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### **Tomato** prices soar to 60-70 per kg, govt keeping a tab

New Delhi, Jun 28 (PTI): Much to the discomfort of consumers, retail tomato prices in the national capital have skyrocketed by up to 65 per cent to Rs 60-70 per kg in a fortnight due to crop damage in producing states.

The prices have risen sharply in other metros

Tomato is available at Rs 50 a kg in Kolkata, Rs 40-45 in Chennai and Rs 35-40 in Mumbai, trade data showed.

It is being sold at Rs 60 at Safal outlets run by Mother Dairy in the national capital and Rs 45-48 on online platforms of Grofers and Nature's

Meanwhile, the central government said the price rise in tomato is a "season-al phenomena" and it is keeping a close watch on the price movement.

NEW DELHI, JUN 27 (PTI): Army Chief Gen. Bipin Rawat will visit Sikkim tomorrow in the backdrop of a standoff between Indian troops and Chinese army along the Sino-India border in the sensitive sector which is threatening to further strain the bilater-

The Army chief will take stock of the opera-tional matters and interact with top command-ers in the formation headquarters of the force in the border state.

Gen Rawat's visit to Sikkim comes amid mounting tension be-tween the two armies along the border in Sikkim following a scuffle between Indian troops and the personnel of China's People's Liberation Army in a remote area earlier this month.

# HC affirms and upholds Golay's conviction in Animal Husbandry corruption case

SUMMIT REPORT GANGTOK, 28 IUN:

The High Court of Sikkim today upheld the conviction of SKM president, PS Tamang (Golay), by the Special Court Prevention of Corruption Act in a corruption case dating back to his tenure as Animal Husbandry Minister of the first SDF Government

in Sikkim in 1994-99.

Mr Tamang, it may be recalled was convicted by a lower court on 28 December, 2016, on charges of dishonest misappropriation of public property under Section 403 and criminal breach of trust under

of Corruption Act, 1988. The case related to his tenure as the Animal Husbandry Minister and involved the distribution of milch cows. The covered the period 1996-97 and the misappropriation involved was to the tune of Rs. 9.50 lakhs. Meanwhile, the High Court

acquitted the co-accused, Til Bahadur Gurung, on one count, but upheld his conviction under another section of the PC Act. He was acquitted on charges framed under Section 403, but his guilt was affirmed by the High Court for charges drawn up under section 406. Satish Kumar Agnihotri, in light of the advanced age of the co-accused, who is now 82 years old, reduced his sentence to simple imprisonment for a period of six months from the original one year awarded to him and reduced the fine component from Rs 10,000 to Rs 5,000.

While pronouncing the adgment in open court, the CJ pronounced today that the appeal preferred by Prem Singh Tamang "is dismissed".

It may be recalled, that earlier this year, on 12 January, Mr Tamang had become the first MLA of Sikkim to be disqualified from his membership of the State Legislature following his conviction in a corruption case.

The case in question was registered by Sikkim Vigilance Directorate after the High Court of Sikkim had issued directions to it to investigate into the alleged misappropriation of government funds in the distribution of milch cows to the BPL families.

The High Court order had come after the then Sikkim Sangram Parishad leader Nar Bahadur Bhandari and Nuk Tshering Bhutia alias Melli Sonam had filed a Public Interest Litigation in the year 2003 levelling these allegations. It was then that the High Court of Sik-kim had directed the Vigilance Directorate to register a case.

Finally, in 2010, Vigilance Police had filed a chargesheet against Mr Tamang and sev-en others, however, two were discharged while framing the charges, and three were acquitted by the designated PC Act Court.

Bengali businessmen engaged

with their condemnation of the recent incidents of attacks and vandalism of Sikkim vehicles in Siliguri.

Addressing a press conference here today, they said, "As we are safe and peacefully doing our business in Sikkim, we would like to appeal to the West Bengal government and the people there to ex-tend the same love and safety to Sikkimese people in West Bengal."

They also stated that the

present situation in North Bengal has also affected their business very badly. They inform that around 80% of the advance



booking for this tourist season have been cancelled so far in the wake of trouble in the neighbouring region.

"We would like to request the concerned authorities and our neighbors to keep the national highway open and safe for Sikkim," they said.

While condemning the recent attack on Sikkim vehicles they appealed that vehicles and people for Sikkim should not be

targeted in Siliguri.

"We have been working peacefully in Sikkim for a long time and the people here are very supportive and loving. So

we would like to request our government and the people to give the same love and safety to Sikkimese people in West Bengal," they said.

The press conference was addressed by Bijon Manna, Tilu Sarkar, Ashok Ghose and other stakeholders.

### Bhutan issues demarche to China over PLA's road construction near Sikkim

New Delhi, Jun 28 (PTI): Bhutan today said it has issued a demarche to China over the construcion of a road towards its Army camp in Zomplri area of Doklam and asked Beijing to restore status quo by stopping the work immediately.

The demarche by Bhutan comes amidst the ongoing face-off be-tween Indian and Chinese troops in the Doklam (also known as Donglang) area of the Sikkim sector.

"We have issued a demarche to China through its diplomatic mission here. Recently, the Chinese army (People's Liberation Army) started construc-tion of a road towards Bhutanese Army camp at Zomphlri in Doklam area which is in violation of an agreement between the two countries," Ambassador of Bhutan to India Vetsop Namgyel told PTI.
"Doklam is a disput-

ed territory and Bhutan has a written agreement with China that pending the final resolution of the boundary issue, peace and tranquillity should maintained in the area," said Namgyel.

The Bhutanese envoy

also asserted that under the agreement, both Bhutan and China should refrain from unilaterally changing the status quo.
"We have asked Chi-

na to stop the road con-struction," he said.

China Meanwhile, today virtually accused India of having a "hidden agenda" in the current military stand-off with it in the Sikkim sector where Beijing has a territorial dispute with Bhutan.

Taking a dig at India, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesman Lu Kang said that Bhutan is a universally recognised sovereign country.

Lu also hinted that In-

dia was objecting to Chi-na's efforts to build the road in Donglang area of the Sikkim sector on behalf of Bhutan which does not have diplomatic

ties with Beijing.

"Hope countries can respect the sovereignty of the country. The Chi-na-Bhutan boundary is not delineated, no third party should interfere in this matter and make irresponsible remarks or actions," he said.

### GM holds demonstration, hills remain tense

DARJEELING (WB), JUNE **28 (PTI):** The Gorkha Janmukti Morcha activists held fresh demonstrations today for 'Gorkhaland' as security forces kept a strict vigil in the hills which remained tense on the 14th day of the indefinite shutdown.

The Army, mean-while, was withdrawn from the restive hills after the state government sought its pull-out.

The GJM supporters

had torched an office of the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration last night prompting the police to briefly detain two central committee mem-bers of the party, Samuel Gurung and RB Bhujel. Both were released after two hours. Protesters also ran-

sacked a panchayat office in Bijanbari area, 25 km from here early today.

The Army was withdrawn from the hills as

the state government sought its withdrawal, a defence spokesman said in Kolkata.

"Six columns of the Army were deployed in the hills on June 8 on requisition from the state government. The Army was withdrawn on June 24 as the state government sought its withdrawal", he said.

# From Gorkhaland to GST, resistance rules

SILIGURI, 28 JUN:

The season, it seems, is of bandhs, strikes, boycotts and denials.

The Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) has trashed the Gorkhaland Territorial Administration (GTA) and continues with the hill bandh while its principal partner in the NDA, the BJP, has denied support to the statehood cause.

Opposing the Centre's "hurry"

in implementing the Goods and Services Tax (GST), the Trinamool has decided to boycott GST's official launch 30 June midnight. Trinamool chief and West Bengal chief minister Mamata Banerjee has made it public

through social media.
Stating ground work for the GST

has indicated it might not attend the launch function

Also opposing the GST in its current form the country's textile sector has decided to observe a strike in protest. The West Bengal government has decided to support the strike.

When such negative mood seems to be on the rise throughout the country, the GJM fielded its most precious treasure on Wednesday to deal a blow for Gorkhaland.

able item. We are keeping a close watch on prices. The states have also been told to be vigilant so that there is no artificial shortage of supplies and price hike," Food and Consumer Affairs Minister Ram Vilas Paswan told PTI.

Even the price data maintained by the min-istry also showed a sharp increase in prices of tomato in the last one

Wholesale traders in Delhi attributed the rising price trend in tomato to tight supplies owing to the crop damage because of rains in Haryana and other producing states.

"More than 70 per cent of the tomato crop has been damaged due to excess rains followed by heat in Haryana, one of the key suppliers of the produce to Delhi," said Ashok Kaushik, President of the Tomato Merchants Association in Azadpur, Asia's largest wholesale market for

fruits and vegetables.

The tomato crop in some parts of Haryana has rotten because of the rains. So, the price for good quality tomato is high, he said, adding that some quantities are coming in from Shimla in Himachal Pradesh.

The supply shortage and price rise are also witnessed in other parts of the country, Kaushik said, adding that the tomato crop in some parts of South India has been damaged due to rains, leading to price increase.

"Prices auoted were so high that it was unviable to bring tomato from the South. In fact, and Maharashtra are supplying tomato to southern states at present," he said.

At Azadpur, tomato prices have jumped to Rs 20-50 depending on the quality. Prices a fortnight ago were ruling at Rs 5-15.

The country's tomato production is estimated to be higher by 15 per cent at 187 lakh tonnes in 2016-17 crop year (July- June), as per the government estimate



### Not in my name, citizens say, in protests againt lynching

New Delhi, Jun 28 (PTI): Dear Ma, I am home. You wanted me to buy new clothes in Delhi, but fate has landed me in heaven, where you don't have marauding mobs. I am home. Yours, Junaid.

There was not a dry eye at Delhi's Jantar Man-tar when 22 -year-old Mohammed Asaruddin read out from what he called his brother Junaid's "letter to his mother from heaven", at a citizens' protest here today.

Asaruddin's voice quivered as he read out the lines in Hindi from a makeshift dais, set against the backdrop of "lynch map of India", highlighting the places where people had been lynched in the country since 2015. The letter, he said, had been penned by a journalist friend.

"Even I was called a terrorist in college. This issue is of identity and we have reached a point where we are having to conceal skull caps and other symbols that define Islam," Asaruddin said.

Hundreds of people from Delhi joined the protest, called "Not In My Name", held six days after the 17-year-old Junaid was killed by a mob on board a Mathura-bound train.

Simultaneous pro-tests were held in several other cities, and are also slated to be held else-where in the world, the organisers said.

Among the protesters in Delhi were ordinary citizens, as well as leaders from the Congress, JD(U), AAP and the CPI.

Students and artistes voiced their resistance against what the organagainst what the organisers called a "climate of fear" in the country through poetry, plays, songs and posters which carried messages such as "Not In My Name, Not In Anyone's name" and "Muslim Lives matter, All lives matter".

Delhi Deputy Chief Minister Manish Sisodia, Congress leader Randeep Surjewala, JD(U)'s K C Tyagi and CPI's D Raja were among the politi-cians present there. Singer Rabbi Shergill

was also there, and was among the performers.

'We are outraged at the systematic violence. ### HRDD not following norms in Asst Prof recruitment alleges SUSA

Sikkim University Students Union (SUSA) has accused the Human Resources Development Department of not following proper norms in recruiting Assistant Pro-fessors in the Govern-

ment Colleges of Sikkim.
The official no-tice [Memo.No. 126/ Dir(HE)/HRDD, dated-24/06/2017] issued by HRDD states that interview notified in Memo. No. 93/ Dir(HE)/HRDD, dated-15/06/2017 stands cancelled and it has been decided to appoint the candidates as per merit on the basis of their marks obtained in the Post Grad-uation (PG) level.

"By considering only the marks of PG as a sole criterion for the post of Assistant Professor (he it in ad-hoc basis), HRDD has invited criticism. ### Adventurous Future

Schools in Sikkim could experiment with one more subject

One of the more interesting enterprises of the skill development programme of the State Government was the adventure course the Sports & Youth Affairs Department took to different corners of the State and then handpicked some for onwards advanced training. The products of that initiative one gets to occasionally see bobbing across the Gangtok horizon on their paragliding runs. The original initiative was interesting since even youth in places still not on the tourism map were trained in adventure sports. And it was interesting not just for the skills imparted and the potential self-employment oppor-tunities but also for the healthy adrenaline rush that the course introduced the young to. The skill development initiative appears to be dulling, and one has not really heard of future engagements on this line, but it would be worthwhile for the Human Resource Development Department to pick up from where the Sports & Youth Affairs Department left off - seriously consider introducing adventure sports as part of the regular curriculum of schools in Sikkim.

For one, such an experiment will not only involve the already trained youth gainfully, but could also contribute more to the future generations than half-baked computer classes or poorly defined environment sciences. The youth already trained in adventure sports should be invited to form clubs which could then open memberships to schools, essentially rural schools. They can charge a nominal membership fees and the students who sign up can be taken through the ropes of adventure options every fortnight. On longer breaks and vacations, these clubs could take students on proper treks or adventure sports excursions. Sounds simple enough and all it requires is for the HRDD to allow the trained youth to enter schools. It would have been wonderful if they also could be employed, but just access should do for now.

How does this help?

To begin with, the students get to do something exciting in school for once. That's a fine achievement in itself. The more important contribution would be the boost that confidence levels can receive with adventure sports. It is now an established fact and even management courses advise adventure sports to increase the confidence levels of trainees. The other advantage would be involvement. The students, when they trek through forests or climb rock faces or white water down the Teesta (wherever hydel projects still allow the river such a rush any more) will receive an intimate introduction to what Sikkim is. They will then learn to appreciate the environment more, care for it more, become more responsible towards it. Few textbooks can deliver these enhancements; it just might be worthwhile to make adventure sports an optional activity in schools here

### Rohingyas in TN: Picking up pieces, rebuilding lives

CHENNAI, JUN 28 (PTI): None would pelieve Mohammed Yusuf and Abdul

believe Mohammed Yusur and Abdul Shakoor are rag pickers. They are among 94 Rohingya Muslim refugees from Myanmar liv-ing near here after fleeing their home land in 2012 amid deadly sectarian violence that had displaced tens of thousands of their community members.

Neatly dressed and, clean shaven, the duo present a picture of con-trast to the squalor all around their dwelling unit, a ramshackle government-run cyclone shelter at Kelam-bakkam on the city outskirts.

The refugees belong to 19 families comprising 47 children, 25 women and 22 men.

Thankful to the government for providing them shelter, the refugees, many of whom are doing odd jobs including rag picking for livelihood, are looking for better accommodation and gainful employment.

Besides, the men folk say they could get job as truck drivers if the govern-ment granted them driving licence.

The refugees live in a ground plus one shelter known as 'round building' locally indicating its circular shape.

They have apportioned the space in the shelter for each of the family by turn-ing clothes as "walls," albeit in a messy fashion with things strewn around with flies swarming everywhere. Each family has a traditional

earthen kitchen on the open ground where they use twigs and fire wood.

While six families live on ground floor, eight are on the first floor and five have put up shacks on open ground around the building. Electricity bill is borne by the government and water is available too.

Mild-dark complexioned and several of them wheatish, one would be-lieve they are local Tamils but for their distinctive language 'Rohingya',with a liberal mix of Urdu and Hindi. Yusuf recounts the pain of leaving

their homeland when violence and ri-

oting escalated in 2012.

"My sister was arrested and is still in jail there and several were dead in clashes and we decided to flee to Bangladesh, fearing for our lives," he

Recalling the ardous journey to Bangladesh by boat and from there to a West Bengal border hamlet, he says their group of 94 moved on to Kolkatta,later boarded a train to Chennai.

All along their journey, they had





to give handsome money to 'dalals, (brokers), he says.

"We arrived in Tamil Nadu in 2012 and were roaming here and there, doing odd jobs," he says,adding their "tryst with nomadic life" ended when police caught them by the end

"Police and local officials brought us here. The only condition that was imposed on us was we should not associate ourselves with local politics or political parties," he says.

Before they arrived at the cyclone shelter, they had stayed put at several neighbourhoods in coastal Kancheepuram like Tiruporur.

Profusely thanking the govern-ent for giving them a 'pucca building,' Sved Alam, a butcher in a local meat outlet says we request the gov-ernment to give us better accommodation, since this place has just two

toilets and cramped."

While Syed Alam is seconded by all others, Shakoor says several men have one more request, which is a driving licence.

He says if they get a driving li-cence they could find employment as truck drivers, "a job which has good

On the requests of Rohingyas, senior State government official told PTI that it may take some time to re-

Interestingly, several of the menfolk were fishers back in Myanmar.

Yusuf and Shakoor had to take to rag picking as they had little else to do when they arrived here. They and others do several odd jobs apart from

Pointing to fish carts known locally as meen body vandi parked around the building, they say they ferry con-struction material, rubble or whatev-'cargo,' comes their way. Located right on the arterial Van-

dalur-Kelambakkam Road, close to the Information Technology corridor on the OMR (Old Mahabalipuram Road), the shelter is bang opposite the local Government Primary Health Centre where the refugees go in case

they were ill.

"If needed, the hospital sends the patients in ambulances to district hospital for better care, there is wor ry on the healthcare front," Yusuf and others say.

On what vocation they had pursued while back in Myan says he used to do 'trading of wares,' while several were labourers, small traders, and others were fishermen.
Praising the local Tamils as a very

helpful and caring lot, he says 'we are also able to do Namaaz here proper-ly unlike back home" and points to makeshift hut abutting the shelter which is 'our mosque.'

The local masjid and Muslims are

lending a helping hand to them

Hafiz Usman, a 23-year old youth is the 'Maulvi,' who teaches the Koran,besides Arabic and Urdu to the children. He stays put in the shelter and also takes care of our children whenever needed. We pay him a honorarium plus grocery, Shakoor says.

On communicating in the local language Usman says, we are picking up words like Akka (sister), Anna (brother) and trying to learn Tamil."
Yusuf and others pitch in saying 'our

children who go to balwadi and local school are quite conversant in Tamil."

Womenfolk, too shy to talk and

busy with daily chores thanked local officials and UNHCR for helping them get 'Aadhar' cards.

However, a section of them are vet to get Aadhar though they have registered seeking it.

The refugees who hail from reine rerugees who hall from re-gions including Maungdan in Myan-mar, have registered with the For-eigners Registration Office (Police Superintendent), in Kancheepuram and have a Residential Permit issued by the authorities.

M Ponnusamy, among a local 'Anna (brother),' who helps the refugees says they are good people who work hard to make a living.

He said "some NGOs, and philanthropists are also helping them. Years ago there used to be Sri Lankan Tamils, now Rohingyas are here.

## Cash is falling out of fashionwill it disappear forever?

On June 27, the ATM turned 50. Former U.S. Federal Reserve Chairman Paul Volcker once described it as the "only useful innovation in banking." But today, the cash that ATMs dispense may be on the endangered list.

Cash is being displaced in so many ways that it's hard to keep track. There are credit cards and electronic payments; apps such as Venmo, PayPal and Square Cash; mobile payments services; cryptocurrencies that operate outside the purview of central banks; and localized offerings such as Kenya's mPesa, India's Paytm and Bangladesh's bKash. These innovations are encouraging cashlessness across communities worldwide.

It's reasonable to expect cash to follow the path of other goods that have been replaced by digital alternatives, such as photos, music and movies. Will cash – and the ATMs that dispense it – experience a "Blockbuster" moment and disappear

from our neighborhoods?

Not so fast. Cash will likely become less popular, thanks to the high cost of using cash and the growing array of alternatives. But I expect it will remain with us forever. The future will be "less cash," rather than cashless. THE COST OF CASH

As of 2013, approximately 85 percent of the world's transactions involved cash.

Reliance on cash is quite uneven across the world. While Singapore, the Netherlands, France, Sweden and Switzerland are among the least cash-reliant countries, in Malaysia, Saudi Arabia, Peru and Egypt, only 1 percent of transactions are cashless. Even some highly advanced countries, such as Japan, are still highly reliant

Cash usage in the U.S. is still high rela-



the U.S. represented 13.1 percent of its GDP, whereas it represented just 7.1 percent in

France and 4.5 percent in Switzerland.

Concerns about social equity offer one motivation for lawmakers to push for cashless alternatives. My colleague Benjamin Mazzotta and I have studied the costs of cash across a wide range of countries, with a particular focus on the U.S., Mexico, Egypt and India. Our research shows that the poor and those with less access to institutions bear a disproportionate share of these costs of using cash.

In the U.S., for example, cash usage imposes a regressive tax on consumers, with the highest impact on people who do not have an account with a bank. We found that the unbanked pay four times more in fees to access their money than those with bank accounts. They also pay US\$4 higher fees per month for cash access on average than those with formal financial services. Such fees include those charged for payday lending, buy-here-pay-here auto loans and check cashing. The unbanked have a five times higher risk of paying cash access fees on payroll and EBT cards.

Poorer consumers also have to spend far more time getting cash. On average, Americans spend 28 minutes a month traveling to get cash, but that time isn't evenly distributed. People who don't use a bank spend about five minutes longer getting to the place where they can get cash, and unemployed people spent nearly nine minutes more.

In the meantime, other scholars have argued for the benefits of a "less cash" society. Ken Rogoff at Harvard has argued that eliminating higher-denomination banknotes can prevent currency from be-ing used to fund illegal activities.

#### A WORLD WITHOUT CASH

A combination of public and private initiatives are currently chipping away at the global predominance of cash, with some countries moving more quickly than others.

Sweden, already high on the cashless ness scale, may become the first country to come close to a truly cashless state. Sweden's history in banks promoting cash digital bank transfers used to pay wages. Cards also become more popular in the 1990s, when banks also started charging a fee for checks. The app, Swish, developed by the major banks, is widely used today for digital money transfers by nearly half the population. Many businesses discourage use of cash, and retailers are legally allowed to refuse cash.

In several other countries, governments are experimenting with innovative digital alternatives. In 2012, the Royal Canadian Mint launched the MintChip project, recently handed over to the private sector. The plan is to store cash on computer chips, enabling the transfer of money between chips through encrypted messages.

In some countries, the private sector has led the way, creating "less cash" societies in the unlikeliest of places. Consider Somaliland, one of the poorest countries in the world. It stands at the forefront of a mobile payment revolution with its ZAAD platform. At over 30 mobile payment transactions a month on average, the average citizen of Somaliland is far ahead of the rest of the world's average of 8.5 such transactions per capita per month.

Perhaps the most dramatic nudge to-

ward "less cash" was experienced recently in India. Last November, the Indian gov-ernment made a high-risk, high-stakes move by demonetizing the 500 and 1,000 rupee banknotes, in effect voiding 86 percent of cash in circulation. Their initial aim was to root out corruption and illegal activity funded by cash. New 500 and 2,000 rupee banknotes were issued, so consumers had to go to a bank and exchange their demonetized currency. In a country that is almost 90 percent reli-

ant on cash, this move led to disrupted enter-prises, unpaid wages and long lines at banks. Mobile wallet players were the unqualified Paytm claiming a 435 percent increase in traffic and a 250 percent increase in overall transactions and transaction value.

However, despite the surge in mobile payments after demonetization, cash in India remains resilient. In March, five months after demonetization, cash withdrawals were actually 0.6 percent higher than a year earlier.

#### THE FUTURE OF CASH

What explains the resilience of cash, despite its costs and a growing array of alternatives? Cash is unique among payment instruments in that anyone can transact, any time, any place, with no third parties involved. With this freedom comes strong privacy protection. Currency neither knows nor cares who holds it or when and where a transaction occurred. People have a visceral sense of security when they have cash with them. Much of this sentiment was uncovered in our Cost of Cash studies spanning multiple countries.

These thresholds will, of course, evolve as our societies become more digitally native. However, old habits and perceptions take a long time to turn over. Some merchants will resist the costs of new equipment or fees that accompany cash alternatives. Cash is also considered more convenient and versatile, while with dig-ital transactions there's always concerns about hacking and fraud.

So, no matter where we are in the world, let us celebrate the ATM's half-century of service. The human connection with cash will be hard to break. Though cash may become less popular, rest assured that there will always be someone who will stop you in the street asking for directions to the nearest ATM.

### TMC not to attend GST rollout programme: Mamata

KOLKATA, JUN 28 (PTI): West Bengal Chief Min-ister Mamata Banerjee today said her party TMC will not attend the GST roll-out programme on June 30 midnight as she flayed the "unnecessary hurry" to roll it out.

The TMC supremo termed the GST roll-out as another "epic blunder" by the Centre.

"Our Parliamentary Party has decided not to attend the 30th June, 2017 midnight programme at Parliament House to celebrate GST, as a mark of protest," she said.

"We are deeply con-

cerned about GST im-plementation. After #demonetisation, this unnecessary disastrous hurry is another epic blunder of the Centre", she said on Facebook.

"We have been for GST from the beginning but are very worried now with the way the Central Government is going ahead with the implementation", she said.

"Our repeated sug-gestions to take some more time to properly implement GST have fallen on deaf ears. The en-tire business community, especially the small and medium ones, are scared and confused.

"Only 60 hours are left before this ill-planned launch and no one knows for sure what's happening!", she said.
"Essential commodi-

ties such as medicines are not available in many places and prices of various commodities are rising for lack of clarity and mismanagement", she said.

Banerjee said, "We nave always been fighting for maintaining the federal structure of the country, even if Bengal at times was the lone voice and conscience of the GST Council". She said, "There are

almost 20 different taxes gle tax and integration of all markets across the country will provide big relief to all".

Having a dig at the BJP, she said, "The current ruling party at the Centre had initially strongly opposed GST for over 7 years and suddenly did a somersault on coming to office as a champion of GST".

Banejee said that the economy is not yet ready to face the GST from July 1. The 3-day strike de-clared by the textile industries in the country was the evidence of "our deep concerns on the lack of preparedness".

"Small business en-

tities are not yet ready with basic requirements like invoice, accounting system, IT system, etc.

Another piece of evi-dence of unpreparedness comes from the fact that the 'Return Form' had to be simplified for the first 6 months as all systems

are not in place.

"It is shocking that the e-Waybill System is not yet designed and states are being asked to run their own systems as a stopgap arrangement",

"We feel, at least six months will further be necessary to notify all rules and procedures and give enough time to the stakeholders, particularly the small and medium enterprises to success fully implement the GST.

"Otherwise, a chaotic situation may arise in our vast economy for which the Government of India will be primarily respon-sible", she said.

The West Bengal chief minister expressed hope that the voices of the people and business-es will be heard by the Centre.

## FIFA discloses damaging Qatar World Cup bid report

FIFA has released a long-with-held report on alleged corruption in awarding the 2022 World Cup to Qatar after more leaks deepened the controversy surrounding the vote.
World football's governing

body had previously declined to publish in full the 400-page report into awarding the 2018 World Cup to Russia and the 2022 edition to Qatar drawn up by US independent investigator Michael Garcia.

But FIFA's hand was forced when German tabloid newspaper Bild said it had obtained the full report and released extracts on Monday, including revelations that a 10-year-old daughter of one FIFA member had received USD 2 million in her bank account

FIFA said it was already considering releasing in full Garcia's findings prior to the latest disclosures.

"However, as the document has been illegally leaked to a German newspaper, the new chairpersons (of the committee) have requested the immediate publication of the full report...in order to avoid the dissemination of any misleading information," FIFA explained in a statement on its website yesterday.

"For the sake of transpar



ency, FIFA welcomes the news that this report has now been finally published.

Garcia had resigned as nead of FIFA's investigatory body in December 2014 in protest after FIFA released a 40-page sanitised summary of his report which he disowned, describing it as "incomplete and erroneous."

The full report referred to an array of suspect financial dealings including the sum of 2 million allegedly sent by a consultant for Qatar, San-dro Rosell, to the 10-year-old daughter of a FIFA official.

by an associate as the proceeds from a real estate deal.

But Garcia concluded that "no proof exists linking Qatar and this 2 million to the daughter of executive committee member (former Brazil foot-ball chief Ricardo Teixeira)."

Rosell is the ex-Barcelona president who is in prison under investigation for money laundering related to the sale of the Brazilian national football team's television rights.

Garcia's investigation also revealed that one former FIFA executive committee member thanked Qatar by mail for a transfer of several hundred thousand euros just after Qatar was awarded the 2022 tournament.

The report also docu-ments that three executive members of FIFA were flown to Rio de Janeiro for a private party ahead of the vote to decide who would host the 2022

World Cup.

Qatar won the right to host the 2022 World Cup in late 2010 and the result of the vote has been the source of enormous controversy ever

Following Garcia's investigation, the adjudicatory chamber of FIFA's ethics com-

mittee noted that there had been suspicious behaviour during the bidding process but not enough to call into question the decision to give Qatar the 2022 finals or Rus-

sia the 2018 tournament. Hours before FIFA made the decision to go public for-mer FIFA boss Sepp Blatter had denounced the report's leaking to Bild.

Blatter, who announced Qatar as the 2022 hosts in December 2010, told AFP: "The only comment that I can make is that there was a leak as only the ethics commission had the power to publish the Garcia report."

He added: "I stand by the statements made at the time by Hans-Joachim Eckert, the Ethics Committee chairman to the executive committee.

"For him the Garcia report did not contain any elements to call into question the attribution of the 2018 World Cup to Russia and 2022 to Qatar.'

Blatter, replaced as FIFA boss in 2016 by Gianni Infantino, concluded: "I've always pointed out and I'll repeat it now, it was Michel Platini's vote in favour of Qatar which influenced the executive committee's vote whereas there

Platini, then head of European football body UEFA, attended a dinner in Paris with Nicolas Sarkozy, president of France at the time, and future Oatari ruler Tamim bin Hamad Al-Thani, on November 23, nine days before the crucial vote.

But Garcia stated that "no proof had been discovered tying Mr Platini's vote" in favour of Doha with Qatar's subsequent investment in France, notably the purchase of Paris Saint-Germain.

Eckert was ousted along with investigator Cornel Bor-bely in May and the former ethics committee chairmen defended the decision not to release the report sooner.

The decision to not publish the report so far was com-pletely in line with the federation's previous decisions and the applicable FIFA rules," they said in a statement sent to AFP.

They said the report "only is a working document" and added that in December 2014, during a FIFA Executive Committee meeting, it was decided that only Eckert "was to decide on the publication of the report as soon as all procedures, including potential appeals to the CAS (Court of Arbitration for Sport), have been closed.

### 62 per cent votes cast in 2nd phase of local polls in Nepal

KATHMANDU, JUN 28 (PTI): Millions of Nepalese people today voted in the second phase of the local-level polls which are being held after a gap of two decades -- an election crucial for cementing democracy in the Himalayan nation.

The Joint Election Operation Centre at the Election Commission announced that around 62 per cent votes have been cast as of 4.30 PM (local time).

In the first round of polls held on May 14, voter turn out was recorded at 71 per cent. The first phase of the local polls was held on May 14 in Provinces 3. 4 and 6.

The voting started peacefully at 7:00 AM for all the 334 positions.

In ward number 9 of Rolpa Municipality of western Nepal, the voting was halted after a voter poured acid into a ballot box.

According to police, the acid destroyed 10 ballot papers.

Deputy Superintendent of Police Ram Prasad Gharti Magar said they are investigating the case.

Prime Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba cast his vote at the Asigram Higher Secondary School, the polling station in Ruwakhola in Dadeldhura district of far-east Nepal.

He said the local villagers were ex-

cited to participate as the second phase of local-level elections were held in peaceful, free and fair manner.

Deuba assured that the Consti-cion's full-fledged implementation would take its course once the local government was established, and that the development works would move forward efficiently, rapidly and transparently.

In a brief statement, Deuba said the

elections were held so that the villages governments are established by the villagers themselves.

Meanwhile, Nepal media reported

More than 6.4 million people are eligible voters in the 35 districts of Provinces 1, 5 and 7 that have gone to polls in the second phase of the local-level polls to elect more than 15,000 local

Though the local polls were earlier scheduled for two phases, the second phase had to be postponed twice -- and a third phase had to be declared -- in a bid to accommodate the dissenting par-ties, including the Madhesis, that are vet to commit to the polls to be held in

Province 2 on September 18.

All the political parties including the Madhesi parties are taking part in the

elections.

The Nepal government had earlier this month postponed the date of lo-cal-level elections in the disputed Mad-hesi- stronghold Province 2 by nearly three months, adding a third phase in the polls that will take place in Septem-

The Rastriva Ianta Party Nepal, the key Madhesi party, have fielded their candidates as independents in the elec-

A total of 8,364 polling centres have been designated for today's voting, the Himalayan Times reported.

In the first phase of polls, the voter

turnout was estimated to be 74 per cent.

The Election Commission said 62,408 candidates were contesting the

second phase of elections. Votes will be cast secretly under the first-past-the-post electoral system on the basis of one post, one vote pattern.

### In Delhi, following road signs may land you in jail

New Delhi, Jun 28 (PTI): Across the world, a motorist is expected to diligently follow road signages, but in Delhi, doing so may actually land you in jail.

A study, conducted on 14 major stretches of the national capital measuring around 85 km, has shown that these faulty signages may actually be behind traffic violations and the resulting accidents.

Nearly 70 per cent of such signs are wrongly designed and placed, the study says.

Conducted by the the Delhi-based Institute of Road Traffic Education (IRTE), the study has found that of around 1,514 regulatory, warning and information signages on the surveyed stretch, 1,098 (75 per cent) do not meet the prescribed norms.

Regulatory signages, like STOP signs, are to be mandatorily fol-lowed while warnings signs are used to alert a driver of potential dangers ahead. Information nages provide information about distance, landmarks etc.

Depending on the category they fall in, these signages differ in terms of shape, size and colour. But in Delhi, they have been interchangeably used, the report point-



ed out, which end up misleading

Similarly, it was also found that most of the primary and sec-

ondary traffic signals at intersections were not functioning as per the prescribed standards or are gly installed. "One of the major deficien-

cies was short blinking green signals used instead of an amber signal. The duration of amber clearance before the red light appears is so short that in present conditions a large percentage of drivers are being caught without any fault," IRTE president Rohit Baluja said.

The IRTE said the proposed Motor Vehicles Amendment Bill, 2016, which has been passed by the Lok

Sabha, stipulates penalties such as imprisonment of up to one year and fine extending up to Rs 5,000 for vi-

olating certain signages.

"Motorists will be liable to be prosecuted due to such faulty road signs and signals, which will defeat the very purpose of the provisions of the new legislation," . Baluja said.

The IRTE said the faulty signs did not meet the laid out requirements of the Indian Road Congress (IRC) codes and the United Nations Convention of Road Signs and Signals, 1968, of which India is a contracting party.

Out of the 1,514 signs, 801, which comes to 54 per cent, were inserted within rectangular boards of either blue or yellow colours. "Blue colour is only permitted

for compulsory regulatory signs as well as facility information signs. Yellow colours are not prescribed by IRC except in construction nes," it said.

It pointed out that the Public

Works Department used blue outer boards while NDMC has taken the liberty of using yellow as insertion boards, making the signage nore of fashion and show rather than for regulation and warning".

Former chief ministers Bhupinder Singh Hooda, Ashok Gehlot, Digvijaya Singh attended the event




