Indigo, IAF planes avert mid-air collision over Chennai

MUMBAI, MAY 24 (PTI): A midair disaster was averted last week when an IndiGo plane which was on a collision course with an Indian Air Force (IAF) in Chennai airspace steered away to safety following an auto-generated warning, a source said.

The two aircraft were just "300 ft" away from each other at the time of the incident on May 21 which set off a Resolution advisory (RA) for the IndiGo pilot to steen the aircraft to a safer distance, the

RA is an auto-generated warning in the cockpit for the pilot to manoeuvre the aircraft and avoid collision.

IndiGo confirmed the incident, which is now being investigated by aviation regulator Directorate neral of Civil Aviation (DGCA).

However, there was no re-

"IndiGo aircraft VT-ITW operating on the Visakhapatnam-Bengaluru route and an Indian Air Force jet were on a collision course as the two aircraft were at a distance of just 300 ft from each other. The planes were at an altitude of 24,000 ft in Chennai airspace. IndiGo Airbus A320 flight was on the climb," the source said.

The mishap was averted at around 9.49 pm on May 21, the source added.

EPIC 17000 Mountain Biking Race to go bigger this year



MANGAN, 24 MAY (IPR): The North District Administration in collaboration with Mountain Goats Adventure Company and Hub Outdoors is organizing EPIC 17000 Mountain Biking Race, the highest Mountain Biking race in the world. The associate partners for the race are Lachen Dzumsa, Lachung Dzumsa, MNP, TAAS, Indian Army and ITBPF. The theme for this year's race is Beti Bachao Beti Padhao' and 'Secure Himalayas'.

Last year the race could make a mark in the Red Bull events. This year the aim is to take the race globally and make a mark in the mountain biking calendar of the world. Adventure tour-ism has been widely promoted by the Chief Minister Pawan Chamling for empowering the youth and entrepreneur-ship development. The EPIC 17K event strives to achieve the vision of the State Government for sustainable develop-ment of tourism in the Sikkim.

Today a preparatory meeting was conducted by the District Collector, Karma R Bonpo and was attended by Senior SP, North, KD Shangderpa, ADC North, SDM Mangan, Representatives of Mountain Goats Adventure Company and Hub Outdoors

The EPIC 17K Mountain Terrain Biking Race is a unique race being held in North Sikkim, where riders will get to experience riding at an elevation of upto 17800 ft. It is a race that will test not only the endurance of the riders but also the ride presents the most panoramic views of Sikkim. The EPIC 17K is organized as a four-stage race and covers a distance of almost 330 kilometers.

The first day of the ride starts from Mangan and the riders will ride upto Lachung town. The next day the ride will be from Lachung and go right upto Yumesamdong and back to Lachung. On the third day, the riders will ride from Lachung to Thangu on the Lachen axis. The final day of the race will be from Thangu to Gurudongmar Lake which will be the final destination of the race. The stages of the race are staggered in such a manner where the obstacles presented to the riders will increase as the stage progresses.

India seeks Australia's help to combat Nipah virus

New Delhi, May 24 (PTI): In the wake of Nipah virus cases in Kerala, the Indian Council for Medical Research (ICMR) has written to the Queensland gov-ernment in Australia asking it to provide an antibody developed there to test if it can "neutralise" the virus in humans.

The antibody has not been tested on humans so far.

"We have asked them to give their monoclonal antibody for conducting a test in India to find out if it can neutralise the Nipah

virus in humans. "In Australia, it has only been tried in vitro (happening outside the body in artificial conditions, often in a test tube) and has been found to be effective But it has not been tested on humans," said ICMR Director General, Dr Balram Bhargava, while clarifying that it will not lead to creation of vaccine.

ICMR is the apex body in India for the formulation, coordination and promotion of biomedical research.

"We are preparing a dossier on what will be methodology and what would be the regula-tory process so that we can fast track the process," he said.



According to Dr Bhargava, stralia is ready to share as it will help generate data on the

efficacy of the antibody.
"It is not yet sure how much it will be effective," he said, adding the infection caused by Nipah virus has a high mortality

rate (50-70 pc).

According to National Vector Borne Disease Control Programme, the drug ribavirin has been shown to be effective against the viruses in vitro, but human investigations to date have been inconclusive and the clinical usefulness of the drug remains uncertain.

The death toll due to outbreak of Nipah virus rose to 12 in the southern state of Kerala, with one more person succumbing to the deadly virus in Kozhikode this morning, said a Health ministry official.

Meanwhile, there are reports

of dead bats being found on the premises of a government school in Himachal Pradesh, samples of which have been sent for testing to NIV, Pune, to ascertain the reason behind their deaths.

According to the health ministry officials, of the 12 deaths in Kerala so far due to the virus, nine people died in Kozhikode district and three in Mallappur-am. Besides, about 160 samples have been sent for testing at the virology institute.

While 18 people with spe-

cific symptoms are admitted

at hospitals in Kozhikode, 22 patients with suspected Nipah cases, all from Malappuram district, are admitted at Kozhikode Medical College for observation.

"They are all contacts of the confirmed cases and their lab results are awaited. Also, 95 families are under surveillance,"

a health ministry official said. Nipah virus (NiV) infection is a newly emerging zoonosis that causes severe disease in both animals and humans. The natural host of the virus are fruit bats of the Pteropodidae Family, Pteropus genus.

Currently, there is no vaccine or drug for the treatment of the NiV infection. The treatment for human cases is supportive and management treatment along with intensive supportive care

The virus spreads through close contact with people's secretions and excretions. Eating food which may have the drop-lets of saliva and urine of infected bats can lead to the transmission of the virus.

Earlier, cases of Nipah virus were reported from Siliguri in 2001 and Nadia in 2007 in West Bengal and around 47 deaths were reported.

The rare virus, mainly transmitted through fruit bats, reportedly claimed 11 lives in the southern

In a letter to the medical authorities, the director of Health Services), Braja Kishore Brahma, underscored the need to take preventive mea-sures against the deadly virus as treatment options were limited. Although

case was reported from any part of the state so far, the health department has asked the hospitals to prepare them-selves for contingencies.

The All India Institute of Medical Sciences (AIIMS), Bhubaneswar, has already set up an isolated ward to admit patients afflicted with the virus, its dean, Bikas

The health department also advised people to avoid consuming fruits that are half-eaten by bats or birds. It said that

No county action for injured Virat, fitness test on June 15

New Delhi, May 24 (PTI): India cricket captain Virat Kohli's muchhyped participation in English County Championship was ruled out on Thursday due to a neck injury, throwing his meticulously planned build-up for the tour of UK into disarray.

Kohli will require a three-week rehabilitation to recover from the injury, the BCCI said.

The 29-year-old will undergo a fitness test on June 15, which will confirm his availability for the initial phase of the UK limited-overs tour starting with the two T20 In-ternationals against Ireland in last week of June

India will begin the series against England with T20Is in ear-

Team India Captain Mr Virat Kohli suffered a neck injury while fielding during Match 51 of the VIVO IPL between Royal Challengers Bangalore and Sunrisers Hyderabad on 17th May 2018 at M. Chinnaswamy Stadium, Bengaluru," BCCI acting secretary Amitabh

Choudhary said in a press release.

"Kohli, who was scheduled to play for Surrey CCC in the month of June, has been ruled out from par-ticipating. This decision was taken following assessments by the BCCI Medical team, subsequent scans, and a specialist visit," the release further stated.

The Indian captain will now undergo a period of rehabilitation under the supervision of the BCCI Medical team. He will begin training and subsequently undergo a fitness test at the NCA in Bengalu-

ru from June 15. "The BCCI Medical Team is confident that Kohli will regain full



fitness ahead of India's upcoming tours to Ireland and England," Choudhary stated.

The batting mainstay had decided to miss the one-off Test against Afghanistan, starting June 14 in Bengaluru, to appear in county matches.

Kohli had visited a hospital

in Mumbai for a check-up yester-day and it was reported that he is suffering from a slip disc injury and will not be playing for Surrey ahead of the UK tour. However, a top BCCI official,

who is privy to Kohli's county engagements, clarified that it was a case of "neck sprain" and not a "slip disc injury" as reported.

Kohli's tremendous workload during the past one year.
In this phase, he appeared in

nine Tests and 29 of the 32 ODIs

that the national team played. He also played 9 out of India's 18 T20 Internationals.

In all, he played 47 international matches with only Rohit Sharma and Hardik Pandya (48 each) playing a match more than him.

Tourist Season Usury Something so expected should have been resolved by now

East District Traffic Police challaned 70 taxis on Wednesday after a surprise check along a popular tourist route revealed that they had over-charged their fares. A thumbs up for them! Such action has been seen in the past as well. Every time there is a jump in passenger numbers, like during tourist seaor a shortage of taxis, like during elections or trouble beyond Rangpo, the appointed ticket counters down shutters and touts peddle ticket in "black". Clearly, surprise checks and on-the-spot challans are not doing much to contain the unethical profiteering that preys on guests short on time and ill-informed about their rights or what the authorities are doing to protect them from being fleeced. Given that the tourist season has been growing more robust every cycle, the scale of over-charging is also increasing and it has become necessary that more agencies and more options are explored to contain the situation.

In the present context, two aspects need to be revisited – crackdown and preparation.

Punitive action, like the surprise checks and challans, need to continue. In fact, the frequency and locations where these ambushes are laid should be expanded. Since experience shows these as having only limited efficacy, something more is required. The tour-ist season stretches longer nowadays, and the seasonal mismatch between demand and supply allows for some heavy profits to be made. This makes the occasional payment of fines a risk that the cabbies see as an affordable occupational risk. May be the punishment for over-charging should be made harsher. It is worth exploring whether cancelling the taxi permit for even three days, or even a week in extreme cases, works as a deterrent because this would hit where it hurts. Impounding taxis even for a day could also be considered. Penalising not just the drivers but also the vehicle owners and even taxi associations they are affiliated to could also help introduce some self-monitoring which could discourage this trend. These are admit-tedly harsh methods, may be not even practical for the long-term and will definitely invite some backlash, but if the authorities are serious about addressing the issue, they should give these a serious a thought.

Any crackdown should be complemented with

preparation. This will have to be a collaborative effort involving at least the tourism and police officials, preferably also the tourism stakeholders. Ahead of a tourist season, they should sit down and brainstorm on how guests do not return from Sikkim with a bad aftertaste of their budgets upended by cheats and cons. If they had a frank exchange, they will definitely come up with a plan that works. The State could begin with working out the carrying capacity of taxis and estimating the demand-supply shortfall. This will need to also include the service required by the daily local passengers. If there is no shortfall, then the crackdown option needs to be reinforced, but if there are fewer vehicles than what the State requires, some out-ofthe-box thinking will be required. In the interest of both, the local passengers and the tourists, the authorities could consider issuing short-term taxi permits to even private vehicles. There must be many private car owners who will be excited by this option and the many hotels and home-stays will also take up this offer. It will also be good idea to incentivise fair practices and these can be easily achieved by setting up a Facebook page or even a website where feedback is taken from tourists and drivers and their associations who/ which receive the most glowing reviews are awarded or felicitated at the end of a tourist season. There must be many programmers in Sikkim who can work out the algorithms required to make this poll transparent and serviceable.

There will be few tourists who make a noise about over-charging because that is a risk travellers run everywhere. Popular tourist destinations have traditionally been notorious for fleecing guests, but that does not make it okay. If Sikkim is serious about addressing this problem, it will do something about it, and with an earnest effort, will also earn another USP for itself. Tourists reassured that they are not being cheated are relaxed tourists. Relaxed tourists are happy tourists and might even tip large and spend more. If nothing else, they will spread even better word of mouth promotion of Sikkim. The State then will win in every regard.

How Conrad's imperial horror story Heart of Darkness resonates with our globalised times

oseph Conrad's Heart of Darkness - or "The Heart of Darkness", as it vas known to its first readers - was first published as a serial in 1899, in the popular monthly Blackwood's Magazine. Few of that magazine's subscribers could have foreseen the fame that Conrad's story would eventually garner, or the fierce debates it would later provoke.

Already, in 1922, the American

poet T.S. Eliot thought the book was Zeitgeist-y enough to provide the epigraph for his epoch-defining poem, The Waste Land - although another American poet, Ezra Pound, talked him out of using it.

The same thought occurred to Francis Ford Coppola more than 50

years later, when he used Conrad's story as the framework for his phantasmagoric Vietnam War movie, Apocalypse Echoes Heart of Darkness can pop up almost anywhere: the chorus to a Gang of Four song, the title of a Simpsons episode, a scene in Peter Jackson's 2005 King Kong remake.

Consider one final Heart of Dark-

ess allusion, from Mohsin Hamid's 2017 Man Booker-shortlisted novel, Exit West. In the novel's opening pages, a man with "dark skin and dark, woolly hair" appears in a Sydney bedroom, transported there by one of the mysterious portals that have appeared around the globe, connecting stable, prosperous countries with places that people need to escape

The "door", as these wormholes are called, is "a rectangle of complete darkness — the heart of darkness". This is a more complicated kind of Conrad reference. Here, "heart of darkness" is a shorthand for European stereotypes of Africa, which Conrad's novel did its part to reinforce.

Hamid's line plays on racist anx ieties about immigration: the idea that certain places and peoples are primitive, exotic, dangerous. For contemporary readers and writers, these questions have become an unavoid-able part of Conrad's legacy, too.


UP THE RIVER

Heart of Darkness is the story of an English seaman, Charles Marlow, who is hired by a Belgian company to cap-tain a river steamer in the recently established Congo Free State. Almost as soon as he arrives in the Congo, Marlow begins to hear rumours about another company employee, Kurtz, who is stationed deep in the interior of the country, hundreds of miles up the Congo River

The second half of the novel - or vella, as it's often labelled - relates Marlow's journey upriver and his meeting with Kurtz. His health de-stroyed by years in the jungle, Kurtz dies on the journey back down to the coast, though not before Marlow has had a chance to glimpse "the barren darkness of his heart". The coda to Marlow's Congo story takes place in Europe: questioned by Kurtz's "Intended" about his last moments. Marlow decides to tell a comforting lie, rather than reveal the truth about his descent into madness

Although Conrad never met any-one quite like Kurtz in the Congo, the structure of Marlow's story is based closely on his experiences as mate and, temporarily, captain of the Roi des Belges, a Congo river steamer, in 1890. By this time, Conrad, born Józef Teodor Konrad Korzeniowski in the Russian-ruled part of Po-land in 1857, had been a seaman for about 15 years, rising to the rank of master in the British merchant service. (The remains of the only sailing ship he ever commanded, the Otago have ended up in Hobart, a rusted, half-submerged shell on the banks of the Derwent.)

Sick with fever and disenchant-ed with his colleagues and superiors, he broke his contract after only six months, and returned to London in early 1891. Three years and two ships later, Conrad retired from the





and embarked on a career as a publishing writer

the novel that he had be on since before he visited the Congo, Almayer's Folly, in 1895. A sec-ond novel, An Outcast of the Islands, followed, along with several stories. Conrad's second career was humming along when he finally set about transforming his Congo experience into fiction in 1898.

DARKNESS AT HOME AND ABROAD Heart of Darkness opens on a ship, but not one of the commercial vessels that feature in Conrad's sea stories. Rather, it's a private yacht, the Nellie, moored at Gravesend, about 20 miles east of the City of London. The five male friends gathered on board were once sailors, but everyone except Marlow has since changed careers, as Conrad himself had done.


Like sail, which was rapidly being displaced by steam-power, Marlow is introduced to us as an anachronism, still devoted to the profession his companions have left behind. When, amidst the gathering "gloom", he be-gins to reminisce about his stint as a 'fresh-water sailor", his companions know they are in for one of his "inconclusive experiences".

Setting the opening of Heart of Darkness on the Thames also allowed Conrad to foreshadow one of the novel's central conceits: the lack of any absolute, essential difference between so-called civilized societies and so-called primitive ones. "This, too", Marlow says, "has been one of the dark places of the earth", imagining the impressions of an ancient Roman soldier, arriving in what was then a remote, desolate corner of the empire.

During the second half of the 19th century, spurious theories of racial superiority were used to legitimate empire-building, justifying European rule over native populations in places where they had no other obvious right to be. Marlow, however, is too cynical to accept this convenient fic-tion. The "conquest of the earth", he says, was not the manifest destiny of European peoples; rather, it simply meant "the taking it away from those who have a different complexion or slightly flatter noses than ourselves." The idea that Africans and Euro-

peans have more in common than the latter might care to admit recurs lat-er, when Marlow describes observing tribal ceremonies on the banks of the river. Confronted with local villagers "stamping" and "swaying", their "eyes rolling", he is shaken by a feeling of "remote kinship with this wild and passionate uproar".

Whereas most contemporary readers will be cheered by Marlow's scepticism about the project of empire, this image of Congo's indigenous inhabitants is more problematic. "Go-ing up that river", Marlow says, "was like travelling back to the earliest beginnings of the world", and he accordingly sees the dancing figures as remnants of "prehistoric man"



Kurtz is shown as the ultimate proof of this "kinship" between enlightened Europeans and the "savages" they are supposed to be civilising. Kurtz had once written an idealistic "report" for an organisation called the International Society for the Sup-pression of Savage Customs. When Marlow finds this manuscript among Kurtz's papers, however, it bears a hastily-scrawled addendum: "Exterminate all the brutes!" The Kurtz that Marlow finally encounters at the end of the novel has been consumed by the same "forgotten and brutal instincts" he once intended to suppress.

ADVENTURE ON ACID

The European "gone native" on the fringes of empire was a stock trope, which Conrad himself had already explored elsewhere in his writing, but Heart of Darkness takes this cliché of imperial adventure fiction and sends it on an acid trip. The manic, emaciated Kurtz that Marlow finds at the Inner Station is straight out of the pages of late-Victorian neo-Goth-ic, more Bram Stoker or Sheridan Le Fanu than Henry Rider Haggard. The "wilderness" has possessed Kurtz, "loved him, embraced him, got into his veins" — it is no wonder that Marlow feels "creepy all over" just think-

Kurtz's famous last words are "The horror! The horror!" "Horror" is also the feeling that Kurtz and his monstrous jungle compound, with its decorative display of human heads, are supposed to evoke in the reader. Along with its various other generic affiliations — imperial romance, psychological novel, impressionist tour de force — Heart of Darkness is a horror story.

Conrad's Kurtz also channels turn-of-the-century anxieties about mass media and mass politics. One of Kurtz's defining qualities in the novel is "eloquence": Marlow refers to him repeatedly as "A voice!", and his report on Savage Customs is written in a rhetorical, highfalutin style, short on practical details but long on sonorous abstractions. Marlow never discovers Kurtz's real "profession", but he gets the impression that he was somehow connected with the press — either a "journalist who could paint" or a "painter who wrote for the papers"

This seems to be confirmed when Belgian journalist turns up in Antwerp after Kurtz's death, referring to him as his "dear colleague" and sniff-ing around for anything he can use as copy. Marlow fobs him off with the bombastic report, which the journalist accepts happily enough. For Con rad, implicitly, Kurtz's mendacious ellike to print.

If Kurtz's "colleague" is to be believed, moreover, his peculiar gifts might also have found an outlet in populist politics: "He would have been a splendid leader of an extreme party." Had he returned to Europe, that is, the same faculty that enabled Kurtz to impose his mad will on the tribespeople of the upper Congo might have found a wider audience.

Politically, Conrad tended to be on the right, and this image of Kurtz as an extremist demagogue expresses a habitual pessimism about mass de-mocracy — in 1899, still a relatively recent phenomenon. Nonetheless, in the light of the totalitarian regimes that emerged in Italy, Germany and Russia after 1918, Kurtz's combination of irresistible charisma with megalomaniacal brutality seems pre-

These concerns about political populism also resonate with recent democratic processes in the US and the UK, among other places. Only Conrad's emphasis on "eloquence" now seems quaint; as the 2016 US Presidential Election demonstrated, an absence of rhetorical flair is no handicap in the arena of contemporary populist debate.

RACE AND EMPIRE

Heart of Darkness contains a bitter critique of imperialism in the Congo, which Conrad condemns as "rapacious and pitiless folly". The backlash against the systematic abuse and exploitation of Congo's indigenous inhabitants did not really get underway until the first decade of the 20th century, so that the anti-imperialist theme was ahead of its time, if only by a few years. Nor does Conrad have any patience with complacent Euroan beliefs about racial superiority.
Nonetheless, the novel also con-

tains representations of Africans that would rightly be described as racist if they were written today. In particular, Conrad shows little interest in the experience of Marlow's "cannibal" ship-mates, who come across as exotic caricatures. It is images like these that led the Nigerian novelist Chinua Achebe to denounce Conrad as a "bloody racist", in an influential 1977 essay.

One response to this criticism is to argue, as Paul B. Armstrong does, that the lack of more rounded Congolese characters is the point. By sticking to Marlow's limited perspective, Heart of Darkness gives an authentic portrayal of how people see other cultures. But this doesn't necessarily make the images themselves any less


If Achebe did not succeed in having Heart of Darkness struck from the canon, he did ensure that academics writing about the novel could no longer ignore the question of race. For Urmila Seshagiri, Heart of Darkness shows that race is not the stable, scientific category that many Victorians thought it was. This kind of argument shifts the debate in a different direction, away from the author's putative "racism", and onto the novel's complex portrayal of race itself.

Perhaps because he was himself an alien in Britain, whose first career had taken him to the farthest corners of the globe, Conrad's novels and sto-ries often seem more in tune with our globalized world than those of some of his contemporaries. An émigré at 16, Conrad experienced to a high degree the kind of dislocation that has become an increasingly typical mod-ern condition. It is entirely appropriate, in more ways than one, for Hamid to allude to Conrad in a novel about global mobility.

The paradox of Heart of Darkness is that it seems at once so improbable and so necessary. It is impossible not to be astonished, when you think of it, that a Polish ex-sailor, writing in his third language, was ever in a position to author such a story, on such a subject. And yet, in another way, Conrad's life seems more determined than most, in more direct contact with the great forces of history. It is from this point of view that Heart of Darkness seems necessary, even in-evitable, the product of dark historical energies, which continue to shape

our contemporary world.

The then Left Front government had formed a special investigation team to probe the death but the scribe's family and the FPJ had demand-ed a CBI probe.

Should we ask monkeys not to procreate: HC asks govt

New Delhi, May 24 (PTI): Should we ask monkeys not to procreate or bite people till the government comes out with a method to sterilise them, the Delhi High Court asked today.

It also pulled up the Centre for importing oral immune-contraception vaccines for testing on the simians without getting approvals for carrying out the sterilisation trials.

A bench of Acting Chief Justice Gita Mittal and Justice C Hari Shancine imported from the United States was pri-marily used to sterilise horses and have not been used on monkeys any-where in the world.

"Why did you import the vaccine if the per-mission for trials has not been received," the court

asked the government.
"Till the time you (Centre) get the permissions, shall we ask the monkeys not to procreate and tell them not to

bite people," it asked.

The bench noted that even the Delhi government and a committee set up on court orders to develop a action plan to control the simian population, have not taken any steps.

It directed the committee to hold a meeting in a day and come out with a time line within which it would take steps to sterilise the monkeys.



After the prime minister accepted Kohli's challenge today morning, saying he will soon share his own 'Fitness Challenge video', various leaders started posing their own dares to Modi on issues ranging from spiralling fuel prices to death of protestors in police firing in Tamil Nadu.

The challenge, which has since gone viral on Twitter, involves a person posting his or her fitness video on the social media platform while tagging others do something similar promote fitness.

However, this 'fitness challenge' soon appeared turning political with Congress president Rahul Gand-hi leading the opposition charge by asking Modi to accept the challenge to reduce spiralling fuel prices or face a nationwide stir by his party.

"Dear PM, Glad to see you accept the @imVkohli fitness challenge. Here's one

from me: Reduce fuel prices or the Congress will do a nationwide agitation and force you to do so. I look forward to your response," Gandhi wrote on Twitter using the hashtag '#FuelChallenge

Missile that downed MH17 came from Russian *military:* investigators

UTRECHT, MAY 24 (AFP): Investigators probing the 2014 downing of flight MH17 said today for the first time that the missile which shot down the plane over eastern Ukraine travelled from a

Russian military brigade.
The Joint Investigation Team "has come to the conclusion that the BUK-TELAR that shot down MH17 came from 53rd Anti-aircraft Missile Brigade based in Kursk in Russia," top Dutch investigator Wilbert Paulissen said.

"The 53rd Brigade forms part of the Russian armed forces," he told reporters at a press conference in the Netherlands.

The Malaysian Air-

lines flight was blown out of the sky over conflict-wracked east Ukraine on July 17, 2014 en route from Amsterdam to Kuala Lumpur.

All 298 passengers and crew, most of them Dutch, were killed in the disaster. But there were 17 nationalities on board including Australians, Britons, Malaysians and Indonesians. The investigators had previously concluded that the plane was brought down by a Russian-made BUK missile system brought in from Russia and fired from territory in Ukraine held by Moscow-backed rebels. But they have stopped short of directly saying who pulled the trigger.

Now the team has

painstaking recreated the route taken by the missile convoy from Kursk across the border into Ukraine using videos and photos.

Paulissen added the team had "ascertained that the BUK-TELAR has a number of unique characteristics. These characteristics as such served as a type of fingerprint for the missile." Moscow has repeatedly denied any involvement in the downing of the Boeing flight 777, putting the blame instead on Kiev.

The probe being led by The Netherlands is fo-cusing on some 100 people suspected of having played an "active role" in the incident, but investigators have not yet publicly named any suspects.

Chief investigator

Fred Westerbeke said Thursday the probe was now in its "last phase" but added there was "still work to be done".

US demands two Venezuelan diplomats leave within 48 hours: State Dept

WASHINGTON, MAY 24 (AFP): The United States ordered two top Venezuelan diplomats to leave within 48 hours in a tit for tat response to Caracas expulsion order against the top two US diplomats there.

This action is to reciprocate the Maduro regime's decision to declare the Charge d'Affaires and Deputy Chief of Mission of the US Embassy in Caracas personae non grata, State Department spokes-woman Heather Nauert said in a statement yesterday.

The Charge d'Affaires of the Venezuelan embassy and the Deputy Consul General of the Venezuelan consulate in Houston had likewise been declared personae non grata and were directed to leave within two days, she said.

Venezuela's move to expel US diplomats earlier this week followed a US tightening

of sanctions over President Nicolas Maduro's controversial re-election as president over the weekend.

The Venezuelan president declared US charge d'affaires Todd Robinson and deputy head of mission Brian Naranjo "personae non gratae." Caracas has claimed it was the victim of a "political and financial lynching" -- accusa-tions Nauert branded "unjustified." "Our Embassy officers have carried out their official duties responsibly and consistent with diplomatic prac-tice," Nauert said.
"We reject any suggestion

to the contrary."

Maduro announced the expulsions after being officially proclaimed the winner of Sunday's election in the South American nation mired in an acute economic crisis and facing growing international isolation.

The European Union said it was also weighing new sanctions after the election was marred by "irregulari-ties" and failed to meet international standards.

Caracas is facing increasing nternational isolation, with the United States, the European Union and the 14 countries of the Lima Group -- which includes Argentina, Brazil and Canada -- refusing to recognize the election result.

China says report on President Xi asking Pak to relocate LeT chief Saeed shocking, baseless

BEIJING, MAY 24 (PTI): China today dismissed as "shocking" and "baseless" a media report that President Xi Jinping has asked Pakistan to relocate the Mumbai terror attack master-mind and JuD chief Hafiz Saeed to a West Asian country, amid mounting international pressure on Islamabad to act against him. According to the report, a close aide of the prime minister of Pakistan said that Xi made the suggestion to Shahid Khaqan Abbasi during their meeting on the sidelines of the Boao Forum

in China last month.
"At a 35-minute meeting, at least 10 minutes of the discussion dealt with Saeed. The

Chinese President was keen on pressing the Prime Minister to find an early solution to keep Saeed away from the limelight, an unnamed close aide of Abbasi

Reacting to it, Chinese Foreign Ministry spokesperson's office said today the report was "shocking and baseless". "It is shocking and baseless that's all we can say," the official from the spokesperson's office told PTI here, declining to comment further on the report.

Considering the close relations enjoyed between China and Pakistan, there is sense of disquiet here over the report in the backdrop of the current tussle between the Pakistan government headed by Pakistan Muslim League-N (PML-N) and the powerful military. Earlier this month, Pakistan's ousted prime minister Nawaz Sharif, who has been disqualified to hold public office for life by the Supreme Court in the Panama Papers case, admitted Pakistan's involvement in 26/11 Mumbai terror attack. Without naming Saeed and Jaish-e-Mo-hammad chief Masood Azhar's militant organisations operating in the country with impunity, Sharif said: "Militant organisa-

tions are active in Pakistan."

"Call them non-state actors, should we allow them to cross the border and kill over 150 peo-

ple in Mumbai? Explain it to me. Why can't we complete the trial," he said in an interview to Dawn newspaper, which created furore in Pakistan. Saeed carries a USD 10 million American bounty for his role in terror activities. He is the mastermind behind the 2008 Mumbai terror attack in which 166 people, including six US na-

tionals, were killed.

While Saeed has been declared a global terrorist by the United Nations after the Mumbai terrorist attacks, China has put repeated technical holds on India, US, UK and France's efforts in the UN to list Azhar as a terrorist for his involvement in the Pathankot terrorist attack.

13 transgenders will contest 2018 Pak general elections: report

ISLAMABAD, MAY 24 (PTI): For the first time, at least 13 transgender persons will con-test the general elections in Pakistan this year with two of them contesting for the Na-tional Assembly, a media report said.

Transgenders were includsus, published in August. The survey identified only 10,418 transgender people out of a population of nearly 208 million in Pakistan.

The importance of the par ticipation of the trangenders was discussed yesterday at a national consultation where their political inclusion and empowerment for social progress was highlighted, the Ex-

press Tribune reported.

The consultation was organised by All Pakistan Transgender Election Network (APTEN) in collaboration with the Election Commission of Pakistan (ECP).

The meeting was attended by all the potential candidates and representatives from their assigned constituencies, it said.

Of the 13 transgender candidates, two will contest for National Assembly and the rest for provincial assembly seats,

report said. Pakistan's election commission on Monday proposed July 25-27 as possible dates for holding the general elections in the country.

The Election Act 2017 under Article 48 A and B transgender community are includ-ed in the vulnerable commu-nity which means that they shall not be required to stand in queue and will be given priority of right to vote, Qamar Naseem, member of the Chief Minister's Special Community on Rights of the Transgender Persons (K-P) and member of the National Task Force said.

"The polling station staff will ensure that they will cast their votes as soon as they will reach the polling station," he said.

last time four transgender persons contested general elec-tion but they could not do it in proper order.

However, this year the community has constituted APTEN which will provide them (transgender) a platform from where they will contest election in an organised manner, the report said.


