WB BJP chief heckled

DARJEELING (WB), OCT 5 (PTI): West Bengal BJP chief Dilip Ghosh was heckled today by a group of people which asked saffron leaders visiting Darjeeling to leave imme diately, leading to chaos at the venue of a party meeting and its cancellation.

A scuffle erupted be-tween BJP supporters and the agitators when Ghosh, heading a party delegation, arrived at the venue where the meeting with the party workers was scheduled.

As soon as he arrived, e agitators shouted the agitators shouted slogans demanding that the BJP delegates leave the hills and showed them black flags. The BJP supporters were far out-numbered by the agitators, who beat them up.

The BJP state chief tried to pacify the agitators but failed. He was then heckled following which he cancelled the meeting and lodged a complaint at a nearby police station.

"There was scuffle between two groups and a few people were injured. A case has been registered and we have start-ed the investigation. The culprits will be arrested soon," Darjeeling super-intendent of police Akhilesh Chaturvedi said.

An angry Ghosh alleged that the attack on him and the BIP delegates was "pre-planned" and that he was not provided any security despite being an MLA.

"It was pre-planned at-tack. And I think this planning has its roots in Kolkata. The administration and police were just mute spectators as our supporters were beaten up and I was heckled. I was not given any security cover. I have lodged a police complaint about the incident,

Discovering Pushen with Dawa

GANGTOK, 05 OCT:

Introducing his latest effort, a 45-minute documenta-ry titled, "Finding Pushen", film-maker Dawa Lepcha of "Dhokbu" fame, issued a challenge to the audience. He bet that nobody in the audience would have ever eaten a Pushen "bread", and, in all proba-bility, never even heard of it. At one level, it was a brave challenge to make, given that the audience comprised pri-marily of Lepcha folk, but at another level, it was safe bet since even the Lepcha reserve of Dzongu now has no more than 15 people left who can prepare this treat any more. Dawa was speaking at the

premiere of the documentary film hosted by the Anthropology Department of Sikkim University here at Barad Sadan today. The Department organized the screening as part of its Ethnographic Film Series initiative and the hall was packed despite the still prevailing holiday mood at most establishments. "Finding Pushen", is a de-



narture from Dawa's previous efforts which, save the feature film Dhokbu, have been more 'academic" in their treatment whereas this one, even as it is detailed and packed with information and insights, plays out almost like a travelogue.

The format sits well with the plot which is a journey of Pushen is a giant

which grows in the wilds of Sikkim in the 4 000-5 000 feet above sea level band in extremely wet and humid slopes.

Dawa shared that he had eard stories of how the Lepchas used to seek out this fern and prepare dough from the

pulp of its trunk to prepare Pushen Khu (bread). He had himself, however, never seen this dish being prepared or eaten it himself. His interest in all things Lep-

cha is well established from his impressive body of work and finding the Pushen was a proiect that had been working on



for a while but had not followed into place and he found himself trekking to Mangzing village in Dzongu with his crew to find Karzang, the septuagenarian there who he had learned knew where to find Pushen and how to prepare Pushen Khu.

June, one learns through

the film, is also the best time of the year to "harvest" this bread.

Karzang and his merry group of friends who help us discover Pushen through the film radiate an infectious charm which has you wishing that Dawa has enough outtakes to put together another documentary of them sharing

stories by the campfire.

The documentary film takes audiences through an engaging journey of marching through swarms of leeches and chance encounters as the crew find the fern, collect it, bring it back, ferment it and then celebrate with a treat of Pushen Khu of various shapes, sizes and combinations

As much as the film succeeds in documenting the process is lucid detail, it also benefits from Dawa's ability to capture poignant and endearing moments which only a film-maker of his confidence and access can capture. So viewers are regaled by the elders who lay down the rules of conversation, yes, language through the process of find-

Public servant's freedom of speech issue sent to constitution bench

NEW DELHI, OCT 5 (PTI): The Supreme Court today referred to a five-judge constitution bench sever al issues such as whether a public functionary or a minister can claim freedom of speech while expressing views in sen-sitive matters which are under investigation.

A bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra considered the questions framed on the issue by senior advocates Fali S Nariman and Harish Salve and said, "we are sending it to a constitution bench".

The top court had tak-en note of a controversial statement of ex-Uttar Pradesh Minister Azam Khan that the Bulandshahr gangrape was part of a "political conspira-cy". Khan had tendered an unconditional apology which was accepted.

which The bench, also comprised Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, also said that besides the issues framed by the two lawyers, the constitution bench would also frame questions to be dealt by

ing a plea filed by a man, whose wife and daughter were allegedly gangraped in July last year on a high-way near Bulandshahr, seeking transfer of the case to Delhi and lodging of an FIR against former Uttar Pradesh Minister Azam Khan for his controversial statement that the gangrape case was a "political conspiracy".

Contd from pg01 ing, harvesting and preparing Pushen Khu, has to be in the legendary (and mostly lost) Lepcha style of speaking only through indirect references - code, if you will.

The entourage is told that if they want salt, they cannot ask for "salt" by its name or it will make the Pushen Khu too salty. And the same applies for everything else from match-sticks to machetes to even excreta. This must have led to many confusions and laughs and one gets some delightful peeks into rustic humour through the duration of the film.

The film is a light watch, but that does not take away anything from its significance or content. both of which benefit from professional handling. It is an important work and it is evident that even people in the villages through which the team trekked to find the giant fern realized it. As a result, what starts off as an "expedition" of six, by the time it reaches the grove of Pushen above Breng-Katam becomes a gaggle of around 20 people, all keen to learn and experience what Dawa and his team have set out to document. Those present for the premiere screening benefitted from having Dawa among them to share more stories from the film. The rest will have to wait till Dawa uploads the film on YouTube, something he announced to do within a day or two.

High Court rejects bail application of rape accused

The High Court of Sikkim has rejected the bail application of 48-year-old Panna Lal Agarwal of Jorethang ac-cused of threatening and raping a 16-year-old girl on three different occasions earlier this year.

While rejecting the bail application, the single bench of Justice Bhaskar Raj Pradhan observed that granting bail to the accused at this stage would not serve

Jorethang Police had lodged an FIR against

Agarwal of Jorethang on 29 July earlier this under 363/354/506/34 of the Indian Penal Code, 1860 [IPC] read with Section 8, 12 and 14 of the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences 2012 [POCSO Act].

It was alleged that the accused had raped the victim three different times within 15 days and had threatened her with dire consequences if she told anybody about it.

While hearing the bail application, counsel for the accused argued that the accused is a business-man of repute and the only earning member of the family and is suffering from accelerated hyper tension. However, the argument was vehemently opposed by the State on the ground that the allegation in the FIR makes it evident that the accused, if released on bail, may continue to threaten the victim and tamper with vital evidence.

The single bench re-jecting the bail observed that while considering bail applications it is in-cumbent upon the Court to balance this liberty

of the accused with interest of the society to have a fair trial adding that although there is no cogent evidence brought forth by the prosecution to establish witness in-timidation, post arrest of the accused, the very fact that the FIR alleges three incidents of intimidation by the accused on the victim is perhaps enough to have a "reasonable apprehension" that the cused may again seek to do so to get away from the clutches of the serious and heinous case where the punishment prescribed is both strin-

The Court further said that "reasonable apprehension, as rightly pointed out by the Learned Public Prosecutor, can be gauged in the present case from the allegation made in the FIR

Special Judge, POC-SO Act, 2012 at Namchi had rejected the bail ap-plications on three occasions of which the last rejection was on 15 Sept last month. However, the Special Judge had granted bail to the co-accused, Anjana Sharma, on 08

The bench had said it would examine wheth-er such statements fell within "the ambit and sweep of freedom of speech and expression or exceed the boundary that is not permissible.

China travel warning

China has issued a travel advisory to its nationals visiting India, the first such warning after the Dokalam standoff, warning them about denial of visas to visit "restricted areas" like the Andaman and Nicobar Islands.

The Chinese Embas-in India issued the advisory, the third in four months, for Chinese tourists in India.

The warning was posted on the embassy's website on Tuesday, and detailed several situa-tions the embassy handled recently in which Chinese tourists were denied entry or investigated while travelling in India state-run Global Times reported today.

"Some Chinese citizens visited Andaman and Nicobar Islands, which are restricted areas for foreigners, with-out gaining permits from India. Some tourists were asked to return upon arrival. Some were even arrested or investigated," the statement read.

"(Visitors should) not

photograph India's border and military facilities and vehicles. While travelling on India's border neighbouring Nepal, avoid visiting border markets, and do not enter the territory of other countries by mistake," it added.

On July 7, weeks after the Dokalam crisis be-

in India issued its first warning, asking Chinese nationals to reduce unnecessary travel to India, maintain a low profile when there, and respect local laws and law en-forcement personnel.

It reissued the warning on August 24.
The 73-day Doka-

lam standoff started on June 16 when Chinese troops attempted to build a road in territory claimed by Bhutan close to the Indian border. Indian troops objected to it and stopped the Chinese from building the road.

The standoff was finally resolved on August 28. Chinese tourists make up three per cent of foreign tourists visiting India each year, the Global Times quoted Indian media reports as saying.

From January to May, 2017, about 119,000 visitors from China visited India, an increase of 9.2

per cent year-on-year.
India has granted e-visa facility for Chinese travellers.

A report by state-run

Xinhua news agency two days ago said China is becoming one of the most popular destinations for Indian tourists.

It is estimated that

the number of outbound tourists from India will reach 50 million overall by 2020, up from 21.87 million in 2016, the report said.

Wildlife Weak

The young will protect what they see, so show them Sikkim's wildlife

Any reference to Sikkim and the qualifying sentence invariably makes mention of the fact that it is a biodiversity hot-spot. We have all read reams after reams on the various geographical zones that Sikkim packs into its 7,096 square kilometres. Experts tell us that Sikkim has 4,000 varieties of flowering plants and herbs, 450 species of orchids, 300 species of ferns, nine species of conifers, 550 species of birds, 600 types of butterflies and a list of fauna that outstrips most other areas the state's tiny size. This is what one has read. Few here would, however, have seen even a sliver of it.

The past few years have seen a rise in wildlife-human conflict [with the wildlife invariably at the suffering end], but these have been limited to bear attacks. disease among the deer population and sightings and the rare clouded leopard incident, beyond that, even the bastis have not been spying on too much biodiversity. Deer populations are on the rise one is told, but in the absence of any scientific study, this could be credited as much to the wiping out of the predator population as to the "ban" on hunting. Maybe the rarer fauna has retreated deeper into the forests; but even that is unlikely because Sikkim's small size ensures that even the thickest of forests has but a constricted sweep with either a habitation or a road encroaching the slopes. Then there is the constricted buffer zone buttressing protected forests and sanctuaries. Admittedly, in the absence of any statistics [current or otherwise], the suggestion that wildlife or flora is not very abundant is as unlettered as the frequent claims of Sikkim being a biodiversity paradise. This is not to challenge claims or Sikkim's position in biodiversity rankings, but to underline the need for more detailed, from the field current studies on Sikkim's flora and fauna. Any such effort will obviously begin with a genuine stirring for something on these lines by the Forest Department and then a parallel effort to excite interest on such matters among the young, for it will be they who inherit whatever is left and will hopefully study better the state of Sikkim's wilds.

This section has often aired problems with the tokenism of special days and weeks that planners organise to escape any real commitment to resolving real issues for the rest of the year, but even in their tokenism, such days have a role to play – in exciting the interest of the young since it is invariably they who get pulled out of classrooms to join rallies and raise placards. In the context of wildlife, one such occasion arrives every October with the first week observed across the country as the Wildlife Week. The first week of October is on its final leg now, but wildlife has not made any news, even by way of events, hence this effort.

Events for the Wildlife Week should be organised in way and on the belief that what the younger generation sees it will protect. A trip to the Himalayan Zoological Park at Bulbuley above Gangtok will bring them a chance to see only a handful of animals. Sik-kim's flora and fauna spans a much wider expanse and there is a real need now to educate students on how abundant Sikkim's biodiversity is. The observance of World Wildlife Week should thus provide the impetus to take the introduction of the Sikkimese young to their environment to the next level. The universal greed for "progress" is apparent, if not even more amplified in Sikkim, and has pushed the wildlife [hopefully] deeper into the forest reserves and not on the brink of extinction from these parts. Sikkim, to its credit, can stake claim to having segregated areas as wildlife reserves much ahead of even India, but now the time has come to reaffirm this commitment. The State has al ready lost animals like the Takin, the Pygmy Hog and the Sikkim Stag to the bracket which records "extinct animals" and has placed some more in the "endangered list." Someone, and only the Forest Department comes to mind, has to now take the responsibility of educating the younger generation on the inventory of animals that the State still has with it. This will have to be with efforts more immediate than posters and slide shows. Sponsored visits to wildlife sanctuaries and tours conducted by experts are the need of the hour. Then, the young will see what Sikkim has and will become more committed to protecting it. Ignorance can prove fatal, because if the present trend of tokenism continues and more animals are lost, no one will even notice the loss until it is too late. There might actually come a time when the young grow up believing that the Red Panda is a stuffed toy and not a real animal. Conservation will not be possible once that stage is reached..

Scientists behind the discovery of gravitational waves win the 2017 Nobel Prize for Physics

The Swedish Academy of Sciences has announced that the 2017 Nobel prize in Physics goes to three scientists for their foundational work leading to the discovery of ripples in the fabric of space and time known as gravitational waves.

Half of the £825,000 prize sum will go to Rainer Weiss of Massachusetts Institute of Technology, and the other half will be be shared by Kip Thorne of Caltech and Barry C Barish, also at Caltech. The scientists, all from the LIGO/VIRGO collaboration, conceived and played major roles in realising the Laser Interferometer Gravitational-Wave Observatory, which first detected the waves in September 2015.

I'm pleased to see this achievement recognised on behalf of the thousands of scientists who work on LIGO, including the University of Sheffield group. I also know the recipients personally, in particular Weiss, who is a friend as well as a colleague.

Gravitational waves, predicted by Einstein in 1916, travel across our universe at the speed of light – stretching space in one direction and shrinking it in the direction that is at right angles. LIGO measures these fluctuations by monitoring two light beams travelling between pairs of mirrors down pipes running in different directions.

The source of the first detected signals was a pair of black holes, each being about 30 times the mass of the sun. These bodies once collided and converted in to one large spinning black hole – emitting three sun masses worth of pure energy in about a tenth of a second. For that short time, the source outshines the rest of the energy sources in the observable universe – combined! It's quite something to try and imagine. Despite being such a violent event, it is so far away that the effects on our local fabric of space and time here on Earth are very subtle – which is why a sophisticated detector like LIGO was needed to make the first detection.

Several more binary black hole signals have been detected by the LIGO detectors since, and one an-



nounced just days ago was detected by the Virgo detector in Italy as well. Now that we know these signals exist and can be detected, a new field of gravitational wave astronomy will grow up, enabling us to probe the dark and puzzling universe – phenomena in the cosmos that don't emit much light but have a lot of mass. It's an exciting time.

UNCONVENTIONAL, SHARP AND FUN

Those of us at LIGO who know Weiss will agree he is an unconventional fellow in the best sense of that description who has inspired a generation of experimental physicists, myself

The first time I met Weiss properly was when he interviewed me for my first postdoc, at MIT. I was in my only smart suit, he walked in wearing a woolly hat, baggy sweater and jeans. I had to reassure him that this was the last time he'd see me dressed up that way. He looked relieved.

Weiss has a refreshingly informal

Weiss has a refreshingly informal approach to physics, which is particularly helpful in encouraging others in their work, especially the young. But this informality and enthusiasm only just conceals his razor-sharp instinct for physics, particularly for sources of headyground noise and for electronics.

background noise and for electronics.
And, because he is what I would call "scientifically sociable", Weiss naturally tends to learn things quickly by talking to people. When I was

working at the LIGO lab at Livingston, I did an early systematic comparison of seismic noise between the two LIGO sites in a key frequency range. The tough thing back then was just gathering enough data from the seismometers to be able to make a meaningful comparison between the noise lavels.

I'd just made a graph of the results, and I was in the control room staring at it when Weiss walked in. He walked out a few minutes later with a copy of that plot, and the next thing I knew, he was using it in talks to the National Science Foundation when arguing for an upgrade to LIGO Livingston's seismic isolation system. That's Weiss in a nutshell. He's quick on the uptake, good at spotting the key points and problems, and authoritative enough to get others – physicists, engineers and funders on his side.

We also share a love of music. Once when I was invited to dinner at his house, I was asked to bring my cello and had to sight-read several cello sonata movements (rather shakily) with Weiss at the piano. He also showed up to a particularly memorable "hoodoo party night" at a club called Tabby's blues box in Baton Rouge, Louisiana, where I was playing in a band. He brought along Gaby Gonzalez, who until recently was chairperson of the LIGO scientific collaboration and Peter Saulson, a professor of physics and thermal

noise pioneer from Syracuse. A more unlikely crowd on the dance floor at Tabby's has probably not been seen before or since. They had a great time.

The future of gravitational wave physics is now intimately tied up with the future of astronomy. The field is set to expand rapidly, with more sensitive instruments needed to sense smaller signals and larger scale instruments needed to probe lower frequencies where many of the astronomical signals lie. We also need observers of the heavens, both to interpret the signals we measure, and to make the link between gravitational waves and other sources of information, such as gamma ray and neutrino bursts, and visible transients. We are hoping to continue to play an important role in the research here at Sheffield.

But, for now, it's time to enjoy the moment of a very well deserved Nobel prize for a great group of physicists. They have played a long game; the project started in 1972, and I didn't even join until 1997. It's a lesson to us all to keep both eyes on the science, to be prepared for a protracted struggle with Mother Nature, but ready in the end to step back and admire the edifice we have constructed, and go on to apply the tools we have created to achieving an ever expanding knowledge of our universe.

FC Barcelona and the Catalan struggle for independence

FC Barcelona's motto "mes que un club" or "more than a club" is emblazoned across the team's website, splashed across the seats of its Nou Camp stadium and embroidered on the collars of first-team shirts.

The slogan dates back to the Catalan club's formation in 1899, when a Swiss émigré founded what is now commonly referred to as "Barca". Hans Max Gamper-Haessig, who was enthralled by Catalonia and would later change his name to Joan Gamper, established Barca as a membership club. Even today, these members pay an annual fee to become part of what many see as one of world football's best governed clubs.

From the outset, Barcelona has been a focal point for Catalan identity, as well as a symbol of democracy. So much so that in 1925 then Spanish prime minister, Primo de Rivera, accused Gamper and Barca of promoting Catalan nationalism. Later, during the Spanish Civil War, Nou Camp would become one of few places in the city where people could openly speak in Catalan.

It is therefore unsurprising that in recent weeks FC Barcelona has become central to the region's independence vote. On Sunday, the day of the vote – which was declared illegal by Spain's central government – Barca called for its league match against Las Palmas to be postponed, as violence spread across the city. When its request was denied, the club issued a last minute statement that condemned the attempts to stop citizens voting and said that the game would go ahead, but behind closed doors.

This match was, though, laden with meaning. Some criticised the club for selling out to television companies, putting money from broadcasting contracts ahead of political principles. Others observed

that pressure has been placed on Barca by La Liga president Javier Tebas, a lifelong Real Madrid fan. He also gave permission for the Las Palmas team to play with a special Spanish flag (intended to symbolise Spanish unity) woven into their shirts.

One of the players on the field during the game was Barca's talismanic defender, Gerard Piqué, who has publicly professed his support for the Catalonia independence vote. Piqué, recently booed by other Spanish fans, has even offered to quit playing for the country's national team.

COMMERCIAL CONCERNS

FC Barcelona is clearly, then, much more than a club. It is a complicated and highly politicised entity in a way the likes of Manchester United or Arsenal have never been. But herein lies an important challenge, which probably serves as a metaphor too for the many other challenges facing Catalonia – how to successfully navigate the future post-in-

Top-level professional football is no longer just a local game for local people. It is a mass-market product traded by businesses for a commercial return. And Barca is no exception. A shirt sponsorship deal with Qatar Airways drew condemnation from fans for moving the club in a more commercial direction. Some cynics have even referred to Barca's "Madridification".

In this context, recent events pose significant challenges for Barca's business dealings. For example, in the middle of Sunday's events, the club issued a public statement asserting that it supported the right to Catalonian self-determination and condemned any act by the Spanish state that might impede its people's democratic right to vote in the referendum.

As a philosophy – and as a brand proposition – this is both noble and distinctive. But for a club that has been casting covetous eyes at Asian markets, it could prove troublesome. The last thing the Qataris or Chinese will want is for fans and businesses in their countries to be building a relationship with a club that advocates separatism and a disregard for central government authority.

It will therefore be worthwhile keeping a close eye on messages coming out of Doha, Beijing and elsewhere in Asia. That said, given Catalan diasporas in Latin America – those that fled the region during the Spanish civil war – at least part of the club's overseas commercial strategy targeting fans

Speculation abounds as to what secession would mean for Barca, whether it could stay in Spain's top flight (Tebas has said the club will not be allowed to remain in the league in the event of secession), and whether it would lose its UEFA membership and right to play Champions League football.

Some have even suggested that Barca could join England's Premier League. Commercially, this might seem like a marriage made in heaven. But it is extremely unlikely to happen, not least because of the potential complexities of such a move. The other alternative – a small Catalonia league with the likes of local rivals Espanyol, Girona and Tarragona – is hard to imagine and would struggle to generate sizeable revenues.

Such a debate may sound premature. But it's indicative of how the club has to consider its commercial, as well as political priorities. Gamper was right, FC Barcelona is more than a club. But football in 1899 was a rather different proposition to football in the 21st century. The power of Catalan politics might be compelling, but in football the lure of global revenue streams may yet trump regional

pur for 139 days in 2016. The blockade wa The blockade was withdrawn in March this year after the BJP- led government came to power in Manipur and assured that their demand would be considered, the official said.

Ranjit Banerjee, a middle aged tourist from Kolkata wanted to visit Sikkim even during the time when Darjeeling crisis was at its peak.

"I had to cancel my plans due to my family's advice but now after the bandh lifted we came here and at much cheaper rates too," he

Since there are less tourists this season many hotels and lodges have rooms available at much cheaper rates than in peak season time.

The people of the hills are with the BJP and the GJM and that is why we have received so much support wherever we are

He said hundreds of people in the hills greeted the BJP leaders and shared their problems. The response was tremendous, he told PTI.

Earlier in the day while entering Darjeeling from Kalimpong, Ghosh and his team faced protests by supporters of the Gorkha National Liberation Front, who like some other hill parties demanded that its delegates leave Darjeeling immediately.

Ghosh and his team were also shown black flags and asked to re-frain from disturbing the "peace and stability" in

the region.

They had faced protests yesterday too by supporters of the Jan Andolan Party and Binay Tamang during their vis-it to Kalimpong. Posters with the messages such as 'BIP go back' and asking the hill people to boycott the party's delega-

tion were put up.

The state BJP chief had, however, refuted the GNLF allegation that he was in the hills to foment trouble and claimed that the protests against the BJP delegation were fuelled by the ruling TMC.

Ghosh claimed it was due to his initiative that peace has returned to Darjeeling. "I talked to the Union home minister, after which peace returned to the Darjeeling hills," he said.

The BIP team is scheduled to visit various places in the hills and neighbouring Sikkim and hold meetings with its workers and the GJM

leadership.
Expelled GJM leader and vice-chairman of the Board of Administrators (BoA), Anit Thapa also accused the BJP of trying to foment trouble in the hills.

The rebel GJM group led by Tamang, who is the BOA chairman, and Thapa are slated to hold rallies to protest the visit of the saffron party delegation.

Study provides photo evidence of snow leopards in Arunachal

New Delhi, Oct 5 (PTI): A study about snow leopards in Arunachal Pradesh has yielded photographic evidence of the presence of the elusive species in the Thembang area of the north-east-

The state-wide survey carried out by World Wildlife Fund (WWF) India in collaboration with the Arunachal Pradesh Forest department was started in March 2017, focusing on unexplored

It has yielded photo evidence of the snow leopard through a camera trap set up at Thembang, one of the community conserved areas in the state, a statement said.

Only a fraction of snow leopard habitats in the state falls into two protected areas--Dibang Biosphere Reserve and Namdapha National Park.

"The presence of the big cat beyond these protected areas highlights the importance of community support for conservation as well as landscape-scale conservation planning," it said.

"This is perhaps the first time that the presence of snow leopard has been reported through a camera trap photograph from the state of Arunachal Pradesh," said Omkar Singh, principal secretary, Environ-ment and Forest, Arunachal Pradesh

The survey relied on the knowledge of the community members to understand the current distribution of snow leopards and other large mammals in the region.

"Scientific information on the distribution of snow leopards generated through this state-wide survey is an en-couraging sign for WWF-India and the Arunachal Pradesh Forest department," said Ravi Singh, secretary general and CEO of WWF-India.

In 2015, there were an estimated 10.4 million new TB cases worldwide and 1.8 million TB deaths, according to the World Health Organization. And India is at the epicentre of this global epidemic, with half a million TB deaths annually. India also accounts for 16 per cent of the estimated 480,000 new cases of multi-drug-resistant TB.

Can India turn things around and control this epidemic?

The answer is a conditional ves. The Indian government has already taken several steps over the past few years to address it. This includes making TB a notifi-able disease, developing the Standards for TB Care in India, introducing daily drug regimens and rolling out molecular and

drug-susceptibility testing.

But there's an opportunity to do more and better, and for India to assume a glob-

INDIA MUST BACK AMBITIONS

WITH RUPEES

Earlier this year, India's Revised National TB Control Program published a draft of a new National Strategic Plan (NSP) for TB Elimi-nation 2017-2025. The NSP, if fully funded and well implemented, could be a game changer in the fight against TB in India.

The plan aims to improve services and

outcomes for the 1.5 million patients in the public system and to scale up access to new diagnostics and drugs. It also sets out a bold road map to reach private providers nd support the millions of patients treated in the private sector.

Building on promising pilot results, the NSP proposes to do so by providing incentives to providers — for following standard protocols for diagnosis and treatment as well as for notifying the government of cases. Patients referred to the government will in turn receive a cash transfer, to compensate them for direct and indirect costs of undergoing treatment and as an incentive to complete treatment.

The cost of implementing the new NSP

is estimated at US\$2.5 billion over the first

three years, a big increase over the current budget. Historically, despite being a highly cost-effective program and despite having a high absorptive capacity, RNTCP has struggled to receive funding that is commensurate with the scale of India's epidemic. This simply cannot continue. India

must start backing its ambitions with ru-pees. Therefore, the real test of whether the bold plan by the Health Ministry can be implemented will be whether enough resources can be mobilized — to find, treat and offer quality care to all TB patients, regardless of where they live.

HEALTH SPENDING AN UR-GENT PRIORITY

TB is one of many diseases that affect Indians, and India is clearly under-performing on several key health indicators, as shown by a recent report on attainment on health-related Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs) in 188 countries. This is an analysis from the Global Burden of Disease Study 2016, which measured 37 health-related indicators from 1990 to

India did very poorly in this analysis, ranking 127 among 188 countries. In fact, every single other BRICS country (Brazil, Russia, China and South Africa) ranked ahead of India.

This analysis clearly shows that India's economic progress is not reflected in the health of its people. India's National Health Policy, approved this year, proposes to increase health expenditure by the government from the existing 1.15 per cent to 2.5 per cent of the GDP, by 2025.

Ensuring this increase should be an urgent priority for India, and an absolute requirement if India is to make progress towards universal health coverage

A TRADITION OF EXCELLENCE Are there areas of strength that India can

leverage to fight TB? India has made some impressive con-

ributions in global health. India has been polio-free for more than five years and this success has propelled global efforts to eradicate polio. Indian biotech and drug manufacturers dominate the production

of TR and HIV medications, accounting for more than 80 per cent of the global market.

The recent launch of a rotavirus vaccine produced in India has underscored the country's leadership role in childhood immunization. India also has huge strengths in IT and software that can be leveraged. And India has a long tradition of excellence in TB research, highlighted by the creation of an India TB Research Consortium.

So, with its strong research expertise in TB, and technological and pharma tical capacity, India has the potential to make great progress against this disease.
What is essential is a strong financial

and political commitment from Prime Minister Narendra Modi to end the TB epidemic, and an overall greater investment in health. When health becomes a priority for India, TB will naturally decline, as will many other conditions that currently make India rank so poorly in health-relat-

India set to make FIFA World Cup debut against USA on Friday

New Delhi, Oct 5 (PTI): Football minnows India stand on the cusp of history as the hosts are set to make their debut in a FIFA event against a formidable USA in a group match of the U-17 World Cup, which begins here on Friday.

India qualified automatically for the event as hosts.

They have prepared well with All India Football Fed-eration sending the players for training tours in Europe and a tournament in Mexico but the home side are clear underdogs.

Man to man, USA are clearly the better team in the Group A match at the refurbished Jawaharlal Nehru Stadium.

Most of the American players ply their trade in Major League Soccer youth teams and a couple of them are set to play in top Europe-an clubs as well.

India would enjoy the home advantage and captain Amarjit Singh and his teammates have promised to be competitive at the showpiece event. The feat of playing in India's first-ever FIFA tournament should spur them to bring out their best and deliver something worthy of a

be the first Indian players to feature in any World Cup.

More than that, odds are heavily against India on Fri-day as the players lacked competitive matches. Besides, they didn't attend any professional academies unlike their American counterparts. The Indian team was assembled in just seven months by head coach Luis Norton de Matos who took over in March after the sacking off German Nicolai Adam.

Adam, who was made India U-17 coach in February 2015, built a team by scouting talent from across the country through trials and tournaments but got the boot early this year after a reign of two years for allegedly abusing players.

Portuguese de Matos made several changes in the team, bringing in at least half a dozen players in key positions.

The two teams are more or less unknown quantities to each other. A pragmatic de Matos has, however, warned against any miracles from his boys, conceding that there is a big gap between his boys and the other teams.

He has no illusions in

the difference in quality be

tween European and American players who have spent at least six- seven years in a professional academy.

De Matos has indicated India cannot play an open game and his focus would be on strong defence and not to concede goals.

His strategy would be to rely on smooth and swift transitions from defence to offence and hit on the count-

He is expected to start Moirangthem Dheeraj Singh

at the goal while two regular center backs Anwar Ali and Jitendra Singh are certainties

Sanjeev Stalin should start as left full back while Hendry Antonay is expected to man the right back's position in place of Boris Singh, who cannot play on Friday after picking a red card against Iran in AFC U-16 Champion ship last year.

The six-feet-two inch defensive midfielder Jeakson Singh could be the key man who will strengthen the defence as well besides helping captain Amarjit and Suresh Singh in midfield.

Komal Thatal, who scored a brilliant goal in India's cam-paign against Brazil in the BRICS Cup last year, has been doing well at the left flank while Aniket Jadhav is expected to start as the lone striker.

De Matos has conceded that USA are strong in offense and the Indian defence and the goalkeeper will have to be strong and patient enough to thwart attacks from the

opposition.
"They (USA) will be strong in attack and we have to prepare to counter their attack. We have to be strong in defence," de Matos said.

USA captain and striker Josh Sargent will sign with Bundesliga club Werder Bremen next February when he turns 18

He also played at the U-20 World Cup in Korea earlier this year, making him the first US player since Freddy Adu in 2003 to play in the U-20 and U-17 World Cups in the same year.

Tim Weah, son of former FIFA World Player of the Year and Liberia great George Weah, is another striker and a big talent. He signed with Paris Saint Germain earlier this year.

US head coach John Hackworth has, however, refused to take India likely in their

opening match. "We've played India once before, we were successful against them. But it wasn't in the opening game of World Cup, it wasn't them hosting a World Cup. My feeling is that, and from information I've heard, there's going to be a loud crowd.

'They (India) are incredi-

to beat them in the opening game and that is a difficult challenge," Hackworth said.

The US team has 17 players who were part of the team that played in the qualifying tournament -- 2017 CONCA-CAF U-17 Championship in April -- in which it had finished second, losing to Mexico in the final on penalties.

India's richest get richer, Mukesh Ambani retains top slot: Forbes

NEW DELHI, OCT 5 (PTI): Reliance Industries chief Mukesh Ambani today emerged as India's wealthiest for the 10th straight year as his net worth swelled to USD 38 hillion (nearly Rs 2.5 lakh crore) while the wealth of 100 richest rose by 26 per cent despite economic hiccups.

Wipro's Azim Premii was the distant second with a net worth of USD 19 billion, moving up two places from last year, while Sun Pharma's Dilip Shanghvi slipped from his earlier second place to the ninth now (USD 12.1 billion) on Forbes magazine's annual 'India Rich List 2017'.

Forbes said Prime Minister Narendra

Modi's "economic experiments" barely affected India's billionaires while none gained more than oil-and-gas tycoon gained more than oil-and-gas tycoon Mukesh Ambani, who cemented his decade-long hold on the top slot by adding a staggering USD 15.3 billion (67 per cent) to his last year's wealth to become one of

Asia's top five richest.

Anil Ambani, Mukesh's younger brother, was ranked much lower at 45th place with USD 3.15 billion. He was ranked 32nd in 2016 (USD 3.4 billion) and 29th a year

Another Gujarati businessman Gautam

Adani has moved up to 10th position (USD 11 billion), from 13th rank last year, as his networth rose from USD 6.3 billion.


Forbes described Adami as a college dropout, who spurned his father's textile shop to set up a commodities export firm in 1988. It also said Adani survived the terrorist attack in Mumbai's Taj Mahal Palace Hotel in 2008.

Patanjali Ayurved's Acharya Balkrishna, known as a close associate of yoga guru Ramdev, made a big jump from 48th place last year to 19th now with a net worth of USD 6.55 billion (about Rs 43,000 crore).

In the case of Ambani, improved refining margins and his telecom unit Reliance Jio's thundering success in notching up 130 million subscribers since its 2016 launch pushed up shares of Reliance Industries.

The Hinduja brothers are at the third position with USD 18.4 billion while Lakshmi Mittal is now ranked fourth (USD 16.5 billion) and Pallonji Mistry fifth (USD 16 billion).

Forbes said the list was compiled using shareholding and financial information secured from the families and individuals, stock exchanges, analysts and regulatory agencies.

The ranking lists family fortunes, including those shared among extended families such as the Godrej and Bajaj families.

Public fortunes were calculated based on stock prices and exchange rates as of September 15. Private companies were valued based on similar companies that are publicly

More than four-fifths of those who kept their spot on the list from last year saw their wealth rise, with 27 listees adding USD 1 billion or more to their net worth.

The richest newcomer is cook-and-airline tycoon Nusli Wadia at the 25th place with a net worth of USD 5.6

Among the five other new entrants to the list are Dinesh Nandwana (88, USD 1.72 billion) of e-governance services firm Vakrangee; Vijay Shekhar Sharma (99, USD 1.47 billion) of fast-rising mobile wallet Paytm and Rana Kapoor (100, USD 1.46 billion) of Yes Bank.

Veteran investor Radhakishan Damani. boosted by the listing of his supermarket chain D-Mart in March, returned to the list at 12th place with a net worth of USD 9.3

Other returnees are Future Group's Kishore Biyani (55th, USD 2.75 billion) and siblings Murli Dhar and Bimal Gyanchandani (75, USD 1.96 billion).

However, a dozen have turned poorer than a year ago, with half of them from the pharmaceutical sector, which has been plagued by challenges.

Pharmaceutical magnate Dilip Shang-

hvi is the biggest dollar loser on the list as his net worth fell by USD 4.8 billion, ending his three-year run as India's second-richest.

The Gupta family (40, USD 3.45 billion), heirs of patriarch Desh Bandhu Gupta, who died in June, saw their fortune shrink as shares of their generics maker Lupin declined.

Brothers Shashi and Ravi Ruia suffered a drop as their Essar Steel faced bankrupt-cy proceedings under India's stricter new w. Forbes said.

The 100 wealthiest on this year's list are all billionaires. The minimum amount required to make the list was USD 1.46 bilon, up from USD 1.25 billion last year.

British author Kazuo Ishiguro wins Nobel Literature Prize

STOCKHOLM, OCT 5 (AFP): British author Kazuo Ishiguro, best known for his novel "The Remains of the Day", won Nobel Literature Prize today, the Swedish Academy said.

The 62-year-old, "in novels of great emotional force, has uncovered the abyss beneath our illusory sense of connection with the world," the Academy wrote in its citation.

Born in Nagasaki, he moved to Britain with his family when he was five years old, only return-ing to visit Japan as an adult. Both his first nov-el "A Pale View of Hills" from 1982 and the subsequent one, "An Artist of the Floating World" from 1986, take place in Nagasaki a few years after World War II.

"The themes Ishiguro is most associated with are already present here: memory, time, and self-delusion," the Acad-

emy said.
"This is particularly or table in his most re-nowned novel, 'The Re-mains of the Day,'' which was turned into a film with Anthony Hopkins acting as the duty-ob-

sessed butler Stevens.

"Ishiguro's writings are marked by a carefully restrained mode of ex-pression, independent of whatever events are tak-ing place," it said. Apart from his eight

books, Ishiguro has also written scripts for film and television.

"We cannot be defined by the evil that threatens us.

We are defined by our love, our caring nd our courage...," he said.
"Words cannot describe the bravery

that the whole world witnessed on Sunday

night," he said during a brief speech at the Las Vegas Police Department Command Centre. Trump said the Americans fied death and ha-tred with love and courage and thanked the first responders on the behalf of the "grateful nation".

"In the months ahead, we will all have to wrestle with

the horror of what has unfolded this week, but we will struggle through it together, we will endure the pain together, and we will overcome together as Americans," Trump

The US president however refrained from talking about gun control laws, the de-bate over which has rekindled in the aftermath of the shooting.


