ICSE lowers pass percentage for board exams

NEW DELHI. NOV 28 (PTI): The ICSE board has reduced the pass percentage for class 10 and 12 examinations from 2018-19 academic session in order to bring parity with the marking scheme of other boards.

The pass percentage for class 10 has been lowered from 35 to 33 per cent and for class 12 from 40 to 35 per cent, a senior board official said.

The HRD Ministry had in May constituted an Inter-Board Working Group (IBWG) to deliberate upon multiple examination related issues including scrapping of moderation policy.

Among several rec-

ommendations made by IBWG was having same pass percentage by dif-ferent boards. "In view of the panel's

recommendations. Council for Indian School Certificate Examination (CICSE) has decided to lower its pass percentage for class 10 from 35 to 33 per cent and for class 12 from 40 to 35 per cent," the official said.

"The objective of the change is to bring a close uniformity with other boards in the country. The change will be implemented from next academic session," he added.

Work on Dikchu-Lingdok road to Gangtok finally begins

After a long wait of nearly four decades, work on the Dikchu-Lingdok road to Gangtok has finally begun. This road, completed, will cut short the travel time

from Mangan to Gangtok from 3 hours to one hour.

A long pending demand of the public of North Sikkim, work on this road has started from Lower Rakdong, Dikchu with an excavator carving out the new cutting.

The old route, which was a mule track originally, was severely damaged by the 1968 floods and landslides espe-cially between Dikchu and Lingdok 9th Mile. Around 60% of the old

still exists so it would not take much to restore the entire stretch

Many villagers from the periphery of Dikchu trek to Gangtok along this route which normally takes two hours to reach Fatak, Bojoghari,

Restoring this old route will make travel and access more convenient for the people of North Sikkim especially Mangan, Dzongu, Lachen and Lachung and also for the people of South and some parts of West district.

Vetting files to challenge Bimal Gurung's discharge in Madan Tamang murder case: CBI to SC

New Delhi, Nov 28 (PTI): The CBI today told the Supreme Court that they were vetting the files in order to challenge the lower court's or-der discharging Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) leader Bimal Gurung in the Madan Tamang murder case.

Madan Tamang, who was the All India Gorkha League (AIGL) president, was hacked to death in Darjeeling in broad daylight on May 21, 2010 when he was overseeing preparations for a public

A trial court in Kol-kata had in August this year discharged Gurung in the case while reject-ing the CBI's claim that was involved in the conspiracy to murder Tamang, who was one of his political opponents in the Darjeeling hills.

The issue cropped up before the apex court to-day when it was hearing an application filed by Bharati Tamang, wife of Madan Tamang, seeking setting up of a special investigation team (SIT) to conduct a court-monitored probe into certain aspects of the case.

Her counsel alleged

that Gurung was the one of the prime conspira-tors, but the CBI has not yet challenged the trial court's order discharging him in the matter.

"Files are being vetted by CBI. Appropriate steps will be taken on order of discharge. It will take reasonable time to challenge the discharge order," the counsel for CBI told a bench of Justices Kurian Joseph and

er's counsel said they have already challenged the trial court's order in the Calcutta High Court which has admitted their plea that would come up for hearing in the second week of December.

CBI's counsel said their probe into the case was complete and 54 accused have been chargesheeted, of which two were absconding three had expired and the rest were on bail.

The bench also issued notices to CBI seeking its response within 10 days on separate applications filed by Bharati seeking a stay on the trial proceedings in the case before the lower court and grant of anticipatory bail to other accused in the case

Referring to tele-onic interceptions, phonic her lawyer alleged in the court that Gurung was in touch with the other accused who had attacked Tamang.

Seeking a stay on proceedings before the trial court, her counsel said the other accused, including several GJM lead-ers, would also seek discharge in the case since Gurung has already been discharged by the court.

The CBI's counsel opposed the contention seeking a stay on the trial

proceedings.

The bench, however, said the CBI would have to file a response on the applications and posted the matter for hearing on December 12.

The apex court had in October 2013 directed transfer of hearing in the case from a Darjeeling court to the Kolkata sessions court on a petition by Tamang's widow.

Fix responsibility for loss of life, assets during protests: SC

NEW DELHI, Nov 28 (PTI): Expressing concern over the loss of lives and damage to public property during agitations, the Supreme Court today asked Centre to create courts in every state and union territory to fix accountability for vandalism and compensate the victims of such violent protests.

The top court suggested to the Centre that one or more district judges should be given responsibilities in consultation with respective High Courts to prosecute and fix civil liabilities on those responsi-ble for such mayhem.

It favoured criminal action against leaders of such organisations or political parties, whose members would indulge in destruction of public or private prop-

A bench of Justices Adarsh Kumar Goel and U U Lalit said although guidelines have been framed by the apex court in 2007, which include videography of such agitations, but there exists no mechanism to deal with the damages to be paid to the

"These agitations, which result in damage to life and properties, are now hap-pening very often. If it is to be dealt by High Court or Supreme Court, then it will



some forum where people can go and seek remedy as per law," the bench said.

The bench's order came on a plea filed by advocate Koshy Jacob, who sought implementation of 2007 guidelines of the apex court with regard to the procedure to be adopted by administration during such agitations and submitting of report to the High Courts and Supreme Court.

The top court said that although the Constitution has given the right to people

to assemble freely and peaceful protest, but no one has been given the right to damage public propety and indulge in violence which result in loss of lives. "Those who fail

to maintain peace shall be held accountable and those suffer must compensated. At prevention lev-el, police can do it through videogra-

phy as stipulated in the guidelines issued by the apex court in earlier judgement," the bench said.

Attorney General K K Venugopal, appearing for Centre, agreed with the suggestion and said the government has taken steps to amend the Prevention of Damage to Public Property Act in consultation with the Ministry of Law and Justice

He said a draft of the Bill has been prepared and published on the website of Ministry of Home Affairs (MHA) seeking

comments of public and other stakehold-

The AG said several comments have been received, which were being analysed by the MHA and further steps will be taken accordingly.

"We hope the suggestions of the court will be considered by government and incorporated in the law that is being pro-

posed," the bench said.

Venugopal said there can be civil liability on those who indulge in violence, besides criminal action.

Referring to the recent agitation in Darjeeling in West Bengal, the AG said things became difficult for the local people as supplies of food and petrol were cut and the Centre had to rush ten companies of para-military force to allow the trucks

to enter Kalimpong.

"People were forced to suffer for no fault due to the Gorkhaland agitation. This should not be done. Those responsible for the chaos need to be held accountable," the bench said.

Advocate Wills Mathew said the court should direct payment of some compensation to petitioner Koshy Jacob for his

Jacob, a lawyer himself had filed the

petition alleging that in 2012 due to a strike called by LDF-PDP party in Kerala, he was forced to spend 12 hours on the road to reach home after being discharged from hospital following an eye surgery.

The bench posed how far it could regarding what will happen to those hose properties have been damaged or who have faced hardships.

The AG replied that the law of tort can be applied and those responsible for the chaos asked to compensate.

In his petition, Jacob has sought im-plementation of guidelines with a specific time-frame issued by the apex court in its earlier verdict of 2007.

In 2007, the apex court in its verdict

had said the police and state government shall ensure videograph of such protests to the maximum extent possible and a Superintendent of Police rank officer should supervise demonstrations.

It had also said that wherever mass

destruction of property takes place due to protests, the high court may issue suo motu action and set up a machinery to investigate the damages and award compensation. In cases where more than one state is involved, the Supreme Court may take action.

SIKKIM IN NEED OF ENTRANCE **CENTRES FOR PREMIER INSTITUTES/ UNIVERSITIES OF INDIA**

Opportunities are the crucial stepping stones to the next levels in our careers and business. And we should always focus on keeping an eye out for oppor-tunities and making the most of them when they arrive. But often opportunities slip by without us even noticing them, and we are not paying attention to what is ng us to miss them. Periodically during the course of our lives, we are granted the "opportuni-ty of a lifetime." It's a chance that doesn't come our way very often, and usually, one that would result in tremendous benefits for us, if we can manage to grasp it before it slips away. Some of us are able to grab a hold, while others may lose their grip for whatever reason and miss the chance. The same thing is happening in terms of grasping opportunities in our state. This is

a hardcore reality in Sikkim that our state lagged behind to show its representation in almost all the Central Universities or Institutes of national importance in India. Hardly have we found any Sikkimese students in these reputed institutes. The main reason of the same which I analyzed from my own experience is that we do

not have entrance centres of these reputed institutes. For the higher education, none of the central universities or the institutions of national importance apart from Jawaharlal Nehru University and Sikkim University has its entrance centre in Sikkim. For the entrance, students have to go either to Gu-wahati or Kolkata. It is very much

lower or middle class those who do not have enough money and where there is no surety of cent percent successful result to go 600 Km and write entrance ex-amination of one university. And moreover, we don't have that resources or channel to proceed for the same. It is my humble request to the concerned authorities of Sikkim those who are dealing with the matter of higher education to write or request a written memorandum to all the important Cen tral Universities or institutions of national importance to provide at least one entrance centre in Sikkim or at Siliguri for the benefit of our Sikkimese students as well as other neighbouring states.

The Constitution's Yours

We might as well get to know it better

The nation celebrated Constitution Day on Sunday, recalling the 26th of November 1949 when the Constitution of India was adopted by the Constituent Assembly. The Constituency itself came into force exactly two months later on 26 January 1950, the Constitution's day we are all more familiar with as Republic Day. The 26th of January invariably becomes too much about announcements and political positions and colour and displays for any real deliberations on the Constitution itself to be undertaken. In that sense, it is welcome that the Constitution is now enjoying a Day exclusively dedicated to it but what is not as encouraging is that not enough is being done to inform and involve the young in its understanding or virtues. Sure, the officials observed it at their respective offices with the same lack of fervour and matching tokenism as they observe the string of other sarkari events, and given that it fell on a Sunday, some even advanced the observance. Be that as it may, it is not enough for the day's significance to remain limited to the executive or the judiciary and it is important that it is extended to the lay citizens as well. Unfortunately, one does not see much of that happening. Instead, what we got was a weekend of noise over myths like the Padmavati or the popularity ratings of the Central Government and its still unexplained bloodletting of the economy. But let's leave those worries for another day and stay with the Constitution of India for now.

It was the adoption of the Constitution that made the nation a Republic of Free People.

This is what the Constitution delivered to the peo-

ple. The Father of the Nation had also visualized the Constitution of India in terms of universal values applied to the specific and special conditions of India. Agreed, in hind-sight, there were problematic inferences even in what Mahatma Gandhi wished for the country, but the root idea of delivering a free people underlines the document. The Mahatma did not live to see the Constitution drafted and adopted, but as early as in 1931 he had written, "I shall strive for a Consti-tution which will release India from all thralldom and patronage. I shall work for an India in which the poor est shall feel that it is their country in whose making they have an effective voice: an India in which there is no high class or low class of people, an India in which all communities shall live in perfect harmony. There can be no room in such an India for the curse of untouchability. We shall be at peace with the rest of the world, neither exploiting nor exploited. All interests not in conflict with the interests of the dumb millions will be scrupulously respected whether foreign or indigenous. Personally, I hate the distinction between foreign and indigenous. This is the India of my dreams for which I shall struggle."

This idea has been incorporated into the Constitu-

tion and if divisions still exist in our midst, it is not be-cause the Document has let us down, but because the people and the leaders have failed the Constitution. And the architect of the Constitution, Dr BR Ambedkar, whose conflict with the Mahatma and the Congress were always obvious and are now being better understood, said as much. Speaking on the draft of the Constitution, Dr. Ambedkar had said, "It is workable, it is flexible and it is strong enough to hold the country together both in peace time and in war time. Indeed, if I may say so, if things go wrong under the new Constitution, the reason will not be that we had a bad Con-

stitution. What we will have to say is that Man is vile."
With our continuing refusal to get to know the Constitution better are we destined to go down in history as vile men? What every Indian needs to remind himself or herself of is that the word "Republic" is no ordinary word. It is a commitment to the effect that, in our country, supreme power is exercised not by some remote monarch but by the people. The Constitution empowers us with this strength, but increasingly, because we blunder around oblivious to the specifics and history and the ideas behind the Constitution, we allow this power to be usurped by the loud and the

How Filipino artists are responding to President Duterte and the 'War on Drugs'

theconversation.com Along one long wall on the Aside of Manila's Baclaran church, visual artist Emil Yap has been working for two years on a mural that depicts the cosmology and history of the Philippines.

Yap collaborates with others on the mural, which uses different sculpture and mosaic techniques. Recently, he rained volunteers who were victims of President Rodrigo Outerte's declared "War on Orugs" - which is estimated to have led to more than 13,000 killings - to work on the mosaics for several months while seeking refuge in the church.

Yap is among a small but growing number of cultural producers whose work addresses the effects of Dutere's presidency. Several of these artsts seek to involve members of com-nunities most affected by the uparge in killings - which are mostly in y-income urban neighbourhoods. Not far from Baclaran Church, at

he Cultural Center of the Philippines performance-maker JK Anicoche col-laborated with young widows of the drug war to perform Zumba as part of a performance entitled 15 Minutes a performance entitled 15 Min of Your Time. A response to self-declared drug addicts across Manila being made to participate in mass Zumba sessions as part of their reabilitation process, the dance-based exercise form now has a somewhat acabre presence in contemporary hilippine life.

Anicoche and Yap are part of an

ose extended network of artists who have been working under the panner of the RESBAK collective (Repond and Break the Silence Against the Killings). RESBAK members make zines, hold film screenings, and produce videos for circulation on social edia as part of their diverse efforts

Their launch video in December 2016 played a famous Filipino Christ-mas song as a backdrop to protesters



silently holding cardboard placards that call to mind the homemade signs often left beside slain bodies.

Cultural projects such as these can offer tools for violence-affected communities to work through their trauma. Among the victims most deeply impacted are children. The Philippine Center for Investigative Journalism has published a children's book, Si Kian, narrating the story of teenager Kian de los Santos, whose fatal shooting by police in August

2017 led to protests.

Journalist Kimberley de la Cruz,
who had been covering the nightly killings for some months before meeting Kian's family at his wake, collaborated with author Weng Cahiles and illustrator Aldy Aguirre to produce Si Kian within a matter of weeks. The illustrated book aims to provide a resource to teachers seeking resources for young students ex-periencing deaths like that of Kian's within their neighbourhoods

SHIFTING ALLIANCES

Like other Filipinos, artists are coming to terms with the tensions emerging between Duterte's supporters and detractors. Some artists had been among those optimistic for change when President Duterte formed alliances with some leftist groups and promised to shake up elitist politics. But as curator and academic Lisa

Ito-Tapang has noted, over the past

year Duterte's alliances have steadily , shifted, including a more prominent alliance with the family of former dictator Ferdinand Marcos, and "a lot of the positionings of artists also re-

flected those kinds of shifts".
For example, a 2016 recent exhibition at the University of the Philippines, Dissident Vicinities, featured works by the militant leftist group BAYAN among other activists and artists. The group is known for making effigies of politicians to be burned at

However, during Duterte's first State of the Nation address in 2016, BAYAN instead produced six "Portraits of Peace" murals, inviting Duterte to address pressing challenges across the Philippines. But a year later, BAYAN returned to mak-ing effigies in protest at the political

THE VIEW FROM THE DISAPORA

Beyond the Philippines, political tensions are also reflected in the work of artists in the diaspora. At Western Sydney's Blacktown Arts Centre - Filipinos are the largest migrant com-munity in Blacktown - glimpses of Duterte could be seen across many works in Balik Bayan, a recent exhibition of Filipino-Australian artists.

Underneath a house built by artist Alwin Reamillo, a toy Japanese cat waved welcome. With Duterte's face plastered over the cat's head, the

wave looks increasingly like the president's signature fist-pump. Alwin has been adding Duterte's head to differen items (matchboxes and wood-en pieces) for several months and plans to keep reworking Duterte's image in upcoming exhibitions. Alwin is openly critical of the consequence of Duterte's Presidency upor

Philippine society.

In the same exhibition Marikit Santiago presents ar image of Duterte at once reli gious and profane. Although Santiago says she does "not have a strong political voice"

her work was prompted by conflicting opinions on Dute-rte within her own extended family, where political discussions had no

previously been common.

In Sydney this October, the La bAnino collective of Filipino and Australian artists performed a new work This Here. Land. It reflected politica differences held within the collective where members were variously sup portive and critical of Duterte.

In the piece's culmination, outgo-ing audience members participated in a recreation of the most famous photographic image (see below) to emerge from coverage of Manila's late-night killings. Incoming audience members, meanwhile, used their phones to illuminate and docu ment the recreation of the image. Al are complicit in the witnessing, de bating and disputing of new politica realities.

Across the political and geograph ic differences that mark Filipino com munities at home and abroad, artistic initiatives may be creating small spaces in which people can attempt

to bridge increasingly tense divides.

These may offer hope not only to those caught up in its violence, but also to other Filipinos seeking ways beyond the political realm to make sense of their circumstances.

The economics of ridiculously expensive art

What would possess someone to buy Leonardo da Vinci's Salvator Mundi for US\$450 million? You might think it's an investment - after all it was previously sold for just US\$10,000 in 2005.

From an economic point of view, art can be an investment. Although the research shows art investing has mixed results. Art also has what economists refer to as "psychic benefits". It is something to be enjoyed, experienced or flaunted, and this may be the key to the high price paid for Salvator

ART AS AN INVESTMENT

As an investment, art's performance varies wildly, depending on a number of factors. For instance, artworks associated with movements that are currently fashionable will outperform other types of art.

Contemporary art is currently outperforming impressionist art, for example. The strong demand for contemporary art coupled with limited supply has resulted in some previously overlooked artists, such as Keith Haring, being embraced by collectors. But it is typically the works of leading artists

that are in hot demand.

Recent analysis found that just 25 artists (including Jean-Michel Basquiat, Andy Warhol and Gerhard Richter) account for US\$1.2 billion of the US\$2.7 billion in worldwide art auction sales for contemporary art sold at auction this year.

Only two women, Agnes Martin and Yayoi Kusa-a, made it onto the top 25 contemporary artists list. This is indicative of issues around gender representation in the arts and the processes by which artists careers and reputations are established.

Academic studies of art as an investment have mixed results. For instance, research of the Canadian art market found that the returns are lower than investing in the stock market. However, the study identifies other benefits to having art in your port-folio, such as it being more diversified.

But research based on around 35,000 paintings by leading Australian artists show the financial returns average between 4% and 15%. Returns for paintings by leading Australian artists including Brett Whiteley and Jeffrey Smart exceed stock mar-ket returns. The study also found that oil and watercolour paintings, as well as those sold by certain suction houses, had higher prices.

However, because art also provides benefits

through consumption (prestige, decoration etc.), it is different to shares and bonds. The returns may be lower, but art is still attractive to invest in.

The Australian art market reflects what has happened in the global market for contemporary art. For instance the five highest priced Australian works sold in 2017 account for almost 10% of the total value of all works sold.

And while the recent sale of Earth Creation 1

by the late Indigenous artist Emily Kame Kngwarreye has not attracted the attention of the Leonardo sale, its price of \$A2.1 million is nearly double what it sold for at auction a decade earlier

ART FOR CONSUMPTION

The aesthetic pleasure of art, a feeling of being challenged or inspired, is subjective and difficult to measure. But that doesn't mean the consumption of art doesn't add to its value.

Economists use the terms "psychic returns" or "psychic benefits" to describe the benefits of consuming art. This is broken down into three main

One area is the satisfaction of supporting the arts and artists. This motivation is especially important for those who donate their collections to museums or otherwise support the arts. While this motivation is important it is not directly related to auction prices.

Then there's the psychic benefit comes from the

"functional" (or decorative) benefits of art that is used to adorn spaces. This is generally the closest to the artists intention when they create the work in the first place.

There's also the prestige that comes from possessing art - especially as it is used to display good taste, wealth and power. For instance, entrances and foyers of offices often display large striking

works of modern or contemporary art.

This is what economists call "conspicuous consumption". As people become wealthier, their demand for high-end art increases. Indeed, art has a long tradition of being used as a statement of pow-

er, including by the church.

What drives the art market, especially at the upper echelons, is a curious mix of investment and

consumption, fuelled by a limited supply.

The work of famous artists provides a signal of quality and assurance to the market and so their work is coveted by the rich and powerful. The uniqueness and rareness of these pieces not only spurs demand, but restricts supply, creating a per-

fect storm to drive prices up.
Although, even this doesn't entirely explain the high price paid for Leonardo's Salvator Mundi. Analysis of the sale suggests the market campaign by the auction house was significant in achieving such a high price.

But aside from its trade value, art can have cul-tural value and social significance that do not neatly translate to market prices. So while Leonardo's Salvator Mundi sold for US\$450 million, non-tradable masterpieces such as Michaelangelo's ceiling of the Sistine Chapel aren't worthless. They're "be-

Two more Russian Sochi Winter Olympians stripped of golds

LAUSANNE, Nov 28 (AFP): Two more Russian bobsleighers from the 2014 Sochi Winter Olympics have been stripped of their gold medals for doping, the International Olympic Committee (IOC) has said.

Aleksei Negodailo and Dmitrii Trunenkov were members of the same four-man bobsleigh team as Russia's flag carrier for the Games Alexander Zubkov, who had his medal stripped on Friday. The IOC has also taken away the team's

title.
The IOC's announcement yesterday comes following hearings by an IOC commission into allegations of state-sponsored doping in Russia at the 2014 Games, hosted

by Russia.
The IOC also disqualified Yana Romanova and Olga Vilukhina from all events they took part in at the Sochi Games for doping violations, taking away the silver medals they won.

Vilukhina won silver

in the women's 7.5km biathlon event, while both were in the Russian 4x6km biathlon relay team that came second to Ukraine.

In addition, Sergei Chudinov, who came fifth in the men's individual skeleton, was also disqualified for doping breaches.

The five athletes punished were also banned from competing at any

future Winter Olympics.

The latest sanctions come just a week before a crucial IOC meeting on December 5-7 to decide pete at the 2018 Winter Olympics in Pyeongc-

hang, South Korea.

As well as Zubkov, speed skater Olga Fatkulina was stripped of her silver medal in the 500 metres last Friday.

Last Wednesday, four Russian skeleton com-petitors were also disqualified.

Russian sports offi-

cials responded to that decision by saying they were prepared to take legal action against the

IOC.

Russia has so far lost 11 medals following the IOC's investigations, including four of the 13 Olympic titles they won in 2014.

That means that they have lost their position on top of the medals ta-ble to Norway, who won 11 golds.
In total, the IOC has

punished 19 Russian Olympians on the recom-mendation of the commission headed by Swiss sports official Denis Os-wald set up to investigate evidence of doping with state involvement.

Three lakh migratory birds throng Kashmir Valley

el, with three new addi-

SRINAGAR, Nov 28 (PTI): The gloomy winter landscape of the Kashmir Valley has come alive with a myriad of colours with the arrival of three lakh winged visitors from as far as Central Asia and Europe after arduous efforts by the Wildlife De-

partment to restore their natural habitat. Tufted Duck, Gadwall, Brahminy Duck, Garganey, Greylag Goose, Mallard, Common Merganser, Northern Pintail, Common Pochard, Ferruginous Pochard, Red-Crested Pochard, Ruddy Shelduck, Northern Shoveler, Common Teal, and Eurasian Wigeon are some of the most sighted birds in the wetlands of Kashmir.

The winged visitors start arriving in the valley towards the first week of November as Kashmir presents them a comparatively hospitable alternate habitat compared to the extreme freezing conditions in their natural habitats in Siberia, China, Japan and other countries in north-ern hemisphere, an official of the Wildlife department said.

'We have recorded around three lakh far. This is very good number as the concentration of migratory birds will peak around first week of February," Wildlife Warden (Wetlands) Roauf Zargar told PTI.

More birds are likely to arrive in the next 45 days as the temperature is expected to drop in some of the places where



these birds come from

The birds -- which feed on insects. worms and fish in these water bodies --present a beautiful picture, changing the colour of the valley landscape.

The Wildlife department took a series

of steps to restore the natural habitat of

these birds which were threatened by encroachments, unscientific waste dispe and noise pollution interfering with the ecosystem of the wetlands.

"We have completed works at Hokersar wetlands while Hygam and Shallabug will be completed in 10 to 15 days," Zargar said.

The floods in Kashmir in 2014 had threatened the winter escapade of migratory birds as the September deluge that year brought with it a layer of oil which settled over the water in the Hokersar wetland, causing enormous damage to the ecosystem of the wetland.

water with oily layer before letting in fresh streams of water to ensure that the visiting birds do not face any difficulty in finding food.

Noise pollution caused by rapid urbanisation around the wetlands, however, continues to be a an irritant as it is putting off the visiting birds.

"Noise of all kinds causes disturbance

to the birds. This can lead to the birds finding alternate places to spend the winters in," Zargar said.

To tackle the more obvious threat of poaching, the department has set up squads to maintain vigil around the wetlands of Kashmir.

"We have so far recovered four guns from Wullar area. We have also set up teams to keep an eye on any poaching attempts not only within the wetlands" but even in the areas surrounding them,

Zargar added.

The birds start a long distance flight from various places like Siberia, China and Japan in the month of October in view of freezing temperatures, which makes food scarce for them in their natural summer habitats.

Protests outside Ajit Pai's home over net neutrality rules

Washington, Nov 28 (PTI): The Federal Communications Commis sion chairman, Ajit Pai, has come under a blistering attack by several Indian-American lawmakers and activists for his proposal to repeal the Obama-era net neutrality

policy.

The activists also protested outside Pai's home in Virginia with signs directing at his children.

Pai, 44, blasted the activists for "harassing" his family members, saying they "crossed the

He is facing backlash from his opponents for his proposal which seeks to reverse Obama era's net neutrality, which meant that all websites are treated equally by Internet providers.

His proposal would end net neutrality and give big Internet providers like Comcast and Verizon broad powers to determine what website should reach out to subscribers faster than others. The activists not only staged protest outside Pai's home with signs directing at his children, they also reportedly sent pizzas to his home every half-and-hour. Some media reports said the frequency was every 15

This is the first instance that a senior Indian-American administration official in any of the presidential administration being harassed and threatened by opponents. Signboards and placards placed by protestors outside Pai's house in Virginia mocked

nouse in Virginia mocked him for his views. "I understand that people are passionate about policy, but the one thing in America that should remain sacred is that families, wives and kids, should remain out of it. And stop harassing us at our homes," Pai told 'Fox and Friends'.

His proposal is sched-uled to come out to vote before FCC on December 14. This is expected to pass as the Republicans have five votes as against three from the Democratic Party.

Pai expressed his displeasure when asked about the protest outside his house in Virginia. "It was a little nerve-racking, especially for my wife," he said.

"Internet regulation activists have crossed the line by threatening and harassing my fami-ly. They should leave my family out of this and fo cus on debating the mer-its of the issue," Pai was quoted as saying by The Washington Post. In an interview to PBS

News early this month. Pai had said the digital landscape has changed, and the government should stop "microman-aging the Web".

Pope meeting Suu Kyi on Myanmar refugee crisis amid outcry

Pope Francis traveled to Myanmar's capital today to meet with Nobel laureate Aung San Suu Kyi, who has come under increasing international criticism over a military crackdown on Rohingya Muslims that the UN and US have termed a campaign of

"ethnic cleansing."

Francis' speech to Suu Kyi, other Myanmar officials and the diplomatic corps is the most anticipated of his visit, given the outcry over the op-eration which has sent more than 620,000 Rohingya fleeing into neighboring Bangladesh.
The Rohingya, who have

been denied citizenship and other basic rights for decades in Buddhist-majority Myanmar, have reported entire villages burned and looted, and women and girls raped.

Leaders of Myanmar's



Catholic Church have stressed that Suu Kyi, the country's civilian leader, has no power to speak out against the military over the operation, and have urged continued support for her efforts to move Myanmar toward a more democratic

future that includes all its religious minorities. Christians in particular.

How Francis bridges the local Catholic concerns with his legacy of speaking out for oppressed minorities will be key in his speech in Naypyitaw, the capital.

His address comes just hours after Suu Kyi was stripped of her latest honor in the West, a "Freedom of the award given to her by the Oxford City Council, which said anyone who turns a blind

eye to violence tarnished its own reputation. Suu Kyi stud-ied at Oxford before returning to Myanmar and being placed under detention for 15 years during the country's long military dictatorship.

Before arriving in Naypy-itaw, Francis met in Yangon with interfaith leaders at the archbishop's residence, and separately with a prominent but controversial Buddhist leader.

The pope stressed a message of "unity in diversity" in his 40-minute meeting with Buddhist, Hindu, Muslim, Christian and Jewish leaders and told them they should work together to rebuild the country, Vatican spokesman Greg Burke said.

"If we argue, let's argue



TEEN FOUND GUILTY OF PLOTTING TERROR ATTACK AT A JUSTIN BIEBER CONCERT

AU.K. teen was found guilty on Monday for plotting an unexecuted terror attack during a Justin Bieber concert in Wales on June 30, according to The Guardian.

The unnamed 17-year-old was reportedly inspired by ISIS and penned a "martyrdom letter" in which he decried the U.K.'s involvement in Syria and Iraq, called himself "a soldier of the Islamic State," and promised the world would see "more attacks in the future."

According to The Guardian, the teen who is white, claimed during the trial that he didn't actually practice Islam and simply possessed a "stupid interest in the gory."

"I wanted to see how easy it was for people who had an interest in terrorism to go online and get information be-cause the police and the government are trying to crack down on terrorism and radicalization," The Guardian reports the teen said to the court. "I wanted to see if it was possible, not for me but from someone else's point of view."His explanation wasn't enough to convince the court of his innocence, especially after they'd learned he'd written another note detailing ways to kill large numbers of people, such as driving a car through a crowd. In addition to researching ISIS



ideologies, The Guardian reports the teen had a knife and a hammer in his school bag, had communicated with someone on Instagram about terrorist attacks, and had specifically looked into Bieber's concert security.

Based on his reported internet re-

search, the teen was inspired by a number of terrorist events, possibly includ-ing the May 22 bombing at the Manches-ter Arena, which killed 22 people and injured dozens of others

Plots and attacks on massive public events are becoming unnervingly common across the world. In October, more than 50 people were killed when a gunman opened fire on a country music fes-tival in Las Vegas, leaving many in the States to wonder if they'd ever be safe attending a similar event in the future.

The teen will be sentenced in Janu-
