## Rajnath appeals to GJM to withdraw strike; Ministry to call meet



NEW DELHI, SEP 26 (PTI): Home Minister Rajnath Singh today appealed to the Gorkha Janmukti Morch (GJM) to with-draw the ongoing strike in Darjeeling hills for a separate Gorkhaland state and asked the Union home secretary to convene an official-level meeting to discuss all related issues.
In a statement, the home

minister said that in a democracy, dialogue is the only way out to resolve any problem and solutions can be found through

"I appeal to the GJM and its leader Bimal Gurung to withdraw the ongoing bandh and to help create a conducive atmosphere for allowing normalcy to return to the area, particu-larly in view of the festival season," he said as the indefinite shutdown to press for a sepa-rate state of Gorkhaland con-

tinued for 104th day.
Singh said he has asked
Union Home Secretary Rajiv Gauba to convene an official-levdiscuss all related issues

"Eleven precious lives have been lost so far, seven have been injured and the entire people of Darjeeling hills have suffered a lot since the strike. I have pained immensely by what has happened in Darjeeling hills," he said.

The indefinite strike called by the GJM has continued since June 12 though its rebel leader Binay Tamang had announced suspension of the bandh.

The indefinite sh down by the Gorkha Janmukti Morch (GJM) for a separate state of Gorkhaland entered the 104th day today. The strike had begun on June 15. "Our party supremo

Bimal Gurung has decided to suspend the indefinite shutdown in the hills from 6 am tomorrow morning for an indefinite period.

"The decision was taken after Union Home

The participants experienced hands-on training in this technology under the supervision of Professor Dr Harish Sharma from YSP University of Horticulture and Forestry and his team.

To support the Government of Sikkim for mainstreaming the beekeeping development activities in the state, GIZ CCA-

Crop Development Departent Government of Sikkim pacity building on beekeeping in Sikkim with the objectives to crate the state own resource person on beekeeping to carry forward these activities to an advanced level.

The training is organized in two places in Himachal Pradesh. At the University campus's bee apiary, the participants learned queen rear-ing techniques for mass production of queen bee, which help to produce multiple bee colonies from the single strong and healthy colony.

At Bajaura, Kullu valley, par-

which is a low cost hybrid bee hive design having both tradi-tional and modern concept of beekeeping. Beekeepers in the Kullu valley are practicing bee-keeping using these mud hives. Mud hives are easy to construct using clay, cow dung, pebbles, saw dust, etc which are locally available. The thickness of the wall of the mud hive is large as compare to modern wooden bee box, because of which, it will remain cool in hot summer days and warm in cold winter season. Because of this climate resilient property, local bees remain happily in the mud hives.

During the closing cere-mony of the training the chief

guest, Director Extension Education, YSP University of Horticulture and Forestry, Dr VS Thakur expressed the need of technology transformation in the Beekeeping Industry and requested scientists to work on it.

Ioint Director, P L Basnet said that in a limited time participants have learned many new techniques for beekeeping especially for queen rearing, and clay hive design which is expected to be helpful to the Government of Sik-kim for implementation of beekeeping activities in the State in more scientific man-ner and helpful for sustaining the organic mission of Sikkim. the release adds.

### SDF workers vandalized my shop, alleges Gangtok shop owner

angtok businessman. Garg, whose shop on MG Marg was vandalized recently after an alleged comment posted by him on Facebook against the Chief Minister, today said that he wants 'full justice and strict action' against those responsible for vandalizing his shop. He has claimed that Sikkim Democratic Front workers

Mr Garg has described the incident as 'life threatening' and has also accused the vandals of stealing Rs 50,000 in cash and a gold chain from his shop.

Addressing a press conference here at SKM head-office today. Mr Garg expressed his dissatisfaction over the police department on releasing the culprits involved in the attack on bail.

"I will not compromise at any stage and I will go to court if required to get justice. If anything wrong happens to me or my family members or my shop then the SDF party will be fully

responsible," Mr Garg said.

He has also accused the Gangtok MLA of being involved in the attack. He has criticized the Area MLA for not condemning the attack and 'staying silent

regarding the incident.

Regarding the Facebook comments, he said that his account was hacked by some un-known person and he had not

posted the comments. He also said that he had reported the matter to the police.

While strongly condemning the incident, SKM MLAs, Kunga Nima Lepcha and Sonam Lama stressed that the police should book the accused under the ap-propriate sections of the IPC. They also urged the ruling party to maintain peace and communal harmony in the State and stated that such incidents will only tarnish the image of Sikkim.

### VI Sustainable Mountain Development Summit concludes in Aizawl

The 6th edition or .....
Sustainable Mountain Development Summit (SMDS-VI) which began in Aizawl, the Mizoram capital on 20 Sept with the goal of making the people of India proud of their mountains, recognizing the value of its mountain regions and enabling its people to realize their potential, concluded on the

night of 22 Sept.

The three-day summit, inaugurated by Chief Minister of Mizoram, Lal Thanhawla was organised by the Integrated Mountain Initiative (IMI), a civil society initiative involving the 10 Indian Himalayan mountain states and the hill districts of West Bengal and Assam and was hosted by the Mizoram Sustainable Development Foundation (MSDF),

press release informs. Governor of Mizoram,

Lt General Nirbhay Sharma, urged the people of the Indian Himalayan states to go back to their roots to ensure protection of environment for arresting climate change. Mr Sharma, delivering the valedictory address, said that rise of temperature during the past few decades in Mizoram is a matter of concern.

Scarcity of water and in contrast heavy and ir-regular rainfall caused trails of destruction in the state which were results of climate change. The incidents of pest invasion and resurgence of new diseases were also caused by climate change, he said adding that planting more trees and emphasis on re-newable energy sources like solar energy were the need of the hour Concerned about the

melting glaciers of the Himalayas, Mr Sharma "The Himalavas have the largest body of snow after the Arctic and

Antarctic. It is sometimes referred to as the Third Pole. When snow from the Arctic and Atlantic melts, it is widely covered by the media. However, the melting glaciers of the Himalayas are hardly ever reported, even though more people are affected. The water from the Himalayan glaciers

feeds nearly 30% of the world's population." Quoting the Interna-tional Panel on Climate Change report, Mr Shar-ma added, "Glaciers in the Himalayas are receding faster than in any other part of the world. If the present rate continues, the probability of them disappearing by the year

lier is very high."

In the course of the

three-day summit, around 300 participants, half of them coming from various Himalayan states, com-prising of distinguished legislators, central and state government representatives, members of civil society, field practi-tioners, academia, indus-try, students, media and communities deliberated on the issues of Climate Change and Sustainable Mountain Cities, shared their experiences, dis-cussed issues of sustain-able development, identified gaps and resolved to work collectively.

The sub themes under Climate Change included Research and Policy Gaps, State Action Plans on CC, and Adaptation Stories, while under Mountain Cities the subthemes were, Infrastructure Development, Water and Waste Management and Disaster Risk Reduction.

GANGTOK, 25 SEPT [IPR]: The state level consultation meet-ing to deliberate on the structures and systems to support decentralized planning and the way forward was held at Janta Bhawan today. The meeting was jointly organized by NITI Aayog, Government of India in consonance with the Rural Management & Development Department Sikkim and PRIA [Participatory Research in Asia], New Delhi.

Additional Secretary, Rural Management & Development Department, Cheden Ladingpa, in her welcome address, gave a brief overview of the ex-pectations from the meeting. She informed that the meeting was an attempt to deepen de-mocracy and local self-governance by strengthening the Panchayati Raj Institution in the State. She put on record the role of PRIA as a crucial partner for development of PRI and capacity building of functionaries at all levels.

Director-PRIA, New Delhi, Manoj Rai, presented the findings from the Action Research in the State to understand the status of progress of local self governance in the State, along with the issues, challenges nendations. He plained why the research was carried out in Sikkim, the methodologies used and the findings. Chairperson-Sikkim Co-op-

erative Union Ganesh Rai in his brief address, maintained that the Panchayat in Sikkim is empowered to the core through a steady progress in the devolution of power. He added that with the initiation of Gram Panchayat Development Plan, the Panchayat is well aware of the resource envelope allocat-ed for development of PRI. He however suggested that there is still room for improvement through strengthening of the District Planning Committees by encouraging participation of pubic and stakeholders in the

planning processes.
President-PRIA, New Del-hi, Dr Rajesh Tandon, facilitated an open discussion on the issues and ways forward, and particularly convergence of all line departments for integrat-ed development of local self government. Officers of the State RM&DD and from line de-partments placed wide range of suggestions based on their experiences at the implementation level. They also referred to pertinent issues and points which could be incorporated in the Action Research document prepared by PRIA. Mayor-Gangtok

pal Corporation, Shakti Singh Choudhary, in his address, called for active convergence between the Panchayati Raj Institution and the Urban Lo-cal Self Government right from the planning process. He added that stringency in the allo-cation of 14th Finance Commission and the 4th FC has restricted the development process in the urban areas. He also pointed out that the socio-economic and demographic burden of the urban areas is slowly shifting to the peri urban areas, which calls for streamlining the planning process. The floating population has to be considered while planning and the guidelines of the Finance Commissions

state specific to ease out the implementation process. Secretary-RM&DD

kim, DR Nepal, in his address, thanked the officers from PRIA New Delhi for organizing and participating in this state lev-el consultancy meeting and for their valued suggestions to strengthen Panchayati Raj Insti-tution and Urban Local Self Government in Sikkim. He called for active participation, ownership and convergence from all line departments to ensure that their programmes are carried through participation of the PRIs and the urban local bodies. He stressed that PRIs and ULBs should not be looked at as entities confined to the RM&DD and the UD&HD and should be viewed as a collective responsibility of all the line departments.

Mr Nepal shed light on the development of PRI in the last five years through capacity building and empowerment at various levels. He attributed the progress made by the PRI to the strong political will to devolve and decentralize power right upto the village level. He cited the numerous awards and accolades received by the PRI in Sikkim for aspects like transparency and accountability and overall performance. He added that the Directorate of Panchayati Raj is taking concrete steps to guide and train the Panchayats on documentation.

The Secretary welcomed the suggestion made by PRIA to have one nodal department, preferably the Planning & Development Department, to head the Decentralized Planning of the PRI & ULB.

In conclusion, he request-ed the PRIA to revisit the Action Research Document with the inputs and suggestions made in today's meeting and come out with a revised doc-ument and submit the same to NITI Aayog. The document would be vital and would have the potential to bring about a paradigm shift in local self gov-

ernance in the State, he stated.

Dr Tandon, in his closing remarks, hailed the coming together of the Mayor and Deputy Mayor and the officials of RM&DD on a common plat-

unique to Sikkim and some-thing exemplary. He observed that the process of local self governance in Sikkim is far more progressive and effective compared to other states. He stressed that participative planning can become a very important vehicle for develor ment. He suggested creating a culture of planning the activities and subsequent review to assess the progress. Planning and review should go hand in hand to achieve the desired results, he explained. He called for making the planning process more participatory by involving all the stakeholders.

The meeting concluded with vote of thanks address by Gautam Mazumdar from PRIA, Sikkim.

The event had the participation of Deputy Mayor-GMC, Lassey Doma Bhutia, senior officers of RM&DD, senior officers of Human Resource Development Department and Animal Husbandry Department, Pro-fessor of Political Science from Sikkim University, and officers from PRIA, New Delhi.

#### Divided in Suspicion

Anyone can deal in whispers, it takes leaders to deliver coherence

It is worrying how discussions on communalism continue to remain in circulation and of how often different sections and groups keep crying wolf, painting monsters only they see and hyperventilating over threats only they perceive. After all, into how many slivers can a population of barely 6 lakh people be divided? Of course, with some sections, the divisions are a simple two-way process of "us" and "them", and that is a disturbing condition to suffer because that reduces every disagreement into an attack, every counter argument into an attempt to deny or subvert.

To begin with, let us not deny that divisions ex-

ist within the Sikkimese society. That much is natural, but what has also been exceptionally reassuring about the State is that the privately held prejudices have not been allowed by the people to pour out in public displays of communal posturing; at least not a scale that causes any more damage than hurt feelings. The State, despite some close calls, has never suffered a communal clash. Its politics and several politicians have often succumbed to communalism, but the people have performed much better. The politics of social engineering, of stitching together winning vote-bank combinations have also been tried, and have, thankfully failed as well in Sikkim.

But, if people are resistant to communal confrontations, why is the bogey raised so often in Sikkim? Perhaps because it is an easy divide to hack away at and experience elsewhere has shown that the people's defenses eventually crumble in the face of persistent communal scare-mongering. Given that everyone belongs to some community or the other, it is an accepted fact that people are also inherently communal, at least in as much as having a soft corner, if not hate, is concerned. Also, because we are social animals, this inherent communal streak seldom develops into paranoia or gets directed against other communities because in a small place like Sikkim everyone needs everyone else. This conditioning of so-cial grooming, however, gets stressed when the lead-er of a pack smells blood – the possibility of making an issue emotive and convincing a people that they are threatened. Few things move off the counter faster than a fabricated conspiracy theory. The more dramatic the fabrication, the more looming is the threat perception. Years of shepherding a disinterested public has honed the skills of these leaders and they are only aided by the blunted perspicacity of the people. People share the blame of allowing space for such voices which keep growing in belligerence because no one holds them to account.

One must realise that India has perhaps the best most detailed Constitution at hand for the protection of its minorities. Ironically, the minorities still feel perpetually threatened in our country. It is unlikely that any minority was ever threatened as a state policy in the past: it was the majority they feared. As time passed, this suspicion fermented into animosity and now teeters on the brink of hatred. When one weighs in the current environment where hate crimes result often from the not so subtle nudging from the new powers in Delhi, one shudders to think what madness still awaits the country. One needs to ask who allowed such hate and such suspicions to get so normal? Surely not the people, because they are too preoccupied with aam-aadmi concerns. It's the leaders who failed us. This deduction holds as true for Sikkim as it does for the nation.

Those claiming to represent communities started becoming instigators instead of counselors. These leaders forget that democracy offers people the right to self-determination, the right to negotiate, the right to harmonise. Instead, they allowed their supporters only the options of complaint, bickering and suspi-cion. Someone who speaks for a community should bridge the communication gap between communities. Anyone can deal in whispers, but it takes a leader to represent a cause and mediate.

### NEIGRIHMS: A Privilege or Entitlement?

N o other healthcare provider is written about as much as the North East Indira Gandhi Regional Institute of Health and Medical Sciences (NEI-GRIHMS). This is good because the management of this critical care centre can remain on their toes and not take things for granted. Sadly every central institution located here, however noble its intent. tends to fall by the wayside because of bureaucratic red tape, control by New Delhi and lack of leadership and vision required to run such institutions.

A public institution whether it be a medical and health infrastructure or a university or a power supply utility are publicly-owned. This means they are funded from the public exchequer. Hence the public need to actively engage with these institutions and hold them to account. The institutions on their part should not feel that the public are encroaching on their rights when they raise questions or critique the institutions. In fact public criticism and CAG reports are the only two elements that can keep institutions on the right track.

The fact that NEIGRIHMS is overburdened with patients from across the seven states, including Assam, Manipur and Tripura which have their own medical colleges, means that the health care institutions in the above states are not functioning well or that NEIGRIHMS has established itself as a leader in some critical departments. I have met with several patients and their relatives who lodge at some of the guest houses/hotels and asked them why they have come all the way here and whether they have reliable health care facilities in their own states. The standard reply one gets is that the Car-diology Department of NEIGRIHMS is well known and has saved many lives. Some may disagree but the fact remains that the Cardiology Department is the flagship Department of NEIGRIHMS. Personally, I have only been to the Orthopaedics Department and found things to be working well here too. At one time I was given a guided tour of the Radiology Department and saw state of the art MRI and CT Scan machines including a modern X-Ray unit.
One is impressed by the availability of such modern diagnostics services provided free of cost. My immediate concern was whether this is sustainable in the long run and if NEIGRIHMS has a rev enue model for maintenance and repair of these machines if they do go kaput which is inevitable with such a huge population of patients requiring their services on a daily basis. I also learnt that the armed forces stationed in Shillong, also come to NEIGRIHMS for treatment and diagnosis. My question is: What about the Military Hospitals? Are they not able to cater to their own personnel? Can civil-ians get treatment at Military Hospitals? Similarly, should the armed forces personnel crowd a health facility meant for civilians?

Lest I be accused of leaving out other Depart-

ments of NEIGRIHMS which also play yeoman's role in patient care, let me also place on record that the Departments of Medicine, Surgery, Gynaecology and Urology also have their aces and each is trying to perform to the best of its ability. There is a palliative care centre for cancer patients too which you would not see in a private hospital. Even if there is a palliative care unit in a private hospital you would have to pay through the nose. In fact, private hospitals today have become so mercenary that they automatically weed out those who are not capable of paying and cater only to the affluent. I often wonder how such exploitative models are encouraged in a poor country like India, and, what are the corporate social responsibilities (CSR) engaged in by private hospitals. It would be enlightening if we could see this in the public domain.

Coming back to NEIGRIHMS, it would be fair say that every director who came in tried to do his best but a health and research centre requires a breadth of vision that few possess, least of all doctors coming in from the government sector. They have simply implemented blueprints coming from the top and mainly from bureaucrats or technocrats whose brief ends only with the brick and mortar part of the institution but not its heart - caring, healing and preventing illness. At one time NEIGRIHMS was supervised by the Prime Minister's Office (PMO) because it took too long to kickstart. Now it is back with the Union Health Ministry which again is a problem since many of the things that directors would like to see implemented are killed by red tape. If NEIGRIHMS is ostensibly mod-eled along AIIMS, Delhi then why is it not given the autonomy that AIIMS enjoys?

Recently there have been news reports and letters to this newspaper complaining that the X-Ray unit gets heated up and patients and their attendants are kept waiting for hours. This means that there are not enough X-Ray units or that patients have far exceeded the numbers envisaged. I wonder how the Director is tackling this emergency be-cause that is what it is. There are too many people in this country who cannot afford private health care. Government institutions will therefore continue to be overburdened. But this also means that NEIGRIHMS should speak out and tell us the exact position. Sweeping the dirt under the carpet will not help anyone!

I recently met the Director Dr Thappa who informed that he had kept a complaint/suggestion box outside his office so that complaints are addressed within the Institution instead of people running to media for every grievance. And that is a problem I wish to address in this article. NEI-GRIHMS belongs to the public of this region. Instead of rushing to the media why don't patients and their relatives meet the Director and lay out their grievances before him? On his part the Director is expected to be empathetic and not defensive.

Heads of Institutions need to be exposed to the public so that they learn firsthand what is ailing the Institution. Every institution also has its share of internal politics. Where two or more individuals live and work together politics is inevitable but it need not be destructive. The Director is expected to embrace all shades of opinions and to set standards of behaviour that can be emulated by juniors and peers. Every institution also has its ethical standards which all are expected to follow, including the head of the institution.

The Director also informed that a 250 bedded. cancer unit and medical college is coming up adja-cent to the administrative complex. This will be a great boon to the people of the region since cancer is a growing concern across states. However, what is worrying is the menu in the NEIGRIHMS canteen from where patients and their relatives usually get their food from. Since Dr Thappa joined the Institute, the canteen has stopped serving non-vegetarian cuisine. I brought this to the attention of Dr Thappa but he brushed the concern aside saying that no such directives were given to the canteen management. But the menu I managed to procure tells the real story. There is vegetable momo, vegetable patties, vegetable paratha and cup noodles (this last one is an unhealthy food item). The rest are cakes and muffins all of which have very little nutritional value and are not diabetic-friendly. The people of this region are not vegetarian by culinary choice. They get their proteins from meat. While it may be difficult for canteens to provide a choice of meat, they can at least serve fish and chicken which are normal fare. I can't understand why a new menu should be introduced with the joining of a new Director.

Finally, as to whether NEIGRIHMS is an entitlement or a privilege, I would like to believe it is both. It is a privilege that we now have access to the best treatment within the region and don't have to flock to Vellore, Delhi, Mumbai or Chennai for medical care. It saves time, money and undue stress for the patient and his/her family. As an entitlement, we get free or subsidized diagnostic facilities and treatment. Medicines may not be completely free but they are sold at rates that are lesser than mark-

Considering that NEIGRIHMS caters to the people of all eight states, it is incumbent upon all state chief ministers to take interest in this Institute and help it in its journey. Similarly, the Members of Parliament from the region ought to show a sense of ownership too and engage with the Union Government to give a fillip to NEIGHRIMS. As of today, NEIGRIHMS is an orphan out of whom much is expected but very little is given by the public.

## The history of the persecution of Myanmar's Rohingya

Some 420,000 Rohingya Muslims, a religious and ethnic minority community in Myanmar, have fled to neighboring Bangladesh since August this year.

The United Nations has called the Rohingya the world's most persecuted minority group and described the atrocities by Myanmar's authorities as 'ethnic cleansing," whereby one group removes an-

Other ethnic or religious community through violence.
But the persecution of the Rohingya is not new.
My research on the Rohingya Muslim experience in Myanmar shows that this pattern of persecution goes back to 1948 – the year when the country achieved independence from their British colonizers.

Here is their brief history

#### THE LEGACY OF COLONIALISM

The British ruled Myanmar (then Burma) for over century, beginning with a series of wars in 1824.

Colonial policies encouraged migrant labor in order to increase rice cultivation and profits. Many Rohingya entered Myanmar as part of these policies in the 17th century. According to census records, between 1871 to 1911, the Muslim population tripled.

The British also promised the Rohingya separate land – a "Muslim National Area" – in exchange for support. During the Second World War, for example, the Rohingya sided with the British while Myanmar's nationalists supported the Japanese. Following the war, the British rewarded the Rohingya with prestigious government posts. However, they were not en an autonomous state.

In 1948, when Myanmar achieved independence from the British, violent conflicts broke out among various segments of its more than one hundred eth-

DECADES-LONG PERSECUTION
After independence, the Rohingya asked for the promised autonomous state, but officials rejected their request. Calling them foreigners, they also denied them citizenship.

These animosities continued to grow. Many in Myanmar saw the Rohingya as having benefited from colonial rule. A nationalist movement and Buddhist religious revival further contributed to the growing

In 1950, some Rohingya staged a rebellion against the policies of the Myanmar government. They demanded citizenship; they also asked for the state that had been promised them. Ultimately the

army crushed the resistance movement. Much like today's terrorists, the rebels at the time were called "Mujahid" or engaged in "struggle" or "jihad." It is important to point out that the interna-tional community has never agreed on how to define "terrorism." The legal definition could vary by country as politics dictates its contours. As scholar Ben Saul says, officials can use its meaning as a weapon against even valid political rivals. The lack of consensus, as Saul argues, reflects disagreement about what

lence is legitimate, when and by whom.

In 1962, just over a decade later, a military coup culminated in a one-party military state where demcoratic governance was woefully lacking. During the next 60 years of military rule, things worsened for the Rohingya. The authorities saw the minority group as a threat to nationalist identity.

Calling them foreigners, the army killed, tortured and raped. They closed Rohingya social and political organizations. They also transfered private Rohingya businesses to the government, debilitating the group financially. Further, the Rohingya suffered forced labor, arbitrary detention and physical assaults. In 1991 and 1992, more than 250,000 attempted to escape to Bangladesh.

ROHINGYA 'STATELESSNESS'
In 1977, when the army launched a national drive to register citizens, the Rohingya were considered illegal. More than 200,000 Rohingya fled to Bangladesh at the time because of further atrocities. Authorities pointed to their flight as purported evidence of their illegal status.

The Citizenship Act of Myanmar, enacted in 1982. formally denied the group citizenship rights. This law required that a person's ancestors belong to a national race or group present in Myanmar prior to British rule in 1823, to become a citizen. The Rohing-ya were still classified as illegal immigrants allowed in by British colonizers. As Human Rights Watch has noted, however, their presence actually dates back to

Today, the Rohingya are the single largest "state-less" community in the world. Their "statelessness" or lack of citizenship increases their vulnerability because they are not entitled to any legal protection from the government.

Without citizenship, they are deprived of basic rights such as access to health services, education and employment. The illiteracy rate among the Rohingya, for example, is a staggering 80 percent.

Additionally, they have been denied the right to

worship freely. They also face restrictions on the right to marry, move freely and own property be-

cause of their religious and ethnic identity. Even though Rohingya population growth has slowed down, anxieties not only persist but are codified in law: Rohingya couples are allowed no more than two children.

Those who break the law risk imprisonment, and the government blacklists their children. Without legal status, they cannot go to school, travel or buy property. The police can also arrest and imprison them.

THE CURRENT CRISIS

Despite Myanmar's recent democratic transition, the persecution persists.

The current humanitarian catastrophe ostensibly legan with an assault on police posts by the Arakan Rohingya Salvation Army, a new insurgency group.

Rohingya refugees in Bangladesh told Human Rights Watch that Myanmar government forces had carried out armed attacks, and burned down their homes. In addition, they beheaded men, raped women and murdered children. Tens of thousands of Ro-hingya have become internally displaced. Even prior to this crisis, 120,000 displaced Rohingya had been

living in internment camps.

Amnesty International said there were indications that authorities in Myanmar have also placed illegal landmines at locations commonly used by refugees Among those killed were two children. What is more, international humanitarian aid has been blocked, preventing necessities like food, water and medicine from reaching a quarter of a million people.

#### AUNG SAN SUU KYI AND HUMAN RIGHTS

The Myanmar Army, meanwhile, denies any wrong-doing. Despite the global outcry, they claim to be conducting "counterterrorism" operations. Due to the severity of the human rights crisis, however, the British government decided to stop its defense en-gagement and training of the military in Myanmar.

None of this criticism, however, has made Aung San Suu Kyi, Myanmar's de facto leader and Nobel laureate, acknowledge the plight of the Rohingya. Amid international criticism, she recently canceled her visit to this week's IJN General Assembly in New York. In her speech to Myanmar's parliament, she denied that there had been any "armed clashes or clearance operations" since September 5, this year

Tragically, her actions signal there will be no end to the persecution of Rohingya anytime soo

### People of hills will not forgive Tamang: Bimal Gurung





Darjeeling (WB), Sep 26 (PTI): GJM supremo Bimal Gurung today said the people of the hills will not forgive expelled GIM leader Binay Tamang for "betraying" their aspirations.

The West Bengal government appointed Board of Administrators (BoA) of the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration (GTA) met for the first time yesterday under the

chairmanship of Tamang.
The meeting had decided to carry out a special audit of GTA, that was headed by Gurung for last five years.

The indefinite shutdown in

the hills over the demand for a separate state of Gorkhaland today entered its 104th day. "The Gorkhas will not for-

give Tamang for playing into the hands of the state government and betraying the aspirations of the people of the hills. He has compromised with the cause of Gorkhaland," Gurung said in a message

He warned that the agitation will turn violent if the Centre does not convene a tripartite talk within next week.

"I will wait for one more week for the Centre to initiate talks. If it does not happen we will decide our next course of

turn violent," Gurung said. Meanwhile, in view of normalcy returning to Darjeeling hills the state administration last night decided to lift the restrictions on use on internet services, which was imposed on June 18.

The internet ban was on in

the hills for 100 days.

Several shops and markets in the hills opened during the day despite threats and intimidation by GJM activists.

Darjeeling district administration said that over 85 per cent of the shops in the hills

The puja organisers have shot a three-part short film and are beaming it outside the pandal to catch the eye of the thousands of pandal hoppers. Titled 'Upachare Bandi' (bound by rituals), the short film is a rundown of social contradictions.

"This is a short film a three-part presentation before thousands of puja revellers - featuring three women belonging to different age groups who find their wishes dashed and movement fettered by certain societal norms

and rituals. So, while on the one hand we are cel-ebrating 'Stree Shakti' we are not allowing women in the families to participate citing certain norms

"Upachare Bandi brings out this inherent hypocrisy in society where the invocation of the mother goddess follows a series of rituals which at times prevent women from par-ticipating in the festival in certain situations," one of the two directors. Aritrik Bhattacharyya said.

The film is a collage. In one bit, a teen girl who has been counting down for the past several months to offer 'Pushpanjali' on Mahashtami day is suddenly asked by her mother not to visit the neighbourhood puja pan-dal as she had menstruated, the other director Arkamoy Datta Majumder said.

In the two bits - a married woman is asked not to visit the pandal during the time of 'Pushpanjali' as the maid has not turned up and an elderly woman has to shelve her plans to meet other members of her group at the puja pandal as her son and daughter-in-law asks to look after her child

Bhowmick, a iournalist working with a local television channel, was covering a clash between the Indigenous People's Front of Tripura (IPFT) and the Tripura Rajyer Upajati Ganamukti Parishad, the tribal wing of the CPI(M), at Mandai when he was hit from behind and abducted.

Later, Bhowmick was found with serious stab injuries and was taken to Agartala Medical College and Hospital where doctors declared him 'brought dead'.

### ICC's new playing rules to come into effect on Thursday

DUBAI, SEP 26 (PTI): Players being sent off for misconduct is all set to become a reality in cricket with the ICC's revamped playing rules, which will be effective in all series starting Sep-

tember 28 or later.
The significant changes also include a restriction on the dimensions of the bat, and changes to the Decision Review System. However, the ongoing India-Australia limited-overs series will continue to be played as per the old rules.

All of these rules will come into effect from the two upcoming Test series - when South Africa host Bangladesh and Pakistan take on Sri Lanka in the United Arab Emirates

The ICC playing conditions will now incorporate the relevant claus-es from the MCC Laws of Cricket (2017 Code). meaning that all the play-ing regulations will be captured in one document for each format.

"Most of the changes to

the ICC playing conditions are being made as a result of changes to the Laws of Cricket that have been announced by the MCC. We have just completed a workshop with the umpires to ensure they un-derstand all of the changes and we are now ready to introduce the new playing conditions to international matches," ICC General Manager (Cricket) Geoff Allardice said.

To maintain the balance between bat and ball, the size of the edges of the bats as well as their thickness will now be restricted.

"The restriction on the length and width of bats remain unchanged but the thickness of the edges can't be more than 40mm and the overall depth can be 67 mm at be issued with a new bat gauge, which they can use to check a bat's legality," the ICC stated.

In a new playing condi-tion pertaining to players' conduct, a player can now be sent off the field for the rest of the match for any serious misconduct.

"...meaning it will apply to Level 4 offences while the Level 1 to 3 offences will continue to be dealt with under the ICC Code of Conduct," it said.

"Threatening to sault an umpire, making inappropriate and de erate physical contact with an umpire, physically assaulting a player or any other person and committing any other act of violence all constitute Level 4 offences," it added.

Also, in the new the DRS rules a review will now not be lost in case of a decision that remains unchanged, solely as the result of an 'umpire's call'.

"As for DRS in Test

matches, there will be no more top-up reviews after 80 overs of an innings, meaning that there can only be two unsuccessful reviews in each innings, while the DRS will now also be allowed to be used in T20Is."

"An important change with respect to runouts is that if a batsman is running or diving towards the crease with forward momentum. and grounded his/her bat behind the popping crease but subsequently lost contact with the ground at the time of the wickets being put down, the bats-man will not be run out."

The same interpretation will also apply for a batsman trying to regain his/her ground to avoid

being stumped.
For boundary catches, airborne fielders making their first contact with the ball will need to have taken off from within the boundary, otherwise a boundary will be scored.

Besides, a batsman can now be out caught, stumped or run out even if the ball bounces off the helmet worn by a fielder or wicket-keeper.

Defence Minister Nirmala Sitharaman and her US counterpart James Mattis held comprehensive talks covering the entire

UN says 480,000 in latest

Rohingya exodus to Bangladesh

Cox's Bazar (Bangla-DESH), SEP 26 (AFP): Some 480,000 Rohingya Muslims have fled to Bangladesh since violence broke out in Myanmar on August 25, the United Nations said today, increas ing its estimate by 45,000 in two days.

A report by UN agencies and international charities said the change was due "in large part" to an estimated 35,000 Rohingya moving into two refugee camps who had not been accounted for before. It also said numbers crossing the border had started to rise again.

The UN gave a figure of 435,000 Rohingya arrivals on Saturday.

"The situation in our neighbourhood and the growing menace of cross-border terrorism were discussed in depth. There is growing convergence in the approaches of both our countries on this issue," Sitharaman said at a joint press conference.

She said both sides recognise the importance of holding those who use terrorism as an instrument of state policy to account

and to dismantle the infrastructure that supports terrorism.
On his part, Mattis said there

can be "no tolerance to terrorism safe havens" He also welcomed India's contribution in war-torn Afghanistan.

India, one of the largest con-tributors in Afghanistan where it in involved in several development projects, however, has ruled out troops contribution amidst the US emphasis for a

greater participation by the country in the conflict-ridden Islamic nation.

"We have made it clear that there shall not be boots from India on the ground (Afghan)," Sitharaman said while responding to a query on whether India will contribute troops in Afghanistan.

Sitharaman also said that Mattis has assured her that he will raise with Pakistan the issue of terrorism emanating from there.



Bali's highest volcano is showing "greater than ever" seismic activity with hundreds of tremors recorded daily, authorities have said, signalling that eruption could be imminent. Clouds have shrouded the top of Mount Agung, which is now said to have entered a "critical phase" as seismic activity increases. More than 75,000 people have fled the surrounding area and a 7.5 mile (12km) exclusion zone has been established around the volcano. The Indonesian national disaster agency (BNPB) said there had been more than 560 deep volcanic earthquakes recorded on Monday alone. In a statement on its website it said an increase in the frequency of the tremors indicated magma was moving towards the surface, and that the "number of earthquake events is greater than ever".

### Smugglers preying on fossils in Narmada valley, officials suspect

INDORE, SEP 26 (PTI): After recovering a large number of tree fossils kept on a government land, the Madhya Pradesh Forest Department suspects that smugglers are removing them from the Narmada valley in neigh-

bouring Dhar district. Forest Ranger Rajesh Chauhan today said, "It appears that the fossils seized on Sunday from a government land at Avral in Manawar tehsil were hidden there to avoid detection by government agencies.

They were carefully hidden under a pile of wood."

Unidentified smugglers were apparently waiting for an opportunity to ship the cache elsewhere, Chauhan told PTI.

An organised gang was suspected to be involved in the smuggling, he said, adding that the seized fossils were sent to the National Dinosaur Fossil Park in Bagh area.

The Forest Department has

scattered in the area so as to prevent their smuggling. It is also trying to create awareness among local people about this invaluable legacy. Chauhan said.

Vishal Verma, head of Man-Panchayatan Council, an NGO which conducts research on fossils in the Narmada valley, claimed that the seized tree fossils

are about seven crore years old.

"Fossils of aquatic creatures and dinosaurs are also found in Dhar district. They

are under threat in the absence of government protection and lack of awareness among peo-ple," he said.

Smugglers from Maharashtra and Gujarat steal fossils and sell them in international mar-

kets at a high price, said Verma.
Three fossilised dinosaur eggs
were stolen in 2014 from a museum near Mandu and haven't been recovered so far, he said, adding that there should be a separate

## Delhi HC dismisses Honeypreet's transit anticipatory bail plea

New Delhi, Sep 26 (PTI): The Delhi High Court to day dismissed the transit anticipatory bail plea of Honeypreet Insan, facing charges of sedition and inciting violence after the conviction of Dera Sacha Sauda chief Ram Rahim in twin rape cases.

The court's order was based on the grounds that she has been evading arrest and hence was not entitled to any discretionary relief.

While passing the order, Justice Sangita Dhingra Sehgal also said that the bail plea was filed in Delhi to buy time and delay the proceedings going on in a Panch-lula court in Haryana.



The high court had reserved the order on the bail plea of the 36-yearold woman after hearing the arguments of her counsel and those of the Delhi and Harvana Police

earlier in the day.

During the hearing, the high court had questioned Honeypreet for filing an anticipatory bail before it even though she was a permanent resident of Haryana and told her "the easiest way out is that you surrender"

The plea was vehemently opposed by the counsel for Delhi and

Haryana Police who said it was "a ploy to do 'fo-rum shopping'" and, by giving a wrong address of a Delhi property, she was "hoodwinking" the court.

Ram Rahim was convicted by the special CBI court in Panchkula on August 25, following which violence and arson had erupted in Panch-kula and Sirsa districts of Harvana which had claimed 41 lives and left several others injured.

### China disrupts WhatsApp ahead of Communist Party meeting

BEIJING, SEP 26 (AFP): Chinese authorities appear to have severely disrupted the WhatsApp messaging app in the latest step to tighten censorship as they prepare for a major Communist Party congress next month.

Users in China have reported widespread disruptions in recent days to the Facebook-owned service, which previously malfunctioned in the country over the summer.

Experts said problems began on Sunday, but text messaging, voice calls and video calls appeared to be working again today, though voice messages and photos were not going through.

WhatsApp provides essage encryption message technology that likely does not please Chinese authorities, which close-ly monitor and restrict cyberspace through their 'Great Firewall".

Many Chinese activ-ists favour WhatsApp over local messaging apps because of its end-to-end encryption function. China has tightened

online policing this year, enacting new rules that require tech companies to store user data inside the country as well as imposing restrictions on what is

permissible content.
Chinese cyberspace
regulators said yesterday they slapped "maximum" fines on major Chinese tech firms Baidu and Tencent for allowing the publication of pornographic, violent and other sorts of banned material on their social media platforms. The amount of the fines

Websites such as Facebook, Twitter, Pinterest and a slew of for-eign media have been blocked for years.

The WhatsApp troubles emerged ahead of the Communist Party congress on October 18. when President Xi Jin-ping is expected to be given a second five-year term as the party's general secretary.

"It smells like Party

congress pre-emptive blocking," said Jason Ng, who researches China's internet at the Citizen Lab at the University of Toronto.

China usually steps surveillance around major events, Ng said.

While the WeChat messaging app owned by China's Tencent company is more widely used in the country, many WhatsApp users complained about the disruptions.

"As we get closer to Party congress, I think authorities will use more extreme censor-ship measures. The public knows that WeChat isn't safe," prominent Beijing-based activist Hu Jia told AFP.

"Me and other dissi-

dents use WhatsApp to communicate 70 per cent of the time. For the few days WhatsApp was com-pletely inaccessible, we didn't talk at all," Hu said.

Earlier this month, WeChat informed its users in a new privacy policy that it would "retain, preserve or disclose" users' data to "comply with applicable laws or regulations" -- confirming long-held public assumptions about the company's practices.
Other users in China

noted that the WhatsApp disruptions would ma it difficult to work with clients abroad

"Facebook, Twit-ter, Gmail, Viber were blocked before. Now even WhatsApp is blocked? Without good messaging tools, it will reduce the efficiency of the foreign trade industry," wrote one person on Weibo, China's Twitter-like social media website.

"I can live without the others (applications), but blocking WhatsApp is driving me crazy," said another. WhatsApp declined

to comment.

The Open Observato-ry of Network Interference, a global censorship detection group, said China started blocking WhatsApp on Sunday.
To operate in China,

some foreign tech companies have complied with local regulations. But others such as Google have chosen to pull completely mainland China.

In July, Apple re-moved software allowing internet users to skirt China's "Great Firewall" from its app store in the country, drawing criti-cism that it was bowing to Beijing's ever-growing web censorship.

Such software, called virtual private networks (VPN), allow people in China to access any web-site, even those that are blocked.

Beijing mandated in January that all developers must obtain govern-ment licences to offer VPNs and there has been concern that it might ban them outright.

### GST, economic slowdown hit Durga Puja sponsorships: Organisers

KOLKATA, SEP 26 (PTI): The combined impact of the Goods and Services Tax and a general slow-down in the economy has hit sponsorships for Durga Puja this year, organisers said.

"This year, due to slowdown in the economy there was pressure in getting sponsors and ad-vertisers. Moreover, corporate sponsors are de-ducting 18 per cent GST, resulting in a huge blow to our budgets," an official of the puja commit-

tee of Ballygunj Cultural Association, told PTI.
Prior to the roll-out

of GST, puja sponsorships were out of the tax ambit (value-added tax), the official said. Another official of

Hindustan Park Durga Puja, Sutapa Das, said, "We do not know what is the reason but advertisers were not forthcoming this season. Perhaps GST and slowdown (economic) are to blame.

Jaygobind Indoria, a member of the Md. Ali

Park Durga Puja committee, said, there has been an impact on advertise ment tariffs this year.

Close to 3.000 small and medium puja committees are organising Durga Pujas this year. Meanwhile, small re

tailers of garments said sales have been lower by at least 15-20 per cent during this festive season, as GST resulted in higher cost of procurement.

There is some lack of clarity about the new taxa tion system, too, they said.
