Tibet museum to come up in Dharamshala

DHARAMSHALA, JAN 13 (PTI): The Tibetan 'gov-ernment-in- exile' has decided to open a Tibet museum at Gangchen Kv ishong here by the end of this year.

The exhibits of the museum will be around 11 themes. The first will be an introduction to Tibet, its history and culture "prior to Chinese invasion", the head of the Tibetan 'government-in-exile' Lobsang Sangay said here.

There will a section

of contemporary Tibet and a memorial space for 1.2 million Tibetans "that have perished as a result of resistance", he said, adding there will themes based on environment and the Dalai Lama.

Tempa Gyaltsen, who handles the environment theme, said, "Tibet with its environmental importance for Asia in terms of water and climate, among other things, is an issue both Tibetans and Chinese have to take heed of and work togeth-

er in the long run."

The cost of the museum will be around Rs six crore, half of which has been sourced, the director of the proposed Tibet Museum Tashi Phuntsok said.

Centre amends housing scheme guidelines

New Delhi, Jan 13 (PTI): The Housing and Urban Affairs (HUA) Min-istry has amended the guidelines of housing scheme for urban areas under Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana.

Areas falling within notified planning or development area under the jurisdiction of an industrial development authority or special area development authority development authority or urban development authority or any such body under state legislation which is entrusted with the functions of urban planning and regula-tions shall also be included for coverage under PMAY(U), according to the amended guidelines.

The housing scheme is being implemented by rural development ministry in rural areas under Pradhan Mantri Awas Yo jana (Gramin) and by HUA ministry in urban areas under Pradhan Mantri Awas Yojana (Urban).

"The beneficiaries in the permanent wait list of PMAY (G) will have the flexibility for opting for a house under PMAY(G) or PMAY (U)," it said.

The benefits of all existing and future rural schemes will not be denied to a beneficiary who would avail a house under this amendment, it added.

Thirteen students from Thirteen squares and different schools of the State are set to par-ticipate in the 'Khelo India' campaign scheduled to be held from 31 Jan at Delhi which aims to promote 150 selected schools in as many districts, and 20 universities across the country, as hubs of sporting excellence, which would enable talented sports per-sons to pursue the dual pathway of education

and competitive sports.

The programme would cover about 200 million children in the age group of 10-18 years under a massive national physical fitness drive, according to Union Min-ister of State for Youth

Affairs and Sports, Rajya-vardhan Singh Rathore. Under the scheme, a campaign will be launched from 31 Jan to 07 Feb to spot sports talents under 17 years in schools, which will be telecast live from Delhi.

For the first selection process, 63 names were sent by State Sports and Youth Affairs Depart-ment out of which 13 have been selected by the Ministry in Delhi.

Govt resumes coin production; mints to work slower

KOLKATA, JAN 13 (PTI): The government has gone back on its decision to halt production of coins entirely and has asked all the four mints in the country to restart production, albeit at a slower pace, industry sources said today. The government has direct-

ed the state-run Security Print-ing and Minting Corporation of India Limited (SPMCIL), which runs the four government mints in Kolkata, Mumbai, Noida and Hyderabad, to work on single shift, instead of the usual two, and keep minting coins of different denominations.

"We have started minting of

coins from yesterday. We have been asked to produce coins of all denominations," Bijan Dey, Vice-President, Calcutta Mint Employees Association, told PTI.

The official said that the Reserve Bank of India (RBI) had given an indent of 7,712 million coin pieces to the government mints for 2017-18 of which 5,900 million units have already been produced.

The mints are expected to meet the target in the remaining two-and-a-half months of the current fiscal.

The RBI picks up the coins

for distribution in the market.

The government had halted oin production from January 9 owing to a glut in the market and lack of storage space.

In an order dated January 9, it

had asked SPMCIL to stop production of circulation coins with im-mediate effect and urged the mints to follow normal working hours "without any overtime for staff" for printing of banknotes only.

The government directive did not go down well with the mint workers who had started agitating because the order would have affected their pay.

Earlier, RBI sources had said that the calibration of coin production needs to take place from time to time based on an assessment of the coins in circulation

and storage space.

Production was stopped since there was no space with banks or the Reserve Bank of India to store the coins.

The SPMCIL notice, a copy of which is available with the PTI, had also said that as on January 8 this year, there was an inventory of 2,528 million pieces of circulation coins lying in the government mints which were not picked up by the RBI.

New Delhi, Jan 13 (PTI): The Executive Committee of the Supreme Court Advocates-on-Record Association (SCAORA) has requested Chief Justice Dipak Misra and four senior most judges to resolve their differences internally and within the constitu-

tional framework.

In a resolution, the

association said it was "pained" with the events which, according to it, "tarnished" the reputa-

tarnished the reputa-tion of the apex court. "Executive Commit-tee of SCAORA is con-cerned and pained with all the events which have tarnished the reputation and image of our esteemed institution.

"It urges stakeholders to exercise restraint and requests them to resolve all issues internally and within the constitutional framework," the resolution said.

Yesterday, four se-or judges--Justices Chelameswar, Ran-jan Gogoi, M B Lokur and Jurian Joseph--had mounted a virtual revolt against the chief justice, listing a litany of problems, including the assignment of cases.

The judges had said

that there were certain issues afflicting the country's highest court and warned that they could destroy Indian democracy.

West Bengal tops DIPP's Business Reforms Action Plan 2017

Nearly 20 lakh devotees to take holy dip at Ganga Sagar

SAGAR ISLAND (WB), JAN 13 (PTI): Nearly 20 lakh devotees from dif-

ferent corner of the country as well countries like Nepal, Bhutan and Bangladesh have gathered to take a holy dip at the confluence of river Ganga and Bay of Bengal on

Makar Sankranti Sunday. "Last year around 15 lakh pilgrims had visited the Ganga Sagar. This year already we have crossed that mark and nearly 20,00,000 people are here. We have made all the arrangements for them so that they can have a memorable outing here," South 24 Parganas district magistrate Y. Ratnakara Rao told PTI today.
A thick blanket of security cov-

er has been placed at the famous spot. The state government has deployed around 3,000 policemen and also pressed into service seven drones to keep a tab on the security as well as the safety of pilgrims

taking a holy dip tomorrow.

In fact, for the first time the state government has equipped its officials with satellite phones to ensure uninterrupted connectivity during the Ganga Sagar Mela

"These satellite phones will ensure that communication is not hampered even if there is an earthquake or a tsunami, among other things," another senior official of the state government told PTI adding that 16 satellite phones has been given to the officers who will be on duty at critical locations.

Incidentally, the state govern-

ment has come up with an innovative Sagar Sanjog Scheme, for providing real-time information regarding the movement of transport facilities for people and vehicles too.

The state government has also

decided to cover over 100 km route from Babughat in Kolkata to the Sagar Island with 500 CCTVs as a part of its security coverage for the grand annual fair.

The state disaster management

department would be getting live feed from the mela area to help effec-tively monitor the proceedings there. As a part of the security ar-

rangements, the state has also introduced a real-time monitoring system the Tirtha Sathi.

'Using the Tirtha Sathi senior administrative and police officers will be able to watch live footages of all the transit and other crucial points, relayed via CCTV cameras, on their mobile phones," Rao said. Besides, 60 giant LED screens

have been placed at different points through which pilgrims would be updated about the timings and fare tariffs of trains, buses and ferries, tide timings as well as safety precautions.

"These information will be pro-vided in three languages Bengali, Hindi and English to facilitate the

largest number of pilgrims," he said.

Talking more on the arrangements, Rao said that the carrying-capacity of barges plying from Lot 8 on the mainland to Kachuberia at the Sagar Island has been doubled this year.

Meanwhile, two battalion of

the NDRF is deployed in Ganga Sagar to mitigate any eventuality during Mela.

This year total 85 personnel of 2 BN NDRF are deployed at three different places. One team is deployed at Lot 8, one deployed at Kachuberia and one deployed at

This is not just a rant

There used to be a time until a few years ago when a faulty made-in-China product, when it manifested its faultiness, would make it to the news and occasionally also lead to some stabs at generating consumer awareness not just about durability but also health and physically safety of consumers when they allow price consideration to trump production ethics. Nowadays, of course, such stories have dried up; probably because Chinese products have become too ubiquitous to be singled out any more. More worryingly, the reason could be that we just don't care anymore about health and safety issues. Hopefully, that is not the case because while the former situation can be corrected, the latter is a flaw which will require more effort than the corporate interests would allow to be prioritized.

What people need to realize is that when, say for instance, a video game console explodes in the hands of a teenager, there is really no consumer court that the family can approach to seek damages and demand that the dangerous product be recalled from the market. This, for the obvious reason that the product did not the reach the consumer through an organised retail chain, and more importantly, because the manufacturer is untraceable- lost somewhere in the production maze that China has become. This is not a rant seeking the impossibility of banning all those wonderfully affordable made-in-China goods that surround us nowadays, but an attempt to flag the danger we expose our kids to when we pick up such goods without keeping ourselves informed on the risks we bring home. It is not always the obvious danger, as brought to light by injuries caused by exploding components of harmless looking toys some years ago, but also the less overt, but damaging nevertheless, risk of exposing children to hazardous substances that have been proven time and again as the ingredients that keep the cost of made-in-China goods so low. Toys manufactured for 'big companies' by Chinese factories have been in the news for having used lead coating which can cause severe brain damage among the kids. When such a story breaks, the 'big companies' recall the products, but the point we miss here is that this happens only in the developed world. Product recalls on such health grounds are unheard of our country, so the kids here remain unconsciously exposed to substantial hazards, and this gets compounded by the fact that the markets here are flooded more by the low-price, no brandname toys. These goods are obviously even more hazardous and circulate and harm enormously more people without ever getting reported, held to account or penalised. Because these are goods that arrive to our neighbourhoods through the unorganised sector [and no, Nathula Border Trade is not to blame because the real volumes move into the country through the docks and not the border], there is no way cheated, or even injured, consumers can seek remedy.

Since it is mostly families from the lower economic strata who consume more of these nameless hazardous toys, the dots never get connected and health costs never accurately reflected. And the problem is not related to toys alone. Other, similarly compromised goods have caused injury and deaths as well. Some years back. cheap made-in-China tyres disintegrated from moving vehicles causing accidents because one of the ways that the price was kept low was by using insufficient gum strip - a feature that helps keep the tyre belts from separating. One could recount many more such instances but the bottom-line remains the same- the hazards will continue until the consumers prefer to ignore the warn ing signs. Of course this is not an approach that should be devoted to only goods made in China, but because almost everything on the shelves is now imported from that country, that is where the focus will invariably land. Only if the consumers make more informed choices, will the retailers be moved to respect the market's demand. Otherwise, we will reach the stage where no other options will even be available (we are perilously close to that stage now), the prioritisation of low costs over health risks, having wiped out all other options from the market.

Trump is an unfit president - when will his backers run out of uses for him?

 ${f A}$ week after the release of a book depicting him as not intelligent enough and not mentally fit to be trusted as commander-in-chief, Donald Trump has done it again. On the same day he cancelled a visit to London to open the new US embassy there, a move many interpreted as an attempt to avoid embarrassing protests, he embarrassed himself further by demanding to know why the US deigns to accept immigrants from "shithole countries"

Before this latest outburst, the White House had spent a week trying in vain to rise above the account of Michael Wolff's Fire and Fury, which uses the words of people in Trump's White House and inner circle to argue that Trump, in the alleged private words of secretary of state, Rex Tillerson, is a "fucking moron". Having failed to block the book's publication and instead hastened it, the White House pivoted instead to denigrating Wolff and one of his primary sources, the former White House chief strategist and Trump ally Steve Bannon.

Trump pursued the mission with both anger and enthusiasm via his favourite medium, Twitter, slamming the book as "really boring and untruth-

ful" and dismissing Bannon as "Sloppy Steve". Besides reinforcing his image as a temperamental, ill-informed man-child, Trump's counter-attack misses the point. Even if Wolff is a huckster ped-dling dubious quotes, as more than a few journal-ists claim, others have been spreading the message publicly and privately since the day Trump took

Chief among them, via his own actions and words, is Trump himself. But there's also Demo-cratic senator Jack Reed, who in July 2017 told his Republican counterpart Susan Collins, "I think – I think he's crazy. I mean, I don't say that lightly and as a kind of a goofy guy." Collins responded: "I'm worried." Republican senator Bob Corker, the chair of the Senate Foreign Relations Committee, first said that Trump "has not yet been able to demonstrate the stability nor some of the competence that he needs to demonstrate in order to be suc cessful" and later called the White House "an adult day care centre".

The cabinet, too, are more than worried. Be-sides Tillerson's reported contempt, Trump's secretary of defence, James Mattis, and his chief of staff, John Kelly have reportedly made a pact that one of them will be in the US at all times.

But in Wolff's account, the foremost figure to question Trump's faculties is Steve Bannon, the hard-right ideologue who arguably propelled

TREASONOUS AND UNPATRIOTIC

Wolff depicts a Bannon out for himself and his agenda, even at the cost of tearing down Trump and his family. "Javanka", the husband-wife team of Trump's son-in-law Jared Kushner and daughter Ivanka, meet with Bannon's unbridled derision Kushner is financially compromised, including by

Russians, and Ivanka is "dumb as a brick". The elder Trump himself, meanwhile, is a pliable simpleton.

But far more importantly, Wolff's Bannon inserts the Trumps into the middle of the alleged collusion with Russia during the 2016 campaign. Donald Trump Jr., Kushner, and then-campaign manager Paul Manafort are "treasonous" and "unpatriotic" for a June 2016 meeting with three Kremlin-linked envoys in Trump Tower in New York City, arranged by Trump Jr. to discuss Russia's provision

of material damaging to Hillary Clinton. In Wolff's rendering, Bannon thinks the ulti-mate downfall of Trump and Co. will be revelations of Russian financial input into the campaign: "It goes through Deutsche Bank and all the Kushner shit. The Kushner shit is greasy. They [Mueller's

After the book dropped, Bannon did not deny any of his statements. Under pressure from his billionaire backers the Mercer family, he clarified that the words "treasonous" and "unpatriotic" refer only to Manafort, who is already under indictment on financial, tax and lobbying charges related to the Trump-Russia investigation.

Bannon has become the most conspicuous casualty of the Fire and Fury fallout, not only dismissed as "sloppy" by Trump but now ousted from his position at far-right soapbox Breitbart. But even with Bannon mostly stripped of his influence, the complaints against Trump raise a disturbing question: why are so many people who think Trump is mentally unfit still willing for him to remain in of-

The answer is that no matter how unstable and vacuous he may be, Trump is a very useful vehicle for other people's ambitions

THE USEFUL IDIOT

Even after his supremely unedifying first year,


Trump still serves as a conveniently empty vesse for all manner of enablers. Having resuscitated his career after six bankruptcies by playing a business-man on reality TV, he now plays the role of chief executive so industries can get pesky regulations rolled back

As he keeps up his stream of offensive, irresponsible pronouncements. GOP legislators put up with it so they can finally secure their \$1.5 trillion tax giveaway. And as white supremacists proclaim their moment has come: as David Duke, former KKK Grand Wizard, explained at the violent Char-lottesville march in August 2017: "We are going to fulfil the promises of Donald Trump. That's what we believed in."

As long as Trump serves that purpose, it does not matter how many conflicts of interest he has, how many women accuse him of sexually harassing or assaulting them. It does not matter how many memoranda or constitutional clauses he does not read or understand. And it does not matter how many Russians he and his inner circle might have met and assisted.

But Trump's usefulness might well expire when Robert Mueller completes his work. That could be sooner than many people would like – with Manafort indicted and former national security advisor Michael Flynn pleading guilty to lying to the FBI, the next probable target is Kushner – and from there, it's only one rung up the ladder to Trump himself. Then again, Mueller's probings could take months or years more to get there. Until then, this emperor's new clothes nightmare continues with no end in sight.

As the Myanmar government's violent policy towards its Rohingya Muslims drew increasing international condemnation in 2016, the country's San Suu Kyi, declined to speak out for the persecuted minority. And in her attempts to protect Myanmar from re-newed isolation, she has continued to deepen its relationship with her most powerful authoritarian neighbour: China. It seems the common notion that newly democratic states have lit-

tle time for autocratic partners is false. Before the West started paying real attention to the Rohingya crisis, Myan-mar's democratic transition was some-thing of a cause celebre. But in reality, the country is still under military sway, and the democratic West is still less in-fluential in Myanmar than China. Beijing's interests are still a decisive economic influence in the country, which is clearly a potentially crucial partner in China's gargantuan Belt and Road

To be sure, China is just one of Myanmar's heavyweight international protectors, which also include Russia and India. These three countries all share certain urgent concerns, among them the threat of militant radical Is-lamism. Connections have been drawn between Rohingya militants and Pakistani extremist groups such as Jaish-e-Mohammed, this just as Beijing is increasing pressure on Pakistan to curb its support for fundamentalist groups that could threaten Chinese in-terests in Asia.

As it surveys this troubling map

- which also includes an insurgency among the Uighur Muslims of China's own Xinjiang province – Beijing views Myanmar's crackdown not as a domes-tic problem for a junior partner, but as another front in a wider struggle for

And just as Myanmar fits into that particular Chinese strategy, it also has a part to play in various others.

THE CHINESE WAY

This is a style of geopolitical influence

China is pursuing the world over. Its current foreign policy in Asia follows a similar pattern to its policies in Africa, which revolve heavily around infrastructure and development assistance as well as commodity extraction. It is still open to question whether these policies will benefit African states in the long term, but what cannot be denied is that China has had a significant impact on the continent in a comparatively short period of time.

Many critics of China's African pol-

thoritarian and violent regimes such as Sudan's, which it backed during much of the Darfur massacre in the 2000s. And even democratic shifts in government do not necessarily turn African

states away from Chinese influence.

After sweeping into power on a wave of anti-Chinese populism in 2011, Zambia's late Michael Sata appeared to spell trouble for Chinese interests in his country. He even threatened to recognise Taiwan - a direct affront to Beijing, which regards Taiwan as a wayward province. But in the end, Sata did not act on his threats, instead endorsing his country's Chinese ties.

What does this tell us about Chi-na's approach to Myanmar and coun-tries like it? As with the expectations of Myanmar's transition to democracy, it is not always certain that a more democratic regime will turn away from Beijing. It seems China has become too verful for most countries to ignore

This is only helped by Chinese foreign policy's remarkable consistency. Besides pursuing the Belt and Road initiative, which extends across much of Asia and well into Europe, China is carefully cultivating cadres of friendly states in its "near abroad", whether in the post-Soviet sphere or Southeast

Asia.

This also explains China's support for North Korea in the face of a war of words between Donald Trump and Kim Jong-un. While that policy has often been held up as an example of Beijing's inability to control Pyongyang, it is equally an expression of China's it is equally an expression of China's relative strength: as things stand, any Western moves to counter North Korea would be impossible without Beijing's assistance.

Then there's the matter of the South China Sea. Once seen as an "American lake", China now lays claim to the sea almost in its entirety, and not just for its own sake; as political theorist John Mearsheimer once argued in The Tragedy of Great Power Politics, aspiring superpowers often seek to dominate in their sphere of influence before becoming a global power.

So as far as China is concerned, the ongoing Rohingya crisis is just one of many developments in Asia where it has key interests at stake. It will not allow the world's growing impatience and outrage at the Myanmar govern-ment's behaviour to undermine what's become a remarkably coherent foreign policy – not a mercenary venture, but a carefully planned great game. Mizoram CM seeks Centre's help for relief to Myanmarese refugees

AIZAWL, JAN 13 (PTI): Mizoram Chief Minister Lal Thanhawla today said his government had sought the Centre's help in provid-ing relief to the 1,440 Myanmarese nationals (pic alongside) who had taken shelter in the north-eastern

The Myanmarese people had crossed over to Mizoram in November last year, following clashes between the Myanmar Army and the Arakan Army (AA) militants in the Chin state of that country.

Thanhawla said he had appealed to the Centre to provide assistance to the refugees, staying in three relief camps in southern Mizoram's Lawngtlai district since November 25.

He added that his government was making efforts to ensure that all the refugees returned to Myanmar.

Officials, however, said the Myanmarese nationals were refusing to return to their respective villages even after the Myanmar Army declared that peace was restored and all the AA rebels were flushed out of their camps



While some of them were afraid going back apprehending that a violent confrontation might erupt anytime between the government forces and militants, many preferred to settle down in Mizoram, they added.

The refugees, mostly Buddhists

and Christians, were residents of Paletwa and surrounding villages

After fleeing from home, they took shelter in Lawngtlai district's

Laitlang, Zochachhuah, Hmangbuchhuah and Dumzautlang villages. After stray bullets from Myan-

mar hit a house in Laitlang just ahead of Christmas, the refugees staying there were shifted to the

other three villages, an official said.
All the refugees would be repatriated, officials in the Lawngtlai district administration said, add-ing that they did not want to use force on them on humanitarian

Odisha aims to complete 3,500 km of rural roads by March-end

BHUBANESWAR, JAN 13 (PTI): Odisha has set a target to complete 3,500 km of rural roads by March-end under the Pradhan Mantri Gram Sadak Yojana (PMGSY), a

senior official said today. So far, the state has constructed 43,222 km road at an investment of Rs 18,624 crore under the central programme, connecting 19,682 villages, official sources said.

The PMGSY is being implemented in the state on a 60:40 sharing basis by the Centre and the state government.

"I have asked the officials to complete road construction of 3,500 km under the PMGSY by March, 2018," Chief Secretary A P Padhi said while presiding over a meeting of the PMGSY's State Level Sanctioning Committee here yesterday.

The committee also approved 165 new roads and 36 bridges spread across 582 km as new connectivity and upgradation projects.

The projects are estimated to cost Rs 500 crore. The target is to complete an additional

14,000 km-road during the next fiscal.

Padhi also directed officials to ensure better quality of construction and expedite completion through close and dayto-day monitoring.
Engineers of the ru-

ral development were advised to make use of waste materials in the construction of the roads, Padhi said.
The chief secretary

also asked the forest department officials to provide necessary cooperation in connecting the





Port Blair, Srinagar rated most wallet-friendly holiday destinations by travel portal

New Delhi, Ian 13 (PTI): Srinagar and Port Blair have seen the steep-est drop in airfares, while Bangkok has replaced Dubai as the top trending holiday destination amongst Indian travellers, according to online travel marketplace Kayak.

These findings are part of Kay-

ak's recently launched tool, Travel Hacker Guide, which provides rankings of the popular and top trending destinations, the most affordable cities to fly to, the best times to book flights as well as travel tips.

The Guide has analysed over 1.5 billion annual search queries to collect information for travellers.

According to the Guide, desti-nations such as Port Blair and Srinagar have seen a drop in average flight price of up to 24 per cent, making them most wallet-friendly options for holidaymakers.

Other destinations like Jammu, Muscat and Kochi, too, saw airfares decrease by 23 per cent, 22 per cent and 19 per cent, respectively.

The ranking on biggest price

drop reflects flight destinations with the highest year-on-year per-centage drop in median air fares.

How conservation architects fought stereotypes and won

TB patients may soon get monthly 'social support' from govt

New Delhi, Jan 13 (PTI): The government plans to give Rs 500 a month to Tuberculosis (TB) patients to help them buy nutritious food and compensate them for travel expenses until they are cured of the disease a health ministry official has said.

Under the proposal. the money would be given to patients, who number around 25 lakh, irrespective of their income level.

The Expenditure Finance Committee has approved the proposal and sent it to the Mission Steering Group, the official said.

The initiative is part of the National Strategic Plan for TB Elimination, with the health ministry aiming to eliminate TB by 2025.

"Around 25 lakh patients suffering from tugiven Rs 500 per month, irrespective of their income level, as social sup-port. A mechanism will be put in place to give the incentives to the patients on the basis of their Aadhaar number and medi-cal documents," the official said.

According to the World Health Organisation an estimated 2.8 million cases of TB occur in India every year, out of which 1.7 million cases are reported.

"The health ministry aims to reduce incidenc-es of TB by 90 per cent by 2025 and reduce mortality due to the disease by 95 per cent by 2030 under the Revised National TB Control Programme," the official said.

The ministry recently rolled out the daily drug regimen to combat the disease across the coun-

ment policy, patients are given fixed drug combi-nations - three or four drugs in a single pill daily, instead of thrice a week (intermittent drug regimen).

Dosage is determined

according to the patient's body weight. Previously, it was same for all adults. an official said.

"Also, children fering from tuberculosis won't have to take the bitter tablets anymore as they will be replaced with easily-dissolvable and flavoured drugs," he

Since 1997, under the RNTCP, patients were being administered drugs thrice a week. The daily treatment regimen is likely to be more effective with lesser relapses and it is expected to reduce drug-resistance greater compliance.

The WHO revised its TB management guide-lines in 2010, recommending that the daily drug regimen be adopted under the RNTCP.

According to health ministry data, TB incidences were estimated to be 217 per lakh population in 2015, which reduced to 211 per lakh population in 2016.

As a student of architecture, her focus on restoration and adaptive reuse of historic buildings was met with scepticism, but Aishwarva Tipnis still managed to carve a niche for herself in the field of urban conservation.

Her conservation projects, including at a fort in Madhya Pradesh and at Doon School. Dehradun, earned her ognition from UNESCO in 2016. And on Thursday, she was conferred the top French cultural award - Chevalier de

l'Ordre des Arts et Lettres. The architect from Delhi appears poised for an even bigger role. She considers ur-ban planners and restoration professionals as a bridge be-



Aishwarya Tipnis

tween the past and the future. But was her journey to the top easy?

"While I was studying at the School of Planning and Architecture (SPA) here, I chose to focus on conservation and reuse of historic structures, while all my classmates were

usy designing new, swanky buildings," Tipnis recalled.

"Needless to say, it was met with a lot of scepticism, as conservation architects were stereotyped more as 'activists' rather than professionals."

At 37, she is one of the youngest conservation archi-tects in a field that is itself very young in India.

The French government said Tipnis was conferred the award for her "outstanding of the French heritage in In-

Tipnis hopes her achieve ment and the honour will inspire more architects to take up urban conservation, as so many old buildings in the country were in direct need of preservation.

Vikas Dilawari, a Mum-

bai-based conservation architect, said restoration and urban conservation were "alien terms" when he was in college pursuing education in archi-

"Many government agen cies and private owners still think demolition and construction is the way forward. They don't even think of the aesthetics at stake, let alone the rich dividends restoration

can pay off to them," he said.
Dilawari, now 52, said
he fought off a similar image problem during his college days, about 30 years ago.

"I had drawn up a restoration plan for the icon-ic Crawford Market for my project while most of my colleagues 'demolished' it to propose a new building. You can imagine, whose idea was

received better," he said.

That, however, didn't discourage him.

After finishing his Masters in building conservation from the University of York, Dilawari has restored some of the iconic buildings in Mumbai in the past 20 years and picked up a number of awards along

In November, his work on restoration of the more than 180-year-old Christ Church in Byculla won him the Award of Merit from UNESCO, while the conservation of the near-150- year-old Wellington Fountain and another fountain in Mumbai earned him Honourable Mention in the

reckoning.

But he's happy that the society is beginning to see the merit in conservation, unlike

in the West, where restoration is more part of a legal frame work and a larger cultural

"My own family thinks I do crazy things, tinker with ru-ins of old buildings. Because, as a society we have not been taught to respect built her-itage or admire its value, sometimes not even when it has been lost to decay or dem-olition," Dilawari rued.

Busting the myth about restoration, Tipnis said: "Heritage conservation isn't just about old buildings, it is about the people who lived then and and who live now."

"It is not only about res-cuing historic structures, it is about restoring and creating an entire ecosystem that is self-sustainable," she asserted.

According to the agreement, each country determines, plans and regularly reports its own contri-bution it should make in order to mitigate global warming.

Iran rejects any change to nuclear deal

TEHRAN, JAN 13 (AFP): Iran today rejected any modification of its nuclear deal with world powers after US President Donald Trump demanded tough new mea-

sures to keep the agreement alive.

Iran "will not accept any amendments in this agreement, be it now or in the future, and it will not allow any other issues to be linked to the JCPOA," the foreign ministry said in a statement, using the 2015 deal's technical name.

Trump again waived nuclear-related sanctions on Friday -- as required every few months to stay in the agreement -- but demanded European partners work with the United States to "fix the deal's disastrous flaws, or the United States will withdraw".

He said the new deal should curb Iran's missile rogramme and include permanent restrictions on Iran's nuclear plants, removing expiration dates due to kick in after a decade.

But Iran's Foreign Minister Mohammad Javad Zarif said the 2015 deal could not be renegotiated.

"JCPOA is not renegotiable: rather than repeating tired rhetoric, US must bring itself into full compliance -- just like Iran," Zarif tweeted immediately after Trump's speech.

The statement from his ministry further criticised new sanctions on 14 individuals announced by the US Treasury on Friday over human rights issues and Iran's missile programme.

In particular, placing judiciary chief Ayatollah Sadegh Larijani on the sanctions list "crossed all red lines of conduct in the international community... and the government of the United States will bear responsibility for all the consequences of this hostile move".

Iran argues that continued US sanctions on

non-nuclear areas such as human rights and missile testing have effectively barred Iran from gaining many of the financial benefits expected from the deal.

Zarif has said Trump's aggressive stance on the deal and Iran generally have also violated the commitment to "refrain from any policy specifically intended to di-rectly and adversely affect the normalisation of trade and economic relations with Iran" in the accord.

Africans outraged over Trump's racist remarks

NAIROBI, JAN 13 (AFP): Africans have reacted angrily after US President Donald Trump reportedly referred to their nations as "shithole countries", with many accusing the US president of racism and ignorance.

The 55-nation African Union condemned the remarks yesterday, while a statement from ambassadors of all countries from the continent at the United Nations de-

manded a retraction and apology. The African Group of UN ambassadors said it was "extremely appalled at, and strongly condemns the outrageous, racist and xenophobic remarks by the president of the United States of America as widely reported by the media".

Ambassadors unanimous ly agreed the resolution after ergency session to weigh Trump's remarks.

The comment was "clearly" racist, said Ebba Kalondo, spokes-woman for AU chief Moussa Faki.

This is even more hurtful given the historical reality of just how many Africans arrived in the Unit-ed States as slaves, and also terri-bly surprising as the United States remains a massively positive exam-ple as just how migration can give birth to a nation," Kalondo said.

He stressed the US was "much stronger than the sum total of Trump reportedly demanded to know why the United States should accept immigrants from "shithole countries", after law-makers raised the issue of protections for immigrants from African nations. Haiti and El Salvador.

However he later tweeted: "this was not the language used".

The United Nations slammed the reported remarks as "shocking and shameful" and "racist".

"You cannot dismiss entire countries and continents as 'shitholes' whose entire populations, who are not white, are therefore not welcome," Rupert Colville, spokesman for the UN human rights office, told reporters in Geneva.

Botswana summoned the US ambassador to the country to "clarify if Botswana is regarded as a 'shithole' country", according to a foreign ministry statement calling Trump's comments "irresponsible, reprehensible and racist".

Senegal followed suit with reign Minister Sidiki Kaba Foreign saying the government "firmly condemned the unacceptable remarks which undermine human dignity, especially of Africa and her diaspora".

Trump was widely derided last year after twice referring to Namibia as "Nambia". Social media users across the

continent posted images of modern skylines and beautiful nature from their countries with the hashtag "shithole".

Many Africans reminded the US of its historic role in the continent's woes. "President Trump, One day, I'll take you to a 'shithole' country called Ghana," wrote Ghanaian Edmond Prime Sarpong on Facebook.

"First stop would be Osu Cas-tle, Elmina Castle, and the over 40 Forts that detained about 30 mil lion slaves, beaten and shipped out like sardine cans and then I will tell you the history of Africa and why people like you made that a 'shithole' continent."

Prominent Kenyan commenta-tor Patrick Gathara told AFP that Trump's words were nothing new.

"This is no different from what Hollywood and Western media have been saying about Africa for decades. We have consistently been portrayed as shitty people from shitty countries."

Some acknowledged problems in their countries, bu blamed this on their poor leaders as well as Western nations.

"Please don't confuse the #shithole leaders we Africans elect with our beautiful conti-nent... Our motherland is the most blessed continent that has been raped by imperialists in collaboration with our shitty misleaders for generations," wrote Kenyan activist Boniface Mwangi on Twitter.

In South Africa, the ruling African National Congress party declared "ours is not a shithole country" and described Trump as "extremely offensive".

Some Nigerians did not hold

back, with many on Twitter saying their country was a "shithole", but that it was "our shithole" to criticise. In Senegal's capital Dakar, ad-

ministrator Idrissa Fall said "we cannot really say that he (Trump) is wrong".

"African countries, and some-

times our leaders, do not exactly deal with the problems of the worst-off, that's what makes peo-ple immigrate". Even war-torn South Sudan weighed in, with President Salva Kiir's spokesman Ateny Wek Ateny slamming the comments as "outrageous".

However Juba businesswom-an Jenny Jore, 31, told AFP that Trump's remarks were "on point"

"It is thanks to our African leaders that we are insulted that way," she said.

The 54-nation UN African Group, which does not include Western Sahara, demanded a "retraction and an apology" from Trump, while thanking Americans "from all walks of life who ve condemned the remarks".




