On 20 Jan, Mr Tamang distributed approval letters to 429 teachers who had been given ap-pointment in various hill schools in 2010 by the Darjeeling Gorkha Hill

Council.
With approval coming only through the DGHC education secretary and not the district inspector of schools, the teachers' post retirement benefits were in doubt, the approval letters put such doubts to rest.

The Nyingma Monlam Chenmo is underway at Bodhgaya [until 26 Jan] where around 10,000 devotees from all over the world are gathered seeking blessings from the Dalai Lama and just by being at the holy site where Lord Buddha gained enlightenment. Such a huge gathering also means brisk business for locals and some visitors. Outside the Mahabodhi temple, one hawker sells 'sungdi' a luge gathering also means bits obstiness on locals and some visitories. ### Mahatma Gandhi assassination case records part of Indian heritage: HC

NEW DELHI, JAN 21 (PTI): Terming the records pertaining to Mahatma Gandhi's assassination as part of India's "cultural heritage", the Delhi High Court has asked the Cen-tre how it intends to collect and maintain the entire case information as was directed by transparency panel CIC.

The poser by Justice Vibhu Bakhru came while hearing a plea by the Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) challenging an order of the Central Information Commission (CIC) which had directed it to provide the police investigation's original records including the case diaries and final charge sheet to an RTI applicant.

Delhi Police to provide information about efforts made by it to arrest three absconders-Gangadhar Dahawate, Surva Dev Sharma and Gangadhar

The home ministry told the court that it was not the au-thority which had all the information and it would probably be available with the Ministry of Culture, the National Archives or Delhi Police.

It also told the court that the Ministry of Culture was working on collecting and preserving the information pertaining to the case as the directions were also issued to it by the CIC.

The court, however, said if

with the home ministry, it can access or call for the same from other authorities.

It asked the home ministry how it intended to ensure max-imum implementation of the objective of the CIC order.

"Tell us how you are going to do it," it queried and the ministry's lawyer said he will have to seek instructions. The court, thereafter, listed

the matter for further hearing on February 12. The CIC order had come on a plea by Odisha-based RTI applicant Hemant Panda who had told the commission that he was a researcher and interested in studying the records pertaining to the assassination

shot dead on January 30, 1948 by Nathuram Godse, a right-

wing activist. Panda had claimed that he had studied the records, in-cluding those in the repository of the National Archives of ry or the National Archives of India (NAI), but could not find two important documents--the final charge sheet by Delhi Police and order of execution

In his RTI application, Pan-da had raised three queries on which he needed clarity -- the efforts made to arrest the absconders in the case, the reasons for acquitting other two accused and whether a copy of final charge sheet and order of execution of Godse are missing

The CIC had directed Delhi Police to transfer its original records, which show its efforts to trace the absconders in the case, to the NAI for preserva-

The commission had also noted that there was "no offi-cial compilation of records at

one place about his death".

"The police have a duty to explain what efforts were taken to arrest three absconding accused or why they could not be traced. The Ministry of Home Affairs has an onerous responsibility to take up this task and place all of those records with the NAI for general access of the public," the CIC had said.

Jaswinder Singh Dha liwal was playing pool with friends at the Royal Canadian Legion, a Canadian ex-service organisa-tion that includes people who have served in military, when the manage ment approached the group and asked him to remove his patka as it was its policy to remove any headgear out of respect for the veterans, CBC News reported.

However, religious garments are exempted from the legion s policy banning head

coverings.

The incident took place on Wednesday at Tignish town in Canada's Prince Edward Island.

"THERE IS A need for multi-dimensional support and nurturing entrepreneurship skills by helping farmers, startups and SMEs in food processing sector in Sikkim," said Principal Secretary-Department of Commerce & Industry, Government of Sikkim, Arvind Kumar, at Associ-ated Chambers of Commerce of India [ASSOCHAM] event held in Gangtok on 18 Jan, a press release informs.

While addressing the conference

on "Linking Startups and SMEs in Food Processing with Government Schemes & Markets" in collaboration with the Ministry of Food Processing Industries, he expressed the need to promote co-operative system and contract farming so as to enable aggregation of holding, production, technology etc. for economic pros-

He also emphasized on the need for partnerships for training and competence building marketing, processing, projects and infrastructure development to accelerate growth and development to Food processing sector in this region leading to more jobs, incomes and opportunities for



the people of this region.

He further suggested diversifying agriculture in Sikkim via Organic Farming, veterinary, poultry, floriculture etc. He also gave a holistic picture of the Indian Food industry as well as scope of sikkim to get itself in the forefront.

"Market linkage is the major problem faced by Sikkim farmers; hence industry associations like ASSOCHAM should focus on build-ing external market linkage for food processing units in Sikkim," Mr Ku-

Dr Jyoti Prakash Tamang stated north eastern region with agro friendly climate and agrarian roots has potential to be sunrise zone for food processing and other agro business industry. He further added that the geo-climatic situation of Sikkim offers an excellent scope for growing different varieties of fruits, vegetables, spices, plantation crops dicinal and aromatic plants of high economic value.

"There is a need to diagnose the

problems in the region for providing an improved production and mar keting environment and value added economic benefit to farmers through appropriate science and technological policies for various post harvest functions in food processing indus-try," Dr Tamang expressed.

The state goes to polls on February 18 and the results for the sixty constituencies will be de clared on March 3.

Official sources have said the entire election process is likely to continue till March 5.

The Class XII examinations, which were scheduled to begin on March 5, will now commence on March 8 in view of the upcoming elections," TBSE presi-dent Mihir Kanti Deb told

reporters here today.

The schedule for Class X exams remains unchanged.

This year, around 27,000 candidates will be appearing for Class XII examinations and nearly 55,000 students will sit for Class X examinations, Deb added.

### **IMA Sikkim Branch condemns National Medical Commission Bill**

GANGTOK, 21 JAN:

The Indian Medical Association (registered under the Societies Act XXI of1860), Sikkim State Branch in a meeting held in Gangtok on 20 Jan had a deliberation on the proposed National Medical Commission Bill that is slated to be discussed in the Parliament.
A press release issued

by the State Branch has voiced its support on the nationwide opposition of the bill.

"The bill is against the interest of the doctor community and the wel-fare of the patient," reads the release.

The Association has also condemned the specific provisions of the act which allows non-allopractitioners to take a bridge course and non-qualified prepare non-qualified practitioners putting risk to healthcare delivery system in the country.

In a letter addressed to Member of Parliament and Chairman of Parliamentary Standing Committee on Health & Family Welfare, Professor Ram Gopal Yadav the State Branch president, Dr SK Dewan and honorary secretary, Dr DF Rai have requested the committee to reconsider the bill and include more representations of modern medical professionals in the system to safeguard the nobility of

The National Medical Commission (NMC) Bill, 2017, seeks to replace the Medical Council of India (MCI) with a new body. Around 2.9 lakh doctors had come onto the streets in protest on 02 Jan. NMC Bill 2017 was presented in the Lok Sabha on 29 Dec 2017 and was scheduled to be discussed on 02 Jan, however, the government referred the controversial National Medical Commission Bill, to a Stand-

ing Committee which has been asked to give its recommendation prior to the Budget session.
The Bill proposes a

government-nominated chairman and members, who will be selected by a committee under the Cabinet Secretary. The medical fraternity is opposing the clause, fear-ing that the body would effectively be run by the government. The Bill also allows practitioners of Avurveda and other tra-

ditional Indian systems of medicine the licence to prescribe allopath-ic drugs after they have passed a 'bridge course.'

In its current form, the l does away with the MCI and brings in a national licentiate examination

The government claims that the Bill will ease the processes for colleges to manage undergraduate and post-graduate courses. Earlier, the MCI's approval was needed for establishing, renewing, and increasing seats in an undergraduate course. Under the new proposal, permission needs to be sought only for establishment and recognition.

The IMA said that the NMC would not be "national" as it did not represent all States. In its merging of Ayush with modern medicine, it posed a potential threat to patients and was as risky as an untested medical "trial."



#### Nar Bahadur Limboo aka Jaributtiwala decodes Ayurvedic knowledge for treating people

#### REBYNA RANA GANGTOK, 20 JAN:

64-year-old Nar Baha-dur Limboo hailing from Gumpadara at Ut-taray in Maneybong Dentam is commonly known Jaributtiwala and has been treating people with his self-gained knowledge in Ayurvedic medication. He is a certified practitioner-baidya. He was spotted selling Ayurvedic medicines from a stall at MG Marg during the Red Panda Winter Carnival Festival.

Jaributtiwala, while speaking to Sommit-times, says that healing people's wounds, from basic to intense, gives him a satisfying feeling.

"I have been collectng jaributti herbs for the past 30 years from the jungles of local ar-eas. I started putting them up for sale 26 years ago. I basically sell these homemade Ayurvedic homemade medicines from my home itself. If any department invites me to hold a stall for sale of these medicines, I willingly do the same for the betterment of the people. I have treated many untreat-able diseases of people through my medicines. If people find it inconve nient to visit my place to fetch medicines, I send

them through vehicles. I am overwhelmed by the good response from the people who have tested my medicines. I collect these jaributtis from local surrounding jungles, from my own paddy where I have planted the medicines and also from Nepal. I treat people with disease like diabetes mellitus, piles hemorrhoids, urinary disorders, asth-ma, stones, tooth pain, gastritis, hypertension, etc., with locally available herbs. I treat snake bites as well," says Jaributtiwa-

Inheriting the knowledge of the medicinal usage of locally available herbs from his grandfather, Jaributtiwala gradstarted expanding his knowledge with his own effort and has today mastered it.

"I may look old from my appearance but my soul is still young and energy still vibrant. I feel very happy serving people and helping them regain energy and a new life," expresses Jaributtiwala

#### Doklam's Back in the News

...and so is the hyperventilation and lack of context

So, the Doklam area, that "plateau" contested between China and Bhutan - at least that is how we in India would have the world believe - is back in the

Its return to the headlines followed a leaking route similar to how the issue had first made news - an obvious nudge towards the story from army/ defence "sources". In the present instance, news reports speak of satellite images revealing Chinese army build-up and construction in the area. It is unlikely that TV channel, even the desh-bhakts types, have satellites keeping watch over our borders. That info was obviously "shared" by defence or intelligence agencies. Although the images are obviously of the Doklam area, it is also unlikely that this was verified by our news channels before they broadcast it. Ear-lier, during its "sensational" debut on national news about a year or so back, TV news anchors dubbed running commentaries on a video of Indian and Chinese soldiers in a shoving match in the Doklam area. These were not captured by an embedded journalist but fell on their laps through WhatsApp groups but no mention was made of the source. This smartphone video was not much different from other videos of similar jostling matches between Indian and Chinese soldiers in this sector. Journalists in these parts have been privy to such visuals for a while now and anyone who knows the borders here, should also know that such confrontations are common at least in the Doklam sector and have been the routine for the past nearly four and a half decades. In their own way, the nature of the stand-offs are also reassuring because, irrespective of what the breathless TV anchors would want you to see, the confrontations are actually quite civil – they shove a bit and hold their line, but never exchange blows and "never, ever" even point guns at each other. If, the "situation" was really as grim as the commentators speculate it to be, don't you think at least a bloody nose would have been caught in those

Interestingly, when the news first broke, most nationalist, oops, national, journalists could not even be bothered by geography and for several weeks led viewers to believe that Doklam was part of India or danced around the suggestion that it was contested between India. China and Bhutan. But that is not the case. As far as India and Bhutan are concerned, it is settled that Doklam belongs to Bhutan. When it comes to Bhutan and China though, it is not very clear what the two have settled upon, and therein lies the rub - why is it always India that screams Doklam while not even a reflex whimper of protest has come out of Bhutan unless goaded by India? Why do the experts not question the obvious hilarity of Doklam somehow making the chicken's neck corridor within tactical "stone's throw" reach of the Chinese? And how come the so-called Defence experts not know of army reports dating back to the late Sixties that the Chinese were taking undue interest in the Doklam area and that India should head them off in collaboration with Bhutan. The top-brass ignored these warnings for four and a half decades and is now hyperventilating and misinforming. They need to be called out. We also need to know Bhutan's thoughts and position on the issue - their actual position and not those they are nudged towards by us. Any long-term solution for the Doklam sector will require Bhutan's interests to be prioritised, understood and respected. One does not see any of that happening.

And what about Sikkim? The actors in play do re-

alise that this entire drama is playing out in the Sikkim sector, don't they? And since it does, does Sikkim not deserve some explanations and reassurances? But none have been forthcoming. And still Sikkim is expected to pay the price. The State and its stakeholders lost an entire Kailash Mansarovar Yatra season to the Doklam stand-off and months of border trade and weeks of tourism in the area were also suspended due to this situation. Rumours were allowed to run around unchallenged and movement of people restricted and monitored without enough explanations. If the drama is to play out from Sikkim's soil, the State needs to be provided more than a mute bystander's role.

### **Guide to the Classics: Anna Karenina**

"IN ORDER FOR A BOOK TO BE
GOOD," said Leo Tolstoy to his wife
Sonya on March 2 1877, "one has to love its basic, fundamental idea. Thus, in Anna Karenina, I loved the idea of the family." These words Sonya copied into her diary on March 3.

This "idea" plays out through the plot of Anna Karenina, published be-tween 1874 and 1876, and often acclaimed as the best novel ever written. It begins with one of the most famous first lines in fiction: "Happy families are all alike; ev-

ery unhappy family is unhappy in its

The first of the novel's two major plot lines relates to the irresistible Anna, who "had not known family life", being brought up by an aunt and married off to the considerably older Alexei Karenin. The second depicts the landowner Konstantin Levin (a frontman for the novel's estate-owning author) who loves, loses but ultimately marries Kitty Shcherbatsky, the youngest daughter of parents devoted to their children and each other.

The two strands are linked by the lovable womaniser Stiva Oblonsky, who is Anna's brother, Levin's best friend, and Kitty's brother-in-law. Anna travels from St Petersburg to Moscow to patch up a hiccup in Stiva's

marriage to Dolly (Kitty's older sister). At the station she finds herself instantly and mutually attracted to the dashing army officer Alexei Vronsky, who is collecting his mother from the same train. The enthralling narrative follows all three couples and finally results in one happy marriage (Levin and Kitty), one that just jogs along (Stiva and Dolly), and the infamous re lationship that ends in the titular char acter's suicide (Anna and Vronsky).

Tolstoy, the youngest of four brothers, was always going to be a writer, but having inherited a large family estate, became a landowner as well. He was crankily opposed to romantic love and conflicted about sex. Only after much procrastination, at the age of 34, would he marry 18-year-old Sonya Behrs and see her aise eight children – though she endured 16 pregnancies.

His sometimes tortured personal views – the 1889 novella The Kreuzer Sonata is little more than a diatribe against sex, love and marriage – provide the unifying context for Anna Karenina. THE BIGGER PICTURE

Yet "family" is far from the only theme

in the novel. Both Tolstoy and his writing are striking for their preoccupation with significant issues affect-ing humanity, then and now: nationalism (which Tolstoy foregrounded in War and Peace), spirituality, pacifism, brotherhood, agriculture and modernisation (read: technology).

In Anna Karenina, Tolstoy's lifelong concern with spirituality is at

the heart of Levin's struggle with the church's requirements for confession before marriage. Levin, like Tolstoy himself, objects to the Russian Orthodox Church both in principle (its hypocrisy, wealth, authoritarianism,

nationalism) and in practice.

The author's opposition to industrialisation is also recognisable in the narrative. The fact that Anna meets her lover Vronsky on a train platform, and ultimately dies under the wheel

of a train, reflects this opposition.

Tolstoy struggled with these themes on a daily basis and explored them in both his long and shorter writ-ings, embodying their effects in characters we feel we know intimately - cer-

tainly enough to love or loathe them.

That we do react with such a sense of total immersion is due to Tolstov's deep understanding of human nature and his ability to draw us into any one of an infinitude of emotions. He admitted that when he "wrote" a character, no matter how antithetical to himself they might be, he felt convinced that for those moments he was that person. The result then reads as if he had actually lived every one of their desires, aspirations and faults before laying them before us.

A CONFLICTED MORALIST

Yet, perhaps because it was a genuine and essential aspect of Tolstoy's own world view, moral judgment is always present in his writing. Though not spelled out, this judgment is implied by unavoidable cause and effect in human actions.

In Anna's case her passion for Vronsky results in a sexual liaison that leads to the breakdown of her marriage, separation from her son, and almost complete isolation from society. Clinging to her (unlicensed) liaison with Vronsky, who tries helplessly to make up for these losses by being everything to her, she moves from emotional dependence to un-founded jealousy to final, self-destructive despair.

At the start the reader feels, with Anna, that what she does is wonderful and romantic, but it then becomes counterproductive and, finally, a disaster. This is Tolstoy in both his guises: the empathetic writer and the moralist, determined to show that family values must triumph over personal gratification.

#### A TIMELESS NARRATIVE

Anna Karenina has generated four ballets, six stage plays, ten operas and 16 films. English-language versions include a 1935 black-and-white film starring Greta Garbo - much treasured despite the incompatibility be-tween Garbo's signature languor and Tolstoy's emphasis on the title char-acter's "suppressed animation". More recently, a 2012 British film

with Keira Knightley was ridiculed by Russian film critics, mainly due to Knightley's performance. There have been seven television adaptations, including two by the BBC. In Australia we had a television version loosely based on the novel, The Beautiful Lie (2015), which was set in the present day.

New translations of the novel are steadily brought out, but no final agreement on "the best" can ever be arrived at. Opinions differ as to how far the translator should divert from fidelity to the text's language in order to achieve greater closeness to the "spirit" or "intention" of the author. Some critics still champion Con-

stance Garnett's dubious translation of 1901, despite mistakes made in the text (many of these were corrected in a revised edition by Leonard Kent and Nina Berberova in 1965). Others pre fer that of Louise and Aylmer Maude (1918) who, living in Russia, were able to go over each line with the author.

Both translations are still available, but many contemporary critics prefer newer ventures that aim for a more "with it" vocabulary or a trendier style. Fortunately, Tolstoy's waiving of his translation rights ensures that a stream of forever-new versions will always reflect inevita-ble changes in language usage and social perceptions.

This superb novel will never gath-er dust because, while mores and attitudes - like translations - change with the times, desire in its various manifestations will always be with us, as will the conscience that must decide whether any of them ought to be reined in.

### The term 'LGBTI' confuses desire, behaviour and identity - it's time for a rethink

The rise of sexually transmissible diseases made front-page news in The Age (Australia), which tried to make sense of the rise among "gay men" and "hetero-

exual people".

This illustrates the increasingly common confusion between behaviour and identity. What is involved is sexual contact, or to use the expression common in the early days of the AIDS epidemic, "the exchange of bodily fluids". Whether peo-ple involved have a particular identity, as

the words used in the report suggest, is irrelevant.

Desire, behaviour and identity are distinct, and they do not always overlap. Someone who is celibate may also have strong sexual desires or even a particular sexual identity; someone may identify as heterosexual but have homosexual experiences; most people will have sexual desires that are not necessarily acted out in practice.

Freud knew this, even as he constructed elab orate explanations for how our sexual beings are created. Alfred Kinsey shocked Americans 60 years ago when he revealed the extent of homosexual behaviour among men who would have denied any homosexual identity.

Contemporary research - for example, the Australian Study of Health and Relationships gests that behaviour, desire and identity overlap in complex ways.

Yet contemporary usage, with its emphasis on identities, ignores these complexities. The term "LGBTI" combines sexuality (lesbian, gay, bisexual) with gender identity (trans) and gender characteristics (intersex).

At a recent conference, one speaker declared himself "a proud LGBTI person". A moment's reflec-tion suggests this is very unlikely.

Being trans - that is, to question whether one's biological characteristics determine one's sense of gender – implies neither heterosexual nor homosexual desires. Indeed, if we accept that gender is fluid,



it makes nonsense of a binary division between hetero- and homosexual. This may be why social conservatives feel so threatened by "gender ideology".

Sexual and gender fluidity are common themes in most cultures, and novels, opera and film are rich in their exploration of this fluidity. As Patrick White wrote in his memoir Flaws in the Glass: "Ambivalence has given me insights into human nature, denied, I believe, to those who are unequivocally male or female.'

The recent film Call Me By Your Name tells the story of two young men who have a brief relationship one summer in Italy. Neither identifies as "gay", and the elder seems largely heterosexual in his subsequent life. Yet some critics complained at the absence of identity politics – one even com-plained that openly gay men had not played the leading roles – ignoring the basic premise that desire does not equal identity.

The use of the acronym "LGBTI", sometimes with added letters to indicate "queer", "asexuals" or "allies", is a direct product of American identity politics, and one increasingly used in debates about human rights. But there is a far neater alternative language, which is the term "SOGI": sexual orientation and gender identity, the preferred usage in international human rights discourses.

There are three good reasons to prefer this term. First, it avoids the neat categorisation of people according to assumptions about fixed identities, allowing for the realities that how people experience

sexuality and gender is often messy and changes over a lifetime. It is also less linked to liberal Western

notions of identity politics, and therefore less likely to be attacked as part of neo-imperial attempts to destroy traditional cultures. This week saw a film festival in Tunisia addressing "issues of gender identity and non-normative sexualities" - a deliberate choice of terminology in a deeply hostile environment.

But perhaps most important, everyone has some sense of their experience of sexu-ality and gender, and the term serves to re-

mind us that we are not speaking of discrete minori-ties, rather of the complexities of human experience. Yes, there are times when particular identities

are important. Same-sex marriage was only an issue precisely because lesbian and gay relations lacked full legal and social acceptance without it. People who feel discordance between their bodies and their gender expression need recognition and protection from widespread discrimination.

But there is an equal danger in assuming that everyone will be comfortable with labels that define them through increasingly arcane acronyms. In his recent memoir, the British scholar Jonathan

"It's one of the delusions of identity politics to think that our desire comfortably coexists with our identity, a belief which has more to do with consumerism than desire. I've come to feel that sexuality might at different times express different aspects of one's self, a situation further complicated by the fact that the self changes."

The current Melbourne Midsumma Festival program refers to "LGBTQIA+" in an attempt to incorporate everyone with "diverse gender and sexuality". But there is a risk of becoming so inclusive that the term loses all meaning. Adding letters to the acronym simply hides the complex interconnections of desire, behaviour and identity in everyday life.

# India's automated ocean pollution system to begin this year

KOLKATA, JAN 21 (PTI): India is all set to have its own automated ocean pollution observation system this year which will help keep a tab on ocean pollution levels apart from offering insights on how the marine system is changing, a top scientist has said. According S S C Shenoi, director, Indian National Centre for Ocean Information Services (INCOIS), the system will become functional by April this year and the cost of the project is estimated to be at Rs 100

INCOIS is an autonomous dy under the Ministry of Earth Sciences

Shenoi said that the new ocean data acquisition system called automated moorings, will

do away with the present practice of collecting water samples from sea and studying their pollution levels thereafter.

"This is for the first time India will have such kind of system. In the US you will find it. This is a very effective system in getting the data about the ocean pollution. We will use those data to understand the quality of wa-

He added that the new sys-

tem will be foolproof.

The project will begin from April once it gets a final nod

from the government, he said. Shenoi said it will help in monitoring the pollution level of the ocean water and the impact of climate change.

"There are reports that the

water is becoming anoxic and it could change the marine sytem. These are suspicions and there is nothing concrete. So, this will give us a clear picture of what actually is hap-pening and help us in the long run to take up preventive measures," he said.

Anoxic waters are areas of sea water that are depleted of olved oxygen.

It will also provide data that will help scientists to under-stand how the marine system is changing.

Shenoi said sensor-equipped uoys will be placed in six coastal areas of the country. The sensors, placed at the bottom of the buoys, will be attached to the sea bed so that they are not washed away.

The moored ocean buoys will be placed in coastal areas of Digha (West Bengal), Goa, Mumbai, Kochi, Vishakapatanam and Chennai, he said.

'We have already completed our background work. We hope to deploy two buoys by December 2018. We will monitor the reading and functioning and then will place other buoys," he said adding the reading will be observed and decoded using a mathematical model.

It is estimated that more than 80 per cent of the pollution in the ocean is from lands with marine debris, especially plas-tics, killing thousands of sea-birds, mammals and sea turtles every year.

#### **Dolphins spotted at Olive Ridley** nesting site in Ganjam dist

BERHAMPUR (ODISHA). JAN 21 (PTI): The Rushikulya river mouth off Ganiam coast in Odisha. famous for mass nesting of endangered Olive Ridlev turtles, has attracted quite a few dolphins too,

a forest official has said. Forest personnel sighted the dolphins belonging to different species in the sea from Purunabandh to Prayagi during a census conduct-

ed on Friday.

The dolphin sus was carried out by the forest departent in the 54-km coastline off Ganjam. Twenty-six dolphins of two species - 15 humpback dolphins and 11 bottlenose dolphins - were sighted, said divisional forest officer (Berhampur), A K Behera.

"Of the 26, nine were found between Purunabandh and Prayagi, the rookery of the Olive

Ridley turtles," he said. Between Prayagi and Nua Boxipalli, 11 dolphins were sighted and six were found in the stretch fro Markandi to

Pati Sonepur.
Last year too, som dolphins were sighted off

the Ganjam coast.

"The coast houses different species of the sea mammal," said the

DFO. "We will submit a report to the govern-ment for the conservation and protection of these dolphins soon," he added.

The Purunabandh-Prayagi area is famous for the mass nesting of millions of Olive Ridley turtles. During the last week of February and in early March every year, millions of turtles climb the shore and lay eggs by digging pits.

The Rushikulya riv

er mouth is the second-largest mass nesting site of the Olive Ridley after Gahiramatha in Kendrapada district.

### 'Padmaavat' protests: GSRTC suspends bus services in north Gui

AHMEDABAD, JAN 21 (PTI): The Gujarat State Road Transport Corporation (GSRTC) today suspended its bus services in northern part of the state, following violent pro-tests by Rajput community members against the release of the film "Padmaavat", an official said.

The bus services were sus-pended in Mehsana, Patan, Gandhinagar, Sabarkantha and Banas-kantha districts till the situation improves, he said.

There are two separate routes

for north Gujarat - one from Gandhinagar to Himmatnagar in Sabarkantha, and another passes from Mehsana and stretches till Banaskantha district via Patan

According to GSRTC secretary K D Desai, all the buses plying be-tween Ahmedabad and the northern region have been cancelled since last night amid the fear of miscreants making these vehicles as their soft target.

"Owing to the attacks on the state buses in some parts of north Gujarat yesterday, we have temporarily suspended our operations for Gandhinagar, Himmatnagar, Mehsana and Banaskantha. The services for other destinations, such as in central and south Gu-jarat, are on as per the schedule,"

Desai said though they tried to resume the service in Gandhinagar this morning, some people target-



Thus, we have decided to halt

the operations. We are in constant touch with police and will resume the service as soon as the situation becomes normal," he added.

Desai said the decision was taken while keeping in mind the safety of passengers, as the miscreants were coming on their motorcycles and running away quick-ly after throwing burning objects on the buses.

Following the GSRTC's decision, several passengers were stranded at the state transport depots in the city, as they learnt about the cancellation of routes for north Gujarat upon their arrival here.

### North Korea to send 22 athletes to Olympics in South

LAUSANNE, JAN 21 (AFP): North Korea will send 22 athletes to next month's Winter Games in the South, the Inter-national Olympic Committee said yesterday, approving a landmark deal between two nations still officially at war.

South Korea had hoped that the Games which begin in Pyeo-ngchang on February 9 could help ease the crisis on the peninsula plagued by months of rising ten-sions over the North's nuclear and missile and

In a surprise New Year's announcement, the leader of Stalinist North Korea Kim Jong-un said he was open to sending a delegation to Pyeongchang.

Before this week's meeting at IOC head-quarters in Lausanne, the two Koreas had already agreed on a set of momentous compromises, including delegations from both countries marching together at the opening ceremony and the formation of a unified women's hockey team.

But the two Koreas still needed approval from the IOC, as the pact required the suspension some basic Olympic

IOC president Thomas Bach gave that approv-al Saturday, announcing that 22 athletes had been cleared to compete in three sports and a total



of five disciplines. include

skating, shorttrack speed skating, cross-country skiing and track Alpine skiing, as well as hockey, with the IOC having approved the entry of the joint team, despite concerns voiced by some hockey federations over

At the opening ceremony, the joint delega-tion "will be led into the Olympic stadium by the Korean unification flag" carried together by athlete from each country, the IOC said.

A special unity uniform will be created for the event.

No North Korean athlete had technically qualified for Pyeongchang, ment required extending qualification deadlines in the sports concerned.
"Today marks a mile-

stone on a long jour-ney," Bach said after the meeting with the leaders of the committees NAGALAND STATE LOTTER Pyeongchang 2018 organisers, and senior government officials from the two countries.

"The Olympic Winter Games in Pyeongchang are hopefully opening the door to a brighter future

on the Korean peninsula,

### At least 6 dead in 12-hour Taliban siege at luxury Kabul hotel

ury hotel in Kabul and killed at least six people including a foreigner, sparking a 12-hour battle that left terrified guests scrambling to escape and parts of the building

ablaze.

The Taliban claimed

The Taliban claimed responsibility for the attack on the six-storey Intercontinental Hotel on a hilltop overlooking the Afghan capital. People trapped at the top of the building tied bedsheets together and climbed over balconies to escape the overnight assault.

One lost his grip and fell in dramatic television footage by Afghanistan's Tolo News station, which also showed black smoke and flames billowing from the top of the hotel.

Special forces were lowered by helicopters during the night onto the roof of the landmark 1960s building, with Afghan security forces killing four attackers in the hours- long assault, the interior ministry said.

"Five Afghans and one foreigner have been killed," interior ministry deputy spokesman Nas-rat Rahimi told AFP today, adding around 150 people were rescued including more than 40 foreigners.

"The body of the foreigner, a woman, was recovered from the sixth floor as the last attacker was being killed," he



added. An official with Afghanistan's spy agency put the number of wounded at eight, while the inte-

rior ministry said six.

Officials said four gunmen burst into the hotel, which is not part of the global InterContinental chain, last night, opening fire on guests and staff and taking dozens of people hostage.

The Taliban claimed responsibility for the latest assault in the wartorn capital via an email from spokesman Zabiullah Mujahid. The interi-or ministry had earlier blamed the Taliban-affil-

iated Haqqani network.

It followed security warnings in recent days to avoid hotels and other locations frequented by foreigners. Kabul has become one of the deadliest places

in Afghanistan for civilians, with the Taliban and the Islamic State group both stepping up attacks.

It was not clear how many people had been inside the hotel.

During the siege, a guest hiding in a room said he could hear gunfire inside the building, where dozens of people attending an information technology conference on Sunday were staying.

"I don't know if the attackers are inside the hotel but I can hear gunfire from somewhere near the first floor," the man, who did not want to be named, told AFP by telephone.
"We are hiding in our

rooms. I beg the securi-ty forces to rescue us as soon as possible before they reach and kill us."

His phone has been switched off since then.

Afghan Telecom re-

gional director Tayeb, who was attending the IT conference, said he saw the attackers enter the hotel.

"Everything chaotic in a moment. I hid behind a pillar and I saw people who were enjoying themselves a second ago screaming and fleeing like crazy, and some of them falling down, hit by bullets," Tayeb told AFP.

Local resident Abdul Sattar said he had spo-ken by phone to friends who are hotel staff and had been trapped inside

"Suddenly (militants) attacked the dinner gath-ering... (then) they broke into the rooms, took some people hostage and

of them," he told AFP.
Rahimi said the attackers were armed with light weapons and rock-et-propelled grenades when they stormed the hotel, a popular venue for weddings, conferences and political gatherings.

Security in Kabul has been ramped up since May 31 when a massive truck bomb killed some 150 peo-ple and wounded around 400 -- mostly civilians.

But the resurgent Taliban and Islamic State are both scaling up their assaults on the city, with multiple devastating attacks in recent weeks.

The attack on the Intercontinental was just one of several bloody assaults today.

In a village in the northern province of

went from house to house in the middle of the night, pulling police from their homes and shooting them dead.

At least 18 officers

were killed, deputy police chief Abdul Raziq Qa-deri told AFP.

In Herat in the west at least eight civilians were killed when a car hit a Taliban-planted roadside mine, officials there said.

The last major attack on a high-end hotel in Kabul was in March 2014 when four teenage gunmen raided the Serena, killing nine people including AFP journalist Sardar Ahmad.

The overnight siege is not the first time the Intercontinental been targeted: in 2011 a suicide attack claimed by the Taliban killed 21 people there, including 10 civilians.

Even before the at-tack was over today, authorities were questioning how the attackers got past the hotel's security, which was taken over by a private company three weeks ago, said Najib Danish, another interior ministry spokesman.

"We will investigate

it," he said.

A hotel employee told AFP that as he fled the staff living quarters in a building next to the hotel he saw the new security guards running for their lives.

#### Pak summons Indian diplomat over ʻunprovoked firing'

ISLAMABAD, JAN 21 (PTI): Pakistan summoned India's deputy high commissioner here for the fourth consecutive day today over the alleged "unprovoked firing" by Indian troops across the Line of Control which resulted in the death of two people.

The tensions have increased between the two sides due to ongoing skirmishes and Pakistan has summoned India's Deputy High Commissioner J P Singh five times since Monday.

General Director (South Asia and SAARC) Mohammad Faisal summoned Singh and "condemned the unprovoked ceasefire violations" by Indian forces, the Foreign

Office said.

In a statement, it claimed that the latest violation by Indian forces occurred on January 20-21, when 18 Indian posts resorted to "unprovoked firing" with mortars and heavy weapons in the Ni-kial sector at the LoC.

The firing killed two civilians - a 33-year-old man and a 25-year-old woman - and injured another women and a girl, the Foreign Office said

Faisal said the deliberate targeting of civil-ian populated areas is indeed deplorable and against the human digniinternational human rights and humanitarian

The repeated ceasefire violations by India "are a threat to regional peace and security and may lead to a strategic miscalculation," he asserted.

He urged the Indian side to respect the 2003 ceasefire arrangement and investigate the repeated incidents of ceasefire violations, the statement said.

### UNSC sanctions monitoring team to visit Pak this week

ISLAMABAD, IAN 21 (PTI): Amid mounting global pressure on Pakistan to act against Mumbai attack mastermind Hafiz Saeed and entities linked to him, a UN Security Council team will visit the country this week for an assessment of Islamabad's compliance with the world body's sanctions regime

The two-day visit of the UN Se-urity Council's sanctions monitoring team will begin on Thursday.

"The monitoring team of the UNSC 1267 Sanctions Committee will be here on January 25 and 26," a senior Pakistani official was quoted as saying by Dawn.

The UN monitoring team's visit is taking place amid increasing pressure on Pakistan from the US and India with respect to the in-adequate implementation of the sanctions on Saeed and entities linked to him.

However, Pakistani officials, insist that the trip is a routine visit.

Saeed was listed under UN Security Council Resolution 1267 in December 2008.

On Friday, the US State Department said it has told clearly to Islamabad that Saeed is a "terrorist" and should be prosecuted to the fullest extent of the law, reacting strongly to Pakistan Prime Minister Shahid Khaqan Abbasi's remarks that there was no case against the Mumbai attack mastermind.

Department spokesperson Heather Nauert said:



"He is listed by the UNSC 1267, the Al-Qaeda Sanctions Committee for targeted sanctions due to his affiliation with Lashkar-e- Taiba, which is a designated foreign

terror organisation."

"We believe that he should be prosecuted to the fullest extent of

the law," Nauert had said.
Saeed, the chief of the Jamaatud-Dawah (IuD), was released from house arrest in Pakistan in November.

The JuD is believed to be the front organisation for the LeT which is responsible for carrying out the Mumbai attack that killed 166 people. It has been declared as a foreign terrorist organisation by the US in June 2014.

"The terms of reference of the monitoring team for Pakistan visit are not publicly known, but as per its general mandate it assists the 1267 Committee in keeping an eye on the freezing of the financial assets of listed persons and entities and checking provision of training and other material to them and their travel," the paper said.

The UNSC monitoring team intimates instances of non- compliance to the committee through its reports. At the same time also advises and assists member states on implementation of the

Pakistan has remained under the Financial Action Task Force scanner over allegations by the US and India about the UNSC sanctions not being fully implemented, the paper said.

The US Department of the Treasury has designated Saeed as a Specially Designated Global Terrorist, and the US, since 2012, has offered a USD 10 million reward for information that brings Saeed to justice.

#### SCARLETT JOHANSSON CALLS OUT JAMES FRANCO AFTER BEING ACCUSED OF SEXUAL MISCONDUCT BY FIVE DIFFERENT WOMEN



Scarlett Johansson delivered a powerful speech on Saturday at the Women's March in Los Angeles, calling out James Franco for claim-ing to support the Time's Up Movement.

'How could a person publicly stand by an organization that helps to provide support for victims of sexual assault while privately preying on people who have no power?' the Avengers star asked, in front of the massive crowd.

Johansson didn't refer to Franco by name while on the microphone, but one of her representatives later con-firmed that she was talking directly to the Disaster Artist actor, who has been publicly accused of sexual misconduct by five women.

'I want my pin back, by the way,' she said, referencing the Time's Up pin Franwore at the Golden Globe Awards on January 7, an act of expression which inspired his accusers to come forward. Franco has denied all

of the allegations lodged against him, saying he supports the women's rights to tell their stories.

The Time's Up movement was created by leaders in politics and the entertainment ndustry to support and help fund legal defense for people who have experienced ineq-uity in the work place, across all industries.

Johansson is one of the original founders, and a major supporter to the cause.

The movement came about as a direct result of the #MeToo social media campaign, which was kicked off in October by reports of rampant sexual misconduct by entertainment mo-

gul Harvey Weinstein. #MeToo, which was first started offline more than a decade ago by Tarana Burke inspired women from all walks of life across the US to share stories of sexual ha-rassment, assault and abuses of power they experienced at the hands of men who had power over them.

A total of five women

have accused Franco of sex-ual misconduct or abuse of power, sharing their stories as part of the movement, in-cluding four student-actors he worked with at Studio 4 and Playhouse West.
Four of the accusers

are former acting students of 39-year-old Franco, and claim the Oscar nominee pressured women both on set and in class to perform topless or even completely nude. The fifth woman said Franco was a mentor to her.
The accusations include

Franco's alleged removal of plastic guards covering female actors' genitalia during simulated sex scenes and his becoming 'visibly angry when females would not appear nude or topless. The allegations

started coming out on social media, after Franco wore a 'Time's Up' pin at Sunday's Golden Globe Awards.
