Cyclone Ochki death toll climbs to 36

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, DEC 7 (PTI): Three bodies were recovered this morning off the Kerala coast, taking the death toll due to Cyclone Ockhi to 36 even as rescue op-erations are going on in full swing to trace the 96

missing fishermen.
Sources in the State control room monitoring the rescue operations, said with the recovery of three more bodies, the death toll in Kerala due to the cyclone has gone up to 36 and 96 fishermen are yet to be traced. While a body was re-

while a body was re-covered near Alappuzha by the Marine enforce-ment wing, two bodies were found by Coast Guard ship Vaibhav off Alappuzha-Kochi coast this morning, defence sources said sources said.

An Air Force aircraft AN 32, flying between Kozhikode- Kochi coasts had sighted a fishing boat with about 15 fishermen this morning following which Navy has sent a Dornier aircraft and ship to the area which is close to Lakshadweep islands, the sources said.

Meanwhile, shipping services from Kozhikode to Lakshadweep began today with around 60 passengers boarding the high speed vessel from Beypore this morning.

MV Minicoy, the pas-senger vessel, berthed at Beypore had suffered some damage in the cy-clone following which MMD officials had not granted travel clearance.

Yesterday, the high speed vessel arrived at Beypore from the islands to ferry the passengers,

the sources said.

Around 1,600 passengers were transported from Kochi to various islands of Lakshadweep when the shipping services resumed on December 5,

according to the sources.

Shipping services from Kochi to the Union Territory was stopped on November 30 to December 2, causing immense hardships to passengers.

From Mangaluru port. M V Amini Divi, will sail for Lakshadweep with 46 passengers tomorrow, the sources added.

Due to the cyclone, about 1,098 passengers had been stranded in the ports of Kochi, Kozhikode and Mangaluru since Noand Mangaluru since No-vember 30.

China protests India's drone 'intrusion' in Sikkim sector

KJM VARMA BEIJING/NEW DELHI, DEC 7 (PTI):

Indian drone "crossed An Indian drone "crossed over" the border with China and crashed in the Sikkim sector which includes Dokalam after losing contact with the ground control, prompting Beijing to lodge a diplomatic protest with India over the violation of Chi-

na's territorial sovereignty. China's Defence Ministry and the Ministry of Foreign Affairs said that the Indian unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) crashed into the Chinese side of the bor-

der recently. "Recently "Recently an Indian Un-manned Aerial Vehicle (UAV) invaded China's airspace and crashed in the Sikkim section of China-India border," Foreign Ministry spokesman Geng Shuang told a media briefing here.

troops had taken a "professional and responsible attitude" to verify the device

Geng did not spell out when the incident had taken place.

In New Delhi, India's defence ministry today said an unmanned aerial vehicle had "crossed over" the border with China in the Sik-kim sector after losing contact with the ground control due to

some technical problem.

It said the Indian border security personnel, as per standard protocol, immediately alerted their Chinese counterparts to locate the UAV and they

later reverted with its location.

The defence ministry said the exact cause of the incident is under investigation.
Sources said the UAV be-

longed to the Indian Army.

The incident comes to light days before Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi's visit to New

Delhi to attend the Russia- India-China trilateral meeting.

"I want to point out that the Sikkim section of the China India border has been delimited," Chinese Foreign ministry spokesman said, in an apparent reference to the 1890 China-

British Treaty.
Beijing often referred to the 1890 Britain-China treaty during the lengthy Dokalam standoff, stating that it has defined the Sikkim section of the boundary with Tibet, therefore the border in that area has been settled.

"The action of the Indian side violated China's sovereignty and it is not conducive to the peace and tranquillity of the border area and China is dissatisfied with this and lodged solemn representation with the Indian side," Geng said.

In its diplomatic protest to India, "China asked the Indian

side to stop the activities of the devices near the border and work with China to maintain peace and tranquillity of the border areas", he said.

Geng declined to reveal the de-tails of the drone. He did not confirm whether the crash has taken place near the Dokalam where the two countries were locked in a 73-day-long border standoff

which ended on August 28.

The standoff ended after Chinese troops stopped building a key road close to India's Chicken Neck corridor.

Asked whether the protest was lodged in Beijing or Delhi, he said he is not aware of the details. "I know that China has lodged solemn representation to the Indian side," he said.

Will extend deadline for mandatory linking of Aadhaar: Centre tells SC

ing of Aadhaar to avail various services and welfare schemes would shortly be extended till March 31 next year, the Centre today told the Supreme Court.

The statement was made by the Centre before a bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra, which said it may set up a five-judge Constitution bench next week to hear several pleas seek ing an interim stay on the decision of mandatory linking of Aadhaar. Attorney General K K Venu-

gopal vehemently opposed be-fore the bench, which also com-prised Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, the plea of senior advocate Shyam Divan, appearing for those opposing the Aadhaar scheme, that the ongoing Aadhaar enrolment process be stayed.

"There cannot be a stay on the Aadhaar scheme which has gone on for years," Venugopal said, adding that the current deadline of December 31 will be extended and a notification to

this effect may be issued tomorrow itself.

Venugopal said he was ready and willing to argue the case finally and no interim stay should be granted in such an important matter.

The bench also made it clear that only a larger bench would de-cide on the plea for grant of interim stay on the Aadhaar scheme

The top court said that the constitution bench would also fix the date for the final hearing and disposal of the petitions challenging the biometric identification scheme

On November 27, the apex court had said it may consider setting up a constitution bench to hear pleas challenging the Centre's move to make Aadhaar card mandatory for availing various services and benefits of welfare schemes.

It had on October 30 said a constitution bench would commence hearing on the clutch of petitions against Aadhaar scheme from last week of November.

had held that Right to Privacy was a Fundamental Right under the Constitution. Several petitioners challenging the validity of Aadhaar had claimed it violated privacy rights.

The Centre had on October 25 told the top court that the deadline for mandatory linking of Aadhaar to receive benefits of government schemes has been extended till March 31, 2018 for those who do not have the 12-digit unique biometric iden tification number and were willing to enrol for it.

The Attorney General had told the court that no coercive action would be taken against those who do not have the Aadhaar card but are willing to enrol for. He had said such people would not be denied the benefits of social welfare schemes till March 31.

In a note to the court, the government had said that "those who have Aadhaar are required to seed/link their Aadhaar with SIM card, with bank account,

where section 7 notifications have been issued".

The government open for the deadline for linking Aadhaar to various programmes being extended for another three months till March 31, 2018 for those who do not have Aadhaar," the note had said.

Some petitioners in the top court have termed the linking of the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) number with bank accounts and mobile numbers as "illegal and unconstitutional"

They have also objected to the CBSE's alleged move to make Aadhaar card mandatory for students appearing for examinations, a contention denied by the Centre.

One of the counsel represent-ing the petitioners had earlier said that final hearing on the main Aadhaar matter was necessary as the government "cannot compel" citizens to link their Aadhaar with either bank accounts or cell phone numbers.

NEW DELHI, DEC 7 (PTI): The Supreme Court today said the law does not sanction the concept of a woman's religion getting merged with her husband's faith after an inter- religion marriage. A five-judge Constitution Bench headed by Chief

No law provides change of woman's

religion after marriage: SC

Justice Dipak Misra was dealing a legal question whether a Parsi woman loses her religious identity if she marries a man from a different religion.

The bench, also comprising Justices A K Sikri, A M Khanwilkar, D Y Chandrachud and Ashok Bhushan, asked senior advocate Gopal Subramanium, representing the 'Valsad Parsi Trust', to take instruction and apprise it on December 14 as to whether it can allow Goolrokh M Gupta, a Parsi woman who had married a Hindu, to attend the last rites of her parents.

Gupta has challenged the customary law, upheld by the

Guiarat High Court in 2010, that a Parsi woman marrying a Hindu loses her religious rights in the Parsi community and hence, loses the right to visit the "Tower of Silence" in the

event of her father's death to perform the last rites.
"There is no law which says that a woman loses religious identity after marrying a man from another faith... Moreover, the Special Marriage Act is there and allows that two persons can marry and maintain their respective religious identities," the bench said.

The bench said it was only the woman who can decide about her religious identity by exercising her right to choice.

Playing rummy with small stakes in a club not gambling: Delhi HC

New Delhi, Dec 7 (PTI): The Delhi High Court has agreed with a lower court's observation that playing rummy with small stakes at a club does not

amount to gambling.
Justice Valmiki J Mehta's observation came on an appeal filed by one Suresh Kumar, challenging a trial court order directing him to pay Rs 3 lakh to the Central Secretariat Club here as damages for filing a false police complaint.

Trial court, in my opinion, also has rightly held that merely because a card game of rummy was played in the club premises with small stakes from a few annas to some rupees would not make it gambling as held by the Supreme Court," Justice Mehta said.

Kumar, a former em ployee of the club, had complained that a "mafia" operated there and the allowed gambling within its premises.

The trial court had,

however, opined that Kumar had failed to discharge the burden of proof on him. The High Court agreed

with the lower court's observations and noted that Kumar was "frustrated" as he had been fired by the club over misconduct.

"I completely agree with the discussion, reasoning and conclusion of the trial court because the complaint filed by the appellant (Kumar) was on account of his frustration of having been removed from the services of the club and the allegations

made by him were not bonafidely made... "They were made ei-ther as a revenge or to pressurise the club to take the him back in service (along) with the fact that complaint was made after around two years of him being removed from the services with the club, the court said.

Externalising Threats, Foisting Insecurities

Projecting enemies does not resolve anything

 ${f A}$ respected professor of peace & conflict studies, addressing a workshop in Sikkim some years ago spoke about the insecurity dilemmas of South Asian nations and how this deters not just peace, but also development in the region. It has been some years since he shared that observation, but nothing has changed on ground, in fact, if anything, the insecurities have only deepened.

The attempt here will be to play these international relations arguments into the local, cross-border realities and see what the possible solutions are. The eight countries that make up South Asia are all inflicted with high levels of insecurity and lack the institutional mechanisms which could address these insecurities and the resultant confrontations through non-violent conflict resolution tools. Failed and weak states were also gripped with internal security threats. Weak states also externalize these threats, as is apparent in the India-bashing that South Asian countries ranging from Pakistan to Sri Lanka to Bangladesh and even Nepal are wont to do. These attitudes obviously force individual countries to turn away from each other and resist genuine inter-State cooperation even though such cooperation has worked with tremendous such cess for EU, ASEAN and even AU. One reason why this has not happened here is because the option of inter-State cooperation to resolve conflicts and develop a more pronounced economic inter-dependence which would reinforce binding peace has not been explored and propounded with adequate commitment, neither by the leaders, nor even the academia or the

Extend this argument to our immediate region and the evidence of its accuracy comes through just as convincingly. The aandolan in Darjeeling continues to externalize its failures and weaknesses, in the present case, by painting a bulls-eye on the WB State Government and taking pot-shots at it. The "irredentist reali-ties" that professor had spoken of as complicating the inter-State relations in South Asia are very much existent in the Sikkim-Darjeeling-West Bengal relations as well and are frequently teased, as has been apparent in the comments made by leaders from across the interstate border on the political situation and system in Sikkim. Of course, of late, even para-dropped into Sikkim BJP leaders have also made rather condescending remarks about Sikkim and its democracy.

It is obvious that the Sikkim-bashing by Bengal leaders, whether from Darjeeling or further down the plains, is only setting up the stage for a more pro-nounced meddling in Sikkim's affairs in the coming days. Students of Peace & Conflict Studies are often shown Afghanistan as a failed state and there can be no arguments against this conclusion. Afghanistan under the Taliban externalized all its threats on to the entire Western world. Among the Very Weak States in the region is Nepal and its traditional animosity towards India whom it blames for everything that goes wrong in the country needs no detailing. The weak states are Pakistan, Sri Lanka and Bangladesh, all of which continue to deny peace to their people by amplifying perceived and real "external" threats. Now Burma has joined the chorus as well.

But if that be the present reality, what are the prospects for the future? Anyone would recommend more involvement of the intellectual elite and the civil society in building the grounds for increased cooperation and exchange and the establishment of unanimous non-interventionist norms. Too many people have been talking over each other. The only way forward, however is for them to speak to each other. Confrontational attitudes, even though they deflect attention for while, fail in the long run because they make everyone insecure. The sooner everyone learns that, the better.

We like to think of our memories as sepia cellu-loid snippets of our life upon this Earth.

We think they "reflect us" and remind us of the person we like to be. True, memories can be iffy sometimes. We don't always remember all the details, but mostly our memories are real.

For a long time, scientists backed us up. Early memory researchers thought that most memories retained some connection with reality. To be sure, memories were elaborately constructed in a bub-bling and boiling cauldron of expectation, emotion, motivation, personal opinion, prejudice and self-delusion — what we scientists call, in our typically obtuse way, self-induced, systematic distortations. But there would usually be some element

As it turns out, we are wrong. When it comes to

emory, reality need not apply.
Psychologists have demonstrated that a skilled manipulator can create memories out of the fantastical thin air. Psychologist Julia Shaw does this in experiments with students. Using basic psychology, she can convince 70 per cent of her subjects that they committed a crime, when in fact they never did. It is "alarmingly easy" to do, she says.

How does she achieve this remarkable fabrica-

First, she makes people trust her. Second, she establishes her authority. Third, she constructs their new memory by invoking, through image, visualization and narrative, the subject's imagi-

Like a potter at her wheel, she moulds and shapes the memory, layering in detail and reinforcing through repetition. Finally, she fires the new memory in the kiln of social pressure and group membership. Voila, the student is a convict-

HUMAN SURVIVAL REQUIRES GROUP COHERENCE

It's shocking, but understandable, from an evolutionary perspective. Neurological mechanisms that create malleable memory do not make us sheeple, but they do go a long way towards creating group identification and coherence, an absolute requisite for human survival before advanced civilization

Malleable memory is an evolutionary thing, and lot more common than you think.

For better or worse, we're all doing it all the

time, unconsciously or consciously.

Even — perhaps especially — Donald Trump.

Like Mickey Mouse in Fantasia, he uses his Twitter magic wand to exploit this "malleable memory effect" to achieve ultra-right economic and social

Just as Julia Shaw did with her students, Trump establishes trust by saying things like: "Nobody would fight harder for free speech than me," "I will create jobs like no one else," I'm the greater doer of things and suggests I'm a good old down home

He establishes authority by saying things like "Nobody knows jobs like I do", by pretending he's the smartest guy in the room and the best man for

After all, he's got the highest IQ, and the biggest crowds. He's the highest-rated and the best thing ever. "Believe me," he says, and his followers be-

He uses images, visualizations and narratives to create whatever memory and new reality he wants. He does it, as he well knows, with consummate mastery and skill.

He practised these skills when he, and the people who were helping him, took down Hillary Clinton. He portrayed her to the people as a crooked, corrupt, incompetent and dangerous failure who would screw over Americans and take them to war. He reinforced it by naming her Crooked Hillary.

And, finally, he invoked group membership and social pressure to lock it all down. He divides Americans into "winners" and "losers," and invites the winners to stand on his side. They apparently heed his call:

There's no doubt Trump is a skillful manipulator of people's memory system. It explains why people who would never ordinarily have voted for Trump cast their ballots for him anyway. He is not a moron, and he's certainly not crazy.

ADDICTED TO ACCU-MULATING CASH?

He may be heavily addicted to the accumulation of money, to the point where he'd rather invoke nuclear war with Korea than slow its flow, but he's not mad, stupid or

crazy, that's for sure.

I imagine he's having a good chuckle. While everybody moralizes and judges, he simply "gets it done." He is making America great again, for the filthy rich. Under the discredited guise of trickle-down economics, he is accused of trounc-

ing on everybody, and possibly taking us all to war, so he and his brethren can legislate their conserva-

In the interests of the uber-rich, his administration has decimated environmental controls, executed a coup d'état of the American education system and passed into law the "biggest" tax bill and tax cuts in history. The only thing he's failed at so far is wiping out health care for the poor, but he might also get that job done in the future.

So what to do? I suppose that depends on whether you're a fan of trickle-down economics or not, or think Trump's a dangerous traitor or not. Personally, I'm on the side of Will Rogers and the IMF, both of whom say, in their own special way, trickle-down economics is a joke.

If you're not a Trump fan, recognize that tweets about the Access Hollywood tape and other tweet storms are not madness, they are carefully designed mini-memes designed to manipulate mass

Making fun of him and calling him crazy only serves his agenda. I suggest we all quit playing into his hands and instead do what Chelsea Handler did. Start taking his agenda, and his threat, a whole lot more seriously than we are.

Transphobia, Islamophobia and the free speech alibi

'I disagree with what you say, but I will defend to the death your right to

This quote, often attributed to the 18th-century French Enlightenment philosopher Voltaire (but actually based on the paraphrasing of his work by English biographer, Evelyn Beatrice Hall), has been used as the hallmark for freedom of speech as a fundamental democratic right.
While Voltaire may not have ac

tually uttered those words, he did say: "Tolerance has never provoked a civil war; intolerance has covered the Earth in carnage."

Both sentiments have come into play during recent debates about free speech in two varving contexts: University classes regarding the use of gender-neutral pronouns and in the framing of the House of Commons Motion 103 combating Islamophobia.

These may seem like disparate

concerns but they are in fact related in the way the so-called "alt-right" uses free speech as a rhetorical prop in their campaigns of ideological intimidation.

I am a sociology professor at Wilfrid Laurier University where faculty concerns over a teaching assistant's decision to show a video of University of Toronto professor Jordan Pe-terson arguing against the use of gender-neutral pronouns has been wide-

ly publicized and critiqued. Supporting the right of transgender people to be acknowledged out-

side of gender-binary language that erases their identities and experiences is branded as left-wing, bleeding heart "political correctness." When academics opt to keep views that re-fuse this acknowledgement from be-ing uncritically purveyed, it's seen as undermining free speech rather than preserving human rights.

As an Islamophobia studies scholar, I recently testified in support of Motion 103 before a Canadian Her-

dom of expression and the intolerance that Voltaire alludes to becomes clear. Sacrificing human rights on the altar of free speech has become a strategy

in the "alt-right" tool kit of bigotry.
Right-wing ideologues use free speech as an alibi for their transphobic and Islamophobic rhetoric. It has become a tool for related neo-fascist groups to mount campaigns of van-dalism, harassment and intimidation. On my campus, colleagues have reviolent "rightlash."

By accusing social justice class-rooms as being "indoctrination cults," Jordan Peterson manages to claim innocence for his own political rhetoric supporters say otherwise

As an academic, I support free speech as well as academic freedom. But these are not without limitations. Freedom of expression is limited by the consequences of that speech. Spreading hate is not free speech.

When I show videos of controver-sial speakers like Peterson and Anne Coulter in my classes, it is within a critical context where students can deliberate on the boundaries be-tween free speech, hate speech and human rights in a democratic society based on social justice ideals.

Using free speech as an alibi to deny transgender people the free-dom to identify themselves through the use of gender-neutral pronouns is tantamount to disregarding and dismissing their personhood.

Using free speech as an alibi to deny Muslims the freedom to name their oppression when members of their faith were gunned down while praying adds insult to grave injury. Our freedoms only extend to the

point where they do not infringe on the freedom of others. Promoting free speech as a democratic ideal without respecting its limits and taking responsibility for its consequences is antithetical to the greater good of a

just and inclusive society.

The West Bengal gov-ernment will announce a new information technology (IT) policy at Bengal Global Business Summit (BGBS) in January, chief minister Mamata Banerjee said today.

The government has had discussions with industry bodies such as ASSOCHAM CII and Nasscom before framing the policy, she said.

"We have decided to announce a new IT policy during the BGBS in January. We want to create more jobs in the IT sector and might even dole out property tax, rental tax reliefs and other subsidies," Banerjee said at the Infocom 2017 here. The CM also said com-

panies like TCS, Cognizant were expanding here and ITC Infotech will begin operations soon.

The government is also setting up a hardware park at Sonarpur near the metropolis, she said.

"There is space available for creating 2.6 lakh job opportunities in the state," she said.

39 held for unlawful fishing in turtle sanctuary

KENDRAPARA (ODISHA), DEC 7 (PTI): Coast guard personnel have arrested 39 fishermen for alleged unlawful trawling activities in turtle concentration zones of Odisha's Gahirmatha marine sanctuary.

Four fishing vessels used by the intruders to venture into the prohibited sanctuary were also seized by the patrolling unit on board a ship, Coast Guard commandant Ashis said.

The interception took place yesterday near Agarnasi coast, around 11 nautical miles from Paradip shore, Ashis said.

The coast guard ship had spotted the trawls and asked the fishermen to surrender through a wireless communication system. They surrendered soon after, he said.

The fishing vessels had trespassed into prohibited corridors, contravening the provisions of Wildlife Protection Act, Orissa Ma-rine Fishing Regulation Act and the rules of the marine sanctuary.

The fishermen and the seized vessels were later handed over to forest department, the commandant added.

The turtles usually get

ensnared in fishing nets or hit by trawls' propel-lers, Gahirmatha Forest Range Officer Subrata Pa-

tra explained.
"The Coast Guard has done a commendable job to ensure the safety of turtles in the sanctuary Patra said, adding that the fishermen were produced before a local court, which remanded them in judicial custody for 14 days.



Mumbai, Dec 7 (PTI): A democratic country like India is cutting a very sorry figure with open threats being given to artists and others and with attacks on people for voicing their opinions,

The high court, while referring to the Sanjay Leela Bhansali's controver-sy-hit film "Padmavati", observed that the director has not been able to rehis film and an actress is facing death threats. The HC also pulled up the CBI and

the state CID, which are investigating the murder cases of rationalists Narendra Dabholkar and Govind Pansare respectively, over the failure to arrest

the main suspects in these cases so far.

The strong remarks were made by a division bench of Justices S C Dharmadhikari and Bharti Dangre while hearing the petitions filed by family members of Dabholkar and Pansare seeking court supervision on their urder probe.

"In this country, we have come to a situation where people cannot voice

their opinions. Everytime a person says he or she wants to voice their opinion, somebody or a fringe group says they would not allow it. This does not augur well for the state," Justice Dharmadhikari said.

"In which other country do you see threats given to artists and performers? It is distressing to know that a person makes a feature film and several people work tirelessly towards it, but is not able to release the film because of continued threats. What have we come to?" he said.
"Today, somebody says I will give a

reward to anyone who kills an actress. Such open threats! People are taking pride in saying we will give reward to those, who will kill an actress. And even chief ministers are saying they will not allow the release of the movie in their states," Justice Dharmadhikari said referring to some states banning the release of "Padmavati". He added that if such things are han-

pening to people with financial backings, what will happen to poor people.

The court noted that this was censorship of a different kind and it was damaging India's image.
"What concerns us is India's image

and reputation as a democratic country. We are the largest democracy. We cannot take pride in the happenings of such incidents day in and day out. We are cutting a very sorry figure,"

Net ac cutting a very sorty lighter, Justice Dharmadhikari said. Referring to the recent case where a foreign couple was attacked in Uttar Pradesh, he said, "Somebody visits this country as tourists and they are attacked." The bench noted that states like

Maharashtra and Karnataka are known for their "progressive and modern thinking". "Maharashtra and Karnataka are

when any major incident occurs, the suspect is apprehended, dead or alive,

known for social reformers and thinkers and with such incidents these states are cutting a sorry figure politically too," the court said. It added that in other countries

"However, our country's agencies have not learnt anything from past in-cidents like the attack on Parliament and the Prime Minister," Justice Dharmadhikari said.

The court said Dabholkar was killed in 2013 and Pansare in 2015, but till date the investigating agencies (CBI and state CID) have not been able to arrest the main suspects.
"We cannot allow such serious mat-

ters to linger for years. We cannot allow constitutional rights to be taken away. Enough damage has been caused

already. Has any senior official from why the probe is not getting any head-away?" the court asked.

It said even after these two attacks, there are persons, who are openly and boldly voicing their opinions, are being threatened.

"At the core of these two crimes is the bold attempts being made by fringe groups to attack those who voice their rational views, thoughts, feelings and expressions," the court said.

"Hence, we feel that it is time to call upon the CBI and the CID to involve their superiors. If the senior officials do not wish to be summoned to court, then they should meet with the counsels appearing in court and take stock of the situation," Justice Dharmadhikari said.

The court directed a meeting to be convened with secretary of state home department, Director General of Police (DGP) and Joint Director of CRI with Additional Solicitor General Anil Singh and Ashok Mundargi, who appears for CID in the matter.

The bench has now posted the matter for further hearing on Dec

While the CBI is probing the Dabholkar case, the Pansare murder case is being investigated by a Special Investigation Team of the CID.

Dabholkar was murdered in Pune on August 20, 2013 and Pansare was shot on February 16, 2015 in Kolhapur. He died on February 20 in a hospital.


completely agree with Prakash sir. It's very important that coaches need to be looked at, it's high time we looked at it because we should have looked at it in the past 10 years and we haven t. And it s not only badminton but across all sports; this is for me the most important thing which is there," Gopichand said here today.
"Coaches need to be respect-

ed, coaches need to be rewarded, coaches need to be awarded and people should be motivated to take up coaching," said Gopichand on the sidelines of the function to announce a grass-roots talent hunt plan by his academy with

IDBI Federal Life Insurance.

A few days ago Prakash said that it was high time the badminton-governing body in the country, BAI, Sports Authority of India and the sports ministry looked at coaching the coache by inviting top foreign coaches to do the iob.

"We treat Indian coaches differently, foreign coaches differently. I ll have to say this openly, but there s not a single rupee of remu-neration which any of the coaches in the past have got from either the federation or the SAI. It s time



they start looking at coaches differently, start looking at coaching differently. And unless we do that we can t sustain the ecosystem of sports," he explained.

All these are important. "In the entire ecosystem of the sport, how many coaches do we know from various fields? Even sportspersons, reporters, and myself, we would not know

so many of them.

Also, how much of pay we give them is also important," he arked.

"The best models in the world are where they re coached at and athlete-centric and sys-tem-driven and unfortunately we re far away from that model,

Gopichand also expressed concerns over the cramped international calendar of the Badminton World Federation.

"I think they ve cramped the calendar too much. It s unfortunate the kind of thinking that the BWF has. And I don t agree to what they have in terms of getting players to play so many tournaments. And there are players who re already getting injured, performances have not been consistent at all and it doesn t help the players' cause when they have to continue to push themselves to play so many tournaments.

In a letter to BCCI act-ing president C K Khanna and head of committee of administrators Vinod Rai, IMA president Dr KK Agarwal said the message that has gone home from the India and Sri Lanka cricket match is that it is safe for children to play cricket even when PM 2.5

levels are more than 300.

The five-day match, in which Sri Lankan play-

ers were seen wearing masks on the field, ended yesterday.

"Rain and poor light are taken into consideration when determining suitable playing condi-tions, we suggest that atmospheric pollution should now also be in-cluded in the assessing criteria for a match," the letter said.

Agarwal said air pollution impacts on per-formance of the athletes. In a situation where milliseconds and milli-metres often determine success, air pollution can be an important factor in affecting their performance, he wrote.

He quoted from medical literature and journals and said poor air quality in the country's capital may increase the risk of lung and heart disease and precipi-tate an acute potentially

life-threatening event.
The safe levels of atmospheric particulate matter (PM), according to World Health Organization (WHO) air quality guidelines, are 20 g/cu mm (annual mean) for PM10 and 10 g/ cu mm (annual mean) for PM2.5.

If the air quality index (AQI) is between 151 and 200 it is recommended should be reduced.

46th FIH Congress in New Delhi from Oct 30 to Nov 03

he 46th Congress of the International Hockey Federation (FIH) will be held in New Delhi from October 30 to November 3 next year.
With former Hockey India chief

Narinder Batra being elected as the first non-European FIH President last year, the power centre of world hockey seems to have shifted its base from

As a matter of fact, it will be the first FIH Congress under Batra's leadership after he took over the reins of world hockey from Spaniard Leandro Negre.

The biennial event will run for four days and will comprise meetings, social events, networking opportunities and presentations.

The Congress, which will have representations from the National Associations, will also chart out the future roadmap of the game, including the ongoing Hockey Revolution, FIH's 10-year strategy to drive hockey's status as a global sport.

The next FIH Congress will hold greater significance as the game is about to witness a transition phase in 2019 with the introduction of the world body's ambitious Hockey Pro League, a new home-and-away league which is expected to stretch over the first six onths of a calendar year.
"Our next Congress will be held in

New Delhi from October 30 to November 3. The next Congress is very important for us as hockey will witness transition in 2019. As part of our Hockey Revolution, the Hockey Pro League will start in 2019," FIH President Narinder Batra told PTI on the sidelines of the ongoing Hockey World League (HWL) Final, here.

With just one year to go before the HPL actually kicks off, the project remains a mystery as the FIH is yet to come out with the details of the tournament.

Another factor which is a con-cern for many is scheduling as the Pro League will coincide with the European Hockey League, the bread and butter for international hockey players.

A few years back, hockey was in dan-ger of being dropped from the Olympic sport but the FIH chief says the future of the sport is safe and secured.

"Hockey is not facing any threat. The

future of hockey is safe. In fact, we are witnessing a rise in hockey's popularity. Hockey has survived and will continue to survive." Batra said.

"The game is being played by 170 countries. Yes, all hockey playing countries doesn't belong to the same level

tries doesn't belong to the same level but the game is in a better position." With changes and innovations be-coming the need of the hour for any sport, the FIH chief has welcomed Hockey India's recent experiment with mixed-gender event during its Hockey 5s National Championships. He, however, said that trying out a

new thing doesn't necessarily mean the world body is contemplating of introducing it.

"Hockey 5s mixed event was tried for the first time with FIH's approval and it turned out to be a huge success, Batra said.

"Every national association has right to try out new things with FIH's approval but it doesn't mean the FIH is thinking of implementing it. FIH is open to national associations trying out new things like 2 goals for one field goal rule of Hockey India League.

"We, at FIH, have a technical committee with experts in it who constantly discuss all these changes. We have a system in place and we work according to that system," the FIH President added.

India will also host the men's Hockey World Cup to be held in Bhubneswar from November 28 to December 16 next year.

Can Cong breach BJP stronghold of 'diamond city' Surat?

AHMEDABAD, DEC 7 (PTI): urat -- Guiarat's diamond Scity and the epicenter of the Patidar quota movement -- is set for a tough Assembly poll battle as the Congress has added the face of the Patidar agitation Hardik Patel to

its arsenal this time.

Amid issues like imple mentation of the Goods and Services Tax (GST) and demonetisation, apart from the 'Patidar' factor, it is to be seen Patidar factor, it is to be seen for whom the large trading community of this diamond and textile hub will vote, when the city goes to polls in the first phase on Saturday

Though Ahmedabad is the largest city of Gujarat, Surat is a favoured destination of political heavyweights in this poll season. Congress Vice President

Rahul Gandhi visited the city twice last month to understand the plight of those who

were "hit by GST and note ban".

During his visit, Gandhi also addressed a huge rally in the city's Patidar strongholds Varachha and Katargam.

On December 3, quota agitation leader Hardik Patel led a mega road show in Varachha, Guiarat Chief Minister Vijay Rupani led the BJP's road show in Majura area the same dav.

Prime Minister Narendra Modi last month addressed a rally at Kadodara, located on the city's outskirts.

The Congress is hoping to snatch some seats from the BJP this time by capitalising on the 'anger' factor of Patidars and the traders.
On the other side, the BJP

is confident of retaining its bastion, as its leaders claim the 'ground reality' is different from what the Congress is projecting.
Out of the total 12 constitu

encies in Surat city, nearly half of the seats - Varachha Road, Kamrej, Katargam, Karanj, Olpad and Udhna - have a concentrated population of Pa-tidars, who mostly migrated here from Saurashtra.

The remaining six seats are - Surat-East, Surat-North, Surat-West, Choryasi, Limbayat and Majura.

To some extent, Surat-North and Majura seats also have a significant popula-tion of Patidars, who are into various businesses, including diamond cutting, polishing, trading and in different trades associated with textiles

The city has been a bastion of the BIP since long.

But, the political scenario in this bustling business hub seems to have changed after Hardik Patel started the agita-tion to get reservation for his community two years back.

At that time, Surat wit-nessed large scale violence and arson, mostly in Varachha and adjoining areas.
Out of the two sedition

cases lodged against Hardik, one was registered in Surat. Since then, the Hardik-led agitating body - Patidar Anamat Andolan Samiti (PAAS) - is up in arms against the ruling BJP and has vowed to defeat it.

Notably, BJP president Amit Shah had to cut short his speech at a function in Varachha area in September when some PAAS agitators

created chaos by shouting slogans and throwing chairs. Now, in an apparent bid to thwart the anti-incumbency factor following the Patidar 'anger', the BJP has dropped six of its sitting MLAs - from Kamrej, Surat-East, Surat-North, Karanj, Udhna and

Katargam seats.
These leaders include sitting MLA of Katargam, Nanu Vanani, who is a minister in the Rupani government.

Out of the nearly 1.98 lakh voters of Varachha Road seat, the Patidars are in the driving seat with their number being over 1.5 lakh.

In Kamrej, where the total electorate is about 4.28 lakh, the Patidars alone account for over two lakh. Katargam, having

around 2.77 voters, the Patidars are in a dominating position with over 1.18 lakh

Besides the 'angry' Patidars and traders, there are various other factors which could breach the hull of BJP's ship in this coastal city.

Since a large population, mostly Patels, of this city belongs to Saurashtra region, the agrarian crisis back home could also add fuel into their 'anger here, Surat city Congress president Hasmukh Desai said.

"Many decades back, Patels and other communities from Saurashtra region started settling here. Since they still own agricultural land back home, they are holding the BJP government responsible for their dwin-dling farm income. It is possible that their anger could reflect in the voting here," Desai said.

Apart from Patidars, the Congress is also banking on small traders and entrepreneurs whose businesses were claimed to have been hit by demonetisation and the implementation of GST the Centre.

In July, the textile traders of Surat city called a massive strike against the GST.

The Congress was quick to take up the issue and party vice president Rahul Gandhi held two back-to-back visits

"On one side we are getting full support from the Patidars, while on the other the trading community and the shopkeepers, who are spread across the city, are seeing a ray of hope in Congress after Gandhi's visit. All the factors are in our favour," Desai claimed.

However, the BIP discarded the argument, claiming that the ground reality is totally different.

"Though traders were unhappy initially, they now understand the benefits of GST. This so-called anger will never convert into votes. If the people were still against us then why so many had turned up for the chief minister's rally?" BJP's sitting MLA from

by the BJP-led government at Majura, Harsh Sanghvi, asked. Meanwhile, the PAAS members have already hit the

streets in the Patidar-dominated areas to convince people not to vote for the BIP. According to PAAS convener for Surat, Dharmik Mala-

via, they have set a target of defeating the BJP on at least five seats - Varachha Road, Karanj, Kamrej, Olpad and Surat-North. 'When we tell people do not vote for the BJP, it im-plies that vote for Congress if

you want to uproot the party

which committed atrocities on us," Malavia said. "The people are in our support and the BJP candi-dates are finding it difficult to even enter into the Patidar societies for canvassing," he claimed.

The 182-member Gujarat Assembly will go to the polls in two phases -- on December 9 and 14 -- and the counting of votes will be taken up on December 18.

Australia lawmakers approve samesex marriage

SYDNEY, DEC 7 (AFP): Gay couples will be able to le-gally marry in Australia after a same-sex marriage bill sailed through parliament today, ending decades of political wrangling.

There were cheers, hugs and sus-tained clapping in the 150-seat lower House of Representatives when all but four MPs voted in sup-port of marriage equality, after the upper house Senate passed the bill 43-12 last week. "What a day for love,

for equality, for respect! Australia has done it," Prime Minister Malcolm Turnbull told the House.

"Every Australian had their say and they said it is fair, get on with it!" The historic reforms

will commence on Saturday, when same-sex cou-ples can a lodge a notice to marry. They will then have to wait a month before tying the knot.

Labor oppo

opposition leader Bill Shorten hailed the passing of the bill as a uniting moment for Australia, adding: "Now is the time for healing".

"A time to build, a time to love, and is now at last a time for marriage equality," he said.

campaigners converged outside parliament in the nation's capital Canberra to celebrate the historic occasion, which sees Australia join more than 20 other countries in recog nising such unions.

The bill was tabled in

parliament by the conservative government after Australians last month endorsed the reforms in a controversial voluntary

postal vote.

Nearly 80 per cent of eligible voters took part in the poll, and almost 62 per cent of the 12.7 million people who participated chose "yes" on their postal ballots

The ballot had been called by Turnbull, a moderate who backed gay marriage, in the face of oppo-sition from hardliners who refused to back a national plebiscite on the issue.

It was opposed by proponents of same-sex marriage, who wanted direct legislative action and ar-gued a poll would expose gay people and their fami-

lies to hate speech.

Just under five million
people voted "no", with conservative politicians using their rejection of gay mar-riage as a catalyst to push for religious exemptions to be included in the bill.

But after lengthy de-bate, both houses of parliament knocked back amendments to the bill, including from former prime minister and staunch "no campaigner Tony Abbott, on religious freedom.

UN Security Council to meet on Friday on Jerusalem

UNITED NATIONS, DEC 7 (PTI): The United Nations Security Council has convened an emergency meeting to morrow after US President Donald Trump in a controversial move recognised Jerusalem as Israel's capital.

Trump recognised Jerusalem as Israel's capital, reversing decades of US and international policy on the holy city. He also directed the State Department to immediately begin the process of construction of a US Embassy in Jerusalem.

At least eight of the 15 members of the Security Council, including Britain and France - the two permanent members which closely align themselves on most of the global issues - joined by other non-permanent members -- Bolivia, Egypt, Italy, Senegal, Sweden, Britain and Uruguay
-- asked for a special meeting of the top decision-making wing of the New

York-headquartered world body.
The UN Secretary General Anto nio Guterres' is expected to address

the Security Council tomorrow.

Earlier in a statement, Guterres said that Jerusalem was the final status issue and must be resolved through direct negotiations.

"In this moment of great anxiety,

I want to make it clear: there is no

alternative to the two-state solution.
There is no Plan B," he said, adding that he has consistently spoken out against any unilateral measures that would "jeopardise" the prospect of peace for Israelis and Palestinians.

"Jerusalem is a final status issue that must be resolved through direct negotiations between the two parties on the basis of the relevant Security Council and General Assembly resolutions, taking into account the legitimate concerns of both the Palestinian and the Israeli sides," Guterres said.

Trump's decision to recognise

Jerusalem as Israel's capitalon has

outraged several countries.

Many of American allies and partners have criticised Trump for the controversial decision

British Prime Minister Theres May in a statement said she disagreed with the US announcement to move its embassy to Jerusalem and recognise Jerusalem as the Israeli capital

before a final status agreement.

"We believe it is unhelpful in terms of prospects for peace in the region. The British Embassy to Israel is based in Tel Aviv and we have no plans to move it," she said.

May stressed that the status of Ierusalem should be "determined in a negotiated settlement between the Israelis the Palestinians".

"Our position on the status of Jerusalem is clear and long-standing: it should be determined in a negotiated settlement between the Israelis and the Palestinians," she said, adding that "Ierusalem should ultimately be the shared capital of the Israeli and Palestinian states".

"In line with relevant Security Council Resolutions, we regard East Jerusalem as part of the Occupied Palestinian Territories," May said.

The US will immediately begin the process to move its embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem, Secretary of State Rex Tillerson has said, after President Donald Trump recognised the holy city as Israel's capital.

In a major announcement, Trump recognised Jerusalem as Israel's capital yesterday despite warnings from the Arab leaders, reversing decades of US and in-ternational policy on the holy city.

"The State Department will immediately begin the process to implement this decision by starting the preparations to move the US Embassy from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem" Tillerson said

The President Trump's decision to recognise Jerusalem as Israel's capital aligns the US presence with the reality that Jerusa-lem is home to Israel's legislature, Supreme Court, president's office, and prime minister's office,

Tillerson said in a statement.

"We have consulted with many friends, partners, and allies in advance of the President making his decision. We firmly believe there is an opportunity for a last-ing peace," he said.

Tillerson said the the safety of

Americans was the State Department's highest priority, and with other federal agencies, it has implemented robust security plans to protect its citizens in affected regions.

In his landmark announce-ment, Trump said consistent with the Jerusalem Embassy Act, he was directing the State De-partment to begin preparation to move the American Embassy from Tel Aviv to Ierusalem.

"This will immediately begin the process of hiring architects, engineers and planners, so that a new embassy, when completed, will be a magnificent tribute to peace," he said.

The controversial decision received mixed reactions.

"I have long believed that Jerusalem is the true capital of Isra-el. However, issues surrounding the final and permanent status of Jerusalem must ultimately be resolved by Israelis and Palestinians as part of an internationally supported peace process," Senator John McCain said.

"That is why today's policy an-nouncement, as well as any future relocation of the US Embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem. should be part of a comprehensive diplomatic strategy in coordination with regional partners to achieve peace and security between Israe-lis and Palestinians," he said. Democratic Senator Tim Ka-

ine, member of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, said the reaction from across the world is "troubling", including from important allies of Israel, and asserted that the announce-ment could have "destabilising consequences" for a region already rife with tensions.

"I am worried about the impact of this decision on the safety of US personnel overseas and have raised my concerns with the State Department to ensure sufficient security measures are in place at all US embassies and consulates," he said. Another Democratic leader

Nancy Pelosi rued that in the absence of a negotiated settlement between Israel and the Palestinians, moving the US embassy to Jerusalem now may "needlessly spark mass protests, fuel tensions, and make it more difficult

to reach a durable peace".

Senator Marco Rubio said,
"Today's announcement is an important step in the right direction. Unequivocal recognition of Jerusalem as Israel's capital will be complete when the US embassy is officially relocated there".

Following the Trump's decision, many Arab leaders warned that it could trigger an upheaval in the already volatile Middle East.

N Korea says war is inevitable as allies continue war games

SEOUL, DEC 7 (AP): North Korea says a nuclear war on the Korean Peninsula has become a matter of when. not if, as it continued to lash out at a massive joint military exercise between the United States and South Korea involving hundreds

of advanced warplanes. In comments attributed to an unnamed For-

eign Ministry spokesman. North Korea also claimed high-ranked US officials, including CIA Director Mike Pompeo, have fur-ther confirmed American intent for war with a series of "bellicose remarks."

Pompeo said Saturday that US intelligence agencies believe North Kore an leader Kim Jong Un doesn't have a good idea about how tenuous his situation is domestically

and internationally.

The North's spokesman said Pompeo provoked the country by "impudently criticizing our supreme leadership which

is the heart of our people." "The large-scale nuclear war exercises conducted by the US in succession are creating touch-and-go situation on the Korean peninsula and series of violent war remarks coming from the US high-level politicians amid such circumstances have made an outbreak of war on the Korean penin-sula an established fact. The remaining question now is: when will the war break

out," the spokesman said.

"We do not wish for a war but shall not hide from it, and should the US miscalculate our patience and light the fuse for a nuclear war, we will surely make the US dearly pay the consequences.

The comments were carried by the official Korean Central News Agency.


