problems of GST to be resolved in 2 months: CEA

New Delhi, Jun 30 (PTI): Arvind Subramanian today exuded confidence of resolving teething prob-lems of GST implementa-

tion in one-two months.
"There will be some hurdles initially. But we will be able to remove them in 1-2 months," Subramanian told media after attending the GST rollout ceremony held in Parliament.

Describing the GST as a "disruptive change", President Pranab Mukherjee in his speech said there are bound to be some teething troubles which will have to be resolved quickly to ensure growth momentum of the economy is not impacted.

"Initially, there will be some problems, but both Centre and states are determined to resolve them, Central Vigilance Commis

sioner K V Chowdary said. GST is an important move, he said, adding, it will curb black-marketing and improve ease of doing

Asked if prices of some goods will shoot up with GST in place, he said, "That is not correct, when the government has said it is revenue-neutral GST. The government is not earning additional revenue.

Asked if GST will spur economic growth, Senior BJP leader and former Finance Minister Yashwant Sinha said, "Let's wait and see. It is difficult to pre-

dict at this point of time." AIADMK member Navaneethakrishnan said, "It turn to pg03

Kovind, Meira in direct contest for president

NEW DELHI, JUL 1 (PTI): The stage is set for a direct contest between the ruling NDA's presiden-tial nominee Ram Nath Kovind and the opposition-backed Meira Kumar for the country's top constitutional post.

Today was the last day for withdrawal of nomi-nations for the presiden-tial election scheduled for July 17.

Barring Kovind and op-position candidate Kumar the nominations of over 90 other candidates who wanted to be in the race for the post of president have been rejected during the

scrutiny process.

Members of Parliament will cast their votes using green-coloured ballot papers, while MLAs who vote in the presidential election will used pink-coloured ballots.

The process of print-ing ballot papers will be-gin tomorrow. The differ-ent colours of the papers will help the returning officer count the votes based on the value.

Total value of the elec-

toral college is 10,98,903. The ballot boxes will be brought to Delhi for counting on July 20.

South reviews shortage of essential commodities; SP-Jalpaiguri assures security for Sikkim trucks

meeting to review the short-age of essential commodities was held today under the was held today under the chairmanship of District Col-lector, South. Along with the DC (South), Senior Super-intendent of Police (South), Joint Directors of Animal Husbandry, Livestock, Fisheries and Veterinary Services, Agriculture and Horticulture Department, Sub Divisional Magistrate (HQ), Station Head Master (Namchi) and District Civil Supplies Officer were present in the meeting

The meeting was held after the Truck Drivers' Association submitted a memorandum informing that they have decided to stop plying to Siliguri after reports of vehicles being vandalized at Siliguri. As per the submission of the Truck Drivers' Association, they are ready to ply the trucks for supply of Essential Commodities under the security provided by the government.

Accordingly, Senior Super-intendent of Police (South) communicated the matter to Superintendent of Police, Jalpaiguri who has assured to take necessary action within his jurisdiction. A meeting has also been called on Monday in this regard by the Siliguri Commissioner to sort out the problem which will be attended by Additional Director General of Police, Headquar-ters, SP East and South. Accordingly, provision of escorts to the trucks for transportation of Essential Commodities shall be decided.

SDM and SDPO Ravangla have been directed to keep stock of at least 2,000 litres

The ropeway takes off from the shores of Tsomgo at 12,313 ft above sea level and climbs up a further 250 metres in height, covering the journey in a 625 mtr ride.

The ropeway was in-augurated by Tourism Minister Ugen T. Gyatso in the presence of Trans-port Minister, DT Lepcha, Parliamentary Secretaries Pintso Chopel Lepcha and Shyam Pradhan and Member of Parliament (Rajya Sabha), Hissay Lachungpa. "We are extremely

delighted to commission India's highest passenger ropeway. The ropeway has all kinds of safety features as per the latest technology such as rope, disc brake, rubber lin-ers," said CRSPL director, Rachana Mukheriee.

The inbuilt capacity of the ropeway is 800 passengers per hour (PPH). With 12 cabins, transporting 6 passen-gers the ropeway cabin has automatic opening and closing doors

DARJEELING (WB), JUL 1 (PTI): A panchayat office was set ablaze in Darjeeling hills, where the GJM today took out processions in support of its demand for a separate

Normal life remained crippled in the hills as the indefinite shutdown entered its 17th day.

Suspected Gorkha Janamukti Morcha (GJM) supporters set ablaze the St Mary's Gram Pan-chayat office in Kurseong last night, but the security forces moved in quick-ly and prevented it from getting completely gut-ted, the police said. GJM supporters took

out processions in various parts of the hills de-manding a separate state and a large gathering was held at the Chowkbazar area here.

The security personnel maintained a

close vigil in the disturbed areas even as Internet services

remained suspended. Shops and business establishments were shut and transport was

Courier services in Sikkim hit due to transport uncertainties caused by Darjeeling unrest KESANG DOMA BHUTIA since the bandh was declared.

GANGTOK, 01 JUL:

One of the many repercussions of the ongoing unrest in Darjeeling has been the disruption in the transport of goods from Siliguri to Gangtok and the courier services in Sikkim have also taken a hit.

Blue Dart's branches located in M.G Marg which provide to and fro daily services from Gangtok to Siliguri has been going under loss since the announcement of the indefinite strike in Darjeeling. Their last delivery from Siliguri was on 26 Jun which was received by the management during the

odd hours of 3 a.m and the only batch dispatched for Siliguri was on the very same day.

All important and urgent documents for passport, college admission documents, some official documents are sent through this service and they are not willing to shoulder such responsibility in these circumances fearing loss and damage of the same en route.

Prior to the bandh, another courier company, DTDC used to transport shipment of 60-70 packages to and fro per day but now the company is also suffer-ing losses. The mail van from Siliguri has not made any de-livery and due to this a bulk of packages to be sent through the same van has been lying around in the office itself.

They have been sending the packages through SNT buses where one bag is charged Rs 100.

The Delhivery Private Limited, located in Tibet road, Gang-tok provides courier services for online shopping sites specifically catering to Amazon, one of the largest online stores.

The Assistant Manager of

the said courier service stated that prior to the bandh the company used to receive shipment of about 1000 products in a day and dispatch 200-300 packages. However, the company's business has gone down by 50%

The shipment from Siliguri comes only till Melli or Rangpo and it has to be received by the company from there on. This has created a hassle for the company

and the business is suffering The Management of Air Express, Gangtok stated that they are suffering a huge pecuniary loss due to the present situation.

They stated that as of now

nothing has been done to address the situation but the Courier Service Providers have been called by the Police Department on 03 Jul for a meeting. They hope the Government will pay heed to their plight and take measures to redress the current situation.

Indian firm takes over construction of Durga temple in Bhutan

THIMPHU, JUL 1 (PTI): A nrominent Indian infrastructure firm has taken over the construction of a much-delayed Durga tem-ple in Bhutan after the project was hit by flaws in its design and disagree-ment among members of a Hindu body governing the temple, according to a media report.

The construction work of the temple at Kuensel Phodrang in Thimphu began in 2012 and was scheduled to be completed in 2014, but the project got delayed flaws and also there was disagreement among Hindu Dharma Samudaya of Bhutan (HDSB) members, Kuensel Online reported.

Following a directive from the government, Jaiprakash Associates Limited (JAL) has now taken over the construc-tion of the temple and it will be completed by June 2018, it said.

After terminating the earlier contract, JAL terminating was given the work to improve the architectural design of the temple

since the earlier designs and constructions had some flaws.

JAL volunteered to

construct the temple with its own fund, the report said.

"Work is in full swing and going on smoothly. The company will spend about Nu 40M for the construction," said JAL civil engineer and deputy general manager Ajay

Pant.
"We had to dismantle almost all the old struc-tures, both inside and outside, because of poordesigned structures and quality, Pant said.

'We had to remove materials, including all the statues, which were made of fiberglass and metal," he said.

Pant said statues of god or goddesses in the Hindu temples should be carved on the stone.

The plan now is to bring statues and other materials related to the temple from Chennai, he said. The temple's main statue will be Durga.



India attends SCO meeting in China amid Sikkim stand-off

KJM VARMA Beijing, Jul 1 (PTI):

Amid a stand-off in the Sikkim sector with Chinese troops, India has attended an SCO meeting in China to enhance anti-terrorism and bor-der control mechanisms among member nations, the first plenary meeting after India and Pakistan became full members of the China-dominated se-

curity grouping.
Seven Shanghai Cooperation (SCO) mem Organisation nber states including China, India and Russia participated in the organisation's meeting of heads of border control departments on Thursday in Dalian, Northeast China's Liaoning Province.

Officials from the Indian Embassy attended the Dalian meeting of the SCO.

This is the first ple-nary meeting since India and Pakistan joined the grouping in June. The other members are China, Russia, Kazakhstan,

Kyrgyzstan, Tajikistan and Uzbekistan. India and Pakistan last month became full members of the SCO that is increasingly seen as a counterweight to NATO.

India's membership was strongly pushed by Russia while Pakistan's entry into the grouping

was backed by China.

Member states discussed how to cooperate on combating terrorism, separatism and extremism, state-run Global

Times reported.

The members also talked about a joint operation along the border to prevent trans-border crimes and to improve the organisation's tion on safeguarding bor der security at the SCO

meeting, the report said.

Border enforcement cooperation is an important part of cooperation between China and other SCO member states, Chen Dingwu, a senior official at China's Ministry of Public Security's Border Control Department, said. He said China values

the collaboration with border control depart-ments of other countries, and has already built cooperation mechanisms with 11 neighbouring countries, including SCO

members.
SCO member states are willing to discuss issues of common interest based on equality as provided by the Shang-hai Spirit, SCO Secre-tary-General Rashid Alimov said.

Sikkim has realised that silence is not always golden. It should not fall silent again

 $T^{\text{ransporters have refused to run the Siliguri gaunt-let, and, in keeping with the mood for indefinite-}$ ness prevailing in the neighbouring hills, have gone on such a strike themselves when it comes to shipping goods and merchandise from West Bengal to Sikkim or vice versa. One sympathises with them. Why should anyone drive into trouble when the agencies responsible for law & order and safety seem disinclined to ensure or demand it? Passenger jeeps, private vehicles and taxis are also put at risk every time they venture beyond Salugara deeper into West Bengal.

Here, what needs to also be recognised is that

the "situation" is not nearly as universally violent or hostile as visuals from the episodes would suggest. The attacks have been one-off incidents clearly carried out by lumpen elements, which, during "normal" times, go about their business as extortion artists or political muscle for hire. That said, even one-off incidents are not excusable and unless every single incident is condemned, protested and followed-up, they set Sikkim up for continued harassment till much after the current excuses to target have run out of juice. It is also important to bear in mind that the impunity with which the attacks have been carried out were emboldened by the Bengal administration's own track-record of ambushing Sikkim vehicles with challans for obscure traffic violations. It is this attitude which marked out Sikkim vehicles as easy prey and the State's support for Gorkhaland only freed the criminally inclined hands to partake in the dadagiri which the law enforcement agencies in Bengal were already displaying. It thus becomes important for the Sikkim Government to make a bigger noise about the situation in Siliguri. It is not enough for the officials here to speak to their counterparts in West Bengal and present jurisdiction as an excuse for the absence of a stronger engagement. To begin with, Sikkim has to ensure that every incident of intimidation, harassment and vandalisation is officially recorded even if an official complaint has not been filed in Siliguri. It should then present these specifics to authorities in West Bengal and, at the very least, seek an update on the legal follow-up. Do the authorities in Sikkim know exactly how many hate crimes have been targeted against Sikkim people in Siliguri since the letter went out to the Home Minister in support of the Gorkhaland demand? By now a special cell should have been dedicated to keeping track of such incidents. Otherwise, when officials here speak to their counterparts in West Bengal, they will be speaking in vague terms about "some" incidents. Babus need specifics. Present them with specific incidents and they will have to respond with specific updates, otherwise

Sikkim's security will also only be vaguely assured.

The present rash of attacks will eventually die down, hopefully before anything more extreme happens. Sikkim's official protests - and condemnations by political parties don't count - should be put on re-cord before that happens so that overt action is seen to be taken, so that the Sikkimese know that the government here looks out for them with genuine concern beyond Rangpo. About the current situation in the neighboring hills, Sikkim had long adopted the silent approach, and only now did it speak its mind on the issue. Yes, the matter concerns WB and the Centre, but surely, since Sikkim is dragged into it every time anyways, it has the right to an opinion and should have the freedom to express it. Also, intimidation should not be the reason it holds back, because the kind of harassment it is being subjected to is clearly illegal and criminals should never be allowed to influence governments or people. And this is why the Sikkim Government should do more than speak to counterparts and should take up the complaints more resolutely. After all, not only does it have a right to complain and speak on behalf of its people, it also has a responsibility to ensure their safety.

Once a child bride, 21-year-old scripts NEET success story

KOTA (RAJASTHAN), JUL 1 (PTI): She was married off at the tender age of eight, but that never deterred Rupa Yaday from pursuing her dream of becoming a doctor.

Now 21, Rupa has secured an all-India rank of 2,612 -- scoring 603 marks in this year's National Eligibility and Entrance Test (NEET).

Her husband and broth-er-in-law, both farmers, also supported her all along, even driving an auto to meet the education expenses, disre-garding villagers' disparaging

Born into a poverty-ridden farmer's home in Kareri village of Jaipur district, Rupa, then a student of class III, and her elder sister Rukma, were wedded to Shankarlal, who

was then 12, and his elde brother Babulal, respectively.

After her class X exams in which she scored 84 per cent marks, her husband and brother-in-law helped her continue her studies.

Rupa continued to excel, again scoring 84 per cent in class XII exam, even as she managed household chores at

the same time.

The same year, she enrolled herself for a B.Sc course and also appeared for the AIP-MT examination, securing an all India rank of 23,000.

"Though I did not qualify

for a good government medi-cal college, the AIPMT marks encouraged my husband and brother- in-law to send me to Kota for preparing for MBBS entrance test," Rupa said.

After the Mayor's Defeat, Lampedusian Voters Face a Global Media Backlash

iusi Nicolini, the Nobel Prize-nominated, Olof Graph Prize-winning and UNESCO-recognised mayor of Lampedusa, Italy, has been voted out of office. On June 11 2017 she came in third place n the island's municipal elections, with just 908

The news went way beyond the borders of this migrant-flooded Mediterranean community of 6,000, which in recent years has found itself at the

centre of Europe's refugee crisis.

"An Italian mayor won an international award for helping migrants. Then she lost her job," ex-

claimed one Washington Post headline.

Domestic and international media grieved
Nicolini as a fallen heroine, a local champion repudiated by her own people. And the Lampedu-sians, who were instrumental in Nicolini's rise as a humanitarian star, were denigrated and vilified, deemed ignorant, backward and racist.

A MORAL COMMUNITY BUT AR-

BITRARY DETENTION

Since her election as mayor in 2012, Nicolini has fed into an Italian narrative about Lampedusa as the ideal, moral community.

She courted and embraced the media with stead-fast zeal, becoming a staple on Italian TV programs. She spoke about how, despite its size and the harsh conditions it faces, Lampedusa chooses to welcome immigrants because it is the right thing to do.

This largely quelled criticism of the bad treatment migrants actually receive in Lampedusa, where they are detained in a centre in Contrada Imbriacola referred to as "the Hotspot"

The human rights committee of the Italian sen-ate has criticised the facility, suggesting that it denies some migrants the right to asylum. Since the centre is designed for very short stay (a maximum of 48 hours), it provides no activities in-house and

access only to basic services. But many people are held for much longer, even exceeding 30 days. And this, the report concludes, violates the fundamental right of freedom from ar-

The immigrant detention centre has also been taken to task by the Italian human rights law expert Fulvio Vassallo Paleologo. In a 2012 book, he denounced the centre for its unlawful detention, use of forced returns, and, in previous years, push-back operations from neighbouring waters.

He recently reiterated these concerns:

"The treatment of migrants in Lampedusa is of-ten worse, in fact, than in other parts of Italy, and the situation, experts Glenda Garelli and Martina Tazzioli say, did not improve with the introduction of the EU's "hotspot approach". Conditions and procedures continue to fall below acceptable human rights standards."

But the issue rarely surfaces in the media. Only when migrants protest (as they did on Lampedusa on May 6) does the Hotspot garner some, if any at all, domestic or international coverage.

Even then, the accompanying images of desperate-looking men and burning buildings serve more to instil fear than to highlight the precarious conditions of the migrants stuck there

EXOTIC, PURE AND BACKWARD

Generally, Lampedusians have been portrayed in Italy as an exotic, pure island community; as "noble savages" untainted by civilisation, more humane, generous and hospitable than the rest of us.

Unknowingly, they have become part of what the human rights and migration expert Paolo Cut-titta called lo spettacolo del confine", a "political

spectacle" with "Lampedusa being the theatre of the border play" (his translation).

In the public imagination, Lampedusians were

an exceptional community. This narrative, which Guisi Nicolini steadily spread across Italy and abroad, caught like a spark in a dry haystack. Oth-

ers began feeding the fire.
Film director Gianfranco Rosi won the 2016 Berlin Film Festival with a movie about Lampedusa. His Fuocoammare (Fire at Sea) was celebrated as an immersion "into a community on the margins".

In it, Lampedusians are depicted as a backward ople, reminiscent of the Italian peasant in the early 1900s

I was on fieldwork in Lampedusa when the Italian national broadcaster RAI aired Fuocoammare for the first time in October 2016, and I watched

the film in the main square there.

Amid the celebratory tone, there was also an acute sense of disappointment in town. As I walked that evening with a Lampedusian friend, I could sense his jilted sense of pride.

I put on a brave face: It was nice to see Lampedusa on the big screen.

He raised his eyebrows: Yes, it was

"But why did Rosi show us in this way to the orld?" he asked.

"Have you ever seen my son eat spaghetti in that way?" he added quickly, referring to a scene where a little boy, depicted as wild and free (he runs bare-foot around the island) is seen slurping away at a plate of pasta.

A SHARED REPUDIATION

This view changed when the Lampedusians voted out Nicolini. After the election the media so universally repudiated the people of Lampedusa that it almost seemed like an orchestrated response.

Here are some headlines from June 12 2017: "Lampedusa fires Mayor Nicolini, symbol of hospitality and winner of the UNESCO peace prize"

(La Stampa); "UNESCO prize winner Nicolini loses Lampedusa election" (European Post); "Lampedusa rebukes Giusi Nicolini, the symbolic mayor of migrants" (Affari Italiani).

A spray-painted message, quickly removed by other Lampedusians, made the rounds, too. It read: Grazie avete estirpato il cancro Lampedusano (Thank you for removing the Lampedusian cancer).

The message, reported as shocking and insult-

ing, brought forth anti-racist moralising and a cascade of social media support for Nicolini.

Everyone was trying to understand what had

happened in Lampedusa; baseless analyses mush-roomed. Some claimed that the problem was a lack of respect for the law, implying that the mayor had ruffled feathers.

Others alleged that her defeat was friendly fire from Pietro Bartolo, a Lampedusian who has also been internationally feted for championing migration

Nicolini herself cited jealousy, claiming that her opponents accused her of "aspiring to more awards and accolades instead of addressing the issues that are dear to the inhabitants of Lampedusa and Linos

THE REAL LOCAL ISSUES

I shall refrain from conducting yet another analysis of the election results.

Instead, I refer readers to the diligent analysis of the Lampedusian collective Askavusa, tellingly titled The elections in Lampedusa: An inevitable short circuit. It argues that Nicolini was ousted for reasons that have nothing to do with migration. That she lost because of maladministration of the island.

From the lack of potable water and the irregular outsourcing of the waste management to a private company that mistreats its (Lampedusian) employees, voters took many concerns to the polls on June 11. Under Nicolini's watch, the island had also seen unsanctioned construction, rampant nepotism and militarisation

There's nothing radical about people choosing their mayor based on local governance issues rather than global ones. But false constructions, it seems, make for better headlines.

This is what happens when a place becomes a symbol. This community of islanders was reified for moral purposes, its people commodified for political, cultural and economic gain.

In a convoluted way, this isn't unlike the vili-fication and dehumanisation that contributes to the terrible treatment of undocumented migrants worldwide. No one, including the Lampedusians,

Would like to write, read and sleep: Ruskin Bond at 83

Author Ruskin Bond has his future Chalked out - he wants to write more, read more and sleep more.

Over 500 short stories, novellas, essays and an autobiography later, Bond - at 83 - stresses that there is a lot more to be written.

The bucket list of the much-loved children's author is topped with a desire to pen more children's stories and

"gory" crime thrillers.
"Everybody wants another children's book. I'd like to do some good gory crime stories, something of everything. That way you don't get bored, moving from one genre to the other," he told PTI.

However, the Landour-based writer, who recently launched his auto-biography "Lone Fox Dancing" here, doesn't like to write under pressure.

"I have accumulated publishers over the years and now they are all af-ter me - 'Mr Bond, you owe us a book' I am feeling a bit overworked. I don't

like writing under pressure," he says.
"So I will make them wait," Bond chuckles. Having spoken on several occasions about his love for reading, it is



not surprising that he wishes to read more books - not the latest bestsellers but his favourite authors.

"I have read thousands of books. but there are so many that I still hav-en't read. And I am not talking of the latest bestsellers, I am talking about the books that I have missed over the

years by the writers I like," he says.

He writes in his memoirs about his fondness for authors such as Agatha Christie, PG Wodehouse, Charles Dickens, Somerset Maugham, George Bernard Shaw, Jerome K Jerome and Mark Twain.

He may have read two or three books of a particular author, but now wants to read more of the writer's works

"I like reading and good writing,"

he says.

Poke him a little further, and he adds that he loves a good nap, too.

"I enjoy sleeping - I always have," he says simply. Bond adds that he is a man who is easily pleased - "not a difficult person;

I don't think so anyway".

By and large, Bond believes he has lived a life without regrets. But looking back on his life, would

he change anything?

"Perhaps, a few more love affairs," he replies promptly. On a serious note, he wishes he had

been kinder to some people, particularly his mother, who separated from his father when Bond was eight and married another man.

"I could have been a bit kinder to people, maybe more understanding of my mother - hadn't been too censorious and been a little supportive. Sometimes one feels guilty, that one could've done more for someone," he reminisces.

Happiness, he believes, is an "elusive" word. "But you could say content-ment is there," he says. Written with Bond's quintessential

wit and warmth, the autobiography, published by Speaking Tiger, takes readers back in time to the genesis of some of his memorable works.

As for naming his autobiography, given a chance, he says, he will call it "Twenty-Two Steps", after the 22 steps, each of a different shape and size, that

lead to his quaint Ivy Cottage in the hills.

The book also contains over 50 photographs, some never published before, capturing the author's life.

Children face the heat in Darjeeling shutdown

With net connection off for the last 15-16 days, we have been unable to check our Facebook accounts or Whatsapp messages. We are totally cut off from the outside world as cable networks have also been snapped in a few areas," Roshan, a class VIII student of St Joseph's North Point, told PTI.

Travelling to other places during the

vacation has also hit a stonewall as they cannot leave the hills during the ongo ing shutdown.

'My father had planned to take us to Digha sea beach during our vacation. I have never been to a sea beach, but now due to this shutdown, all our plans have gone for a toss," said another student of St Joseph's North Point.

Most of the students in Darieeling either study in government schools or in renowned boarding schools.

They were also apprehensive about whether their friends, who have gone home for the vacation, will return or not due to the unrest in the hills.

of a family friend of the Tagore family living in Maharashtra." He said, "The scenes

will be based on written documents and it will be documen platonic".

The Marathi-Bengali biopic is being produced by Priyanka Chopra's 'Purple Pebble Pictures'.

As per the amended schedule, Group A, featuring the home team, which is automatically seeded as A1, will be based in New Delhi and teams of Group B will be

based in Navi Mumbai.

Matches for the knockout stage remain as planned before.
Acknowledging the in-

creased efforts of the local authorities and the LOC in connection with the re-quested amendment, FI-FA's Head of Tournaments Jaime Yarza said: "Attendance, especially in the venue where the home team plays its matches, is one of the priorities of the FIFA U-17 World Cup India 2017, crucial to achieving the purpose of better positioning foot-ball in the country, so the government's commitment in this regard is highly appreciated "The presence of the

secretary of sports at the meetings concerning the state of the works in the stadium and train-ing sites sends a positive message and reflects the strong involvement of the authorities.

"We expect this involvement to extend into the area of pollution prevention, which has been an important topic dis-cussed in relation to the tournament, in particular in Delhi. We are now ex-pecting an action response plan to prevent pollution levels from affecting the tournament, which ideally should continue beyond the tournament." Besides India, who

are automatically qualified as hosts, the follow-ing teams have booked their tickets to the competition: Iran, Iraq, Japan, Korea DPR (Asia); New Caledonia, New Zealand (Oceania); Brazil, Chile, Colombia, Paraguay (South America); Costa Honduras, co, USA (North, Central America and Caribbean); England, France, Germany, Spain, Turkey (Europe); Mali, Niger, Ghana, and Guinea (Arica).

US returns looted royal seals to S Korea

SEOUL, JUL 1 (AFP): South Korean President Moon Jae-In is returning from an official visit to Washington with two ancient royal seals looted during the Korean War, reports

The repatriation of the Chosun dynasty antiques, dating from the 16th and 17th centuries, comes after years of campaigning by the South Korean government, which said they were stolen during the turbulent 1950-53 war.

Moon received the seals during

a ceremony in Washington during a visit to the US Friday and was due to arrive in South Korea with them on Sunday, Yonhap news agency said.

The Chosun dynasty, who cultivated a ruling philosophy drawn from Confucianism, governed from 1392 to 1910, when Japan colo-

nized the country. One of the seals was made in 1547 to honor Queen Munjeong (15011565), the third wife of Chosun Dynasty's 11th king, Jungjong.

in 1651 to commemorate the installation of the crown prince of King Hyojong. They were seized by US author-

ities in 2013 after Seoul clarified these were stolen items.

It marked the third time that Washington has returned South Ko-

In 2013 the United States sent back Korea's first money printing block made in late 19th century and the following year, it handed back nine royal seals.

Tens of thousands of old Ko-

rean cultural items were spirited abroad during Japan's colonization of Korea from 1910-45 and the Korean War.


