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Darjeelingboils over, GJM calls 12-hour bandh

Stone-peltina. lathicharge, tear gassing, arson, confusion, miscommunication, and now a 12-hour bandh

SUMMIT REPORT

The West Bengal government had to call in the Army in Darjeeling on Thursday evening after Gorkha Jammukti Morcha (GJM) supporters clashed with security forces. Violence evented at around 3 n.m. erupted at around 3 p.m.

Since morning, the situation was fluid in Darjeeling with the GJM taking out rallies and holding a sit-in demonstration a short distance away from the Raj Bhawan where the State Cabinet

meeting was taking place.

The rallies arrived from Singmari,
Darjeeling Railway Station and Batasia Loop at the Gorkha Ranga Mancha Bha-wan and staged a sit-in demonstration. The police had set up barricades be-

low the St Andrew's Church, While the State Cabinet meeting started at the Raj Bhawan at around 2 p.m. The 2-hour long sit-in demonstration started along with slogan shouting at around 12:30 p.m and continued till around 2:45 p.m.

Vehicles stopped plying and shops downed shutters in Darjeeling. Meanwhile, the State Cabinet meet-

ing followed by a press conference had finished at around the same time.

Following the Cabinet meeting, while the 28 Ministers were still in the Raj Bhawan and the CM had returned to the Richmond Hill Government Guest House, at around 3 p.m. the GJM supporters torched an effigy of the CM.

Suddenly there were stones being pelted and amidst shouts a stampede ensued. Some people even tried to bring down the police barricade.

The police resorted to lathi charge and firing tear gas shells. Police vehi-cles parked on the Chowrasta road were

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an entire floor;

torched while stones and bottles rained on the police personnel from the Hill

More than 45 security force personnel were injured in the clash.

A police booth was set on fire.

10 police vehicles were torched

along with a State Government bus.
Police personnel, CRPF jawans, including lady police personnel and offi-

cers were injured.

Finally, at around 5 p.m. the situation was diffused and the GJM support-

ers and leaders left the area. GJM has claimed that 5 of their sup-

porters were injured. "We have called for a 12-hour bandh from 6 a.m. to 6 p.m. on Friday. All education institutes will remain closed, vehicles will not ply and business es-tablishments will remain closed. Emergency services have been exempted. Everything was going peacefully. TMC supporters threw stones at the sit-in demonstration leading to this," alleged Gorkha Janmukti Yuva Morcha leader, Amrit Yonzon.

Mamata Baneriee sat in an adminismamata Banerjee sat in an adminis-trative meeting with the Chief Secretary and the Home Secretary at Richmond Hill. In the evening the Ministers left Darjeeling while the CM will stay back. It may be recalled that GJM had

called a two-day bandh of educational institutions from 01 June and protest marches throughout the Hills from 04-08 June. The party is protesting against the alleged imposition of Bengali language in the Hills.

In Kalimpong, GJM supporters torched an effigy of the Chief Minister, Mamata Banerjee at Damber Chowkwhich the situation quickly deteriorated into confusion and much rumour-mongering but no untoward incidents were

reported in Kalimpong. Kalimpong town shut down after 5pm. Earlier, the GJM rally had a strong presence of students, not all of whom were sure about what was planned for



Panchayats of 3 Dzongu GPUs condemn pro-project pamphlet distribution

The Panchayats of Hee-Gyathang, Lum-Gor-Sangtok and Saffo-Passingdang Gram Panchayat Units of Dzongu have strongly con-demned the pamphlet distributed by people favouring the Teesta Stage IV Project during their rally on 06 June at Mangan in North Sikkim.

Section 6 of the Forest Rights Act provides a transparent three step proce-dure for deciding on who gets rights. First, the gram sabha (full village assembly, not the gram panchayat) makes a recommendation i.e who has been cultivating land for how long, which minor forest produce is col-

lected, etc.
The gram sabha plays this role because it is a public body where all people participate, and hence is fully democrat-

mendation goes through two stages of screening committees at the taluka and district levels. The district level committee makes the final decision (see section 6(6)).

The Committees have six members – three government officers and three elected persons. At both the taluka and the district levels, any person who believes a claim is false can appeal to the Committees, and if they prove their case the right is denied (sections 6(2) and 6(4)). The dangers of political brinkmanship and the costs

Sitting on an uneasy cusp the past few days, Dar-jeeling finally erupted in flames on Thursday. There is a gut feeling that its effects would be felt

Political brinkmanship between the Trinamool-led state government and the Gorkha Jan-mukti Morcha (GJM) has been running thick over several issues in the hills the past few months. The culmination, when it came on Thursday, was in the shape of violence. Understandably, life will be held to ransom in

the hills once again as the GJM-sponsored move-ment, if not hostilities, catches up in other parts of what is generally known as the Darjeeling hills. And, tourism, which is the money spinner for the hills, will fall the first casualty to the upset condi-

GJM activists went on the rampage in the vicini-ty of the Raj Bhawan on Thursday where chief minister Mamata Banerjee was holding a cabinet meeting. The police were brick batted, tear gas lobbed and vehicles were torched. The GJM has announced a dawn to dusk clampdown of the hills on Friday.

While the chief minister has stayed put in Dar-jeeling overseeing arrangements to ensure safe return of stranded tourists and hopeful return of normal conditions, it is learnt, the Army has been requisitioned to bring the situation under control. That says, the police force present in the hills is not adequate to contain the violence, which can escalate if not handled carefully.

Similar showdowns between Left Front cadres and BJP activists versus the police on May 22 and May 25 respectively in the streets of Kolkata ended in blood-letting of the demonstrators. In Darjeeling the situation was just the reverse with the police coming at the receiving end.

The topography of the hills is such that blunt-ing a violent movement is not as easy as it is in the plains. Here those on elevated ground physically enjoy dominance in a hostile situation and so immense patience will have to be exercised to ensure violence does not spread in other parts of the hills.

The hill community is a martial race and history is testimony they are not averse to skirmishes against the establishment if sentiments are hurt. So, caution is the operative word in the given con-

That said, the million rupee question now is what triggered Thursday's conflagration? The hills have been on the boil the past few days on the Bengali language in schools issue. But, Mamata Banerjee made it clear from Mirik two days ago that Bengali would be optional in hill schools, not compulsory. Yet the violence.

Politically the GJM has been losing ground to the Trinamool in the hills as demonstrates results of the recently held civic polls. With the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration (GTA) hopefully round the corner, the GJM had to claw back into public imagination. And what better than a movement in the name of Gorkhaland?

Thursday might have seen the beginning of

such a movement yet again.



Aadhaar mandatory for PAN cards: SC verdict tomorrow

New Delhi, Jun 8 (PTI): The Supreme Court will pronounce its judgement tomorrow on a batch of petitions challenging the constitutional validity of a provision in the Income Tax Act making Aadhaar mandatory for filing income tax returns and allotment

A bench comprising Justices A K Sikri and Ashok Bhushan had on May 4 reserved the verdict on the pleas, challenging section 139AA of the Income Tax (I-T) Act, which was introduced through the latest budget and the Finance Act, 2017.
Section 139AA of the Income

Tax Act provides for mandatory quoting of Aadhaar or enrolment ID of Aadhaar application form for filing of income tax returns and makng application for allotment of PAN (Permanent Account Number) with

effect from July 1 this year.

While opposing the government's move, the petitioners, including CPI leader Binoy Viswam, have contended before the bench that the Centre cannot "belittle"





the apex court's 2015 order holding the unique identification number as voluntary.

They argued that government should not have enacted section 139AA in the Act to make Aadhaar mandatory for PAN as the apex court's five-judge bench order was clear that Aadhaar was voluntary

and not mandatory.

However, the Centre had contended that Aadhaar was made

mandatory for allotment of PAN to weed out fake cards which were used for terror financing and circulation of black money.

Attorney General Mukul Ro-hatgi had told the bench that the programme of PAN had become suspect as it could be faked, while Aadhaar is a "secure and robust" system by which the identity of an individual could not be faked. Rohatgi had said that with the

implementation of Aadhaar, the government had saved over Rs 50,000 crore on various schemes to benefit the poor as well as pension schemes. The Centre had also told the court that fake PAN cards were being used to "divert funds" to shell companies.

During the hearing, the Su-

preme Court had observed that it was yet to be "tested" whether Aadhaar violated protection of life and personal liberty granted un-der Article 21 of the Constitution, which was pending hearing for an authoritative pronouncement five-judge Constitution Bench.

AHMEDABAD, JUN 8 (PTI): A division bench of the Gujarat High Court which is hearing appeals in the 2002 Naroda Patiya case today visited the crime spot to get a better idea of the incident in which 97 people, mostly Muslims, were killed.

Justices Harsha Devani and A S Supehiya visited Ahmedabad's Naroda Patiya area, where one of the worst incidents of violence during the post-Godhra ri-ots of 2002 took place. The judges spent around two hours at the spot.

In an order yesterday, the bench had said, "Right from the beginning... the learned counsels for the respective parties have been requesting this court to visit the scene of incident so as to get a better idea of the manner in which the incident has occurred and to understand the topography of the area which is spread over

a considerable area.

"Having regard to the evidence which has come n record, the court finds

that the request made by the advocates is reason-

able," it said.

Former Gujarat minister Maya Kodnani and other convicts in the case have filed appeals before the high court.

A special trial court had on August 30, 2012 award-ed life imprisonment to Kodnani and 29 others, and "imprisonment till death" to Babu Bajrangi. Kodnani is also facing a trial in the Naroda Gam riot case.

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Do we really need more exams?

Every student, from the farthest corner of his/her heart (and mind) believes that 'the more the merrier' is a phrase that will never apply to examinations. Sadly, the phrase is coming to life with the recent announcement of primary and middle school board examinations in schools affiliated to the Council for the Indian School Certificate Examinations.

These examinations are not new to the country, you can ask your parents about them. They were removed by the Congress government back in 2010 when they revamped the education policy. Ever since it has been revoked, educators have not been at peace as there have been repeated appeals by the Central Advisory Board of Education to bring these examinations back. If not the government, Gerry Arathoon (CEO, CISCE) has definitely answered their prayers stating that ICSE will conduct examinations for students of the 5th and 8th standard starting 2018. "It will be just a periodical evaluation exercise to get an idea on the progress of the students' learning after a particular level," the CEO said.

As an afterthought he also added that there will be no "pass-fail tags". If there are no pass or fail tags Sir, then



where is the evaluation? Maybe what he meant to say is that they will not carry the burden of being a board exam. But let's face it, that is inevitable. Technically even the class 10 exams are supposed to be mere evaluation because at the end of the day they do not decide much but we still have students running from their homes and committing suicide after bad results. What I mean to say is that any competitive exam and especially a board exam gives an opportunity to the society to turn into the beast that it is. This beast is merciless. It feeds on the prestige that good marks bring and preys on the embar-

rassment that bad marks carry. Mostly, these exams become more about the image of the family than the perforce of a student and that's just how it is. Everyone conveniently forgets the amount of unnecessary pressure that a child has to face every time they have a board exam. We have proof that a 15 or an 18 year old cannot handle this pressure. Why are we then willing to subject mere 9 year olds to this? Whoever said that writing a board exam makes it easier to write the next has clearly never written a board exam because in the second exam, in addition to the initial ing these exams as practice for the 10th

and 12th exams is baseless.

Another issue that came to my mind when I heard about this was that now, all schools under the ICSE will have to follow the same syllabus. This can be good because then all students across the country will be learning the same thing but it also introduces a sort of rigidity at the primary school level. It denies the freedom of a school to decide its own curriculum. When teachers prepare their own curriculum it becomes easier for them to evaluate their students.

Dictating what every student should know at every age is restricting because it discourages the school or the students from breaking boundaries and learning more. In fact, growing children should have to face no such barrier as collabor. You could ear they always the students of the st a syllabus. You could say that nobody is stopping a student from studying beyond the prescribed syllabus but human beings operate on incentives. If you tell a student that the syllabus is the only thing that they are required to know, how many do you think would go

We all know that the whole year leading up to the 10th and 12th stan-dard examinations is spent studying for these examinations. Now imagine having to do that for four years!

The programme started with a rally held by students of Govern-ment Senior Secondary School, Singtam, with banners and placards displaying messages and safety precautions during times of natural calamities.



Farmer unrests follow from a long process of sidelining

When seventy per cent of the population, that W majority living in rural Sikkim which registers agriculture as its profession, is extended less than 3% of the loans advanced by banks in Sikkim, one knows that an inexcusable denial is afoot. As per stipulations governing banking practices in the country, loans to the agriculture sector should constitute at least 18% of the total advances released by banks. In Sikkim, this figure stands at a dismal 2.90% as of 31 March 2016 as per data featured in the 39th State Level Banker's Committee. It would have been all well if the under-performance by banks was because farmers in Sikkim were so well off that they did not need loans to improve the productivity of their farms. But that is obviously not the case. Public sector banks achieved only 37.90% of the target they set up for themselves for agriculture sector loans. But wait, the figure gets even more dismal when one realizes that although 37.9% of the targeted loans were disbursed, these covered only 13.1% of total beneficiaries they had aimed to cover. One cannot understand this hesitation when one also notices that recovery for agricultural loans was at a handsome 63.5% for Sikkim against the dismal 14.9% for loans to industry. If agriculture receives the right boost in the form of adequate loan support, rural Sikkim will prosper. That much any one can figure out. But what

confounds is why that is not happening.

Of course, the situation of fewer new generation hands taking up the proverbial plough is not unique to Sikkim. Census 2011 informs us that 42% of the nation's farmers would, if given the choice, quit agriculture. It is into this frame that Sikkim's situation needs to be viewed. There might not be desperate poverty among the farmers in Sikkim, but the sector has obviously plateaued out and is now on the de-cline which is why fewer families have the new generation tilling the fields. This is not to suggest that the children of farmers should remain farmers, but is an argument to highlight that dignity needs to be brought back to the sector and more youngsters allowed the chance to leverage their wider exposure, keener scientific temperament and higher ambitions to revolutionise agriculture in Sikkim.

The State Government, to its credit, has undertak-

en the right policy decision by pursuing the Organic Sikkim mission and identifying horticulture and floriculture as thrust areas for the rural economy. Organic Sikkim, even as it strives to resuscitate agriculture to its original, un-poisoned by pesticides roots in Sikkim, also capitalizes on a growing respect for organic products in the world market. But it will take more than awareness workshops by "service providers" to deliver the real results. Such a turnaround can begin if capital formation in agriculture and allied sectors is accelerated. Sikkim has the benefit of being in a situation where agriculture loans are required not for sustenance but to propel the sector to a new level of prosperity. The investment is required because as per the Agriculture Census of 2010-11, 77% of the farmers in Sikkim fall in the small and marginal category, working on average farm sizes of 0.64 hectares. The general consensus on the minimum size of farmland to allow a farmer the space to "do well" is at least one hectare. Hence, for farmers to prosper, or even remain relevant, they will need to invest in their small landholdings and improve productivi-ty through better irrigation, improved seeds, wider diversification and adding sources of livelihood like poultry and animal husbandry. This should ideally come through agriculture loans.

To draw a positive from even the current status of poor banking support for agriculture, this situation allows Sikkim the benefit of learning from the horrors of farmer indebtedness which has torn through wide swathes of farmlands across the country. If the policy-makers decide that banking support for agriculture should be expanded, they should first ensure that fiscal prudence and financial planning is instilled in rural Sikkim. Urban Sikkim already has a very poor track-record of loan repayments, but that spectrum has the cushion of salaries and commerce to tide them over, rural Sikkim is not as privileged, but its resilience is a strong asset to keep the loans safe and serviced if the people are first informed about banking and loan repayment processes.

ISIS attacks in Tehran could plunge the Middle East into greater turmoil

ran experienced its first major ISIS attack on June 7, as armed men and suicide bombers targeted two symbols of the Islamic Republic in Tehran: Avatollah Ruhollah Khomeini's mausoleum and the Iranian parliament. At least 12 people are reported to have been killed and 42 wounded.

The Iranian Revolutionary Guards (IRGC), the most powerful force in the country, accused Saudi Arabia for the attacks, saying, "This terrorist attack happened only a week after the meeting between the U.S. president (Donald Trump) and the (Saudi) backward leaders who support terrorists. The fact that Islamic State has claimed responsibility proves that they were involved in the brutal attack," as quoted by Reuters.

IRGC deputy command-er Brigadier General Hossein Salami promised "revenge for today's attacks in Tehran, on terrorists, their affiliates and their supporters".

The attack actually took place two weeks after US President Donald Trump's visit to Saudi Arabia. Trump was given a lavish welcome by King Salman bin Abdulaziz Al Saud, despite his claim during the 2016 US presidential campaign that the Saudis had ties to 9/11, "kill women" and "push gays off buildings".

The two nations bonded over an anti-Iran alliance during the visit, irking Tehran. Trump and the House of Saud also signed an arms agree-ment worth over US\$100 bil-

lion, and discussed Saudi investments in the US. though the deals have not been finalised

TARGETING IRAN

In a speech to the Arab leaders in Saudi Arabia on May 21, Trump pinpointed Iran as the main party responsible for terrorism in the region. This was a departure from the positions of the previous US administration, including those of former US secretary of state Hilary Clinton, which was revealed in leaked emails.

an interview with The Atlantic magazine in April 2016, former US president Barack Obama even said that Saudi Arabia should "share" the Middle East with Iran.

Trump's Middle East trip coincided with the

May 19 Iranian presidential election and compli-cated the reelection bid of President Hassan Rouhani, a pragmatist reformer, against conservative cleric Ebrahim Raisi.

Young people in Iran danced in the streets

when Rouhani won, even as in Riyadh Trump was sword-dancing with Saudi strongmen and promot-ing an anti-Iranian message.

The Iranian response to Trump's trip was predictably strong. The Supreme Leader condemned

both Trump and the Saudis, calling their arms deal a "multi-billion dollar bribe to America" that can-not help the Saudis reach their regional objectives.

He also highlighted the hypocrisy of the Trump administration in ignoring Iran's democratic elec-tion to side with the leaders of a "tribal and backward country".

President Rouhani's response to Trump's Saudi gambit was similar, though softer - and more sarcastic - in tone. He mocked the trip as "just a show with no practical and political value" and argued that real strength comes not from arms but ballot boxes, which, he says, "the poor Saudis have never

REGIONAL IMPLICATIONS

Public displays of US-Iran hostility aside, the main facts, actors and challenges in the region remain the same. The US and Iran are backing the same

The connections between the US, Iran and Arab countries also explain why the Russians exhibited such a calm attitude towards Trump's trip. Russia has invested in the region, and is on Iran's side in terms both of Syria and fighting terrorism.

China has energy security, (geo-)economics and counterterrorism interests in the Middle East, and is also tilting toward Iran in those areas. Turkey, a NATO ally, has serious disagreements

OTHER ACTORS

with US policy in Syria, especially over the Kurdish question and is working on Syria with Iran and Russia. Pakistan is a tough nut to crack for all actors involved, including the US, Iran, and Saudi Arabia. These regional and global actors' interests cannot be dismissed by a meeting between Trump and the Saudis.

IRAN'S PROSPECTS

Shia connections have made Iran very influential in Iraq, Lebanon and Syria, where the country supports the Syrian government by deploying forces on the ground.

Iran also has plans for its other neighbours. It is developing infrastructure with Central Asian countries, such as railways and roads connecting with Azerbaijan. Further, Iran plays an indispensable role in the region for the Chinese New Silk Road initiative.

As for the West, Rouhani's re-election has sent a strong signal. Most EU countries leaders have congratulated him. And, as multilateral sanctions on Iran were lifted after the 2015 nuclear deal, Rou hani's recent victory was also welcomed by global financial markets.

The question now is not so much about Trump's statements and displays of affection to the House of Saud or the continuation of past arms deals. Rather, analysts must understand how Iran will play its regional and global cards. How will Iran make use of the tensions within

the Arab anti-Iran alliance such as the recent Qatar-Saudi rift?

Will Iran downplay the ISIS attack, as the re-action of its Parliamentary Chairman Ali Larijani seemed to indicate? Or will the event increase regional tensions between Saudi Arabia and Iran as IRGC has promised?

The Saudi minister of defence recently issued a not-very-thinly-veiled threat against Iran, saying, "We will work so that the battle is for them in Iran". If anything, the recent ISIS attack may elevate the Iranian-Saudi rivalry to a new level.

governments in Afghanistan and Iraq, which are, respectively, accusing the Pakistani and Saudi regimes (two American allies) of supporting terrorism and unrest in their countries

The countries are also both fighting against ISIS in Iraq in a tacit agreement about their shared interest in destroying the group. The latter has now responded with a direct attack on Tehran. But that violence is likely to harden Iranian resolve for fighting ISIS.

Neither the US nor Saudi Arabia are likely to get a major strategic advantage from Trump's recent trip, and the agreements signed with the Saudis cannot benefit the US without the country paying a high price for siding with hardline Saudi strong-

men and their intolerant version of Islam.

The US could also potentially become immersed in the region once more, going against Obama's pivot to Asia, for the same reasons it has previously become stuck in Iraq and Afghanistan. Trump needs Arab countries' support to counter Iran, fight terrorism, and address the Israeli-Palestinian conflict. But the same contradictions and challenges that have beset US policies in relation to

Why journalists should engage with their readers: a view from Slovakia

What happens when journalists join in the discussion in the often-frightening comments section below their articles? That's one of the questions I sought to answer in my book, Discussing the News: the un-easy alliance of participatory journalists and the critical public, published earlier this year.

In traditional newspaper culture,

journalists do not often engage with their readers. So, as a researcher I jumped at the chance of witnessing an attempt to foster a more conver-sational relationship between jour-nalists and the public at the newly-founded Slovak daily, Denník N.

The newspaper is based in the Slovakian capital Bratislava. It was set up by the senior editors of Slovakia's second-most read daily, SME, who walked out in protest in September 2014 when a financial group suspected of political influence and corruption acquired a 50% stake in

the newspaper.

Half the newsroom followed them into a new venture, which was initially only online. In January 2015, they launched a print edition five days a week.

PARTICIPATION AND

EDITORIAL INDEPENDENCE
As an antidote to the rise of media oligarchs in Central Europe, Denník N relies on a subscription-based business model. It views this approach as a condition for editorial independence and sees it as a promising strategy in Slovakia, where internet penetration rate is of 85% and the press is free.

In this country of over 5 million people, readers are above-average news consumers. According to a 2015 poll conducted for my research about 72% of respondents were active participants in news dissemination, both via social networks and on newspaper websites. What's more, according to the 2016 Digital News Report, Slovakia is the leading EU nation for commenting on news websites.

By building a strong relationship

with its audience, Denník N sought to offset the chronic dependence of media organisations on institutional or private shareholders with potentially conflicting interests. Participation was a natural extension of this philosophy as it encourages readers to subscribe and make the media more independent.

The newspaper encouraged its journalists not just to read the comments on their articles but to respond to them. And, to varying degrees, they did.

JOURNALISTS REPLY

ON JOURNALISM

In analysing these exchanges and talking to journalists, I discovered that there were certain comment types that journalists significantly over- or under-selected for reply.

They had a strong preference for comments about journalism. Readers commenting on editorial choices – misalism. Readers takes, headlines, accusations of bias -

rather than on the theme of an article

were more likely to get a response.

The journalists' responses drew on a stable repertoire of argumentative forms. Basically, when they engaged – beyond simple acknowledgements and thanks – they resorted either to process or to authority arguments. These, as Andrew Abbott describes in his book The System of Professions, are strategies of professional legitimisation.

In the screenshot above, a reporter thanks a reader for spotting a typo before explaining that the report was published "two minutes after the President's official state-ment arrived". This reference to the time pressure that online newspapers work under when dealing with breaking news highlights that they ometimes sacrifice orthographic precision for speed.

This is what's called a process argument, in that the author provides an insight into the conditions of production of an article. The logic is that if people have a better understanding of a process they might be more understanding of the results.

The second type of justification is the authority argument. In commenting on their own pieces, journalists would, wherever possible efface their own voice and defer to other, more credible authorities. They might quote in greater depth one of the sources of their article, link to an official report, scientific article or statistical database, or cite a public opinion poll in order to back up the facts or interpretations outlined in the piece.

In both process and authority arguments, Slovak journalists used the discussion as an accountability instrument, acting almost in the manner of

readers' editors or ombudsmen. POLEMIC CONVERSATIONS

Occasionally, they took a different track. Some writers crossed the line of neutrality and distance that journalists usually keep, and digressed from facts to interpretations. They took up or threw down polemical

gauntlets and got into arguments.

The three who did so most frequently had different backgrounds and beats: one was a commentator writing mostly on economic issues; another was a young reporter on the foreign news desk covering controversial topics such as gay rights and the refugee crisis; and the third was a correspondent writing long-form reportage and interviews

When faced with criticism, some bluntly told commenters that they were wrong, or ridiculed their assertion by calling it "laughable". Doing this risks inflaming the discussion, but they sensed this kind of reply was in keeping with the spirit of online discussions: animated verbal conflict is acceptable there.

The same goes in many well-estab-lished media genres: heated debates, as television and radio reporters have

long known, make for very good viewing and listening.

Denník N's "polemi-cising" journalists took on a distinct "discursive identity" in their com-ments, a style they would never indulge as newspaper reporters (un-less they were writing opinion pieces). In other words, they recognised the characteristics of a genre and adapted their discourse accord-

Just as I'm using a genre-specific form of writing in this article (which differs from the style of my book, though it's still based on or derived from it), I witnessed astute journalists at Denník N treating discussions as a distinct genre, one that is only now emerging. It challenges them to learn to talk credibly in poorly scripted situations, ones

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that journalism school doesn't really touch.
As journalists must now juggle

several digital channels of communication – both to retain relevance with an online audience (for marketing purposes) and to explore new forms of dialogue between information-producers and information-consumers (from a democratic perspective) – this is an increasingly important skill.

NOT COMMENTERS:

CONTRIBUTORS
According to French philosopher Joëlle Zask, participation is con-tributory if each participant in a situation retains the possibility of making and claiming a difference through their intervention. The contributor is thus valued for his or her singularity.

So here's a modest proposal: let's call a person who discusses the news a "contributor", instead of using less dignified terms such as commenter or user.

The term is a useful boundary

object; it allows journalists and their increasingly critical publics to meet on neutral ground without equalising their status. By encouraging journalists to consider their "below-the-line"

critics as contributors, we can challenge them to think of their own published texts as provisional accounts, always open to outside additions, clarifications, objections and corrections.

But by asking journalists to think of themselves as contributors

when they engage with a critical online audience in comments or on social media, we give them a sort of professional shield. They can more easily value the time they spend in the dialogue, while still treating it as different from and subsidiary to their main role as writer, safe in the knowledge that they are not tacitly

endorsing the claim that we are all journalists now.

And if we agree that these contributors – both readers and journalists – can constructively exchange, clicking on the comment button becomes a much less fright-

Pedestrian bowling performance
from defending at the second seco from defending champions India saw them slump to an unex-pected seven-wicket defeat against Sri Lanka in a high-scoring ICC Champions Trophy Group B contest here today.

Riding on Shikhar Dhawan s

125 and half-centuries from Rohit Sharma and Mahendra Singh Dhoni. India piled up a 321 for 6 only to be stunned by unfancied Lank-an batting line-up that produced a splendid batting show to knock off

the runs in 48.4 overs.

Danushka Gunathilaka (76 off 72 balls) and Kusal Mendis (89 off 93) added 159 runs to lay the platform before skipper Angelo Mathews (52 no off 44 balls) coolly finished off the job in company of Kusal Janith Perera (47 retired hurt) and Asela Gunaratne (34 no off 21 balls).

Arguably, the biggest upset of the tournament also threw the group wide open with all four teams India, Pakistan, South Africa and Sri

Lanka in with a chance to qualify.
India now must beat South rica on Sunday in order to qualify

for the semifinals.

For India, the 103 runs conceded by Hardik Pandya (51 off 7 overs) and Ravindra Jadeja (52 off 6 overs) in 13 overs tilted the game decisively in favour of Lankans on what was a batting belter where a target of 322 looked par for the

Call it complacency or unable



to gauge the strength of unknown entity, the Indian bowling lacked the required discipline as Gu-nathilaka and Mendis rolled back the years giving a glimpse of the Lankan sides of mid and late 90 s. They were hardly bothered by

any bowler during their 159 run

stand. Left-hander Gunathilaka especially was severe first up, hitting seven fours and two sixes. The first one was using Umesh yadav s extra pace to pull it behind square while the next was another pull in-front of square when Hardik erred in

length.

What hurt India during the phase was poor show from Jadeja, whose first six overs cost 52 runs including seven fours and a six.

Mendis was severe on him as he bowled short and also didn t have any help from pitch made life

With regular bowlers failing to do the job, captain Kohli brought himself and Kedar Jadhav. But Gunathilaka was run-out more so be-cause of Mahendra Singh Dhoni s quicksilver reflexes.

India created further inroads when the other set batsman Mendis was run-out, courtesy brilliant pick up and throw off his own bowling by Bhuvneshwar Kumar.

But skipper Mathews and Perera added 75 runs in 10.2 overs to ensure that islanders don t lose

However Perera had to retire suffering cramps with Gunaratne joining his skipper with 51 runs required in a little over seven overs. The youngster then chanced his arms against Bumrah and Yadav to finish the game much to delight of Sri Lankan fans.

Earlier Dhawan continued his love affair with the Champions Trophy with yet another elegant hundred, guiding India to an imposing 321 for 6 after being put

Dhawan smashed his way to a 10th career ODI hundred, and added 138 for the opening stand with Rohit Sharma, who cruised his way to a languid 78 off 79 balls.

The final flourish was provid-

ed by none other than Mahendra Singh Dhoni with a quickfire 63 off

This was Dhawan s third hundred in Champions Trophy, having scored a couple during last edition. His entertaining innings comprised 15 fours and a six.

He got an able ally in Dhoni,

who got an ideal platform coming in to bat in the 34th over. The fourth wicket stand produced 82 runs in 10.4 overs.

The former captain used all his experience, hitting seven fours and two sixes on way to reaching his 62nd ODI half- century. Jadhav s (25 of 13 balls) cameo was icing on the cake.

Mathews wanted his bowlers to make first use of the wicket but the pace trio of Lasith Malinga (2/70 in 10 overs), Suranga Lakmal (1/72 in 10 overs) and Nuwan Pradeep (1/73 in 10 overs) most of the times bowled short of length only to be pulled time and again by the Indian batsmen.

Worse, they were again behind the stipulated over-rate.

The best part about Dhawan s innings was the sheer effortlessness with which he shifted gears. He started on an attacking note only to drop anchor when Rohit upped the ante before another round of attractive strokeplay after the loss of Virat Kohli (0) and Yuvraj Singh (7) in quick succession.

For Rohit, the 91 on comeback against Pakistan had given him enough confidence to caress the very first delivery of the match bowled by Malinga to wide off

Dhawan in the very next over played an imperious cut shot off Lakmal. He followed it up with a cover drive off Malinga s bowling but it was a cautious start during those first five overs that yielded

While the runs didn t come at a quick clip but there was no incisive quality in Lankan attack that could have troubled the openers.

Malinga, who is nearing the end of his ODI career, lacked bite in his bowling. The openers didn t take chances against the slinger but also weren t in any kind of trouble.

Their understanding was there to be seen. When Rohit was playing himself in, Dhawan attacked the bowlers but once the Mumbaikar got a hang of the track, the southpaw quietly slipped playing the role of a second fiddle.

By the 10th over, the Lankan bowling started losing its grip and by the 20th over, it lay in complete tatters with Mathews lacking a plan B to stop the duo from scoring

freely.

The 100 came up in the 20th over their second century stand in successive overs.



Media could act as countervailing power in democracy: Aveek Sarkar

BEIJING, JUN 8 (PTI):

China's iconic lea Mao Zedong's famous quote of "let a hundred flowers bloom" could also be applied to the media in a democracy where it could act as a countervailing power. Vice Chairman and Editor Emeritus of the ABP Group Aveek Sarkar said today

"Nobody explained about fake news better than former Chairman Mao Zedong of China, who said 'let a hundred flowers bloom'. The idea of media in a democracy is that hundred ideas Sarkar speaking at the BRICS Media Forum being hosted by China's state-run Xinhua news agency.

About fake news, he said, "It is possible to make a professional

mistake but fake news is something somebody consciously does for ulterior purposes."

'What does Mao's message mean. In India, as elsewhere, the media belongs to the civil so-ciety. By civil society we mean something which has nothing to do with the government," said Sarkar, who is also the

Director of PTI.

"It is not news which is omnipotent. It is the state which is omnipo-tent. The media in a society like India is a counterfoil to the state. As the state becomes more powerful and assumes more and more authority, the media is the countervailing power and the ju-diciary is another countervailing power.

"These are the countervailing powers to the society. So each institution assumes power to countervail each other," he said.

"When one wing gets stronger, the other wing also gets stronger. When we speak about cooperation, we have a problem," Sarkar said.

He also said that the problem of providing a counterbalance to international media is difficult because people trust New York Times (NYT) more.

People trust an NYT report rather than a re-port in the Indian media, Sarkar said. "I am sure this is true

for everybody else. NYT has earned the reputation by trying to wield countervailing power," he Today it is the effec

tive voice against Donald Trump. NYT also was effective in opposing the

America's involvement in the rules for a more repthe Vietnam war. So, it po-sitioned itself away from the state and positioned itself as a correction to the state, Sarkar said.

This being the case, while media is state-owned in some countries and part of the civil society in countries like In-dia, "there could be a theoretical difference in cost purpose at least the way we look at things, he said.

Editor of The Hindu Mukund Padmanabhan, who took part in the BRICS Media Forum. highlighted the theme of a BRICS-driven alternative media, saying that the international system which is undergoing a profound transforma-tion, presented BRICS countries a serious opportunity for making a contribution to writing resentative and a more inclusive global order.

He said the BRICS media should evolve a new revenue model in tune with the explosion of the digital media without com-promising the basic values of quality journalism.

Media has a "duty and social responsibility" to ensure that "traditional values such as accuracy, fairness, truth, are not forsaken in the interests of speed, sensationalism, and more eyeballs", he said.

BRICS media must innovate, across multimedia platforms, in order "to remain unique and relevant so that people are willing to pay for what is produced rather than let some platform such as Google, Facebook or Twitter exploit its commercial value", Pad-

"The BRICS and the emerging economies could well be at the forefront of a new wave of industrialisation driven by the concept of sustainable globalisation, which is being currently abandoned by many, especially in the West," he said.

Despite diversity, the media in BRICS countries

can cooperate, specially the media of India and China. There is information and perception defi-cit between the two countries. Padmanabhan said.

Accusing President Donald Trump of defaming him with defaming him with "lies", fired FBI director James Comey today said it was "very disturbing" that he asked him to stop probing the Russia links of one of his top aide, prompting the White House to assert that "the president is not a liar".

During almost three hours of his explosive testimony to a Senate panel. Comey said he saw Trump's request to stop investigating the alleged ties of his former nation al security adviser Mi-chael Flynn as an "order".

Comey said the president asked him for "loyalty" during a White House dinner and to lay off Flynn -- who is under criminal investigation -imploring Comey to "let

Asked whether he considered Trump's request to drop the investigation of Flynn, Comey said, "I don't think it's for me to say whether the conversation I had with the president was an effort to obstruct. I took it as a very disturbing

thing, very concerning."

The 56-year-old former FBI chief told the committee that he per-ceived Trump's comments over Flynn as an

But the White House hit back angrily at Comey.

"I can definitely say the president is not a liar and frankly am insulted by that question," said White House spokes-woman Sarah Sanders.

Asked about a dinner he had with Trump on January 27 - just days after his inauguration, Comey said the US president was trying to establish a "patronage rela-

tablish a patronage relationship."

Describing that dinner, he said, "My common sense told me that what was going on is, either he thought or someone told him, 'you have already asked Comey to stay, and you did not get anything for it.' And the dinner was an attempt to build

"What the president whispered in my ear was. I really look forward to working with you...I'm three times we've already talked about me staying. My common sense told me, he's looking to get something in exchange..

Comey said.

It took place less than 24 hours after a knife and vehi-cle attack killed at least eight people at London Bridge, the second major incident to hit the UK in as many weeks. Enhanced security was added in response to the potential threat, but organisers pressed defiance in the face

"The only thing we can do now is choose how we let this affect us and how we live our lives from here on out," Grande said in a statement on Twitter.

"Music is meant to heal us, to bring us together, to make us happy. So that is what it will continue to do for us."Grande's single One More Time was also re-released

following the attack, with some of the proceeds going towards the Red Cross Fund. It is currently in the running for the number one spot in the UK singles chart.
