Rains bring Mumbai to its knees: flood situation improves in Bihar, Assam, WB

New Delhi, Aug 29 (PTI): Torrential rains threw normal life out of gear in Mumbai and trig-gered a landslide which derailed an express train while the flood situation improved slightly in Bihar with no fresh deaths

reported today.

Heavy rains lashed south Gujarat and parts of Saurashtra too, dis-rupting normal life, with the MeT department predicting heavy to very heavy rains in the region

over the next two days.

The flood situation improved in West Bengal and Assam, as rail services for transporting goods to the flood-ray aged northeastern re-gion resumed and passenger train services are expected to restart from September 3.

A landslide caused by heavy rains led to the derailment of the Nagpur-Mumbai Duronto Express' engine and nine coaches between Vasind and Asangaon stations in Maharashtra, but no casualties were reported in the incident.

Torrential rains accompanied by strong winds pummelled Mumbai, disrupting rail, road and air services, uprooting trees, swamping homes, and bringing the *turn to pg02*

Talks held between Bengal govt and hill parties; no decision yet on bandh

KOLKATA, Aug 29 (PTI): West Bengal Chief Minister Mamata Baneriee today held talks with political parties of Darjeeling hills and requested them to withdraw the indefi-nite shutdown, which entered the 76th day.

After the meeting, GJM convenor Binay Tamang said any decision on the shutdown would be decided at a meeting of the GJM central committee to be convened in Darjeeling along with Gorkhaland Movement Coordination Committee, which is spearheading the agitation in the hills.

Besides Gorkha Jan-mukti Morcha, major political parties in the hills like Gorkha National Liberation Front and Jan Andolan Party participated in the dialogue.

Addressing newsmen at the secretariat, Baner-jee said the talks were "cordial and positive".

"We requested for

withdrawal of the bandh as tea gardens, schools, tourism, transport - evervthing is closed.

"Dialogue has start-ed and it will continue. It will end the deadlock in Darjeeling," she said, adding the next meeting will be held at Uttarkanya secretariat in north Bengal on September 12.

They (the hill parties) raised the Gorkhaland issue but we did not agree. They can raise their voice, it is their prerogative. It is a

democratic set-up.
"They said that the agitation is because of their demand for Gorkhaland. (government) have clarified our position.

Government has its own jurisdiction, some constitutional obligation and bindings and we will continue our work

through these."
Asked whether the hill parties sought tripartite talks, she replied in the affirmative. "But we said it is not in our hands"

Elaborating on the meeting, the chief minister said, "Everybody raised their voice and it is good that instead of bulldozing or imposing anything on anybody as there is freedom and right. It is democracy. So discussion was very fruitful, very positive and constructive."

"But everybody has agreed that we should start working towards normalcy and the restoration of peace," Baner-

To another question on distribution of ra-tions in the hills, she said "That is why we are asking for withdrawal of the bandh." Tamang said that the hill parties welcome the state government's call for the meeting to restore normalcy and to resolve political deadlock. "We take this as an initial step to a journey for the fulfilment of our dreams and also show our commitment to peace, democratic values and the constitution ... But we must say that peace and

Assembly passes Supplementary **Demands for Grants for** Rs 69,078.63 lakh

GANGTOK, 29 Aug:
The Sikkim Legislative Assembly today passed First Supplementary Demands for Grants for 2017-18 which includes the demands of Grants for 36 Departments to the tune of Rs. 69078.63 lakh comprising of Rs. 25359.32 lakh on Revenue Account and Rs. 43719.31 lakh on Capital Account.

The Supplementary Demands for Grants vot-ed and passed by Sikkim Legislative Assembly is slightly higher than the annual budget of Rs. 690 crore of 2000-2001 financial year. Chief Minister, Pawan

Chamling who is also in charge of Finance, Revenue & Expenditure department said that the supplementary demands for grants was passed with the aim of com-pleting various on-go-ing projects such as the 1000-bedded multi spe-ciality hospital at Sokaythang which is expected to be completed by March next year, completion of Organic Vegetable Mart at Gangtok, comple-tion of Bhaichung Stadium at Namchi, various school buildings which are under constructions, pending drinking water projects and beautifica-tion of bazaars and tourism projects.

The Supplementa-ry budget has also earmarked Rs. 20 crore for establishment of Gyan

Mandir (Community Library at Gangtok), Rs. 7 crore for establishment of Folk Healer centre at Assam Linzey, Rs. 7 crore for construction of Aastha Siddhi Hanuman Mandir at Namthang, South Sikkim, Rs. 15 crore for alternative highway for decongestion of traffic from Ranipool to

Sichey, Mr Chamling said. He also urged all members of the Legislative Assembly to monitor all on-going projects without compromising on the quality of works.

While replying to the points raised by the

members during the two-day Assembly ses-sion including the passing of four new legisla-tions and four amended legislations, Mr Chamling said that Sikkim has set an example in the country by passing the Sikkim Prevention of Cow Slaughter Bill.

The first ever Gaushala in the state is going to be established soon at Daramdin, West Sikkim for which budget of Rs. 2 crore is earmarked in this Supplementary Demands for Grants, he informed.

In its 23 years of gov-ernance, Sikkim Democratic Front has pre-served the distinct identity of Sikkim and will not allow its dilution at any cost, the Chief Minister said.

A constructive beginning, now push for normalcy

The ice has broken. The ball is now firmly on Bimal Gu-

rung's court. That is the long and short of the meeting vis a vis the Darjeeling situation between the state government and the hill parties in Kolkata on Tuesday.

As expected, the hill par-ties present in the meeting namely GJM, GNLF and JAP raised the Gorkhaland issue The state government steered clear of it stating it did not have the authority to discuss

the subject. The hill parties would,

however, go back home one recognition under their belt. Chief minister Mamata Banerjee, who supervised Tuesday's meeting, conceded that the Gorkhaland aspiration was a long-standing one and it was within the hill parties' right to voice their demand.
She, however, in the next

breath underlined that it was not within the state govern-ment's jurisdiction to discuss the separate state issue.

The next important issue, the ongoing bandh was discussed, but the hill parties understandably could not come up with a decisive reply on it. Coming to their rescue, a magreason why: "Let them go back to the hills, take time to discuss it within their respective par ties and then come up with a solution," was her line saver.

So now the hill parties would go back to their base and thrash out Tuesday's de-velopment within their respective organizations and come up with an agenda for the next round of bi-party meeting to be held in Siliguri on September 12. Till then everything remains fluid.

All eyes would now remain trained on what the GJM chief, Bimal Gurung does. The GJM is suffering an erosion of authori-

with Gurung running the risk of being eclipsed by the party's

new face Binay Tamang.
Tuesday's meeting, if any thing was not in sync with Gurung's latest instructions. The state government's hands off approach on the Gorkhaland issue made it just another sub-ject discussed in the meeting among other issues. That is not what Gurung had wanted.
So what happens now?

The chief minister has already declared that the next meeting between the hill parties and the state government would be held on September 12, and that regular interaction should follow after Tuesday. tion it would mean the current phase of the Gorkhaland movement is practically over.

And that could be the crunch issue for Gurung and the hawks within the party. Will they accept it, or would they reject the proposal and go back to the agitation path? The GIM representative Binay Tamang, who was present in Tuesday's meeting, came up with an important observation at the end of the meeting. Criticizing those behind the recent IED explosions in the hills Tamang, said: "Restoration of peace and normalcy in the hills is necessary."

which also reveals that there are many more like Tamang who are tired with the uncertainty the mode of the agitation has ushered in the hills and want an end to it. But then, the million rupee question, how would Bimal Gurung and his confidants react to it?

Tuesday's meeting has served one purpose though. The deadlock has been broken and now the long arm of the Centre might come in the picture. The Centre had made it a pre-requisite for the hill parties to hold talks with the state government first. That condition has been fulfilled.

Govt circular on patriotic rock shows an insult to youths: Cong

NEW DELHI, AUG 29 (PTI): The Congress said today that the HRD Ministry's circular asking IITs and central universities to organise "patriotic" rock shows was an "insult" to the country's youth.

Congress spokesperson Manish Tewari said the government seemed to have presumed that nationalism needed to be inculcated through rock bands.

"If this is the vision the government has for the young peo-ple of this country, then all that I would like to say is, 'God help us;" he told reporters.

"It is a very funny circular to say the least," he added.

The Congress also accused the BJP government of "subverting" the mandate of the National



Film Development Corporation

"It does not have the mandate to hire rock bands and send them across the country. There seems to be subversion of the very remit of the National Film Development Corporation," he

As part of the programme named "Yeh India ka Time Hai" the government has identified certain bands which will be across the country and perform patriotic songs.

The programme has been organ-ised to celebrate 70 years of India's Independence and 75 years of the Quit Movement

He said there was no prob-

lem with promoting national-ism or patriotism and that there were enough musical groups, literary societies, clubs and debating platforms available in every such institution than "subverting the mandate of NFDC to hire rock bands of allegedly spurious

and nationalism".

Tewari said the government talks about ushering a "New India" by 2022, but India is still a democratic country and the term of this government ends in

"Till the time they have al-ready decided to subvert democracy and not hold elections in 2019, (the time frame of) 2022 does not make any sense," he added.

"Nobody has a monopoly over patriotism and nationalism; least of all the government and least of all the BJP. We do not think that they either have the credentials or the moral right to lecture the Congress or any other party on patriotism and nationalism," he said.

Trains were running late or stopped on all three suburban rail-way lines as tracks were submerged at several places.

Traffic crawled at snail's pace on important roads.

"The metropolis has received heavy rainfall since last night. Between 8.30 am and 12 pm today, the city received 85 mm rainfall." Sudhir Naik, Deputy Municipal Commissioner, told PTI.

Many flights had to be diverted to other cities and aircraft had to do go-arounds through the day.

Charan Singh, Director, India Meteorological Department, said a 'Red' warning has been issued for the next 24 hours for the city and adjoining areas, indicating there could be very heavy rainfall. He said the city and surrounding areas would continue to receive heavy rainfall over the next 2-3 days.

Due to the heavy rainfall, at least



another 31 dams have received 99 per cent water. Seventeen dams are 80-90 per cent full.

As flood waters were receding in some places of Bihar, many people have returned to their homes and only 116 relief camps are function-ing now in which 1.38 lakh people

are staying.

1.71 crore people are affected in 19 districts, a report of state disaster management department said.

In Assam, 1.02 lakh people were still affected by floods in four districts in the state as one more person died in Morigaon district taking the toll in the third wave of floods in the

The total number of people killed

in this year's flood- related incidents in Assam has gone up to 158.

According to an Assam State Disaster Management Authority report, Morigaon is the worst-affected with more than 55,500 hit, followed by Nagaon with nearly 43,000 people affected in

the deluge. Currently, 288 villages and

12,000 hectares of crop area are still inundated, the ASDMA said, adding the authorities are running 70 relief camps and distribution centres across five districts, where 21,049 people are taking shelter.

The northern parts of West Ben-gal, some of which are yet to recover from the impact of flood, are again likely to receive heavy rains from August 31.

The flood-situation in the six north Bengal districts improved a lot and the toll remained 90.

Coochbehar, Jalpaiguri, Malda, South Dinajpur and North Dinajpur districts are still recovering from the depredation of flood caused by

eavy rains earlier this month.

So far, close to 1.5 crore people have been affected in the floods in the state which has lost an estimated Rs 14,000 crore in the deluge.

The flood-like situation in the southern districts of Odisha, which were lashed by incessant rains yesterday, has improved slightly as water began to recede, though the road connectivity remained af-

The water levels of the rivers, which have inundated six villages, were going down as the intensity of rain, triggered by a low pressure, decreased, officials said.

However, the IMD has forecast more rains in the state.



BSNL to set up 1 lakh wi-fi spots by March 2019

New Delhi, Aug 29 (PTI): State-owned telecom firm BSNL will set up 1 lakh wi-fi spots across India by March 2019, Chairman and Managing Director Anupam Shrivastava said today.

"We have plans to set up 1 lakh wi-fi by March 2019, which include 25,000 for rural areas. The USOF (Universal Serice Obligation Fund) will provide financial support for rural wi-fi hotspots," Shrivastava told reporters on the sidelines of launching a GST application for BSNL customers.

The BSNL CMD said the company will invest about Rs 1,800 crore in setting up 70,000 wi-fi hotspots and the USOF is providing a fund of Rs 900 crore, including three years of operation and maintenance for set-

ting up 25,000 hotspots. "We will set up another 5,000 wi-fi hotspots on revenue share basis and BSNL is not required to invest capital... we are only providing bandwidth," Shrivastava said.

As for the GST app, he said BSNL has selected Masters India that will provide software to customers of the state-run firm.

"At a time when a new entrant has changed the dynamics of doing business in the telecom sector, tariffs are going to rock bottom, we need to explore other models for generating revenue. The GST filing service that we are providing in partnership with Masters India will be on revenue sharing basis and it will attract customers to our network," Shrivastava caid.

Par panel members seek redrafting of report on demonetisation

New Delhi, Aug 29 (PTI): Several members of a parliamentary panel today sought redrafting of its draft report on demonetisation as RBI has not provided some crucial details including on the quantum of junked Rs 500/1000 notes, sources said.

The acceptance of the report was deferred as member MPs across parties in the Parliamentary Standing Committee on Finance said it needs to be "redrafted" while some of them stated that it "lacks punch", according to the sources.

Let's Play Politics The next Assembly elections are not far away

The next Assembly election is barely a year and nine months away. That is not very deep in the future. Twenty-one months, after all, provide barely enough days to smoothen disgruntlement of five years [for the ruling party] or lead time to recover eroded voter base of 25 years [for the Opposition parties]. Yes, the SKM rode a strong anti-incumbency ripple in 2014, but the political space has been drastically rearranged since then and the Opposition has still not found its rhythm even though it has been looking at issues to leverage. Criticism of the government and the ruling party, after all, even if much more aggressive, is not enough at this advanced stage to translate into meaningful votes because to make a serious play for things, it will have to expand its voter base beyond the already disaffected and disgruntled. Similarly, for the ruling Front, it cannot afford to rest easy on its five terms in office because it did receive a scare in the last elections and saw its vote-share shrink the moment an organized and concerted challenge was mounted. It does not enjoy the luxury of going aggressive and belligerent like the Opposition because that would end up distracting voters from the achievements of the past 25 vears and deliver Sikkim a stronger anti-incumbency factor. These confusions and conflicts will make for an interesting round of politicking which can be expected to gather steam as early as the end of the year which has been coming up as the phase when "politics" begins happening in Sikkim. Unfortunately, no fireworks can be expected for the panchayat elections which will come earlier but are unlikely to see any committed Opposition mobilization.

The mutual distrust between the ruling party and coalition of Opposition parties is well established and hardly surprising. As far as the voters are concerned, this requires no further reiteration. The criticisms and condemnations and denials and counter allegations that the two sides have remained obsessed with thus far were expected in the first four years of the present term as routine, predictable stances. For politics and the wooing of the voters, much more than press releases are required. Maybe the voters don't even expect it anymore, but would definitely be hoping that the level of political debate now improves at least a notch to become more about policies and visions. In Sikkim, politics normally picks up pace only when elections are a year away, and may be that is why there is too much clutter and deal-making instead of informed debates and sustained positions. Those with a stake in politics should now consider getting active much more in advance... like when there's only a year and nine months left. And from hereon at least, any party keen on making a contest of the next elections would be well advised to share its plans for Sikkim if they were given a chance to run it for next five years. Their plans for their "enemies", okay "opponents" to keep things politically correct, will only please individ-uals who share their hatreds; elections however are not won by individual dislikes. To win votes, one needs to speak to the people, about issues that concern the people and offering solutions to problems being faced by the people. For that, vision is required, not targets.

The focus here is on what the Opposition needs to do because the odds still do not favour it. It would be wise on their part to stop believing that a "silent wave" is in the making – too many others have made that mistake in the past for there to be the need for a repeat. Look at things from the voter's perspective, the Opposition is not even offering new faces yet. The political debate thus has to improve into becoming one about contesting ideologies, different plans of actions, differing courses for the State. Then the voter might then think there is a choice, otherwise a contest will

In Vietnam poverty and poor development, not just floods, kill the most marginalised

Flooding and landslides in northwest Vietnam have caused widespread devastation since the start of August. The disaster crippled the provinces of Son La. Dien Bien, Yen Bai and Lai Chau, situated within one of the most disadvantaged regions of the country.

Tragically, at least 27 lives have been lost, many more are missing and almost 1 trillion Vietnamese Dong (US\$43m) of damage has been reported. The already poor in-

frastructure of the region has been badly impacted.
Pictures and videos posted online and across
different media channels have shown terrifying and dramatic scenes. In some footage we can see the rapidly moving flood water sweeping through residential areas.

Disasters are widely misunderstood in Viet-nam – as they are elsewhere – as "natural" oc-currences. As a consequence of this, there is little open discussion about the social, political and economic factors that are inextricably linked to the issue. It is of particular concern that the voices of those most affected, Vietnam's ethnic minori-

MINORITY GROUPS MOST AFFECTED

Ethnic minority groups, predominantly the Tay, Thai and Hmong peoples, compose approximately 80% of the population in the region. It is one of the poorest parts of the country. The poverty rate among ethnic minorities in the region is 73% and the extreme poverty rate 45.5%. By comparison, the extreme poverty rate among the Kinh majority (88% of population) nationwide is 2.9%.

Ethnic minorities in Vietnam are terribly disadvantaged due to the lack of access to education, infrastructure, transportation, health care and other services. These factors have contributed to wide-ranging social and economic disadvantage and therefore, increased vulnerability.

In the northwestern part of Vietnam, these groups are also often subsistence farmers – crops are critical to their existence and flooding brings

Beginning in June, forecasts indicated that serious flooding was likely in the region, and there were widespread instances of flooding in early July. These messages were disseminated across media platforms. However, it is unclear whether this message was actually received by those most at risk.



Even more problematic is the way in which disasters are perceived and discussed in Vietnam. The focus is invariably on the "natural" quality of disasters, as referred to by the Law on Natural Disaster Prevention and Control (No. 33/2013/ OH13), which to an extent defines the scope of narrative regarding disasters in Vietnam. This language, repeated by the media, leaves many people blind to the social and political aspects of

THE OFFICIAL NARRATIVE

When disasters happen, the focus of Vietnamese media is consistently on reporting the death toll, loss and damage figures, and stories involving search and rescue operations by the government and non-government organisations.

In the wake of this tragedy, the government ini-

tiated a major disaster relief fundraising campaign. Lieutenant Lo Thi Sao Chi, who was organising the military response to the disaster, told the VOV5 news site that the government "participated in the search for missing people, relocated households in dangerous areas, cleared soil and rocks from the

flood and helped people resettle their lives."

But the media has failed to actually ask the right question: why were the victims living in such unsafe, vulnerable living conditions in the

How come the poverty and inequality issues plaguing ethnic minorities have not been ad-dressed? Little progress has been made among these most marginalised groups, despite signifi-cant improvements across the country as a whole. Unfortunately, a serious critique of the root causes of disasters like this one is almost complete-

ly absent in the media

DEVASTATING DEVELOPMENT

What has been conveniently forgotten is the fact that communities affected by flooding are often particularly vulnerable because they have been

Over the past 30 years, the government has been developing hydropower capacity in the affected region. Hydropower projects in Lai Chau (completed 2016) and Son La (completed 2012) were designed to maximise profit. Unfortunately, in many cases of such development, environmental and social impacts are secondary concerns.

The projects have displaced numerous communities. International Rivers reports that the Son La project alone, in the northwest of the country and 320km from Hanoi, may have displaced 91,000 people.

Those forced to move have been thrust

into ever more vulnerable living conditions.

In many cases they have lost access to the river that sustained livelihoods and essential services such as water and electricity. As a result, poverty and inequality have been exacerbated.

REDUCE RISK, LISTEN TO THE PEOPLE

Yet, people in northwest Vietnam continue to demonstrate a remarkable level of resilience in spite of systemic disadvantage. Those who had been displaced by flooding almost immediately began to clean up the area after this latest tragedy, salvage materials and rebuild their lives.

Although rural Vietnam has historically experienced extreme disaster impacts, climate change threatens to act as a risk multiplier

The government officially advocates for the decentralisation of disaster risk management, but Dutch NGO CORDAID reports that, "the involvement of vulnerable groups is still limited and in effect the plans are still managed in a top-down

It is possible to reduce disaster risk through licy decisions and development plans. However, in reality the more common outcome of developent is the creation of additional risk.

More often than not, vulnerable people are ig-

nored and decisions are made based on the potential for economic gain.

Those on the margins of society always suffer in disasters. If we truly aspire to build a better society, their needs must now be prioritised.

Change cannot come quick enough. Northern

Vietnam continues to suffer this summer, most recently as Typhoon Hato brought further flooding to the already stricken region.

The world protests as Amazon forests are opened to mining

he Amazon, often described as the The Amazon, often described as the "lungs of the Earth", is the largest rainforest in the world. Its extraordinary biodiversity and sheer scale has made it a globally significant resource in the fight against climate change.

But last week the Brazilian president Michel Temer removed the pro-tected status of the National Reserve of Copper and Associates, a national reserve larger than Denmark.

The reserve, known as "Renca",

covers 46,000 square kilometres and is thought to contain huge amounts of copper, as well as gold, iron ore and other minerals. Roughly 30% of Renca will now be open to mining exploration. Renca also includes indigenous reserves inhabited by various ethnic communities living in relative isolation.

The decision, which has been denounced by conservation groups and governments around the world, comes as the unpopular Temer strug-gles with a crushing political and eco-nomic crisis that has seen unemploy-

POLITICAL AND ECO-NOMIC TURBULENCE

Brazil is currently in the middle of the largest corruption scandals in its history. Since 2014, an ongoing federal investigation called Operation Car Wash has implicated elite businesspeople and high-ranking politicians, uncovering bribes worth millions of dollars exchanged for deals with the state oil company Petrobas. According to the BBC, almost a third of President Temer's cabinet is under investigation for alleged corruption.

There is no doubt that Brazil needs to find ways out of recession and unemployment. As the minister of mining and energy has said, "the objective of the measure [to allow mining] is to attract new investments, generating wealth for the country and employ ment and income for society."

However it's not clear that this

ove will benefit ordinary Brazilians This is not the first gold rush into this area, and the Amazon still has high indices of poverty and many other challenges.

During the 1980s and 90s tens of thousands of miners flocked to gold deposits in the Amazon, driven by high international prices. One of the most famous examples, "Serra Pelada," saw 60,000 men dig a massive crater in the Amazon Basin.

These mining operations typically

provided little economic benefits to the local populations. Instead, they at-tracted thousands of people, which led to deforestation, violent land conflicts and mercury pollution in the rivers.

In reality the Amazon and its peo-

ple deserve a sustainable model of velopment, which takes advantage of the outstanding biodiversity and beauty of its standing forests. The historical record shows mining is likely to lead to a demographic explosion, and further deforestation, pollu-tion and land conflicts.

THE PRINCIPLE OF

NON-REGRESSION

One important aspect of international environmental law is called the "principle of non-regression". The principle states that some legal rules should be non-revokable in the name of the com-mon interest of humankind. Essentially, once a level of protection has been anted there is no coming back.

This principle is reflected in arti-

cle 225 of the Brazilian constitution. which lays out the right to a healthy environment:

"All have the right to an ecologi-

cally balanced environment [...] and both the Government and the community shall have the duty to defend and preserve it for present and future generations."

The Brazilian constitution also describes the Amazon forest as a "na-tional heritage". It must then be treat-

ed accordingly.
While the Amazon is a fundamental part of Brazil's history, it's also against climate change. The Amazon contains half the worlds' tropical rainforests, and its trees absorb and store vast amounts of carbon dioxide.

According to the Intergovernmental Panel on Climate Change, land use, including deforestation and forest degradation, is the second-largest source of global emissions after the energy sector

Developed countries around the world have committed resources to help Brazil offset the costs of safeguarding their forests. One example is the Amazon Fund, created in 2008. It has received billions of dollars from foreign governments such as Norway and Germany, to combat deforestation and to promote sustainable prac-

tices in the Brazilian Amazon.

But with 14 million Brazilians unemployed, further assistance is required to ensure that they can protect

As well as governments, companies have also committed billions of dollars to fight climate change and support projects that reduce carbon emissions and promote energy ef-ficiency. Most businesses have also created self-regulatory standards to ensure compliance with international laws and ethical standards.

The decision of the Brazilian government leaves us with two ques-tions. How will the international community honour their commitments to keep global warming below $2\mathbb{Z}$, if countries begin rolling back their environmental protections? And how will companies involved in mining projects in the Amazon honour their social responsibility commitments and moral obligation towards present and future generations?

The degradation of the Amazon will affect the entire world. The clearing of the Amazon for mining will lead to the emissions of thousands of tons of greenhouse gases, furthering global warming and causing the irreversible loss of biodiversity, and water resources, as well as damage to local and indigenous communities.

Let us not take a step back to-wards more destruction. Rather, let us strengthen the protection of our remaining forests.

Who are PARA-LEGAL VOLUNTEERS (PLVs)?

Under the NALSA Scheme for Para-Legal Volunteers (PLVs) introduced during the year 2009, Para-Legal Volunteers act as intermediaries bridging the gap between the common people and the Legal Services Institutions to remove impediments in access to justice by making legal services accessible to people who are in the villages and in geographically inaccessible areas

PLVs are trained on basic laws and legal system of our country and provide basic legal assistance to those who approach the legal aid clinics for legal advise

Who are entitled to free legal services?

Section 12 of the Legal Services Authority Act, 1987 prescribes eligibility for free legal aid to the following persons to file or defend a case, if that person is -

- a member of a Scheduled Caste or Scheduled Tribe;
- a victim of trafficking in human being or begar as referred to in Article 23 of the Constitution;
- a woman or a child;
- a mentally ill or otherwise disabled person; a person under circumstances of undeserved want such as being
- victim of a mass disaster, ethnic violence, caste atrocity, flood drought, earthquake, or industrial disaster; or
 - an industrial workman: or
- in custody, including custody in a protective home within the meaning of clause (g) of section 2 of the Immoral Traffic (Prevention) Act, 1956, or in a juvenile home within the meaning of clause (j) of section 2 of the Mental Health Act, 1986; or in a psychiatric hospital or psychiatric nursing home within the meaning of clause (j) of section 2 of the Mental Health Act. 1987: or
- in receipt of annual income less than rupees one lakh as may be prescribed by the State Government, if the case is before a Court other than the Supreme Court, and less than rupees one lakh or such other higher amount as may be prescribed by the Central Government, if the case is before the Supreme Court.

Any person living in the vicinity of the Legal Aid Clinics detailed above may approach these clinics for legal aid advice and free legal advocate.

Trans-boundary collaboration and sound water management are key to mutually beneficial water utilisation and flood control in India and three other riparian countries of the Brahmaputra basin, experts have

The Brahmaputra basin spreads over China, Bhutan, India and Bangladesh and has a total area of 5,80,000 square kilometres.

The river, one of the major rivers in Asia, flows 50.50 per cent in Tibet, 33.60 per cent in India, 8.10 per cent in Bangladesh and 7.80 per cent in Bhutan. India and Bangladesh constitute more than 95 per cent the total population of the Yarlung Zangbo-Brahmaputra-Jamuna basin, which bears the brunt of the floods.

"Water utilisation in

the Yarlung Zangbo-Brahmaputra- Jamuna river is a challenge due to its narrow width and high drainage density which produces high flood wave causing severe flood dam-age in the lower riparian countries of the basin". said Arup Sarma of the Indian Institute of Technology (IIT) Guwahati at a workshop on 'Water and Neighbourhood' organised by the Third Pole

here recently.

Data sharing among the riparian countries was the need of the hour to minimise the effect of flood damage and ensure the benefits of a technically sound and mutually heneficial holistic hasin management programme are taken up in a collabo-

Heavy flooding since May has so far claimed 157 lives and affected nearly 20 lakh people in Assam. The Brahmaputra and its tributaries submerged more than 2,500 villages, destroyed 1.06 lakh hectares of cropland, damaged infrastructure by breaching embankments and overrunning roads and bridges.

Nearly 75 per cent of Kaziranga National Park, a world heritage site, had been inundated.

An understanding ex-

ists between four countries - China, India, Bhutan and Bangladesh - but a multilateral body comprising the four countries can go a long way to address the trans-boundary issues of the river basin and ensure its proper management, said Anamika Barua of IIT Guwahati.

All riparian countries must realise the importance of collaboration leads to ecological benefits that come from sound water management and a healthy eco-system, Barua said.

She said the benefits to societies by using water to produce services and intra-basin relations lead to trade agreements and regional integration.

The Brahmaputra basin has the highest water resources potential but its utilisation percentage is low mainly due to its high temporal variation of more than 75 per cent in four months leading to severe floods, erosion and drought. With climate change

and anthropogenic impacts, temporal variation may further increase, increased intensity of rain-fall and high sediment load add more complexities to the system but it is the concept of Ecolog-ical Management Practices (EMPs), if applied at large scale, that can help maintaining ecological balance of the basin", Sar-Increasing basin stor-

age by EMP application and well designed mutually beneficial multipurpose reservoir proj-ect can help improve the present scenario of disastrous flooding, erosion, landslide and poor water utilisation, he said.

A large number of followers, who had come to Dera headquarters before the conviction of Ram Rahim to show solidarity with him, have now left the place.

There are only 200 followers, most of them employed at the sect headquarters, according to officials. Authorities said that law and order prevailed in the area.

After the conviction of Ram Rahim Singh by a CBI court in Panchkula on August 25, six Dera followers were killed in Sirsa while 60 were injured in violence.

Dismayed by SFA's disciplinary action, SHSC demands proper explanation

Sikkim Himalayan
Sporting Club [SHSC] management has ex-pressed its dissatisfaction and displeasure on the disciplinary action initiated against two of its players and coach by the Sikkim Football Association [SFA]. The club has demanded a proper explanation on the rea-sons behind the disci-

plinary action from SFA.

Further, the club has threatened to quit the upcoming SFA premier division league 2017 if the SFA does not provide satisfactory explanation within one week. It is to be mentioned

here that on the basis of a report submitted by Match Commissioner and officials deployed to assess the second quarter-final match of Independence Day Football Tournament for Chog-yal Sir Tashi Namgyal Memorial Cup between SHSC and Sikkim Sports Academy on 09 August at Paljor Stadium, the disciplinary committee of SFA took disciplinary action against the coach, Pranoy Subba, goalkeeper, Bipen Bhattarai, and Sudesh Subba of SHSC.

Addressing a press conference here today, SHSC management of-ficials alleged that such dictatorship of the SFA will not allow football to prosper in Sikkim.

"Although we are not satisfied with the decision of the SFA, if they have taken such action then they should serve us a copy of the action first instead of going to the Press," they stated. They alleged that

this was just an attempt to defame SHSC, which is one of the prestigious

clubs of the State

"It was really shock-ing and disheartening to read about SFA's decision in the newspapers when we were not even informed about it," they expressed.
According to

SHSC officials, the referee had brought the situation under control during the match on 09 Aug showed red cards to players from both the teams No action has been taken against the SSA players involved, they said and also accused the Match Commissioner, Cham-chuk Lama, of manhandling a player of the SHSC during the match.

"We reported the matter to the SFA on 10 Aug and asked for a response within two days. The SFA has not responded till date," they said.

SHSC officials have alleged that the Match Commissioner has unfairly targeted SHSC and they have further questioned why such action has not been taken during similar incidents that have occurred in the presence of the same Match Commissioner.

"SFA should be able to point out my mis-takes and tell me about it before initiating such action. I am really sad-dened that they did not care to hear my side of the story," said SHSC coach, Pranoy Subba. He added that such action on the players would de-stroy the future of young players.

"We will not pay any fine until we will receive a satisfactory reply from the SFA. If they fail to do so, we will not participate in the upcoming premier division league of the State," said SHSC officials.

Venus celebrates 20 years at US Open, awaits Serena return

New York, Aug 29 (AFP): Venus Williams celebrated her 20th anniversary at the US Open as the tournament celebrated 20 years of Arthur Ashe Stadium, where she claimed two of her seven Grand Slam titles.
Williams was

17-year-old upstart with beads in her hair when she rallied to defeat Latvia's Larisa Neiland 5-7. 6-0, 6-1 in the first round of the 1997 US Open in her Flushing Meadows de-but on her way to her first Grand Slam final, which she lost to Martina Hingis.

"It has been 20 won-derful years," Williams told the crowd after a 6-3. 3-6, 6-2 first-round victo ry over Slovakian qualifier Viktoria Kuzmova

"I'm not sure there are going to be 20 more."

Since Williams be-came the first unseeded US Open women's finalist since 1958, she has won the 2000 and 2001 US Opens and five Wimbledon crowns, including her most recent Slam ti-tle in 2008.

But this season, at age 37 Williams has turned back the clock, reaching the finals at Wimbledon and the Australia Open. She lost to Spain's Gar bine Muguruza on the All

England grass and to her pregnant sister Serena at Melbourne last January. She reached Arthur Ashe Stadium having played in two Grand

Slam finals in a year for the first time since 2003, marveling at the largest venue in tennis from her airplane window.

"It's massive. When

I was flying in, we flew right over it," Williams said. "A certain excitement I get to play there. It's a privilege. It's an

honor. I take it quite seri-Everybody does." Asked what her career timetable might be,

the oldest woman in the US Open said, "I don't know. We'll see. I have no plans. Zero."

Well, she has one. With

23-time Grand Slam winner Serena giving birth in the next few weeks, Venus will become an aunt for the first time as an adult. It's one of the few adventures the sisters haven't been able to fully share in their careers.

"It's definitely a different experience, pecially for she and I, because we spent our whole lives so focused on work," Venus said. "So when you have an experience that is not work, it's pretty intense. It's a completely different experience for both of us."

Tour life without Ser-ena has Venus spending more time down Memo

ry Lane than just a landmark night at Arthur Ashe Stadium.

"I definitely have adjusted at this point. It takes time," Venus said. "There are moments where you have very distinct memories of togeth-

"I've been able to remember those and be fond or have some longing or happy memories, all those feelings. But the plan is hopefully that it won't be forever.

Until Serena is able to return as doubles partner and singles star, something she has said her goal would be to do in time to defend her Australian Open title in 2018, Venus will have to settle for some coaching advice from afar.

'We always coach each other pretty much. We know what it's like to be out there," Venus said. "It's like I know I relate to her, she relates to me. I know exactly what it feels like. It's great to get advice from someone like that.'

India of medal at World Championship Aug 29

Gaurav assures

HAMBURG, (PTI): Wildcard entrant Gaurav Bidhuri today became only the fourth Indian boxer ever to secure himself a medal in the World Championships after he defeated Tunisia's Bilel Mhamdi to enter the semifinals of the megaevent here.

Gaurav prevailed in

a split decision in the bantamweight (56kg) quarterfinal contest to make the last-four stage, becoming the second from the country to do so in his debut world championship. The only other Indian to have achieved the feat was Vikas Krishan, in the 2011 edition.

"It is so so surreal.

I was a wildcard entry and now I am a medallist. Everything has hap-pened so quickly for me, my brain will take some time to process all this," Gaurav told PTI after his triumph.

Besides Vikas, Vi-jender Singh (2009) and Shiva Thapa (2015) have been the country's only other medallists at the marquee event of the sport. But they have all settled for bronze medals and it remains to be seen

if Gaurav can better them

on that.
"I am going to create bigger history now by winning a better medal than bronze. I have been dealing with a back problem for the last eight months, (but) somehow kept going and finally I have been rewarded, it is just so overwhelming right now," said the boxer, who will face American Duke Ragan in the semi-finals after tomorrow's rest day.

But there was slight disappointment as well for the contingent when Amit Phangal (49kg), an-other impressive debutant in the event, bowed out in the quarterfinal stage.

The Asian Championships bronze-medallist went down to Olympic champion and second seed Hasanboy Dusma-tov of Uzbekistan in an unanimous verdict, ending what has been a fine campaign for the 21-year-old.

Gaurav, who has been battling a back niggle for the last eight months, took the ring next for India and was on the offensive from the word go.



Dera chief's case has embarrassed religious figures: Ramdev

INDORE, AUG 29 (PTI): A day after Dera Sacha Sau-da chief Gurmeet Ram Rahim Singh was jailed for 20 years for rape, yoga guru Ramdev today said such cases are causing an embarrassment to religious figures.

"It is true that we are facing embarrassment for such cases which have surfaced in the past two-three years," Ram-dev, who was here to participate in a private programme, told reporters.

The popular yoga guru was asked about the conviction and sentence ing of the self-styled god-

man in two rape cases.

He, however, cautioned that the entire saint tradition should not be seen in bad light if a religious figure is found guilty in a criminal case

Ramdev advised religious and spiritual leaders to go back to history and follow the code of conduct set by Indian sages centuries ago.

'It is wrong to link the entire saint tradition with criminal activities if a person living in the guise of a saint or a religious leader commits a mistake or crime."

The 51-year-old ayurveda expert-cum-en-trepreneur said in the wake of the Ram Rahim episode the entire commu nity of religious-spiritual gurus should not be tarred with the same brush.

There are still millions of saints in the country who are living a life full of honesty, purity and serving

the common people."

He said, "Lord Ram is the greatest symbol of Indian culture. If there is any taint on a person bearing the name Ram, it only sullies the character of that particular person.

Need for legally-bound ban against nuclear testing: UN chief

terres today called on countries, including India, to ensure that the Comprehensive Nu-clear-Test-Ban Treaty comes into force soon, saying North Korea's continued nuclear tests demonstrate the need for

a legally-binding prohibition.
In his message on the International Day against Nuclear Tests, the UN secretary general said for almost 20 years, a global norm has existed against nuclear testing based on voluntarily unilater-al moratoriums. While this restraint should be applauded, it is not enough.
"More than 2,000 nucle-

ar tests have been conducted over the past seven decades from the South Pacific to North America, from Central Asia to North Africa. They have harmed some of the world's



most vulnerable people and pristine ecosystems," he said. Guterres' message comes

as nuclear-armed North Korea fired a missile which flew over Japan, one of its most provocative missile tests in

recent years that prompted Tokyo to warn residents in its path to take cover.

"Continued nuclear tests by the Democratic People's Republic of Korea demonstrate that even the strongest

norm is no substitute for a legally-binding prohibition," the UN chief said.

The missile travelled around 2,700 kilometres (1,700 miles) at a maximum altitude of around 550 kilometres. No

flown Japan for years, and the launch came after a strained period on the peninsula follow ing Pyongyang's testing of two intercontinental ballistic missiles (ICBM) last month that appeared to bring much of the US mainland within reach.

Guterres said to ensure that no nation can conduct another test, it is essential that the CTBT. Treaty banning all nuclear explosions, finally enter into force.

Eight more Annex 2 states need to ratify the Treaty to accomplish this.

Annex 2 states are the states that must ratify the treaty and deposit their instruments of ratification with the secretary-general of the United Nations for the CTBT to enter into force.

Israel, and the US, which have signed the Treaty, and North Korea, India, and Pakistan,

which have not signed.
"I urge all countries yet to join the CTBT to do so as soon

as possible," Guterres said.

Last year, the Security
Council had adopted its first resolution focused solely on nuclear testing and Guterres expressed hope that it would represent a new momentum towards taking the essential next step in ridding the world of the menace of nuclear weapons.

The CTBT was negotiated at the Conference on Disar-mament in Geneva and adopted by the UN General Assembly. It opened for signature on 24 September 1996. Since then it has reached near-universality and 182 countries have signed it.

China hopeful of getting support for successful BRICS summit

Beijing, Aug 29 (PTI): China today hoped that all BRICS nations will play a role for the success of the grouping's upcoming summit in Xiamen, a day after India and China agreed to disengage their soldiers to end the Doklam standoff.

India and China yes-terday ended their 73-day standoff in Doklam by withdrawing their troops from the area, a diplomatic breakthrough that came just days be-fore the BRICS (Brazil, Russia, India, China and South Africa) summit hosted by China.

Prime Minister Na-rendra Modi will travel to Xiamen to attend the summit from September

When asked whether China halted the work on a road in Doklam to end the standoff so that the BRICS summit could be held, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesper-son Hua Chunying said, "Peaceful resolution of

the issue through the diplomatic serves the common interests of all relevant parties."

"It shows the sincerity and responsible attitude of China as a major country," Hua said.
She said the summit

is the common cause of all the BRICS countries and ensuring its success serves the interests of all relevant parties.
"We hope all relevant

parties can play a role for the success of the summit. We hope to get the support and coordi-nation from all relevant parties," she said.

When asked about the road construction in Doklam, Hua said China will take into consider-

ation all relevant factors including the weather, while building it.

"In order to meet the needs of defending the borders, improving the living conditions, China has long engaged in infrastructure develop-ment including the road construction," she said.

Hua reiterated that "Chinese border troops will continue to station and patrol the Doklam area. We will continue to exercise our sovereignty with historic conventions.

Katy Perry's Despite Katy Perry's best(?) efforts, the most exciting moment came cour tesy of an absent Taylor Swift.

The winners of MTV's Video Music Awards have rarely been as exciting as what unfolds at the ceremony itself. WINNER: TAYLOR SWIFT

Despite her rumored surprise appearance, Taylor Swift didn't show up to the VMAs, but yes, she still managed to win the night.

Hell, it didn't even matter that Swift was only nominated for a single award (Best Collaboration, for "I Don't Wanna Live Forever (Fifty Shades Darker)" with Zayn Malik, which she ended up winning); she still managed to dominate the conversation surrounding them.

All week leading up to the show, the most highly anticipated event wasn't anything to do with how Katy Perry would do as host, or the confirmed slate of performances featuring stars like Kendrick Lamar and Miley Cyrus. Instead, It was the mere possibility of whether or not Swift would show her face after staying out of the public eye for so long, whether to perform her new single What You Made Do" or make some kind of self-aware nod towards her longstanding feud (or lack thereof) with Perry.

Swift did none of those things. But she did premiere the video for "Look What You Made Me Do" during the show, and proved she didn't

Honestly, Perry was fighting an uphill battle the sec-ond Swift fired up her "I've got a new single and a new album coming out" publicity machine. Even the fact that Swift released "Look What You Made Me Do" on the same day that Perry released her baffling video for "Swish – the revenge fantasy song that she has not-so-slyly referenced as being about her and Swift — proved that Swift is play-ing chess while Perry's playing Boggle. it together for an overall win if she had crushed her VMAs hosting gig. LOSER: JULIA MICHAELS

Not only did Michaels lose Best New Artist to Khalid, but her performance of "Issues" — backed by a bopping line of what appeared to be a lost sorority mixer — was almost immediately cut off by a tease for the impending pre-miere of Swift's "Look What You Made Me Do" video. Anyone interested in seeing the 'extended" performance was then encouraged to watch it online. Somewhere, Swift is kicking back in her sweatpants, unfurling a wicked smirk at just how handily she won the night without even showing un

WINNER: KENDRICK LAMAR

Someone who didn't and could never be played off is Kendrick Lamar, who opened the VMAs with such intensity that the entire stage was set ablaze. And we do mean that literally: as the wall behind him lit up, a stunt perform-er on literal fire careened in front of him.

It was as electric and passionate as we've come to expect from Lamar no matter where he's performing. He was so good, in fact, that he set a completely dissonant tone for the mess to come but that's not his problem, is it? Also, he eventually won six of the eight awards he was nominated for, so as far as Kendrick was concerned,

it was a great night. LOSER: LORDE'S IMMUNE SYSTEM

Lorde is one of our most musical precious nymphs, but her performance ended up being one of the weirder ones of the night, and not in the usual Lorde way that's made her such a fas-cinating performer over the vears. The culprit for her confusing energy, Lorde tweeted before the show, was the flu.

Her illness explains why she didn't sing at all, opting instead to flail and writhe around the stage to her new song "Homemade Dynamite" like a kid try to walk after spinning themselves around too fast. Like, it was cute, but would you go out of your way to see it? Nah.

WINNER: JACK ANTONOFF AND HIS MANY, MANY WRITING CREDITS

In contrast, Jack Antonoff producer of Lorde's new album and Bleachers frontman — had a great night as the omnipresent ghost of VMA present. He performed in the pre-show, introduced Lorde, and accepted the award for Best Collaboration on behalf of Zayn and Taylor Swift since he co-wrote their winning song. He even got one of the better camera cutaways of the night, as he chilled in the audience and contentedly ate a banana.

This year's VMAs took a purposeful, political stand long before they aired. They brought back the "Best Video with a Social Message" award, rebranded as "Best Fight Against the System Award." They made all the categories gender neutral, nixing Best Male Artist and Best Female Artist to create an all-encom-passing Best Artist of the Year category. They even made the traditional "Moonman" trophy gender neutral by renaming it 'Moon Person" in a classic case of, "Points for trying, but this just seems awkward now."

It's always a little jarring when a moment like this happens during a show that also

But it was also undeniably moving when Robert Wright Lee IV, a pastor, spoke about his "moral duty to speak out against racism, America's original sin," and when Susan Bro spoke about creating a foundation in her daughter's name to keep fighting hate. It was, in other words, the kind of moment that made even the show's clumsier efforts to be more inclusive and thoughtful worth it.

LOSER: THE VMAS' REP-UTATION AS A ONE-OF-A-

A few bright spots just couldn't make up for a night full of confusing bits, flat jokes, desperate attempts to create viral hashtags, and the vast majority of performances coming and going so for-gettably that they almost immediately floated away into
