HC scanner leads SPCB to seal Pristine Life Science pharma unit

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 22 APR

After the Sikkim High Court scanner revealed contravention of Environmental Protection Act, 1986 and Hazardous & Other Wastes Management Rules by pharma units operating in Sikkim, the State Pollution Control Board, in a first, sealed one such unit here.

On the report of Amicus Curiae, Manita Pradhan, pointed out severe instances of violation of these laws and rules, the High Court directed the SPCB to seal the Pristine Life Science Pharma Unit.

The unit was polluting right under the sup-posed watch of the State Pollution Control Board despite the local peo-ple having made several complaints about dumping the untreated haz-ardous chemicals by the unit. This was eventually brought to the notice of the High Court. Pristine Life Sciences,

Park on NH-10 in Singtam, East Sikkim, it is informed, has not prop-erly installed or maintained the Ion-Exchange filtration equipment and is also alleged to have dumped and buried hazardous wastes like Ef-fluent Treatment Plant sludge, rejected finished products and expired raw materials behind the factory premises.

This hazardous waste was not being treated through the Effluent Treatment Plant, which is in contravention to the provision of Section 8 of the Environment (Pro-tection) Act, 1986 and also the provisions of the Hazardous and Other Wastes (Management & Trans-boundary ment) Rules, 2016.

It is also being contended that Pristine Life Science used contami-nated and dirty water from the jhora to man-ufacture medicines and other drugs

He further said that SDF government was not serious in the human resource development.

While asserting that local students should be given priority in Sikkim University, Mr Bhu-tia said the party will be writing to the Centre regarding the issue. He also called on the MPs to take up the issue of SU campus in Parliament. Regarding the Chief

NMSHE scientists come up with glacial lake volume and area equation SUMMIT REPORT

GANGTOK, 22 APR:

Ascientific team from Sikkim State Climate Change Cell under State Council of Science and Technology has come up with a glacial lake volume and area (VA) equation based on the scientific interventions carried out at South Lhonak Lake, a press release from De-partment of Science & Technology and Climate Change, informs.

The team involved in the development of the empirical equation comprises of RK Sharma, Pranay Pradhan and NP Sharma.

The team worked

on four years of intensive field as well as multi-temporal satellite data based studies to come up with the volume area equation in order to calculate the storage volume of other potentially dangerous glacial lakes in the Sikkim Himalaya and Indian Himalava as a whole, the release reads.

The principle investigator to the project was Additional Director, Department of Science, Technology and Climate

Change, DG Shrestha.

The scientific paper, entitled 'Remote sensing and in situ-based assess-ment of rapidly growing

Central Asia, and Tibet, was the most important Buddhist centre of learning in ancient and medie

Citing quantum physics, which describes nature at the smallest scales of energy levels of atoms and subatomic particles, the Dalai Lama said the concept was explained 2,000 years ago by the Indian philosopher Nagarjuna.

"Buddha was an an-cient Indian scientist. I consider myself as half monk and half scientist. he said, referring to his de-liberations with scientists.

Terming war, terrorism and religious violence products of materialism, the spiritual leader expressed his sadness over the violence against the Rohingya slims in Myanmar. The Rohingya, who

had lived for centuries in the Buddhist-majority country, are one the most persecuted people in the world. Mvanmar had denied them citizenship since 1982, effectively rendering them stateless Nearly 70,000 Rohingya people had to flee Myan-mar to Bangladesh after a surge in violence and military crackdown on in August least year.

Invest in Learning

Because that is what education is really about

At around this time last year, the State Government had made the ambitious announcement to revolutionise education in Sikkim starting with primary schools and building up from that. This was a well intentioned initiative and welcome because it identified the beginning of schooling as the most important years for learning. For far too long, primary schools $\frac{1}{2}$ have received only token attention and funds when these should have been the focus area. Hopefully, that is what the government plans in its latest move, but in the year that has passed, although there have been a few reasons to hope, at the institutional level, one still does not spy the excitement that could effect a major change. Hopefully, concerted efforts are underway which will surprise everyone.

And then the State is also putting together a State University. It is unclear what will be unique about this institution or what missing component of higher education it will provide a fillip for, but there really cannot be any complaints about more places of learning and there cannot ever be too many of them so long as they are about learning and not dispensing degrees. or worse still, jobs by favouritism. And please, don't impose employability as a criteria for the courses unless they are technical and skill-imparting trainings. Make the institutions genuinely about learning and then the graduates will automatically become sought after human resource for any sector they wish to join. Instil a keenness for learning, and you will have students who can adapt and pick up skills and expertise for any job that catches their fancy. Obsess over imparting employable skills and you will never succeed because the job market is huge and ever changing. It needs people with aptitude, not necessarily skills because those can be picked up on the job as well. Give the young confidence and they will be ready for the world. Constrict them into school uniforms when they should be discovering and expressing them-selves more confidently in their college years and you are only producing order-takers for times which require independent thinkers.

One also hopes that the current interest in revolu-

tionizing education is not limited to civil engineering projects. Where so much money is expended on infrastructure, not enough attention is being paid to the education that these improved infrastructures impart. Education is introduced in every speech as an empowering tool and if it were really so, students from underprivileged families would not drop-out from school in such huge numbers. The mid-day meal scheme is all very fine if it is malnutrition that the planners intended to address, but if they thought this would keep children in school, then they should have invested in teachers and learning tools first and finally on an effective monitoring system to keep teachers on duty and classrooms about ideas and learning. And more importantly, the planners should invest on fashioning a syllabus that is contemporary and prioritises learning, not memorising. Students drop out from school not because they cannot afford it, but because they cannot understand how education empowers them. It carries no relevance either for them or their families. Those from underprivileged families will drop out of school and the better heeled will drop out from college. More students drop out because they want to start working at improving their lives, learning by rote does not open their minds to the appreciate how education offers a way out; but, if schools encouraged students to think for themselves, analyse information and situations, they will understand what education means and then struggle to stay in school.

What this requires is not just for the syllabus to change, but also how subjects are taught in our schools, the manner in which learning is evaluated. There are those who believe that the Indian education system is the best, pointing out the achievers that our schools and colleges export. And therein lies proof of the drawbacks – the better minds still need to go abroad to deliver. As a nation, India produces a lot of educated people, but when it comes to thinkers and visionaries, people who give the world the next big idea, even when their nationality is Indian, are products of education systems that are not on our shores. So yes, let's invest in infrastructure, make sure that a well-provided-for school is the vicinity of every habitation, but also simultaneously, let's invest thought into how this infrastructure can work with a syllabus and pattern that makes thinkers of the next generation, not just note-takers.

The inconsiderately cruel ban on non-organic vegetables has many effects on the citizens of Sikkim other than limiting the choice of vegeta-bles to Ningro and Simrayo. There are many sociopolitical and legal fallouts of the ban as well.

The greatest casualty of the order has been the abrogation of a citizen's fundamental right of privacy and choice. The Maharashtra High Court, in its order on the beef ban case, observed, "As far as the choice of eating food of the citizens is concerned, the citizens are required to be let alone especially when the food of their choice is not injurious to health. As observed earlier, even a right to sleep is held as a part of right to privacy which is guaranteed under Article 21 of the Constitution of India, In fact the State cannot control what a citizen does in his house which is his own castle, provided he is not doing something which is contrary to law. The State cannot make an intrusion into his home and prevent a citizen from possessing and eating food of

The Supreme Court, on 24 August, 2017, said "nobody would like to be told what to eat or how to dress" while ruling that these activities come under the realm of the right to privacy.

The government ban on non-or-ganic vegetables on the pretext of health reasons in absence of any medical test proving that non-organ-ic vegetables from Siliguri are causing health problems in the state is unjustified.

The other reason given by the State that farmers would earn more from organic vegetables seems to be based on speculation rather than facts. The latest data showing the prices paid by SIMFED to farmers at the field and the price at which it is sold in Gangtok clearly shows that the benefit is only to the organiza-tion and not to the farmers. Farmers in Sikkim have never got a fair price for their produce and only the middlemen have earned the profits from

The effect on health from the ban on non-organic vegetables may prove more harmful than beneficial. . In relation to many developed and developing countries consumption of vegetables and fruits in India is low.
Consumption of fruits and vegetables is abysmally low among middle and high-income groups in urban India, according to a survey conducted by the Indian Council for Research on In ternational Economic Relations (IC-

Non-communicable disease
(NCD) risk factor survey carried out in seven states using WHO 'STEP' approach under integrated disease surveillance project (IDSP) showed that people consumed vegetables four to seven days and fruits two to three days in a 'week'. Fruit consumption was higher in urban areas but no dif-ference was noticed in vegetable consumption across rural-urban divide. Lack of availability of fruits and veg-etables round the year and their high costs were cited as important reasons of lower consumption. Studies have shown that low consumption of vegetables and fruits in India is associated with many nutritional and related

NSSO data on consumption of vegetables in Sikkim shows that it is

below the national average. Malnutrition affects children the most according to the NHFS report, resulting in stunting which is indicative of chronic or cumulative nutritional deprivation in early childhood. The stunting rate for Sikkim is 28% and wasting rate is 5.1 %.

Anemic prevalence among women between ages 15 to 49 is 35.25% and among men it is 15.7%. The biggest concern on India's tuberculosis map is Sikkim with an increase of 11 percent of new tuberculosis cases which are to be found multi-drug resistant (MDR), a figure which stands more at par with Mumbai. People who are malnourished or underweight are more likely to get tuberculosis and are also more susceptible to reinfection or relapse of TB after treatment. Malnutrition leads to decreased immunity. TB patients need a diet of leafy, dark-colored green vegetables for their high iron and B-Vitamin content and antioxidant-rich, brightly-colored vegetables, such as carrots, peppers, and squash, and fruits, like tomatoes. Nutrient deficiencies as well as diet-related chronic diseases could be prevented best by diets largely based on plant foods, such as well-balanced vegetarian diets

The experiment in Sikkim will have to be seen if it is successful after the failure in Kerala and Assam which also tried to restrict pesticide sprayed vegetables. Both states failed in their endeavour due to the protest from neighboring states supplying the veg-etables and also due to the shortage of vegetables inside the state. For the moment citizens of Sikkim will have to bear the high cost and limited choice of vegetables till they find their voices to protest against the dictatorial diktat which has curbed their fundamental right of privacy and choice.

Nobel Prize Crisis: Flurry of withdrawals rocking Swedish Academy's showpiece literature award

The Swedish Academy is in trouble. The body which bestows the annual Nobel Prize in Literature has been hit by the withdrawal of a number of its members after a row over allegations of sexu-al abuse and harassment. The crisis came to a head after the decision of the permanent secretary, Sara Danius, to step down on April 12, prompting King Carl XVI Gustaf to intervene, promising reforms to able to academy to continue

The academy's rules don't allow for members to resign, so disenchanted members withdraw from active participation. Danius's withdrawal is the first by a permanent secretary in more than than 230 years. It means there are only 11 active members of the academy and the rules require that new members must be elected by 12 members.

The Swedish Academy was established in 1786 to promote the Swedish language by setting stan-dards and developing poetry and other forms of linguistic expression. For a century and more, this was where writers rubbed shoulders with high-ranking officials and aristocrats. But for the past century, the 18 members of the Academy have tended to be well-known writers and academics – a fine family name is no longer enough for entrance.

But apart from this small modernisation in the interests of promoting equality, the Swedish Academy has remained surprisingly stable. There have been scandals and expulsions, most notably that of founding member, Gustaf Mauritz Armfelt, a director of both the Royal Opera and the Royal Theatre in Stockholm, who was excluded twice - both times for political reasons when Armfelt was forced to flee the country in fear of his life. Another prominent exclusion was that of politician and aristocrat Count Henning Hamilton who resigned after finan-

But overall the academy has been remarkably stable and, when Alfred Nobel's will stipulated in 1895 that the Nobel Prize in Literature should be decided upon by "the academy in Stockholm", the organisation received an enormous boost in pres-tige as well as a financial boost that has allowed it

to fund the Nobel Library. SCANDAL ERUPTS

The current crisis actually has its roots in a row as far back as 1989 when members Kerstin Ekman and Lars Gyllensten left their chairs after a majority of the academy voted against a proposition to submit an appeal to the Swedish government to engage against the fatwa issued by Iran against Salman Rushdie for his controversial novel The Satanana Rushdie for his controversial novel Rushdie for his controversial novel Rushdie ic Verses. In 2015, another member, Lotta Lotass, left her chair for personal reasons

After Gyllenstein's death and replacement by Kristina Lugn, this meant that only 16 of the 18 members of the academy were now actively involved in its work. These included five women including Danius the permanent secretary and the poet Katarina Frostenson whose husband Jean-Claude Arnault is reported to have been the subject of numerous complaints of sexual harassment and abuse. These go back as far as 1996 when there is evidence that a young artist called Anna-Karin Bylund contacted the then permanent secretary Sture Allén (confusingly, the permanent secretary actually holds the office for a limited term which varies) with allegations of sexual harassment against Arnault. No action was taken at the time.

Towards the end of 2017, in the wake of the Weinstein scandal and the #MeToo movement, 18 women came forward in the Swedish press with further allegations against Arnault, who is not only

married to an Academy member but runs the Forum, a club for artists in Stockholm which is subsi dised by the Academy. There were also allegations going around that the names of several winners had been leaked in the past, although there is said to be no record of odd betting patterns in Sweden. In the UK, Ladbrokes is reported to have suspended betting on one occasion after large amounts of money were placed on the eventual winner. Ar-nault's lawyer Bjorn Hurtig told Reuters that his client denied all the allegations, including that of being the source of leaks

TURMOIL

According to reports of the affair, moves to expel Frostenson were frustrated by the Academy's dominant conservative male faction, led by Allén and literary scholar Horace Engdahl (also a former permanent secretary), which voted against the measure on the grounds that it would be unfair to punish Frostenson for the perceived crimes of her husband. Three members: novelist Klas Ostergren, literary scholar Kjell Espmark and historian Peter Englund duly resigned and Danius stood down as permanent secretary and withdrew from active participation, as did Frostenson.

The affair would not have attracted so much international interest but for the Swedish Academy's role in selecting the recipients of the Nobel Prize. And now, thanks to all the resignations, the existence of the Academy itself has been put in jeop-ardy. All eyes are now on the king and his possible reforms to reach some kind of solution that can secure the future of the Nobel Prize in Literature.

in the accident, they said.



SSB completes border deployment along Nepal, Bhutan with over 54000 troops

New Delhi, Apr 22 (PTI): curity along India's east-ern frontier, the SSB has finally completed the deployment of over 54,000 personnel along the open and crime-prone borders with Nepal and Bhutan.

Similarly, 20 full bat-talions of the paramilitary, at 158 operational border posts, have now been deployed along the Bhutan border that runs along the states of West Bengal, Sikkim, Arunachal Pradesh and Assam, they said.

These figures have been accomplished in the recent past, officials said.

One remaining battal-t, that comprises over 1,000 personnel, is kept

1,000 personnel, is kept as a reserve, they said. SSB Director General Rajnikant Mishra con-firmed the development to PTI, saying this was a task that had to be com-leted on priority. pleted on priority.

be deployed for patrolling, tionalising the full-fledged intelligence wing of the SSB that was sanctioned to it by the Union Home

Ministry last year.

50 IIT alumni quit jobs to form political party

New Delhi. Apr 22 (PTI): A group of 50 alumni from the prestigious Indian Institutes of Technology (IITs) across the country have quit their jobs to form a political party to fight for the rights of Scheduled Castes, Scheduled Tribes and Other Backward Classes.

The group, which is waiting for an approval from the Election Commission, has named their outfit Bahujan Azad Party

We are a bunch of 50 eople, all from different IITs, who have quit our full-time jobs to work for the party. We have ap-plied to the Election Commission for an approval and are meanwhile do-ing ground work, Naven Kumar, a 2015 IIT Delhi graduate, who is leading the group, told PTI.

The party members, however, do not wish to jump the gun and aim for the 2019 Lok Sabha elections. a hurried job and end up being reduced to just one of those small political outfits with big ambitions. We will begin with contesting the 2020 Bihar Assembly elections and then aim for the next Lok sabha polls, Kumar said.

The group, which includes members mostly from the SC, ST and OBC communities, feels that the backward classes have not received their due in terms of education and

All set with a poster which has pictures of B R Ambedkar, Subhas Chandra Bose and A P J Abdul Kalam, among others, the party has already begun a social media campaign.

Once we have the regis-tration, we will form small units of the party which will start working on the ground for our target groups. We also do not wish to pitch ourselves as a rival of any political party or ideology, Kumar added.

Scion opposes Tripura govt move to convert palace into museum

AGARTALA, APR 22 (PTI): The state government's decision to develop the century-old 'Puspavant Palace' into a museum has come under fire from Pradyot Kishore Debbarma, Tripura's royal scion and the grandson of last king Bir Bikram Kishore, who termed it as a move to "hijack indigenous heritage".

The Tripura government has recently issued a notito announce that the 'Puspavant Palace', which as the official residence of 16 state governors since 1972, is set to be transformed into a museum and research centre dedicated to Nobel laureate Rabindranath Tagore.

Governor Tathagata Roy has shifted to a new Raj

Bhavan building, which he inaugurated on April 18 at

the capital complex here.

"I am against the renaming of any old monuments or palaces. It is sad to hear that the government of Tripura will be renaming the Puspavant Palace (governor's house) to Rabindranath Tagore museum," Debbarma said.

Samarjit Bhowmik, the secretary of Rajbhavan, however, clarified there was no question of changing

the name of the palace, but it would be converted into a iseum for Tagore. When pointed out that the state does not intend to re-

ne the palace, Debbarma said, "They are trying to hijack everything culturally. Eventually, they would rename



the palace. I want to know why the historical place would be made into a museum. Let it remain as it is." Tagore was a great friend of the maharajas of Tripu-

ra and the government is unnecessarily trying to drag

Debbarma equated the present government with the erstwhile Left Front rule that had tried to convert

the Ujayanta Palace into a museum.

"How is this government different from the Left Front government, which tried to do something similar with Ujayanta Palace. If the government wants to build m for Rabindranath Tagore, I am willing to donate land for it, but remodelling the Puspavant Palace is not a good idea." The Joint Action Committee of Civil Society (JACCS),

an organization of the state's indigenous people, has also issued a statement two days ago to say that it strongly condemns the BJP government's decision to overhaul the royal abode.

The palace was built by King Birendra Kishore Man-ikya in 1917 and his statue should be installed in front of the palace, JACCS general secretary Anthony Debbar-

Pannalal Roy, who conducted a research on Tago-re's relation with the Manikya kings of Tripura, said the bard has visited the state seven times and stayed at the palace in 1925 as the guest of Bir Bikram Kishore, the last Manikya king.

Tripura was elevated to the status of a full-fledged

state in 1972, and since then, the palace, built on 1.76 hectares of land, served as the Raj Bhavan or the gov-

"The Puspavant Palace has been identified as a heritage building not only because of its association with royalty, but also because Tagore and other great per-sonalities had stayed here as royal guests," the Raj Bhavan secretary added.

Women's safety: Little has changed in 'National Capital of Rape' since 2012, say experts

Debates over the safety of women have kicked up a dust, but done little to ensure their security, students and professionals say, stressing nothing has changed in the national capital after the 2012 brutal gangrape that briefly sparked some soul-searching and led to a new law.

Delhi reported 15,319 cases of crimes against women in 2014, 17,222 in 2015 and 15,310 in 2016, data collected by the National Crime Records Bureau stated.

It won the dubious sobriquet of the "national capital of rape" when the city registered the maximum number of 1,996 rape cases in the country in 2016, up from 1,893 in 2015.

But women stressed that little had changed since people came out to the streets in protest against the rape and death of a paramedical intern in 2012.

"Ask any girl, and she would tell you what happens with us daily in public spaces. People stare at our body, they wrongly brush past us,

get intimidated," said a 23-year-old MA student who did not wish to be

These violations occurred in places that ranged from Metro trains and DTC buses to shopping malls and colleges, she said.

And they regularly took place on social media sites.

'I was even threatened on Facebook for not reciprocating to somebody's sexual advances," she said. "What business do people have in asking if I am a virgin or if my 'seal' is intact?"

Her parents worried about her safety every time she went out of the house, she said. adding that venturing out after 8 pm for her was a strict "no".

"But every other day we keep hearing news of rape or moles-tation that happens not only to young women but to children, too,"

medical student on board a bus in Delhi on December 16, 2012, the Supreme Court had upheld death for the four accused in the case it diabolical".

In its wake the government ended the criminal law in April 2013, bringing stricter punishment for crimes including rape, sexual harassment, voyeurism, stalking and acid attacks.

"Even after the amendments, the ground level enforcement is really bad," said Anahita Bakshi, a public relations professional based out of South Delhi.

The 25-year-old professional said most women would say they felt unsafe if asked about the way

the city treated them.

Sharper laws have been brought in, but few believed they had made a difference. "Nothing has changed even six

years after the Delhi gangrape case with respect to women's safety and the psychological fear that we have to deal with. The only change, perhaps, is that the situation has worsened," said the postgraduate student, advocating death penalty

After the nation-wide public outrage over the Kathua and Unn-

day gave its approval to the promulgation of an Ordinance with the death penalty for those who raped children up to 12 years of age.

President Ram Nath Kovind to-day promulgated the Ordinance.

Delhi Commission for Women chairperson Swati Maliwal too was on a hunger-strike for 10 days, demanding death for rapists

However, victims and experts believed the death penalty could not be a deterrent to rape and crime against women unless the political leadership showed a commitment.

"The decision (by the Union Cabinet) is a mere 'lollipop' given to the people ahead of the general elections," said the father of the 2012 gangrape victim.

Talking to PTI, he said it had been four years since the lower court and the high court awarded the death sentence to the rapists and murderers of his daughter, orders upheld by the Supreme Court.

"When the government has not been able to hand down punishment to the culprits in this case said, claiming that the government

was not going to punish them.

He also stressed the death penalty would not deter people against such crimes, and added that the Union Cabinet's latest move was insensitive towards children above

12 years.
"And what if the accused of a rape turns out to be a juvenile?

Will he face the gallows," he asked.
Supreme Court lawyer and rights activist Vrinda Grover also asserted that nothing had changed since 2012 in the levels of violence, mindsets of people, the legal sys-

tem or in the political class.

"And the reason it hasn't changed is that the law requires a certain orientation for people to change the way they look at the law. look at women," she said.

One of the problems, she held, was that the political leadership was not committed to creating cir-cumstances where women were equal citizens and could enjoy the

freedom of liberty.
Referring to the Kathua and Unnao cases, Grover said the reship came only after society had expressed extreme anguish and anger. An eight-year-old girl was raped and killed in Kathua in Jammu, while a teenager in Unnao in Uttar Pradesh said she had been gang-raped.

"Unless there is a commitment by political leadership there won't be any changes in the system," Gro-

ver added.

The lawyer, who is opposed to the death penalty, said the country had "very low levels" of conviction because of the shortcomings in the legal system.

"The investigation and pros-ecution is not the way it should be. And the problem is that it (the death penalty) is the only answer that the political class has -- whether it is the Delhi Commission for Women or the Prime Minister...

"Death sentences are going to bring no change in our lives. These are gimmicks and we are fed up.. they are playing politics over the bodies of women," she said.

Bindra biopic aims to inspire youngsters to take up shooting as sport

Two Chinese dragon boats capsize in river, 17 killed

BEIJING, APR 22 (PTI): Two dragon boats practicing for a race on a river in southern China have over-turned, drowning 17 people, authorities said today.

The accident hap-pened at about 1:30 PM yesterday when the dragon boats, 18 meters long and with a capacity of 30 passengers each, over-turned during the practice session on Taohua-jiang River in Guilin, the regional capital.

About 60 people fell into the water.

Seventeen people were killed after the boats overturned vesterday in southern China's Guangxi Zhuang Autonomous Region, the authorities said.

Eight boats and over 200 people were dispatched for the rescue.

Authorities in Guilin said villagers in Dunmu Village organised the practice session without notifying police before-hand. Two organisers hand. Two organisers have been detained, staterun Xinhua news agency reported.

Suicide attack on Kabul voter registration centre kills

"It happened at the entrance gate of the centre. It was a suicide attack." Dawood Amin, city police chief, told AFP.

Health ministry spokesman Wahid Majroh said 31 people had been killed and 54 wounded. The higher toll could not be immediately confirmed, but a police official told AFP on condition of anonymity that at least 25 people had been killed

Earlier, interior ministry spokesman Najib Danish put the death toll at nine and 56 wounded. He could not immediately

be reached for an update.

In her initial remarks, Swaraj congratulated Wang on being elevated as state councillor and appointed the special representative for the India-China boundary talks.
Wang said the bilat-

eral ties have witnessed

a good development and vn a positive mon tum this year under the guidance of the leaders of the two nations.

"On the eve of the closing of China's Natio al People's Congress this year, President Xi Jinping received a very import-ant phone call from Prime Minister Narendra Modi.'

He said the call spurred a positive mo-mentum in the dialogue process between the two countries

"Our two leaders had in-depth in-depth exchange of views and reached important consensus furthering the China-In-dia relationship. We must work very hard to implement the consensus between our two leaders

"India's membership to the SCO has expanded the orgainsation's poten-tial and its influence, as well as providing a new platform for the India-China cooperation and I be-lieve that India will make a positive and energetic contribution to the organ-

isation," Wang said.

Their meeting is part of efforts by the two countries to step up the pace of high-level interactions to improve relations, official sources here told PTI be-fore the meeting.

Following the Doka-lam standoff last year both countries increased dialogue to scale down tensions and improve relations with talks at various levels.

Swaraj and Wang are meeting in the immediate backdrop of the re-cent meeting between National Security Advisor Ajit Doval and top official of the ruling Communist Party of China (CPC) Yang Jiechi in Shanghai.

Experts take samples from site of alleged Syria gas attack

Investigators from the global chemical arms watchdog collected samples yesterday from the site of a suspected gas attack in Syria two weeks ago, after security concerns delayed their

Gruesome footage of the alleged toxic attack on April 7 in the town of Douma, just outside Damascus, horrified the world and prompted unprecedented Western strikes on Syrian military installations.

Just hours after the joint missile strikes, a team from the Organisation for the Prohibition of Chemical Weapons (OPCW) arrived in Syria to investigate the claims.
But they had been un-

able to access Douma itself, which fell from rebel hands into joint Syrian and Russian control after the suspected chemical attack.

United Nations security experts deployed to the town on Tuesday to check it was safe, but were forced to pull out after an explosion went off and they were shot at.

Investigators finally collected evidence from the site for the first time on Saturday, the OPCW said.

The samples collected will be transported to the OPCW Laboratory in Rijswijk and then dispatched for analysis to the OPCW's designated labs," the body said in a statement, adding it could plan another visit.

Russia's foreign ministry had earlier announced the inspectors reached Douma after guarantees by Syria and its own forces, and said it expected them to carry out an "impartial investigation".

Moscow, a key ally of President Bashar al-Assad, has said its own probe into the events in Douma found no traces of chemical use.

Assad's government,

too, has repeatedly denied using toxic weapons, and accused the West of "fabricating" the claim to justify bombing Syria.

Medics and first responders in the town say more than 40 peo-ple were killed on the night of April 7, reporting foaming at the mouth, pinpoint pupils and difficulty breathing.

Investigators reached Syria a week later at the country's invitation, arriving just hours after a coordinated wave of French. American and British missile strikes.

But they spent a week in the capital, unable to access Douma just a few miles to the east, even as groups of journalists visited the town on government tours. Western powers

slammed Syrian and Russian authorities, saying proof that chemicals were used in Douma was probably being hidden.

"It seems likely that

terial evidence linked to the chemical attack dis-appear," Foreign Minister Iean-Yves Le Drian said on Saturday, shortly before the OPCW got access to Douma

Analysts say that if chemicals were toxic used, OPCW inspectors would still be able to find important traces in clothes, walls, rocks and soil in Douma, although their potency decreases with time

"Nerve agents like sarin can be present in the environment for many weeks after use and particularly if you look near the site where a weap-on has exploded," said Alastair Hay, professor of environmental toxicology at the University of Leeds.

Crucial evidence can also linger in victims' blood, urine and organs.

"Autopsy samples, if available, will provide invaluable evidence and

found in many organs," Hav told AFP.

The "White Helmets", a Syrian rescue force that works in opposition-held areas, said it had given the OPCW details on the burial site of the Douma

But a top official from Jaish al-Islam, the rebel group that controlled Douma during the al-leged chemical attack, accused the regime of raiding the graves.

The OPCW does not have a mandate to establish who is responsible for chemical attacks. The joint OPCW-UN taskforce that did was shut down by Russia last year after it blamed Syria's regime

for another gas attack.
Experts say it may take between two and three weeks to analyse evidence collected Douma.

Iran threatens to 'vigorously' resume enrichment if US quits nuclear deal

NEW YORK, APR 22 (AFP): Iran is ready to "vigorously" resume nuclear enrichment if the United States ditches the 2015 nuclear deal, and further "drastic measures" are being considered in response to a US exit, Iranian Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif warned.

Zarif told reporters in New

York that Iran is not seeking to acquire a nuclear bomb, but that Tehran's "probable" response to a US withdrawal would be to restart production of enriched uranium -- a key bomb-making ingredient.

"America never should have feared Iran producing a nuclear bomb, but we will pursue vigor-ously our nuclear enrichment," added the foreign minister, who is in the United States to attend a UN meeting on sustaining peace.

US President Donald Trump has set a May 12 deadline for the Europeans to "fix" the 2015 agreement that provides for curbs to Iran's nuclear program



in exchange for relief from finan-

Zarif's comments marked a further escalation of rhetoric following a warning earlier this month from Iranian President Hassan Rouhani that Washington would "regret" withdrawing from the nuclear deal, and that Iran would respond within a

the deal if the United States "intends to maintain any credibility in the international community" and to abide by it, "rather than demand more." The foreign minister warned against offering

any concessions to Trump.

"To try to appease the pres-

cise in futility," he said.

European leaders are hop-ing to persuade Trump to save the deal if they, in turn, agree to press Iran to enter into agree-ment on missile tests and moderating its regional influence in Yemen, Syria and Lebanon. If the United States buries

the deal, Iran is unlikely to stick to the agreement alongside the other signatories -- Britain, China, France, Germany and Russia said the foreign minister.

"That's highly unlikely," he

said. "It is important for Iran to receive the benefits of the agreement and there is no way that Iran would do a one-sided implementation of the agree-ment." Zarif, who will attend a UN meeting on sustaining peace this week, warned of "drastic measures" under discussion in Iran.

He declined to be more specific, pointing to "what certain members of our parliament are saying about Iran's options."

Getting people together for water conservation a challenge'


Aamir Khan has said that gathering people from villages to improve the ater situation in Maharashtra a huge challenge.

Aamir's Paani Foundation aims to impart knowledge and bring about a change at the grassroots level in Maharashtra about water conservation and watershed management.

"The biggest challenge is - peo-ple coming together. For example, water can only be stored in a pot which has no holes in it. Until human beings in a community, in the village, come together close (nothing can happen).

"If there are cracks in the society, the water will seep through. You have to remove all the cracks and then come together and then you will grab water," Aamir said in an interview here.

The 53-year-old actor added

ociety is fractured on many levels"... Politically, there are five par ties in each village, we have different castes in villages, you have land owners... Some do not have land, some people have land close to the stream, some people have land away from the stream. We had management is actually going to help all of us.

But certainly it's a challenge that has been overcome by the villagers themselves. We are just training them. That is the beauty of this idea. That the village does things on its own to solve the problem," he added.

At Paani Foundation, which was founded by Aamir in 2016, the team empowers villagers and gives them a sustainable solution for water conservation which is expected to

help them for years.
"All the work will be done by the village. They will decide what is the area of their land, how many water-sheds fall into it, what is the kind of work they need to do.

"So they make the plan and execute it. We just teach them how to do it. It is a demand-driven exercise. We don't choose villages, villages

tiative would help prevent farmer suicides, Aamir said it would a con-

"Certainly, it will contribute to that. Water is not the only reason

for farmers' suicides," he said.

Aamir appealed to students and people living in the state's urban areas to join the initiative, by becoming "jalmitras" (water's true friends) on May 1, which happens to be Maharashtra Day.

People from cities can register on the website of Paani Foundation to work in villages, alongside local residents.

The last date for registration is midnight of April 25

So far, over one lakh people have signed up and Aamir hoped more people from cities pitched in.

The actor revealed that while

women were at the forefront of this cause men often made excuses

a village, the women were doing 'shramdhaan' (donating efforts) the men were lazing around and giving excuses.

"So the women decided that they won't go home. After work, they all told their husbands they are not

coming home if they (men) don't come for shramdhaan," he said.

The "Dangal" actor has been getting strong support from the state since water conservation and drought elimination is one of the key projects of the Maharashtra government led by Chief Minister

Devendra Fadnavis.

"The government has a scheme,
Jalyukt Shivar Abhiyaan, which does the same thing. They take 5,000 villages every year and help the villagers by funding some of the activities. We don't take money from the government but we do seek their

"Like we are using Maharashtra State Road Transport buses. It is a big logistical effort but we do give a lump sum of Rs 50 lakh for this. So the CM facilitated that for us. They are helping us a lot. They are being extremely supportive," the actor added.

Talking about the reports in pa-

pers that he wanted to make Maharashtra drought-free in five years, Aamir said, "That's a claim that has come out in the papers. But I never said that. People asked us what is your hope and I said my hope is that in five years we should not be relevant anymore.

"All the villages should know by how to do this (conserve ter). We (the foundation) should become useless in five years and that's what I am hoping for I am not even thinking of that (other villagers). I am only focusing on Maharashtra.

Swedish dance music artist Avicii dead at 28

 $\mathbf{S}^{\mathrm{wedish}}$ DJ Avicii, real name Tim Bergling, died at age 28 on Friday, April 20, his publicist confirmed.

"It is with profound sorrow that we announce the loss of Tim Bergling, also known or IIII Bergiing, also known as Avicii," his publicist Diana Baron said in a statement. "He was found dead in Muscat, Oman this Friday afternoon local time, April 20th. The family is devastated and we ask everyone to please respect." ask everyone to please respect their need for privacy in this difficult time. No further statements will be given."

Avicii's club anthems include Wake Me Up, Levels, and recently, Lonely Together with Rita Ora.

The electronic dance music (EDM) star, who reportedly made \$250,000 (£180,000) a night on tour, had struggled with some health issues in the past, having his gall bladder and appendix removed in 2014.

He announced his retire-

ment from touring in 2016, partly because of the health problems.

One of the biggest nam in dance music of the last 10 vears, he had a catalogue full of pumping, uplifting, house

Grammy Awards and had nine UK top 10 singles, including two number ones

He suffered from health

problems including acute pancreatitis, in part due to excessive drinking He later announced a re-

turn to the studio, and released a new self-titled EP in 2017.

The EP, Avici (01), was

nominated for a Billboard mu sic award for top electronic al-bum just days before his death.

As well as working with the likes of Aloe Blacc and Rita Ora, Avicii collaborated with artists including Madonna and

Coldplay.
Other leading electronic artists wrote tributes to Bergling after the news of his death.

Singer Dua Lipa tweeted:
"Such sad news to hear about
Avicii passing. Too young and
way too soon. My condolences go

out to his family, friends and fans."
US band Imagine Dragons
tweeted: "Working with him was one of my favourite col-laborative moments. Far too young. The world was a happier and fuller place with his presence and art."

"No words can describe the sadness I'm feeling right now, hearing about Avicii passing away," offered DJ Zedd, while singer Adam Lam-bert, who collaborated on the track Lay Me Down, called him "a brilliant composer and a gentle spirit."
