GANGTOK, 28 OCT:

More than 40 runners
from across the country and abroad are set to participate in the second edition of the strenuous Kanchendzonga Marathon 2017 to be held on 06 Nov on the Dzongri trail in West Sikkim.

The event is being or-ganised by Sikkim Mountaineering Association taineering Association and Kanchenjunga Marathon Committee with support from Tourism Department. This high altitude run was first hosted in 2015, a press release informs.

So far, 40 runners from different States of the country and one from Nigeria have registered

Nigeria have registered for the marathon, informs the organizing committee director, Kunzang Gyatso.

He further informed that preparations for the marathon have reached the final stages.

It is informed that the participants and the organizing committee members are scheduled members are scheduled to leave on 30 Nov from Yuksom to Goechala. The marathon will be flagged off on 06 Nov from Goechala at the height of 15,700 feet and the runners will have to run 42 KMs at the scheduled time of 08 hours and complete the half marathon of 21 KMs from Phedang to Yuksom in 04 hours

The winner will receive a cash prize of Rs One lakh while the first runner-up and second runner-up will receive Rs 75,000 and 50,000 respectively along with medals, mementos and certificate:

### LJP demands PM's intervention to stop attacks on NE people

NEW DELHI, OCT 28 (PTI): Citing a rise in the number of cases involving racial discrimination and attacks on those from the north-east in the national capital, the Manipur unit of the Lok Janshakti Party (LJP) today demanded Prime Ministe Narendra Modi's intervention in the matter.

In a memorandum submitted to the prime minister, the party also urged him to implement the recommendations of the Bezbaruah Committee in letter and spirit.

The committee was formed in 2014 under the chairmanship of M P Bezbaruah, a member of the North-Eastern Council.

It had recommended that the government took special police initiatives to ensure the safety and security of the north-east-ern people living in Delhi-NCR and other parts of

the country.

The memorandum also suggested that the government should form a new panel if the Bezbaruah committee's report was "not satisfactory".

### Labourer crushed to death dismantling building in Pakyong

Subir Roy, 44, was crushed to death today when a portion of the building he was engaged as a

ourer to dismantle collapsed on him in Pakyong. He, along with six others, was at work dismantling a building rendered inhabitable by the airport construction when, at around 4 p.m. a portion of the building collapsed on him.

His body was eventually extracted from the unstable section by a team of NDRF personnel later in the evening. The dead body has been sent to the STNM Hospital for post mortem and will then be handed over to the bereaved family. Subir Roy hailed from Jalpaiguri in West Bengal. The Airports Authority of India which i devel-

oping the airport had handed over the task of dis-mantling the said building to the Buildings & Housing Department which had tendered it to a local contractor, it is informed.

The building in question is one of five ear-

marked for demolition. The same crew, it is informed, had dismantled the other buildings as well without any mishaps.

# FIFA U-17 WC 2017 becomes most attended in event's history

17th edition of the FIFA U-17 World Cup in India today turned out to be a milestone event as it became the most attended in the history of the tournament.

After the third-place

atch between Brazil and Mali here on Saturday, the total number of spectators who turned up at the six host venues across the country went past the earlier record attendance of 1,230,976 set in the first edition of the tournament in China in 1985.
With 56432 spectators turning up at the Salt Lake

Stadium to watch the Brazil versus Mali match, the total

attendance of the FIFA U-17 World Cup reached 1280459.

Before this match, a mere 6949 attendance was needed to break the record.

The 2011 edition in Mexico had also attracted a total of 1,002,314 spectators, becoming the third one to have more than one million attenattendance The

matches had breached the million mark in the last Round of 16 match on October 18.

In terms of the number of spectators per match, this edition is second behind the inaugural edition in China (which was 38,469) as the number of participating teams and matches were

lesser at that time.

Sixteen teams competed till the 2005 edition in Peru (when the tournament was known as FIFA U-17 World Championships) before the number of participating countries was increased to 24 from the 2007 edition in South Korea. The number of matches was also increased from 32 to 52 from 2007 onwards.

ata's Salt Lake Stadium has the highest attendance per match. The venue has so far logged a total of 542125 spectators from 10 games, at a staggering average of 54212 per match. The stadium has a total capacity of 66.600.

a teenage girl in Kotkhai in Himachal Pradesh. The court extended the judicial remand of Zaidi, Deputy Superin-tendent of Police (DSP) Manoi Joshi and six other policemen by two weeks up to November 12 in the

in the rape-and-murder of

case.
Zaidi, the then Theog DSP Joshi, the then Staton House Officer of Kotkhai, one Assistant Sub-Inspector, three head constables and one constable were arrested by the CBI on August 29.

Suraj Singh, an ac-cused in the rape-and-murder case, was killed allegedly by another ac-cused in the case at Kot-khai police station of the intervening night of July 18 and 19, triggering a massive public outrage. Suraj Singh, a 29-year-

old labourer from Nepal, was among six people ar-rested by the local police.

The remaining five accused in the rape-andmurder case have been released on bail as the CBI failed to file the charge sheet within 90 days.

Zaidi was heading Special Investigation Team (SIT) probing the case of rape-and-murder of the minor school girl in Kotkhai area of Shimla in

early July.

The case was later transferred to the CBI on the orders of the Himachal Pradesh High Court.

The Class X student had gone missing on July 4 and her naked body was recovered from Haliala forests in

Kotkhai on July 6.
The CBI has so far submitted six status reports and the high court has directed the CBI to file the charge sheet in the custodial death case by Novem-

# Bullock cart owners block Pune-Nashik Highway

PUNE. OCT 28 (PTI): Bullock cart owners today blocked the Pune-Nashik Highway near near Chakan here demanding lifting of the ban on bullock cart races in Maharashtra.

They also sought a ban on the People for the Ethical Treatment of Animals (PETA), an NGO which has been campaigning against

The Bombay High Court on October 11 refused to lift its ban imposed on bullock cart races

in Maharashtra. The order came ahead of Diwali festivities when bullock cart races are organised across the state.

"The Maharashtra government passed a bill to resume bullock cart races and the President of India, too, approved it. Howev-er, a petition was filed against the bill in the High Court and the court banned bullock cart races," said Ramkrushna Takalkar, an office-bearer of the All India Bullock Cart Owners' Association.

"Several cases have been registered against the PETA in other countries as they are involved in malpractices. We demand that government ban the PETA and ini-

tiate an inquiry against it," he said. He said the state government should approach the Supreme Court and put forth their side strongly so that the ban on races

### Govt in consultation with MCI taking steps to revise MBBS syllabus: DGHS

BHUBANESWAR, OCT 28 (PTI): Director General of Health Services, Prof Jagdish Prasad today said the Central government. in consultation with the Medical Council of India (MCI), was taking steps to revise the syllabus of the MBBS course.

He said the step is being taken to ensure that the MBBS students do not require to study in great detail many aspects of medical science in which they would specialise subsequently.

"The new syllabus may be ready in another one and half years," Prasad told reporters after addressing a pub-lic lecture on 'National Health Programmes' at

the SOA University.
"What is the need to teach a student at MBBS level 10 different surgeries when all they need is to acquire a good knowledge as to how to treat common diseases." he said and urged students to take great care in studying the subjects of anatomy, physiology and pathology for a strong foundation. While interacting with

doctors and faculty mem-bers, Prof Prasad said the issue of antibiotic resistance was a raging topic world over and the government had requested MCI to make it mandatory for every medical college to have a pharmaco vigi-lance committee to monitor use of antibiotics.

"Antibiotic resistance is worse than cancer as it cannot be treated and will kill," he said.
On certain diseases,

Prasad said though leprosy eradication had been largely successful in most states, the problem persisted in the states of Odi-sha, Chhatisgarh, Bihar and Jharkhand besides Dadra and Nagar Haveli. "The government has launched a door to door

"Odisha accounts for 40 per cent of the malaria cases and we aim to reduce the incidence in the country by one-third this year," he said.

# Lose the Jokes, Break the Spine

### Humour is necessary in a democracy

 $\mathbf{S}^{\text{o}}$ , now we are country where a Prime Minister who is expected to a somber statesman can make crude jokes but comedians whose job it is to mock and poke need to hold their tongues if they slip a punch-line which could offend the powerful. Here one may recall the tasteless remark that the PM made in Japan at around this time last year when he sniggered that many a marriage reception in India had been burned because of demonetization. The bhakts had laughed along at the time. Even applauded. And now, we learn of a comedy show which censored a skit, dropped it completely in fact, when a mimicry artist aped the PM (and Rahul Gandhi as well). This was by Star Plus. The story would have never come out had the recording of the performance not gone viral on social media. We were not even done shaking our heads in disbelief over the easy fearfulness that has become us that news arrived that an FM channel had been bullied by the online mob of bhakts into discontinuing its sarcasm-laced public interest message which called for safer travel for tourists. The two episodes come on the heels of the thin-skinned and hard-nosed intolerance with which attempts were made to have a Tamil film drop sarcastic references to GST, yes, the same Goods and Services Tax which Rahul Gandhi famously threw up as Gabbar Singh Tax. Before all this, media houses have been stared down into taking down reports on crony capitalism and jour nalists seen as unfriendly to the regime forced out of their jobs and stories. These are not one-off incidents, but a steady progression of suppression of independent thought. It started with mainstream platforms and regular news, and after they had been cowed down or co-opted, it was the turn of the jesters. This should not have surprised us because those with an inflated sense of self and/or blinkered by rigid ideologies have tradi-tionally been quick to take offence and fast and furious with the pushback.

We make matters worse with self-censorship, as was displayed by Star Plus which did not even air the performance for fear of protests. Anyone who has seen the skit will wonder what the fuss was about because even Akshay Kumar found it inoffensive enough to laugh along and applaud. The artist mimics Narendra Modi and Rahul Gandhi to tell a set of jokes, he does not ridicule their policies or positions. The FM channel promo was also more commentary on the society at large and its inability to understand the "atithi devo bhava" jumla and less a criticism of the powers that be. But who will explain these obvious positions to click-bait bhakts? And so we embarrassed ourselves some more.

But all of this is about more than just getting em-

barrassed or scared, it's also about what we are allowing ourselves to become. Laughter, those among the readers who still remember the Reader's Digest will recollect, is the best medicine. It is the salve that helps maintain sanity when there is too much madness around. The moment people have to look around before they crack a joke or laugh to one, you know that their spine has been broken. Who wishes that in a democracy? Societies which lose their sense of humour and their ability to laugh at themselves also lose their optimism, faith and democratic instincts and few places prove this better than neighbouring Darjeeling which has allowed its funny bone to fracture and is now calcified with easy aggression and a perpetual victimhood syndrome. Come on, even monarchs realized the effectiveness of humour as a safe release for festering discontent and allowed jesters to mock and joke even in their presence. Force this out of the system and resentments will fester and harden into spite and hate to eventually explode because release valves have been too tightly shut.

# The Rohingya horrors and Aung San Suu Kyi's whitewash

t was a bright autumn morning, and I had just dropped off my two children at nursery and was scrolling through Twitter, when I spotted a video of another mother's two children.

The youngest was a one-year-old boy, the same age as my own youngest; the other, his nine-year-

old sister, had been carrying him for miles. She was weeping, the tears from her terrified eyes indistin-guishable from the rain pouring off her short black hair and drenched clothes. A Rohingva child, she had fled from the one of the many scenes of horror inflict-ed by the Myanmar military on Muslim areas across the country's beleaguered Rakhine state, where hundreds of villages have been burned to the ground and where fleeing people have been killed by landmines and children beheaded. As I struggled to get my front door key into the lock, I found I was crying too.

The UN has called the Myanmar military's campaign against the Rohingya, involving the burning of hundreds of Muslim villages in Rakhine State and targeting people with landmines as they ran, a "textbook example of ethnic cleansing". More than half a million people have fled into Bangladesh – many of them chil-dren who saw their parents murdered. The UN has warned of a further influx.

For those fairly unfamiliar with Myanmar, the situation is not just horrific, but bizarre. Myanmar was supposed to be firmly on the road to democracy, and yet now the military is out murdering again. Buddhism has an international reputation as a peaceful religion – and yet the vicious violence is being perpetrated by the military in the

ame of Buddhist nationalism.

And then there's the sight of Nobel Peace Prize-winning human rights icon Aung San Suu Kyi, the head of government in all but name, publicly white-washing the situation. She has failed, not just to condemn, but even to recognise the atrocities. She has declined to acknowledge the existence of the Ro-

hingya except as part of a terrorist movement or to call for UN investigators to be allowed in to observe the situation. While she has now proposed that anyone "verified as a refugee" would be accepted back, it is hard to see what reassurance this might offer to Rohingya people who are not considered citizens in Myanmar and when no guarantee has been offered

for their future safety.

All this has been happening in a country I was living in just four years ago, when the world was full of hope for its peaceful, democratic future. I only wish

### DECADES OF REPRESSION

Myanmar's military has a five decade-long track record of inflicting violence upon civilians in the name of Buddhist nationalism, a principle written into the country's constitution. In Rakhine state, the military has twice before attempted "ethnic cleansing" of Ro hingya Muslims, first in 1992 and then in 2012. Many of the country's other ethnic and linguistic minorities have been similarly targeted.

During the decades of repressive military rule, the government-run newspaper, The New Light of Myanmar, would regularly feature articles about one of the military leaders opening yet another bright, golden pagoda for the local population to worship in and be grateful for, even as terrible events were unfolding in other regions. I have seen some of the results first-hand: ten years ago, I was living and working in Thailand in a refugee camp where 40,000 Karenni people were trapped after fleeing from burning hill villages and mass killings in Myanmar.

Then, almost out of the blue, the regime announced in 2010 that Myanmar would begin a transition towards democracy. Suu Kyi was released from house arrest and other notable political prisoners freed. Onlookers were astounded but sceptical – they

League for Democracy (NLD) party won 81% of seats, only to see the results disregarded. But remarkably, this time, the military appeared to follow through. In 2012, it permitted a by-election in which Suu Kyi was allowed not only to run for office, but to win it. A gen-

Reen to lend a hand in this exciting new phase, and to finally see inside this secretive country, I moved to Myanmar at the start of 2013 to work on a human rights legal project, training local lawyers in Yangon, the former capital. And almost as soon as I stepped off the plane. I was entranced

HOPE FOR DEMOCRACY
On the one hand, arriving in Yangon was like stepping back in time. Life bubbled busily and fragrantly on the streets, men and women alike wore colour ful longyi wrap-arounds rather than jeans and there was barely a mobile phone in sight. The air seemed to vibrate with happy anticipation of the future. The junta was still in control of parliament, but a full general election was promised before long. Most people I spoke to expressed adulation for "The Lady" and felt freer to express themselves than ever.

I was so captivated by those I met in Yangon that I ended up writing a book about them. Myanmar's writers were particularly fascinating to me, initially

waved to her with a mechanical smile

From then on, I began to notice an uptick in news articles about Muslims, and the hate speech directed against them. A notorious nationalist Buddhist monk, Ashin Wirathu, had recently been released from jail for inciting violence against Muslims and had promptly resumed his activities as leader of a nationalist campaign called 969, which aimed to "defend" the Buddhist values of Myanmar against what was said to be an expanding Islamic presence. The campaign discouraged relationships between Bud-dhist women and Muslim men and sought to persuade businesses not to deal with Muslim custo ers; shopkeepers around town were busy putting signs up behind their counters. It all felt sinister to say the least.

### WITNESS TO VIOLENCE

A few months later, my husband and I decided we'd do some travelling to see more of the country, and would head almost as far north as we could legitimately go. Some regions were still closed to visitors, including most of Rakhine State, where there had been clashes between Muslims and Buddhists the year before. Other states were off-limits too, among them Shan and Karen, where populations had their own languages and cultures and wanted to preserve them, contrary to the regime's preference for uniformity.

Just before we left, news

broke of more violence involving Muslims, this time starting in a little town called Meikhtila. It all started with a dispute between a shopkeeper and a Muslim cus-tomer over a gold hairpin, which attracted attention and escalated until a mob formed and de-stroyed the shop. Later that day, a Buddhist monk was doused in petrol and burned, sparking violence that killed 40 people and injured more than 60, most of them Muslims.

The BBC posted a video showing police apparently standing by as rioters, including Buddhist monks, torched ses and killed Muslim stu dents in Meikhtila in central Myanmar. About 9,000 people were displaced before military

troops were sent in to calm the situation. There were rumours flying around that the military had started burning down Muslims' houses, even that troops had incited violence deliberately. One person told me that they had seen a horde of men dressed in black ride motorbikes around one night while the internet was suspiciously down

Whatever the truth, the situation seemed to calm coned it was safe to proceed.

We took a snail-like but stun-

ning train journey up to Pyin Oo Lwin, which had been a colonial hill station retreat, then headed to Mandalay, where we dined on delicious dhal in the street. Our final stop on this trip was going to be the picturesque Inle Lake in the Shan hills, which required us to change trains and stay overnight in a town called Thazi. We hadn't quite clocked how close that was to the epicentre of the recent violence.

We arrived shortly after sunset and got off the train to darkness and eerie silence. A couple of peo-ple who looked like locals got off at the same station, but scuttled away. There were no taxis waiting, and

nobody trying to sell anything at all to these tourists. It was clear that there were hardly any buildings near the station and that the centre of the town must be some way off down the only visible road. But weirdly, there were no lights to be seen in the disweirdly, there were no ngins to be seen in the calculation. We had booked a room in the only guesthouse in town which was supposedly on the main street. There would be no more trains until the next day. We turn to pg05



because it was so difficult to get access to their work In my first few days in the country, I searched b shops for fiction in translation to help me get a better sense of the place, but found hardly any. When I finally met some writers in person, they uncovered a trove of true stories about creating and informing and surviving under one of the world's most repressive regimes. All injured passengers were taken to nearby hospitals, but two of them who suffered serious injuries were rushed to Kath mandu for treatment, the

According to preliminary reports, the accident occurred because the driver failed to take the high speed bus under control at the turning point due to poorly visibility, the police said.

Altogether 52 passen gers were travelling on the bus, police said.

While the police pri-

ma facie blamed visibility for today's accident, such mishaps are not uncom-mon in the Himalayan nation and occur mostly due to poor infrastructure and reckless driving.

After Guwahati and Dibrugarh in

Assam, Agartala was the third city in the northeast to get a Rajdhani.
"The 14-coach train, with one

AC first-class, two AC two-tier, eight AC three-tier coaches, one pantry car and two power-cum-luggage vans, will stop at 16 stations," the NFR official added.

tions here.

# India and B'desh to restore snapped rail lines: Haque

AGARTALA, OCT 28 (PTI): Bangladesh Railway Minister Mujibal Haque said an initiative has been taken to reconnect railway lines with India in 12 places, which were snapped after partition of the country in 1947.

"We want to restore all the railway lines which existed be-fore the partition of India. Now the initiative is on to restore rail connectivity in twelve places between Bangladesh and India. Both the governments are cooperating with each other in this regard," he told reporters here last evening.

Haque was in the capital to end a conference of Rotary Clubs of both the countries. Tripura Chief Minister Manik Sarkar inaugurated the conference.

The Bangladesh minister said the second rail bridge on the Titas and the Bhoirab rivers in Brahmanbaria district of his country was completed with funding from India, and that it would be inaugurated soon.

Apart from the 'Moitree Exwhich runs between Dhaka and Kolkata, he said another train 'Bandhan Express' to run between Khulna in Bangladesh and Kolkata, was likely to be launched next month

"There is also a proposal from Bangladesh side to launch a train to connect Rajshahi in Bangla-desh and Kolkata," he said.

Haque noted that the progress of the 15-km long ongoin Agartala-Akhaura project was satisfactory and land acquisition for the purpose in Bangladesh side was complete.

Land acquisition for the project in Indian side has also been completed, West Tripura Distric Magistrate and Collector, Milind nteke told reporters earlier.

The central government has released Rs 97.63 crore to acquire the land, he said.

The process of laying railway tracks to connect Agartala with Akhaura in Bangladesh would be completed next year, Haque said.
Out of the 15-km track, five

km would be on Indian side and the rest in Bangladesh.

Ramteke stated that the Northeast Frontier Railway (NFR) was the nodal agency for implementation of the project in Indian side. railway minister

Suresh Prabhu and Haque had jointly laid the foundation stone of the project here on July 31 last. A flyover of 3.7 km will be constructed on the Indian side to save cultivable lands and the

entire project cost will be borne by the central government. New Delhi is keen to estab-lish the rail link as it will con-

nect West Bengal and Tripura through Bangladesh The 1,700 km distance be-

tween Agartala and Kolkata, which goes through the chicken neck in Siliguri, would be reduced to 350 km if passengers could move through Bangladesh,

That would at least remind her electorate that a genuine democracy cannot tolerate this kind of violence and hatred. Whether their leader stays or goes, the younger generation of NLD politicians and activists must find a way to redeem their party's reputation and make their democracy viable This is a mountain to climb, but there are talented younger people capable of scaling it. I have met several of them.

In the meantime, the horror of the sit-

uation has made me think twice about going back to Myanmar, I have been invited speak at the Irrawaddy Literary Festival November, of which Suu Kyi is a patron. If I still go, I anticipate some tense conversations. I might even have to point certain people in the direction of that video.

would just have to find it on foot.

As we set off, a man appeared out of the shadows, looking worried and pointing to his rickshaw. He whispered the price to take us to town. We nodded in eager relief, handed over the money and climbed aboard. He cycled silently down the deserted road, then pulled up at a junction, got off and took our bags from us, putting them down by the side of the road. "I have to leave you here," he whispered hoarsely. Surprised, we got off and thanked him. "Do you know where the guesthouse is?" I asked. He shook his head

We walked slowly along the main street. It was only 7.30pm, but nobody was around. No pedestrians, no bikes, no cars, no lights visible except through cracks around doors and shutters – we were utterly alone. We walked silently on down the street, hoping that a door would be thrown open and a welcoming, illuminated face would call out, saying he'd be waiting for us. Nothing.

saying he'd be waiting for us. Nothing.
Finally, we spotted an old sign nailed above a door saying "guesthouse". Relief!
We knocked, and knocked again: silence.
There was definitely light around the window shutters. We called out, "Hello? Is anyone there?": still silence. We began to panic. What was going on, and what on Earth were we going to do if we weren't going to be let into the only legal place to stay in town?

But then we heard footsteps. The lock jiggled, and the front door opened. A man stared out at us, and then past us. His face was not welcoming, it was scared, and not of us. "You booked to stay?", he whispered. We nodded, and he beckoned us in.

He led us upstairs into an ancient, peel-

ing box room where he took down our passport details. We asked him what was going on and he stopped writing and looked at us "There is a curfew," he said. "Because of the violence. Just down the road. You didn't hear about it?" It was only then that we realised quite how close to the violence we were. We hadn't thought to check about curfews. "No-body is allowed to have any lights on after sunset in this region, or be outside at all," he said. "I am a Muslim myself. We Muslims are very scared. Bad, bad things are being done to us. We have nobody to help, nothing."

We nodded, then crept up to sleep in our flimsy, filthy single beds in a room that couldn't have been done up in any way for the past 50 years. So much for the transition, for the racing economy of the next "Asian Tiger", for the hope of peace and free-dom from fear.

Shortly after we returned to Yangon, an orphanage attached to a mosque was set on fire in the centre of the city, just around the corner from where we were living. Thirteen children were killed. When a police officer speaking at the scene said the fire was trig-gered by an electrical short "and not due to any criminal activity", he was jeered by the crowd. Nobody was arrested, and after a few days the street opened again.

### When I left Myanmar, I still held out hope

that the general election in 2015 would im prove things and that Suu Kyi would speed up the transition and usher in reforms to prevent violence and hate speech from escalating. But as the campaign got underway, it became clear there were major obstacles.
Chief among them was the constitution,

which the military government made clear

it would not amend in the foreseeable future. One of its clauses prohibits any candi date with a foreign spouse or foreign-born children from becoming president, a measure designed specifically to bar Suu Kyi from taking the helm. Another provision guarantees the military enough seats in parliament to give it a veto and to exert control over security and border affairs. Still others protect the primacy of Buddhism over other religions and deny rights to those deemed to be non-citizens – notably the Rohingya.

During the course of her election campaign, Suu Kyi lobbied in vain to change the presidential eligibility clause, but the constitution remains intact today. By taking power once elected, she effectively acquiesced to it (she settled for the new title of

### SUU KYI'S SILENCE

Given that military violence against Rohing-ya Muslims is worse that it has ever been - which is saying something - why has Suu Kyi offered no words either to condemn that violence or to support the protection of their rights? Of course, she is in a tight spot. Because of the control the military re-tains, there is little she can do practically to stem their violence - she has no authority to command troops. As for what she could say she probably believes that to admit publicly that Rohingya civilians have been attacked by the military – not to mention that they are the targets of ethnic cleansing – would be enough to trigger a coup. Suu Kyi almost certainly believes that to

effect badly needed democratic change she needs to remain in government, at any cost. But there comes a point where democratic legitimacy is completely lost. Ethnic cleans-

ing is undoubtedly past that point.

A further flaw with this notion of Suu Kyi's role is the idea – held on to not only by her but by many in international governments – that the future of Myanmar's democracy depends on her personally retaining office.

In truth, a democratic party is needed; not one person. And judging by her performance so far, she may in fact be more hindrance to her party than help. Rather than nurturing or empowering her colleagues, she has earned a reputation as a dictatorial micro-manager. No other policymakers have been allowed in her cabinet, and those ng with her have said that, under her reign, the "government has become so cen tralised, there is complete fear of her". It's hard to miss irony of her own oft-quoted words: "It is not power that corrupts but fear. Fear of losing power corrupts those who wield it and fear of the scourge of pow-er corrupts those who are subject to it." Then there's the matter of her personal

beliefs. It is by no means clear that even if she could, she would speak out in support of Rohingya Muslims as deserving equal rights in Myanmar. Her party's spokesperson. Win Htein, has stated on the record that she has no sympathy for the Rohingya. She blocked Muslims from running for parliament in 2015 and was silent when a prominent Muslim adviser and friend of hers was assassinated ten months into office. She has voiced no concern over the explicit primacy of Buddhism in the constitution and, on her watch, Buddhist nationalism has increased, not diminished.

# Brazil finish third with 2-0 win over Mali

champions Brazil ended the tournament in third position after beginning as the favourites. This was the second time they finished third since the inaugural edition in China in 1985.

Mali, meanwhile, went outside a podium finish after ending runners-up in the last edition in Chile.

Mali made two changes with captain Mohamed Camara coming in for Cheick Oumar Doucoure and Mama-di Fofana replacing Abdoulaye Diaby as central defender in the starting XI. Brazil did not make any changes from the line-up that started in their semifinal loss to England on

# Apparel exporters flag post-GST issues before Par panel

New Delhi, Oct 28 (PTI): Apparel exporters have brought up the problems faced by them post GST before a parlia-mentary panel, signalling the "strong likelihood" of a decline in garment shipments from India and pos sibility of job losses.

The Apparel Export Promotion Council (AEPC) made a presenta-tion to the Parliamentary Standing Committee (Rajya Sabha) on Commerce chaired by Naresh Gujral earlier this week.

The body pressed for early consideration of tax refunds blocked on the purchase of ginned cotton (agricultural inputs such as agricultural machinery, seeds, fertilisers, power, diesel and the like) and miscellaneous central or state levies like power cross subsidy, stamp duty, property tax and other evies for refund under

Rebate of State Levies.

The council also drew the attention of the com-



issue of extension of exemption of IGST on import under EPCG (Export Promotion Capital Goods) or Advance Authorisation from March 31, 2018 to December 31, 2018, in order to provide a longer window for investment decisions.

It also asked for al-wing utilisation of MEIS (Merchandise Exports from India Scheme) scrips for use in payment of CGST, SGST and IGST to ease the challenges of working capital blockage and other procedural issues

To arrest the decline in exports, the AEPC suggested that the competitive exchange rate and rupee appreciation be stabilised to protect the interest of exporters.

"The positive impact of GST is yet to be felt by garment industry where input costs have not come down. Overall effect of GST on apparel exporters, especially small and medium exporters, is burdensome and

stressful due to substantial increase of working capital and higher trans-action cost," AEPC Chairman Ashok Rajani said. "It has not only impacted the production of apparel adversely, but has also led to pressure on margins for exporters due to lowering of drawback rates."



# Spain takes control of "independent" Catalonia

today moved to seize direct control of Catalonia, sacking its police chief a day after the Catalan regional parliament's independence declaration sent shock waves through Europe.

The firing of Josep Lluis

Trapero, the highest-ranking officer of the Mossos d'Esquadra regional police, follows yesterday's dismissal of Catalonia's president, his deputy, all ministers, and the entire parliament.

Moving to quash what he termed an "escalation of dis-obedience", Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy called December 21 elections in the region under sweeping powers granted by the Senate in response to Catalan lawmakers voting to declare an independent republic.

The dismissal of Trapero, seen as an ally of his region's separatist leaders, was an-



nounced in today's official government gazette. Madrid accuses Trapero of disobeying court orders to block a banned October 1 independence referendum.

Instead, the ballot was disrupted, violently in some cases, by officers from Spain's national police and Guardia Civil paramilitary forces. All

eyes this weekend will be on whether Catalonia's separatist executive, led by Carles willingly Puigdemont, will willingly step aside for caretaker envoys from Madrid.

Spain's Deputy Prime Min-ister Soraya Saenz de Santamaria is due to meet later with secretaries of state who will likely take charge of Cat-

alonia's regional ministries. Tens thousands celebrated Barcelona other Catalan Catalan terday's inde-pendence dec-laration, which analysts say the region has no legal power to execute.

But anti-se-cession rallies have been called

for the capital, Madrid, today, and for Barcelona tomorrow. The move to quash Catalan powers under Article 155 of the Spanish constitution is likely to anger many in a region of some 7.5 million people that enjoved considerable autonomy, with control over education, healthcare and police. It is the first time the central government has curtailed aunomy in the region since dictator Francisco Franco's repressive 1939-75 rule. Independence supporters have warned they will resist the temporary measure, implemented under a constitutional article devised to rein in rebel regions.

"We won't cave in to Ra-

joy's authoritarianism nor to 155," the far-left CUP party, an ally of Puigdemont, tweeted.

A motion to declare Cata lonia a "republic" was passed yesterday with 70 votes out of 135 in the regional parliament, where pro-secessionists hold sway. Catalan leaders point to the "Yes" vote in the doorly divising October 1 ref. deeply- divisive October 1 referendum as a mandate for independence, even though less than half of voters took part.

Echoing widely-held fears, Federico Santi, Europe analyst at political risk consultancy crisis could become violent, with "more serious clashes between national police and pro-independence activists.

Speaking after the parliament's proclamation, Puigdemont urged activists to "maintain the momentum" in peaceful manner. The Spanish government has received unwavering support from the United States and its allies in the European Union.

The bloc is increasingly wary of nationalistic and secessionist sentiment, particularly after Britain's dramatic decision last year to leave the bloc. EU President Donald Tusk insisted Madrid "re-mains our only interlocutor" in Spain, but urged it to exercise restraint.

"I hope the Spanish gov ernment favours force argument, not argument of force," he tweeted.

### US keen to move forward on key defence pacts with India

WASHINGTON, OCT 28 (PTI): The US is keen to move forward on some important defence agree-ments with India that will make it easier for the Trump administration to share classified data and facilitate the sale of F-16 and F-18 fighter jets to New Delhi, a top American diplomat has said.

The Trump administration last month told Congress that it "strongly supports" the sale of F-18 and F-16 fighter jets to India and asserted that the proposals have the potential to take the Indo-US de fence ties to the next level There are important defence agreements that the two countries can move forward on, Alice G Wells, acting assistant secretary of state for the South and Central Asian Affairs, told reporters yesterday.

The agreements will make it easier for the US to share classified data and that will facilitate sales like the F-16 or the F-18 fighter jets and will help create a defence technology partnership, which is what India is seeking, but which will also create jobs for Americans at home she said

"This is a dynamic relationship which really hasn't begun to see the potential yet," Wells said. Wells had accompa-nied US Secretary of State

Rex Tillerson on his just concluded trip to Afghanistan, Pakistan and India.

This was an extremely friendly, very wide-rang-ing dialogue on how we can partner together on the strategic relationship that we think is going to define the rest of the 21st century," Wells said.

While there was a bilateral component to the visit, they talked about how the two countries with shared values - a respect for de-mocracy, transparency, freedom of navigation, for economic development ran inculcate these valu in the broader Indo-Pacific region, working with important partners like Japan and Australia

# **Protest by AIIMS** resident doctors enters 3rd day NEW DELHI, OCT 28 (PTI):

A protest by resident doctors of the premier AIIMS against "improper imple-mentation" of the Seventh Central Pay Commission's recommendations entered its third day today

The protesting doc-tors continued to work while fasting.

The doctors alleged that revised allowances under the 7th Central Pay Commission (CPC) had been implemented in other central government hospitals including RML Hospital and Safdarjung Hospital and autonomous institutes such as the Chandigarh-based PGIMER, but ctors at the AIIMS were yet to get the benefits.

Around 2,000 resident

doctors taking part in the fast held a peaceful pro-test from 1 pm to 2 pm in front of the hospital main gate and announced that they would not break their fast until their demands were fulfilled.

They were joined by the nurses' union, offi-cers' association, society of young scientists, stu-dents' union and karam-chari union among others. "The health minister

is not at all interested in the problems of the staff of the AIIMS and there is complete apathy to our demands. This (protest) will continue till we get approv-al for the release of our revised pay according to the 7th CPC recommendations from the health ministry.

"The government should realise the risk of working without food in hospital settings," AIIMS resident doctors' association president Harjit Singh Bhatti said. In a letter to Prime

Minister Narendra Modi, the AIIMS Resident Doctors Association (RDA) said even one-and-a-half years after the implementation of the commission's recommendations and four months of allowance approval in other medical institutes, the AIIMS doc-tors here still did not get the revised pay because of

administrative lapses.

"We have remained silent for a long time, hoping for a response from the health ministry. But there has been a complete lack of constructive steps taken by the ministry.

"Being a responsible citizen and a doctor we will not hamper the facil-ities for patients. In our further action to put our demands forward we will work continuously without consuming food," for-mer AIIMS RDA president Vijay Kumar said.

Two people have been shot dead by police in Kenya as violence continued over the country's presidential election. It brings the total number of le killed in two days of clashes to eight. In Nairobi's Kawangware slum, one man was shot dead as unrest erupted between ethnic grou, And another man was fatally shot during a confrontation with police in the western town of Bungoma. The latest deaths came as protesters who support opposition leader Raila Odinga clashed with police who fired tear gas and water cannon as they looted shops and set fire to a street kiosk. Some rioters belong to the ethnic group Luo, while others belong to the Kikuyu community.

### NKorea nuclear weapon use will meet 'massive military response: Mattis

SEOUL. OCT 28 (AFP): US Secretary of Defence Jim Mattis warned today that North Korea would face a "massive military re-sponse" if Pyongyang ever used its nuclear weapons.

"Make no mistake -any attack on the United States or our allies will be defeated," he said at a press conference on his trip to Seoul. "Any use of nuclear

weapons by the North will be met with a massive military response, effec tive and overwhelming."

Tensions have been running high on the Ko-rean peninsula, with the North conducting its sixth nuclear test last month and test-launching multiple missiles capable of reaching the US main-land. The North's ruler Kim Jong-Un and US President Donald Trump have also traded verbal threats of war and personal insults that have sparked global alarm.

that diplomacy remained a "preferred course of action" to solve the current crisis but stressed, "our diplomats are most effective when backed by credible military force".

He urged Pyongyang

"harbour no illusion" saying the isolated state is militarily "overmatched" by the US and South Korea -- a key ally of Washington that hosts 28.500 US troops.

mark that "only one thing will work" with the North fuelled concerns of a po-tential conflict on the divided peninsula where the 1950-53 Korean War had left millions dead.

This marks the first time global measles deaths have fallen below 1,00,000 per year, said the report by the World Health Organisation, United Nations Children's Fund, Centers for Disease Control and Prevention and Gavi-The Vaccine Alliance.

"We have seen a substantial drop in measles deaths for more than two decades, but now we must strive to reach zero mea-sles cases," said Jean-Ma-rie Okwo-Bele, Director of the WHO's Department of Immunisation, Vaccines and Biologicals.

"Measles elimination

will only be reached if measles vaccines reach every child, everywhere," Bele added.
