SDM convenes meeting to address Chungthang's worries with Teesta Stage-III reservoir level

TEESTA URJA TO KEEP **EVERYONE IN LOOP** WHEN WATER LEVEL

WANGCHUK BHUTIA

CHUNGTHANG, 18 MAR:

Pollowing complaints [read SummitTimes in the complaints] 18 March 2018 for details] by the public and panchayats of Chungthang in North Sikkim regarding what they perceived as an alarming rise in the water level of the 1200 MW Teesta Stage III reservoir, a meeting was called by the Sub Divisional Magistrate [Chungthang] between Chungthang Zilla and Gram Panchayats, local administration, Teesta Urja Limited (TUL) officials and locals today.

Teesta Urja officials informed that the land acquired by TUL at the reservoir site was upto 1,590 meters above mean sea level

(MSL) and as per Global Positioning System (GPS) water level at the reservoir site during winter/ lean season is maintained around 1584

further informed that the water level reached 1585 meters in the last few days, which according to them was 'rare' and seen 'only during testing the reservoir and gener-

ation requirement'.

During monsoons, the maximum level of the water is maintained between 1575 to 1580 meters and minimum is 1565 meters, they detailed.

TUL officials have, however, now agreed to alert the district and sub divisional administra-



tion, police, zilla and gram pan-chayats of Chungthang in case the water level rises beyond

The intimation will be give en through phone, WhatsApp messages to individual phones and groups and subsequently in writing for confirmation. the officials said

This is an addition to the ing procedure.

TUL has also been advised to mark the outer limit of their land so as to bring clarity with regards to lands affected.

At those places within Chungthang town area not covered by Rim treatment- local public have been invited to

through official channels with copies marked to all concerned for urgent and immediate consideration.

The same will be put by Chungthang TUL authorities here to their seniors for "urgent necessary action," it was decided.

With regards to Moon-light Junior High School at Chungthang, TUL has agreed to make a mesh and wire fencing along the Lachen Chu towards Chungthang to provide addi-

Issues should be resolved through dialogue: Dalai Lama

JAMMU, MAR 18 (PTI): Tibetan spiritual leader the Dalai Lama today said issues should be resolved through dialogue and India needs to play its role ensuring a peaceful 21st century.

Opposing the arms race and nuclear weap-ons, he said violence leads to counter violence and the cycle continues unabated.

This cycle should be broken to make the world a better place to live in, the Dalai Lama said here at the first convocation of the Central University of Jammu (CUJ), which was established in August 8,

"The only way to create peace, is we must develop will power no matter how complicated the situation is and try to resolve issues through dialogue," he said.

Dialogue will be successful if views of oppo-site parties are respected and their interests are taken into consideration, the spiritual leader said.

"India's ancient knowledge is very relevant in todays world to achieve a peaceful 21st century. The 21st century must be a century of peace and India can play a major role to achieve this goal," he said.

The world is going through immense violence and there is a

threat of use of nuclear weapons, and "if you think it will make the world a better place, the answer, I think, is simply no", the Dalai Lama said

The world presently has too much violence and it seems that the 20th century belongs to armies, he said.

"No matter how sin-cere the motivation (for violence) is and once there is involvement of military forces, it will have unpredictable con-sequences," the Dalai Lama warned.

Differences will always be there. But in order to face these differences, the use of force cannot be justified, the spiritual leader.

Once violence is committed, it "leads to counter violence and a chain cycle", he said referring to the 2003 Iraq war.

"I had written a letter to former US president George W Bush and suggested non-violent measures What happened, today the entire Arab world is engulfed (in violence). I feel a wrong policy was one of the factors that increased hatred towards the US," the Dalai Lama said.

The US, Russia and even a small country like North Korea, is developing deadly weapons and "if it continues, the

Bill on transgender rights sent to Cabinet

NEW DELHI. MAR 18 (PTI): The Social Justice ministry has sent a Bill on transgender rights to the Cabinet after finalis ing nine amendments, in cluding those in the definition of the term 'trans gender', keeping with the recommendations of a parliamentary panel.

Transgender Persons (Protection of Rights) Bill that has undergone inter-ministerial consultation and was vetted by the law minis try has been sent to the Cabinet, a senior ministry official said.

The earlier definition of a transgender was "neither wholly male nor female, a combination of female or male, or nei-ther female nor male and whose sense of gender does not match with the gender assigned to that person at the time of birth", has been removed, as per the advice of the standing committee, he

said. The official said according to the new definition proposed in the Bill, "a transgender means a person whose gender does not match with the gender assigned to that person at birth and includes trans-man or trans-women (whether or not such persons has undergone sex reassignment surgery or hormone therapy or la-ser therapy or such other therapy)".

It also includes per-son with intersex varigender-queer and person having such socio-cultural identities such as 'kinnar', 'hijra',

The ministry has also done away with the provision of recommenda-tion required from district screening committees for issuing certificate, if a transgender undergoes a surgery to change his or her gender.

A transgender, who has already been issued a certificate and under-goes a surgery to his or her gender, may now get a it from the medical superintendent or chief medical offi-cer, authenticating the same to make an application to the district magistrate for a revised certificate

"The district magistrate on re-ceipt of an application and after being satisfied will issue a certificate indicating change in gender in such form and manner and within such time, as may be prescribed," the official said.

The standing committee had

called for removing some provisions after hearing the contentions of the stakeholders that transgenders were reluctant to undergo physical examination in front of the district screening committee for a certificate.

"The standing committee wondered why will the same person would apply again for a certificate and undergo the same procedure which he went earlier," the official

Besides, now every establishment, irrespective of how many peo-ple are employed there, will have to designate a officer to deal with complaints, he said.

Earlier, establishments of 100 or more people had to designate a com plaint officer.

102 rhinos in Pobitora Wildlife Sanctuary, census finds

Morigaon (Assam), Mar 18 (PTI): A total of 102 rhinos have been count-ed in Pobitora Wildlife Sanctuary here during a census carried out by the state's forest department, a senior official said today.

The one horned rhino census was conduct-ed after six years in the sanctuary, which has vast

tracks of swamp land.

Divisional Forest Officer, Wildlife Division-Guwahati, P Boruah told re-porters that 102 rhinos



are there in the 48-sq km Pobitora Wildlife Sanctuary, the "densest habitat of one horned rhinos in the world".

During the last six

ears, six rhinos have been shot dead by poachers in the sanctuary, while 20 others had nat-ural deaths, the DFO said.

Boruah said the sanc-

tuary was badly affected by floods in 2017, but after repair work, there has been heavy turn out of both domestic and foreign tourists this year.

mutually beneficial relationship with both in the changed context," Gyawali said, adding that Nepal needs support from both the countries.

"Chinese President Xi was sup-

posed to visit Nepal in 2016, which could not be materialised possi-bly due to frequent government changes," he said.

Speaking to reporters here, Gyawali said similar high-level visits will take place from Nepal's side also.

He said the government was

making necessary preparations for the foreign trip of Nepal Prime Minister K P Oli.

"Prime Minister will make foreign trip soon and we are making necessary preparations to that end. But we have not yet decided from which country he will begin his foreign trip with," he said.

Meanwhile, External Affairs

Minister Sushma Swaraj has congratulated Gyawali on his appoint-ment to the post of Foreign Minister of Nepal.

She made a phone call to congratulate the newly-appointed Foreign Minister on Friday, Indian embassy officials said.

In her congratulatory letter,

Swaraj expressed confidence that India-Nepal partnership will be further strengthened during his tenure. She also extended an invitation to Foreign Minister Gyawali to visit India, they said.

Oli expanded his Cabinet and inducted 15 new ministers in his Council of Ministers, including the daughter-in-law of Maoist chief

Prachanda, on Friday.

Nepal concluded three phase of provincial, local and parliamentary elections as part of its efforts to implement the new Constitution that was promulgated in September 2015.

The new government led by Left parties convened its first par-liament session on March 5 following the elections

In 2015, when Nepal adopted a new Constitution that split it into seven states, dozens of people were killed in ethnic clashes over

territory and rights.

The ethnic Madhesi group, mostly of Indian-origin, protested for months, saving they were not getting enough territory in one of the states and were also facing discrimination.

Violent clashes not only killed 50 people, but also left the country with severe shortages of fuel and medicine because protesters blocked the borders with India.

The protesters finally agreed to the elections after some amendments were made to the Constitution.

Mutter Matters

From farms to markets on govt or pvt enterprise?

 $F^{\rm armers}$ from Himachal Pradesh are unlikely to vacation in Hong Kong or Japan, or maybe, a decade now years since they began trading there, they have begun holidaying there as well. But that would not have been the case in the year 2007, a year when, if they found themselves in Hong Kong or Japan and decided to visit the sabzi mandis there, they would have ended up buying peas they produced for nearly tentimes the cost they sold them at. Some 600 tonnes of peas grown in the valleys of Himachal Pradesh were purchased by a Punjab-based company and exported with huge success to Japan and Hong Kong in the year

No, the Himachali farmers were not conned.

They made bulk sales at a handsome Rs. 25 per kg [remember, we are talking year 2007 here]. Peas, even in the inflated markets of Sikkim, are selling in the current 'season time' [eleven years later] for around Rs. 85 per kilo. It is safe to say that 600 tonnes purchased at Rs. 25 per kg in 2007 ensured a major windfall for farmers in Himachal Pradesh, who, as per the agri-data [NHB 2011-12] produce only 6.90 percent of the nation's pea production. This high rate accrued to them becomes even more significant in light of the fact that the exporters had also supplied the seeds to the farmers... for free! Flash forward to the present times. The opportunity opened by exporters from neighbouring Punjab has been seized by growers in HP who now have their own registered food processing partnership specialising in peas and the turnover has been increasing every year.

The lesson here for Sikkim is not necessarily to

start growing peas more [although that would not be a bad idea], but to accept that market success soars on the wings of private enterprise, not governmental spoon feeding. Government largesse, and for that matter even private sector indulgence, needs to be capitalised by the real stakeholders and harnessed for sustainable prosperity. Opportunities have to be recognized and unanimously pursued. One is not seeing this follow-up enough in Sikkim as is reflected in the still continuing need to hold "awareness programmes" to convince people of the benefits of organic farming a fortnight short of the proposed ban on import of a slew of vegetables grown in chemically-spiked farms outside. One may have issues of the ban route to boost local enterprise or even unconvinced about nature of the ban, but what cannot be ignored is that an opportunity has been force-created for farms here. What one cannot also help notice is that this development has not triggered the kind of excited engagement and preparation that would have been expected from the

It goes without saying that farmers should have rediscovered organic solutions from previous generations by now and should have been demanding better market access by now, their fields already organic certified and their produce tagged and prepped for markets which respect organi farming. Clearly, the current ban regime flows from the palpable absence of this mood in the fields, which is unfortunate because such engagement would also have kept the concerned agency sharp and on its toes and not recklessly lackadaisical as they continue to appear.

On a similarly note, it was around ten years ago that the State Government had brought Orchid suppliers from Holland to Sikkim. What came of that initiative? It is probably floundering because while the State Government did its part by bringing the potential partners over, from thereon the local entrepreneurs who should have taken over probably did not. International flower festivals have also been held in Sikkim. What was the take away for florists from there? It is easy to blame bureaucratic indifference and even interference, but market realities are different now and private enterprise can overcome these attitudes. But an effort has to be made; something on the lines of what farmers from the Kangra valley of Himachal Pradesh did with

Good Politics Bad Economics

The promise of freebies to people by political parties if they are voted to power is now a common feature during elections in India. Distribution of freebies during elections or in the pre-election cycle is a deeply ingrained tradition in democratic India. Therefore, there is an upsurge in the trend of doling out freebies to voters in cash or kind in pre and post election periods. Freebies often take the form of cash, bribes, free rice, loan waivers, salary enhancement, and its mandatory practice by parties has taken the centre-stage in all

election campaigns.

The pre-election warm-up to next year's Assembly election has already begun in Sikkim with the Sikkim Democratic Front Government making several announcements to attract voters to their camp. The declaration to regularize muster roll workers and home guards is an old promise which has been used by the SDF party in the last few elections. A weak attempt was made a few years back to regularize some muster roll employees but was stopped citing some technical problems. Enhancing the salary of ASHA and Aanganwadi workers is also a long pending demand and salary raise has al-ways been taken just before the elections. The implementation of Pay Commission recommendation is the ultimate carrot dangled for the government employees. It is seen that political parties in India do not really care for the economic fallout of the expenditure they splurge on distributing goodies and freebies during election time.

While most large States can afford to splurge on some freebies and goodies, small States like Sik-kim, with their limited revenue resources, cannot afford to spend funds to attract voters. The financial impact on regularizing muster roll employees, for instance, is extremely large. Though the government banned muster roll employees, the rule has been confined to paper with political bosses employing muster roll workers without any problem. The state's biggest committed expenditure is on employee salaries along with pensions.

Sikkim has the highest government employee to population ratio in the country which is mainly due to the failure of the government to generate employment in the private sector. Expenditure on salaries is presently about 35.88% of the revenue receipts and 37.25% of revenue expenditure. The committed expenditure of the government comes to around 53.65 % of revenue receipts. The latest announcement to regularize muster roll and home guards along with enhancement of salaries of ASHA workers, Anganwadi, Adhoc and other elect-ed members will run the State to near bankruptcy.

Data on government employees clearly shows that non-regular employees are more than regular employees despite the government orders to curb non regular employment. Irrespective of the loom-

ing financial disaster in the horizon, the govern ment seeks to please the non regular employees by offering them wage hikes and regularization

The State, which already has a huge debt accounting per head loan burden of Rs 77,850 for every citizen of Sikkim, is fully dependent on the center for funds with only 26% of its revenue being generated internally and the remaining coming from the center. Growth of liabilities stands at 17% while growth of assets comes to around 8.47%. Committed expenditure stands around 53.65% of

revenue receipts.

The expenditure on salaries would be more than 70% of total expenditure leaving little funds for other works.

In such a bleak financial scenario, taking such decisions without considering the future financial implication is pure economic suicide. The financial impact of the recent announcement will force the state into total financial crisis. Calculating the burden of pay revision at half the raise of 23.55% of central government employees at 12% without taking into consideration the arrears payment annually is staggering. And add to that salary payment to home guards who have completed 15 years and muster roll employees who have attained five years of service. There is an estimated 4,000 Muster Roll employees and Home Guards who are eligible as per the government announcement for regularization. Also to factored in is salary enhancement of minimum of Rs 1000 to elected members of Panchayats, Municipal Nagars, MLAs, ASHA and Anganwadi workers.

The total revenue expenditure in 2015-16 stood

at 85 \% of the total expenditure of the state. The

additional expenditure will raise the percentage much higher. Along with the committed expendi-ture on salaries there is also expenditure on interest payment and subsidies which will further raise the committed expenditure of the government. With more than half of revenue going to committed expenditure the expenditure on other sectors will be further curtailed. The government has been able till now to adhere to the FRBM requirement of deficit to 3.5% of GSDP due to the high growth of GSDP which is mainly due to the contribution from the. Pharmaceutical companies which are reporting high turnovers. If the contributions from these companies are deflated, then the state would have defaulted on the FRBM requirement long ago.

The high GSDP has also enabled the government to go for higher borrowings but the additional expenditure on salaries will curb the government from further borrowings since the capacity to repay will come down. The vision of earning thousands of crores from hydel projects already evaporated and strict grant of funds from Central Government, Sikkim is rapidly moving towards bankruptcy with the government more concerned about wooing voters than the fiscal health of the state. With all opposition parties more concerned with other issues, the attention to the breakdown of financial health has been neglected. Since the economy of the state is government expenditure centric any fiscal slowdown will immediately decelerate economic activities in the state which will give rise to unemployment, poverty and growth of social discontentment. Though the recent promises of the government may be good politics, it is a bad economic decision.

I was a student of Stephen Hawking's – here's what he taught me

ike many students of my gener like many students of my generation, Stephen Hawking had al-ready had enormous influence on me ong before we ever met. When I was hesitating about my A-level choices, it was his book A Brief History of Time that convinced me to continue with physical sciences. In 1994, Hawking and mathematical physicist Roger Penrose gave a series of inspiring lectures about cosmology in Cambridge. As a direct result, I chose courses on black holes and relativity for my fourth year of study at the University of Cambridge.

I first saw Hawking when I was

an undergraduate. At that time he was living in an apartment building just behind my

student house He was already so famous that friends would to my just to room watch him leaving and enter-ing his apartment. But as an undergraduate I never tried to talk with him, much feeling too junior and intimidated.

After I finished my fourth year, was invited in to talk to Hawking, who was already using a speech synthesizer, about options for my PhD. I was quite nervous when I first met him, but he jumped straight into physics and soon we were discussing black holes. I became a student at the time of the "Second String Theory Revolution" in theoretical physics. Hawking had not worked actively in string theory, but he was very keen to

understand the new ideas.

Following that meeting, he sen me off to read all the papers that Edward Witten, a famous string theorist, had written that year. My task was to come back and summarise them

for him - the student teaching the master. It's difficult to describe how hard this task actually was: Hawking expected me to jump straight to the frontier of string theory as a starting graduate student. He also chose the title for my PhD thesis: "Problems in M-theory", which I worked on from 1995 to 1998.

I can only hope that my explanations of string theory were helpful. Hawking went back and forth on his views on M-theory, but eventually ended up thinking that it may be our best bet for a theory of everything.

NO HAND-HOLDING

PhD students were enormously important to Hawking. In the early phase of his illness, his students helped take care of him. By the time I



became his student he needed roundthe-clock nursing. At this point, his students were no longer involved in his physical care, but remained essential to his research. Theoretical physics begins with ideas and concepts, but these then evolve into explicit detailed calculations. Hawking had a remarkable ability to do complex calculations in his head, but he still relied on collaborators to develop and complete his research projects.

Theoretical physicists typically give early PhD students "safe" research projects, and guide them through the calculations required. As the students develop, the projects be-come more ambitious and risky and students are expected to work independently. However, PhD students working with Hawking did not have the luxury of this gentle introduction he needed us to work on his own

high-risk, high-gain projects.

Hawking's communication via his speech synthesizer was necessarily concise and he simply could not pro-vide detailed guidance about calculations, making it extremely challenging to work with him. But it was also stimulating, forcing students to be creative and independent. He did give praise when he thought it was due. He once sent me away with a very hard problem - finding exact rotat-ing black hole solutions of Einstein's equations with a cosmological constant - and was stunned when I came back a few days later with the solu-tion. I can't even remember exactly what he said but I will never forget

what he said but I will never forget his enormous smile. Hawking was a determined and stubborn person. On many occasions he got through serious medical is-sues with sheer determination. This same determination could make him very difficult to work. But it could also push research projects forward: Hawking would refuse to give up on seemingly unsolvable problems.

In fact, never giving up is the main thing Hawking has taught me – to keep attacking problems from different directions, to reach for the hardest problems and find a way to solve them. It's immensely important as a scientist, but also in other aspects of

PITHY ONE-LINERS

Hawking was devoted to his family. His eyes would light up when one of his children came to visit or when he proudly showed us pictures of his first grandchild. In many respects, Hawking treated his PhD students and collaborators as a second family. However busy he was, he always made time for us, often making dignitaries wait outside his office while he talked physics with a student. He would eat lunch with us several times per week, and funded a weekly lunch for the wider group to bring everyone

together.

There were many occasions when physics discussions merged seamlessly into social activities: going to the pub, eating dinner at one of his favourite Cambridge restaurants, and so on. Hawking had a wonderful sense of humour. He turned his communication difficulties into an advantage, composing pithy one-liners. For instance when changing his mind about what happens to information in a black hole, he announced it in the pub by turning the volume up on his synthesizer, saying simply: "I'm coming out." He would discuss anything and everything in a social setting: politics, movies, other branches of

science, music.

As we worked in closely related fields, we saw each other regularly even after I finished my PhD. In 2017, I attended a conference in Cambridge celebrating his 75th birthday. The list of participants illustrates Hawking's influence on academia and beyond. Many of his former students and collaborators have gone on to become leaders in research in cosmology, gravitational waves, black holes and string theory. Others have had huge impact outside academia, such as Nathan Myhrvold at Microsoft.

There is currently pressure on academics to demonstrate the immediate impact of their research on society. It is perhaps worth reflecting that impact is not easily measurable on short time scales. Hawking's was tru-ly blue-sky research – and yet it has fascinated millions, attracting many into scientific careers. His academic legacy is not just the remarkable science he produced, but the generations of minds he shaped.

There's no doubt Hawking's death

is a huge loss to physics. But personally, what I will miss most is his humour and the general feeling of inspiration I got from being around him.

KUSHAN SARKAR New Delhi, Mar 18 (PTI): Contrary to popular belief that Mahendra Singh Dhoni was relegated from the elite category of central contracts, it was the former skipper himself who wanted an A+ grade for top performers, says CoA chief Vinod Rai.

Twenty-six cricketers have been handed central contracts with skipper Virat Kohli, Rohit Sharma, Shikhar Dhawan, Bhuvneshwar Kumar and Jasprit Bumrah being included in the Rs 7 crore A+ category. Dhoni is in the A category with Rs 5 crore annual retainership.

"This A+ category was proposed by the players themselves. We had a discussion about this category with Dhoni and Virat. They proposed that there should be category of world-class ex-cellence in which players who play all three formats of the game should be there," Rai told PTI in an exclusive in-

The head of the Committee of Administrators said both Dhoni and Kohli wanted A+ to be a functional category to indicate who are the Indian team's

top performers.

"This should be a functional category and out. Also ry where players move in and out. Also it will show that the best in the business are rewarded as per performance." What the former CAG found heart-

ning was the camaraderie between Kohli and Dhoni.

"Their camaraderie is exceptional with so much mutual respect. Virat respects Dhoni's cricketing acumen and Dhoni respects what Virat is achieving as a player," said Rai. In fact, Virat has told the CoA why

he thinks Dhoni is irreplaceable in the limited overs set up as of now. "Virat feels that there are no faster



pair of gloves than MS Dhoni today. Also Dhoni's cricketing mind honed over so many years is an asset for Virat. As far as how many years of cricket is left him, time and his performance will tell,'

Rai said that the best part about central contracts was that it ensured a

decent earning for domestic players.
"These increases have been p posed in consultation with the players. Domestic players, who were getting Rs 10-12 lakh per annum, will now get Rs 20-22 lakh per annum in addition to the earnings from Gross Revenue System (profits from TV broadcast).

"Now with this kind of salary, domestic players can concentrate on their game without looking for jobs," Rai said.

There was a lot of anguish among

BCCI office bearers at not being consulted and the finance committee being allegedly bypassed, but Rai set the record straight.

'We discussed with players and we placed the proposal to the office-bear-ers. The package was there with them from September (2017) and there's nothing new in it. Finance committee did not meet is a fact but package was known to them," said Rai.

"They did not even have any comments to make. Finally when we again met the players (during Sri Lanka series), we showed them and they did it was reasonable. So we decided to put it out as players have contracts and their insurances are in place before IPL," he

Sindhu loses epic semifinal to bow out of All **England Championship**

BIRMINGHAM, MAR 18 (PTI): Olympic silver medallist shuttler P V Sindhu lost an epic semifinal against World No. 2 Japanese Akane Yama-guchi to bow out of the USD 1000,000 All England Championship in Birmingham.

Sindhu failed to build on a handsome lead in the decider to go down 21-19 19-21 18-21 to Yamaguchi after battling for an hour and 19 minutes last night. This was the ninth victory on the trot for the 20-year-old Japanese, who had won the German Open early this month.

In scenes similar to the one that went down to the wire in the summit clash of last year's Dubai Super Series Final, both Sindhu and Yamaguchi threw themselves for everything on the court, traversing diagonally again and again during a diagonally series of punishing ral-lies, which defined the edge-of-the- seat thriller. However, in the end

it was Yamaguchi, who showed better nerves to walk away with the match and book a place at the final against World No. 1 Taiwanese Tai Tzu Ying at the Arena Birmingham.

Despite being on the court for almost 3 and a half hours during the three-game matches in last three days, Sindhu didn't show any signs of fatigue and matched the nimble-footed Yamagu-chi as they looked to out-do each other. But a slight lapse of concentration in

the dying moments con-tributed to her defeat. Sindhu, who has come out victorious in six of their nine previous matches, made an aggressive start with a smash and rode on unforced errors from Yamaguchi to

jump to a 5-0 lead.
Playing with the drift, the Japanese struggled to keep the shuttle inside

court initially.

A couple of shots going out from Sindhu and a tight net play saw Yamaguchi make it 3-8. Sindhu hit a stunning down- the-line smash but twice she erred at the forecourt as the Japanese moved to 5-9. However, Sindhu enjoyed a healthy 11-5 lead at the first break The Japanese dynamo

made Sindhu work hard The Indian too tried to create angled strokes to put her opponent in difficult situations. Yamaguchi hit one at long and found the net twice as Sindhu lead 14-7.

Yamaguchi continued to commit unforced errors as Sindhu doubled her lead at 16-8. Howev-er, the Indian missed one at the forehand forecourt and made a bad judge-ment to allow Yamaguchi reach double figures

The Japanese kept fighting and started forcing Sindhu into error to narrow the lead to 15-17. A long rally ensued next which ended with Sindhu failing to sent one across at the forecourt. Another missed chance at the backhand forecourt and it was 17-17.

It was again a couple of unforced errors which broke the run of points as Sindhu led 19-18. A great judgement at the back line gave Sindhu two game points. Yama-guchi saved one with a half smash before Sindhu sealed the opening game with a smash and cele-

brated with a fist pump.

The fast-paced rallies continued after the change of sides as the duo looked to outdo each oth-er. Yamaguchi dictated the rallies but Sindhu kept up with her rival as the duo split the initial 14 points.

It was quite a task to tame the baby-faced Japanese as she was extremely fast on the court and retrieved most of the diagonal strokes that Sindhu threw at her. In the end, a jump cross court angled smash and then a return after catching the shuttle early helped Yamaguchi reach

11-9 lead at the interval.

After the break, a tight net play followed by a smash and then an easy mistake by Yamaguchi saw Sindhu make it 12- 12.

"Everybody knows we finished first, eight points above Chennai-yin. We are human beings, the players did an incredible job. I am sad for them and the fans. But that's football," Bengaluru FC head coach Albert Roca said.

He said it's left for others to dge whether the structure of the tournament was fair or needs to be changed to reward the teams which finish top of the league stage.

"It is too easy for him to say yes. I think even some of their (Chennaiyin) players came to us and said we should not have been in this

situation. The tournament is like it is and we cannot change that. It is not for me to say that is fair or not. It is for you to say," he added. Bengaluru and In-

dia captain Sunil Chhetri expressed disappointment. "The fact is that we

had 40 points and won the league stage. Sadly, we could not win the final."

Gregory praised Mailson Alves for his two crucial strikes which saw Chennaiyin win their second ISL title.

J&K needs 2,500 playfields, says State Sport Council

SRINAGAR, MAR 18 (PTI): Jammu and Kashmir needs 2500 play fields for its 1.21 crore population to harness its true sporting potential and take sports from the capitals to other districts and towns of the state, according to the State Sports

Officials at the supervisory body for sports activities in the state, feel that the existing 137 play fields -- mostly concentrated in Jammu and Srinagar -- are just too small in number to allow a proper environment for budding sportspersons of the state. According to officials, while Srinagar district accounts for 29 of the 103 playfields of the valley, Jammu district has half of the 34 playfields in entire Jammu region which consists of 10 districts.

Surprisingly, Ladakh region -- consisting of Leh and Kargil districts -- has no play field at all, an official said.

The council has formulated an ambitious plan of making play fields accessible to all the people of the state but it will require massive funding.

With no resources of its own, the Coun-

cil is looking up to the state government and the Centre to fund this massive development of sports infrastructure. requirement

"The infrastructure requirement has been projected to the Chief Minister during a meeting recently and the draft paper envisages one play field each for every 8,000 persons," said a Sports Council official on conditions of anonymity.

The official said while there is enorinfrastructure

mous talent and potential as far as sports is concerned, lack of proper sporting facil-ities is proving a major stumbling block in the transition of players from the state to the level where they will be in reckoning for representing the country.

"We have players like Parvez Rasool (Kashmir's only international cricketer) and Manzoor Pandav (who was recently signed by IPL franchise Kings XI Punjab) coming through the ranks. They have showcased their talent even though we do not have proper training facilities other than the cricket stadium where only limited number of players have access," the official said.

He also cited the example of top foot ballers like former Indian captain Majid

Kakroo, Mehrajuddin Wadoo and Ishfaq Ahmad who have shone at the national

"We have now got an astro turf where our footballers can practice throughout the year. The results have started to show in very short span of time. We have two teams from Kashmir playing the I-League second division and some players from the valley have gone to play in European clubs. There is no dearth of talent," he said. The athletes from the state have won

over 250 medals in zonal and national level sporting events during 2016-17, the official said adding this was testimony to the enthusiasm for sports in the state.

As per the projections for infrastructure development, the Sports Council wants the number of playing fields in Baramulla district to be increased from present 22 to 320.

Similarly, in Anantnag district, the uncil wants to add 258 playing grounds to the existing 17 grounds.

The council, in its report, has laid ma-jor thrust on increasing the number of play fields in Jammu division from 34 to 1302 in order to provide sporting opportunities to the nearly 70 lakh population

It has also proposed 200 playing fields for Udhampur district, 197 for Rajouri, 185 for Kathua, 175 for Jammu district, and around 100 each play fields for other districts of the division. Only Doda (50) and Samba (68) districts have got a proposal of less than 100 play fields.

Lanka Prez Sirisena lifts nationwide state of emergency

COLOMBO, MAR 18 (PTI): Sri Lanka's President Maithripala Sirisena today lifted a nationwide state of emergency imposed on March 6 for the first time since the civil war following days of communal violence between majority Sinhala Buddhists and minority

Muslims in the country.

President Sirisena,
who returned to Sri Lanka last night from an official visit to India and Japan, removed the state of emergency as the sit-uation in the country returned to normal.

"Upon assessing the public safety situation, I instructed to revoke the



State of Emergency from midnight yesterday, he twitted today.

The government imposed a state of emergency on March 6 and blocked Facebook, WhatsApp and other social media sites following anti-Muslim violence in the island's central hills

Kandy and Ampara districts in which three people were killed and hundreds of Muslim-owned including properties, mosques, were damaged.

Facing flak from the Opposition for not lifting the blockage on social media despite improve-ment in the situation,

the government lifted the ban on Facebook on March 15 after officials from the US social media giant agreed to step up efforts to remove hate speech posted on its platform during the anti-Muslim violence.

The communal vio-lence was triggered by the death of a Sinhalese man at the hands of a mob

The government had deployed thousands of troops to restore peace and protect the minority Muslims and their property.
"The President decid-

ed to revoke the order in view of the improved se-curity situation," a presi-

dential official said.

The police arrested more than 200 people for violence against Muslims.

It was the first time

in seven years Sri Lanka had imposed the mea-sure. The country was under a state of emergency for nearly three decades when the government fought Tamil rebels LTTE in the civil war that ended in 2009.

Violence has risen in the Buddhist-majority country since 2012, with some hardline Buddhist groups accusing Muslims of forcing people to con-vert to Islam and vandalising Buddhist archaeo logical sites.

India, US two-plus-two dialogue postponed: **US** official

WASHINGTON, MAR 18 (PTI): The first Indo-US two-plus-two dialogue has been postponed due to the uncertainty over the confirmation of Mike Pompeo as the new Secretary of State, an American official said after President Donald Trump fired Rex Tillerson.

The two-day dia-logue, announced last summer when Prime Narendra Modi had a successful meeting with President Trump at the White House, was tentatively scheduled for April 18-

19.
"It has been postponed for now," an in-formed US official said.

The official wishing anonymity, however, quickly pointed out that it would have no impact on the bilateral relation-ship as the meetings this week by the foreign and defence secretaries de-cided to continue with their agenda.

There was no official announcement of the high-level dialogue in-

volving the foreign and defence ministers from

the two countries.

India's foreign and defence secretaries were here early this week for preparatory talks with their American counter-

The Indian delegation landed in Washington DC amidst the firing of Tillerson as the Secretary of State by Trump.

The delegation

continued with their meetings both at the State Department and at the Pentagon as scheduled, during which it was decided to hold the dialogue at a later date, which ap-pears unlikely before the summer.

The dialogue was seen as a vehicle to elevate the strategic re-lationship between the two countries.

After June last year. the two countries have tried at several other dates for the dialogue to take place, including sometime in November and December.



The Government is preparing further moves against Russia following a day of tit-for-tat action over the poisoning of former spy Sergei Skripal. Speaking at the Conservative spring forum on Saturday, Theresa May said Britain "would never tolerate a threat to the life" of its citizens, or others in the country, from the Russian government. The pledge comes as 23 British diplomats based in Russia begin packing their bags as they are expelled from the country in retaliation for Russian representatives being told to leave the UK.




