Make daily sports period mandatory for all classes: Tendulkar to CBSE

DELHI, MAY 7): Master Blaster in Tendulkar has (PTI): Sachin lauded the new policy of the Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) mandating daily sports period for students of class 9 to 12 and urged the board to extend it to all the classes.
The board has formu-

lated new sports guide-lines for schools mandating them to have a daily sports period for class 9 to 12 so as to prevent students from having a sedentary lifestyle and turn-ing into couch potatoes.

"India is at number 3 when it comes to obesity and it is a matter of serious concern. A young, unfit and unhealthy India is a recipe for disaster. To be able to tackle this issue, we must build a strong sporting culture in our country," Ten-dulkar said in a letter to CBSE Chairman Anita

Karwal. "CBSE's decision to reserve one period every day for health and physi-cal education is indeed a right move in that direction. However, there is certainly more that can be done with this initia-

tive," he added.
The ace The ace cricketer further said, "Since the overall objective of your initiative is preventing obesity among children, the board would also like to consider making health and fitness mandatory across all other classes as well." The board has prepared a 150-page manual detailing sports guidelines for schools for classes 9 to 12 and methodologies for implementing them.

According to the new guidelines aimed at mainstreaming health and physical education, it will be mandatory for schools to have a "sports" period daily during which students will have during to go the playground but will be free to perform any physical activity list-ed in the manual and will be graded on the same.

The board had in March asked all schools to reserve one period for "Health and Physical Education (HPE)" while preparing their time-table for the 2018-19 session. However, HPE will be different from Physical Education (PE) academic elective which is offered to class 10 and 12 students.

Modi like mobile phone on speaker mode: Rahul

(PTI): Congress chief Rahul Gandhi today hit back at Prime Minister Na-rendra Modi for his "PPP Congress" jibe, likening him to a mobile phone on "speaker and airplane" mode and not the "work" mode. On the 9th leg of his election tour

of Karnataka, he accused Modi of making personal attacks against him as he did not have to speak about on other issues.
"There are three modes in a cell

phone....the first is the work mode... the other two are speaker mode and airplane mode. Modi only uses speaker and airplane mode and not the work mode," he told reporters in an impromptu interaction.

He was responding to a question about Modi's Tuesday remark at an election rally in Gadag where he said the Congress will become "Punjab, Puducherry, Parivar" Congress after its defeat in the Karnataka Assembly polls.

"You might have seen and heard, in my speeches I speak about Narendra Modi, I question him on issues....but I speak about him with respect. Naren-dra Modi is an elderly man, he is aged, going to be 70. I respect those who are elder to me," Gandhi told election ral-



lies in Hosakote and Maluru.

Modi, he said, cannot speak on corruption as the party's chief ministerial candidate Yeddyurappa faced graft allegations.

"He cannot speak about corrup-tion as he has Yeddyurappa standing next to him. He cannot speak about farmers as he has not given them MSP, bonus, and not waived farm loan

"He cannot speak about Dalits as Rohit Vemula (a dalit student of Hyderabad who committed suicide) was killed by his people, Dalit inUn-nao was killed by his people. What is left? Speak ill about Rahul Gandhi, Siddaramaiah, and (Mallikarjun)

Kharge. He does it," he said.

During the three-day visit, Gandhi will address public meetings in Kolar, Bengaluru rural, Chikkballapura, Tumakuru districts and Ben-

galuru city.

Gandhi said though use of such language was unbecoming of a prime minister, it was a "habit" with Modi. Alleging that atrocities against

Dalits and minorities were on the rise, the Congress president said his party would not allow the Constitution to be changed, as asserted by Union minister from Karnataka

Anantkumar Hegde "Narendra Modi folds his hands garlands it, but the causes for which Ambedkar fought, he will not fight for it," Gandhi said, adding that, all across the country Dalits and minorities were being "beaten up,

norities were being beaten up, killed and crushed". About Hegde's allegedcom-ments on the Constitution, he said, "Modi jilisten carefully, put however much strength you have you cannot change Ambedkar's Constitution be cause Congress partywill not allow you to do it."

Terming Karnataka elections as a fight between ideologies, he said on one side was the thinking of Basavanna (12th century social re-former), the Congress party, Indira Gandhi and Devraj Urs (former chief minister), and on the other were the BJP, RSS, Modi's thought.

Gandhi said apart from Yed-dyurappa, four former ministers who had spent time in jail, and eight people from the camp of the controver-sial Reddy brothers were in the poll fray so they can "loot" Karnataka..

"The qualification of Yeddyurappa, Reddy brothers and four ministers..... Yeddyurappa is the most corrupt chief minister the country has seen, Reddy

the country has seen...they will give money for marketing Modi after looting Karnataka," he said.

Earlier, the Congress president rode a bicycle as he led a march against high fuel prices at Maluru in Kolar district. He later stood on

a bullock cart from where he addressed a gathering.

He alleged the Modi government wanted to take money from the common man to give it to its "rich friends".

The world over petrol prices were going down, but in India those were still high, he lamented.

"Earlier in international market, the price was USD 140 per barrel, now it is USD 70 per barrel. So lakhs of crores of rupees is being saved by the government. Where is the money going?" Gandhi asked.

"Why are you not telling people that you don't want to put GST on petrol and diesel? You want to take away money from the common man and want to give it to your five or ten industrialist friends....take money from the pockets of women and put it into the pocket of Nirav Modi and Lalit Modi," he said.

Weather warning: Delhi govt decides to close all evening schools tom

ment today decided to close all evening schools tomorrow following the weather department's warning about heavy rains and thunderstorm

The government said that all evening schools (second shift which starts from the afternoon) will be shut tomorrow. There are around 400 evening schools running in the national capital.

Government has also asked other schools to not hold outdoor activities and extra-curricular activities between 3 PM to 7 PM during which wind speed is expected to remain high.

The decision was tak-

en at a high-level meeting chaired by Chief Sec-retary Anshu Prakash to review the preparedness of authorities in the wake

of the warning. The India Meteorological Department (IMD) today issued an alert forecasting that several parts of northern and eastern India, including Delhi, could witness thunderstorm and squall tomorrow with winds gusting up to 50-70 kilo-meters per hour.

In a circular issued in the evening, the director-ate of education said that winds with a speed of 50-60 kmph may blow be-tween 3 PM and 7 PM in Delhi which is expected to peak around 5.30 PM.
"In the light of in-

puts from State Disaster Management Authority, it has been decided that government, govern-ment-aided & recognised unaided school under directorate of education running in evening/IInd shift shall remain closed on May 8 as a precaution-

"Other schools are also advised to not hold asso auvised to not hold outdoor activities/ex-tra-curricular activities during the above said time period (from 3 PM to 7 PM)," the circular stated stated.

The government also issued a list of 'dos and don'ts' to deal with any such possible situation Officials of the fire department, revenue, traf-fic police, home, PWD and others were present in the meeting chaired by the chief secretary. In the list of 'dos and

don'ts', the government has advised citizens to try to stay indoors and staff off verandas and keep a watch on local weather updates and warnings.

The government also asked people to ensure that children and animals are inside and un-plug unnecessary electrical appliances.

The advisory also asked citizens to avoid taking a bath or shower or leave water running for any purpose. "This is because light-

ening can travel along pipes. Keep away from doors, windows, fire places, stoves, bath-tubs, or any other electrical charge conductors," the

advisory stated.

According to the India Meteorological Department (IMD), thun-derstorm accompanied by gusty winds, is very likely at isolated places over Jammu and Kashmir. Uttarakhand. Himachal Pradesh, Punjab Haryana, Chandigarh, Delhi and western Uttar Pradesh tomorrow.

At least 124 people were killed and more than 300 others injured in five states due to dust storms, thunderstorms and lightning last week.

Britain to Trump: don't ditch Iran nuclear deal

WASHINGTON, MAY 7 (AFP): Britain has appealed to US President Donald Trump not to abandon the Iran nuclear deal as a key deadline approaches, saying that while it is not perfect there is no better al-



The call came in an op-ed piece in The New York Times that was signed by For-eign Secretary Boris Johnson, ahead of a meeting with officials from the US administration in Washington on Monday.

Trump has threatened to withdraw from the agreement when it comes up for renewal on May 12, demanding his country's European allies "fix the terrible flaws"

in it or he will re-impose sanctions on Iran that were eased under the historic accord.

The nuclear deal was struck in 2015 among Iran and Britain, China, France, Germany, Russia and the United States, then led by Barack Obama.

Under the pact, sanctions were eased in return for a commitment from Iran not to pursue a nuclear bomb, but Iran says it is not reaping the rewards despite complying with the deal.

"At this delicate juncture, it would be a mistake to walk away from the nuclear agreement and remove the restraints that it places on Iran," Johnson wrote in Agency have been granted extra powers to monitor Iran's nuclear facilities, "increasing the likelihood that they would spot any

attempt to build a weapon".

"Now that these handcuffs are in place, I see no possible advantage in casting them aside. Only Iran would gain from abandoning the restrictions on its nuclear program," Johnson wrote.

He added: "I believe that keeping the deal's constraints on Iran's nuclear program will also help counter Tehran's aggressive regional behavior. I am sure of one thing: every available alternative is worse. The wisest course would be to improve the handcuffs rather than break

Delhi govt delaying 7th pay commission implementation in pvt schools: Plea in HC

New Delhi, May 7 (PTI): A private unaided schools association has moved the Delhi High Court alleging that the AAP government was de-laying the implementation of the Seventh Central Pay Commission's recommendations in

such institutions causing hardship to teachers, students and parents alike.

The plea, which i

listed before Justice Sunil Gaur for tomorrow, was earlier listed before five judges who recused from hearing it on the ground that someone in their families was studying in schools that were part of the association.

The petitioner association, Action Committee Unaided Recognised Private Schools, has claimed in its plea that while gov-ernment and aided institutions are implementing recommendations of the 7th central pay commission (CPC) immediately, the same benefit was being delayed when private

entities were concerned.

The petition, filed through advocate Kamal Gupta, has claimed that the government and aided schools can draw sustenance from the exche-quer for the payments to be made towards increased salaries and allowances, but private institutions are entirely ceived from students to meet such liabilities.

JAIPUR, MAY 7 (PTI): Languishing at the bottom of the table, Rajasthan Royals need nothing less than a miracle to remain in contention for the IPL Play-offs when they take on Kings XI Punjab in a do-or-die battle, here tomorrow.

Three consecutive defeats have more or less sealed their fate and for things to turn around for the Royals, every aspect of their game needs to improve and click for them.

They are taking on Punjab, placed third in the table, just a day after losing to them by six wickets in Indore, where neither the howlers nor the batsmen could do a convincing job.

Nothing has gone right for the winners of the inaugural edition of the IPL, who lost their pillar Australian Steven Smith -- to ball-tampering

The lackluster performance by their batsmen and bowlers have landed them in a position where they need to win all their remaining games and also pray for favourable results in order to qualify for the

The hosts are back on their home turf, where they have recorded two of their three victories, but they need to start afresh.

Three consecutive defeats, including a narrow one against Delhi Daredevils, has left them demoralised and their mentor, the legendary Shane Warne, too wore a dejected look in the dugout from where he saw



the Royals miss out on half chances.

Average performance by captain Ajinkya Rah-ne and below-par show of English all-rounder Ben Stokes and Rahul Tripathi has hurt them badly and the hosts need all these batsmen to fire. West Indian bowler Jofra Archer, though, has been

impressive and the only saving grace for them while expensive pacer Jaydev Unadkat has been a complete let-down, taking just seven wickets at a poor 9.86 economy rate.

Traffic Jammed in Gangtok

Time to seriously ponder easing options

Commuting in Gangtok used to comfortable only during holidays, but now the tourist season has snatched away even that weekly reprieve. Till a few weeks ago, traffic used to flow unhindered on Gangtok roads instead of snarling ever so often. The congestion on the roads had already become bad when it was just the office-goers who were flagging down taxis, but now there are tourists arriving by the jeeploads every hour even as another batch commandeers cabs to complete their sightseeing junkets. This leaves those who depend of share-cabs to get around town rather poorly serviced, but that challenge we leave for later.

Suffice for now to say that traffic is a problem in Gangtok. The jams are becoming longer and denser and parking has emerged as a treasure-hunt for which no one has presented a practical conclusion. There is, after all, only so much road available to accommodate the march of vehicles which shows no signs of tapering off. What also continues to hamstring Gangtok when it comes to managing its traffic is the fact that most of the solutions that consultants could offer - like wider roads or bypasses or flyovers - are not possible for development here. The capital will have to work with the roads it already has, at least along stretches where most of the congestion takes place. There is no scope for widening roads and very limited options to create alternate routes. That said, there are still some options it could explore even when it comes to road usage and also some experiments it could try out.

Let us start with the situation shared at the start of this piece. The worst congestion on Gangtok roads during non tourist seasons is in the block from around 10 a.m. till around noon, the morning office rush hour. The jams standstill again once offices give over later in the afternoon. For anyone who sees traffic as a problem, this should then be the first situation to be addressed. One way to reduce the number of vehicles on the road at this time would be to increase and incentivize the use of office car pools. This option is already being used to some extent in government offices However, not all government servants travel in their own vehicles or car-pools, and many use share cabs Further, car-pooling serves only government servants, but government offices also attract lay people coming there, and they too mostly use share taxis. What could ease congestion would be the introduction of a good public transport shuttle during the peak rush hours. Before anyone points to the city runners as a public transport service already deployed, let's accept it that these are too few and too erratic in timing to be taken seriously as a solution at present. Traffic flows can be eased, and so congestion removed, with better information. Better information among commuters about how frequently buses will be available. Ply enough of them on the roads during rush hours, and inform the people about the frequency, and most would prefer buses to clambering for share-taxis at the designated

Of course, since office hours trigger the biggest jams, the policy makers could also consider staggering the office hours so that the rush of office-goers is also spread out instead of being bunched together. But then again, for this solution to bear any results, the work culture will have to be much more consistent than the present trend of casual timings. But if this were to work, then the arrival of lay people to offices could also be spread out by appointing timings, say to two hours after offices open, for people to meet officers. This again, is not an easily enforceable option, but should maybe be tried only after the jams on the roads have become even worse... yes, things could get much worse still.

What the planners need to also ponder on is to make the link roads, like the one flowing through Arithang to the bypass or from ICAR to 5th Mile or the Paljor Stadium Road shooting down to bypass, more motorable and convenient for people to consider bypassing the gridlocked zones unless their destina-tions necessitate suffering through them. At present, the alternates are not even close to being convenient diversions and anyone who has to reach anywhere in Gangtok is forced to drive through the entire length of it. It goes without saying that if the driving surface was improved on the many feeder roads, more people would consider using them even if they were longer than that NH10 route.

Of course, there are more options that could be considered, and definitely many more, much better solutions that can be attempted, but let's take this as a starting point for more ideas to be voiced to do a better job of managing Gangtok traffic.

Toxin linked to motor neuron disease found in Australian algal blooms

A lgal blooms in major Australian rivers are releasing a toxic chemical that may contribute to the development of motor neuron disease

My colleagues and I tested algae from waterways in New South Wales, and found that a neurotoxin called BMAA was present in 70% of samples, including those from crucial water sources such as the Darling and Murrumbidgee rivers.

This compound is well known overseas, and has been found in waterways in the United States, Europe, Asia, and the Middle East. But this is the first time it has been detected in Australia. Although its presence has been suspected, it was never specifically tested until now

Two samples containing BMAA were collected from the Murrumbidgee River, which runs through the NSW Riverina, a hotspot for MND in Australia. Positive samples were also collected in Centennial Park and Botany wetlands in central Sydney, as well as Manly Dam on Sydney's North-

In the past 30 years, Australian rivers have had the dubious honour of hosting some of the largest algal blooms in history. In 1991 a bloom stretched along more than 1,200km of the Darling River, prompting the New South Wales government to declare a state of emergency. The army was mobilised to provide aid to towns.

Since then, southeast Australia has had four large blooms, most recently in 2016. The future isn't promising either. Rising water temperatures mean blooms are likely to increase in frequency and duration in the future.

Multiple state agencies monitor populations of types of bacteria in Australia, regularly testing water quality and issuing alerts when blooms are present. This testing is necessary because of the impressive number of toxins that cyanobacteria can produce, ranging from skin irritants to liver and neurological toxins. Most of these compounds are relatively fast-acting, meaning that their effects take hold rapidly after exposure.

The neurotoxic compound BMAA, however, is

not currently part of regular testing, despite links between long-term exposure to algal blooms and the development of diseases such as MND. BMAA is known to be produced by a type of freshwater and marine bacteria, as well as some species of algae.

HOW BMAA AFFECTS OUR HEALTH

Research in America found that regular participa-tion in water-based recreational activity resulted in a threefold increase in the risk of developing MND. Satellite mapping also revealed that lakes prone to algal blooms were often surrounded by clusters of MND patients.

Southwestern NSW has become a focus for MND researchers since 2014, due to the presence of a hotspot for MND cases around the Riverina. The town of Griffith has reported a prevalence of this disease that is nearly seven times higher than the national average of 8.7 cases per 100,000 people. Hotspots like these can help researchers identify environmental factors that contribute to diseases.

This is particularly important in MND, in which ly 5-10% of patients have a family history. The other 90-95% of cases are sporadic, occurring without warning. It is possible that BMAA expo-

sure, in association with genetic, or other environ mental risk factors, contributes to the high incidence of MND in the Riverina.

BMAA also has a similar structure to the amino acids that make up the proteins in our body. We hypothesise that this contributes to its toxicity and ability to build up in animal tissue and in plants

that are exposed to contaminated water.
Similar to mercury, BMAA can accumulate in the food chain, which means that people could be consuming relatively large amounts of it through their diet. A US animal studyfound that dietary exposure to BMAA resulted in the formation of plaques and protein tangles in the brain, which are hallmark features of neurodegeneration.

TINY AND TOXIC

The toxins produced by some blue-green algae can affect the nervous system, the liver and kidneys, or be toxic to cells more generally. Humans can be affected by drinking contaminated water or eating affected shellfish. Direct contact with water can also cause itching and rashes. Worse still, the toxins can remain in the water even after the blue-green algae themselves have vanished - in some cases for

weeks, depending on the conditions.

Larger blooms tend to occur where there is an excess of nutrients, often the result of fertiliser runoff from intensive agriculture or other degradation of the catchment system. This means that, throughout Australia, the potential for blooms is increasing.

Water temperature also influences algal blooms for two reasons. First, blue-green algae grow faster in warmer water and, second, warmer tempera-tures increase "thermal stratification", in which a warmer surface layer overlies deeper, cooler water Stratification allows cyanobacteria to flourish in the warmer sunlit surface waters because of their unique ability to make themselves float.

So how do you steer clear of blue-green algae? The obvious tips are to avoid drinking untreated water from still, calm water bodies, and to be mindful of children or dogs playing by the water.

Green surface scum is the most obvious tell-

tale sign of an algal bloom, but not all species of cyanobacteria form scums. Discolouration of the water, particularly a green colour, can also indicate the presence of blue-green algae. Some species, such as Microcystis, give off a distinctive odour, although some other blue-green algae also create musty-smelling chemicals that are non-toxic.

It is comforting to know that if water quality is at risk, vour local water authority is probably on top of it already, and will typically erect warning signs each summer. Many lakes and reservoirs are routinely closed for recreational use to protect the public from toxic blooms during the hotter months

BLOOMING HOT

The forecast hot, dry summer is likely to be a boon for blooms, given that bluegreen algae prefer warm, still water. This means that areas that typically get algal blooms might find they

are bigger and longer-lasting this summer. In Australia's southern states, the blooms might also start earlier in the summer and last longer into autumn

But the scale of blooms also depends on nutri-ents, so reducing the amount of nutrients that are washed off the land during rainfall events can provide a way of controlling them. This can be done by reducing land degradation, for example, reducing erosion, creating vegetation buffer zones along river banks, and avoiding excessive fertiliser use.

Some of these processes will take time to imple

ment and therefore won't help us this summer. But combating cyanobacteria in the longer term will help to protect the environment, allow continued recreational use of water and, most importantly, protect our precious drinking water.

Research now needs to focus on tracking and monitoring algal blooms to detect the presence of BMAA, and determining how long it remains in the ecosystem after these blooms occur.

This can potentially help to reduce human ex-sure to BMAA. Although the factors that cause MND are many and varied, we hope this understanding could ultimately help to reduce the num-ber of people who develop the disease.

As the Bureau of Meteorology has already warned us, Australia is in for a hot, dry summer as the current El Niño takes hold. Those conditions are ideal for blue-green algae to bloom in lakes,

onds and reservoirs.

Photosynthesising bacteria, also known as cyanobacteria, are found in all aquatic environments from the tropics to the poles. Most species have no adverse impact on the environment, but a few have nastier effects, and some are toxic to humans and animals.

Blue-green algae can form vast "blooms", some large enough to be seen from space. In the Australian drought summers of 2009 and 2010, for example, hundreds of kilometres of the Murray River suffered major cyanobacterial blooms, which hampered the use of water for drinking, agriculture and

These blooms occur mostly in still water bodies and can be found throughout Australia. Some blue-green algae form visible surface scums, while others remain hidden in the water column. Some live in freshwater; others float in the open ocean or even live on the sea bed.

Every cancer patient should be prescribed exercise medicine

m very}$ four minutes someone in Australia is diagnosed with cancer. Only one in ten of those diagnosed will exercise enough during and after their treatment. But every one of those patients would benefit from exercise.

I'm part of Australia's peak body representing health professionals who treat people with cancer, the Clinical Oncology Society of Australia. Today we're joining 25 other cancer organisations to call for exercise to be prescribed to all cancer patients as part of routine cancer care

Published today in the Medical Journal of Australia, our plan is to incorporate exercise alongside surgery, chemotherapy and radiotherapy to help counteract the negative effects of cancer and its treatment

WHAT ARE WE CALLING FOR? Historically the advice to cancer pa tients was to rest and avoid activity. We now know this advice may be harmful to patients, and every person with cancer would benefit from exer-

cise medicine. Most doctors and nurses agree ex ercise is beneficial but don't routinely prescribe exercise as part of their patients' cancer treatment plan.

It is our position that all health

people with cancer should:

1. view and discuss exercise as a stan-

dard part of the cancer treatment plan 2. recommend people with cancer adhere to exercise guidelines

3. refer patients to an exercise physiologist or physiotherapist with expe-

WHY PRESCRIBE EXERCISE?

Cancer patients who exercise regu-larly experience fewer and less se-vere side effects from treatments. They also have a lower relative risk of cancer recurrence and a lower relrisk of dying from their cancer

If the effects of exercise could be encapsulated in a pill, it would be prescribed to every cancer patient worldwide and viewed as a major breakthrough in cancer treatment. If we had a pill called exercise it would be demanded by cancer patients, prescribed by every cancer specialist, and subsidised by government.

Cancer and its treatment can have a devastating effect on people's lives, causing serious health issues that compromise their physical and mental well-being.
Research shows exercise can help

cancer patients tolerate aggressive treatments, minimise the physical declines caused by cancer, counteract cancer-related fatigue, relieve mental

professionals involved in the care of distress and improve quality of life.

When appropriately prescribed and monitored, exercise is safe for people with cancer and the risk of complications is relatively low.

Implementing exercise medicine part of routine cancer care not only has the potential to change people's lives but to also save money. People with cancer who exercise have low-er medical expenses and spend less time away from work

WHAT EXACTLY SHOULD BE PRESCRIBED?

Exercise specialists can prescribe exercise in a similar way that doctors prescribe medications; by knowing how cancer impacts our health, and understanding how certain exercises improve the structure and function of

the body's systems.

These individualised programs involve specific types of exercises, performed at precise intensities and volumes based on a mechanism of action and dosage needed to counteract

the negative effects of cancer.

The evidence-based guidelines recommend people with cancer be as physically active as their current abili-ty and conditions allow. For significant health benefits, they should aim for: 1. at least 150 minutes of moderate intensity aerobic exercise weekly (such as walking, jogging, cycling, swimming)

2. two to three resistance exercise session each week involving moderate to vigorous intensity exercises targeting the major muscle groups (such as weight lifting).

These recommendations should be tailored to the individual's abilities to minimise the risk of complications and maximise the benefits

HOW WILL PATIENTS FILL THE PRESCRIPTION?

Getting this much exercise may seem out of reach for many people with can-cer. But exercise specialists who have experience in cancer care can help. They'll esign an individual program based on the patient's disease, how they've responded to treatment and the anticipated trajectory of their health status

Online directories can help find accredited exercise physiologists and physiotherapistspractising nearby. These services are eligible for sub sidies through Medicare and private health insurance.

Or patients can opt for structured cancer-specific exercise medicine programs such as EX-MED Cancer, which I lead. Such programs are designed to maximise the safety and effectiveness of exercise medicine for cancer patients.

SC asks K'taka police to grant protection to woman married off without consent

Supreme Court today came to the rescue of a Karnataka politician's 26-year-old daughter, who has been married off by her family alwho has legedly without her consent, and asked the state police to provide her security, after she claimed there was a threat to her life from

her kin.

The woman, a computer en gineer who was named Ms 'X' in the plea, appeared before a bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra and submitted that her marriage be set aside as she did not consent to it and that she be granted protection as she wanted e further studies and job in Bengaluru.

The bench, also comprising justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, said that it has already made clear that it will not deal with the constitutional-ity of the provisions of the Hindu Marriage Act and validity of her "forced marriage". The bench, however, consid-

ered the plea of woman for grant of security and asked the Karnataka police to provide it to her at Bengaluru where she would be residing for work and further studies.

'You (woman) are a major. You are independent to go wherever you want to go," the bench said, adding that nobody, including her family members and the husband, can force or coerce her. It considered the submissions

requested that the her identity and that of her family not be disclosed, that her parents be asked to give back the documents like educational certificates, Aadhaar card and passport.

Jaising, who initially sought

setting aside of marriage on the grounds of lack of consent, later said that the woman would be pursuing the remedy for dissolution of marriage at an appropriate forum. The bench then discharged

Delhi police and the Delhi Commission for Women, which were granting protection and pursuing her case respectively, of their re-sponsibility as the woman said that she would be going back to Karnataka.

Earlier, the apex court had

asked the Centre and the Delhi Police to grant her protection during the stay in the national capital.

The woman had sought striking down of sections 5 and 7 of the Hindu Marriage Act (HMA) to the extent that they fail "to prescribe free, fair, valid prior consent of the parties to a marriage".

"We can deal this petition as habeas corpus petition only. We will not get into the constitutionality of the provisions of the HMA," the bench had said.

The woman had sought quashing of her marriage conducted on March 14, 2018 on the grounds that it was solemnised without her

free, fair and valid prior consent by her family members.

The court had said such a dec-

laration that lack of explicit con-sent would render the marriage invalid can be decided through appropriate proceedings emanating from family court.

She had claimed that her fundamental right to choose her life partner, has been brazenly trampled by her "family members, who in connivance with each other, have coerced, threatened, blackmailed, pressurized, abused, compelled and tricked her into get-ting married to the man, against her wishes and free consent"

The woman had also claimed that she had escaped from the "clutches of her abusive family in Karnataka" and reached Delhi and further sought direction to the authorities from the apex court to provide her adequate security in order to safeguard her life, liberty and limb which was under threat from her own family members who are politically active in Kar-

She had also said her family's conduct was indicative of resulting in the ghastly act of 'honour killing' as she wanted to get married to a person outside her caste.

The woman, an engineer by ofession, alleged that she was forced to discontinue her studies in January this year as her parents forced her to marry against her



Chhetri calls for away matches against tougher opponents ahead of Asian Cup

GURUGRAM, MAY 7 (PTI): Indian football team captain Sunil Chhetri said on Sunday that the country should play more international matches away from home and against much stronger opponents in the next six months if it is to do well in the AFC Asian Cup tournament.

Chhetri said his team needs the best of preparations to make it count in the January 5 to February 1 event in the United Arab Emirates next year after crashing out of the group stage in the 2011 edition -- the last time India played in the prestigious event -- by losing all their matches with big margins.

'What I'm looking forward is winning games outside the country which is very important. Our home record is fairly good but outside home we have really struggled. I just hope in the next six months we get more away games against much better opponents so that we can test ourselves. What we are facing (in Asian Cup) are the best in Asia," Chhetri said.

The prolific striker's remarks make sense as India has done badly against the continent's top opponents away from home during the 2018 World Cup qualification campaign, which preceded the Asian Cup qualification rounds. India had lost to Iran,

Oman. Turkmenistan and even to Guam in their away matches of the World Cup qualifiers. The Stephen Constantine-coached won just two matches out of 10 World Cup qualifiers.

Chhetri, who turns 34 this August, does not agree with the view that India has got an easier group this time as compared to the 2011 edition where the country was clubbed with Asian powerhouses Australia and South Ko-



rea as well as Bahrain. This time India has been grouped with UAE, Thailand and Bahrain.

"If you say it can be easier because we are doing well that can be a valid point. But we can't say it is UAE, Thailand and Bahrain and so it is easier. Only because we are not facing Australia and South Korea people think it's going to be easy. It is not," he said on the sidelines of an initiative by KIA Motors India to select two school children as official match ball carriers for the oming World Cup in Russia.
"UAE is ahead of us and

they are playing at home. Thailand is the most improved side in Asia in the last six years. We played against Thailand in six-seven years ago and it was a 2-2 draw. They are competing with the best in Asia. Australia and Japan are finding difficult to beat Thailand."

Nonetheless, the star striker said his team "should look to take maximum points in their first match" if they they want to proceed further in the tournament. India play Thailand in their opening match on January 5 in Dubai.

Chhetri also said that the impressive run in the Asian Cup qualifying campaign, during which India had a 13-match unbeaten run, will count for nothing in the main round. The impressive run had contributed to India returning to top 100 in FIFA rankings af-

"I am happy with the kind of performance we have put into. But I don't give too much importance to FIFA rankings. We have broken inside top 100, but the way rankings work is very tricky. What we have to deal with is a much bigger stage and it will not help by what we have done before," he said.

Chhetri will, no doubt, be playing in his last Asian Cup next year and he will be the only Indian to have played in two editions of the continental showpiece. He scored two goals out of three by his team in the 2011 edition in Doha.

He has donned India jersevs 97 times so far and his 100th match is expected to come up during the four-team Intercon-tinental Cup to be held from June 1 in Mumbai, which will also involve South Africa, New Zealand and Chinese Taipei.

"It has been an unbelievable ride. I started out from Delhi and the only reason why I wanted to play India U-17 was to get a certificate to get into St. Stephen's (college). Whatever I have achieved now is some thing I have never dreamt of. I am living a dream and I am really happy about it. I could not have asked for anything more." Chhetri's club Bengaluru

FC nearly won Indian Super League in their debut season, only to lose to Chennaiyin 2-3 FC in the summit clash. He said that the final loss still hurts him and his club-mates.

Global quantity of plastic in oceans to nearly double to 250

KOCHI, MAY 7 (PTI): eight million tonnes of plastic end up in the oceans each year and the global quantity will nearly double to 250 nillion tonnes by 2025, says a new analysis paper.

The new International Union for Conser-vation of Nature (IUCN) co-authored analysis paper, released recently, warned that the 'plastic soup' contains toxic chemicals, which could pose risks to marine species and humans.

It said reliable quantitative estimations of input loads, sources and originating sectors represent a significant knowledge gap, "but it is suggested that every vear almost eight million tonnes leak to the ocean."

It said estimates are that oceans may already contain over 150 mil-lion tonnes of plastic, of which around 250,000 tonnes, fragmented into five trillion plastic pieces, may be floating at the oceans' surface.

"It has also been es-

timated that the global quantity of plastic in the ocean will nearly double to 250 million tonnes by 2025, which likely also represents a pollutant load of millions of tonnes of chemical additives," it said.

Marine species ingest potentially contaminated plastics directly, and by eating contaminated prey, says the paper ti-tled 'Marine litter plastics and microplastics and their toxic chemicals components: the need for urgent preventive

measures'.

"Seabirds are partic ularly vulnerable, with studies showing the presence of additives used as flame retardants in plastics, as well as foams and textiles, which were discovered in their stomachs and fatty tis-sue," said the paper, published in Environmental Sciences, Europe.

The paper said that at a global level, United Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) has estimated the economic impact of marine plastics (excluding microplas-tics), including losses incurred by fisheries and tourism due to plastic littering, as well as beach clean-up costs, at around USD 13 billion per year.

"Looking at the scale of the marine plastic problem today and at the projections for future growth in production of plastic globally, it is clear we are in the midst of a major crisis," said Carl Gustaf Lundin, Director of IUCNs Global Marine and Polar Programme.

Ludin said urgent action was needed to reduce toxic chemicals leaching into oceans from plastic.

To reduce amount of contaminants in marine plastics, the authors recommend addressing issues in the life-cycle design of plastic prod-ucts and creating products that minimise use of hazardous substances, an approach known as 'green chemistry'.

They also concluded that the development of best practice codes for industry is likely to be more efficient than relying on 'end-of-pipe' solutions; and existing scientific evidence and precautionary principles should drive action from scientists, industry, policy and civil society to curb leaking of plastics into the marine environment in the short term.

'Societies need to act at multiple levels," said Joao Sousa, IUCN Proj-ect Manager for Marine Plastics, co-author of the report. "Developed

tries need to identify and adopt less harmful production processes and promote alternatives, whilst sound waste management and awareness-raising should be the main priority for developing nations," said

actor Robin Williams was struggling from diffuse Lewy body dementia in his last days, a new book has revealed.

In a soon-to-be-released biography, titled "Robin", author Dave Itzkoff says the actor did not have Parkinson's diseas he was diagnosed earlier, New York Post reported.

The actor, who had started having

troubles with speech and behavioural dvsfunction, did not know he was suffering from the neurogenerative disease.

It was only three months after his death that the autopsy results revealed that he had "diffuse Lewy body dementia".

The inability to express himself, a rarity for one of the most spontaneous per-formers on-stage and on screen, was eating Williams from the inside during the filming of "Night at the Museum: Secret of the Tomb", the third movie in the successful family franchise in Vancouver in 2014.



The actor committed suicide at the age troubled last year.

3 on August 11, 2014. Williams was having trouble remembering his lines while he was filming Night Williams to piece together the actor's at the Museum: Secret of the Tomb, the

third movie in the franchise.

Make-up artiste Cheri Minns recalled the actor would cry unstoppably in her

"He was sobbing in my arms at the end of every day. It was horrible. Horrible. I said to his people, 'I'm a makeup artist. I don't have the capacity to deal with what's happening to him'," she says in the book.

Minns even asked the actor to return to stand-up comedy

to get back his confidence but he just cried and said, "I can't, Cheri. I don't know how anymore. I don't know how to be funny.

The actor's third wife, Susan Schneider, said he started complaining about an array of symptoms: indigestion, trouble urinating, insomnia, loss of his sense of smell and heartburn. A slight tremor cropped up in his left hand, which was attributed to a

shoulder injury.
"It was like playing whack-a-mole. Which symptom is it this month? I thought, is my husband a hypochondriac? We're chasing it and there's no answers, and by now we'd tried everything," Schneider

Billy Crystal, Williams' old friend, described the actor looking frail and "un-characteristically quiet" when he saw him

after a four-month gap.
Crystall recalls when they said their goodbyes after dinner, the actor burst into

"What's the matter?" Crystal asked.

"Oh, I'm just so happy to see you. It's been too long. You know I love you," Williams said to him.

Williams, a four-time Oscar nominee, won a supporting actor Oscar for "Good Will Hunting" for his portrayal of a wise and morose psychologist.

One of the most beloved artistes of his generation, he featured in films such as "Mrs Doubtfire", "Dead Poets Society" and "Patch Adams".

In the painting, his muse, who he first met in 1927 as a girl of seventeen, "awake or asleep, writing or reading, appears in manifold guises throughout Picasso's oeuvre", evoking a pri-vate moment from what became a decade long af-

fair between the two.

Marie Therese's unmistakeable profile and sweep of blonde hair are silhouetted in front of a window at the Chateau de Boisgeloup, the grand house outside of Paris acquired by Picasso in 1930.

Her sensual curves are echoed by the diffused green light ema-nating from the gardens beyond the window the deliberate juxtaposition of the horizontals and verticals of the window frame with the soft curves of her body masterfully emphasising her form.

Islamic countries call Rohingya crisis 'ethnic cleansing'

DHAKA, MAY 7 (AP): A grouping of Islamic countries said Myanmar's treatment of Rohingya Muslims is a "serious and blatant violation of international law" and it is calling for international support in solving the

The Organisation of Islamic Cooperation issued a joint statement Sunday at the end of a two-day conference in Bangladesh, which has taken in more than 700.000 Rohingva who have fled violence in Myanmar since

The statement said the grouping will continue to work the UN and other global platforms to address the rights violations

taking place in Myanmar. The grouping echoed previous international statements saying ethnic cleansing is taking place in Myanmar.

Bangladesh Foreign Minister A.H. Mahod Ali said delegates pledged solidarity with his country "in the face of the huge Rohingya influx with its humanitarian and security consequences."

Security forces in Buddhist-majority Myanmar launched a scorched-earth campaign in late August in response to attacks by a Rohingya insurgent group. Thousands of people are believed to have been killed in the crackdown, which many rights activists believe was a calculated attempt to drive Ro-

hingya from the country.
Rohingya are denied citizenship in
Myanmar, where they have long faced persecution. Many in Myanmar see them as il-legal migrants from Bangladesh, and deride them as "Bengalis." Most have long lived in poverty in Myanmar's Rakhine state, next to Bangladesh.

The hundreds of thousands who fled now live in squalid camps across the border in Bangladesh. The Bangladesh Red Crescent Society estimates that at least 100,000 refugees will be exposed to extreme dangers during the coming monsoon season.
