High transportation costs eating into profits say Noom Panang farmers

MANGAN, 15 FEB [IPR]: A village was conducted by District Collector, North Karma R Bonpo, accompanied by Additional Director [AHLF&VS], Managing Director [North Sikkim Milk Union], Block Development Officer [Dz-ongu], Deputy Director [Horticulture], District Information Officer [North], Assistant Engineer [Roads & Bridges], AE [Irrigation], AE [Agriculture] and various field staff.

It may be mentioned here, Noom Panang is a remote village located in Passingdang Saffo GPU and the team had to trek for an hour to reach the village from Lingthem. The village of Noom Panang is currently one of the few vegetable clus-ters in the district and is



currently producing vegetables which are sent to

Gangtok.

A Gram Sabha was or ganized by the villagers and during the Sabha an interaction with the district officials was held.

The villagers evinced

keen interest to produce vegetables on a large scale as per the organic mission of the Government of Sikkim. However, due to the shortage of wa-ter in the district, the vegetable production is being hampered, they informed.

Further, the does not have any road connectivity and villag-ers stated that it leads to huge transportation costs which eat into their profits. The villagers therefore demanded that road connectivity and water supply works be taken up on priority to give further fillip to the organic production. The villagers stated that in order to take up dairy farming, a stockman centre at Passingdang was required.

Mr Bonpo stated that water supply for irriga-tion will be taken up un-der Pradhan Mantri Krishi Sichayee Yojana [PMKSY] and the work will be taken up shortly by the Agriculture Department. He directed the AE, Roads & Bridges to take up the preparation for DPR for road connectivity.

Further, the DC appealed to the villagers to revive the co-operative societies and set up milk collection centres. He said that the villages should also focus on dairy farming for livelihood

generation and to aid the organic mission in the villages. He assured that all help will be extended by the district administration for getting loans for dairy farming under Dairy Entrepreneurship Development Scheme of NABARD.

The District Collec-tor also visited the ICDS Centers and the Primary School of the villages. He said that necessary repairs of these centers will be undertaken.

Gas disaster survivors to campaign against BJP in MP bypolls

BHOPAL, FEB 15 (PTI): The organisations working for the cause of the Bhopal gas trage-dy victims today said they will campaign against the BJP in the upcoming bypolls to two Assembly seats in Madhya Pradesh.

They alleged that the rul-ing party has failed to resolve the issue of compensation to those who suffered in the world's worst industrial disaster.

five organisations fighting for the rights of the gas victims told reporters that they will raise their issues during the campaign for the Mungaoli and Kolaras Assembly seats bypolls slated this



month, and also during the

Stationery Karmchari Sangh they would highlight the al-Bhopal Gas Peedit Mahila leged false promises made by BJP leaders regarding compensation to the industrial disaster victims in their voter education programme

ahead of the bypolls.
"We plan to share copies of official documents with the electorate in the two areas to substantiate our allegations of betrayal by the BJP leaders," she said.

"The by-elections will be our first step in making the long pending issues of the

gas disaster a part of state polls later this year and the general elections next year," she further said.

"We hope to provide a critical edge to ensure the defeat of BIP in Mungaoli and Kolaras," Rashida Bee added.

The bypolls in Mungaoli and Kolaras Assembly seats will be held on February 24, and the counting of votes would take place on February 28.

The byelections were necessitated following the death of the sitting Congress MLAs Mahendra Singh Kalukheda (from Mungaoli) and Ram Singh Yadav (Kolaras).

The non-performing assets (NPA) level in agriculture advances as on June 30, 2017 was Rs 5,731 crore, which went up to Rs 6,611 crore as on December 31,2017, rising by Rs 880 crore in

a period of six months.

The Punjab government had announced the debt waiver scheme in June 2017.

Crop loan waiver for up to Rs 2 lakh for small and marginal farmers (up to 5 acres) and a flat Rs 2 lakh relief for all other marginal farmers would be given, thus benefiting over 10 lakh farmers.

In the first phase, the state government has waived cooperative loans of 47,000 small and marginal growers belonging to five districts worth Rs 167.39 crore out of the approved 1.60 lakh cases with loans worth Rs 748 crore.

The government has already identified 5.63 lakh farmers, who took loan of nearly Rs 2,700 crore from the cooper-ative institutions as on March 31, 2017.

The agricultural advances in Punjab witnessed an increase of Rs 4,873 crore -- from Rs 68,199 crore in December 2016 to Rs 73.072 crore in December 2017, showing a growth of 7.14 per cent,

Modi visits Arunachal, says people greet each other with 'Jai Hind' in the state

ITANAGAR, FEB 15 (PTI): Visiting Arunachal Pradesh under the shadow of protests by Chi-na, Prime Minister Narendra Modi today hailed the patriotic nature of the people of the border state, saying they greet each other with 'Jai Hind' and announced naming the New Delhi-Naharlagun Express as

"Arunachal Express".

Modi's second visit to
Arunachal Pradesh was vehemently opposed by China which urged India to refrain from taking any action that may "complicate" the bound-ary question. It is his first visit to the frontier state after the Army s standoff with Chinese soldiers in Doklam plateau last year.

Modi, who earlier visited Arunachal Pradesh in February 2015, told a public rally here that he "cannot stay without meeting you all". China claims Arunachal Pradesh as part of South Tibet.
Clad in traditional tribal

headgear, Modi dedicated the

state civil secretariat building to the people, laid the foundation stone for the Academic Block of the Tomo Riba Institute of Health and Medical Dorjee Khandu state convention centre.

"My visit to Arunachal Pradesh is related to three key projects in the state. The

secretariat is already functional and this was a good step taken by the state gov-ernment," he said at the rally at the Indira Gandhi Park here before leaving for Tripura to address election rallies. The prime minister hailed

the patriotic nature of the people of Arunachal, saying they greet each other with 'Jai Hind'.

Modi also announced that the New Delhi-Naharlagun Express would now be called "Arunachal Express". The train, he said, will connect the "people of the state with mainland India".

The frequency of the train, connecting the national capital to the state, would

two days a week.

Modi complimented Chief Minister Pema Khandu for the wonderful work he is doing". "He has prepared a top

quality roadmap on how Arunachal Pradesh should be in 2027. And, he did not only ask officials for inputs but also people from all walks of life," he added.

On other issues, Modi accused the previous UPA regime of neglecting the North East and said his government has given priority to the region with ministers and senior officials regularly visiting it.

Seeking to highlight the significance of the region, he said important meetings should not only be held in the national capital but "we must go to all states. And that is why I came to Shillong for a Northeastern Council meeting. An important meeting related to agriculture was held in Sikkim."

Without naming Manmo-

mer prime minister could not visit the state on the pretext of workload, "But I am such a PM who cannot stay without meeting you all".

The prime minister said

he would personally tell peo-ple to go to Arunachal Pradesh to hold important meetings at the convention centre.

This is more than a building, it is a vibrant centre that will further the aspirations of Arunachal Pradesh. There will be conferences and cultural activities that will draw government officials and private companies," he said.

Modi said he has directed the state government not to wait for inauguration of any project but start utilising it after its completion.

Modi said the Centre is taking up the Ayushman Bharat Yojana on mission mode to provide quality and affordable health care to nearly 50 crore people across

He said the scheme, billed as the world's largest govern-ment-funded health care programme, is a path-breaking initiative and would bring a "paradigm shift" in the health sector.
"The scale of this scheme

is un-parallelled and it will bring a paradigm shift in our health sector. It is time to give India a health care system that makes quality treatment affordable within a limit of Rs

5 lakh per family," he said.

Modi asked the state
government to frame a new health policy and work to at-tract private investments in the sector.

Referring to the BJP-led NDA government's crusade corruption, Modi said the government has been able to curb corruption through the direct bank transfer (DBT) scheme.
"The Centre has saved Rs

54,000 crore through Aadhaar-enabled direct benefit transfer of about 400 government schemes," he added.



1,000 rubber units face closure due to carbon black shortage

other countries face anti-dumping duties. Due to this, small & medium rubber units are facing short-age of carbon black and resultant price hike," association senior vice-presi-dent Vikram Makar told

reporters here today. Carbon black shortage is so severe since the past few months that over 1,000 units are on the verge of closure, which will lead to loss of nearly 2 lakh jobs, while the industry is losing about Rs 750 crore every month, Makar said.


Carbon black is the most preferred reinforc-ing material and filler in rubber products, both in tyre and non- tyre seg-ments, comprising 25-30 per cent of the product by weight. It is also used in plastics, paints and inks as colouring pigments.
The domestic rubber

industry is seen growing at 8.42 per cent CAGR during 2016-2020. However, the carbon black capacity has not grown in the past couple of years, commensurate with the demand.

Current crabon black demand is 12.85 lakh tonne as against capacity of 9.5 lakh tonne. A gap of 3.25 lakh tonne, thus is

primarily due to lack of ca-pacity addition by current carbon black manufacturers in the last two years

To tide over this crisis the association has urged government to make a few policy amendments immediately to save small and medium sized units from closing down by allowing imports and curb or stop export of carbon black, he said.

Good Rules Don't Safe Roads Make

Regulations are required, but try building consistency first

 \mathbf{T} wo fatal accidents were reported on Sikkim roads within hours of each other on Tuesday. Expect some noise and efforts to make the roads safer in the coming days and then prepare for the push lose momentum and for things to return to their dangerous self. That said, if the roads are policed for safety even for a brief while, it would be helpful. It would however not be worthwhile because people know that initiatives lose steam and instead of making safe driving a habit, they will just wait out the drive and return recklessness to the roads eventually. After all, did the authorities not announce speed-limits for Sikkim roads at around this time last year? Does anyone, including the traffic cops, know what's happening with that rule? But such amnesia was expected. Setting speed limits is a welcome move, bt one needs to realize that good rules need even better implementation to be of any consequence.

Knowing Sikkim, the speed-limit regulation was always destined to have been only superficially thought out, and even if implemented, done so only for nuisance value for some time and then forgotten. To begin with, how were speed-limits be checked everywhere, and how were the breaking of speed limits penalized? What were the always-on-prowl traffic cops to check more diligently against - unauthorized/ irrespon-sible parking, dangerous driving or over-speeding? Was the speed regulation to applied to all vehicles? Couldn't be, because parking rules don't appear to be universally applicable and VIPs treated to empty slots kept empty in anticipation of their arrival even in areas like MG Marg where private citizens are allowed only 10-minute pauses. One wonders why the speed limit rule was even formalized. Again, most people would think that it was to make the roads safer. But, if it is only the private citizens who need to observe the speed limits while the VIPs and their officers can ignore it, then one would be forced to surmise that private vehicles are being intentionally slowed down so that those who consider themselves "very important" can move very fast.

If that was not the case, then ensure that the speed regulation is extended to every vehicle on the roads. And this brings one back to the need for improved implementation to ensure that well intentioned moves deliver on their promise. Some years ago, the Motor Vehicle Rules were marked for an amendment to deliver a stronger commitment to making vehicular traffic safer in Sikkim. The proposed amendment required a driver to produce a driving license issued from hill regions or procure such a special permit from Sikkim before being allowed to ferry passengers as a taxi driver in the State. The idea was sound. At one level it ensured that those hired as taxi drivers in Sikkim were tried hands on hill roads and not landing jobs despite suspect driving skills only because they have managed to buy a driving license elsewhere. The requirement to get these permits renewed and the powers given to the licensing authorities here to verify the antecedents of the applicants ensured that drivers took their jobs more seriously and the authorities have a paper trail to follow in case someone absconds after a mishap (a common response). One wonders where this rule sits nowadays because it sure does not appear to be in practical practice. Agreed, this one was complicated and presented many genuine complications, but in the many years that have passed, these could have been ironed out to guarantee that drivers of passenger vehicles in Sikkim had tested driving skills. That is a substantial assurance to receive for passengers nowadays.

The point being reiterated is that 'good rules' need

good implementation to deliver 'good results.' After all, there is no dearth of either good rules or good intentions in the country, but it is in the delivery that everything goes wrong. More awareness and more stringent stipulations to keep the roads safe are welcome, but almost immediately raise the fear of more complicated red tape, more powerful officials, more dugdi. These don't make travel safe. A more genuine and sustained engagement, however, could.

Why security measures won't stop school shootings in USA

When deadly school shootings like the one that took place on Valentine's Day in Broward County, Florida occur, often they are followed by calls for more stringent security measures.

For instance, after the Jan. 23 case in which a

15-year-old student allegedly shot and killed two students and wounded 16 others at a small-town high school in Kentucky, some Kentucky lawmak ers called for armed teachers and staff.

If anything, the response of the Kentucky law-kers represents what has been called the "target-hardening" approach to school shootings. This

approach attempts to fortify schools against gun violence through increased security measures. These measures may include metal detectors, lock-down policies, "run, hide, fight" training and surveillance cameras.

While some of these measures seem sensible, overall there is little empirical evidence that such security measures decrease the likelihood of school shootings. Surveillance cameras were powerless to stop the carnage in Columbine and school lockdown policies did not save the children at Sandy Hook.

As researchers who have collaboratively written about school shootings, we believe what is missing from the discussion is the idea of an educational response. Current policy responses do not address the fundamental ques-tion of why so many mass shootings take place in

schools. To answer this question, we need to get to the heart of how students experience school and the meaning that schools have in American life.

An educational response is important because the "target hardening" approach might actually make things worse by changing students' experience of schools in ways that suggest violence rather than prevent it.

HOW SECURITY MEASURES CAN BACKFIRE

Filling schools with metal detectors, surveillance cameras, police officers and gun-wielding teachers tells students that schools are scary, dangerous and violent places - places where violence is expected

The "target hardening" approach also has the potential to change how teachers, students and administrators see one another. How teachers un-derstand the children and youth they teach has important educational consequences. Are students budding citizens or future workers? Are they plants to nourish or clay to mold?

One of the most common recommendations for schools, for example, is that they should be en-

gaged in threat assessment. Checklists are sometimes suggested to school personnel to determine when students should be considered as having the potential for harm. While such practices have their place, as a society we should be aware that these practices change how teachers think of students: not as budding learners, but potential shooters; not with the potential to grow and flourish, but with the potential to enact lethal harm

Of course, society can think of students in different ways at different times. But the more teachers think of students as threats to be assessed, the less educators will think of students as individuals to nourish and cultivate.

As researchers, we have read the accounts of dozens of different school shootings, and we think educators, parents and others should begin to raise the following questions about schools.

QUESTIONS OF STATUS

To what extent does the school – through things like athletics, homecoming royalties, or dances and so forth - encourage what some political scientists have called the "status tournament of adolescence" that lurks behind the stories of many school shootings?

As one reads about such shootings, one often senses a feeling of social anxiety and betrayal on the part of perpetrator. Americans hold high expectations for schools as places of friendship and romance, yet too often students find alienation, humiliation and isolation. The frustration at these thwarted expectations at least sometimes seems to turn toward the school itself.

FORCE AND CONTROL ISSUES

To what extent does the force and coercion employed by many schools contribute to a "might makes right" mentality and associated violence?

It is true that bullying is part of some of the sto-

ries of school shooters. Students who are bullied or who are bullies themselves will quite naturally think of schools as places appropriate for violence. There is also sometimes a rage, however, against the day-to-day imposition of school discipline and punishment. Since schools are experienced as places of force and control, for some students, they also come to be seen as appropriate places for violence

IDENTITY AND EXPRESSION

In research on American high schools, one finds the idea that American schools are intertwined with notions of "expressive individualism" – the idea that human beings should find out and be true to who they really are on the inside. Might this also

contribute to school shoot-

Suburban high schools, in particular, are seen by the middle class as places to accomplish expressive projects. Sociologist Robert Bulman points out, for example, how Hollywood films set in suburban settings focus on student journeys of self-discovery, while urban school films for cus on heroic teachers and academic achievement. In the same vein, many suburban school shooters see what they are doing as acts of

self-expression. Reading stories of school shootings, one often finds moments in which the shooters claim that something inside, whether hatred or frustration, needed to find expression. An example of this is the manifesto left by Luke

Woodham, who shot two stu-dents in 1997. "I am not spoiled or lazy," he wrote, "for murder is not weak or slow-witted, murder is gutsy and daring." The school became the place where Woodham thought he could express the

gutsy and daring person he found on the inside.

WHAT TO DO
Of course, it will be difficult to definitively answer the questions we have posed above. And, even if we are able to find answers, it is not clear what the proper educational response should be.

For example, self-expression might be a valuable task for schools, even if it is found to contribute in some way to school shootings. Our suggestion is simply that, instead of trying to find solutions to school shootings in the dubious arms of security technologies, or even solely through more promising public policy, society should ask deeper quesabout the nature of education and schooling in American society.

It is time to think about school shootings not as a problem of security, but also as a problem of education.

Senegal's rappers continue to 'cry from the heart' for a more just society

merican musicians were once in-American musicians were once material to political activism. The 1963 March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom is recognised as a seminal moment in American history and a triumph for nonviolent resistance. Harry Belafonte, then a 36-year-old superstar of music, television and film, was at the forefront, serving as a confidant to Martin Luther King and helping to bankroll the Black Freedom Movement. Today few American artists seem willing to take such an active role in political struggles.

But across the Atlantic musicians in many African countries are in the vanguard of popular struggles, not only providing a symbolic soundtrack

but marching on the frontlines and leading social movements. Take Nigeria, where Seun Kuti car-ries on the legacy of his father Fela by confronting the country's venal political elite. In Burkina Faso rappers helped overthrow Blaise Compaore.

In Africa's newest country, South Sudan, a new collective of musicians and artists, Ana Taban, has emerged as some of the few critics of the country's kleptocratic rulers. And in Tanzania the legendary father of Swahili hip hop and opposition member of parliament sits in jail, Sugu, accused of insulting the country's increasingly autocratic president, John Magufuli. One of the most notable examples of

artists in the Belafonte mould is the musical collective Keur Gui in Dakar, Senegal. Already among the most popular within Senegal's lively hip hop scene, their profile grew exponentially in 2011

President Abdoulaye Wade's attempt to steal a third presidential term

ACTIVISM ON A TRUCK
In 2011 Keur Gui's lead rappers Thiat and Kilifeu joined other musicians and journalists to form the Y'en a Marre (Fed Up) movement to mobilise youth against Wade. During their campaign, Keur Gi recorded songs that became the cri de coeur (cry from the heart) of the broader movement.

Along with other musician-activists the group toured the country in a flat-bed truck with a built-in soundsystem playing in small towns and rural villages bringing their message to distant communities. This was essential in a country where the average age is just over 18 and 70% live in rural areas.

Thiat was arrested and detained following a rally in Dakar's Obélisque Square for allegedly calling the Presi-dent a "liar" and saying that the then 85-year-old was too old to govern. Y'en a Marre's actions were crucial in en-suring Wade's defeat and his replacement by Macky Sall.

Rather than rest on their laurels, Keur Gui, especially the charismatic Thiat, have continued their activism. In Senegal where politicians have histor ically sought to legitimatise their gov-ernments by co-opting popular mu-sicians, Keur Gui was offered a share of the spoils of the new regime. They refused, insisting that their vision was never simply to change elected leaders.

Rather, their movement Y'en a Marre pushes for a vision of democratic

transformation beyond the ballot box.
Inspired by legendary pan-Africanists like Amilcar Cabral, Thiat, who

of the one made famous by Cabral, has worked to organise and support other artist-led social movements in Africa including Balai Citoyen in Burkina Faso.

In 2014, the group released a follow up album featuring the single Diogoufi ("Nothing has changed").

Shot with the aesthetic sensibility of a film by the Senegalese director Ousmane Sembene, the video begins with Thiat sitting outside a store as ordinary Senegalese try and fail to purchase basic goods. Over a mournful piano loop, Thiat offers a frustrated commentary (translations of the original Wolof and French lyrics were provided to me by Thiat) on the failure of the new political adership to bring about change:

Same electoral promises Same selling of our lands
The country's in total chaos
Its only two years and we're already fed up.

Through the 1980s Senegal once boasted a robust and diverse econ-omy that posted impressive growth. But decades of austerity programmes have left the government indebted to foreign donors and largely incapable of providing much in the way of social

While cognisant of the role the in-ternational community has played in Senegal's impoverishment, Thiat's lens always remains sharply focused on the failings of the country's political elite:

A government pushed into power

They fail in their duty Lazy regime No vision Permanent mess

Get out of here!

Kilifeu, whose gritty melodic ca-dence balances Thiat's straight deliv-ery, echoes his calls for a new vision and new political leaders in his lacerating solo verses:

The leaders hang on to the power In spite of the opposition of the population.

Politicians are all the same, no dif-

Only broken promises and lies. We are fed up of your nonsense, We really need change. CYNICAL MANOEUVRES

The international community remains mitted to a vision of democratic reform for Africa that centres on electoral competition over empowering ordinary people. Political elites circu-late between political parties while en-gaging in cynical institutional manoeuvres that further entrench their power.

Even where regimes blatantly violate any notion of democratic process as in Rwanda, Kenya and the Dem-ocratic Republic of Congo currently, diplomats insist that elections equate democracy going as far as telling pro-testers to "stand down" as a leading Congolese activist recently told me.

"There are no other options but elections," they suggest. The truth is that we've failed to recognise the new political visions being articulated by young musicians and activists across the continent. Instead of lecturing them on how things should be, per haps it is time for us to just listen

The combine strength of the CPN-UML and CPN-Maoist Centre was 174, sufficient to form a majority government at the Centre. The Madhesi parties, Ras-

triya Janta Party Nepal has got 17 and Federal Socialist Party Nepal has got 16 seats in the Parliamentary elections.

The elections were seen as the final step in Nepal's transition to a federal democracy following a decade-long civil war till 2006 that claimed more than 16.000 lives.

In 2015, when Nepal adopted a new Constitution that

split it into seven states, dozens of people were killed in ethnic clashes over territory and rights.

Following the adoption of the new Constitution, the eth-nic Madhesi group, mostly of Indian-origin, protested for months, saying they were not getting enough territory in one of the provinces and were also facing discrimination.

The polls were seen as a major step towards implementing the new Constitution.

Oli had served as deputy prime minister during the then interim government led by Girija Prasad Koirala in 2006 after the successful conclusion of the second Peoples Movement. He was elected as a member of Parliament in the House of Representatives for the first time from Ihapa district in 1991.

He had also served as Minister of Home Affairs in 1994 1995. He was re-elected to the House of Representatives from Jhapa electorate in 1999.

"We will lodge stern representations with the Indian side," he said.

Geng said that China and India had reached important consensus on properly managing disputes, and the two sides were working to resolve the territorial disputes through negotiation and consultation.

"The Chinese side

urges the Indian side to honour its commitment and abide by the relevant consensus, and refrain from taking any action that may complicate the boundary question, Geng said.

"(These three areas)

located between the illegal 'McMahon Line' and the traditional customary boundary between China and India, have always been Chinese been territory," he said in the Xinhua report, adding that the 'McMahon Line' drawn by Britain in 1914 was an attempt to incor-porate the areas into In-

dian territory.

He urged India to cherish the hard-won momentum of improvements in bilateral relations and create enabling conditions for the boundary talks and the development of bilateral relations.

China routinely protests visits by Indian leaders to Arunachal Pradesh and reiterates its claims over the state.

The India-China border dispute stretches across 3,488 kms. Both sides have held 20 rounds of talks so far through their Special Representatives to resolve the issue.

KATHMANDU, FEB 15 (PTI): Nepal will have a new president on March 5 in place of the Himalayan nation's first woman president Bidhya Devi Bhandari, according to sources at the country's election commission.

While the election for Nepal's new president would be held on March 5, the vice president would be elected on

March 16, they said.

The Election Commission of Nepal has proposed the dates for the elections after consulting the leaders of major political parties.

However, the final date and schedule of the election will be announced after the new Cabinet makes formal decision in this regard, the sources said.

Bhandari was elected as the first woman president of Nepal in Octo-

With the formation of the new Parliament, the tenure of the president expires. The process of electing a new esident starts once the new prime minister is appointed.

CPN-UML chairperson K P Sharma Oli today became Nepal's Prime Minister for the second time, over two months after his Left alliance routed the ruling Nepali Congress in the country's historic parliamentary polls.

Oli had earlier served as the couns's prime minister from October 11, 2015 to August 3, 2016.

Earlier, former prime minister Sher Bahadur Deuba had addressed the nation and submitted his resignation to the president.

EAST LONDON (SOUTH AFRICA), FEB 15 (PTI): A perfect start achieved, the Indian women's cricket team would look to continue its supremacy over South Africa when the two sides clash in the second Twenty20 International, here Friday.

After a 2-1 win in the ODI series, the Indian women started the T20 series on a confident note. drubbing the hosts by sev en wickets here in the first game on Monday.

And the Harmanpreet Kaur-led side would look to carry on the momentum in the remainder of

the five-match series.

The way the Indians came out all guns blazing in the first T20, it seemed the loss in the inconsequential third ODI prior to the series was just a rare bad day in office and their confidence hardly took a beating.

Opting to bowl, the Indian women first restricted South Africa to 164 for four and then overhauled the target with consummate ease in 18.5 overs.

While chasing, opener Mithali Raj (54 not out) held the Indian innings together and shared two crucial stands -- a 69-run partnership for the third wicket with debutant Jemimah Rodrigues (37) and a 52-run fourth-wicket stand with Veda Krishnamurthy (37 not out)

-- to steer her side home.

Mithali's knock, her
11th T20 International half century, came off 48 deliveries with the help of



half a dozen fours and one six and the Indian team management would hope for an encore from the experienced batswoman.

The 17-year-old Mumbai player, Rodrigues, also batted impressively on her debut, hitting four boundaries and a six during her breezy 27-ball knock, while Krishnamurthy was at her attacking best.

Opener Smriti Mand-hana made 28 but she would be hoping for a big knock tomorrow.

Skipper Harmanpreet Kaur too would be hoping to score big after a first-ball duck in the last match, owing to a run out.

The Indian batting

looks in good form but the visitors' bowling is a cause of concern in the absence of veteran pacer Jhulan Goswami, who has been ruled out of the series be-cause of a heel injury.

Young fast Pooja Vastrakar (1/34)certainly looked nervous on her debut and her pace colleague Shikha Pandey's (1/41) performance was a

In the absence of Jhulan, Pandey would need to shoulder more responsibility upfront in the bowling department.
T20 specialist off-spin-

ner Anuia Patil was the star for India in the last match, claiming 2 for 23 in her four overs to pin down South Af-

rica's batting line-up.

But she would definitely need support from the likes of Poonam Yaday, Radha Yadav and Harmanpreet.

"It's good to have the oungsters in the squad. Usually when you have a few new members, they get a lot of positive energy into the team and they are quite active on the ground

too," Mithali had said after the first match.

For South Africa, the key would be not to get bogged down by the setback and build on the positives.

Chloe Tryon s ballistic 32 not out from seven balls, including two fours and four sixes, was a big takeaway from the last match and skipper Dane van Niekerk is hoping that the team builds on it.

"We need to regroup, we need to speak open and honestly with each other and see where we can change stuff. Our fielding wasn't at its best and we pride ourselves on our

fielding," Niekerk has said. "T20 is so short and the margins are so much smaller, so hopefully we can bounce back in the next few. I'd like to win the next four and go away from this tour smiling."

Relentless India eye 5-1, South Africa aim consolation

A historic series triumph sealed, India are expected to put their bench strength to test while a vanquished South Africa would aim for a consolatory win when the two sides square off in the sixth and final ODI, here Friday.

The Men in Blue have already won the six-match series with a 4-1 margin, after victories in Durban, Centurion, Cape Town and Port Elizabeth. Their only loss came at the rain-affected fourth ODI in Johannesburg.

With victory in the last game, India

also confirmed their No.1 spot in the ICC ODI Rankings, taking over from South Africa who were sitting atop at the start of this series.

Having won the series. India would like to carry on momentum, especially with the three-match T20I series to follow soon after. Yet, the visitors would also like to find a balance between going all out in a dead rubber and resting a few players keeping in mind a long overseas schedule later this year.

Bhuvneshwar Kumar has nearly played non-stop since the limited-overs leg of the tour of Sri Lanka, featuring in 19 ODIs and six T20Is as well as two Tests on this tour.

Jasprit Bumrah too has played 20 ODIs since that Lanka tour, along with eight T20Is and his workload has only increased given that he played through the Test series here as well. Some rest will do both of them some good especially ahead of the next contest

Alternately, India's second line of pace attack needs some attention. Since that Sri Lanka tour, the Men in Blue have played 20 ODIs and the Kumar-Bumrah duo has not featured together in only one of them -- at Bengaluru against Australia

One way to look at this is the splendid job they have done as the foremost newball pairing in limited-overs' cricket.

The other way, of course, is that Team India is too dependent on them and should look to build back-up options, should look to build back-up options, given the preparatory mode for the 2019 World Cup.

Mohammed Shami has only played three ODIs since the 2015 World Cup. Ever since he returned from injury, he has featured twice against West Indies (2017) and then once against Australia. Shardul Thakur, the fourth pacer in

this current squad, has only ever played in two ODIs. It suffices to say that India



ond-choice pace attack and despite the success of Kumar-Bumrah combination,

this aspect needs urgent attention.

The middle-order continues to be another area of focus. There has only been one half-century contributed from Nos. 4-7 in this series. After Ajinkya Rahane's effort in Durban, only MS Dhoni came close at the Wanderers when he played the situation with 42 not out off 43 balls.

Shreyas Iyer has got starts in both the matches he has played but failed to capitalise. Rahane too has fizzled out since his comeback at No.4. Hardik Pandya has scored 26 runs in four innings in this ODI series. The slow nature of pitches is one of the reasons being attributed to this downturn.

With the top-order doing well and essentially eating out 30-35 overs in every game, the middle-order has been forced

It also needs to be mentioned that South Africa's death bowling is seen to be their only high point of the series so far.


