Eight batches, each comprising around 50 pilgrims, were scheduled to have taken the Nathu

The first batch was to have crossed over to China through Nathu La on June 20 and the last batch on July 31.
It would have taken a batch 21 days to complete the pilgrimage.
China had issued vi-

sas for first two batches and applications for the other pilgrims were put on hold because of the tension along the border.
The first batch of

grims had to return from the Nathu La border post as the stand-off between India and China showed no signs of easing.

The pilgrims returned to Gangtok on June 23 after staying in Nathu La for three days awaiting permission from the Chinese side for the onward journey.

The second batch of pilgrims did not move from Gangtok and was eventually told to return home. Mansarovar was opened to the public in 2015.

The pilgrimage Kailash Mansarovar, cated at an altitude of 15,160 feet, takes place from June to September each year through the two routes.

The Kailash Mansa-

rovar yatra is considered holy by Hindus, Bud-dhists and Jains and is undertaken by hundreds of pilgrims every year.

Meanwhile, pilgrims

denied entry by China through Nathu La in Sikkim may be allowed to join the yatra that takes the Uttarakhand route. but only if there are any dropouts in the new batches, a government

official said today.

"Seven or eight pilgrims who were denied through Nathu La by Chinese authorities have expressed their de-sire to take this route,"

High-level meeting reviews situation in Sikkim sector

New Delhi, June 30 (PTI): A high-level meeting today reviewed the situation in the Sikkim sector where tensions have flared up between Indian troops and Chi-nese military over construction of a road by China in a strategically key area near the Sino-India border.

The meeting was attended by Army Chief Gen. Bipin Rawat, National Security Adviser Ajit Doval and Foreign Secretary S Jaishankar among others and it carried out detailed analysis of the overall situation in

the sensitive areas.

Gen Rawat, who returned from Sikkim this morning, presented a de tailed account of ground realities in the wake of the stand-off between the two armies triggered by China's attempts to build a road at Donglong which Bhutan says belonged to it.

The situation was re-

viewed in the meeting,

sources said.

Gen. Rawat had yesterday visited the Army's formation headquarters in North Sikkim and was

briefed by top commanders about the face-off as well as the current situation.

The flashpoint was China's attempts to build a road in the strategi-cally key area of Don-glong as its link to the Sikkim-Bhutan-Tibet tri-junction could give China a major military

advantage over India. The Indian Army had blocked construction of the road.

Commenting on the issue, the External Affairs Ministry today said India was "deeply concerned at the recent Chinese actions and has conveyed to Beijing that such construction would represent a significant change of status quo with serious security implications for India".

Road construction on Sikkim border has serious implications, India tells China

New Delhi, Jun 30 (PTI): The government today expressed deep concern over China constructing a road in the disputed Doklam area near Sikkim, and said it had conveyed to Beijing that such an action would represent a significant change of status quo with "serious" security implications for India.

India's reaction follows a face-off between Indian and Chinese troops in the area, prompting Beijing to take a tough stance and demand withdrawal Indian troops from the Sikkim sector as a pre-condition for "meaningful dialogue" to resolve the situation.

Beijing had also ac-

cused India of being a "third-party" to the China-Bhutan dispute.

Reacting to China's contention, the Ministry of External Affairs (MEA) said it was essential that all parties concerned display utmost restraint and abide by their respective bilateral understandings not to change the status quo unilaterally.

Chinese interference at the Doklam Plateau in the Sikkim-Bhutan-Tibet tri-junction of late has turned the region sensitive. With Nathu La barely 15 KM from the Doklam Plateau, the Centre on Friday scrapped the Kailash-Mansrovar yatra through the pass indicating the situation was tentative.

There is no official confirmation to it, but with national security under threat just a stone's throw away,

it might not be surprising if the Gorkhaland protagonists are asked to stand down the movement till tension at the border eases.

The Indian Army has reinforced troop strength in Sikkim in preparation for any exigency and so has Chi-na in its territory. Moreover, the In-dian Army chief General Bipin Rawat reconnoitered the sensitive region the past two days highlighting the seriousness of the standoff.

Doklam Plateau is a disputed territory in western Bhutan adjacent to China's Chumbi Valley. China of late was constructing a motorable road up to the tri-junction to extend strategic width to Chumbi Valley, which is wedged between Bhutan and Sikkim.

India has, however, made it clear that it will not allow China to build a motorable road to the tri-junction through the Bhutanese territory of Doklam Plateau and Indian soldiers have had to jostle with Chinese forces to desist them from continuing with the construction.

Chumbi Valley is a strategic po-sition China enjoys. Extending the vantage point to the Doklam Plateau in Bhutan, which acts as a buffer from the Indian point of view, would give China a militarily favourable po sition overlooking the strategically vulnerable Siliguri Corridor.

The sensitive 'Chicken's Neck

or the Siliguri Corridor is a narrow strip of land that connects the Northeastern states with the rest of India. Although India has strengthened its military might in the Siliguri Corridor over the years, the stretch, which is barely a 100 Km from the Chumbi Valley, continues to remain geographically sensitive.

Military presence at the Doklam Plateau is therefore important for China's strategic calculus. Control over the area would make it easier for its army to conduct military ma nouevres aimed at blocking the Siliguri Corridor.

The Indian Army therefore must be on amber alert following the past

few days' developments in the remote terrain between Sikkim and Bhutan. With the military of a neighbouring country wanting to surreptitiously creep up to India's borders trampling on a friendly country like Bhutan's territorial claims, a political movement at close quarters would be the last thing the Army would want to confront at this sensitive hour.

The advocates of the Gorkhaland movement have formed a common platform to take forward the agitation, but theoretically speaking, all initiatives can come to a grinding halt if the Army puts its foot down. Again, there is no official confirmation to this conjecture.

"India is deeply concerned at the recent Chinese actions and has conveyed to the Chinese government that such construction would represent a significant change of status quo with serious security implications for India," MEA asserted in a press

The ministry also narrated the sequence of events since June 16 when a People's Liberation Army (PLA) construction party entered the Doklam area and attempted to construct a road. "In coordination with

the Royal Government of Bhutan, Indian person-nel, who were present at general area Doka La, approached the Chinese construction party and urged them to desist from changing the status quo. These efforts continue," the ministry said.

In keeping with their tradition of maintaining close consultation or matters of mutual interest, Bhutan and India had been in continuous contact through the unfolding of these develop-

ments, it said.

As far as the boundary in the Sikkim sector was concerned, India and China had reached understanding in 2012 reconfirming their mutual agreement on the "basis of the alignment",

the ministry said.
Further discussions regarding finalisation of

the boundary had been taking place under the Special Representatives framework, it added.

While India referred to the June 26 statement by the Chinese foreign ministry -- that Indian border troops crossed the boundary line in the Sikkim sector of the China- India boundary and entered Chinese territory -- it did not react to the allegations directly.
On June 16, the min-

istry said, a PLA con-struction party entered the Doklam area and attempted to construct a road.

"It is our understanding that a Royal Bhutan Army patrol attempted to dissuade them from this unilateral activity," it said, adding that Bhuambassador had publicly stated that it lodged a protest with the Chinese government through their embassy in New Delhi on June 20.

The MEA also noted

that the Bhutan foreign ministry had yesterday issued a statement un-derlining that the construction of the road inside Bhutanese territory was a direct violation of the 1988 and 1998 agreements between Bhutan and China and affected the process of de-marcating the boundary between the two coun-

Bhutan has also urged China to return to the status quo as before 16 June 2017, MEA said.

India underlined that the two governments had in 2012 reached an agreement that tri-junction boundary points between India, China and third countries would be finalised in consulta-tion with the concerned countries.

"Any attempt, there-fore, to unilaterally determine tri- iunction points is in violation of understanding,"



Cultures Live

...provided we don't stifle them

Because some things need reiteration from time to time, we return here to arguments that have been tabled often and worries that have been raised frequently because the deliberations continue remain open, and will for some more time.

Turn to any corner of the world and one comes across voices of protest or groans of concern from a culture under threat, a way of life nearing extinc-tion, a lifestyle on the brink. While there are always external elements like the influence of globalisation and the pressure to homogenise which eat away at the edifice of cultural uniqueness, the biggest threat comes from those who refuse to let cultures breathe
- those who view it as a relic which needs to be preserved in the purest form as imagined or decided by them. Unfortunately for such groups, cultures are living systems which need to be nurtured, not pickled. But 'preserving' is easier since nurturing would entail allowing a culture to grow and that would go against ill-informed beliefs that cultures are perfect on which any growth is a blemish. Such mindsets refuse to accept that culture is not something that can be pickled and preserved as a museum piece for posterity. Culture, because it is about a people, is vibrant, alive and contemporary. It is spontaneous, almost instinctive, and not something that is learnt; it is imbibed. Since culture forms a part of evolution, it is also subject to fresh interpretations, nuances and

Because culture is about people, it cannot survive on state patronage alone - that would be relegating it to the status of a museum display. Some years ago, members of the Museums Association of India conferred in Gangtok. The focus of that conference was "Intangible Heritage - Preservation & Portrayal." In layman's terms, they were speaking of ecomuseology, the science, or rather the attempt, to allow cultures to breathe and thrive unencumbered in their natural habitats. But even this comes with its pitfalls. In the Journal of Indian Museums released at the conference, the editorial spoke of the "very amateurish and vulgar commercialisation" of culture that one sees in the tourism sector of Rajasthan. What was true of Rajasthan is true for Sikkim as well. The message preservation of cultures should not come at the cost of reducing vibrant lifestyles into caricatures. This can happen only if the people to whom the culture belongs want to nurture it. For the same reason, if a people reject their Culture as ripe for extinction, no amount of preservation helps. Yet, a culture should not be dismissed even before one has understood it. It is important that the repository of culture is passed on to the next generation to nurture and craft as it feels right. And yes, people can discard a culture if they want to, but only after they have understood it and decided that it does not serve their purpose any more. What the current holders of culture can do is pass it on to the next generation in an as unadul-terated a form as possible. What the younger generation, equipped with its better education, can do is research deeper into their roots. Then, even if the physical form of cultures dwindles away, at least the records will survive for future generations, if it feels

so inclined, to revive.

What is required of the establishment is to provide the support which allows these aspirations

A legislative reform is needed to push corporate social responsibility

he corporate social responsibility (CSR) move The corporate social response to advocacy for cor-

porations to play a role in ameliorating social prob-lems due to their economic power and overarching presence in daily life.

Now, the movement is transitioning from its reliance on purely voluntary activity to the greater use of laws. The push for legalisation came because voluntary CSR presented problems such as free-riding (companies taking advantage of benefits without actually spending), greenwashing posing as CSR, and false disclosures.

Governments are now modifying their laissez

faire approach and considering legal rules.

The US Securities and Exchange Commission, for instance, has moved beyond its mandate as a market regulator to issue rules on conflict minerals, resource extraction payments, and gender diversity. And, in 2014, the European Union issued a directive on disclosure of non-financial and diversity information.
Similarly, Australian companies are required to

disclose how they will manage their environmental and social sustainability risks.

INDIA AT THE FOREFRONT

India has gone further than any other country. In 2013, it enacted Section 135 of the Indian Companies Act prescribing a mandatory "CSR spend of 2% of average net profits ... during the three immediately preceding financial years" for all companies meeting specified financial thresholds. In other words, companies "having net worth of rupees five billion or more, or turnover of rupees ten billion or more or a net profit of rupees fifty million or more during any financial year" have to ensure that they spend 2% of average net profits made during the three preceding years on CSR activities.

In order to assess the effectiveness of this unique experiment in mandating CSR spending

and disclosure, we studied the reporting practices of the four largest banks by market capitalisation in India compared with banks from Australia, China, and Japan where there is no such law. In order to do so, we assessed annual and CSR reports of our sample of companies from 2012, one year before the law was passed.

Indian banks did not have CSR reports before

2012. The CSR committees formed by the banks function in the spirit of the law within defined tar-gets, monitoring CSR spend, and reporting reasons

for shortfalls in spending.

Of the Indian banks evaluated, only the State
Bank of India (SBI) disclosed its CSR spend prior to the promulgation of the new Companies Act; all banks disclosed this spend from 2013

Despite the new law mandating a CSR spend of 2% of pre-tax profit for corporations of this size, only ICICI Bank met the target in 2014. But it fell to 1.9% in 2016.Kotak Mahindra Bank reported a CSR end of less than 0.69% of pre-tax profits in 2016.
In spite of not meeting the targeted CSR spend,

none of the banks reported any fines or proceedings for breaching the law.

During this period (2012-2016), Australian banks had the highest disclosures, followed by Iapan, China and India

There's a marginal difference in Indian bank disclosures after the new law was passed in 2013. But these differences may well be due to the different cultures and other non-market factors at play.

DIFFERENT PROGRAMS

Indian banks spend on educational and health promotional CSR activities, as prescribed by the new law. Additionally, all Indian banks use in-house foundations and centres, and promote staff volunteering at high-profile events. All these activities are designed to obtain maximum positive media coverage.

Less popular CSR activities, such as programs for eradicating malaria or combating other major communicable diseases – also defined in the Act as

designated CSR activity – do not get any attention. Another popular CSR activity is contributing to natural disaster relief funds, which is probably aimed at scoring brownie points with the politi-cal party in power. Then there's lip service to environmental sustainability by the development of "ideal" bank branches with small environmental footprints. But the vast majority of offices languish with old energy-hungry, environmentally dated structures and activities.

In contrast – and despite the absence of a leg-

islative mandate - Australian banks have been dis closing their CSR expenditure since at least 2010. CBA and Westpac spend more on CSR as a percentage of pre-tax profits than the other two major Aus-

Chinese and Japanese banks report on targets and achievements to meet their respective environmental laws, albeit not in as much detail as Austra-lian banks. As there's no legal requirement to report on their actual CSR spends, Japanese banks did not disclose this in their reporting media till 2015. In 2016, Japanese banks Nomura and Mizuho

started reporting their CSR spend. Similarly, Chinese banks started voluntarily reporting their CSR

But all fall below 0.25% of post-tax profits.

TIME FOR REFORM

Our analysis shows that the law in its current form is failing to promote CSR activity. Its poor design and lack of clear obligations, set in a milieu of poor law enforcement, is also not generating an ethical obligation to obey the law in spirit.

Our findings are of value to policy makers and suggest it's time to reform laws – to socialise corpora-tions and CEOs in terms of their legal obligations and the benefits of CSR activity, to design enforcement

mechanisms, and to generate ethical behaviour.

India's legal provisions contain vague language and permit a high degree of self-interpretation that undermines legislative intent. For example, it al-lows banks to list "staff training in fire safety" as part of CSR even though this should be a strictly mandatory workplace safety activity. Indian banks' annual and CSR reports do not

show a major shift in the nature of disclosures after 2013. The law is perhaps purely expressive as the provision stipulates minimal penalties for non-compliance and relies on a comply-or-explain philosophy. This exacerbates the lack of ethical obligation to obey laws in India where there's a level of high corruption, low levels of public confidence, weak institutions, low levels of development, and education, among other such issues

The provisions also appear to be formulated based on a traditional understanding that top management is solely responsible for ethical behaviour and CSR activity, without making the connection between the company and its stakeholders. There is no explanation for how the CSR provision fits within the wider ambit of a corporation's role and purpose, the duties expected of its directors, or the information it is expected to disclose

Until such time that the law is made more precise and backed up by effective enforcement and penalties for non-compliance, it will not promote CSR or make companies engage more with stake-holders. Section 135 is merely a stealth tax and will impose unnecessary compliance burdens.

Why do so many gay and bisexual men die from suicide?

Gay and bisexual men are four times more likely to attempt suicide in their lifetime than heterosexual men. Researchers now estimate that suicide kills more gay and bi-sexual men than AIDS. Despite this well-documented inequity, there are no targeted suicide prevention programs in Canada. Gay and bisexual men are rarely mentioned in mental health policies

Homophobia — within families, schools, communities and even in doctors and counsellors offices — is a key cause, according to the Still Here project within the Men's Health Research Program at the University of British Columbia.

As a postdoctoral research fellow in nursing at the University of British Columbia, I work on the Still Here project to engage gay and bisexual men who have previously struggled with suicide (or who have lost another gay or bisexual man to suicide) to tell their stories through photographs.

Twenty-nine gay and bisexual men have participated in Still Here thus far, contributing more than 300 photographs. Each participant met with a research team member to describe his photographs and to share his story. Together, these photos and stories are helping us better understand the multiple factors that lead gay and bisexual

en to consider suicide.

Homophobia a common theme Each story is unique and we are finding that the reasons gay and bi-sexual research participants consider suicide are varied. Homophobia is,

however, a common theme uniting all the stories and photos.

Most of the men in our study spoke of experiences of violence, bul-lying and family rejection because of their sexuality. Others learned to internalize society's negative view gay and bisexual people.

Many Still Here participants also described how they were confronted with homophobia and stigmatizing attitudes when they opened up to talk about their feelings to their doctor or counsellor.

Because of homophobia, men described feeling isolated, lonely and invisible. These feelings often led to depression, sentiments of helplessand thoughts of suicide. Homophobia is not the only rea-

son these men contemplated suicide. It was often coupled with mental illness, financial problems or losing a job. For some, it was an abusive relationship, or the end of a relationship, that contributed to their thoughts of

Breaking the silence

We need to break the silence around suicide. There is a pervasive myth that talking about suicide encourages it. But not talking about it perpetuates shame and stigma. Many Still Here participants described how they felt very alone with their suicidal thoughts because it is not something that people openly talk about. This silence made it harder for them to ask

To spark a conversation on suicide, the Still Here participants worked with the research team to host several exhibits of their photographs. These exhibits have had a powerful impact on those who viewed them, and provided space and inspiration for people to share their own stories and discuss prevention.

To extend the reach of these photographs, the Still Here project launched an online gallery at www. stillhereproject.ca that has now been

visited by thousands of individuals worldwide.

Prevention strategies

The first prevention strategy is to improve mental health services for gay and bisexual men. Accessing mental health services is dif-ficult. The barriers are numerous and include cost, long wait lists and the fact that many health pro-fessionals have difficulty discussing suicide. Also, men are often offered pills to deal with their de-pression when they would rather talk to someone.

Mental-health professionals and doctors also need better training to address the complex needs of gay and bisexual men, and to re-duce homophobic and stigmatizing attitudes.

As a society we need to work harder to resist stigma. Legal progress has been made in Canada for sexual minorities but homophobia continues to impact the lives of many gay and bisexual men. A study published in 2015 found that half of gay and bisexual men have been harassed or bullied because of their sexuality. One in 10 has been gay-bashed.

If we do not eliminate homophobia and if we fail to change perceptions of mental illness, gay and bisexual men will continue to endure high rates of suicide.



Nearly half a million displaced Syrians return home: UN

GENEVA, JUN 30 (AFP): Nearly half a million displaced Syrians have returned to their homes since the beginning of the year, mainly to find family members and check on property, the UN refugee agency said today.

The agency said it had seen "a notable trend of spontaneous returns to and within Syria in 2017."

Since January, about 440,000 people who had been displaced within the war-ravaged country had returned to their homes, mainly in Aleppo, Hama, Homs and Damascus, Andrej Mahecic, a spokesman for the agency, known as

a spokesman for the agency, known as the UNHCR, told reporters in Geneva. In addition, around 31,000 refugees in neighbouring countries had also returned, he said, bringing to 260,000 the number of refugees who have returned to the country since 2015.

But Mahecic said this is a mere "fraction" of the five million Syrian refugees hosted in the region.

He said the main factors prompting the displaced to return home were seeking out family members, checking on property, and, in some cases, a real or perceived improvement in security

conditions in parts of the country."

He said it was too early to say if the returns might be directly linked to a palpable drop in violence since Turkey agreed at talks in Astana in May with Russia and Iran, allies of Syrian President Bashar al-Assad, to establish four safe zones across Syria to ban flights and ensure aid drops.

But this week, the UN's special envoy for Syria, Staffan de Mistura, told the Security Council that since the May 4 deal, "violence is clearly down. Hundreds of Syrian lives continue to be spared every week, and many towns have returned to

some degree of normalcy."

Mahecic nonetheless cautioned that "while there is overall increased hope linked to the recent Astana and Geneva peace talks, UNHCR believes conditions for refugees to return in safety and dignity are not yet in place in Syria."

"The sustainability of security im-

provements in many return areas is uncertain, and there remain significant risks of protection thresholds for voluntary, safe and dignified returns not being

met in parts of the country," he said.

"Access to displaced population inside Syria remains a key challenge, he added. But "given the returns witnessed so far this year and in light of a progressively increased number of returns", the agency had begun scaling up its operations inside Syria to better be able address the needs of the returnees, he said.

Syria's war has killed more than 320,000 people and forced millions from their homes since it began in March 2011.

Ex-CIA agent convicted over imam kidnapping to face sentencing

LISBON, JUN 30 (AFP): A former Indian-origin CIA agent who was found guilty of kidnapping an Egyptian imam by an Italian court more than a decade ago has said she intended to return to Italy to face

her sentence, but hopes to avoid prison.
Sabrina de Sousa, who holds dual
American and Portuguese nationality, said yesterday she would leave Portugal to face the Italian courts over the abduction of radical preacher Abu Omar from a Milan street in 2003 in an opera-tion allegedly led jointly by the CIA and the Italian intelligence services.

She has already gone on trial in absentia along with 22 others in what were the first legal convictions in the world against people involved in the CIA's extraordinary renditions programme that followed the September

"I'm going back to Italy next week to serve a sentence that will be determined by the Italian courts," 60-year-old de Sousa told AFP, saying she hoped to be released on parole and carry out community service.

At the end of February, Italian Presi-

dent Sergio Mattarella granted her "a par-tial pardon of one year's imprisonment", reducing her jail time to three years of a lenient form of sentence that does not necessarily need to be served behind bars and allows the convict to work



Talks on Sikkim sector row only after withdrawal of Indian troops: China

BEIJING, JUN 30 (PTI): China today said the diplomatic channels with India are "unimpeded" for "meaningful talks" over the military stand-off in the Sikkim sector but maintained that Indian troops must first with draw from the Doklam area over which Beijing has "indisputable sovereignty".

'The diplomatic channels for the communication between Chinese and Indian sides re-mained unimpeded," Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Lu Kang told a media briefing here.

He said the Indian troops "trespassed" the recognised delineated boundary between China and India on June 18. This is the first time China came out the with precise date about Indian troops entering the disputed Doklam area (referred by China as Donglong) near Sikkim allegedly to stop Chinese troops from constructing a road.

'So the most pressing issue should be the withdrawal of troops into the Indian territory. So it is the pre-condition for any meaningful dialogue," he said when asked whether any talks were going on between the two

He said in additions to the photographs of alleged Indian "incursion" into Donglong area, the Chinese foreign ministry will also upload a map on its website to provide a "better understanding of the reality".

He also refuted Bhutan's allegation that Chinese troops' attempts to build the road vio-lated the 1988 and 1999 agreements to maintain peace and

tranquilly.

Lu said China has "indisputable sovereignty over the Donklam area."

area was under Chinese administration from emperor Qing dy-nasty, the last imperial dynasty of China established in 1636.

Lu said the area where Chi-nese side undertook road construction "totally belongs to the Chinese territory" and offered to release details on this on foreign ministry's website.

"From historical evidence we can see that Doklam has been a traditional pasture for the Tibetan residents and we have exercised good administration over the area," he said.

Before the 1960s, if the Bhutan residents around the border wanted to graze their cattle they had to get the approval from

"The Tibetan dynasty and Qing dynasty also set a clear boundary

along the border," he said.

"In addition to the jurisprudential evidence, the historical convention in 1890 (the Sinio-British treaty) has clearly defined it as the crossing point be-tween China, Bhutan and Indian boundary.

"The Doklam area belongs to Chinese territory and we are exercising complete and comprehensive administration over the the region and our border troops and the residents around the border are herding their cat-tle along this," he said.

He claimed that the evidence is recognised by the Bhutan side. "Even though China and Bhu-

tan have not established diplomatic relationship we always maintain traditional friendship. We can tell you that Chinese people are friendly and want good relations with Bhutan people," he said.

"But our determination to uphold our territorial integrity and sovereignty is unwavering,"

A standoff erupted between the two militaries after the In-

dian Army blocked construction disputed territory between China and Bhutan also known as

Of the 3,488-km-long India-China border from Jammu and Kashmir to Arunachal Pradesh, a 220-km section falls in Sikkim.

Enhancing bilateral trust will greatly ben efit Sino-Indian relations and bilateral cooperation in the region," Hu Shisheng from the Chi-na Institutes of Contemporary International Relations, an offi-

US travel ban takes effect, with lawyers on hand just in case

Lawyers and rights activists took up positions at major US airports as a weakened version of President Donald Trump's travel ban went into effect.

But there were no signs of the chaos that erupted when the first version of the restric-tion, derided as discriminatory against Muslims, was abruptly imposed back in January.

Attorneys working pro-bono set up makeshift, just-in-case legal aid stations -- some with signs in Arabic -- at airports serving New York, Los Angeles, San Francisco, Chicago, Washington and other cities, news reports said

Protesters angry Trump's immigration policies also turned out, with some in Los Angeles holding black-andwhite placards denouncing Trump as a fascist. But the first hours of the new

version of the ban, as allowed by the Supreme Court, appeared to unfold calmly.

Gone were the dramatic scenes of some people arriv-ing from seven mainly Muslim countries being detained and questioned for hours, with some even deported on short order to where they came from.

"We're not really expecting any issues at the airport.

But we're here just in case, to monitor, to tell people what's go-



ing on, and to report back what we're seeing," Camille Mackler, director of legal initiatives at the York Immigration Coalition, told The Daily Beast.

She was among volunteers at JFK Airport in New York awaiting flights from London, Istanbul Doha and Abu Dhabi

"We think we're going to see it abroad, because it's really for people applying for visas," Mackler added.

The Trump administration says the temporary ban is nec-essary to keep terrorists out of the country, but immigrant advocates charge that it illegally singles out Muslims.

Under a Supreme Court ruling this week that allowed part of the ban to take effect -- and ended, for now, five months of skirmishes in lower courts -- the 90-day ban on visitors from Iran, Libya, Somalia, Sudan, Syria and Yemen, and a 120- day ban on

will allow exceptions for people with "close family relationships" in the United States.

Activists said the govern-ment has defined that too narrowly, excluding relationships with grandparents and grand-children, aunts and uncles and

The Department of Home land Security, which was heavily criticised for mishandling man arrivals when the ban was first attempted in January, promised a smooth rollout this time. The new ban took effect at 8:00 pm Thursday Eastern time.

The department said that anyone with a valid visa issued before the ban began would still be admitted, and that all authorized refugees booked for travel before July 6 would also be al-

lowed.

"We expect business as usual at the ports of entry starting at 8 pm tonight," a DHS official said. "Our people are well prepared

But the ban's implementa-tion, even with exceptions, was claimed as a political victory by Trump, after federal appeals courts twice blocked his order, saving it violated constitutional protections of religion and overshot his presidential powers.

Immigrant rights groups and mocrats in Congress continued to label Trump's order illegal and said the exemptions pro-vided in a Supreme Court ruling on Monday remained unfair.

According to guidelines issued by the State Department, people with "close family relationships" would be exempt from the ban. It defined that to include parents, spouses, children, sons- and daughters-in-law, siblings and step- and half-siblings.

But "close family" does not include grandparents, grand-children, aunts, uncles, nieces, nephews, cousins, brothers-in-laws and sisters-in-law, fiances and any other "extended" family members, the guidelines say.

People with formal relation-

ships with a US entity -- who have for instance been offered a job or been accepted to study or lecture at a university -- will also qualify for visas during the ban. But a hotel reservation, even if already paid for, does not qualify.

HC grants bail to 1984 anti-Sikh riots case convict

New Delhi, Jun 30 (PTI): The Delhi High Court today granted bail on medical grounds to an 89-year-old convict serving life term in a 1984 anti-Sikh riots case.

A vacation bench of Justices Manmohan and Yogesh Khanna released retired naval officer Captain Bhagmal on bail till July four on the ground that he has to undergo a surgery.

The court granted him the re-

lief till July four instead of three months sought by the convict, so that the bench which is hearing the anti-Sikh riots cases can take

a final decision on his plea.

"A prayer is made for suspension of sentence for three months. In view of the circum-stances placed before us, the sentence of the appellant is suspended till July 4," the bench said in its interim order.

The convict is already on

interim bail since March 24 on medical grounds.

Bhagmal, through his counsel, had stated that he is suffering from enlarged prostrate for which he has to undergo sur-gery which would require stay in the hospital.

Taking note of his medical condition, the bench extended his bail on furnishing of a personal bond of Rs 25,000 with one surety of the like amount.

It directed Bhagmal to give the address at which he would be available and the mobile number on which he can be contacted by the CBI during the interim suspension of his sentence.

The bench asked the convict not to get in touch with any witness or the legal heirs of the

deceased. 'In case, there is a violation of this condition, it will be open to

the CBI to move an application for recall of this order," it said, adding that Bhagmal shall not leave the National Capital Territory of Delhi

without its permission.

Bhagmal, former Congress councillor Balwan Khokhar, Girdhari Lal and two others were held guilty in a case relating to the murder of five members of a family in Raj Nagar area of Del-hi Cantonment on November 1, 1984, after the assassination of Prime Minister Indira Gandhi.

They had challenged their conviction and the sentence awarded by the trial court in

The trial court had acquitted Congress leader Sajjan Kumar but awarded life term to Bhagmal, Khokhar and Girdhari Lal and three-year jail term to two others former MLA Mahender Yadav and Kishan Khokhar.

The convicts have filed appeals before the High Court while CBI too has filed an appeal alleging that they were engaged in "a planned communal riot" and "religious cleansing". The agency has also appealed against acquittal of Kumar

The high court had on March 29 this year issued show cause notices to 11 accused including Khokhar and Yadav in five 1984 anti-Sikh riots cases.

The accused, who were acquitted of the charges, were asked why should the court not order reinvestigation and retrial against them as they faced al-legations of "horrifying crimes against humanity".

The bench had issued notic-

es on the complaints filed regarding the violent incidents on November 1 and 2, 1984 in the Delhi Cantonment area.

Govt slashes small savings rates by 0.1%

New Delhi, Jun 30 (PTI): The government has low-ered interest rate on small saving schemes like PPF, Kisan Vikas Patra and Sukanya Samriddhi by 0.1 per cent for the July- September quarter, a move that will prompt banks to lower deposit rates.

The rates have been lowered by 0.1 per cent across the board compared to the April-June quarter. However, interest on savings deposits has been retained at 4 per cent annually.

Since April last year,

interest rates of all small saving schemes have been recalibrated on a quarter-ly basis. A finance ministry notification said investments in the public provident fund (PPF) scheme will fetch lower annual rate of 7.8 per cent.

Kisan Vikas Patra (KVP) investments will yield 7.5 per cent and mature in 115 months. The one for girl child savings, Sukanya Samriddhi Account Scheme, will offer 8.3 per cent annually, from 8.4 per cent at present. The investment on 5-year Senior Citizens Savings Scheme will yield 8.3 per cent. The interest rate on the senior citizens scheme is paid quarterly.

Term deposits of 1-5 years will fetch a lower 6.8-7.6 per cent that will be paid quarterly while the 5-year recurring de-posit has been pegged lower at 7.1 per cent.
