Inclement weather and damaged roads in TAR heat hack pilgrimage before it even began

KESANG DOMA BHUTIA GANGTOK, 24 JUN:

The overland Kailash-Mansarovar Yatra for the first two batches of the season has ended with the 91 pilgrims not being able to get across Nathula. After keeping the groups waiting and hoping, con-firmation reportedly arrived today that at least these two groups will not be able to travel onwards into Tibetan Autononous Region of China on their pilgrimage.

They will now be returning home on Sunday, having enjoyed good hospitality in Sikkim, but refused their Yatra due to inclement weather on the other side of the border.

From information received from the STDC, both the batches are returning to New Delhi to-morrow. The STDC has arranged two AC buses from SNT to ferry the pil-

grims till Bagdogra.
China has refused entry to the first and second batches of 47 and 44 Indian pilgrims respec-tively on their scheduled travel to Kailash Mansarovar through the Nathu-la. Although no official word has arrived yet on why this has happened, it is reliably learnt that extensive damage to roads across Nathula in TAR due to rains and land-

The first batch of

angtok-born music producer Gangtok-born music producer and rapper, Ugen Nagyal Bhutia, has done it again. His 2015 hit 'Call Me Indian' turned heads with many of the music sites calling him the next gen rapper sensation. A string of hits under his hat like the radio favorite 'Badam Ko Lagi', the loyalty song 'Bhotey Kukur' and now one of the largest streaming songs by a Sikkimese rapper, 'Jai Jai Khukuri'.

Awash in music, Gorkha and Bhutia pride, he attempted to boost the morale of the community through the will of his conflicted rhymes. The rapper did not set out to create an anthem for protestors with his hopeful exploration of Gorkha pride, but it ended up being adopted by many who would write "Jai Jai Khukuri" while posting pictures of the movement as their caption.

"It's a chant of hope and feeling,"

he told SummitTimes.

"I was in class 10 when I first heard about the Gorkhaland movement. I was not aware of the situation or what it meant to the people at the time so I was not that vocal about it. Seven years later, the movement began again and it garnered attention from everybody This time I knew what it meant for the people of Darjeeling to have their own home," Ugen shares.

In the video of the song, footage from past protests is interspersed with photos from Gorkhas' 100year movement. Since its official release on 19 June on Facebook and YouTube, the song has garnered more than 3.50 lakh online streams (excluding YouTube plays) with people calling it the 'anthem' of the movement.

"I wanted to be careful about what I wanted to express through the song. I did not want it to create a stir among the listeners therefore; I researched the topic and did some digging. I talked to people and wrote the song in about two days. I wanted to contribute something to the movement and I did with my

music," the rapper shares.

"The song carries the unbearable anguish of thousands. The song reflects the indifference, disregard and negligence of all who remain quiet about this issue," Roshni Tamang from Darjeeling said when asked about the song.
On being asked about his timing

to release the song, Ugen says, "This is what's happening in the country. Whenever I make music, it reflects where I'm at mentally. And this is where we're at".

When asked about the response that the song has gotten since it got released, the Gangtokian says, "It's crazy. This is one of my favorite songs that I have written and composed. To see that people are relating to the song makes me much more than just a musician. It makes them see me as one of them who is feeling the same thing."



The state government, which has been pushing for this project, has also been told by the Centre to improve road conditions and provide multi-modal transport facilities, said Secretary, Ministry of Civil Aviation, R N Choubey.

The announcement of a second airport in the national capital region comes at a time when the Indira Gandhi International Airport in New Delhi grapples with an ever- increasing number of passengers.

The IGI Airport currently handles nearly 62 million passengers every year. As per its updated master plan, the passenger handling capacity will be increased to 109.33 million passengers per year in a phased manner.

However, the airport is likely to reach that figure in the next seven years, necessitating a second airport in the vicinity of the national capital, according to the government.

Remember the Emergency

The darkest phase of Indian democracy is also the most murkily remembered

remained until the Right took office in Delhi, and chances are that they will ensure that more people remember this day and serve it the infamy it deserves. But this rediscovery is not without its ironies though, because the people now in power who will try and coach us about this day, display, every day, every sign of entitled righteousness and arrogance which had made the Emergency possible. The middle class continues to buy the fiction of order and pride today as it did from 1975 to 1977, and defends and justifies the extreme subjugation of the marginalized by the privileged and the powerful. So, even if the date might get discussed and "debated" on national TV, no one will really be any wiser. And this

will be to the misfortune of the country.

For the record, on the midnight of 25 June, 1975, the then Prime Minister, Indira Gandhi, clamped Emergency on the nation. An obvious lust for power led Indira Gandhi to impose the Emergency so that she could stay on in power even after the Courts had ruled that she had no business remaining in office. When the gavel of justice slammed against her, she cracked the whip and co-opted even more power for herself. Before the people's mood swept her into irrelevance, she gambled and roared. It worked, because the people cowered (at least for a while) and were distracted into believing that a strong leader was giving them what they wanted. This cycle repeats itself in our democracy at all levels and all corners with varying degrees of success. But this was not what the people have ever received. In 1975, fundamental rights were suspended, newspapers censored and journalists hauled to jail along with perhaps the entire Opposition. Midnight raids became common and Tihar was packed to the gills with dissenters. Emergency apologists suggest that for once the trains ran on time and officials actually worked. Fact remains that the two years of Emergency were times when India ran under a dictatorship and no matter how "efficient" the officers became at this time, it was a period which went against everything that democracy stands for and the worst hit were the underprivileged. The model did not go down well with the people and they voted not only Indira's INC out of power but also refused the original Mrs. G a berth in the Lok Sabha when they finally got a chance to vote in 1977. It is another matter that the same people voted her back into power in 1979. But

that argument we keep for another day.

The Emergency is something that the generation in schools and colleges now does not even know about; at least not in the real sense. This blind-spotting of the tumultuous two years in the history of Indian Democracy is perhaps as unfair as the actual Emergency itself. Every generation of Indians should know what can happen if citizens of a democracy stop caring or allow themselves to get carried away by bombast and faux nationalism. One does not expect the horrors of the Emergency to be taught in schools, but even the mainstream media is failing in its job with mere tokenism on the topic. This is perhaps because the media houses, save perhaps Indian Express and The Statesman, keeled over to official pressure at the time. This is a skeleton that everyone wants kept locked. But that is wrong. Young Indians need to know what happened between 1975 and 1977. They have to understand the situation that led to the Emergency so that they can recognise the signs when a repeat is being attempted. No one really expects an Emergency to be imposed again, but there might not even be the need to in the present times when free thought and liberal ideas can instead be effectively drowned out by trolls and a jingoistic media. This makes the need for the young to understand the Emergency even more keenly so that they also need to know of the popular movement, about the silent majority, which finally overcame the draconian imposition. They need to know of the symptoms of a democracy in distress and about the tools that can repair it so that they can deploy the same when required.

The past, we should realise, is not something to pride over or to feel ashamed of, it is something to learn from. India, and for that matter even Sikkim, prefers to ignore the uncomfortable bits. India ignores the Partition Riots and the Emergency and Sikkim dodges on the Merger. This attitude should change. We need to look deeper into our pasts again, not for critiques and allegations, but, as mentioned earlier, to be better prepared.

Wonder Woman: Feminist Icon or Symbol of Oppression?

's been a busy - and controversial - year for Wonder Woman

In October 2016, the United Nations ma rious appointment: Wonder Woman would be the global organisation's new Ambassador for Wom-en's Empowerment, aligned with the launch of a new campaign to fuel Sustainable Development Goal number five, which aims to achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls by 2030.

The announcement, which coincided with Wonder Woman's 75th birthday and a new Hollywood super-production about the comic book character, was met with a great deal of criticism

While the fictional feminist icon has long been a representative of strong, liberated women, her Western appearance, sexualised image and unrealistic beauty don't resonate with millions of young women around the world. They're actually alienating.

Feminists skewered the decision. Was the UN implying that no flesh-and-blood woman was up to

Over 44,000 people signed a petition resulting in "one less woman in politics". Just as quickly as she'd got it, Wonder Woman lost her job.

WHAT'S A FEMINIST?

She's still winning at the box office though. The film, released on June 2, has already brought in US\$571 million worldwide

Director Patty Jenkin's Wonder Woman is being hailed as a "masterpiece of subversive feminism". It is the first time since 1984's Supergirl that a female superhero has anchored a film.

This woman-directed, woman-led film tells a story of justice, of a character who fights evil forces for the greater good. As Wonder Woman, Gal Godot overcomes the trite "damsel in distress" narrative and rescues her own damn self. But are we being overly generous with the feminist label here?

In a recent article, the Hollywood Reporter said that Warner Bros had created "what one might describe as a postfeminist Wonder Woman", with Jenkins "temper[ing] the character's traditional strength with vulnerability." Even Gadot, the film's Israeli star, is quoted

as saying, "Credit Patty for not turning [Wonder Woman] into a ballbuster" – not the most feminist of concepts.

Rather than represent real women, Wonder Woman satisfies the societal image of the ideal woman. Inhumanly strong, super sexy and bolstered by her exceptionalism, Wonder Woman is a "walking contradiction of the competing demands placed on women's shoulders today".

How many actual women or girls around the orld can live up to Wonder Woman as a role model? Would we even want them to?

Also lacking in laudatory reviews of Wonder Woman is the idea of intersectionality – the ac-knowledgement that women's multiple identities (not just sex but also gender identity, race, class, sexual orientation, religion and others) expose them to numerous forms of oppression.

Why haven't feminists noted that the film is, quite simply, too Western and too white?

MEANWHILE IN LEBANON

In Lebanon, where I currently live and work, Wonder Woman was banned nationwide, upsetting fans, shocking civil liberties groups and raising

concerns about government censorship.

The decision is based on the Israel Boycott Law



of 1955, which prohibits economic relations with Israel, "an enemy state", including with any "insti-tutions or persons having residence in Israel". Actress Gal Godot is clearly among them.

Lebanon and Israel have a long history of con-flict (the most recent flare-up occurred in 2006), and Lebanon forbids its citizens from travelling to Israel. It also prohibits entry to anyone with an Is raeli passport stamp and forbids the purchase of Israeli products.

More than a political disagreement, the Cam

paign to Boycott Supporters of Israel-Lebanon explains, this is "resistance against occupation", which is to say that the ban isn't about Israelis or Judaism but rather about the government-supported Zionist project that has resulted in human rights violations against Palestine and the Palestinian

But enforcement of the law is uneven. Hewl-ett-Packard and Coca-Cola, supposedly banned, are actively operating here, and Lebanon has previously screened films featuring Israeli actors, including Star Wars (with Natalie Portman) and the Fast and Furious series (with Gal Gadot).

Nor is the Lebanese government consistent in supporting the Palestinian people. Palestinians here are routinely denied access to jobs, healthcare and citizenship. In Lebanon, popular sentiment on Palestine ranges from indifference and resentment to outright discrimination.

As the Lebanese researcher Halim Shebaya not-ed in a June 2 opinion piece, it would have been

a much more powerful statement if the Lebanese onle had refused to see Wonder Woman because it symbolised oppression than for politicians to make that decision for them.

If this ban was an act of solidarity, it's unlikely that Palestinians here or elsewhere saw it that way. Letting the film run and then donating the proceeds to support Palestinians living in Lebanon – perhaps to Palestinian women's organisations – would have been read more clearly as solidarity.

REMEMBERING INTERSECTIONALITY

Lebanon's dubious ban and Wonder Woman's dubious feminism may seem poles apart but the two are, in fact, related – because of intersectionality,

In both the Arab region and the United States, there is a growing debate about whether feminism and Zionism are compatible.

One camp claims that they are, a position that the Sarah Lawrence College student Andrea Cantor laid out for the Huffington Post earlier this year.

"Israel is more than a government" she wrote.
"It is a country that allows trans people into the
army," and has "progressive stances on women's and LGBTOIA's rights".

The other side questions that notion. Linda Sarsour, a prominent Palestian-American activist, has been an outspoken proponent of the view that you can't be a Zionist feminist.

As an Arab woman raised in America, I don't so much question the choice of Gal Gadot to play Won-der Woman – because, in point of fact, Hollywood rarely denies actors roles because of their beliefs and moviegoers hardly care – but her elevation as a global feminist icon. Is it appropriate that an outspoken Zionist - a woman who supports the idea of a national identity rooted in another's national erasure – should become the emblem of powerful Western womanhood?

In the end, despite its efforts, Wonder Woman merely exposes the dominant narrative of white women's feminism and the global indifference to Palestine's plight. Its failures to challenge the sta-tus quo are too important to ignore, because a feminism rooted in oppression is no feminism at all. What is 'cognitive reserve'? How we can protect our brains from memory loss and dementia

we get older we have a greater Arisk of developing impairments in areas of cognitive function – such as memory, reasoning and verbal ability. We also have a greater risk of dementia, which is what we call cognitive decline that interferes with daily life. The trajectory of this cognitive decline can vary considerably from one person to the next.

Despite these varying trajectories, one thing is for sure: even cognitively normal people experience patholog-ical changes in their brain, including degeneration and atrophy, as they age. By the time a person reaches the age of 70 to 80, these changes closely resemble those seen in the brains of

people with Alzheimer's Disease.
Even so, many people are able to function normally in the presence of significant brain damage and pathology. So why do some experience symptoms of Alzheimer's and dementia, while others remain sharp of mind?
It comes down to something called

cognitive reserve. This is a concept used to explain a person's capacity to maintain normal cognitive function in the presence of brain pathology. To put it simply, some people have better

cognitive reserve than others.

Evidence shows the extent of someone's cognitive decline doesn't occur in line with the amount of bi-ological damage in their brain as it ages. Rather, certain life experiences determine someone's cognitive re-serve and, therefore, their ability to avoid dementia or memory loss.

HOW DO WE KNOW?

Being educated, having higher levels of social interaction or working in cognitively demanding occupations (managerial or professional roles, for instance) increases resilience to cognitive decline and dementia. Many studies have shown this. These studies followed people over a number of years and looked for signs of them de-veloping cognitive decline or dementia in that period.

Cognitive reserve is traditionally measured and quantified based on self reports of life experience such as education level, occupational complexity and social engagement. While these measures provide an indication of re-serve, they're only of limited use if we want to identify those at risk of cogni tive decline. Genetic influences obviously play a part in our brain development and will influence resilience.

The fundamental brain mechanisms that underpin cognitive reserve are still unclear. The brain consists of complex, richly interconnected networks that are responsible for our cognitive ability. These networks have the capacity to change and adapt to task demands or brain damage. And this capacity is essential not only for normal brain function, but also for maintaining cognitive performance in later life.

This adaptation is governed by brain plasticity. This is the brain's abil-ity to continuously modulate its structure and function throughout life in response to different experiences. So, plasticity and flexibility in brain networks likely contribute in a major way to cognitive reserve and these pro-cesses are influenced by both genetic profiles and life experiences.

A major focus of our research is

examining how brain connectivity and plasticity relate to reserve and cognitive function. We hope this will help identify a measure of reserve that reliably identifies individuals at risk of cognitive decline. STRENGTHENING YOUR BRAIN

While there is little we can do about our genetic profile, adapting our lifestyles to include certain types of behaviours offers a significant opportu-

nity to improve our cognitive reserve.
Activities that engage your brain, such as learning a new language and completing crosswords, as well as having high levels of social interaction, increase reserve and can reduce

your risk of developing dementia.

Regular physical activity also improves cognitive function and reduces the risk of dementia. Unfortunately, little evidence is available to suggest what type of physical activi-ty, as well as intensity and amount, is required to best increase reserve and

protect against cognitive impairment.

There is also mounting evidence that being sedentary for long periods of the day is bad for health. This might even undo any benefits gained from periods of physical activity. So, it is important to understand how the composition of physical activity across the day impacts brain health and reserve,

and this is an aim of our work.
Our ongoing studies should contribute to the development of evidence-based guidelines that provide clear advice on physical activity pat-terns for optimising brain health and

Processions taken out in Darjeeling, shutdown continues

DARJEELING, JUN 24 (PTI): People wearing the traditional Gorkha attire marched through the streets of Darjeeling today in support of Gorkhaland as the indefinite shutdown in the hills

entered its 10th day.

Internet services remained suspended and local cable channels remained blocked in certain parts of the hills.

Meanwhile, the family members of a Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) activist, who was allegedly killed in police firing on June 17, lodged a complaint against the police.

The police had earlier de-nied the allegation of opening fire at the GIM activists.

The GIM has decided to burn copies of the Gorkha Territorial Administration (GTA) Accord, signed in 2011 between the

Union home ministry, the West Bengal government and the outfit, on June 26 and 27.

The elected members of the GTA, belonging to the GJM, which is leading the stir, resigned en masse yesterday.

GJM chief Bimal Gurung, who had surfaced in public yester-day, addressed the media at the party's stronghold at Patlebas and threatened to "fight till the end" for their one-point agenda of a separate Gorkhaland.

Meanwhile, Bengal BIP chief Dilip Ghosh denied that the saffron party had ever talked about Gorkhaland.

"We had never talked about Gorkhaland. Didi (West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee) had signed the GTA accord. We are not in favour of creation of states on the basis of any linguistic group or community. We had said this earlier too.

"If states are to be created on the basis of a linguistic group or community, we would have to support all such demands such as those of the Kamta-puris, Rajbanshis etc. We were never in support of this," he told

reporters in Alipurduar.

The GJM is an ally of the BJP in the NDA.

Gurung had said that talks were on with the Centre and that he was hopeful of "positive results".

Students stranded at several

boarding schools were evacuat-ed yesterday after the GJM offered them a 12-hour "window"

till 6 pm to leave the hills safely.
A case of murder, arson, assault on police personnel and conspiracy to incite violence was filed against Gurung and his wife Asha on June 17.

The Calcutta High Court has directed that notice be served on Gurung by all means possible in view of a PIL, challenging the indefinite bandh called by the GJM in Darjeeling.

The West Bengal government yesterday offered a dia-logue to the GJM leadership in a bid to defuse the crisis with Home Secretary Malay De saying that the doors were "open for talks to restore normalcy in

The government also sent a letter to Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh protesting Sikkim Chief Minister Pawan Kumar Chamling's support to the GJM's Gorkhaland demand terming it as "unconstitutional".

We never talked about Gorkhaland: WB BJP president

Thousands evacuated as 27 UK highrise towers fail safety test

housands of residents were to-Thousands of residents were to-day evacuated from four housing towers as the UK government in the wake of the deadly Grenfell Tower blaze found 27 high-rise residential blocks across Britain unsafe.

Residents of 650 flats in four tower blocks on an estate in the Swiss Cottage area of north London were evacuated last night by the lo-cal Camden Council, following tests ordered in the wake of the Grenfell Tower blaze on June 14 which claimed at least 79 lives and displaced hundreds others.

The estates evacuated were found to have cladding similar to Grenfell Tower, which Scotland Yard confirmed as a factor for the fire spreading rapidly through the 24-storey building after a fridge-freezer burst in one of the flats.

Local councils and housing authorities have been given until Monday to submit cladding samples for these tests to ensure the material used on the exterior of their residential blocks are not made up of similar flammable material as in the massive Grenfell Tower blaze in west London last week.

The Metropolitan Police, which had launched a criminal investigation into the Grenfell Tower trag-edy, has said that detectives are keeping open the option of bringmanslaughter charges relating to the Grenfell fire.

Camden Council's Labour party leader Georgia Gould said the council had acted "as swiftly as we possibly can" to ensure people's safety after the fire service said they could not guarantee the residents' safety in those blocks

"I know it's difficult, but Gren fell changes everything and I just don't believe we can take any risk with our residents' safety and I have to put them first," she said.

"I offered to pay for fire stations to be stationed outside all of those blocks so we could have a couple of days to get the work done but the message was there was absolutely nothing I could do to make those blocks safe that night," she added.
Refurbishment on the Chalcots

Estate evacuated overnight was also overseen by Rydon, the company involved in the refit of Grenfell Tower, according to its website.

ing Street on behalf of Prime Minister Theresa May said: "My thoughts are with residents being evacuated in Camden while their homes are made safe tonight. We will work with and support the emergency services and relevant authorities to safeguard the public".

Many residents have reacted

with anger at being moved out of their homes and 83 have so far refused to leave their homes on the Chalcots Estate.

The council has said that if neople still choose to not leave their homes then it would "become a matter for the fire services".

Once the flats are evacuated,

the external thermal cladding from five tower blocks on the Chalcots Estate will be removed.

There were also concerns raised about the insulation of gas pipes going into flats, and fire doors. The council has secured 270 hotel rooms to house the residents

Emergency accommodation has also been set up at Swiss Cottage Leisure Centre and at the Camden Centre in King's Cross nearby.

Srikanth beats Shi Yuqi, reaches 3rd successive Super Series final

SYDNEY, JUN 24 (PTI): Kidambi Srikanth continued his dream run and grabbed a third succes-sive Super Series final spot at the Australian Open with a straightgame victory over China's Shi Yuqi here today. Srikanth, who had reached the summit clash in Singapore

and Indonesia, joined Indonesia's Sony Dwi Kuncoro, Malaysia's Lee Chong Wei, the Chinese duo of Chen Long and Lin Dan to become only the fifth player in the world to contest three successive Super Series finals.

A former World No.3. Srikanth, who had reached the semifinals in the last edition, produced vet another near-perfect performance to outclass All England finalist Shi 21-10 21-14 England finalist Shi 21-10 21-14 in a 37-minute match to notch up his second win over the Chinese. Srikanth had beaten him at the quarters of the Singapore Open in April.

"It's a dream performance," said Srikanth, who had suffered a stress fracture in his right ankle after the Olympics.

"I played a World Super Series final (Singapore Open) after two years, and then to play the next two finals is a dream for sure."

"I was in control of the whole match, I didn't give him any easy



points at the start. It's just that I had to stay there, he's someone who wants to keep the shuttle in play and goes for the odd shot, so I wanted to stay there and not give him easy points. I was in control at the net

Srikanth will play either reigning Olympic champion and twotime World champion and All England champion Chen Long or Korea's Lee Hyun II in the finals. "I have no thoughts about the

Man arrested for cheating over 2,000 people in tourist scam

New Delhi, Jun 24 (PTI): Delhi Police have arrested a 40- year-old man for allegedly cheating more than 2,000 people from all over India of crores on the pretext of providing luxurious holiday tour packages in five-star hotels.

The accused, Raman Kapoor, is

wanted in several cases of cheating in Delhi, Uttar Pradesh and Gujarat. He was arrested on the intervening night of June 19 and 20 outside Kalinga Hotel, south Tukaganj in Indore, Madhya Pradesh, said Deputy Commissioner of Police (Crime) Madhur Verma.

Kapoor had opened a firm in the name of 'Sun Star The Club' and 'Goodluck Hotels Pvt Ltd'. He used to send his employees to busy marketplaces and petrol pumps with coupons of their company

They would ask visitors to these places to fill up these forms. They would tell visitors that if their names come up in a lucky draw, they would be invited for free dinner with family in a five-star hotel in the city.

Later, they used to call the victims to a hotel with family for dinner and his employees used to lure them by showing features and facilities provided by the club.

After the customers would be convinced, they would be charged between Rs one to 1.5 lakh for different types of membership in the company by showing different grade hotels, said the officer. After paying the amount to the accused, the cus-

tomers, however, would not be able to avail the perks of the membership they had taken.

Police had received a complaint

from Manoj Kumar, a resident of Patel Garden, Uttam Nagar that he had been cheated to the tune of Rs 1.12 lakh.

The company representatives cheated the complainant on the pretext of providing holiday packages for 12 nights per year in five-star hotels with air-tickets for 20 years after

membership.

They claimed that Sunstar company has tie-ups with various five-star properties located at prime tourist locations in India and abroad like JW Marriott, Le Meridien, ITC Welcome, Leela Ambience Hotel and others,

said the DCP.

The accused also told him that he can discontinue membership in the tenth or twentieth year and he will get back the entire membership amount. They also offered a refund of Rs 2,000 for each holiday to those who did not

avail the offers.

However, when Kumar tried to avail the holiday offers, he did not get any response from the company, said the officer.

A Crime Branch team conducted several raids in Delhi, Gujarat, Mum-bai, UP and Madhya Pradesh in search of the accused persons since they had duped several people in these states with the same modus operandi, he

Over 140 people feared buried in China landslide

KJM VARMA Beijing, Jun 24 (PTI):

Over 140 people were feared buried today after a massive landslide smashed into their homes in southwest China's Si-chuan Province after which rescuers frantically scoured through the rub ble for survivors.

The landslide from a high part of a mountain in Tibetan and Qiang Autonomous Prefecture of Aba hit Xinmo Village in Maoxian County at about 6 AM, blocking a 2 km section of a river and burying 1,600 etres of road

The landslide smashed into 46 homes, where about 141 people were feared to be buried. State television showed large groups of rescuers trying to scour through the mud and

A family of three was pulled out alive from the rubble, the Mao County vernment said on its of

ficial Weibo page.

The couple and their baby are being treated at the Mao County People's Hospital, the post said. It did not provide further details on their identities.

Chinese President Xi

Jinping has ordered allout efforts to save people buried in the landslide.

The provincial gov-ernment has launched the highest level of disaster relief response and sent rescue teams to the site, state-run Xinhua news agency reported.

More than 300 rescuers carrying excavation

and life- detection instruwere rushed to the site, said Tang Limin, spokesperson of Sichuan provincial government

Pictures posted by the People's Daily newspaper showed bulldozers mov-ing earth and large boulders as the rescue efforts continued.

Local police told state

broadcaster CCTV that the landslide had been triggered by recent heavy rains in the region and that the situation was made worse by a lack of vegetation in the area. "There are several tonnes of rock," police cap-

tain Chen Tiebo told the broadcaster, adding that, "It's a seismic area here."

Roads in the county were closed to all traffic except emergency services. Landslides are a regular danger in mountainous regions of China, especially during heavy rains. In 2008, 87,000 people

were killed when an earth-quake struck Wenchuan county in Sichuan prov-ince. In Maoxian county, 37 tourists were killed when their coach was buried in a landslide caused by the earthquake.

Pak mourns attack victims; army launches crackdown

PESHAWAR, JUN 24 (PTI): Pakistan was in a state of shock after weeks of relative peace as terrorists struck at three cities, killing 62 people and wounding over 100, prompting the army ınch a countrywide crackdown on militants

A suicide bomber yes-terday blew up his explosives-laden car near In-spector General of Police Ehsan Mehboob's office in Quetta, the capital of Balochistan province, killing at least 13 people, including seven policemen, and wounding 21 others.

The blast was claimed both the local affili-of the Islamic State terror group and by Jamaat-ul-Ahrar (JuA), a splinter group of the Teh-rik-e-Taliban Pakistan.

Hours later, twin blasts tore through a market crowded with the people shopping for Eid in the Shia-dominated Parachinar city in the Kurram tribal region yesterday, killing at least 45 people, mostly Shi-

as, and injuring 75 others. Banned Lashkar-e-Jhangvi Sunni militant group linked with the Taln took responsibility the attack.

The first blast occurred during rush hour in Turi Market, where a bus terminal is also located. The second blast took place as rescuers and bystanders rushed to aid those who had been hurt

in the first explosion.

At least 45 people have been killed and 80 others injured in Parachinar, an official from the local administration said.

Officials said the blasts on the last Friday of the holy month of Ramazan targeted people shopping in the area and those heading out of the city ahead of Eid.

Separately in the evening, three militants rid-ing on two motorbikes killed four policemen in a restaurant in Karachi.

Police said that a banned group was in-volved in killing of cops in Karachi but did not identi-

fy the attackers.

However, pamphlets found from the spot of attack in Karachi showed that previously little known outfit Ansar al- Sharia Pakistan has claimed responsibility for the attack. It also warned to launch an opera-tion against security forces.

It appears to be in retaliation for Radd-ul Fas-sad operation launched by security forces earlier this year to eliminate the facilitators of militants

With former US governor Arnold Schwarzenegger at his side, French President Emmanuel Macron has repeated his catchphrase "Make the planet great again" - a swipe at President Trump's "Make America great again" slogan. UN chief's meetings with India, Pak PMs sign of his commitment to Kashmir issue: aide

N Secretary General Antonio
Guterres' several meetings with Prime Ministers of India and Pa-kistan in the six months since he assumed charge is a sign of his involvement and commitment over the Kashmir issue, according to one of his spokespersons. Guterres, in his first press con-

ference here this week, had ac-knowledged that through his meet-ings with Prime Ministers Narendra Modi and Nawaz Sharif, he is engaged in bringing about dialogue between the South Asian neigh-bours to resolve the Kashmir issue.

"I think what he was saving was that he has been engaged with these leaders. He's met them five times in total since he's become Secretary-General. I think that's a sign of his commitment to the issue, his interest and his involvement in the issue," the UN Chief's associate spokesperson Eri Kaneko told re-porters at the daily press briefing

here yesterday. Kaneko was asked details regarding the discussions between Guterres, Modi and Sharif and whether any commitment was given by the Indian and Pakistani leadthe Kashmir issue.

"What the leaders agreed on is for them to say, them to announce It's not for us to say. But, the point that he (Guterres) was making and that we continue to make is that he is very engaged on the issue, and we'll let you know if there is anything," Kaneko said.

When asked again if the Secretary-General got any commitment from the two leaders on engaging in dialogue, Kaneko said, "any commitment from the leaders is a question for them. It's not something for us to nounce."

Responding to a question whether he is engaged in bringing about dialogue between India and Pakistan to mostly the state of the state o Pakistan to resolve the Kashmir dispute, Guterres had said, "why do you think I met three times the Prime Minister of Pakistan and two times the Prime Minister of India

"For someone accused of do-ing nothing, it is quite a number of meetings," he said, referring to criticism that he has been shying away and is reluctant to act to defuse ten-sions between India and Pakistan over the Kashmir issue.

Modi and Guterres had met in St Petersburg in June on the sidelines of the St Petersburg International Economic Forum.

During the meeting, Modi had stressed on multilateralism to ad-dress global challenges such as ter-

Sharif and the UN chief had met on the sidelines of the World Economic Forum at Davos in January and again this month in Astana on the sidelines of the Shanghai Coop-eration Organisation (SCO) summit.

Guterres spokesman Stephane Dujarric, when asked at press briefings about the Secretary General s response to the situation in Kashmir, has repeatedly said that Gu-terres is following the situation in the region closely.

The UN Chief has not made any

direct intervention to resolve the is sue, reiterating his call for India and Pakistan to find a peaceful solution through engagement and dialogue to resolve the Kashmir issue

Pakistan continuously raises the Kashmir issue at the UN seeking the world body's intervention in the dispute with India. But New Delhi has always maintained that Kashmir is a bilateral issue with Islamabad.


