PIL seeks Court directions to ensure that LPG distributors make home deliveries

Rules have been misinterpreted to the disadvantage of consumers, petitioner contends

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 07 AUG:

A Public Interest Litigation filed in the High Court of Sikkim has accused the Food and Civil Supplies & Consum-

nivance with the LPG cylinder distributors, of violating norms laid down by the Indian Oil Corporation and over-charging consumers here. The PIL contends that since the distributers were already being subsidised by the IOCL for home delivery of LPG refills, it was wrong for it to still charge transportation cost from consumers.

Prem Goyal, a senior

Gangtokian, has approached the High Court seeking that directions be passed to ensure delivery of refilled LPG cylinders to the registered addresses of consumers as mandated by IOCL and ending the system of dropping cylinders off at road-heads and requiring people to queue for their refills. The PIL argues that the Notification of the Food and Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department which allows for levying of transportation cost from consumers also be quashed.

The division bench of the High Court, following the PIL, had issued a notice on 04 July last month itself to the Union Ministry of Petroleum and Natural Gas, IOCL, State Gov-ernment and 12 Distributors, including the State Trading Corporation of Sikkim. Now,

the division bench compris-ing of Chief Justice Satish Kumar Agnihotri and Justice Meenakshi Madan Rai has given two weeks' time for filing of counter affidavit and two weeks thereafter for the petitioner to file a rejoinder.

In the PIL, the petitioner has contended that as per the Liquefied Petroleum Gas (Regulation of Supply and Distribution) Order 2000, the delivery of LPG Cylinder is required to be done at the registered address of the consumers. Mr Goyal has also pointed out that rules do not allow distributors to sell LPG at a price higher than that fixed by the Government Oil Company

or the parallel marketer.

Gurung threatens to intensify protest in Darj hills

DARJEELING (WB), AUG 7 (PTI): Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) su-premo Binal Gurung today threatened to intensify the agitation in the Darjeeling hills if the Centre did not intervene to resolve the crisis as the indefinite strike demanding a separate state of Gorkhaland en-tered its 54th day.

The GJM leadership, on July 30,

had given a 10-day "deadline" to the Centre to intervene to resolve the crisis in the hills, arising out of its Gorkhaland demand.

"The deadline will end soon, but if the Centre decides to sit idle, we will intensify our agitation in the hills. The GJM is a constituent in the NDA government at the Centre. We hope they (BJP) will intervene to resolve the situation," Gurung told reporters.

GJM activists took out rallies in various parts of the hills, demanding restoration of the Internet services, which have been suspended since June 18, and an immediate withdrawal of police personnel from the hills.



Edge of the seat RS contest likely in Gujarat tomorrow

AHMEDABAD, AUG 7 (PTI): After weeks of dramatic political developments, Gujarat looks set for an on the edge of seat contest in the Rajya Sabha elections which will decide among others the fate of Ahmed Pa-tel, the influential political secretary to Congress chief Sonia Gandhi.

It is after a gap of about two decades that a contest is happening in Rajya Sabha polls in Gujarat, where official nominees of major parties used to get elected unopposed, after the BJP fielded a Congress rebel against Pa-tel, who is seeking a fifth term. The ruling BJP has fielded party chief Amit Shah, Union minister Smriti Irani, and Balwantsinh Rainut who till recent? Balwantsinh Rajput, who till recently was Congress' chief whip in the House, for the three RS seats.

Tendong Lho Rum Faat: The Great Deluge

Tendong Lho Rum Faat was a little known festival in the premerger days; it came into prominence only during the reign of the Sikkim Democratic Front government.

The story of the flood be-

longs to the genera of flood folktales which is common to a wide range of cultures. Stories of floods are found in folklore of many countries though the

cause of the flood differs from country to country. The biblical flood story is the most famous while in India the story of the first avatar of Vishnu saving the earth in Matsya avatar from the flood originates in the Vedic age. Most flood tales are consid-

ered symbolic narratives of divine punishment sent to punish people for their evil acts. Flood tales usually contain a cultural hero who strives to ensure the

rebirth of a new civilization. However, the flood of Ten-

dong Lho Rum Faat differs in ways from most other flood stories. A majority of the flood stories concern flooding of the world but the Lepcha leg-end concerns only Sikkim and unlike other stories where few favored families are saved, the Lepcha story does not mention any particular persons who are rescued. Saving of animals is


also not included in the Lepcha story while majority of flood stories mentions rescuing of mals during the flood.

On the other hand the Lepcha story like most of the other stories concerns being saved on a mountain top. The role of a bird is also similar to the flood story of the bible and Baby lonian stories where a raven and a dove are sent to see if the flood has receded while in the

Lepcha story a partridge comes to the rescue. Unlike other flood stories the Lepcha tale of flood does not concern divine pun-ishment but rather involves a love story of Teesta and Rangit rivers. The Lepcha legend says the deluge occurred because Teesta being a male unable to reach the appointed meeting point before Rangeet was ashamed and disappointed and wanted to return to his origin

causing the flood. Another unique feature of the Lepcha festival is that the day is celebrated as a day of deliverance and prayers are offered for the well being of sentient beings and the world. The festival shows the strong connection and affinities of Lepchas with nature.





Section 9, sub-section (e) clearly states that: "No distributors shall without prior written permission of the concerned Government Oil Company, refuse to make home delivery at the registered address of the consumer, as registered with the distributor: Provide that the State Government may, fix additional charges for home delivery of LPG Cylinders to the consumers, as it may deem necessary in view of the geographical terrain and or the distance in the area of distribution"

As any consumer in Sikkim will vouch, this is only partially followed in Sikkim where the additional charges have been fixed, but home delivery ignored.

The PIL complains of as much when it points out that even after levying the transportation charges, the respondents (the distributers) are not delivering the LPG refills to the registered addresses of the

The petitioner states that the

Food and Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department has made a wrong interpretation of the rules under the shelter of the LPG Reg-ulation of Supply and Distribution Order 2000 imposing additional transportation cost on retail sale price for delivery of domestic LPG refills only till distribution points across the state

It is also highlighted in the petition that the consumers in Sikkim have been denied the facilities of home delivery within the fixed price regime as per IOCL norms, and that some consumers in Sik-kim need to pay nearly Rs. 300 extra to porters due to unfair trade practice of non-delivery of LPG cyl-inder by the distributors to their

Mr. Goyal is representing him-f as petitioner-in-person to present his case in public interest.

IOCL, Kolkata, in its RTI replies to the petitioner clearly stated that all the Regular LPG Distributors of IOCL are required to supply refill on home delivery basis to all registered customers residing in their respective operating areas as advised by Oil Marketing Companies, for which customer has to pay the Retail Selling Price of LPG refills in that market which is inclusive of

delivery charges.

Only under exceptional conditions, filled cylinders deliveries on cash-on-carry basis (non-home delivery) from regular LPG distributors are permitted, wherein the delivery charges (currently) of Rs. 18 per 14.2 kg cylinder will not be charged.

The Food and Civil Supplies & Consumer Affairs Department, vide its notification, allows for transportation charges of Rs. 27 beyond 500 meters up to 10 Kms, Rs. 42 beyond 10 kms to 25 Kms. Rs. 57 beyond 25 kms to 40 Kms and Rs. 77 exceeding 40 kms in ra-

The petitioner has also prayed the High Court to issue writ of mandamus to make the rate of the LPG cylinders equal in all parts of

Panchayat polls arrive soon, hopefully the parties will be there too

One might not glean it from the public domain, but an election is less than two months away in Sikkim. And save the party in office, no one else seems working towards making an earnest pitch for the people's votes. There is nothing really new in this scenario either because opposition parties, much to their own disadvantage, have traditionally found excuses to dodge the panchayat elections here. In fact, they have shied away from municipal body elections as well, and then they wonder why people won't take them seriously!

The common excuse offered by political parties to "boycott" panchayat elections is that they are opposed to these being held on party lines. This position is self-contradictory because what they are essentially saying is that they will not participate any which way -boycott if on party lines and not directly participating in the other scenario because then party symbols and flags are not involved. Of course, the truth is obvious to all – most parties do not bother to remain connected with the grassroots during the political off-season years between assembly elections and hence have a difficult time even finding candidates to contest a respectable number of seats. Since only voters of the respective panchayat wards can contest elections there, presence has to be established across the state and supporters kept consistently connected and involved for parties to have enough names in the membership rolls to even field candidates. Yes, a case could be made out against holding panchayat elections on party lines for this very reason, but that cannot be something that political parties argue and should really be something that the civil society builds consensus for As far as political outfits are concerned, they should embrace the chance to participate in every activity in the public sphere, even elections to executive bodies of social and community organizations. But wait, they already do that surreptitiously. And that is why it is probably better that when it comes to the panchayats, it is all made above board by making the candidates contest as official candidates of political parties. Don't do that, and accountability becomes the first casualty because when the elected representative fails to deliv er, there is at least a party high command that can be approached for redress.

This brings one to the other worrying fixture of panchayat elections - there are too many uncontested victories than is healthy for a democracy. During the last panchayat elections held in 2012, of the total 290 Panchayat Wards that Sikkim had at the time, 133 had been won uncontested by the SDF even before election day. Voting was held for 157 wards, and interestingly, a majority of the contested wards went to independents who won 97 of these 157 wards. Of course, one needs to also recognize that a big chunk of the independent victors were ruling party members who contested as independents when they did not get the party ticket. Although the opposition camp claimed many of these as their victories, these remain but claims because they did not field any candidates officially. What can also not be ignored is the fact that in 2012, the Sikkim Krantikari Morcha, which even though it had not yet been launched, was already very active as a coalescing political outfit. One does not see any such activity in the political realm at present, and although press releases abound claiming tours and outreach programmes by parties, the ground reality will surface only when nominations open.

What the political outfits decide to do is for them to decide. One hopes they will participate. But what the people should probably resolve to do in the meanwhile is ensure that their wards do not go uncontested. Although it is wonderful to have unanimously-selected candidates, the people lose a prospective representative the moment s/he takes office uncontested because then the loyalties shift to the powers that awarded the ticket. To win an election is to win the people's trust and that comes bundled with accountability towards their aspirations and woes; more responsibility to pri-oritise people and their affairs. And is that not what one wants most from grassroots representatives?

Who will tell us the stories: A story beyond Tendong Lho Rumfaat

Indeed the much awaited festival has arrived for the Lepchas to gather and celebrate, remembering the Chyu Tendong, an unyielding hill which withstood the great deluge. As the story unravels, the race between the two great rivers the Teesta (Rungnyu led by Paril Bu) and Rangeet (Rungnyet led by Tutfo), to meet at the confluence and travel ahead to-gether beyond the hills ended with the early arrival of Teesta. Dismayed, Rangeet flowed back to where it originated. Teesta failed to convince her lover, Rangeet to move forward to the plains as Rangeet was embarrassed, enraged and hurt on coming second. Seeing his state, Teesta decided to flow back along with her lover but diversion in their plan caused a flood to rise above the hills. The Rong folks flocked together, took refuge in Tendong Hill, pleading to God to save their lives from the flood which endangered the lives of the people and Kayum Fo (bird), on behalf of Itbu Rum (Creator) accepted the offering of the Rongs and thereby receded the flood.

From time immemorial, the Lep chas have celebrated Tendong Lho Rum Faat to thank God. This year, Tendong Lho Rum Faat is being celbrated at Tallom Purtam (Daerumden), West Sikkim as a grand state celebration. It is also being cele-brated in various parts of Sikkim. It gained the status of State festival only in the year 1997, recognized by this present government and as a mark of celebration, this day has been declared as a State holiday. Lepchas from Sikkim, West Bengal, Nepal and Bhutan come together on 7th of Au-

gust to celebrate the Rumfaat at the hilltop and on 8th, in Gangtok or in designated Districts. The festival is all about worship, prayer, thanksgiv-ing and merrymaking.
From a young age, I have heard

about Tendong Lho Rum Faat narrat-ed to me by my parents and I have attended the celebration at community hall with much excitement, wearing my attire for the day, with colorful songs and dances, which allured me the most. I am very much indebted towards my parents as my interest in oral history and my affair with reading and listening started when I grew up listening to them narrating folktales. This also increased my knowledge and enlightened my intellect about the socio-economic condition prevalent at that time, which in turn made me curious about the stories of other communities which has helped in the development of my thought process. This made me want to listen to what Thung-Nukung (grandparents) as well as Burra-Pakhas and Azo-Anas of my society had to narrate. I loved and value what they shared with us, at the same time being aware of what their absence will tomorrow behold. I get nostalgic with the scenario at my home, where after dinner, my siblings and I flocked to our parents to hear a story and I am always amazed at my parents' enthusiasm and energy after a long day's work. To this day I ask my parents to tell us a story, if not a folktale, at least a story of their life's struggles so that we siblings know more about our people and our land. These stories may not find a place in academia but what we have heard about our history is engraved in our

hearts. This is how a culture is transnext generation with a new audience in a new scenario

With firm conviction I can say that the culture of any community survives and thrives when it is told and passed on to the younger generation. Preservation of culture starts at home when we pay heed towards what our elders have to share and what we gain from them needs to be shared and passed on. It's a two-way respon-sibility of listening and sharing carefully. We need to realize that we have story tellers at our homes and in our society and through their stories we can connect ourselves with our land, people, nature and environment and who better than them to learn from. We need to continue and cultivate the culture of narrating the folktales of ancient days to our youngsters not only to preserve the stories but also to educate them about the culture and tradition of our land. Our tradition is fading away as we are occupied with other activities and most of our time is consumed by social media, making us pseudo-social, where space for such leisure activity is no longer seen as desirable in present day. This type of interaction builds our imagination and our perception. As we grow up, we start questioning the logic and rationality and this turns into a culture of question, debates and discussion.

Coming back to the story of Tendong Lho Rumfaat and the flood which had engulfed eastern and southern parts of Sikkim, one can simply say that the great deluge might have occurred looking at the location of Teesta, the confluence.

For me it was no different, as I entirely believed that there was indeed a flood which killed many Lepchas, as a researcher taking an account of flood occurrences in plains areas of North-Bengal, it spoke to my logic to believe that there was indeed a flood which might have been caused by a landslide.

As I commute regularly along the banks of Teesta and enjoy the beauty and its changing colours, with each new season, it has become more evident to see the socio-cultural, political and economic significance of river Teesta for Sikkim, North Bengal and even in foreign policy making of India. Teesta remains a prominent part of dialogues between India and Ban-gladesh. It is a question to ponder on; whether the Indian diplomats know the story of Teesta, how attached Sikkimese are to the river and how nostalgic they become when we hear and sing "Jaha Bagcha Teesta ra Ran-geet". Teesta also remains the lifeline of North Bengal, with many lives de-pendent upon it. Many have tales to tell on Teesta and it is still being woshipped in North Bengal.
On the occasion of the Tendong

Lho Rumfaat, I encourage our fellow Sikkimese to celebrate the occasion. reflect on the importance of the great River Teesta, raise the concern and protection it deserves. It is not only a celebration of Lepcha community, rather it is an occasion where we Sikkimese can pause and give a serious thought to nature which has been bestowed upon us and be grateful for

what we have.

Why kids need risk, fear and excitement in play

theconversation.com "Be careful!" "Not so high!" "Stop that!"

Concerned parents can often be heard urging safety when children are at play. Recent research suggests this may be over-protective and that kids need more opportunities for risky play outdoors.

Risky play is thrilling and exciting play where children test their boundaries and flirt with un-certainty. They climb trees, build forts, roam the neighbourhood with friends or play capture the flag. Research shows such play is associated with increased physical activity, social skills, risk management skills, resilience and self-confidence. These findings make intuitive sense when you watch children at play.

Importantly, it's not up to parents or experts to decide what is risky play for a particular child. Rather, children need to be given the mental

and physical space to figure out appropriate risk levels for themselves: far enough that it feels exhil-arating, but not so far that it becomes too scary.

My years as an injury prevention researcher have left me well aware of things that can go wrong and how to prevent them from happening. But because I have a doctorate in developmental psychology, I am also concerned that we are keeping our kids too safe. Preventing our kids from exploring uncertainty could have unintended negative consequences for their health and development, such as increased sedentary behaviour, anxiety and phobias

PARENTS' HOPES AND FEARS

Many of the parents I've spoken to through my re search recognize the importance of risky play, but can be overwhelmed by worry about the possibility of serious injury or abduction. They also worry that someone is going to report them to the authorities for letting their child take risks. These worries make it hard for them to let go and can result in over-protection.

More recently, I've noticed an opposite trend: parents who are worried their child is too timid and not taking enough risks. They want to know how they can help their child take more risks in play. This concerns me as much as over-protection.

Both approaches can increase the risk of injury and harm since they ignore children's capabilities and preferences. How will children learn about themselves and how the world works if an adult is con stantly telling them what to do and how to do it?

WHAT ABOUT INJURIES?

There's never been a safer time to be a child in



Canada. The likelihood of dying from an injury is 0.0059 per cent. Car crashes and suicides are the leading causes of death, not play. In fact, children are more likely to need medical attention for an injury resulting from organized sports than play.

Likewise, the likelihood of abduction by a stranger is so small that the statistics are not even collected. In an attempt to strike a balance, injury prevention professionals are moving to an approach that seeks to keep children as safe as necessary, rather than as safe as possible

CHILDREN ARE INHERENTLY CAPABLE

Risky play is an important part of many outdoor schools and early child care settings in Canada and other parts of the world. In outdoor forest schools and nurseries in the U.K., for example, pre-school and kindergarten kids build dens, climb trees, use tools and create fire — under careful supervision.

One principal in New Zealand decided his stu

dents didn't need any rules. Students were allowed to climb trees, build forts, ride bikes -- whatever occurred to them. His school was part of a larger study that found students who were allowed risky play were happier and reported less bullying than students in schools who didn't change their approach.

Seeing children engaged in risky play helps us realize that they're much more capable than we think. When they're given the chance, even very young children show clear abilities to manage risks and figure out their own limits. We just have to open our eyes and be willing to see what is in front

of us. And most importantly, get out of the way to give them a chance to experiment for themselves. The potential for learning is enormous

WHAT'S A PARENT TO DO?

Setting unnecessary limits on a child's play or pushing them too far: both are problematic. Our role as caregivers is to give children the freedom to explore and play as they choose while supporting them in managing the real dangers that pose a serious and realistic threat to their safety.

What this looks like varies for different chil-

dren depending on their developmental stage, competencies and personal preferences. For example, play where there is a chance of getting lost is common at all ages: A preschooler hiding in bushes feels like he's a jungle explorer. His parents super-vise while giving him the feeling of independence.

For older children, this kind of play can involve exploring their neighbourhood with friends. Parents can help prepare them by gradually building

For parents struggling to strike a balance, my lab has developed OutsidePlay.ca, an online tool to help parents manage their fears and develop a plan for change so their children can have more opportunities for risky play. Usually this involves learning how to get out of the way of children's play. Change can be as simple as counting to 30 before stepping in to give children a chance to manage on their own. Parents are often amazed by what they see.

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Bank unions call for all-India strike on 22 Aug

CHENNAI, AUG 7 (PTI):
Bank employee unions have called for a nation-wide strike on August 22 to protest against privatisation and merger of public sector banks, among other demands, a union leader said today.

The All India Bank Employees Association (AIBEA), which represents nine bank unions and employees of public and private sector banks, has called for a nation-wide strike on August 22 to press for various demands, its general secretary CH Venkatachalam said.

Nearly 10 lakh employees would participate in the strike to protest plans to privatise public sector banks, merger and consolidation of banks and other demands including not to write-off non-performing assets (NPAs) in banks, Venkatachalam said in a statement.

Some of the other demands put forth by the unions include declaring wilful default of bank loans as criminal offence, implementation of the recommendations of Parliamentary Committee on recovery of NPAs.

Giving some financials, Venkatachalam claimed that bad loans that were written off by State Bank of India group in the last five years stood at Rs 93,041 crore.

While bad loans by the country's largest public sector lender State Bank of India as of 2016-17 was Rs 20,339 crore, for SBI Group as a whole it was Rs 27,574 crore.

Stating that people should not be penalised for corporate default, he said after the proposed stir on August 22, a massive rally would be conducted on September 15. Sometime in October or November, continuous strike for two days would be conducted, he said.

Manipur guv moots Flying Doctor scheme

IMPHAL, AUG 7 (PTI): Manipur Governor Najma Heptulla today said that she had informed the prime minister of the 'flying doctor' plan mooted by her, which she said would be help to the people of the hill areas of the state and its neighbours.

Heptulla, who is away in Delhi, told PTI over phone that she had tied the rakhi to Prime Minister Narendra Modi during the day and informed him of the plan.

The scheme is one of its kind and will be very useful for other hill areas in the NE region as the neighbouring states in the area share similar topographical features, the governor said adding she had requested the prime minister to

inaugurate it after the completion of the official and mandatory requirements.

Heptulla had told a function here last week that the North Eastern Council has allocated Rs 25 crore for the flying doctor scheme and that various districts, both in the hills and valley would be covered through choppers equipped with medical necessities.

Manipur was recently hit by the worst flood in 20 years and had been plagued by vector-borne diseases like Japanese encephalitis and dengue both in the hill and valley areas where surface transport services are difficult due to landslides during the monsoons

Water released by Nepal causes floods in UP

New Delhi, Aug 7 (PTI): Heavy rains lashed several parts of Himachal Pradesh today triggering landslides which closed over 280 roads whereas in Uttar Pradesh, water believed to be released by Nepal caused floods in which deaths of two children were reported.

About 650 people from 32 village panchayats in UP's Bahraich district were evacuated due to floods.

The two deaths were reported from Kaisarganj and Mahsi, District Magistrate Ajay Deep Singh said.

He said Ghaghara river was flowing above danger mark at two places and flood water has entered a large number of schools in Mahsi and Kaisarganj tehsils.

Around 650 people from 32 village panchayats in three tehsils in Bahraich district have been evacuated after river Ghaghara inundated a large part of Bahraich district, officials said.

Torrential rains in Nepal and Terai regions and water released by the neighbouring country are said to be the cause of swelling of river Ghaghara in the district.

In Himachal Pradesh, Dera Gopipur town was the wettest in the state receiving 174 mm of precipitation.

Kangra, Hamirpur, Shimla, Una and Mandi districts suffered maximum damage. Four houses collapsed in a landslide in Sarkaghat area of Mandi district but there was no loss of life, an official spokesperson said.

As many 97 roads were closed on Mandi circle, 69 in Kangra, 60 in Hamirpur and 50 in Shimla. Intermittent rains and landslides were hampering work to clear the roads, the chief engineer of the Public Works Department said.

He said 277 JCB, 25 bulldozers and 78 tippers have been pressed into service to clear the roads and the department has suffered losses to the tune of Rs 291 crore due to damage to roads and government property.

Heavy showers drenched the national capital, offering much-needed respite from muggy conditions.

As the skies turned grey, vehicles were seen plying with their headlights on around 2.30 pm.

Despite ban, manual scavenging 'privately' thrives in Delhi

NEW DELHI, AUG 7 (PTI): Toxic fumes inside gutters and sewers have snuffed out seven lives in the national capital within a month, but agencies are busy passing the buck, or washing hands off by pinning the blame on private contractors.

Bezwada Wilson, the national convener of the Safai Karamchari Andolan, said the Delhi Jal Board (DJB) cannot simply get away by saying the workers who died of asphyxiation vesterday were not employed with the agency, as they were clean-ing a sewer line owned and maintained by it.

"We are reporting every death to the authorities. Each and every elected representative have been given memorandums detailing the extent of the issue, but nothing is happening.

Their hands are soaked in the ood of safai karamcharis," Wilson told PTI.



Moreover, Section 7 of the Prohibition of Employment as Manual Scavengers and their Rehabilitation Act, 2013, clearly states that no person, local authority or any agency shall engage or employ, either directly or indirectly, any person for

hazardous cleaning of a sewer or a septic tank.

Wilson said too often these ager cies are absolved of criminality as the workers are not employed directly by them, but by private contractors.

"You have money for bullet

trains, but no resources are being spared to put an end to these deaths. Mere tall talk on Swachh Bharat will not suffice. Why do we even have Article 21 providing Right to Life in our Constitution?" he said. Four men had died while clean-

ing a tank containing poisonous sew-age in south Delhi's Ghitorni in July 15 while three died while cleaning a sewer line in Lajpat Nagar yesterday. In both the cases, the deceased were working for private contractors.

A report prepared by the Del-hi State Legal Services Authority (DSLSA), which had identified 233 manual scavengers in Delhi, shows the extent to which workers, without proper safety gears, are cleaning sewers and tanks under private

The DSLSA had pointed out in its report, which was submitted in the Delhi High Court, that out of these workers, 104 were attached to gov-

ernment agencies while 129 were working as outsourced or private contract workers.

The court had termed as "dis-

graceful" the existence of manual

scavengers in the city.

The Supreme Court, in 2014, had issued a series of directions to all states for strict implementation of the law by acting against violators, and ensure education, employment and rehabilitation of affected people

"Our sewer lines have to be modernised. Most of them date back to the British period. The whole cleaning process must be mechanised. Workers must be provided with safety gears.

"When will we introduce technology that can potentially change lives? And one needs to take the bull by the horns and deal with the widely prevalent casteist mindset, which is at the root of manual scavenging," Wilson said.



Sikhs one of the top targets of hate crimes in US: Community leaders

WASHINGTON, AUG 7 (PTI): Sikhs are one of the top targets of hate crimes and sectarian violence in the US, the community leaders have said as they remembered victims of the 2012 mass shooting by a white su-premacist that claimed the lives of six Sikhs at a Gurdwara in the Wisconsin city.

Several eminent Sikh-Americans across the US, lawmak ers, government officials and local leaders partici-pated in prayers held on the weekend to mark the five-year anniversary of the mass shooting. "We have made com-

mendable efforts to secure our Gurdwara Sahib's all across the country and taken many preventive measures. But Sikhs are still one of the top targets of hate crimes, sectarian vio-lence, and bullying in American schools.

In recent years, at-tacks have rather increased in manyfold, said Gurinder Singh Khalsa, who heads the Sikhs Political Action Committee.

"Hate has no colour. Hate has no face. Yet we all saw hate five years ago," Blahair Dulai, president of the Sikh Temple of Wisconsin, said, addressing the gathering.

"When you come to-gether and those hearts and minds connect, the presence of the divine is there and you don't even have to say a word," he added.

Among the speakers yesterday at the Gurd-wara was retired Oak Creek Police officer Brian Murphy, who was shot fifteen times before the shooter was brought

"When something is stolen from you, when the lives were stolen from everyone here, you can't get that back," Murphy said.

Withdraw from Doklam to avoid confrontation: PLA to India

People's Liberation Army (PLA) may be thousands of kilometres away from Doklam but has a stern message for the Indian Army -- withdraw from the Chinese territory to

avoid confrontation.

A visit by Indian journalists, sponsored by the Chinese government, today turned into a propaganda exercise by the Chinese Army for delivering its message on the prolonged standoff between troops of the true countries in troops of the two countries in Doklam near Sikkim.

Sr Col Li claimed, "What the Indian troops have done is an invasion of Chinese territory. You can report about what the Chinese soldiers are thinking about. I am a soldier, I will try my best to protect territorial integrity. We have the resolve and determination," he told Indian journalists taken to visit this garrison on the outskirts of

The visit included a rare demonstration of combat skills of the PLA troops before



The demonstration included sharp shooting skills with small arms, capture of "hostile forces" in close combat, counter-terrorism and laser simulation force-on-force training of reinforced infantry

however, clarified that the demonstration had no particular reference to Doklam where China says 48 Indian troops still stayed put along with a bulldozer.

"In addition, there are still a large number of Indian armed forces congregating on the boundary and on the Indian side of the boundary," the Chinese Foreign Ministry had said earlier.

Responding to questions

on the present impasse in Doklam, he said, "What the PLA will do depends on the actions of the Indian side. We will take appropriate action when it is necessary."

"We will follow the orders of the CPC (ruling Communist Party of China) and the Central Military Commission (the overall high command of the 2.3 million strong army headed by Chinese President Xi Jinping).'

The garrison is one of the oldest and most important training centres of the PLA officers and troops. It is also responsible for the security of the Chinese capital.
About 11,000 troops are

stationed at the garrison. The state media also continued the tirade against India.

An article in the official China Daily today said "geo-strategic miscalculations" were behind India's border "trespassing".

For China, the trespassing by Indian troops was unexpected and it is unac-ceptable as it happened in a section of the boundary that has hitherto been considered beyond dispute by both sides in the otherwise long drawn out and arduous boundary negotiations," it said.

India's "trespassing" amounts to no less than a violation of China's territorial sovereignty, and China has the lawful right to take "whatever measures" it deems necessary to defend its territory, it said.

Time, it added, is fast running short for India to pull out from Chinese territory and on that basis explore a face- saving solution in consultation with China. "India should do well to remember that its neighbour has the capability to defeat all invading ene mies," it said.

India and China have been locked in a standoff in Doklam since June 16 after Chinese troops began constructing a road near the Bhutan trijunction.

Bhutan has protested to China, saying the area belonged to it and accused Beijing of violating agreements that aim to maintain the status quo until the boundary dispute is resolved.

India says the Chinese action to construct the road was unilateral and changes the status quo. It fears the road would allow China to cut off India's access to its northeast-

S Korea prosecutors seek 12 years' jail for Samsung heir

SEOUL, AUG 7 (AFP): South Korean prosecutors today demanded the heir to the Samsung empire be jailed for 12 years over his role in the corruption scandal that brought down the country's last president.

At the final hearing in the trial of Lee Jae-Yong, the vice chairman of Samsung Electronics, prosecutors called him the "ultimate beneficiary" of crimes committed in the scandal, which culminated in the impeachment and dismissal of president Park Geun-Hye.

If the judges convict him and agree with the sentence recommendation it will be among the harshest penalties ever passed on a top executive of a chaebol, the business groups that dominate

Asia's fourth-largest economy.

Lee and four other executives of Samsung -- the world's biggest smartphone maker and the country's biggest firm -- are accused of bribing Park's pow-erful confidante with millions of dollars to win presidential favours and ease a controversial

2015 merger deal. "The defendants were closely tied to power and sought personal gains," the prosecutors said.

They sought a 12-year sentence for Lee, who is also charged with embezzlement and hiding assets overseas among other offences, 10-year terms for three of his co-accused, and



seven years for the last of the defendants in the trial.

Taking the stand for the first time in his defence last week, Lee claimed that he had no role in decision-making at the wider Samsung group and "mostly listened to other executives".

His lawyers say the allega-tions were unjustified and the defendants never sought anything in return for the money that was donated.

The verdicts are expected later this month.

Lee, 49, has effectively been at the helm of Samsung, which has revenues equivalent to about a fifth of the country's GDP, since his father was left bedridden by

a heart attack in 2014.

One of the favours Lee allegedly sought from Park was state approval for a controversial merger of two Samsung units in 2015, seen as a key step to ensuring a smooth power transfer to him.

The deal was opposed by many shareholders who said it had wilfully undervalued shares of one of the two firms. But it eventually went through after the national pension fund -- a major Samsung shareholder -approved it.

The special prosecutors failed to give any evidence for the existence of such a succession operation," Lee's lawyers argued at Monday's hearing.

If Lee is found guilty it will be a blow for Park, who is on trial separately on 18 charges including bribery, coercion and abuse of power following her dismissal from office in March.

Park was formally im-peached after public uproar over her questionable ties with confidante Choi Soon-Sil sparked mass nationwide protests for months.

Choi is also on trial for using her presidential ties to force top South Korean firms including Samsung to "do-nate" nearly 70 million to non-profit foundations which she controlled.
