Bengal invites GNLF for talks on Darjeeling on 29 Aug

KOLKATA, AUG 22 (PTI): Extending an olive branch, the West Bengal government today invited the GNLF for talks on August 29 on the Darjeeling stalemate, but snubbed agitation spearhead GIM.

I received a letter from the Gorkha Gorkha National Liberation Front (GNLF) last night and with-in 24 hours we have responded.

Doors for a dialogue have to be always kept open," Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee told a press conference at the state secretariat after returning from a visit to flood-affected areas of north Bengal.

She said that the state government accepted the propos-al of the GNLF, a constituent of the Gorkhaland Movement Co-ordination Committee (GMCC), for a dialogue and fixed August 29 for the discussion at the state secretariat.

But Banerjee made no mention of agitation spearhead Gorkha Janmukti Morcha

Miffed with the West Ben gal government for respond-ing to GNLF's appeal for talks, GMCC convenor and GJM vice president Kalyan Dewan said a dialogue can only be successful if the main stake holders of the Gorkhaland movement are invited for talks.

"Responding to GNLF's appeal is nothing but an effort to undermine the GJM and GMCC," Dewan told PTI.

Describing the request of the GNLF to hold dialogue as a "good and constructive gesture", Banerjee said, "Major political parties and development boards, which have been involved in develop

in the hills, will be invited for the meeting."

The chief minister said,

"The state government is for development and always open to hold talks to restore peace in the hills."

Banerjee said only the GNLF till now had expressed its willingness for talks to end the indefinite shutdown in Darjeeling.

The agitation entered its 69th day today.
"A stalemate is continuing

in the hills. Any other major political party apart from the GNLF, which is in favour of peace and willing to partici-pate in talks, is welcome. My government is always ready

for talks," she said.

Recalling that meetings
were earlier held to initiate
a dialogue, Banerjee said, "I

had held a meeting with the chairmen of different (development) boards."

She said later state Chief Secretary Maloy Kumar Dey also held a meeting but not all representatives of various parties participated in it.

Banerjee said there would be discussion on the destruc-tion and vandalism which affected normal life and tourism.

"The police and general public have shown restraint. A few people have lost their lives in the current unrest. Many government and private properties in the hills were destroyed during this period. There will be discussions on them also," she said

She said that normalcy was being restored slowly in different parts of Darjeeling and Mirik.

Gorkhaland movement is led by the GJM and it is the GJM which called the indefinite shutdown over two months back. The GIM is also the main stakeholder of the GMCC. If the state government wants the talks to be fruitful, it has to officially call the GJM and GMCC for talks."

"The GNLF may be a constitent of the GMCC but it is not the main stakeholder with whom

talks can be held," he said.

Dewan said, "Responding to GNLF's appeal is nothing but an effort by the state gov-ernment to undermine the GJM and GMCC."

Yesterday, GJM joint sec-retary Binay Tamang had requested both the state and central governments to initiate talks at the earliest to restore peace and normalcy in the hills.

SC bans 'triple talaq'

NEW DELHI, AUG 22 (PTI): In a path-breaking verdict, the Supreme Court today banned the 1,400 year-old practice of instant 'triple talag among Sunni Muslims and set it aside on several grounds including that it was against the basic tenets of the Holy Quran and violated the Islamic

law Shariat.

A five-judge Constitution bench, by a majority of 3:2 in which the Chief Justice J S Khehar found himself in a minority, said in a one line order: "In view of the different opinions recorded by a majority of 3:2, the practice of 'talaq-e-biddat' triple talaq is set aside."

The three separate verdicts totalling 395 pages, written for the majority by Justices Kuri-an Joseph and R F Nariman did not concur with the minority view of the CJI and Justice S A Nazeer that 'triple talaq' was a part of religious prac-tice and the government should step in and bring

in a law. The three judges, Justices Joseph, Nariman and U U Lalit, expressly disagreed with the CJI and Justice Nazeer on the key issue whether triple talag was fundamental to

Islam.

The verdict was immediately welcomed by leaders across the political spectrum, social activists and top jurists who hailed it as a victory of "gender equality" and a "giant step" for women, with Prime Minister Nar-endra Modi saying it has granted equality to Mus-

similar Echoing senior advocate Mukul Rohatgi, who had advanced Centre's stand against the practice as Attorney General, wel-comed the ruling saying it was a step towards achieving the ultimate goal of a uniform civil

code (UCC).

He said the government's stand was "completely vindicated" and the judgement has restored the dignity of the Muslim women who can now march to progress like other citizens of the

Venugopal also comed the verdict which upheld the stand of

upheld the stand of the NDA government, while legal luminary Soli Sorabjee said "it is a progressive judgement which has protected the rights of the women and now no Muslim man can divorce his wife through this method." With triple talag be-

ing set aside, now Sunni Muslims, among whom the practice was prevalent, will not be able to take recourse to this mode as it would be ʻvoid ab initio" (illegal at the outset).

They are now left with two other modes of securing divorce - 'talaq hasan' and 'talag ahsan after the apex court today set aside the 'talaq-e-biddat' or triple talaq. Under 'talaq ahsan', a

Muslim man can divorce his spouse by pronounc-ing 'talaq' once every month in three consecutive months, which would be signified by menstruation cycles.

As per 'talaq hasan', divorce can be given by pronouncing talaq "during successive tuhrs (menstruation cycles)" with no intercourse during any of the three

Writing the majority judgement, Justice Joseph said "I find it extremely difficult to agree with the CJI that the practice of triple talaq has to be considered integral to religious denomination in question and that the same is part of their per-sonal law." This view was shared by Justices Nariman and Lalit who were part of the majority.

Referring to the verses of the Holy Quran, Jus-tice Joseph said, "They are clear and unambiguous as far as talaq is con-cerned. The Holy Quran has attributed sanctity and permanence to mat-

rimony. "However, in tremely unavoidable situations, talaq is permissible. But an attempt for reconciliation, and if it succeeds, then revoca-turn to pg03

No wonder then, the Su-preme Court has found the practice of triple talaq "whimsical, capricious and arbi-trary". Six months down the line the Parliament is incumbent to frame a law against the practice and till then, the practice stands struck down. A red letter day indeed in keeping with the spirit of democracy and the Constitution.

Alleging the verdict intruded on their religious practices and threatens the pluralistic fabric of the nation, resistance

will brew in certain quarters. The argument that personal laws cannot be re-written in the name of reforms and the validity of the Muslim personal law cannot be tested as it derives from the Quran, will also be proffered.

But, such opposition of the historic judgement is diametrically opposite to the world-wide trend on triple talaq. Several Muslim countries

countries that follow the Sharia Law including Pakistan and Bangladesh have banned the practice of triple talag. Turkey and Cyprus have inand so have Tunisia and Algeria. Triple talaq is also invalid in Iran under the Shia Law.

Muslim women of the country will now breathe easy. No more instant divorces over the cell phone or social media. No more uncertain future if a marriage hits a rough patch. Fundamental right at last has been estab-lished, but not before countless fell victim to the whim of triple talaq. However, it is better late than never.

With the triple talag issue now settled, it is also time

to focus on equally inhuman trends such as dowry practice and violence against women in general in this country. If women of the Islamic com-munity were saddled with the arbitrary blight of instant divorce that has ruined countless lives so far, domestic vi-olence arising out of dowry practice is a genuine stain among sections of the majority community.

If abolishing triple talaq is in the interest to safeguard the fundamental right of Muslim women, stringent action should also be taken against all or resorting to post marriage violence on the dowry issue. Practiced surreptitiously, the system in one word must go.

That aside, violence against women irrespective of community is on the rise. Several such incidents in the recent past have rocked the nation. The authorities that be should ensure steps to dis-courage such unsavoury activities as severely as possible.

Ending triple talaq alone would otherwise not guarantee the fundamental rights of women in this country.



Bihar flood toll rises to 341; PM's aerial survey on Aug 26

PATNA, AUG 22 (PTI): With 37 more deaths, the toll in Bihar flood rose to 341 today even as 1.46 crore people are affected by the deluge in 18 districts of the state.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi would make an aerial survey of flood affected districts of Bihar on August 26, said Dep-uty Chief Minister Sushil Kumar Modi.

"PM coming on 26th Aug for aerial survey of flood affected dists of Bihar (sic)," Sushil Modi said in a tweet.

The flood toll stood at 304 till yesterday in Bi-har with 1.38 crore people battling the deluge in 18 districts.

Around 7.61 lakh

people have been shift-ed to safer areas. With water receding in some places many people have returned home. Special Secretary in

Disaster Manage-Department Anirudh Kumar said that 2.29 lakh people are putting up



in 1,085 relief camps.

AITA terminates contract of CTL, leaves Vijay Amritraj shocked

New Delhi, Aug 22 (PTI): The All India Tennis Association (AITA) today terminated the contract of Vijay Amritraj's Champions Tennis League due to breach of contract, much to the shock of the former star. who says the move has come at a time when they were striving to revive the League.
The All India Tennis

Association (AITA) had entered into a nine-year contract in 2014 with Second Serve Private Limited (SSPL), led by Amritraj, who was one of the Direc-

tors of the company.
The AITA Secretary
General Hironmoy Chatterjee said that the organisers have failed to pay Rs 30 lakh to them as Annual Fixed fee for 2016 season, apart from 10 percent of surplus amount in the first two years.

"They did not con-

duct league last year and the contract was to have it for nine years without any break. They did not pay the fixed fee of Rs 30 lakh, so it was a breach of contract. We had given them a chance to conduct it this year to which they initially agreed," Chatterjee told PTI.

"But later on, they said that the franchises would not agree to have it for just 2017 season. They insisted that we allow them to conduct it for nine year as per the agreement but our Executive Committee rejected it," Chatterjee.

The senior AITA official also said CTL organisers also failed to pay 10 per cent of surplus amount

"They never paid that 10 per cent citing losses, Chatterjee further added. When contacted, Am-

ritraj told PTI that they are completely shocked to hear the news. He also revealed that AITA had Annual Fixed fee.

"They knew very well that we were regrouping and making efforts to re-vive it. They wanted to almost double the amount of fee," Amritraj said.

They have all our balance sheets. that show we have incurred losses, so how we would have paid 10 percent of surplus when there was no profit," he said.

CTL CEO Arjun Rao said they were in the middle of reviving the league and were talking teams and asserted that it was not a flawed financial model.

"I would not say it was a faulty model. It was financially viable. We were very hopeful to have a better league and now this puts us a few steps back in our efforts," Rao lamented.

Amritraj said it was difficult to raise money for tennis in India and AITA's decision was very unfortunate. "Why do you think we

have only one ATP tournament in India in last 21 years. It is because it is difficult to get sponsors for tennis. But we were making efforts and they knew everything. I really don't understand why they did it."

"If they wanted fee for 2016 then they should have terminated the contract in 2016 itself Why wait till August 2017? They never wrote to us that you owe us fee." Rao reasoned Amritraj said it was setback for tennis in country. "If Ramkumar won

SC bans 'triple talaq'

tion, are the Quranic es-sential steps before talaq attains finality.

"In triple talaq, this door is closed. Hence, triple talaq is against the basic tenets of the Holy Quran and consequently, it violates Shariat.' Justice R F Nariman,

whose views were con-curred with by Justice U U Lalit, was in agreement with Justice Joseph saying "this form of Talag must, therefore, be held to be violative of the fundamental right contained under Article 14 (right to equality) of the Constitution of India."

Upholding the NDA government's view that the practice was against fundamental rights like equality and dignity, Justice Joseph referred to the four sources of Islamic law -- Quran, Hadith, Ijma and Qiyas. Maintaining that

the Holy Quran was the "first source of law" and pre-eminence has to be given to it, he said "that means, sources other than the Holy Quran are only to supplement what is given in it and to sup-ply what is not provided for. In other words, there

cannot be any Hadith, Ijma or Qiyas against what is expressly stated in the Quran. Islam can-

not be anti-Quran."

Justice Nariman, in his separate judgement, said "It is clear that Triple Talaq is only a form of Talag which is permissible in law, but at the same time, stated to be sinful by the very Hanafi school which tolerates it."

He referred to the

fact that triple talaq is "instant and irrevocable" and leaves no scope for reconciliation between the husband and wife by two arbiters from their families, which is essential to save the marital tie and was not in sync with the Holy Quran.
"It is clear that this

form of Talaq is manifestly arbitrary in the sense that the marital tie can be broken capriciously and whimsically by a Muslim man without any attempt at reconciliation so as to save it," he said.

Disposing six pleas including a suo motu petition titled 'Muslim Women's Quest For Equality', Justice Joseph relied on the 2002 apex court ver-dict in the Shamim Ara case in which it was held

that "triple talaq lacked legal sanctity".

It referred to various

High Court verdicts and rejected the plea of par-ties like All India Muslim Personal Law Board (AIMPLB) that the Shamim Ara case did not create a legal precedent.

"Talaq must be for a reasonable cause and be preceded by attempts at reconciliation between the husband and the wife by two arbiters one from the wife's family and the other from the husband's: if the attempts fail, 'talaq' may be effect-

"In the light of such specific findings as to how triple talaq is bad in law on account of not following the Quranic principles, it cannot be said that there is no ratio decidendi (the rule of law on which a judicial decision is based) on tri-ple talaq in Shamim Ara case," Justice Joseph said.

He dealt extensively with the AIMPLB plea that triple talaq was integral to Islam as it was in practice for the last 1,400

"Merely because a practice has continued for long, that by itself

cannot make it valid if it has been expressly de-clared to be impermissible," Justice Joseph, in his 26-page judgement, said. "Hence, there cannot

be any constitutional protection to such a practice and thus, my disagreement with the CJI is for the constitutional protection given to triple

talaq," he said. Justice Joseph disagreed with the minority verdict which held that though triple talaq was part of the religion, its operation can be staved (injuncted) by it under Article 142 (extra-ordinary power of the SC) for six months to enable the State to frame a law to deal with it

"I also have serious doubts as to whether, even under Article 142, the exercise of a Fundamental Right can be injuncted," he said.

Relying on the Sham

im Ara verdict, he said, "I expressly endorse and reiterate the law de-clared in Shamim Ara. What is held to be bad in the Holy Quran cannot be good in Shariat and, in that sense, what is bad in theology is bad in law as

Keener minds will invest deeper thinking... and deliver

It is not really possible for a person to understand what shapes another's culture unless s/he spends years in an active dialogue with that culture. If this statement were true, and it is, then one would expect development projects - which by definition aim to change the environment or the condition or even behaviour of a people - to be based on a deep under-standing not only of obvious cultural differences, but of the underlying values and perceptions which shape a culture. But that would be too utopian to expect, won't it? Unfortunately, more and more development projects are conceived, planned and even executed by people whose schedule is so tight that they have to rely on a technique which allows them to turn projects at a rapid rate. They opt for what experts call the "bottle-neck approach". Developmental analysts look for the bottleneck which is blocking their version of development from reaching the people. They then juxtapose.

Let's take the oldest failure (this might be highly contentious) of free India - its system of a quota for every ill. Analysts, when India got Independence, racked their brains why the adivasis and the dalits were not assimilating into the mainstream faster. Denial of equality, and through it, lack of education and opportunities was the obvious answer. So a quickfire solution was worked out - reservations. And sure enough many tribals started getting into premier institutes and then started landing cream jobs. Exulted with the results, the planners forgot part-B of their plan – social reform to ensure equality at all level and improving infrastructure in tribal areas. Education in the remote regions remained dismal and the reservation kept getting extended. The fact that 67 years on the reservation still exists is proof that the magic formula failed. This, not because the model was flawed, but because we failed as a society to end prejudices and casteism; the bottleneck still constricts access and acceptability

What appears scary at this juncture, especially for Sikkim, is that the same bottleneck approach continues to be applied. People with little understanding of the uniqueness of each problem continue to dish out immediate remedies. Most times, those in positions of responsibility analyse the obvious and formulate solutions at the same simplistic level. Take Sikkim's hydel potential for example. Everyone knows that mountain streams are torrents of potential hydel power. Anyone will tell you that Sikkim needs to generate revenue. So a simple solution is offered - generate electricity. One wonders how much thought had gone into for whom this power is being generated and at what cost to the environment and socio-cultural balances on ground As a result, even after some mega projects have already been commissioned, the State is still discovering hidden costs by way of local resentments and unaccounted for damages. Of course, better planning and projection by the project implementers and those tasked with the responsibility of oversight would not have caught so many people off guard so many times, but that's in the past now and should be noted down as necessary undertakings for future projects. Meanwhile, what should be borne in mind is that continuing engagement between the projects and the affected people should not be dictated by the needs of the implementing agency alone (in the garb of nation-building) and the ability of the people to absorb the changes and their need to remain masters of their own community and areas is respected as well.

The same would apply to tourism, the other thrust area. Entering into an enterprise without a clear plan and target in mind can clutter the mind and scuttle the project, neither of which Sikkim can afford. Sikkim is today poised at a stage where each decision will have far-reaching implications. While one can understand the pressures on the government since people in Sikkim take caution to be inaction, one would still advise informed dialogue before any venture. Most of what Sikkim has done since 1975 is implement central schemes with gusto. While this might speak volumes of the administration's ability to carry out orders, it does not reflect much innovation. As much as Sikkim needs the workhorses, it also needs imaginative and concerned thinkers. Some brilliant ideas have been seeded – skill development, Organic Sikkim, CATCH, CMRHM to name but a few – but even the fanboys will admit that in execution, these have achieved only a fraction of what the vision had seen possible. The new world order is such that it demands creativity, that's what Sikkim needs to promote and nurture

How should we protest neo-Nazis? **Lessons from German history**

After the murder of Heather Hey-er in Charlottesville, many people are asking themselves what they should do if Nazis rally in their city. Should they put their bodies on the line in counterdemonstrations? Some

say yes.

History says no. Take it from me: I

study the original Nazis.

We have an ethical obligation to stand against fascism and racism. But we also have an ethical obligation to do so in a way that doesn't help the fascists and racists more than it hurts them.

HISTORY REPEATS ITSELF

Charlottesville was right out of the Nazi playbook. In the 1920s, the Nazi Party was just one political party among many in a democratic system, running for seats in Germany's Parliament. For most of that time, it was a small, marginal group. In 1933, riding a wave of popular support, it seized power and set up a dictator-ship. The rest is well-known. It was in 1927, while still on the

political fringes, that the Nazi Par-ty scheduled a rally in a decidedly hostile location - the Berlin district of Wedding. Wedding was so left-of-center that the neighborhood had the nickname "Red Wedding," red being the color of the Communist Party. The Nazis often held rallies right where their enemies lived, to provoke them.

The people of Wedding were de-termined to fight back against fascism in their neighborhood. On the day of the rally, hundreds of Nazis descended on Wedding. Hundreds of their opponents showed up too, organized by the local Communist Party. The antifascists tried to disrupt the rally, heckling the speakers. Nazi thugs re-taliated. There was a massive brawl. Almost 100 people were injured.

I imagine the people of Wedding felt they had won that day. They had courageously sent a message: Fascism was not welcome

But historians believe events like the rally in Wedding helped the Nazis build a dictatorship. Yes, the brawl got them media attention. But what was far, far more important was how it fed an escalating spiral of street violence. That violence helped the fascists enormously.

Violent confrontations with antifascists gave the Nazis a chance to paint themselves as the victims of a pugnacious, lawless left. They seized it



It worked. We know now that many Germans supported the fascists because they were terrified of leftist violence in the streets. Germans opened their morning newspapers and saw reports of clashes like one in Wedding. It looked like a bloody tide of civil war was rising in their cities. Voters and opposition politicians alike came to believe the government needed special police powers to stop violent leftists. Dicta-torship grew attractive. The fact that the Nazis themselves were fomenting the violence didn't seem to matter

One of Hitler's biggest steps to dictatorial power was to gain emergency police powers, which he claimed he to suppress lefti

THE LEFT TAKES THE HEAT

In the court of public opinion, accusations of mayhem and chaos in the streets will, as a rule, tend to stick against the left, not the right.

This was true in Germany in the 1920s. It was true even when opponents of fascism acted in self-defense or tried to use relatively mild tactics, such as heckling. It is true in the United States today, where even peace-ful rallies against racist violence are branded riots in the making.

Today, right extremists are going around the country staging rallies just like the one in 1927 in Wedding. According to the civil rights advoca-cy organization the Southern Poverty Law Center, they pick places where they know antifascists are present, like university campuses. They come spoiling for physical confrontation.

Then they and their allies spin it to

I watched this very thing happen steps from my office on the University of Washington campus. Last year, a right extremist speaker came. He was met by a counterprotest. One of his supporters shot a counterprotester. On stage, in the moments after the shooting, the right extremist speaker claimed that his opponents had sought to stop him from speaking "by killing people." The fact that it was one of the speaker's supporters, a right extremist and Trump backer, who engaged in what prosecutors now claim was an unprovoked and premeditated act of violence, has never made national news

We saw this play out after Charlottesville, too. President Donald Trump said there was violence "on both sides." It was an incredible claim. Heyer, a peaceful protester, and 19 other people were intentionally hit by a neo-Nazi driving a car. He seemed to portray Charlottesville as another ex-ample of what he has referred to elsewhere as "violence in our streets and chaos in our communities," including, it seems, Black Lives Matter, which is a nonviolent movement against violence. He stirred up fear. Trump recently said that police are too con-

strained by existing law.

President Trump tried it again during the largely peaceful protests in Boston – he called the tens of thousands who gathered there to protest racism and Nazism "anti-police agitators," though later, in a characteristic about-face, he praised them

President Trump's claims are hitting their mark. A CBS News poll found that a majority of Republicans thought his description of who was to blame for the violence in Charlottes ville was "accurate."

This violence, and the rhetoric about it coming from the administration, are echoes - faint but nevertheless frightening echoes - of a well-documented pattern, a pathway by which democracies devolve into dictatorships.

THE ANTIFA

There's an additional wrinkle: the antifa. When Nazis and white supremacists rally, the antifa are likely to show

"Antifa" is short for antifascists. though the name by no means includes everyone who opposes fascism. The antifa is a relatively small movement of the far left, with ties to anarchism. It arose in Europe's punk scene in the 1980s to fight neo-Nazism

The antifa says that because Nazism and white supremacy are violent, we must use any means nec-essary to stop them. This includes physical means, like what they did on my campus: forming a crowd to block ticket-holders from entering a venue to hear a right extremist speak.

The antifa's tactics often backfire, just like those of Germany's communist opposition to Nazism did in the 1920s. Confrontations escalate. Public opinion often blames the left no matter the circumstances

WHAT TO DO?

One solution: Hold a counter-event that doesn't involve physical proximity to the right extremists. The Southern Poverty Law Center has published a helpful guide. Among its recommendations: If the alt-right rallies, organize a joyful protest" well away from them. Ask people they have targeted to speak. But "as hard as it may be to resist yelling at alt-right speak ers, do not confront them.'

This does not mean ignoring Nazis. It means standing up to them in a way that denies them a chance for bloodshed.

The cause Heather Heyer died for is best defended by avoiding the physical confrontation that the people who are responsible for her death

How the smartphone affected an entire generation of kids

As someone who researches generational differ-ences, I find one of the most frequent questions I'm asked is "What generation am I in?"

If you were born before 1980, that's a relatively easy question to answer: the Silent Generation was born between 1925 and 1945; baby boomers were born between 1946 and 1964; Gen X followed (born between 1965 and 1979).

Next come millennials, born after 1980, But where do millennials end, and when does the n generation begin? Until recently, I (and many others) thought the last millennial birth year would be 1999 – today's 18-year-olds.

However, that changed a few years ago, when

I started to notice hig shifts in teens' behavior and attitudes in the yearly surveys of 11 million yo people that I analyze for my research. Around 2010, teens started to spend their time much differently from the generations that preceded them. Then, around 2012, sudden shifts in their psychological well-being began to appear. Together, these changes pointed to a generational cutoff around 1995, which meant that the kids of this new, post-millen-

nial generation were already in college.
These teens and young adults all have one thing in common: Their childhood or adolescence coincided with the rise of the smartphone

WHAT MAKES IGEN DIFFERENT

Some call this generation "Generation Z," but if millennials aren't called "Generation Y," "Generation Z" doesn't work. Neil Howe, who coined the term "millennials" along with his collaborator William Strauss, has suggested the next generation be called the "Homeland Generation," but I doubt anyone will

want to be named after a government agency.
A 2015 survey found that two out of three U.S. teens owned an iPhone. For this reason, I call them iGen, and as I explain in my new book "iGen: Why Today's Super-Connected Kids are Growing up Less Rebellious, More Tolerant, Less Happy – and Completely Unprepared for Adulthood," they're the first genera-tion to spend their adolescence with a smartphone. What makes iGen different? Growing up with

a smartphone has affected nearly every aspect of

their lives. They spend so much time on the internet, texting friends and on social media - in the large surveys I analyzed for the book, an average of about six hours per day – that they have less leisure time for everything else.

That includes what was once the favorite activity of most teens: hanging out with their friends. Whether it's going to parties, shopping at the mall, watching movies or aimlessly driving around, iGen teens are participating in these social activities at a significantly ver rate than their millennial predecessors

iGen shows another pronounced break with mil-lennials: Depression, anxiety, and loneliness have



shot upward since 2012, with happiness declining. The teen suicide rate increased by more than 50 percent, as did the number of teens with clini-

A LINK THAT CAN'T BE IGNORED

I wondered if these trends - changes in how teens were spending their free time and their deteriorating mental health – might be connected. Sure enough, I found that teens who spend more time on screens are less happy and more depressed, and those who spend more time with friends in person

are happier and less depressed.
Of course, correlation doesn't prove causation: Maybe unhappy people use screen devices more.

However, as I researched my book, I came across three recent studies that all but eliminated that possibility – at least for social media. In two of them, social media use led to lower well-being, but lower well-being did not lead to social media use.

Meanwhile, a 2016 study randomly assigned some adults to give up Facebook for a week and others to continue using it. Those who gave up Facebook ended

the week happier, less lonely and less depressed. WHAT ELSE IS LOST?

Some parents might worry about their teens spending so much time on their phones because it represents a radical departure from how they spent their own adolescence. But spending this much time on screens is not just different - in many

ways, it's actually worse.

Spending less time with friends means less time to develop social skills. A 2014 study found that sixth graders who spent just five days at a camp without using screens ended the time better at reading emotions on others' faces, suggesting that iGen's screen-filled lives might cause their social skills to atrophy. In addition, iGen reads books, magazines and

newspapers much less than previous generations did as teens: In the annual Monitoring the Future survey, the percentage of high school seniors who read a nonrequired book or magazine nearly every day dropped from 60 percent in 1980 to only 16 percent in 2015. Perhaps as a result, average SAT critical reading scores have dropped 14 points since 2005. College faculty tell me that students have more trouble reading longer text passages,

and rarely read the required textbook.

This isn't to say that iGen teens don't have a lot going for them. They are physically safer and more tolerant than previous generations were. They also seem to have a stronger work ethic and more realistic expectations than millennials did at the same age. But the smartphone threatens to derail them before they even get started.

To be clear, moderate smartphone and social media use – up to an hour a day – is not linked to mental health issues. However, most teens (and adults) are on their phones much more than that.

Somewhat to my surprise, the iGen teens I in-terviewed said they would rather see their friends in person than communicate with them using their phones. Parents used to worry about their teens spending too much time with their friends – they were a distraction, a had influence, a waste of time

But it might be just what iGen needs.

Shahabuddin chargesheeted in journalist murder case

MUZAFFARPUR, AUG 22 (PTI): Former RJD MP Mohammad Shahabuddin was today charge sheeted by the CBI in a special court here for the offences of murder and criminal conspiracy in the killing of journalist Rajdeo Ranjan in May

last year.
Sunil Singh Rawat, the investigating of-ficer of the case, and public prosecutor Deep Narayan submitted the charge sheet against Shahabuddin, a four-time MP from Siwan, and six others before CBI judge Anupam Kumari.

Defence lawyer Sha-rad Sinha said that the other accused against whom the agency has filed the charge sheet are Azahruddin Beig alias Laddan Mian, Rishi Ku-mar Jaiswal, Rohit Kumar Soni, Vijay Kumar Gupta, Ranjeet Kumar and Sonu Kumar Gupta.

This is a supplementary charge sheet by the CBI as the agency had filed its earlier charge sheet against one ac-cused in December, 2016.

Bihar Police had charge sheeted six persons in the case before the probe was taken over by the agency. A total of eight accused have been charge-sheeted so far in

The CBI has charged Shahabuddin, currently lodged in the high-security Tihar Jail in Delhi, under IPC sections related to criminal conspiracy and murder and provisions of Arms Act, a statement from the agency said here.

"The charge sheet has been filed under section 120B (criminal conspiracy) read with 302 (murder) of the IPC as well as section 27 of the Arms Act," Sinha told PTI over

charge has not been submitted against two oher accused Mohammad Javed and Mohammad Kaif who are out on bail in the case as the investigation is currently underway, Sinha

It may be noted that the special CBI court on May 26 had made Shahabuddin an accused in the murder case.

The four-time RJD MP from Siwan is alleged to have been involved in the murder of Rajdeo Ranjan, a journalist of a prominent Hindi daily in

Shahabuddin is facing trial in more than 45 criminal cases. He was moved to the Tihar Jail in February this year on a Supreme Court order on a plea by Siwan native Chandrakeshwar Prasad whose three sons were killed in two separate incidents.

Rajdeo Ranjan, dis-trict bureau chief of the Hindi daily, was gunned down on May 13 last year and his wife had accused Shahabuddin of having a role in the killing.

ceding from the flood-hit




areas in these districts and people are returning home. Situation is improving everyday," an official said at the state secretariat today.

Vijender predicts more than 1 medal at World Championships

New Delhi, Aug 22 (PTI): Eight years ago, he scripted history by opening the country's account in amateur boxing's marquee event and Vijender Singh feels India might just go one better on that during the 19th World Championship, starting August 25 in Hamburg.

The 31-year-old had fetched a

The 31-year-old had fetched a bronze medal at the 15th World Championship in Milan, just over a year after becoming India's first Olympic medallist in boxing -- a bronze-winner at the 2008 Beijing Games.

The nation has a bronze each to show for in the 2009, 2011 and 2015 World Championships -- the other two bronze- medallists, apart from Vijender, being Vikas Krishan (2011) and Shiva Thapa (2015).

"It is a mature bunch of boxers. I have been in teams that had Shiva (Thapa), Vikas (Krishan) and Manoj (Kumar). So, I know some of them well. They have the ability to ensure that India ends up with more than one medal. If they compete to their full potential, I think there is a real chance of more than one medal," Vijender told PTI in an interview.

"They have competed at the highest level in the past and know what they should do. I cannot give any suggestions to them but I can just say, they need to be very focussed," he added.

Both Vikas (75kg) and Shiva (60kg) are part of the eight-mem-

ber team, which has already reached Hamburg after qualifying for the event through the Asian Championships earlier this year.

The others in the team are Amit Phangal (49kg), Kavinder Bisht (52kg), Gaurav Bidhuri (56kg), Manoj Kumar (69kg), Sumit Sangwan (91kg) and Satish Kumar (+91kg).

A fair share of amateur history to his credit, Vijender turned professional in 2015 and has two titles to flaunt in an unbeaten run so far.

"That bronze medal I won in Milan was part of a beautiful phase in my career because it managed to silence some harsh critics, who felt that my medal in Beijing was a fluke. There were people who said that I was not training enough, within months of my medal in Beijing," Vijender said.

Vijender recalled how he sought solitude during both the Olympics and the World Championship.

"To me, focus has always meant shutting myself off before heading to a big tournament. I would just insulate myself from anything and everything that was going on outside the little space, which I would

create for myself," he explained.
"There will always be expectations and I am sure the guys who are competing this time, are well aware of that. But to me, the key lies in not allowing that to play on the mind.

There has to be a single-minded focus on the ring, forget everything else, that's what I do," he said.

A former world No. 1 in middleweight amateur rankings, Vijender refused to pick favourites but did single out Thapa for praise.

but did single out Thapa for praise.

"He has progressed tremendously and seems to be a very sorted boxer. I have been impressed by his growth," said the Haryana star about the 24-year-old, who is the first Indian to claim three back-to-back Asian Championship medals.

Singapore's oldest Hindu temple under investigation: report

SINGAPORE, AUG 22 (PTI): One of Singapore's oldest Hindu temples is under investigation over suspected criminal offences, a media report said today.

Commercial Affairs Department is conducting the probe into Sri Veeramakaliamman Temple, but it is "inap-propriate" to comment further on the investigation, police said.

The Commissioner of Charities (COC) also said in a statement that it had been notified of the investigation and has also launched its own inquiry into the temple.

"The review identified certain areas of concern with regard to gover-nance and administra-tion, which warrant conducting an inquiry." Channel News Asia reported citing the statement.

The COC added that it will decide on the next course of action after the inquiry. In the meantime, religious activities will not be affected and the temple can continue with its operations and daily services, the COC said, adding that measures will be put in place to ensure the temple is properly managed.

The temple at Seran-goon Road is a well-known landmark in the Little India area, with about 5,000 devotees on each Sundays and is popular among tourists. The temple was set up as a trust and obtained charity status in 1988. The temple, found-ed by Tamil pioneers in 1835, underwent a twoyear-long, SGD7-million makeover which was com-pleted in 2014.

China backs Pak after Trump's warning on terror safe havens

BEIJING, AUG 22 (PTI): China today jumped to the defence of its all-weather ally Pakistan in the wake of US President Donald Trump's stern warning to it over providing safe havens to terrorists, saying that Islamabad is at the front-

line of combating terrorism.

Trump, in his first prime time televised address to announce his Afghanistan and South Asia policy, hit out at Pakistan for providing safe havens to "agents of chaos" that kill Americans in Afghanistan and warned Islamabad that it has "much to lose" by harbouring terrorists.

Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson Hua Chunying, while reacting to Trump's comments on Pakistan, said, "Hope the relevant policy deci-sion by US side will be conducive to promoting security, sta-bility of the relevant region." "(On) President Trump's

say that Pakistan is at the frontline of fighting terrorism, has made sacrifices in fighting terrorism, making an import ant contribution to upholding peace and stability," Hua said, strongly defending Beijing's all-weather friend.

Trump, in his address, slammed Pakistan for its support to terror groups and warned Islamabad of consequences if it continues to do so. Hua, in response to Trump's scathing criticism of Pakistan's support to terror groups, said, "I think the international community should truly affirm" the efforts by Pakistan in combating terrorism.

We are pleased to see US and Pakistan to conduct cooperation in anti-terrorism efforts on the basis of mutual respect and contribute to the global peace and stability,"



indicating Trump deepening ties with India, mua said China is happy to see the development of normal and friendly relations between the two countries as long as such a relationship does not harm other countries and is conducive to regional development. "So we are pleased to see sound and normal relations between US and India," she said, hoping that the two sides will play a more constructive

role promoting regional peace

and development.

Hua skirted a direct answer to a question on wheth-er China's policies like blocking India's membership to the Nuclear Suppliers Group and efforts to get Jaish-e-Mohammed leader Masood Azhar banned by the UN had created more space for the US to develop closer ties with India. saying its bilateral ties with India or with the US will not

be targeted at a third party. Hua also criticised India's action to block China's road building in Doklam region where the two sides are in-volved in a standoff. India's move at Doklam has a negave impact in the eyes of the Chinese people, she said.

India should match its words with deeds, Hua said while calling for unconditional withdrawal of Indian troops and equipment.

Asked about the impact of Trump's decision to follow a more proactive policy in Afghanistan on China, Hua said, the "Chinese side will uphold the objective and unbiased principle to promote friendly relations with other coun-tries, based on the merits of the matter itself".

"We hope that the Trump administration's policy adjustment will be conducive to promoting peace and stability in South Asia," she said. "China closely follows Pa-kistan-Afghanistan relations. We think the stable relations between the two countries will also be helpful," Hua said.

Referring to recent trip made by Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi to Afghanistan and Pakistan amid Kabul's allegations that Islamabad was not cracking down on the Taliban, Hua said Wang's visit was aimed at mediating for better relations between the two countries.

During the visit, Afghan-istan and Pakistan sent out goodwill messages to each other, especially in the estab-lishment of crisis management mechanism which China is trying to operationalise, she said.

We also appreciate and applaud the dialogue between the two countries. During the process, as a friend of these two countries. China will. within its capacity, play a con-structive role," she said.

Trump seeks greater role for India in Afghanistan's stability

WASHINGTON, AUG 22 (PTI): President Donald Trump today vowed to boost US' strategic partnership with India in Afghanistan but pressed New Delhi to provide more help to the wartorn country, especially in the economic sector, as it makes billions of dollars

in trade with America.

Trump, in his first prime-time televised address to the nation as commander-in-chief, laid out his South Asia policy saying a "critical part" of it was to further develop US' strategic partnership with India. He said after a "com-

prehensive review", it was decided that the American strategy in Afghanistan and South Asia will change dramatically. The US President reached out to India seeking an enhanced role for New Delhi, especially in the economic field, to bring peace and stability

in Afghanistan. India, the world's largest democracy, is a key se curity and economic part-ner of the US, he said.

"We appreciate India's important contributions to stability in Afghanistan, but India makes billions of dollars in trade with the US, and we want them to help us more with Afghanistan, especially in the area of economic assistance and develop ment," Trump said.

We are committed to pursuing our shared objectives for peace and security in South Asia and the broader Indo-Pacific region," said the US Pres-

ident Indo-IIS bilateral trade in goods and ser-vices increased from USD 104 billion in 2014 to USD 114 billion in 2016.

India has a strategic partnership with Afghan-istan and is implement-ing projects worth USD 2 billion to help rebuild the country's infrastructure.

India has been supporting an Afghan-led, Afghan-owned, broad-based and inclusive process of peace and reconciliation, and advocating the need for a sustained and longterm commitment to Afghanistan by the interna-

tional community.
In June last year, Prime Minister Narendra Modi and Afghan President Ashraf Ghani jointly inaugurated a landmark dam, a Rs 1,700 crore show-piece infrastructure project by India in strategically

important Herat province.
In his speech, Trump came down heavily on Pakistan for its support to terror groups, saying Islamabad receives billions in aid from the US but continues to harbour terrorists.

"We can no longer be silent about Pakistan's

safe havens for terrorist organisations, the Taliban, and other groups that pose a threat to the region and beyond," he said.

"In the past, Pakistan has been a valued part-ner. Our militaries have worked together against common enemies. The Pakistani people have suffered greatly from terrorism and extremism. We recognise those contributions and those sac-

rifices," Trump said.
"But Pakistan has also sheltered the same organisations that try ev-ery single day to kill our people," he added. Trump noted that the

US has been paying Pakistan billions and billions of dollars but it continues to house the very terrorists that America is fighting.
"But that will have to

change. That will change immediately. No part-nership can survive a country's harbouring of militants and terrorists who target US service members and officials. It is time for Pakistan to demonstrate its commitment to civilisation, order, and to peace," Trump

Doklam impasse: China rejects Rajnath's hope of early solution

BEIJING, AUG 22 (PTI): China said today that the only way to end the standoff in Doklam was for India to unconditionally withdraw its troops from the area, a day after Home Minister Rajnath Singh hoped Beijing would soon make a "pos-Singh yesterday had

hoped that a solution to the standoff in Doklam would be found soon and said India never attacked a nation nor did it harbour any expansionist behaviour. In a speech, he had also expressed hope that China will undertake a positive initiative to resolve the standoff.

But China responded with its standard propaganda attack by repeating its accusation that Indian troops "illegally crossed the boundary".

Chinese foreign ministry spokesperson Hua Chunying said India's reasons to stop the Chinese road building activnese road building activity in Doklam area was "ridiculous". "So the only prerequisite and condition of this incident is unconditional withdrawal of the Indian troops and equipment," Hua told re-

India and China have been locked in a stand-off for more than two months in Doklam near the Sikkim sector. The faceoff began after Indian troops stopped Chinese military from building a road India believes would allow Beijing to cut its access to the northeastern states.

Bhutan says Doklam belongs to it but China claims sovereignty over the area.

China's state dia has written shrill commentaries over the standoff and has even released a video which portrayed Indians in a very poor taste. In a separate incident

on August 15, Indian and Chinese troops engaged in stone pelting in Ladakh region that resulted in minor injuries to soldiers on both the sides.

Hua said China "loves peace and firmly upholds

"At the same time we will safeguard our territorial sovereignty and integrity".

"We will not allow

any country or any indi-vidual to infringe upon China's territorial sovereignty," she said.

interpreted as the first step in a publicity campaign for a new album, her first since 2014's chart-topping,

multi-platinum 1989. The static-y clip, which runs for ten seconds, shows a reptilian tail flapping around silently - no context or clues to its



significance, a savvy Rorschach test for both fans and haters.

What does it mean? The internet shrugged.

But most, including Billboard magazine, have taken Swift's history with 'snake' iconography and run – or should that be slithered - with it.

since at least last year, following an acri-monious breakup with former boyfriend Calvin Harris and an infamous feud with Kanye West and the Kardashian clan, who outed Swift's two-faced outcry over a con-troversial lyric about her in Kanye's Famous.

Tweets at the time, including one shared over 220,000 times from Kim Kardashian herself, made the snake emoji a regular fixture on Swift's timeline, and fans see her latest track as hitting back against the slight, or at least publicly engaging with it after a long musical absence.

It's the most media-ready narrative,

not to mention Swift has a history of slyly addressing private preoccupations in her songs, but the theory ignores one sticky point: it doesn't really look like a snake

Other theories have posited that the song will deal with "time", citing a man-ic collage of tweets, Instagram pics and quotes from the singer and those associated with her label and collaborators, including a photo of a prop clock reportedly used in the upcoming music video

Following Friday's single and video release, the singer's album is expected in December, as friend Ed Sheeran recently blurted to BBC. She's also set to appear at Monday's MTV Video Music Awards, to be hosted by her old Bad Blood nemesis Katy

PAKISTAN BANS THE RELEASE OF PARTITION: 1947

irector Gurinder Chad Director Guringer Glader ha's Partition: 1947, the Hindi version of Viceroy's House has been disallowed to release in Pakistan because of alleged misrepresentation of Muhammad Ali Jinnah.

Director Chadha tweet-ed on August 20th, "It is un-fortunate my film has been banned in Pakistan. It will always be the land of my an-cestors." The film is about the inside life of the Viceroy's House in 1947 during the Partition of India featuring Hugh Bonneville, Gillian Anderson, Huma Qureshi and Manish Dayal.

According to The Express Tribune, the Sindh Film Censor Board considered it unsuitable, stating that "the po-litical narrative contradicts the national interest of Pakistan".

The Board's secretary Abdul Razzaq Khuhawar was quoted thus: "It's a historical film and nothing negative is shown against Pakistan. The main reason for banning it was the misrepresentation of Quaid-e-Azam Muhammad Ali Jinnah.

"We felt his character was not portrayed correctly and it felt strange. Although the character only appears in a few scenes as the film mostly revolves around Lord Mount-batten, the actor didn't look like Jinnah at all. If you had seen it, you couldn't tell it was Jinnah. Otherwise, there were no issues with the film."


