Steps to deal with rising petrol, diesel prices likely this week

New Delhi, May 22 (PTI): With record fuel prices creating a "crisis situation", the government will work on an appropriate solution to ease the burden on common man, top officials said.

While Oil Minister Dharmendra Pradhan stated that he has aired concerns about high oil prices, a senior official said the government will come out with "some steps" this week to deal with record high petrol

and diesel rates.
"I have loudly spoken about concerns (about high oil prices)," Pradhan said, adding that "appropriate steps" will be tak-

en. He did not elaborate. Indian Oil Corp (IOC) Chairman Sanjiy Singh said there is no direction from the government for moderating prices and the three week hiatus before the Karnataka poll was to avoid sharp spike in retail rates.

"We believed that fundamentals did not support such sharp spikes witnessed so we decided to moderate prices," he told press conference on the fourth quarter earnings.

Asked what changed their mind, he said fuel retailing runs on narrow margins and no company can continue to sell at below cost for long.

The government may not rely only on cutting excise duty, which makes up for a fourth of the re-tail selling price, said the official cited earlier, but he too did not elaborate on the various steps being considered.

ernment and it has to be handled with combination of steps. Finance ministry is consulting the petroleum ministry on rising crude prices," he said.

More than a week after the state-owned oil firms ended a 19-day pre-Karnataka poll hiatus on revising fuel prices, petrol and diesel rates have touched record highs. Petrol costs Rs 76.87 per litre in Delhi and diesel costs Rs 68.08 a litre. In last nine days, petrol price has risen by Rs 2.24 a litre and diesel by Rs 2.15.

Rates vary from state to state depending on the incidence of local sales tax or VAT. The prices in Delhi are the cheapest among all metros and

among all metros and most state capitals. The official said the government has to be mindful of its fiscal maths while dealing with the option of cutting excise duty.

"We cannot rely on excise duty cut alone, al-though I am not ruling out a possibility of cutting excise duty. We have to be mindful of any fiscal impact of any excise cut

on fuel," the official said.

Both the Centre and states, where VAT makes up for 20-35 per cent of the retail cost and have gained from the rising oil prices, need to take measures, he said.

"Some steps to deal with rising oil prices are likely to come this week," he added.

The rupee, which has fallen to 16-month low of 67.97 against the US dollar, is also playing a role in high oil bill, he said.

IOC Chairman said the companies have freedom to revive prices and they took a call in the best interest of consumers.

The central govern ment levies Rs 19.48 a litre of excise duty on pet-rol and Rs 15.33 per litre on diesel. State sales tax or VAT varies from state to state. Unlike excise duty, VAT is ad valorem and results in higher revenues for the state when

rates move up.
In Delhi, VAT on petrol was Rs 15.84 a litre, and Rs 9.68 on diesel in April. Today it is Rs 16.34 on petrol and Rs 10.02 a litre on diesel.

Every rupee cut in excise duty on petrol and diesel will result in a rev-enue loss of Rs 13,000 crore.

The government had raised excise duty nine times between November 2014 and January 2016 to shore up finance es as global oil prices fell. but then cut the tax just once in October last year by Rs 2 a litre.

Subsequent to that excise duty reduction, the Centre had asked states to also lower VAT. Just four of them -- Maharashtra, Gujarat, Madhya Pradesh and Himachal Pradesh -- reduced rates while others including BJP-ruled ones ignored the call.

In all, duty on pet-rol rate was hiked by Rs 11.77 per litre and that on diesel by 13.47 a litre in those 15 months that helped government's excise mop up more than double to Rs 2,42,000 crore in 2016-17 from Rs 99,000 crore in 2014-15.





Indifference Begets Resentment

The young are suffering, but we withhold involvement

 $\mathbf{A}^{\mathrm{workshop}}$ on "Understanding the Drug Abuse Situation in Sikkim: Problems and Solutions" put together some while ago offered some interesting insights which, unfortunately, continue to remain ignored. While there was nothing new in the alarm that was raised about the situation created by substances of abuse, what should get the alarm bells ringing is the impression the young appear to have developed about the societal response to this very clear and present

There was near unanimity among the young that among the leading triggers behind making addicts out of the youth was the breakdown of the family unit compounded by lack of options to occupy the leisure hours, uninspiring education, boring classrooms, easy access to substances of abuse and general societal disinterest in collaborating to find a solution beyond the law enforcement approach. Tease these issues a bit, and one is confronted with the thread which runs through all these issues - a lack of engagement and a refusal to get involved. The data collected by the students revealed that a majority of the addicts came from broken families or experienced discord at home. Pause with this situation a bit and one has to accept that family problems do not necessarily lead one to addiction but the absence of involved parenting creates the environment in which experimenting with substance abuse becomes easier to get away with. And it is the same lack of involvement which expands out of the family and into the society and governance which leaves them with nothing to do when they are free or makes buying "stuff" easier and delivers us a situation where only the government has stepped up to combat substance abuse by legislating a law – Sikkim Anti-Drugs Act – and now backing the SAATHI engagement at the schools, but the society at large remains unmoved and uninterested in addressing the problem.

What is worse, the young notice that everyone realizes that substance abuse has become a problem, hence the continuing refusal to engage becomes even more confounding for them. The involvement vacuum is something they cannot wrap their heads around, and this cannot bode well for Sikkim because this means that an entire generation – not just the addicts but also their peers - is growing up with a possible sense of re-sentment, noticing how indifferent the elders around

them have remained to what they are facing.

A class XI student who kicked the habit thanks to friends who are part of the SAATHI initiative and a Principal who responded with more than reprimand and expulsion when addiction was detected, shared that it took him nearly a year since he resolved to get help, to actually seek it. And this at a school which has a very effective counseling and support system already in place! Imagine what it must be like in environments where stigma is the only response a teenager dealing with addiction is confronted with?

The only ray of hope in all this apathy comes from the young themselves. Students from a clutch of senior secondary schools have developed impressively sensitive explanations and solutions for the problem reveal none of the shallow condescension one sees in the more grown-up efforts at trying to address the substance abuse problem. They display an empathy which one finds sorely missing from the society at large and through SAATHI, have been invested with a confidence which will hold them in good stead throughout their lives and also equip them with the faculties to actually do something concrete about this problem in later years. Meanwhile, the least that the generation above them can do is begin searching for that dormant instinct to get involved. Do not do so and the younger generation when it comes of age will not care about

Flat Earthers vs climate change sceptics: why conspiracy theorists keep contradicting each other

Flat Earthism and the idea that human activity man activity is not responsible for climate change are two of the most prevalent conspiracy theories today. Both have been increasing in popularity since the late 20th century. Currently, 16% of the US population say they doubt the scientifically estab lished shape of the Earth, while 40% think that human-induced climate change is a hoax. But proponents of one of these theories are not neces-sarily proponents of the other, even though both are often motivated by a common mistrust of authority. In fact, they regularly contradict one another.

Flat Earthers, for example, tend to disbelieve organisations such as NASA on the shape of Antarctica – or indeed, that there is a southern hemisphere at all. Yet the president of the Flat Earth Society, Daniel Shenton, is quite convinced – presumably at least in part thanks to information from NASA – that climate change is happening and espouses a fairly con-ventional view on the subject. Former White House communi-

cations director, Anthony Scaramucci (dismissed by president Trump after ten days in office), meanwhile, beieves that the Earth is in fact round. but does not believe in anthropogenic climate change, as he made clear in an interview with CNN.
Such selective reasoning is com-

mon among conspiracy theorists who often lack consistency with one other. Despite this, the media, celebrities and even politicians regularly make broad comparisons between climate change scepticism, Flat Earthism and other conspiracy theorie

FABRICATED DATA?
In the field of global climate change, scientific bodies often are accused, even by those in power, of fabricating data. But such criticism is often deeply flawed. Take those sceptics, for example, who believe that climate change is occurring, but because of natural - rather than man-made causes. If one argues that data has



been fabricated to show warming where there is none, one cannot then also imply that warming is occurring after all, but naturally. Either there is warming or there is not. Similarly, Flat Earthers who state that images showing Earth's curvature are due to the shape of a camera lens, them-selves believe in a disc which by defi-

nition has a curved edge.
Indeed, one of the few common alities which exist between all major conspiracy theories is that somehow scientists and governments are involved in a grand conspiracy for reasons unknown.

A major part of the scientific anthropogenic climate change argument is that there is an increase in temperature extremes in both summer and winter. Evidently, a Flat Earth model cannot support this; in fact, the most accepted Flat Earth model, which maintains that the sun rotates in a non-variable circular orbit over the flat disk, implies that there should be no seasons at all, let alone multi-decadal seasonal extremes due to climate change. Nevertheless, to quote Shenton:

"Climate change is a process which has been ongoing since (the) beginning of detectable history, but there seems to be a definite correla-tion between the recent increase in worldwide temperatures and man's entry into the industrial age."

In this instance, the president of

the Flat Earth Society is correct. Anthropogenic climate change sceptics, on the other hand, are often willing to accept the science behind the Earth's natural cycles, which they blame instead of human activity - for the world's weather woes. Clearly, we again find an implicit difference of opinion between a Flat Earth model, and a non-anthropogenic climate

change one.
It is also clear that many climate change sceptics believe in the (approximately) spherical Earth, even if only subconsciously, by their use of scientifically accepted global maps when discussing data – not to mention when calling it "global" warming.

AND WHAT ABOUT ALIENS?

untrustworthy and steeped in corruption, then why would one believe them on any issue? Where does the line of trust actually fall? Why would a person who mistrusts governments and scientists on the shape of the Earth, not hold the same politicians and scientific organisations similarly bogus on the issue of climate change? Or alien abductions, chem trails, or anything else?

But the problem isn't likely to go way any time soon. The US has the highest number of believers in both flat-Earthism and anthropogenic climate change scepticism, and the UK is not far behind. The US also has a high number (more than 50%) of senior political figures who deny manmade climate change, not to mention a democratically elected leader vocally believing the same. There are also numerous well-known celebrities who question the established shape of our planet.

While of course scientists can play the blame game, it could be that the scientific method itself is a major limiting factor in communicating results with the public. Science is not just a body of knowledge, but a method of

critical thinking.
Scientists, by necessity, have to communicate their findings in a certain rigid way focusing on probabili-ties, certainty values and confidence intervals. These can appear dry or baffling to the public. But by providing more easily understandable narra-tives we can make scientific discussions with the public more productive.
In today's complex world of social

media narratives, the engagement of scientists with the public is more crucial than ever. Thankfully, current funding for public engagement training and activities is accessible to scientists with a passion for communication and conversation, enabling them to communicate facts rather than "fake news

Girls thrive with women teachers: a study in Francophone Africa

Over the past few decades most advanced countries have witnessed two striking reversals of the gender gap. First, teaching has become a profession dominated by women. This is particularly true at primary school level, where 84.5% of teachers across all countries classified as "developed" by UNESCO are women.

The second reversal has been among pupils. Girls now outper-form boys in almost every educational outcome across the board they do better in terms of enrol-ment, achievement and graduation

These changes have been achieved in several ways. When a

country is in the early stages of development, there tends to be a gender gap in educational investment that favours boys. And the teaching profession in such countries is usually dominated by men. But as countries develop and incomes rise, spending be-comes more balanced and girls are able to close to even entirely reverse the gender gaps in schooling and teaching.

Such shifts are starting to occur in many devel-

oping countries. But sub-Saharan Africa, particularly in its western and central regions, is lagging behind. Women teachers are still in the minority in countries like Benin, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Chad, Congo, Ivory Coast, Niger, Senegal and

And, we discovered, this has implications for how teachers' gender influences student learning

Our study found that girls in the sixth grade – so on average around 13 years old – performed better on standardised tests in reading and maths when they are taught by women than when they are taught by men. This also has implications for how girls perform at school compared to boys. Girls



outperformed boys on the subjects under women

We found no evidence that boys' performance changed in maths whether their teachers were men or women. And in reading, boys performed a little better under female teachers than they did with male teachers.

These findings echo similar studies elsewhere in the world. They suggest that female teachers can act as role models who enhance girls' motivation and learning outcomes. The countries in our study
– and others – should work harder to ensure gen-der parity when hiring teachers. This can empower girls and improve their results

MEASURING PERFORMANCE

We analysed the standardised test scores of more than 31,000 primary school pupils in 1,800 primary schools in the Francophone nations of Benin, Burkina Faso, Burundi, Cameroon, Chad, Congo, Ivory Coast, Niger, Senegal and Togo. In 2015, only 36.9% of primary teachers in these countries were

We decided to focus on test scores, which are graded by external evaluators, as they're an objective measure of achievement. This means they

provide the best evidence of how teachers' gender affects – or doesn't – pupils' results. In addition to the data analy-

sis, we asked pupils to report back about whether they enjoyed a subject more or less when it was taught by a teacher of the same gender. So, for instance, did girls enjoy maths more with a woman teacher? The answer was "yes". Girls preferred being taught by women and their results reflected this.

ROLE MODELS
Teachers are important figures when it comes to students' gender-related attitudes towards dif-ferent school subjects. Along with parents, teachers determine the extent to which traditional academic stereotypes such as "boys are good

at maths and girls are good at reading" are passed on to future generations. Our research found that such stereotypes re-

main widespread in Francophone Africa – ever among teachers themselves. Teachers' percep tions of the relative average performance of girls versus boys in their classes often differed entirely from the reality. In particular, both male and female teachers frequently overestimate boys' maths performance.

But these perceptions don't hold girls back from outperforming boys in maths. This suggests that female teachers' presence – and the roles they model simply by being maths teachers – inspires girls, makes them more motivated to do well and improves their results.

Based on our findings, we'd suggest that poli-

cies should be developed specifically to improve gender balance in teaching in the countries we studied. Hiring more female teachers can contribute to closing educational gender gaps without hurting boys' performance. [the writer is Graduate Stu-

The Supreme Court said it would decide whether the IFC enjoyed immunity under the 1945 International Organisations Immunity Act.

Jam and other petitioners knocked the door of the Supreme Court this year after lower courts dismissed their petitions arguing that the IFC enjoyed immunity, like other foreign countries, under the 1945 International Organizations Immunity Act.

In their petition, the villagers argued that the Tata Mundra Power Plant has failed to comply with international environmental standards. This has resulted in devastation of the local environment.

"International organisations play an ever-increasing role in the economic landscape of this country and the world. Therefore, the question whether they are absolutely immune from any kind of lawsuit - no matter how strictly commercial their activities; no matter how egregious their actions; and no matter the views of the Executive Branch - has great significance," the

petitioners argued. In 2015, the applicants - Indian farmers, fishermen, a trade union of fishworkers, and a local government entity - sued the IFC in the US District Court for the District of Columbia. They brought claims for negligence, negligent supervision, public nuisance, private nuisance, trespass, and breach of contract.

The petitioners lost the case before a district court in 2016 and the US Court of Appeals for the District of Columbia in 2017. Both the courts argued that IFC enjoys

He was first elected as an MP in the 2008 general elections. Deo was re-elected to the lower house, with an increased margin, in 2013. He again won this year's election with a margin of 47,635

WASHINGTON, MAY 22 (PTI): Pakistan has raised with the World Bank the alleged violation of the Indus Waters Treaty by India, which inaugurated the Kishanganga hydro project in Kashmir, as the multilateral lender sought opportunities within the treaty to find an amicable resolution of the issue.

The four-member Pakistani delegation, led by Attorney Gener-al Ashtar Ausaf Ali, met the World Bank officials here yesterday, days after Prime Minister Narendra Modi inaugurated the 330 MW Kishanganga hydroelectric project in Jammu and Kashmir.

The inauguration of the hydroelectric project was held amid pro-tests from Pakistan which claims that the dam on a river flowing into

Pakistan will disrupt water supplies.
Pakistan's Foreign Office had, on
Friday, voiced concern over the inauguration of the hydroelectric project, saying inauguration without reso-



lution of dispute between the two countries will tantamount to violation of the Indus Waters 1960 that regulates the use of waters in the shared rivers.

"The Indus Waters Treaty is a profoundly important international agreement that provides an essential cooperative framework for India and Pakistan to address current and future challenges of effective water management to meet human achieve development needs and goals," a World Bank spokesperson

"The meetings are discussing concerns raised by the Pakistan delegation and opportunities within the

tion," the spokesperson said.

No other details about the nature of Pakistani grievances were made

available by the World Bank officials.

The discussions are scheduled to continue today.

Pakistani daily Dawn said the talks would cover four key points: the height of the dam built on the Kishanganga River, its capacity to hold water, Pakistan's demand for setting up a court of arbitration to settle the dispute and India's counter-demand for an international expert.

Islamabad had been raising objections over the design of the hydel project, saying it is not in line with the criteria laid down under the Indus Waters Treaty (IWT) between the two countries. But, India says the project design was well within parameters of the treaty.

The project, located at Bandipore in North Kashmir, envisages diversion of water of Kishan Ganga

river to underground power house through a 23.25-km-long head race tunnel to generate 1713 million units per annum.

The Kishanganga project was started in 2007 but on May 17, 2010, Pakistan moved for international arbitration against India un-der the provisions of the Indus Waters Treaty.

The Hague-based International Court of Arbitration allowed India in 2013 to go ahead with construction of the project in North Kashmir and upheld India's right under the bilateral Indus Waters Treaty to divert waters from the Kishanganga for power generation in Jammu and Kashmir.

The international court, however, decided that India shall release a minimum flow of nine cubic metres per second into the Kishanganga river (known as Neelam in Pakistan) at all times to maintain environmental

As summit looms, North Korean media return to angry tone

Korean media stepped up their rhetorical attacks on South Ko-rea and joint military exercises with the United States, warning Tuesday that a budding detente could be in danger.

State media unleashed three strongly worded commentaries slamming Seoul and Washington for the maneuvers and demanding Seoul take action against de-fectors it claimed were sending anti-North Korea propaganda leaflets across the border.

The official media had until

recently taken a relatively subdued tone amid the North's diplomatic overtures to its neighbors, including a summit with South Korea's president last month and plans for leader Kim Jong Un to meet US President Donald Trump in Singapore on June 12.

That first changed last week, when it lashed out against the maneuvers, cut highlevel contacts with Seoul and threatened to "reconsider" the Trump summit.

One of the reports on Tues-day, which came as North Korea allowed an airplane full of foreign journalists into the country to cover the dismantling of its nuclear test site this week, accused Seoul of teaming up with Washington for military drills intended as a show of force and as a "war drill" against it.

It's not unusual for North Korea's official media to turn to hyperbole to make a point and



the rhetorical barrage coincides with a visit to Washington by South Korean President Moon Jae-in. Strongly worded messages don't necessarily mean it is backing away from diplomatic negotiations.

But the North's abrupt sharpening of its words has raised concerns the Trump summit may prove to be a bumpy one - or that it could even be in jeopardy. Trump has suggested he is willing to walk away if Kim isn't willing to have a fruitful meeting and it appears both sides have agendas that remain far apart from each other.

There has been no indication that North Korea will can-cel plans to dismantle the test site, an important gesture of goodwill. The North has also not suggested it will go back on its promise to halt underground testing and launches of intercontinental ballistic missiles.

But it did ban South Korean

journalists from the trip to the nuclear site. And the language Tuesday offered a veiled threat that talks could be harmed.

"Dialogue and saber-rattling can never go together," said the commentary published in Minju Joson, one of the country's four main daily newspapers.

"There are some arguments describing the improvement of the situation on the Korean Peninsula as 'result of hard-line diplomacy' of the US and 'result of sustained pressure," said another, by the official KCNA news

"It seriously chills the atmosphere of the DPRK-US dialogue and is of no help to the devel-

opment of the situation." DPRK is short for the Democratic People's Republic of Korea, the North's official name.

Yet another article lashed out at South Korean authorities for allowing defectors to send anti-North Korea leaflets across their border.

It noted that the two leaders agreed at their summit in the Demilitarized Zone last month not to conduct hostile against each other and said the authorities have an obligation under that agreement to block such actions, even by private cit-

"If the North-South relations face a grave difficulty again owing to the provocation of human scum, the blame for it will be entirely on the South Korean authorities," the report said.

Chinese official media slams report on mining near Arunachal border

BEIJING, MAY 22 (PTI): Slamming a report about large-scale mining by China at the Arunachal Pradesh border, official Chinese media here today questioned the report's motive while hoping that India would not be "provoked" by it and blight the progress achieved at last month's

Wuhan summit. The Hong Kongbased South China Morning Post on Sunday re-ported that China has begun large-scale min-ing operations Lhunze county under its control adjacent to the border with Arunachal Pradesh where a huge trove of gold, silver and other precious minerals valued at about USD 60 billion has been found.
The report

The report also claimed that China is rapidly building infra-structure to turn the area into another South China

Sea-like scenario.

It is to be hoped that India will not be provoked by this report, lose focus on the big picture of the relationship between Beijing and New Delhi and get off the track of Sino-Indian cooperation , the Global Times tabloid daily, known for its abrasive commentaries against India, said in an editorial today.

The editorial titled, 'Dodgy report disturbs Sino-Indian ties' said, the report poked a sensitive spot in Sino-Indian ties but severely lacked factual evidence

It also said the Chinese expert quoted by the Post told the Global Times that he did not mention the South China Sea at all in his com-

Terming the report as coarse, the editorial said it attracted widespread attention from Indian media on Sunday. Since the paper quoted people familiar with the project as describing China's move as a part of an ambitious plan by Beijing to reclaim South Tibet, relevant news stories from Indian media were full of vigilance," it said.

But to many Chinese people, their first im-pression is that the report is not credible, given the vague facts, the geo political point quoted by a geologist and the denial by the expert, it said and questioned the motive saying that it is aimed at seeking to disturb Si-no-Indian ties .

"The report was bound to make waves. Lhunze county is not a disputed region. Whether or not there are min-ing operations there falls entirely within China's sovereignty. The Sino-Indian border dispute is different from the South China Sea issue and so it is quite farfetched to compare the two, the editorial said.

It also said after the Dokalam standoff, Beijing and New Delhi increased their strategic communication and coordination in the border areas.

"After Indian Prime Minister Narendra Mo-di's visit to Wuhan last month and his meeting with his President Xi Jinping, the two sides achieved major progress in strengthening mutual trust. Both countries have no intention of pro-voking border disputes and China is unlikely to kick-start an aggressive plan on territorial issues . it said.

The two govern-ments, not the media, should take the lead in solving border dis-putes, as the latter can easily mislead public sentiment. Negotiations should be conducted by the two countries' pro fessional diplomatic and security teams, which should present a solution acceptable to both parties and the two nations' societies , it said.

The daily also quoted experts alleging that Western countries are trying to create discord between India and China

The 'groundless hype' reflected the fact that some Western powers are constantly sowing discord between China and India, and using Delhi as a pawn on the front-line challenging Beijing, Hu Zhiyong, a research fellow at the Shanghai Academy of Social Sciences' Institute of International Relations told the daily.

THE EXPENDABLES 4 CONFIRMED; MAY START FILMING IN EARLY 2019

Sylvester Stallone previously dropped hints about Expendables 4 happening, and now the film is confirmed to the size for t firmed to be going forward. When it released back in 2010, the first Expendables played like a tremendous action movie jam session, fea-turing old school heroes like Sylvester Stallone and Arnold Schwarzenegger sharing the stage with new school stars like Jason Statham and Jet Li. And in classic '80s action movie fashion, the film whipped up enough graphic violence to earn an R rating.

Audiences embraced the semi-nostalgic Expendables formula to the tune of \$274 million in worldwide grosses. The Expendables 2 followed, with Schwarzenegger receiving a beefed-up part, and scared up \$315 million worldwide. By the time Expendables 3 rolled around however, the formula had begun to seem tired, and it didn't help that producers, apparently

reaching for a bigger audience, elected to go for a PG-13 rating instead of an R. Despite the third movie's diminished returns - only \$214 million worldwide - Stallone has long hinted that Expendables 4 would still happen (despite his apparent battles with Millennium Films).

As reported by Deadline. the fourth Expendables mov-ie has gotten the go-ahead af-

ter Millennium Films struck an all-important deal with exhibitors Dadi for Chinese distribution rights. Deadline reports an early 2019 start date for the film.
