Power Deptt officials arrested for negligence

NAMCHI, 25 OCT [IPR]: With regard to the recent demise of a 60-year-old resident of Ravangla, South Sikkim due to electrocution, an FIR has been lodged at Ravangla Police Station against the Power & Energy Department today.

Karma Bhutia, Junior Engineer, Anujla Bhutia, Lineman Dozang Lepcha and Line Assistant Hem Kumar Rai were all ar-rested and detained for interrogation.

Will extend deadline to link Aadhaar with schemes: Centre to SC

NEW DELHI, OCT 25 (PTI): The deadline for mandatory linking of Aadhaar to avail the benefits of various government schemes has been extended till March 31 next year for those who do not have the 12-digit biometric identification number, the Centre today told the Supreme Court.

It told a bench head ed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra that extension of the deadline from De-cember end this year till March 31, 2018, would apply only to those per-sons who do not have Aadhaar and are willing

to enrol for it.

"We (Centre) have decided to extend it till March 31, 2018," Attorney General K K Venugopal told the bench, which also comprised Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud.

The petitioners challenging the Centre's move to make Aadhaar mandatory for welfare schemes termed the linking of the identity number with bank accounts and mo with bile numbers as illegal unconstitutional, while one of their lawyers strongly objected to the CBSE's move to make it mandatory for students to appear for exams.

Venugopal told the court that no coercive action would be taken against those who do not have Aadhaar but were willing to enrol for it and added that they would not be denied the benefits of social welfare schemes till March 31 next.

In a note given to the court, the government has said that "those who have Aadhaar are required to seed/link their Aadhaar with SIM card, with bank account, PAN card and other schemes where section 7 notifications have been issued".

Barun Bhujel, in custody GJM councillor, dies

KOLKATA, OCT 25 (PTI):

Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GIM) councillor Barun Bhujel, who was arrested in June died at the state-run SSKM hospital here today. "Bhujel had chronic

liver problem and pan-creatitis. He died early today. Post-mortem is being done", Manimoy Band-padhyay, superintendent of SSKM hospital said.

Superintendent of police, Kalimpong, Ajit Yadav said that Bhujel, a GJM Councillor from Kalimpong, was arrested on June 16 for his alleged involvement in arson and violence in the hills.

"He was in judicial custody. For the last one month he had complained about problems of the liver and the pancreas.

He was admitted to North Bengal Medical College. Last week he was taken to Kolkata and was admitted to SSKM for treatment.

Now the actual reason for his death will be known after post mor-tem," Yadav told PTI over

phone.

GJM chief Bimal Gurung alleged that police torture had led to Bhujel's death and that there was delay in his treatment. Gurung, in an audio

message from an undisclosed location urged the people of the Hills to hit the streets in protest and

observe a day of mourning.
"Barun was one of the first to be arrested

by police.
We express our condolences. He gave his life to the fight for Gorkhaland. It was police torture and deliberate negligence in his treatment which ulti-mately led to his death," Gurung said.

Meanwhile in Kalimpong, as word spread of his demise early in the morning, the market shut down and his supporters put up black flags in the town area.
His family has alleged

He was sent to Bagrakot jail after arrest and family members today contended that he

head when he was taken to Bagrakot back in June.

Biren Bhujel, the deceased leader's younger brother, also alleged to-day that Mr Bhujel was tortured in Bagrakot jail.

The family also claimed today that they were informed about Mr Bhujel's failing health very late. The family said that he had been critically ill for a long time but they were informed only on the day he was admitted to North Bengal Med-ical College (from where he was taken to Kolkata).

"Our family had gon to see him... he was caged, his hands were cuffed and he was treat-ed inhumanely. He was suffering from pancreati-tis. He was in pain," stat-ed cried Biren Bhujel.

Mr Bhujel leaves behind his wife, two daughters, parents, two brothers and one sister. He was elected as a ward commissioner twice in the civic elections. He was 40 years old.

Cooperative society claims it can resuscitate stalled Teesta Stage VI hydel project

GANGTOK, 25 OCT:

Multi-State Energy
Consumers' cum
Producers' Cooperative Society Limited today claimed that it has put in place processes to revive the at-present defunct 510 MW [170x3] Tees-ta Stage VI hydel project which was being developed by Lanco Teesta Hydro Power Pvt Ltd. (LTHPPL) at Singtam. The Cooperative Society has hinted that the State and Union Ministry of Finance, including the lead banks, have given the green signal to go for revival with a view to recover their bad investment. This is expected to come through in the next four-five months, it was stated today.
Simon George Lama,

chief promoter of the Co-operative Society in question, today informed that the Cooperative Society has proposed Rs. 1,855 Crore for revival of the

project stating that the cost of the bought-out consideration and equity share of 49% of defunct HEP promoter and loans from lead banks of Rs. 1,575 [after 30% discount from lenders on interest earned as of now from Rs. 2250 crore] which is overdue since 2013.

He said that once the Multi-State Energy Consumers' cum Produc-ers' Cooperative Society Limited takes over the defunct power project, it developed using technol-

ogy from Norway.

The State Government had awarded the Teesta Stage VI to LAN-CO Hydro Power Project on a build-own-operate-transfer (BOOT) basis in 2006.

The power develop-er has failed to revive the project since the earth-quake setback of 2011 and is severely reeling with financial crunch and cost overruns. The state gov-ernment has already waited six years for the devel-

opers to revive the project. However, the State Government has not yet terminated the agree-ment with the defunct

power developer.

Mr Lama informed today that the Cooperative Society has already approached the State and Central Electricity Regulatory Commission with new plans and claims that the plan was feasible.

contd from pg01 for linking Aadhaar to various programmes being extended for another three months till March 31, 2018 for those who do not have Aadhaar," the note said.

It said that persons, who do not have Aadhaar and are willing to enrol for it, "will be facilitated to enroll for Aadhaar and will be provided benefits and services through alternate means of identification untill such enrollment."

The counsel for the petitioners, who have challenged the Centre's move to make Aadhaar mandatory for these schemes, raised the issue of the mandatory linking of the Unique Identification Authority of India (UIDAI) number with bank accounts and mobile numbers.

Senior advocate Shyam Divan, appearing for some of the petition contended that final hearing in main Aadhaar matter which is pending before the apex court was necessary as the government "cannot compel" citizens to link their Aadhaar with either

bank accounts or mobile numbers.

"This case is crying for final hearing since long," he said, adding that w even Central Board of Secondary Education (CBSE) has asked students to give their Aadhaar for appearing in

ard examinations.
"What are they (government) doing? A school children can not go to school and give his exams without giv-ing his Aadhaar. Is this the civil liberty we are talking about in the country. Divan said while repeatedly urging the bench that a full-fledged hearing was

necessary in the main matter.

Senior advocate Anand Grover, appearing for some other petitioners, argued that the move to link Aadhaar with bank accounts and mobile numbers was illegal and unconstitutional.

Divan told the bench that com plaints have started coming in that after linking bank accounts with Aadhaar, the accounts were being "wiped out" and there were people who have UIDAI number, but do not want to link it.

"They say extension till March next year will be only for those who do not have Aadhaar and are willing to enrol

for it.
They cannot compel us to link Aad-

haar," he said, adding "they can make a statement that they will not take coercive action against those who don't want to link Aadhaar". Senior advocate Arvind Datar, ap-

pearing for petitioners, claimed that not linking Aadhaar with bank accounts would make citizens liable to be prosecuted under the Prevention of Money Laundering Act.

When the petitioners said earlier the court had said that the main Aadhaar matter would be heard in the first week of November, the Attorney General said "we are ready for hearing". However, Venugopal told the bench

that he would take instructions on certain issues related to Aadhaar and come back to the court.

The court asked him to mention the

atter on October 30.

During the hearing, the Attorney General referred to the apex court's judgement declaring right to privacy as a fundamental right and said in that verdict. Justice Chandrachud had emphasised that a robust regime for protection of data should be put in place.

Regarding the issue of data protection regulation, the bench observed, "there are large number of working rules and if they will rush, we might have a poor data protection regulation. Countries across the world are struggling to have a data protection mecha-

Venugopal said the Justice Sri Krishna committee which has initiated the process of reviewing the entire issue of data protection, had in its October 16 meeting recommended certain issues after detailed deliberations.

In a note handed over to the bench, the Centre has said the committee has recommended that "each working group shall provide specific comments/ amendements on clauses of the draft data protection bill circulated by MeitY (Ministry of Electronics and Information Technology).

Corruption Hurts the Already Vulnerable

That's a good enough reason to say No More

 $\mathbf{T}^{ ext{he}}$ Corruption Perception Index, published annually by Transparency International, a corruption monitoring organisation based in Berlin, was released in January at the beginning of this year. As this year too draws to a close, so begins the routine of taking stock and reminiscing over the year gone by and that brings us to pause a while on corruption and the nation. As per the Corruption Perception Index released this year, India has slipped to the 79th spot from its all-time high of 76 registered in 2015. On this index, the higher you rank, the cleaner is the system, or at least the perception of it. India's slide could either be because other nations have become cleaner or we as a nation have become more corrupt. Both scenarios are possible, and given the crores being offered to even minor players to switch political allegiance and the lakhs of crores of tax-payer money being announced to bail out corrupt banks and the disgustingly rich, it is the latter which appears more plausible. The list is for 176 countries, with Denmark on No. 1 position as the cleanest society and Somalia at the bottom end as the most corrupt country. India shares the 79th slot with three other countries - Belarus, Brazil and China, all of which have scored a 40 on a scale of 0 (highly cor rupt) to 100 (very clean). Over two-thirds of the 176 countries and territories in this year's index fall below the midpoint of the scale (along with India) with the global average score of a paltry 43, indicating endemic corruption in a country's public sector. As a country, we are even more corrupt than the global average for

While there are enough arguments to question the process by which Transparency International works out its list, these are only precision issues, and the world at large agrees that the list is accurate. The TI report reveals that although India's ranking has slipped, its corruption perception has improved slightly for the better. We had scored 38 in 2015, but even this slight improvement is nothing to write home about, since, as mentioned, as a nation we continue to be more corrupt than the average for the world as a whole

That said, what is significant about the TI rankings is that the Corruption Perception Index, started in 1995, has been instrumental in creating awareness and triggering debate on corruption. But that is for governments and societies more conscious about their image. Bhutan, for example, is ranked a respectable 27th with "first-division-marks" of 65 points. What is significant is that in 2009, Bhutan was ranked 49th. While the neighbour has shown marked improve-ment, we remain sloppy. There is clear unanimity in our country that corruption is widespread, all pervasive and attendant to every arm of the government. Unfortunately, we approach corruption with a fatalistic attitude – accepting it as unavoidable and trapping ourselves in a rut where palms need to be greased even for routine works. Where corruption was at one time required to push through works which would put the concerned officer's future and career at risk, in our instinct to jump the line and aversion to make the system work, we have now created a monster which needs to be fed even to process what should be ours

Someone recently argued that corruption is ingrained in our culture by pointing out that we rou-tinely bribe even Gods for favour ["Bhakal" anyone?], so bribing mortals does not weigh too heavy on our conscience. But it should. What most of the debates and chest-beating on corruption overlook is that it is not just an inconvenience, it is much worse, because now that it is institutionalised, it worsens the realities of the most vulnerable sections of society. A corrupt system makes no difference between skimming from a multi-crore construction project or siphoning grants and aid meant for victims of natural calamities or subsidies marked for the underprivileged. Kickbacks and embezzlement compromise the effectiveness of such necessary public expenditure as poverty alleviation, education, environment conservation, public infrastructure creation, aid etc. While economies with a vibrant private enterprise can cushion corruption with some resoluteness, societies which are more dependent on government dole and grants to finance multiple challenges, suffer the most crushing blow because of the denial which corruption causes. These are also invariably societies which are less empowered and thus less likely to make a noise about graft, and in their desperation, more likely to continue feeding the monster even larger shares. By accepting and indulging corruption, we have painted ourselves into a corner and the only escape is if we realise that the slivers which reach us are not enough for the boxed in crowd, put our feet down, and collectively say "No More

Sexual harassment isn't the exclusive domain of show biz big shots. It remains alarmingly prevalent nationwide, even as other crimes are generally de-

In the U.S., a 2006 study found that 27 percent of college women reported some form of forced sexual contact – ranging from kissing to anal intercourse – after enrolling in school. This sexual violence is heavily underreported, with just 20 per-cent of female student victims reporting the crime to law enforcement.

Nor is sexual harassment limited to the United States. The U.N. has called gender-based violence a "global pandemic." As experts in emergency medicine and legal research at the Harvard Humanitaran Initiative, we believe it's important to acknowledge that this issue transcends national borders and class boundaries to touch the lives of roughly 33 percent of all women worldwide.

A WORLD OF TROUBLE

According to World Health Organization estimates, one in three women worldwide will experience either physical or sexual violence in her lifetime, many of them before the age of 15.

In fact, for many rural women, their first sexual

encounter will be a forced one. Some 17 percent of women in rural Tanzania, 21 percent in Ghana, 24 percent in Peru, 30 percent in Bangladesh and 40 percent in South Africa report that their first sexual

experience was nonconsensual.

Intimate partner violence is also pervasive globally. In one World Health Organization study, 22 to 25 percent of women surveyed in cities in En-gland, Mexico, Nicaragua, Peru and Zimbabwe reported that a boyfriend or husband had committed some form of sexual violence against them. Globally, up to 55 percent of women murdered are killed

Violence against women takes many forms, ranging from psychological abuse to the kind of sexual predation, sexual assault and rape alleged-ly committed by Harvey Weinstein. Honor killings, physical attacks, female infanticide, genital cutting, trafficking, forced marriages and sexual harass-ment at work and school are also considered gender-based violence.

Rates range from country to country – from 15 percent in Japan to 71 percent in Ethiopia – but violence is, in effect, a ubiquitous female experience.

Sexual violence is committed at particularly high rates in crisis settings like war zones, refugee camps and disaster zones

In these places, even humanitarian workers are not immune. Dyan Mazurana and her colleagues at Tufts University found that many female development-aid staffers in places such as South Sudan, Afghanistan and Haiti had experienced disturbing rates of sexual assault, often perpetrated by their



Women in crisis settings, such as refugee camps and war zones, are par-ticularly likely to experience sexual assault.

EXPLAINING SEXUAL VIOLENCE

So what's driving this pervasive phenomenon? Research reveals that there are multiple causes of sexual violence, among them gender inequality and power differentials between men and women.

For example, sexual violence occurs more frequently in cultures where violence is widely ac-cepted and where beliefs about family honor, sexual purity and male sexual entitlement are strongly

Even in many countries that rank well on gender equality, including in the United States, weak legal sanctions against perpetrators of sexual vio lence can encourage and effectively condone such

So can cultural acceptance. Weinstein's sexual predatory behavior was longstanding and wellknown within the film industry, yet he was allowed to continue his abuse with impunity – until women began speaking up.

Likewise, Fox News renewed Bill O'Reilly's contract even after he and the company had made at least six multi-million-dollar settlements with men who filed sexual harassment claims against him. Awareness of a problem is one thing; taking action is quite another.

Men with lower educational levels, or who have been exposed to maltreatment or family violence as children, are more likely to commit sexual vionce themselves. That's because violence begets violence, a rela-

tionship that's abundantly clear in the kinds of conflict zones where we work. Mass rape has long been used as a weapon of war, and has been well-documented during conflicts in the Democratic Republic of the Congo, Colombia and South Sudan.

Among the most salient cases are the Rwandan

and Bosnian genocides. According to the U.N.'s High Commissioner for Refugees, up to 500,000 Rwandan women were systematically raped in 1994 as part of an ethnic cleansing strategy, while tens of thousands of Bosnian women and girls were sys-tematically raped between 1992 and 1995.

PSYCHOLOGICAL TRAUMA

Wherever and however it happens, violence against women and girls poses a major public health problem for women and their communities

Some 42 percent of women who experience intimate partner violence reported an injury – including bruises, abrasions, cuts, punctures, broken bones and injuries to the ears and eyes – as a con-sequence of that abuse. Women who suffer violence are also 1.5 times more likely to have sexually transmitted diseases like HIV, syphilis, chlamydia and gonorrhea, twice as likely to experience depression and drinking problems and twice as likely to have an abortion.

Violence against women is also closely associat-

ed with suicide and self-harm.

If there's any silver lining to the Weinstein and O'Reilly scandals, it's that in coming out against these high-profile men, dozens of women have helped to highlight not just the prevalence of sexual violence in the United States but also the societal norms that silence women and allow abusers to go

Humanitarian organizations from the World Health Organization to the U.N. to the U.S. Agency for International Development have recognized that gender-based violence is not just a women's issue. Addressing it requires working with men and boys, too, to counter the cultures of toxic masculinity that encourage or tolerate sexual violence.

After all, women's rights are human rights, so sexual violence is everyone's problem to solve.

The fact is, societies with high rates of sexual violence are also more likely to be violent and unstable. Research shows that the best predictor of a state's peacefulness is how well its women are treated.

Teens are sleeping less-but there's a surprisingly easy fix

Something is stealing teens' sleep.
In a newly released analysis of In a newly released analysis of two large national surveys, my co-authors and I found that the number of U.S. teens who reported sleeping less than seven hours a night jumped 22 percent between 2012 and 2015. Sleep experts agree that teens need at least nine hours of sleep a night. But by 2015, 43 percent of teens re-ported sleeping less than seven hours a night on most nights – meaning almost half of U.S. teens are significantly sleep-deprived. What could have raised sleep

deprivation among teens to such unprecedented levels? Some factors are easy to rule out. For example, we found that the amount of time teens spent working, doing homework and participating in extracurricular activities held steady during those years.

But there was one large change in teens' lives between 2012 and 2015: More owned smartphone

IT STARTS AS AN ALARM CLOCK

Today's teens – whom I call "iGen' - are the first generation to spend their entire adolescence with smart-In our analyses, we found that

teens who spent more time online and on social media were more likely to sleep less. Time spent watching television had a much weaker link to fewer hours of sleep, and teens who spent more time with their friends in person or on sports or exercise actually slept more.

the one teen activity that both increased during the 2010s and was linked to shorter sleep, making it the most likely cause of teen sleep depri-vation. Seventeen- and 18-year-olds - who spend more time online than younger teens – were also the most sleep-deprived: The majority, 51 percent, slept less than seven hours on most nights by 2015.

The link between time spent online and less sleep was considerable.
Spending five or more

hours a day online (vs. one hour) upped the risk of sleeping too little more than 50 percent. Spending three hours a day (vs. one hour) upped the risk nearly 20 percent.

Smartphones which the majority of Americans owned by the end of 2012 – allow mobile and instant internet access. It's difficult to prove what causes what in an analysis like this, but it seems much more likely that teens' increased smartphone use between 2012 and 2015 led to less sleep than less sleep leading to more smartphone use.

Why might smartphones cause teens to sleep less? Unlike other electronic devices such as TVs and desk-top computers, smartphones (and tablets) are easily carried into the bedroom and held by hand in bed.

Most of the students I interviewed for my book "iGen" told me they kept

their phones within reach as they slept, in part, because they all used it as their alarm clock.

Many also told me that their martphones were the last thing they looked at before they went to sleep at night. That's a problem, because answering texts and scrolling through social media is mentally and emotionally stimulating, which leads to disturbed sleep. Others told me that they also regularly reached for their phones, often just out of habit, when they woke up in the middle of the night.

There's a physi-ological response as well: The blue light emitted by smart-phones and tablets simulates davlight. inhibiting the brain's production of mela-

tonin, the hormone that helps us fall asleep and stay asleep.

And that's if teens try to go to

A 2014 study found that 80 percent of teens admitted to using their phones when they were supposed to be sleeping – a practice some call vamping." Some said they stayed up most of the night when their parents asleep.

thought they were asles SOME SIMPLE LIMITS

Sleep deprivation can have serious consequences for teens.

Those who don't sleep enough perform more poorly in school and are at greater risk of developing obesity. Sleep deprivation is also linked

to mental health issues including depression and anxiety among both teens and adults.

When conducting research for my book, I found that iGen teens are more likely to be depressed and anxious than previous generations. If smart-phones cause teens to sleep less, and less sleep leads to depression, sleep deprivation might explain why teen depression increased sharply after 2012 - exactly when smartphones became common, and exactly when sleep deprivation began to increase among teens.

What can be done? Later start times at high schools have significant positive impacts on teen sleep, but school start times aren't something parents and teens can control.

In contrast, limiting smartphone use before bed is a strategy that can be immediately implemented (ideally for the whole family, adults included). A "no phones in the bedroom after bedtime" rule can work. If your family uses phones as alarm clocks, buy inexpensive alarm clocks. Put an app on phones that shuts them down during certain hours, or leave phones and tablets in another room overnight. Suggest reading a book, taking a bath or writing in a journal in the

hour before bed.
Your teens will probably get some more sleep – and they might find themselves healthier and happier as

Meghalaya HC expresses dissatisfaction with NHAI over failure to repair highway

SHILLONG, OCT 25 (PTI): The Meghalaya High Court has expressed dissatisfaction with the Na-tional Highway Authority of India over its failure to repair a kilometre stretch of road at Umsning town in Ri-Bhoi district and directed the NHAI to com-plete the maintenance work at the earliest.

"Having examined the affidavit and the atexamined tached report and photographs and having heard the amicus curiae as also ASG (Additional Solicitor General), we are constrained to state total dissatisfaction over the manner of dealing with the matter by NHAI," a Division Bench headed by Chief Justice Dinesh Maheshwari said in an order yesterday.

Admitting that that there had been heavy downnours in the last few days, the Bench said "Indisputably, the bad part of the highway in question... has remained in a very bad shape for last more than a couple of years and it could hardly be appreciated that NHAI had not taken appropriate steps to provide motorable conditions.

NHAI Project Direc before the court had purportedly informed of the repair works under-taken earlier this month but the downpours since October 18 last had damaged the bituminous

work again.

Amicus curiae in the case, S Panthi, submitted that he had visited the site many times and the stretch of the highway continues to remain in bad or rather very bad shape.

The Bench, apart from directing the Panthi to visit the site, which is on the Shillong-Guwaha ti highway about 38 km from here, everyday and to draw up daily report with photographs and videography.

Most hospitals in Arunachal don't have facilities for disposal of bio-medical wastes: CAG

ITANAGAR, OCT 25 (PTI): Most of the hospitals and nursing homes in Arunachal Pradesh don't have facilities for disposal of hio-medical wastes according to a recent report by the Comptroller and Auditor General of

The CAG report which was tabled in the state as-sembly this month highlighted that in 10 government hospitals treatment plants were installed. But they remained non-functional due to lack of trained manpower, technical defects, lack of fund for maintenance besides shortage of power.

Centre framed the Bio-Medical Waste (Management and Handling) Rules 1998 under the provision of (Protec-Environment tion) Act, 1986 which prescribed the procedures for treatment and disposal of bio-medical waste generated by hospitals, nursing homes,

dispensaries and clinics.

The report highlight various drawbacks n the Arunachal with Pradesh State Pollution Control Board (APSP-CB) as the board did not have the state level data on health care establishments which is required for compliance of rules and regulations of the

Bio-Medical Waste.
The report pointed



by the APSPCB.

The report further stated that 12 hospitals inspected did not observe the standards prescribed in the rules for disposal of bio-medical

The CAG findings revealed that in the state hospital at Naharlagun, near here, bio-medical waste treatment plant was installed in June 2004 at a cost of Rs 70.88 lakh under central assistance was subsequently dismantled in June 2012 to accommodate construction of 300 bedded no replacement had been provided since then.

In general hospital Pasighat, where the plant


No 'Choti' baat: Bihar girl wins int'l acclaim for enhancing Musahars' lives

20-year-old girl from Bihar has made her native Bhojpur District proud by winning international acclaim for her efforts to uplift the Musahar community, considered one of the lowest and most downtrodden in the state s caste-ridden society.

Choti Kumari Singh, hailing from an impoverished upper caste Rajput family, has won Women's Creativity in Rural Life Award from the Switzerland-based Women s World Summit Foundation.

Choti started helping with social and educational work among Musahars in her own village of Ratanpur in 2014, after joining a programme run by the Mata Amritanan-damayi Math of the spiritual leader Mata Amritanandamayi Devi (Amma).

The programme aimed at



adopting 101 villages acros the country to make them self-reliant models of sus-

Choti is the youngest person to receive the USD 1,000 (Rs 65,000 approx.) award since it was instituted in 1994 to honour women

exceptional creativity, courage and commitment for the life in rural communities.

Mostly working as landless labourers, the Musahar community suffers from poverty, near-total illiteracy and lack of personal hygiene. Child mar riages are rampant and school attendance is negligible.

When the programme was introduced at Ratnapur in 2014, Choti started offering free after-school tuition classes for children.

"It was a herculean task to bring Musahar children to the classes because their parents did not show the slightest interest in educating them. I went door to door gathering children and trying to convince the parents, Choti says.

initiated self-help groups wherein every wom an saves Rs 20 a month, which is deposited in a common bank account for starting home-based activities.
The tuition classes proved

to a huge success with 108 children enrolled. This is no mean task in a village with a population of less than 1,000 people. Initially, the Musahar villagers were hostile. They used to drink, gamble and verbally abuse me. However, once they started observing the positive changes brought by our work, the situation ecame relatively favourable, Choti recalls.

At the tuition centre, Choti began giving basic lessons in hygiene and cleanliness. At first, the children were reluc-tant and habitually took bath only once a fortnight.

I had a tough time making them sit through the class-es. Some of them even came to the class drunk. But with time, their attitude changed, Choti says.

The Mata Amritanandamayi Math has adopted five

New tool to improve Indian monsoon forecast

WASHINGTON, OCT 25 (PTI): Scientists have developed a new tool for objectively defining the onset and demise of the Indian Summer Monsoon
- a colossal weather system that affects millions

of people annually.

The researchers from Florida State University in the US developed a method that uses rainfall rates to mark the span of the Indian Summer Mon-soon (ISM) at any given location throughout the affected region.
For generations, sci-

entists have struggled to produce a model for reliably defining the dura-

tion of the monsoon.

No existing system has allowed researchers to reliably define the pa-rameters of the season at this fine a scale, re-

searchers said. "Current "Current weather forecasting and monitoring protocols focus attention on monsoon onset at one location - specifically the state of Kerala in the southwest corner of the country - and extrapolate for the rest of the region," said Vasu Misra, associate professor at Florida State University.
"We have gone down

to specific locations, we have covered the whole country, and we have objectively defined the onset and demise dates for any given year," said Misra, lead investigator of the study published in the journal Climate Dynamics.

The lack of a clear, granular and objective benchmark for ISM onset and demise for all areas of the country has been a longtime source of consternation for people, researchers said.

In some parts of the country, the torrents of rain that characterise monsoon season account for more than 90 per cent of the total annual precipitation, they said.

Researchers said that many rhythms of Indian political and agricultural life can be destabilised by dubious or false claims of

"That leads to tre mendous amounts of frustration and confusion for the general public and for the people who are trying to monitor the monsoon because nobody has really gotten down to do it at a granu-lar scale," Misra said.

The new system, which ties the onset of the monsoon to location-specific rainfall thresholds, can work to allay that frustration, he said.

Up until now, regionmeteorological partments have relied on their own ad hoc criteria for determining ISM on-set, which can often lead

to contradicting claims.

A more inclusive method will allow officials and researchers throughout the country to define the monsoon season using a standardised system that, through rigorous testing, has been shown to capture ISM evolution comprehen-sively. Anchoring the definition of onset and demise solely in local rain rates eliminates the need to rely on less accessible atmospheric variables, researchers said.

England send Brazil packing out of FIFA U-17 World Cup

KOLKATA, OCT 25 (PTI): Rhian Brewster struck a sensational hat-trick, his second in as many matches, as En-gland handed pre-tournament favourites Brazil a stunning 3-1 defeat to cruise into their maiden FIFA U-17 World

Cup final here today.

Brewster, who had scored a hat-trick in his side's 4-1 decimation of the USA in the quarterfinals on Saturday, scored in the 10th, 39th and 77th minutes in front of a shell-shocked 63,881 Brazil supporting partisan crowd

The triple strike took Brewster to seven goals, the highest in the tournament, and the Liverpool youth team player has once again shown that he is the best predator on show in the mega-event. This is the first time that a player has scored two hat-tricks in the same edition of a tourna-

Brazil, who were seeking their fourth title, were finally outwitted and outplayed by a more tactical and resilient side and they bowed out of the tournament with a heart-

break.
In fact, England, who created history by reaching their maiden semifinals in their fourth appearances, were clearly the better side today as they did not allow Brazil to impose on them in the match, which was shifted out of Gu-

The 68-year-old Salgaon-is seen agreeing to tamper with the pitch to suit the requirements put forth by the re-porter. India Today TV said the video was shot last evening.

BEIJING, OCT 25 (PTI): President Xi Jinping today secured a second term as the head of the ruling Communist Party of China as the new leadership that will rule the world's second largest economy for the next vears was unveiled, cementing his status as the most powerful man to lead the country in decades

in a closed-door vote to head the the Communist Party's all-powerful Politburo Standing Committee, introduced the new leadership in an elaborate ceremony at Beijing's massive Great Hall of the People with no

Premier Li Keqiang retained his seat on the all-powerful seven-member commit-tee, which has five new faces.

The five new members in the ruling council are Li Zhan-shu, 67, vice premier Wang Yang, 62, leading Communist Party theoretician Wang Huning, 62, party organisation department head Zhao Leii, 60, nd Shanghai party chief Han Zheng, 63.

The new faces replaced leaders who had reached an informal retirement age of 68. The age of the new leadership



of them could succeed Xi at the next party Congress in 2022.

announcement lows the end of the week-long Communist Party National Congress, the biggest event Party National in China's political calendar, which is held every five years. Xi and Li, 62 walked along with members of the new Politburo Standing Committee before a media event telecast live ross the world.

Xi in a brief address after introducing the new committee said, "Over the past five years we have set out a broad agenda, some tasks have been completed while others need more work."

"With decades of hard work, socialism with Chinese characteristics has entered a new era. In this new context, we must get a new look and, more importantly, make new

accomplishments," he said. He spoke about the China entering new era of modernisation.

"As I look ahead to the next five years, I see several import ant junctures and signposts,"

Stating that the coming five years between the 19th and the 20th Party Congress is the period in which the timeframes of the two Centenary goals will converge. Xi said, "Not only we must deliver the first centenary goal, we must also embark on the journey towards the second centenary goal." "Peace and development are precious and

should be valued.

The CPC will work with other countries for shared future and the noble cause of peace and development of all humanity," he said. Over the past five years, China's GDP rose from 54 trillion yuan

(USD 8.2 trillion) to 80 trillion yuan, contributing more than 30 per cent of global economic

Xi also thanked the national and international media for working hard in reporting about the party's key Congress.

Though the ruling Communist Party of China is guided by the collective leadership principle, Xi who emerged as the post powerful leader with his ideological thoughts incorporated in the party Constitution and declared earlier as "core leader" has acquired a higher status than other members of the Standing Committee and party, therefore expected to have his way on all policy mat-

Xi, who heads the party, presidency and the military has stamped his authority with massive anti-corruption campaign and the multi-billion dollar Belt and Road Initiative (BRI) to spread China's influence in the world.

once-in-five-years Congress of the CPC on its final day yesterday approved Xi's ideology to be written into its Constitution, which is in addition to the title of "core leader" conferred on him last year that analysts say enhances his leaders of the party.

Xi's concept of "socialism with Chinese characteristics for a new era" was added to the party's Constitution, elevating him on par with modern China's founder Chairman Mao Zedong and his successor Deng

Xiaoping.
Till now, only the thoughts of Mao and his successor Deng were enshrined in the Constitution of the world's longest ruling Communist Party, interpreting the complex doctrine of Marxism with Chinese characteristics. The thoughts of Deng, China's reformist leader, were added posthumously.

The thoughts of two of Xi's predecessors, Jiang Zemin and Hu Jintao, were mentioned in the Constitution but not their names. This makes Xi only the third leader to have his thoughts on governance enshrined, which will now be part of school textbooks all over China.

Xi's confidant Zhao Leji was elected secretary of the Central Commission for Discipline In-spection (CCDI) of the CPC.

Zhao was elected at a ple-nary session of the CCDI, at which the CCDI also elected its deputy secretaries and Stand-

Myanmar, Bangladesh vow to cooperate to return Rohingya

YANGON, OCT 25 (AFP): Myanmar and Bangladesh ve agreed to work together to repatriate hundreds of thousands of Rohingya Muslim refugees officials said, but details remain thin as the humanitarian crisis deepens.

Ties between neighbours have been se verely strained by army-led violence in Myanmar's Rakhine state that has driven more than 600,000 Rohingya into Bangladesh

since late August.

The exodus has saddled one of Asia's poorest nations with a massive humanitarian crisis, with refugees too terrified to return to Rakhine.

Dhaka and the UN

have accused Myanmar's army of ethnic cleansing and called for the full repatriation of the Mus-lim minority, who have crammed into makeshift camps in Bangladesh's Cox's Bazar district.

Washington is also pressing for targeted sanctions against Myanmar military officers involved in the violence

After talks in Myan-mar's capital Naypyidaw yesterday, Bangladesh's Home Ministry said Myanmar had agreed to stop the outflow of Rohingya and take back all refugees.

"Myanmar has agreed to stop continuous entry of displaced Myanmar nationals in Bangladesh and to bring normal-cy back to the Rakhine State," the Home Ministry said in a statement.
But Myanmar offered

a more measured commitment, saying only that refugees need to be scrutinised for proof of their roots in Rakhine state.

"We cannot say when ve are going to receive (the refugees)," Tin Myint, from Myanmar's Home Ministry, told reporters after the meeting.

"We will accept af-ter scrutinising... we will check whether they really stayed in Maungdaw and Buthidaung," he said, re-ferring to the hardest-hit districts in Rakhine that are now nearly empty of Rohingva residents.

That criteria may be difficult to fulfil for the Rohingya who bolted from Myanmar soldiers and Buddhist mobs who they allege drove them out with a massive campaign of arson, murder and rape.

Also, Myanmar has rendered the Rohingya stateless with the government refusing to recognise them as a distinct ethnic group.

Myanmar vehemently of ethnic accusations cleansing and defended the army campaign as legitimate response to August 25 attacks by Rohingya militants.

Previous Myanmar government statements have suggested that any Rohingya with links to the militants would be barred from returning

Even if the reparation plan goes forward, there is widespread concern over what the Rohingya will return to, since many of their villages have been razed by fires

'There is trust deficit between Pak, US over Afghanistan'

Minister Khawaja Asif has acknowledged that there is a "trust deficit" between his country and the US over the issue of Afghanistan even as he asserted that the two countries were talking to bridge their differences.

Asif's remarks came after Secretary of State Rex Tillerson during his whirlwind visit here outlined the US' new South Asia Strategy and the vital role that Pakistan can play in working with America and others to facilitate a peace process in Afghanistan that can bring stability and security to the region.

"Yes there is a trust

deficit...but deficit...but we are talking," Asif said in response to a question.

"Having said that, (I should say) there is a willingness on both sides bridge this (trust) deficit," he told BBC Urdu

The foreign minister also said that the US and international forces had failed to end the conflict in Afghanistan despite their more than a decade

long efforts.
"They (US) must do some self-accountability also. Why have they lost 45 per cent of the Afghan



territory in the last 10, 12 years," he asked.

Asif also said that Pakistan was not dependent on the US aid as it has been getting only a "trickle" of the assis-tance. He said Pakistan was also not looking for military hardware from

"We do not get anv military hardware from the US. We are not like in the past when we were their proxy," he said.

Separately, talking to Geo TV, he said that Pakistani leaders told Til-lerson that there were no terrorist safe havens in

Terrorist attacks are not planned or executed from Pakistani soil, there are no terrorist safe havens in Pakistan, and we made this clear to the US delegation," Asif said.

WHATSAPP TO LAUNCH GROUP VIDEO, VOICE CALLS AFTER ROLL-OUT OF LIVE LOCATION FEATURE

WhatsApp

Last week WhatsApp launched live-location tracking fea-ture and now the company is launching group video calls for its users. The application is already the most popu-lar title on both iOS and Android but it's planning to become the go-to app when it comes to communication.

The group calling feature hasn't made it to the final built yet but is expected to do so in a few months' time. According to WaBetaInfo, a website that tests all new WhatsApp features claimed that the application will be launching a group video and voice call feature.

This new update might feature in WhatsApp's next update for beta users. The site claims that the 2.17.70 beta version will come with this new feature. Along with this feature, the update will also carry a new update that will help with an easy transition between phone numbers. If a user changes their number, WhatsApp will notify all contacts on their list about the change.

WhatsApp has been aggressively intro-ducing new features within their application and is also stepping in the social media realm by introducing features like stories. The consistent rise in a smartphone's computational power is enabling applications like WhatsApp to delve into other genres of communication

Though many popular applications offer services like conference video and voice calls much before WhatsApp, the sheer size of the user-base makes the feature an instant hit. The application has 1 billion daily active users and around 1.3 billion monthly active users.

The Live Location feature was also offered by various applications like Messenger, Goo-gle Maps, Telegram etc. but with WhatsApp adopting it, the feature might finally get broader audience.

To use the Live Location feature one will have to tap on the paperclip icon next to the chat box. The location can be shared in the form of chat. It can be sent to WhatsApp

groups as well as individual chats.

To keep a track of how many people or groups are getting the live location updates, one can check in the Account Privacy settings. In terms of WhatsApp groups, if various participants have shared their live location, all locations will be visible on a single map.


