were working a fresh land-slide buried them under tonnes of mud.

"But so far we can confirm only two deaths," he said.

Bangladeshi diplomat indicted for labour trafficking in US

New York, Jun 13 (PTI): A senior Bangladeshi diplomat here has been indicted on charges of forcing his domestic help to work long hours without pay, with prosecutors saying he tried to cover up his actions after an Indian diplomat faced visa fraud charges and accused of exploiting her maid in 2013.

Md Shaheldul Islam, 45, is the Dep-

uty Consul General of Bangladesh in New York and holds "limited immunity" which pertains specifically to official actions only. Queens District Attorney

actions only, Queens District Attorney Richard Brown said in a statement. Islam was indicted by a Queens County grand jury with 33 -counts of labour trafficking, assault and other charges. He was arraigned yesterday before Queens Supreme Court Justice Daniel Lewis, who set bail at USD 50,000 bond or USD 25,000 cash and ordered Islam to surrender his pass-

Islam s next court date is June 28 and if convicted, he faces up to 15 years

According to the indictment, Md Amin was brought to Queens from Ban-gladesh around 2012 to work as household help for Islam and his family. Soon after Amin's arrival, Islam allegedly took his passport and required the man to work 18 hours a day in the family s

Even though Amin had a contract which outlined his compensation, it is alleged he was never paid for his work and if he disobeyed Islam s orders, Amin was allegedly physically assaulted by the diplomat, who either struck him with his hand or sometimes with a wooden shoe.

The Bangladeshi diplomat allegedforced Amin to work for his family in their Queens home without finan cial compensation from approximately 2012 through May 2016, when the vic-

tim was able to escape.

According to the charges, the victim s only source of income came from tips from guests when he was a server at parties and a minuscule amount of money that Islam sent to Amin s family in Bangladesh.

Khobragade too was accused of underpaying her domestic help while making her work long hours and of intimidating her and her family. Manhattan s former top federal prosecu-tor Indian-American Preet Bharara had brought the charges against Khobragade, setting off a major diplomatic crisis between Washington and New

"However, in 2014, shortly after there was local news coverage of an Indian diplomat being charged with labour trafficking, the defendant allegedly sought to cover up his own alleged illegal actions by taking most of the victim s cash tip money which he gave back in the form of a check," Brown

"It is alleged the victim then had to deposit the check into his bank account, thereby creating the appearance that the employee was receiving a pay-check," the Queens District Attorney statement said, referring to the Kho-bragade incident without naming the Indian diplomat.

Finally, according to the criminal charges, when Amin asked to leave his job on several occasions. Islam in response, allegedly hit him or threatened to harm his family back home in Bangladesh. It is alleged that Islam specifically threatened to kill the man s mother and young son and, on occasion, stated he would have Amin s college-age daughter shamed if he did not continue to work as his servant.

In May 2016, Amin was able to esape from the residence and reported his experience to the police.

The allegations in this case are very disturbing. A diplomat is accused of using both physical force and vile threats to control a person in his employment and whom he refused to pay," Brown said adding that Islam seized his domestic help's passport and, from the first day on the job, refused to pay wages due the employee.






