All eyes on Tuesday's all-party meet with WB Govt

DARJEELING (WB), SEP 11 (PTI): All eyes are on Tuesday's all-party meeting convened by the West Bengal government in Siliguri to discuss the Darjeeling crisis, even as the indefinite shutdown in the hills entered its

89th day today.

This is the second all-party meet convened by the state government after the August 29 talks. The Gorkha Janmukti Mor-

cha (GJM), which is spearhead ing the agitation in the hills and had earlier said it would not attend the meeting if the issue of a separate state of Gorkhaland was not discussed, today said a seven-member delegation of the party, including three MLAs, would take part in the meeting.

"We will attend the meeting tomorrow. We will stress on the issue of Gorkhaland. We also want peace to return to the hills," GJM MLA Amar Singh Rai

GIM general secretary Roshan Giri said although the party had decided to participate in the meeting, it had also urged the Centre to hold a tripartite talk to solve the crisis.

The Gorkha National Libera-

tion Front (GNLF) and other hill parties will also participate in

tomorrow's meeting.
Binay Tamang and Anit Thapa, who were expelled from the GJM by party supremo Bimal Gurung, will also attend the meeting in their personal capacity as they have been invited by

the state government.

Thapa today urged the GJM leadership to shun the "path of violence" and help restore peace

"Some of the GJM leaders are encouraging violence. We feel that peace should return to the hills and for that, we need to shun the path of violence," Tha-

A large number of shops were open in parts of the Darjeeling hills today braving threats and intimidation by the GJM.

After the first all-party meeting, the differences within the GJM started coming out in the open, leading to the expulsion of Tamang and Thapa from the party.

For the third consecutive day, the police and administra-tion, through a public address system, appealed to the locals to open shops and restore normalcy in the hills.

Peace rallies were taken out by the residents in Kurseong, Darjeeling and Mirik.

GJM supporters took out rallies in support of the Gorkhaland demand and the ongoing shutdown in certain parts of Darjeeling, Sonada and Kalimpong.
Picketing was strengthened

in some areas and posters and leaflets, in support of the strike, were distributed.

Internet services have remained suspended in the hills since June 18.

Following yesterday's meeting convened by the District Magistrate with representatives of local businesses, offices and schools to explore the possibility of return-ing normalcy to Kalim-pong, today, three banks

amidst tight security .

This however remained a token gesture since no banking was possible in the absence of internet connection. a service which has re-mained suspended in these parts since 18 June.

So, banks opened after 90 days here today, but banking has still not returned

Meanwhile, schools and businesses remained shut, preferring to wait and watch. All eyes are now on the Tuesday meeting in Siliguri be-tween the West Bengal Government and representatives of hill groups striving for statehood. Stakeholders point to

the pointlessness of open banks but no banking, to stress that normalcy cannot return piecemeal. If schools reopen, the students and teachers will need vehicles which will need fuel and the schools will need operational kitchens and canteens which need supplies.

Meanwhile, in another development, today, after nearly two months, a North Bengal State Transport Corporation bus came into town from Siliguri and one left here for Siliguri. These buses had very few passengers on board.

Cabinet Committee on Security to decide whether to allow Karmapa to visit Sikkim

NEW DELHI, SEPT 11 (PTI): The Cabinet Committee on Security (CCS), headed by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, will take a call on whether to allow Karmapa Ogyen Trinley Dorie to visit Sikkim as demanded by the State Government and the people of the state, a home ministry official said.

The Home Ministry

has prepared a note on the Karmapa's visit to Sikkim and sent it for approval to the CCS, the highest decision making body of the country's se curity matters, the offi-cial said on condition of anonymity.

However, the Karma-pa will not be allowed to enter the Rumtek monastery located in East Sikkim, even though he may be allowed to visit the state, the official said referring to the note prepared by the Ministry.
The central govern-



ment had banned entry of all both claimants to the title of Karmapa to the Rumtek monastery in East Sikkim in 1994.

The Sikkim government has written several times and passed resolutions requesting the Centre to allow Karmapa Ogyen Trinley Dorjee to visit Sikkim where his previous reincarnation lived ever since he left Tibet following the Chinese takeover and where he had many followers and also his seat

however, not given any decision on it vet.

Karmapa Ogyen Trin-ley Dorje, head of the Karma Kagyu (Black Hat) sect of Tibetan Buddhism, was born in Tibet and had escaned to India through Nepal at the age of 14. He reached the Tibetan exile quarters at McLeod Gani on January 5, 2000.

He presently lives in Dharamsala and is also recognised by the Dalai Lama.

A dedicated farmer of Menrongong Village, Tshering Lepcha, was given a brief demonstra-tion on field preparation, nutrient management line sowing and spacing of the crop by Block Technology Manager [Kabi], Norbu D Bhutia, under the guidance of Joint Director-Food Security & Agriculture Development Department [North], Churamani Upreti.

It may be mentioned here, Urad Dal is a short duration crop that of-fers opportunity for mixed cropping and is a rich source of protein [24-26%]. The optimum



temperature for its cultivation ranges from 25-35 degrees with toleration for frost and can be grown in the lower and

The FLD is conducted for the whole crop sea-son, starting from field preparation and sowing to its harvest, during

which the entire POP of the crop will be demonstrated. A well managed organically cultivated Urad Dal yields up to 8-10 Q/ha, which is expect-

wall at school premises.



Chief Justice SK Agnihotri chairs NGT Eastern Zone regional conference

GANGTOK, 11 SEPT:
The National Green Tri-The National Green Tri-bunal [NGT] Eastern Zone regional conference was held on 09-10 Sept at Guwahati in Assam on the theme of 'Waste Disposal and Management'.

A press release in-forms that eminent academicians and experts in the field, judges, Chief Secretary of Assam, Chairperson of Central Pollution Control Board [CPCB] and those in-volved in the management of waste converged at the venue to deliberate on the given theme.

Chief Justice of Sik-kim High Court, Justice Satish Kumar Agnihotri, chaired the plenary session held on 10 Sept.

Addressing the session, Justice Agnihotri spoke on waste management in Indus Valley Civilization, which dates back to 2500 BC. It has been discovered that Mohen-Jo-Daro and Harappa towns, presently situated in Pakistan and Lothal in Gujarat, had developed very good drainage and sanitary systems, he mentioned

He highlighted the common forms of managing wastes in present period which includes destruction through burning or incinerathrough tion, dumping, burying, transportation from one place to another place, recycling, reusing and composting. He informed about the pros and cons of each form of waste management. He mentioned about recent tragedy at East Delhi's Ghazipur land-fill site where a deadly 'avalanche' swept away public properties, killed people and injured many.

Coming to e-waste management, he told the gathering that the E-Waste [Management and Handling] Rules, and Handling] Rules, 2011 apply to every producer, consumer or bulk consumer involved in the manufacture, sale & purchase and processing of electrical and electronic equipment or components as specified in the list of schedule. The Pollution Control Boards are to implement the rules with positive spirit and

authorize or grant the permission, handling, dismantling etc of the e-waste, he added.

Regarding Sikkim, the Chief Justice highlighted about the cleanliness of the urban centres and rural areas of the State. Waste management is being implemented in a proper manner by all the stakeholders, he said.

He also praised the initiatives taken by the state government in gar-bage collection and management despite scarcity of land, executing the ban on use of plastic bags and prohibition on agricul-

tural waste burning.

The co-chairperson of the session was Justice Dr P Jyothimani [Judicial member-NGT].

To secure the future, think beyond protection and quotas

ocal protection is an important issue. It could also Local protection is an important local be argued that it is of more emotional significance but because people than constructive intervention, but because people and their leaders feel so strongly about the issue, it becomes very important. Even the West, with its enviable unemployment rate despite the economic downturn, is passionately debating the pros and cons of outsourcing which, in its mind is taking jobs away to cheaper human resource destinations even though benefits of such cost cuts benefit cash-strapped consumers at home the most.

So yes, local protection evokes a passionate and emotional response from the people, and governments have to continuously appear to be prioritising it. There are, however, practical and logistic implications that should never be lost sight of and quality never allowed to be compromised. Opportunities that progressive and positive attitudes create should not be allowed to get drowned by the din of rhetoric. In a world growing increasingly 'flat' [to borrow the now dated term from Thomas L. Friedman], digging trenches only manages to keep opportunities out, shrinks the horizon and constricts development. The present times demand competitive edge, and prioritizing protectionism dulls this pre-requisite of making it in the world. Protect, yes, but also trust the inherent skills and potential of the young. The young have proven that they have what it takes to succeed and survive. Take for example the many young entrepreneurs that Sikkim can boast of now. They happened when the easier option of landing employment with the government became scarce and also less appealing. They applied themselves to enterprises, something that the 'local' talent pool was not considered very adept at till even a decade back But look around now, the youth, who while in school, were being groomed for cushy bureaucracy or technical professions, have grown up quite well as hoteliers restaurateurs, travel operators, small scale industrialists, respected professionals with national media, sportespersons... achievers.

Such successes probably happened because they grew up before obsessive protectionism invaded the public domain and made the young lazy. This of course does not go to say that job opportunities should not be protected for the people of the land, they should; but the policy makers have to strike the right balance where it is done in a way that does not lull future generations into a false sense of security and stops them from developing skills which make them world beaters. It is not easy, but a good beginning can be made with devising ways which reward healthy business practices. Investors who set up shop in Sikkim should conduct themselves better, encourage and invite more local employment on their own instead of being made to do so by way of legislations. They enjoy tax breaks and many other sops when they opt for Sikkim, not because Sikkim needs more factories, but because it rewards job creation. They have to understand and appreciate this fact. The young on the other hand should be groomed as competitors, not as beneficiaries-in-waiting. In times to come, it should be their skills that attract and retain investments and not lavish industrial policies alone. Various arms of the government will have to collaborate to make this possible. It is possible and the generation controlling the present owes it to the future.

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Beyond cats and Kardashians: can journalism satisfy audiences without dumbing down?

Australia is debating the problem of media companies getting increasingly enamoured by the sugar hit of audience reach. This debate of sensationalism over sensible and noise over content is as valid in India

Australia's media ownership laws, evidence is emerging that journalists are moving away from the traditional watchdog role of the press towards satisfying the demands of audiences.

Decades of debate about whether journalists ought to give audiences what they like rather than what journalists think they need is being resolved in favour of what US journalism thinker Jeff Jarvis dismisses as the "cats and Kardashians" model of digital journalism.

But is giving audiences what they want the same as dumbing down?

Results from a recently published study of istralian journalists indicate that journalists are shifting their thinking away from the "citizen orientation" typically associated with the watchdog role of the press to a more consumer focus.

Senior editors say that understanding what audiences want — as recorded by clicks and other forms of web-based feedback — is an essential part of contemporary journalism.

Growing advertising revenues on the basis of dience reach and volume remains the dominant journalism business model.

As Kate de Brito, the editor-in-chief of the country's most visited news website, news.com.au, puts it, if no one clicks, "you may as well have just emailed it to your mum".

But Jarvis, the director of the Tow-Knight Center for Entrepreneurial Journalism at City University New York, argues news organisation understand that getting more clicks isn't the same

as listening to your audience.

"The price of advertising is going down, desperation up. Journalism gets cheapened in the

Efforts to reshape how journalism survives and makes money - and serves its multiple roles in society — has emerged as a key sticking point in Federal government moves to change Australia's media ownership laws.

Reform of the media ownership laws that restrict any one person controlling radio, TV and a newspaper in the same market hinges on the government's willingness to back measures promoted by Senator Nick Xenophon to support public interest journalism.

Xenophon, a key member of a current senate journalism inquiry, has supported tax breaks to small media companies and other ways to develop

new business models for journalism.

The government has been reluctant to support tax relief but reportedly has a more positive attitude to other measures to boost journalism jobs and explore new business models.

Without support from Labor or the Greens, Team Xenophon's votes will be crucial to the pas-sage of any deal that would also end restrictions on any one person controlling TV licenses that reach more than 75% of the population. Indications from Canberra are that a compro-

mise deal could be close.

Alternatives to one-size-fits-all mass audience model are under trial or development across the journalism sector, from experiments in surfacing quality journalism using artificial intelligence to moves to personalise news and information feeds.

The New York Times, for instance, has stated wants to deliver individualised news based on what individuals read, where they live and how of-

ten they come to the site.

Given the NYT has 2.3 million digital-only subscribers, this is perhaps the most ambitious at-

tempt yet at active audience listening.

Jarvis calls on media companies of all sizes to recreate journalism as a service based on "relevance and value"; cast aside the idea of mass, rethink audiences as communities and individuals.

But, as he concedes, media companies are un-derstandably finding it hard to build a new house (based on his notion of service) when the old one (based on volume) is burning down.

Audience reach and volume — and the constant

flow of metrics that reveal them - drive the news agenda for most media companies. Ratings always have in commercial radio and TV.

But now few media outlets can afford to ignore what audiences are doing (or not) with their content. Advertisers won't let them.

In the recently published study of Australian journalists, Folker Hanusch, from the University of Vienna, and Edson Tandoc, from Nanyang Technological University in Singapore, explored the impact of audience feedback via readers' comments, Twitter and web analytics on journalists' thinking.

In a survey of 358 journalists, they found a marked shift towards providing "the kind of news that attracts the largest audience" as opposed to the more traditional role of holding the politicians and business to account.

This especially held true for journalists working in competitive markets; those freed from market pressures were "able to prioritize their normative functions of being watchdogs and shaping

public opinion".

Even so, most Australian media companies, including the national broadcaster, are enamoured by the sugar hit of audience reach.

In the most recent Nielsen digital ratings,

the closest competitor to news.com.au, with its 5,905,000 unique visitors a month, is the ABC. Its combined news sites reach 4,651,000 Australians

Little wonder then that Fairfax chief Greg Hy wood gets so upset about the ABC using taxpayers money to buy Google ads: smh.com.au is about half million behind the ABC and no other Fairfax site is in the current top 10.

Hanusch and Tandoc's work indicates that a radical reshaping of how journalists see their roles is underway.

"Seeing the number of unique visitors to the site, the number of page views a page gets, and the amount of time readers spend on a story, among others, easily and regularly, could be socializing journalists into prioritizing these metrics."

But what do clicks actually mean?

Results of a recently published Dutch study of news consumers indicate that the act of clicking or not — is more complex than like or not and driven by a host of considerations. The study also makes the obvious but useful observation: clicks do not account for the preference of consumers

who browse without clicking.

The study by Tim Groot Kormelink and Irene Costera Meijer, both from Vrije University in Amsterdam, described 30 considerations for clicking or not clicking among a group of 56 news

Reasons for not clicking included supersaturation ("not another story about Syria", said one participant) to "bullshit": the users instantly dismissed the "pettiness of the headline".

The study's participants often engaged in "online browsing patterns that did express interest in news, yet did not necessitate a click". The authors conclude that "even if one seeks a rough estimate of people's news interests, clicks are a flawed in-

Therein lies a pressing conundrum for the online news industry: if not clicks, what? If audiences
— and advertisers — are going to be fully served,
there needs to be better way.

Why al-Qaida is still strong 16 years after 9/11

Sixteen years ago, on September 11, 2001, al-Qaida conducted the most destructive terrorist attack in history.

An unprecedented onslaught from the U.S. followed. One-third of al-Qaida's leadership was killed or captured in the following year. The group lost its safe haven in Afghanistan, including its extensive training infrastructure there. Its surviving members were on the run or in hiding. Though it took nearly 10 years, the U.S. succeeded in killing al-Qaida's founding leader, Osama bin Laden. Since 2014, al-Qaida has been overshadowed by its former ally al-Qaida in Iraq, now calling itself the Islamic State.

In other words, al-Qaida should not have survived the 16 years since

So why has it?

THE TIES THAT BIND

Much of the credit goes to al-Qaida's extraordinary ability to both form alliances and sustain them over time and under pressure.

In my forthcoming book "Allianc-

es for Terror," I examine why a small number of groups, such as al-Qaida and IS, emerge as desirable partners and succeed at developing alliance

Understanding terrorist alliances is critical because terrorist organizations with allies are more lethal, survive longer and are more apt to seek weapons of mass destruction. Though terrorist partnerships face numerous hurdles and severing al-Qaida's alliances has been a U.S. objective for over a decade, the fact is that these counterterrorism efforts have failed.

to survive the immediate aftermath of 9/11. The Afghan Taliban stood by al-Qaida after the attack, refusing to surrender bin Laden and thereby precipitating the U.S. invasion of Afghanistan. Fleeing, al-Qaida was able to turn to allies in Pakistan to hide its operatives and punish the Pakistani government for capitulating to U.S. pressure to crackdown on the group.

It was alliances that helped al-Qaida continue to terrorize. In October 2002, for example, al-Qaida's ally in Southeast Asia, Jemaah Islamiyah, struck a bar and a nightclub in Bali, killing more than 200 and injuring more than 200 more, to brutally com norate the first anniversary of

And it was alliances that allowed al-Qaida to project viability. With the "prestige" that came with conducting 9/11, al-Qaida was able to forge more of them and indeed create af-filiate alliances in which partners adopted its name and pledged allegiance to bin Laden.

Al-Qaida's first and most notori-

ous affiliate alliance, al-Oaida in Iraq. was formed in 2004 with Jordanian jihadist Abu Musab al-Zarqawi. Using the standing he accrued through his role in the insurgency in Iraq, Zarqa-wi then helped al-Qaida acquire its second affiliate in 2006, al-Oaida in the Islamic Maghreb. Then, in 2009, al-Qaida designated its branch in Yemen and Saudi Arabia as al-Oaida in the Arabian Peninsula. Its alliances spanned the Middle East and helped it to project power, despite the U.S. war on terrorism.

A LOWER PROFILE

While al-Qaida still sought affiliates, by 2010, it modified how its alliances

Al-Qaida forged an alliance with al-Shabaab in Somalia, but did not publicly announce it or ask al-Shabaab to change its name. Bin Laden justified to al-Shabaab's leader the shift to a less visible form of alliance as a way to prevent an increase in counterterrorism pressure or a loss of funds from the Arabian Peninsula. He privately expressed concerns that al-Qaida's name "reduces the feeling of Muslims that we belong to them, and allows the enemies to claim deceptively that they are not at war with Islam." Bin Laden's deputy, Ayman al-Zawahiri, saw the move as bin Laden capitulating to members of al-Qaida who worried about "inflating the size and the growth of al-Qaida." After bin Laden's death, Zawahiri publicly announced al-Qaida's alliance with al-Shabaab, though al-Shabaab still

did not adopt al-Qaida's name.

Though al-Qaida's alliance arrangements have varied, these relationships have helped it to survive the loss of its founding leader in 2011 and the ascent of a far less capable leader. Zawahiri's rise to the helm of the group was the consequence of an alli-ance, specifically between his original Egyptian group, al-Jihad, and al-Qaida. The alliance culminated in a merger in 2001, with Zawahiri becoming bin

Laden's deputy and successor. However, Zawahiri lacks bin Laden's cachet or diplomatic savvy. He is a better deputy than a leader. His poor handling of the strife between jihadist group al-Nusra in Syria and its parent organization, the Islamic State in Iraq (previously al-Qaida in Iraq and now IS), led to the alliance rupture between al-Qaida and its af-

filiate in Iraq.
Though al-Qaida had an acrimoni-

ous break with IS, it gained al-Nusra as an affiliate in the central conflict in the Sunni jihadist movement: Syria. As was the case with al-Shabaab, this alliance with al-Nusra did not include a rebranding and was initially kept secret. In addition, al-Nusra subse quently changed its name, an effort to gain more legitimacy within the conflict in Syria by publicly distancing it-self from al-Qaida, though seemingly

with al-Qaida's consent. Al-Qaida has not acquired another affiliate since the alliance rupture and rise of IS as a rival in 2014. It organized existing members into a new branch, al-Qaida in the Indian subcontinent, that year. The branch in South Asia reflected al-Qaida's success at expanding beyond its predominantly Arab base, particularly in

Pakistan.
Critically, with the exception of IS, al-Qaida's alliances have been resilient over time. This is true despite ample reasons for its partners to abandon ties, such as the heightened counterterrorism pressure that comes with affiliation to al-Qaida; the death of its charismatic leader: and the Islamic State's efforts to court al-Qaida allies. Even the Afghan Taliban remains unwilling to sever ties, even though doing so would elimi-nate one of the major reasons that the United States will not withdraw from the "forever war" in Afghanistan.

There is a window now for the U.S. to damage al-Qaida's alliances: It has a weak leader and major rival. But that window may be closing as the Islamic State's so-called caliphate crumbles and al-Qaida grooms bin Laden's son as its future leader.

With this the toll in this year's flood in the state touched 160, it said.



Cox's Bazar (Bangladesh), Sep 11 (AFP): The situation in Myanmar is a "textbook example of eth-nic cleansing", the United Nations said today, as the number of Rohingya Muslims fleeing Myanmar for Bangladesh topped 300,000.

The Rohingya, a stateless islim minority, have faced cades of persecution in Muslim Myanmar where they are regarded as illegal immigrants.

But since the latest upsurge in

violence on August 25, hundreds of thousands have flooded across the border into Bangladesh bringing stories of entire villages burned to the ground by Buddhist mobs and Myanmar troops.

Today the UN human rights chief Zeid Ra'ad Al Hussein ac-cused Myanmar of waging a "systematic attack" on the Rohingya and warned that "ethnic cleansing" seemed to be under way.



"Because Myanmar has refused cess to human rights investigators the current situation cannot vet be fully assessed, but the situation seems a textbook example of ethnic cleansing," he told the UN Human Rights Council.

Suu Kyi, a Nobel peace laure ate, has come in for strong international criticism over the military crackdown on the Rohingya, which began when militants ambushed security forces on August 25.

The UN special rapporteur on human rights in Myanmar has said the latest violence may have left more than 1,000 dead, most of A further 27,000 ethnic Rakhine Buddhists as well as Hindus have also fled violence has gripped Rakhine, where international aid programmes in Rakhine have been severely curtailed.

Fellow Nobel peace laureates Malala Yousafzai and Archbishop Desmond Tutu have urged Suu Kyi to intervene

The UN refugee agency says at least 313,000 Rohingya have now arrived in Bangladesh from Myanmar's Rakhine state since August 25, around a third of the total population of 1.1 million.

The true figure could be even higher - the UN said many new arrivals are still on the move and are therefore left out of the calcu-

Dhaka initially stepped up border controls after the violence, stranding thousands of refugees at the Bangla-

deshi frontier, but in the last weel has been allowing them to enter.

Refugee camps and makeshift settlements near the border with Myanmar, which already hosted hundreds of thousands of Rohingya before the latest upsurge in violence, are now completely overwhelmed


