Letter not even processed when WB Police began extra judicial action, Sikkim Police clarifies

GANGTOK, 03 SEPT:
Sikkim Police today confirmed that
the Siliguri unit of the West Bengal
Police's CID wing had submitted a letter
to SP (South) on 01 September seeking assistance in the arrest of three "fugitives" from Darjeeling wanted in cases there and believed to be in hiding in South Sikkim. Sikkim Police has also explained that while such a request was made by only one agency (Siliguri CID), as many as three groups of Bengal Police were active inside Sikkim on the day and carrying out activities for which they had neither received "assistance" of Sikkim Police nor had sanction under any tenet of the law or due

ocess. ADGP Sudhakar Rao, who is also

the spokesperson for Sikkim Police, made these clarifications this evening after media reports referred to a letter from Siliguri CID to SP (South), Sikkim Police, informing his office of their proposed raids. Quoting sources, these media reports suggested that Sikkim Police was always in the know of things (about Bengal police raids inside Sikkim) but was pretending that no infor-mation was shared at the Bengal Police had gone rogue in Sikkim.

It may be recalled that Sikkim Po-lice had confronted Bengal Police teams when they carried out raids and made arrests in Namchi on 01 September. A meeting of Gorkha Janmukti Morcha central executive committee members was held in Namchi on the day. The ar-rested people include two Sikkimese

and all were taken away from Bengal police when they could not present any documents to warrant either the raids or the arrests.

During the day, one team led by the Kalimpong SP was also allegedly involved in a fatal shooting on a public road in Sikkim.

Addressing media-persons here today, ADGP Rao clarified that to begin with, the letter presented by the Siliguri CID to SP South did not carry any specifics and did not attach any supporting

Further, even as the SP [South] was studying the request and before he had taken any decision on the request, a second team of West Bengal police personnel under the Darjeeling SP had already started raiding and arresting people inside Sikkim near Namchi.

Sikkim Police had not been ade-quately briefed about this second team in the vicinity. The Siliguri CID team was reportedly at the Namchi Police Station at the time when the Darjeeling team had begun operations, without permission or any authorization, the ADGP highlighted.

The manner in which the West Bengal police team acted was wrong, the ADGP reiterated today.

Even as Sikkim Police was dealing with this twin situation, a third team of Bengal Police, this one led by the Kalimpong SP had entered Sikkim "as tourists wishing to visit Rabongla" but had detoured towards Sadam in South Sikkim and were moving up towards Namchi.

Sitharaman is India's first full-time woman Defence Min

NEW DELHI, SEP 3 (PTI): In a big promotion, Nirmala Sitharaman today became the first woman to become a full-time Defence Minister of the country as she faced the challenge of speeding up modernisation of the three forces in her new

58-year-old raman, a Rajya Sabha member, is the second woman to take charge of the crucial ministry as Indira Gandhi, as the Prime Minister, had also held the portfolio in the

seventies.

Her elevation is seen as reward for her good work as the Commerce Minister. Finance Minister Arun Iaitlev was handling the Defence Ministry after Manohar Parrikar quit to become the Goa's chief minister in March.

Sitharaman will now be a member of the cru-cial Cabinet Committee on Security whose mem-bers include the prime minister, home minister, external affairs minister and the finance minister.

"Somebody who has come from a small town, grown into the party with all the support of the leadership, and if given such responsibili-ty, it just makes you feel sometimes that cosmic grace is there. Otherwise, it is impossible," she told

Sitharaman said she was just overwhelmed

and humbled.
"I am sure, now that I have an extremely competent successor in Nir-mala Sitharaman, she will carry the road forward," Jaitley said con-gratulating Sitharaman.

One of the BIP's chief spokespersons before its ascent to power, Sitharaman is an alumna of the prestigious Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU).

As the Defence Minister, Sitharaman will face several challenges, including strengthening of the combat capabilities of the



Army, Navy and the Air Force due to changing regional security matrix and geo-political dynamics.

Defence experts feel

the frequency of incidents of incursions by the Chinese Army may go up in the coming months and years after the Dokalam face-off, and Sitharaman may face a challenge in handling such complex issues.

The government has

been focusing on domes-tic defence production and Sitharaman will have to carry forward a number of big-ticket reform initiatives, including implementing the ambitious "strategic partner-ship" model with several countries like the United

States and Russia.
Under the new model, select Indian private firms will be roped in to build military platforms like submarines and fighter jets in India in partnership with foreign

defence majors.

On August 30, the government had announced major reforms in the Indian Army to enhance its combat capability which will include redeployment of nearly 57,000 officers and other ranks. She will have to play a key role in implementing this initiative.

Sitharaman also faces the challenge of modernising the defence research organisations and various other defence public sec-

tor undertakings.

Binay dares Bimal to return to Darjeeling

DARJEELING (WB), SEP 3 (PTI): Expelled GJM leader Binay Tamag to-day alleged that he was receiving death threats and challenged party chief Bimal Gurung to come out of hiding and return to Darjeeling.
Tamang, who assert-

ed that no one has the right to expel him as he is the founding member of the Gorkha Janmukti Party (GJM) party, today wrote a letter to Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh requesting him to find a solution to the Darjeeling crisis.

"I am receiving death threats for the last few days. I feel that I too will meet the same fate as Madan Tamang who was killed in 2010. Who are Bimal Gurung and Ro-shan Giri to expel me? I am the founding member

of the party.
"It is very easy to give lecture by hiding in some place. If Bimal Gurung and Roshan Giri have the guts, let them come back to the hills," Tamang said in a press conference.

Tamang alleged GJM general secretary Roshan Giri is misleading Gurung in order to serve his own vested interests.

"They accused me of Playing into the hands of state government. But now they too have agreed to sit for talks with the state government on September 12. Then what wrong did I do? Before announcing

Body of GJM supporter shot in Sikkim by Bengal cops brought home

KALIMPONG, 03 SEPT:

Residents of Kalimpong turned out in large numbers today to pay their final respects to Dawa Bhutia, the Pedong youth shot dead in Sikkim on 01 Sept, allegedly by a West Bengal police team led by the Kalimpong SP.

The gathering of people turned into a protest rally as the funeral procession arrived in town and people started raising slogans condemning WB police atrocities and the hostile environment that had been created in the region by their overbearing and extra-judicial conduct.

The dead body of Dawa Bhutia, hailed as a martyr for the

Kalimpong at around 1:30 p.m.
People raised slogans condemning the actions of Kalimpong Superintendent of Police, Ajit Singh Yadav, as the dead body was escorted into town.

Dawa Bhutia, as per an FIR registered by Sikkim Police at Namchi in South Sikkim, was shot dead by a posse of West Bengal cops led by the Ka-limpong SP along the Bhanjhyang-Sadam road near Namchi in South Sikkim on Friday.

He was reportedly in Namchi to attend the Gorkha Jan-mukti Morcha central executive committee meeting called and chaired by GJM president Bimal Gurung in Namchi. Three teams of West Bengal cops, one each from Kalimpong, Darjeeling and Siliguri, were also in Namchi on the day and carried out botched raids and the fatal shooting.

The deceased was report edly returning from Namchi, when, at the Bhanjhyang-Sadam stretch, they crossed the Kalimpong SP and his team. Someone from that group opened fire and fatally injured Dawa Bhutia who was declared brought dead when he was rushed to the Namchi Hospital by his friend.

Meanwhile, today, the Kalimpong district president of the GJM, Dr RB Bhujel, acknowledged Sikkim Government and

South Sikkim Police Administration for the manner in which they handled the situation on Friday and for how they foiled the extra-judicial activities of Bengal police inside Sikkim.

"We are very thankful to the

Sikkim government and Sikkim Police for their gesture; they have helped us at a time when we need ed help the most," said Dr Bhuiel.

Sikkim Police has registered a murder case against the Kalimpong SP and his team, it may be recalled.

Dawa Bhutia's body was

taken to his official residence in Pedong from where the body will be brought to Tirpai here for the funeral.

Flooding in India, Nepal, B'desh affecting 16 mln children: UNICEF

UNITED NATIONS, SEP 3 (PTI): About 16 million children across India, Bangladesh and Nepal are in urgent need of life-saving support due to "catastrophic" flooding in the three South Asian countries, a UN agency said.

"Millions of children have seen their lives swept away by these devastating floods" said Jean Gough, UNICEF Regional Director for South Asia. "Children have lost their homes schools and even friends and loved ones. There is a danger the worst could still be to come as rains continue and flood waters move south" she

Weeks of torrential monsoon rains and catastrophic flooding in Nepal, India, and Bangladesh have devastated the lives of millions of children and families. UNICEF estimates that almost 16 million children and their families are in urgent need of life-saving support. Since mid-August, there have been at least 1,288 reported deaths, with over 45 yasion people estimated to be affected. Many areas remain in-

accessible due to damage to roads, bridges, railways and airports. The most urgent needs for children are clean water, hygiene supplies to prevent the spread of disease,

food supplies and safe places in evacuation centres for children to play, the UN agency

The United Nations Children's Fund (UNICEF) is on the ground working in close coordination with respective governments and humanitarian partners from three countries to scale up its responses and respond to immediate needs of affected children and their families.

"Massive damage to school infrastructure and supplies also mean hundreds of thousands of children may miss weeks or months of school" said Gough. "Getting children back into school is absolutely critical in establishing a sense of stability for children during times of crisis and provides a sense of normality when everything else is being turned upside down."

In India four states in the northern part of the country have been extensively affected by the flooding, affecting over 31 million people including 12.33 million children. Some 805,183 houses are either partially or fully damaged and 15,455 schools have been damaged, disrupting the education of nearly one million students. Further heavy rains in Mumbai resulted in at least five deaths by drowning and three people including two children died due to house

collapse.

In the affected states in India the state governments, following rescue operations, are conducting relief, rehabilitation and recovery oper-ations. UNICEF, at the request of the state governments, is providing multi-sectoral planning and coordination support in the three worst affected states of Assam, Bihar and Uttar Pradesh. Over 9.8 million people in Bihar have been reached with lifesaving information on topics such as safe drinking water and handwashing, UNICEF said. In Bangladesh alone, more

than 8 million people have

been affected by flooding, including around 3 million dren. An estimated 696,169 houses have been damaged or destroyed and 2,292 primary and community schools have been damaged by high water. There have already been more than 13,035 cases of water-borne diseases in the country.

In Nepal, 1.7 million peo-

ple, including 680,000 children, have been affected with 352,738 displaced from their

More than 185,126 homes have been damaged or destroyed in addition to 1,958 schools, affecting the education of 253,605 children.



Informing is not Authorisation

What WB cops did in Sikkim was wrong

The misadventures of West Bengal cops in Sikkim cannot be defended. And those who think that they can pull out a letter either to suggest that the actions of the Bengal posses in Sikkim were permissible, or to cast aspersions of culpability on Sikkim Police display a sad combination of shallow minds, callow understanding and mischievous opportunism. What the WB police attempted in South Sikkim is not acceptable even in West Bengal because even there they have jurisdiction only for policing, not to shoot people at random or conduct raids without sanction and arrest people without probable cause. They did all of these when they blundered into Sikkim on 01 Sept, misled their counterparts here, put Sikkimese people in harm's way and displayed clear signs of distrust and prejudice which are at the root of all the trouble that the neighbouring State is facing in the Darjeeling Hills.

To begin with, a letter seeking assistance of local police for proposed raids is just that – a letter seeking assistance. Having received such a letter does not mean that assistance will be provided, and even though such courtesies are almost always positively entertained, due processes still need to be followed in the lead-up and after the raids have been carried out. The Bengal cops were clearly on a fishing expedition in Sikkim, wanting to cast a wide net and see what fell in their laps. The fact that they were unprepared is evident in the interim bail secured by the one GJM leader they managed to "arrest" without a warrant in Sikkim. Furthermore, the locals they had also sought to "arrest" would also have been frisked away to West Bengal had Sikkim Police not intervened. Had the Bengal cops managed to take their "prisoners" out of Sikkim unchallenged, they would have shown the arrests as having been made in West Bengal ("along the border with Sikkim"). This is common practice, but pause with it a while see how the story could then have been spun. West Bengal could have then claimed that the Sik-kimese were now directly involved in the Gorkhaland agitation at the planning level and also part of GJM's central executive committee. Given the conspiracy theories the neighbouring state - the establishment as well GJM leaders there - are wont to spin, this episode could have acquired very damaging connotations. But that is not why Sikkim Police stepped up and stood its ground. They clearly did so because what was being attempted was not just unethical, but also illegal.

The encounter on a public road was a clear case of criminal behavior. Their being cops does not absolve them of any blame and even if Sikkim had granted permission for the proposed raids, it would not have been a carte blanche giving them a free run in Sikkim. No cop is authorized to open fire merely on suspicion or just because they want a "fleeing" person or vehicle to stop. What was the provocation? An important looking Scorpio with West Bengal registration plates? Even if all clearances had been taken and the entire operation launched under Sikkim Police watch, opening fire without provocation would have been criminally wrong. What the Kalimpong SP allowed to happen under his watch - it was his posse that fired inexcusable. What is also inexcusable is that he did not inform Sikkim Police about the incident and it was only when the victim was brought to Namchi hospital that the story came out. When Bengal police opens fire on a public road in Sikkim, they put Sikkimese at risk of their trigger-happy ways. The existence of a letter cannot cover up for that.

By keeping Sikkim Police in the dark about details of their plans or "source" information, the West Bengal cops revealed the trust-deficit which is one of the reasons why Darjeeling wants out. They obviously thought that Sikkim, because it has supported Darjeeling's aspiration for statehood, would sabotage the raid and arrest plans. Sikkim Police has shown no reason why its professionalism should be doubted, in fact, with its response to the situation, it has proven to a professional force because it has refused to play favourites by covering up for Khaki excesses. Bengal continued to display such prejudices when one of its Minister's accused Sikkim of helping GJM leaders "flee" but conveniently ignored the fact that his forces had no authorization to even be in Sikkim in the first place. It is only now that a "lookout notice" has been issued against Bimal Gurung, and until that happened, there was no requirement for Sikkim to either arrest

him or keep watch on his movements here.

In conclusion, it is important to realize that informing someone cannot be misrepresented as somehow having received authorization as well. Nothing works that way, not even in a family, and surely not when it comes to inter-state matters or law & order situations.

The Doklam Standoff and Sikkim's **Geo-Political Resurgence**

This monsoon season was not much about the usual rain but more about the flash flood of political issues that hit Sikkim from multiple direction of varying magnitude testing its resilience and commitment and exposing it to new levels of vulnerability. The otherwise unknown, forgotten tiny Sikkim suddenly leaps up making headlines nationally and internationally re-defining the geo-political resurgence of Sikkim in the Indian sub-continent.

Be it the renewed do-or-die peoples movement of the Gorkhaland agitation, the subsequent economic blockade and vandalization of Sikkim registered vehicles in the plains of Siliguri, the massive rally in support of Sikkimese identity on the 20th August at Gangtok, and above all the eyeball to eyeball confrontation and subsequent war rhetoric between the Indian Army and the Peoples Liberation Army of china at the Doklam tri-junction in Sikkim sector, Sikkim came into the eye of the storm and found itself in the vortex of all types of geo-political consequences and the otherwise tranquil and peaceful Sikkim has been rattled, re-inventing itself to adjust and move on in these changing and challenging phase of the Hindi-Chini, bhai-bhai dynamics between India and China

SIKKIM - THE BUFFER STATE

The Indian and Chinese armies last fired at each other 50 years ago in 1967 when the Indian army defended the Nathula sector with heavy artillery bombardment against the Chinese to maintain the border status quo. The present standoff at Doklam, though de-escalated as of now, reminds Sikkim that it stands in the line of fire if at all war breaks out between India and China anytime in the future.

The mainstream of Indian politics has always downplayed Sikkim due to its tiny size and as such Sikkim seems to be lost in its own backvard, but in testing times like these, Sikkim resurrects itself as the frontier state of the Indian union and its geographical location is vital for the overall security of

India.

Sikkim stands as a buffer state shielding the 27km long Chicken's Neck that connects the remaining north-eastern states to the rest of the country and also the Gangetic plains of the Indian

Thus, Sikkim measuring just 7,096 sq kms and occupying 0.21% of the geographical area of India, with a population of 6.10 lakh compensates its tiny size with its important strategic location in the overall security map of the country. The obvious missing link is the non-existence of a reliable in-tegrated communication network to augment and supplement the strategic location of Sikkim in case of any military emergency. New Delhi has failed to assimilate and integrate such a vital ingredient of planning and this can cost us dearly.

DEFICIT IN INFRASTRUCTURE AND COMMUNICATION NETWORK

An assured souvenir that one can take freely from Sikkim is the tiring and painful experience of travel or ride through any stretch of the deplorable condition of the roads in Sikkim, be it the National Highways, District roads and any other road. The suffering will detest any thoughts of visiting Sikkim again, it's such a raw deal. Rubbing salt on the wound are the pharmaceutical companies and hy-droelectric companies, 92 numbers in total, which have mushroomed here since the mid-2000's enjoying an extended tax holiday till 2027. They have further overloaded and jammed the already strained network of the roads in Sikkim. These companies ply heavily loaded trucks, lorries, cargo consignment vehicles and buses in almost all the nooks and corners of Sikkim.

The State Government's failure to first strengthen, widen and improve the network of roads and bridges in Sikkim before establishment of these companies in preparation for the voluminous traffic load and density has choked the traffic flow all over Sikkim. The Government of India on its part should also have intervened and guided the Government of Sikkim set its priori-ties right and foreseen the consequences of such an unplanned policy. As a result, in an emergency situation, such bottlenecks caused by policy paralysis will make the mobility of defence movement through Sikkim sluggish and could even be brought to a grinding halt altogether. Time that some out-of-the-box thinking was done.

Firstly, to reduce travel time and assured right up way on National Highway-10, the lifeline of Sik-kim, between Sevoke in West Bengal and Rangpo in Sikkim, a 55 km long road tunnel with fully in-tegrated control systems has to be constructed like the Chenani-Nashir tunnel in Jammu and Kashmir In the long run, this road tunnel would save fuel cost and travel time and would be an all weather route which would boost trade and tourism as well.

Secondly, at least the standard specifications of a two-lane Highway with an width of 14 meters has to be maintained all along the remaining National highway namely, the Gangtok-Nathula Highway (56.3km), the North Sikkim Highway (174km), the Rangpo-Rongli-Kupup highway (97.4km), National Highway-10 from Rangpo to Gangtok (38.7km) and all the bridges replaced with increased carrying capacity.

The Government of India and Government of Sikkim can press and mobilise the Corporate Social Responsibility funds from these 92 odd pharmaceutical and hydro-power companies to supplement the project cost. These companies otherwise seem non-committal to any social cause in Sikkim and might rise to the requirement of national secu-

Thirdly, the absence of air connectivity to Sikkim further pushes it into absolute remoteness. In contract, in the North East Region there are 16 airports -international, defence and domestic - with Auranachal Pradesh alone having six airports but Sikkim at present just has the under construction Greenfield airport at Pakyong, started in 2009 and hounded by controversies and delays ever since. The other districts and distant areas of Sikkim too need to be connected by air and when Nepal can build the world's most extreme airport at Lukla at an altitude of 9,334feet (2,845 meters) and Bhutan can come up with the Paro airport in a deep valley surrounded by mountains, why can't the remote areas of north, west and south districts of Sikkim also be given air connectivity which otherwise can also be used for defence operations.

MILITARY STRENGTH INSIDE SIKKIM

The military map of India shows three army corps of over 2.5 lakh soldiers deployed to defend the North-East of India and the 17th Infantry Division, North-East of India and the 17th Infantry Division, nicknamed the 'Black Cat' headquartered in Gangtok and our very own - The Sikkim Scouts, the youngest Indian army regiment raised in 2013-15 from amongst Sikkimese youth trained for border defence and mountain warfare specially to face the

Chinese aggression.

The army defence system is a complex logistic layout integrated to the overall network within the entire country. The presence of the Indian (British India befire 1947) army in Sikkim dates back to 1861. Today, along the Nathula sector in East Sikkim and the northern borders one does not see much military modernisation and infrastructure built up and the Sikkim sector is just maintained like a border check post, much like a buffer location between the international borders and the plains

CIVIL DEFENCE STRATEGY... IS SIKKIM PREPARED?

The impact of the 6.8 Richter magnitude of earthquake that hit Sikkim on 18 September 2011 tested all the standard operating procedures (SOP) of the Sikkim State Disaster Management Act 2007, and it was found wanting in many aspects. Lessons learnt, and with the paradigm shift in disaster management and mitigation plans, the remoulded, "the implementation of the Sikkim state disaster management plan 2015- would again be put to test in letter and spirit anytime. However, the Doklam standoff surely signals to Sikkim for a resilient and efficient civil defence strategy to be added to the bylaws of the Sikkim state disaster management authority, since Sikkim stands in the line of fire. As presumed during the onslaught of war and emergency, the civil defence would play a vital role as the local emergency service provider in supporting the defence forces, mobilising and guiding the civilians, supporting and assisting the administration to save lives and properties, reduce casualties, ensure the supply of essential commodities, alert the general public on survival skills, reassure their

Therefore, it is very essential that the civil de-fence corps be raised and trained to protect the Sikkimese general public, thus building confidence reducing fear and uncertainty and ensuring higher survival rate in times of war. Such a civil defence force can be raised and trained through volunteers from the general public of Sikkim for war and emergency works least we don't become sitting ducks.

THE NITI AAYOG - FOR A SIKKIM MASTER PLAN

The Doklam standoff exposed India's imbalance not only in its military preparedness but the inefficiencies of border infrastructure as only 22 of the 73 all-weather roads along the border have been completed a decade after they were sanctioned and 14 strategic railway lines to rush troops and supplies to the border remains paper bound. The Sikkim sector, as mentioned earlier, is very infrastructure and communication deficient not even worthy for civilian requirement.

The NITI Aayog - that aims to create a New India with a 15 year long-term vision, seven year medium term vision and a 3 year action agenda, and lately the NITI Aayog's prioritizing of infrastruc-ture development in the North East of India looks promising and wise. It's time the Aayog integrated Sikkim into the overall master plan of infrastruc-

ture development in this sensitive border state.

The up-gradation and modernization of infrastructure and communication network in Sikkim has to be based on national security priority to up-hold the sovereignty of India, and not based on the usual population demand theory on which Sikkim can never match the other bigger states of India. A big observation in Sikkim since Doklam

standoff started in June is the absence of any central leadership visit to Sikkim, be it the Ministers of the Government of India or any tall central political

leaders. This sent all the wrong messages.

Five things to watch out for at the Chinese **Communist Party congress**

The Chinese Communist Party (CCP) will soon embark on its own "Game of Thrones" as delegates gather for its 19th National Congress in Beijing. A variety of posts will be filled for the next five years – includ-ing the vitally important General Sec-retary of the CCP (President of the People's Republic of China or PRC), as well as members of the Standing Committee (roughly akin to the UK Cabinet). These individuals will find themselves leading a massive organisation, which has more than 80m members, and running what is arguably the world's largest economy.
They will wield considerable powers but the incumbent leader is unlikely to relinquish his grip on power. So what should we look out for?

1. XI JINPING'S AMBITION
Since becoming the party's General Secretary in 2012 (and therefore President of the PRC), Xi Jinping has consolidated his position. At the heart of this has been the anti-corruption drive. To Xi's supporters, this represents the General Secretary's earnest desire to rid the party of im-



pure elements that undermine the party's legitimacy.

In contrast, critics say that this drive is a front to remove opponents and to consolidate his power. Whatever the truth, it is virtually certain (barring illness) that Xi will be re-turned as General Secretary for an-

other five years. In addition, Xi will surely retain his chairmanship of the Central Military Commission - thereby exercising

significant influence over the armed forces. But there are rumours that Xi intends to extend his influence beyond five years. If so, this represents a significant departure from the gradual institutionalisation of Chinese

Since the 1990s, CCP General Secretaries have generally served only two terms (Zhang Zemin was elected in 1992 and 1997 – although he had become General Secretary slightly

earlier in 1989 as part of the Tiananmen re-shuffle - and Hu Jintao was elected in 2002 and 2007). If Xi tries to prolong his influence, this may indicate a return to the more personalised politics of the 1960s, 1970s and 1980s.

2. THE AGE DOUBLE STANDARD

Even if Xi "Da Da" ("Father/Uncle Xi") emerges with enhanced prestige following the 19th congress, a complete return to the Maoist personality cult depicted in propaganda posters of the 1960s and 1970s seems unlikely. The Chinese Communist Party is not monolithic and is comprised of different factions, such as the Shanghai gang, the Communist Youth League and the Princelings. To make matters more complicated, there is also over-lap between these groups. Never-theless, the National Congress – and hence the election of CCP officers – will indicate which groups are ascendant or in retreat.

Who serves on the Standing Committee also matters. It is widely expected that because most of the current Standing Committee are aged in their late 60s, there will be a high

Sex workers to wear chef's cap this Durga Puja

KOLKATA, SEP 3 (PTI): The sex workers of Sonagachi in the city, Asia's largest red light area, would don the chef's cap this Durga Puja at the various food pavilions run by the West Bengal fisheries department.

Durbar Mahila Samanwaya Com-

mittee (DMSC), an NGO which works for the development and uplift of the sex workers of the state, is in talks with the State Fisheries Development Corporation (SFDC) on the project in which sex workers will be trained by the fisheries department.
DMSC has more than 1,30,000 regis

tered sex workers in its fold.

"During Pujas we run about eight food pavilions in various parts of Kol-kata and two in Bangalore. Most of our cooks have been sent to Bangalore. As we need cooks we approached Durbar and they agreed.

We will be training the manpower both in cooking and in fish processing - right from handling a live fish to pack aging a finished product. They will cook for our food pavilions during Pujas," Soumyajit Das, SFDC managing director

Samarjit Jana, an official of Durbar, told PTI that the training of the sex

"The fisheries department had asked us for few women who could help in their kitchens and their fish processing units. We sought the opinion of workers and many of them and their children expressed their desire to work as cooks," he said.

The move was specially welcomed by those who wish to quit the world's oldest profession and their children who want to get rid of the stigma associated with it.

In the first batch a total 30 sex workers will be sent for the training conducted by SFDC, which will organise a workshop for them. They would be trained in cooking various dishes for its food pavilions and cut and process raw fish which are sent to various de-partmental stores across the state.

"As we need people in our processing units where we regularly have to cater to huge orders from various food chains, online grocery shops and super markets. their (sex workers') employment will not be limited to the pujas," Das said.

On remuneration, he said it will de pend on the amount of fish that they will process, scale, cut fillets out of whole fish or dry every day.

er of its membership this autumn Recent convention suggests that if can didates are over 68, they will be retired.

This age restriction does not apply to Xi or Chinese "prime minister" Li Keqiang as both are in their early 60s (and both serve on the Standing Committee). But there are suggestions that Xi's anti-corruption manager, Wang Qishan, may stay on – even though he is 68. If Wang continues on the Standing Committee, this would symbolise Xi's

power.
3. THE POWER OF FORMER LEADERS Another telling development will be the ability of former presidents to anoint future presidents. China's "paramount leader" during the 1980s, Deng Xiaoping, helped ensure that Hu Jinto succeeded Jiang Zemin in 2002. For his part, Jiang was instrumental in Xi's rise to power after Hu in 2012. Given this precedent, one might expect Hu to secure the promotion of one of his protégés to the Standing Committee later this year in the hope that this candidate will succeed Xi in 2022. It remains to be seen if Hu has sufficient clout.

4. THE CHALLENGES AHEAD

On a recent visit to China, I was struck by the pace of change, including high speed trains and the purchasing of goods by mobile phones (not cash). Yet for all these technological developments, there are still significant challenges for China: rural poverty, environmental degradation and the economic turbulence generated by the

'new normal" –China is now transition ing from export-led economic growth to consumer-driven growth.

The Xi-Li administration has sought to tackle these problems as part of the "Chinese Dream" – or national "rejuvenation" – which aspires to attain a "moderately prosperous society". We will see this autumn how far the party judges the Chinese Dream to have been

5. FOREIGN POLICY AND NORTH KOREA

We may also gain insight into China's foreign policy for the next five years. Recently, China's neighbours have been unnerved by territorial disputes in the South China Sea and by the steady advance of the PRC's military. Again, the shuffling of personnel and speeches at the National Congress may indicate where the PRC sees itself going. Will it become a regional or global power? Will China be an economic, military or diplomatic player?

A potential test case is the curre standoff between the US and North Korea. Nobody knows how this situation will develop – in late August, North Korea fired a missile over Japan. But giver the close proximity of the Korean pen-insula to China, one can bet that Beijing will be monitoring the situation closely. One thing is for sure, China's leaders will have a full in-tray when they go back to work

Action over foul-mouthed Fognini too slow, says Nadal

NEW YORK, SEPT 3 (AFP): Rafael Nadal insisted that tennis chiefs were wrong to wait three days before kicking controversial Italian Fabio Fognini out of the US Open for a vile, sexist tirade at a female

The 30-year-old Fognini aimed two ugly misogynistic blasts at umpire Louise En-gzell as he crashed to defeat in a first-round singles match

against fellow Italian Stefano Travaglia on Wednesday. However, Fognini, with compatriot Simone Bolelli, won two rounds of men's doubles on Thursday and Friday before the Grand Slam board defaulted him on Saturday.

Fognini, the world num-ber 26, had already been fined 24,000 for the incident.

Tennis chiefs explained the delay in making a decision on a possible suspension on having to wait for a transsation of the player's brief remarks.



"It takes four days for that translation? I don't think so. Easy to find," said world num-ber one Nadal after making the fourth round on Saturday.

"Of course it is not a positive thing. Of course if you are not doing the right things on the court, of course you need to be in some way affected, no?" added the Spaniard.

"But at the same time is true that things can be made to happen earlier because I believe that he played two doubles matches. If they want

to suspend him, will be much better to do it immediately, not three days later or four days later, because then he was here playing for a few

ning two matches. I think it is not the ideal situation. Probably something that will go immediately to check it, and if he deserve a suspension, he takes it, and if he don't deserve, don't take it.'

A tournament statement said that Fognini had been

provisionally suspended. As a result, his and Bolelli's third-round doubles opponents, Nicholas Monroe and John-Patrick Smith, were given a walkover into the quarter-

"Pursuant to the Grand Slam Code of Conduct, Fabio Fognini is hereby provision-ally suspended from further participation in the US Open pending a final determination whether a major offense has been committed during his first round singles match," said

"The provisional suspension is with immediate effect and, therefore, Mr Fognini has been withdrawn from his up-

coming doubles match."
Fognini has a controversial history over his on-court behavior and was handed a record fine of 27,500 at Wimbledon in 2014.

"I apologize to the fans, to the referee for what happened," he wrote in Italian on

Twitter.

"It was just a very bad day, but it did not forgive my behavior in the match. Although I'm a hot-head (and though I've been right in most circumstances) I was wrong. But in the end it's only a tennis match."

India's Rohan Bopanna who had lost in the second round of the doubles to the Italian pair alongside partner Pablo Cuevas, accused the or-ganizers of dithering.

"I wanted them to play the whole tournament. If US Open is letting them play 2rounds. Let them play whole thing and then make a decision," Bopanna tweeted.

"If a player is under investigation, As a tournament you do not schedule his match till a decision has been taken."

He added: "It's a career of

Delhi Book Fair: The one that didn't fare so well

New Delhi, Sep 3 (PTI): Fair was foul at Delhi's annual book festival, with booksellers complaining that a variety of reasons from violence triggered by the conviction of a cult head to hiked prices, thanks to GST affected sales.

Publishers were an unhappy lot, stressing that the organisers had done little to sell the nine-day long Delhi Book Fair.
"There were no customers",

"There was no publicity","We won't be participating in the next book fair", were some of their many grievances.

Where Dera violence was to blame for low turnout during the initial days, the spiked prices of books because of GST played a spoilsport all through, they said.

But, what topped the com-plaint list of all publishers was the lack of, rather no publicity, of the

book fair, prior to the event!
"There was not even one hoarding of the book fair anywhere outside. Moreover, earlier there were regular announcements at metro stations, where they would also



there was nothing.

"And the result is in front of you. This time we are finding it hard even to recover the money we spent in renting this space," said the visibly worried Kaushal Goyal, from Pigeon and GBD Books.

The cost of one stall in the fair as Rs 56,000.

According to publishers, this was some thousands extra in comparison to the last year.

There is no next time for us.

This is the last time we are partici-

pating in this fair," he said However, ITPO denied the alle-

gations saying that the stalls were made available at "subsidised

"Each of them got a space on sub-sidised rates. We never increased the price of any stall. The minor increase in prices is because of the taxes," said a person from ITPO, on the condition of anonymity.

With barely 120 publishers

showing up at the fair, the count

was significantly lower than last year that boasted of the presence of 180 plus exhibitors.

Hemant, who debuted at the

fair this year, rues his decision to participate. "Obviously, the poor promotional campaign is to be blamed for the low turn out. But other than

that, the GST too played its role. "So this too went against us, which only affected our business

further," said a despondent Hemant. The ITPO even-

tually did turn to radio for the pub-licity of the book fair. But it was too little too late. Especially for

Hindi publica-tion houses, who are already in the midst of the never ending crisis of low

Hindi literature. "I can certainly say that for this

book fair the objective of ITPO was to make money, nothing else. There

is no facility whatsoever... their help desk here is of no use. They are minting money at our expense.

"The fair was organized in the worst manner. There was no publicity. You know many people who came here were like they were just not aware of the book fair for good days," said SK Gupta, from Surya Bharti Prakashan, a well-known

Hindi publication house.

He, too, blamed GST for dent-

ing the business further.

"See there is no GST on books. But,

then you have GST on paper, printing, binding and so. This makes the books expensive for the customer to buy. Nothing went right for us this time, for example

no one from Haryana and NCR made it to the book fair for first initial days due to the violence of

Dera supporters," he said. Many renowned Hindi publishers have given the book fair a miss due to dwindling number of ver-nacular readers, which includes the giants in the business like Raj Kamal Prakashan, Vani Prakashan and Prabhat Prakashan, among many others.

However, the ITPO didn't seem to pay much heed to any criticism.

Talking about the alleged "dismal publicity", they said this time they fol-lowed a "new strategy of promoting more on social media than the con-

ventional media platforms".

"We have taken adequate measures to make the book fair a success just like the earlier ones, ITPO said.

Needless to say, there is no love lost between e-books and publishers too, as many still blame the same for the scanty footfall, more than anything else.

dia, toh Badhega India', comes to a close today.

China asks N Korea to stop wrong actions after nuclear test

BEIJING, SEPT 3 (PTI): China today strongly con-demned North Korea's sixth nuclear test and asked the reclusive nation to "cease" its "incor-rect actions" and return to the dialogue table for denuclearisation of the Korean Peninsula.
North Korea claimed

today that it successfully conducted a test of a hydrogen bomb meant to be loaded onto an in-tercontinental ballistic ballistic missile (ICBM). It is the rogue nation's sixth, and most powerful, nuclear test.

China, North Korea's main diplomatic ally, criticised the country for ignoring international con demnation of its atomic

weapons programme. China's Ministry of Foreign Affairs said in a statement, "The Democratic People's Republic of Korea has once again conducted a nuclear test in spite of widespread opposition from the international community The Chinese government resolutely opposes and strongly condemns it."

It said that China's

firm stance, as well as the common goal of the in-ternational community, was achieving denuclearisation on the Korean Peninsula, protecting the nuclear non-proliferation mechanism and maintaining peace and stability in northeast

Asia.
It asked North Korea "to seriously consider" the steadfast will of the international community on a denuclearised Kore an Peninsula and to com-ply with the UN Security Council resolutions.

China also asked North Korea to "cease incorrect actions that worsen tensions and run against its own interests, and return to dialogue to resolve the problem".

Xi opens BRICS summit: Ask members to shelve differences

XIAMEN (CHINA), SEP 3 (PTI): Chinese President Xi Jinping today asked BRICS members to shelve their differences and accommodate each other's concerns by enhancing mutual trust and strategic communica-tion, as he opened the 9th an-nual summit of the five member emerging economies here.

The opening ceremony of the three-day BRICS summit started with BRICS Business Council in this southeastern Chinese city in Fujian province amid a downpour trig-gered by typhoon Mawar which had caused widespread disruption to the summit preparations and the city's The typhoon caused considerable disruption to the flights.

BRICS - Brazil, Russia, In-

dia, China and South Africa - is a grouping of the five emerging economies. The BRICS summit brings together the leaders of these countries.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi, Brazilian President Michel Temer, South African President Jacob Zuma and Russian President Vladimir Putin will attend the summit.

In his speech broadly focusing on enhancing cooperation between the BRICS members, Xi said, "construction of a tall building starts with foundation. We have laid the foundation and put in place the framework

for BRICS cooperation."

Outlining BRICS cooperation in the last 10 years, he said treating each other

as equals and seeking common ground while shelving differences is important

part of cooperation.
"In terms of BRICS cooperation, decisions made through consultation (and) not by one country We respect each other s model of development. accommodate and work to enhance strategic communicahe told about 1000 delegates from differ-

"Given difference in national conditions, history and cultures, it is only natural we may have some differences in pursuing our cooperation," he

"However with strong faith in cooperation and enhancing collaboration the BRICS countries can achieve steady progress in our cooperation," he added.

The summit comes days after India and China last week ended a 73-day standoff in Dokalam by withdrawing troops from the area. The two sides were locked in a face-off after Indian troops stopped the Chinese People's Liberation Army from building a road in the area.

In a candid speech without directly referring to differences, Xi referred to his multi-billion dollar Belt and



Road Initiative (BRI) in which the China-Pakistan Economic Corridor (CPEC) is a crucial

India had protested to CPEC as it passes through Pakistan-Occupied Kashmir. India also boycotted the Belt and Road Forum (BRF) host-ed by China in May.

Xi said BRI is not a tool to advance any geopolitical agenda, but a platform for

practical cooperation.

It is not a foreign aid scheme, but an initiative for interconnected development which calls for extensive consultation, joint contribution and shared benefits, he said.

"I am convinced that the BRI will serve as a new platform for all countries to achieve win-win cooperation and that it will create new opportunities for implementing the 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development," he said. He also said BRICS should

promote the "BRICS Plus" approach to build an open and diversified network of develment partners.
China has invited Egypt,

Kenya, Tajikistan, Mexico and Thailand as guest countries for the Xiamen BRICS summit as special guests like India invited BIMSTEC (Bay of Bengal Initiative for Multi-Sectoral Technical and Economic) leaders for last year's BRICS summit at Goa.

"We should get more emerging market and developing countries involved in our concerted endeavours for cooperation and mutual benefits," he said. Xi said as a cooperation platform with influence, BRICS cooperation is more than about five countries.
"BRICS places high premi-

emerging market and develop-ing countries and have established effective dialogue mech-

anisms with them," Xi said.
Xi also said that BRICS cooperation has reached a crucial stage of development.nIn assessing the performance of BRICS cooperation, it is important to bear two things in mind -- the historical course of global development and evolving international landscape; the historical process of development of BRICS countries, both individually and collectively, he said.

He said the development of the BRICS countries has delivered tangible benefits to more than three billion people.

Xi said that in the pas

decade, combined GDP of the bloc has grown 179 percent, trade increased 94 percent while urban population expanded 28 percent, contributing significantly to stabilising the global economy and returning it to growth. He also said the BRICS countries have been committed to multilateralism, fairness and justice in the past decade.

BRICS countries have endeavoured to fulfil their international responsibilitv. and have staked out their positions on major regional and international issues and made proposals for addressing them during the past decade, Xi said. The countries have promoted reform of eco-nomic governance to increase the representation and say of emerging market and developing countries, according to the president.

The bloc has also taken the lead in implementing the Millennium Development Goals and Sustainable Development Goals, and engaged in close dialogue and cooperation with other developing countries to pursue development through unity, the Chinese president said

He said the BRICS countries should work to usher in second golden decade. Going forward BRICS countries have maior tasks to accomplish, which are to grow economies and to strengthen cooperation he said

"It is time to set sail when the tide rises," Xi said, adding that countries should work to let their economic cooperation have more substance.

"Economic cooperation is the foundation of the BRICS mechanism," Xi said, referring to the progress in the operation of the New Development Bank and Contingent Reserve Arrangement and in e-commerce, trade and investment facilitation, trade in services, local currency bond issuance, scientific and technological innovation, industrial cooperation and public-private partnership.

He also said BRICS countries should implement agreements and consensus already reached while actively exploring new ways and areas of practical cooperation.

Russia slams N Korea nuclear test, urges calm

Moscow, Sep 3 (AFP): Russia urged calm today as it slammed North Korea after Pyongyang said it successfully tested a hydrogen bomb.

"This latest demonstrative disregard by Pyongyang of the requirements of the relevant resolutions of the UN Securi-ty Council and the norms of international law deserves the strongest con-demnation," the foreign ministry in Moscow said.

The ministry said it regretted that the leadership of North Korea was ating a serious threat" for the region and warned that "the continuation of such a line is fraught with serious consequences

for Pyongyang.
"In the unfolding conditions, it is imperative to remain calm and to refrain from any actions that lead to a further escalation of tension," a

"We call on all interested parties to immediately return to dialogue and negotiations as the only possible way for an overall settlement of the problems of the Korean peninsula," it said.

The ministry insisted Moscow remained committed to a joint Rus-sian-Chinese proposal that would see Pyongyang halt weapons tests in return for the US suspending military exercises in the region.

North Korea conducts 6th nuclear test, says it was H-bomb SEOUL, SEP 3 (AP): North

Korea said it set off a hy-drogen bomb today in its sixth nuclear test, which judging by the earthquake it set off appeared to be its most powerful explosion yet. South Korea's weather agency estimated the nuclear blast yield of the presumed test was between 50 and 60 kilotons, or five to six times stronger than North Korea's fifth test in September 2016. That would mark a signif-North's quest for a viable nuclear missile capable of striking anywhere in the United States

On North Korean television, a newsreader called the test a "complete success" and said the "two-stage ther-"two-stage ther-clear weapon" monuclear had "unprecedented" strength. Hours earlier, Pyongyang claimed its leader had inspected a hydrogen bomb meant for a new intercontinental ballistic missile.

Seoul's weather agen cy and the Joint Chiefs of



5.7 magnitude quake occurred at 12:29 p.m. local time, in Kilju, northern Hamgyong province, the site where North Korea has conducted nuclear tests in the past.

Seoul officials revised their earlier estimate of 5.6 magnitude quake. The US Geological Survey called the first quake an explosion with a mag-nitude 6.3. The US State Department had no immediate reaction. South Korea's presidential of-fice said it will hold a

meeting chaired by President Moon Jae-in.
South Korea's mili-

tary said it has strengthened its monitoring and readiness while mulling a variety of possible responses that could be executed in collaboration with the US.

Japan confirmed that North Korea conducted nuclear test, Foreign Minister Taro Kono said. "It is absolutely unac-ceptable if North Korea did force another nuclear test, and we must protest strongly," Prime Minister Shinzo Abe said.

The USGS and China's earthquake administration detected a second tremor in North Korea minutes after the first, describing it as a cave-in or collapse. South Korea's weather agency, however, said no second quake occurred.

North Korea conducted two nuclear tests last year, the last nearly a year ago, on the September 9 anniversary of the nation's founding. It has since maintained a torrid pace in weapons tests, including its first two intercontinental ballistic missiles test in July. Last month, North Korea fired a potentially nuclear- capable midrange missile over northern Japan.

Earlier today, photos

released by the North Korean government showed Kim talking with his lieutenants as he observed a silver, peanut-shaped device that was apparently the purported thermo-nuclear weapon destined for an ICBM.

What appeared to be the nose cone of a missile could also be seen near the alleged bomb in one picture, which could not be independently veri-fied and was taken without outside journalists present. Another photo showed a diagram on the wall behind Kim of a bomb mounted inside a cone

State media said Kim visited the Nuclear Weapons Institute and inspected a "homemade" H-bomb "super explosive power" that "is adjustable from tens (of) kiloton to hundreds (of) kiloton." North Korea's nuclear

and missile programme has made huge strides since Kim rose to power following his father's death in late 2011. The North followed its two of Hwasong-14 ICBMs by threatening in August to launch a salvo of its Hwasong-12 inter-mediate range missiles toward the US Pacific island territory of Guam.

It flew a Hwasong-12

over northern Japan last week the first such overflight by a missile capable of carrying nukes, in a launch Kim described as a "meaningful prelude" to containing Guam, the home of major US mili-tary facilities, and more ballistic missile tests targeting the Pacific.

It may be difficult for outside experts to confirm that the nuclear device detonated today was an H-bomb. State media reported that the test left no trace of radioactive material.
