#### One held for Darjeeling gun battle incident

DARJEELING, OCT 14: A man was arrested in Darjeeling today for his sus-pected links to Friday's gun battle, in which a po-liceman was killed, even as the men in uniform intensified the efforts to nab Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) chief Bi-

mal Gurung.

The combing operation by police to nab the GJM chief continued for the second consecutive day today in the forest

areas near Darjeeling. "We have arrested a man in connection with yesterday's incident. He is being interrogated," a senior police official said.

According to police sources, the person arrested had links with the Gorkhaland Personnel (GLP), a GJM wing.

Four policemen were also injured in Friday's incident, which occurred in the forest area near Darjeeling. The GJM had claimed that three of its supporters were killed in the police firing. The police, however, did not comment on it.

A senior police official today said the situation in the hills was largely normal and traf-fic movement was also smooth.

However, towards Saturday evening there were unconfirmed reports of another clash between the police and υροιιce and surung's supporters near Patlebas.

since August after the West Bengal government lodged cases against him under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act for his alleged involvement in several bomb blasts in Darjeeling and adjoining areas.

Friday's exchange of fire was the first in-cident of violence in the hills after a 104-day shutdown was called off by Gurung on September 26, following an appeal by Union Home Minister Rajnath Singh.

The GJM is an ally of the BJP in the National Democratic Alliance.

Sikkim is all set to host a national level youth festival in Gangtok. The Department of Sports and Youth Affairs, Government of Sikkim is organis-ing the fifth edition of the North East Youth Festival, here in Gangtok this year.

The announcement was made by the Minis-ter of Sports and Youth Affairs, Government of Sikkim, RB Subba in a press conference held in Gangtok today.

The festival will be held at Paljor Stadium in Gangtok, East Sikkim.

The Minister said that it is a huge opportunity and a matter of pride for the State to host such a national festival.

"It is an honour for the State to be hosting an event of such standard,"



said Mr. Subba.

He further added that the North East Youth Festhe North East Youth Fes-tival is a big multicultur-al event for the youth to showcase their talents and move towards national integration.

Mr Subba while ad-dressing the press meet said that the youth are the future leaders and the makers of the State

He said that Sikkim is leading the nation and the world in the field of organic farming and informed that the state government is planning to start a course in organic farming at Chakhung Government Science College in West Sikkim.

He also said that the State Youth Policy is in

the last phase of its framing and are planning to release the same during the festival if possible.

The North East Youth Festival will see participants come together from all the other North Eastern States of the country as well as other parts of the country.

The three-day festi-

val is being organised at Gangtok from 28-30 Oct. More than 1,500 youths from all North East States will participate in the festival.

During the festival, there will be competitive events in folk dance, folk song, one act play, instru-mental music and rock band competitions. The festival will also feature martial arts show as a non-competitive event along with food festivals,

and many more.

Youth falling in the age group of 15-29 years are eligible to partici-pate in the event and Sikkim will have maximum number of participants said Secretary of the Youth Affairs Department, SD Dhakal.

"The participating youth will be from different colleges, National Service Scheme volun-teers, Nehru Yuva Kendra volunteers and more than 100 participants from schools of Sikkim will take part in the event," said Mr Dhakal.

#### Iranians respond with anger, mockery to Trump speech

TEHRAN (IRAN), OCT 14 (AFP): Iranians re-sponded with anger and mockery today to the bellicose criticism of their government by US President Donald Trump, who threatened to tear up a

landmark nuclear deal.

Trump's use of the phrase "Arabian Gulf" rather than "Persian Gulf" particularly hit a nerve in a country with a fierce nationalistic streak.

"Everyone knew Trump's friendship was for sale to the highest bidder. We now know that his geography is too," wrote Foreign Minister Moham-mad Javad Zarif on Twitter, referring to the US al-liance with Iran's regional rival Saudi Arabia.

Despite pressure from the Arab Gulf monarchies, most international bodies still use "Persian Gulf" as the conventional name for the region's waterway, and many Iranians shared photos of US veterans' medals and graves referring to the "Persian Gulf conflict" of the 1990s.

In his White House speech last evening, Trump reeled off a list of grievances committed by the "Iranian dictatorship, its sponsorship of terror-ism, and its continuing aggression in the Mid-dle-East and all around the world".

He also threatened to

"terminate" the 2015 nuclear deal signed between Iran and six world powers unless Congress passed stringent new sanctions.

But as Iranians head-ed to their offices on to-day - the first day of the work week in Iran - the reaction was often one of bemusement.

"Trump's statements are so ridiculous that it actually works in Iran's favour. Speaking about the 'Arabian Gulf' is taken very badly by peo-ple here," said Abbas, a 40-year-old banker, who

only gave his first name.
"The reaction of the
Europeans shows that the United States is isolated, and only Saudi Arabia and Israel have supported Trump," he added. The other signatories to the nuclear deal - Brit-

ain, France, Germany, Chi-na and Russia - have called for its preservation, saving

for its preservation, saying that Iran is clearly sticking to its commitments.

Trump's efforts to reach out to ordinary Iranians, who he referred to as the "longest-suffering victims" of the Islamic regime, also appeared to have fallen on deaf ears, with many recalling the travel ban he slapped on

them earlier this year.

"The most disgusting part of Trump's speech was when he tried to show himself as sympathising with Iranians," wrote one Twitter user.

"Reminder: Not even 6 months have passed from the execution of visa ban for wrote another. For all the bluster, Trump's strategy was not as tough as many had predicted.

## Panel Advocates sensitized on Cross-**Examination of Witnesses**

Sikkim State Legal Services Authority (SLSA) organized a sensitization programme for panel advocates with less than eight years of practice on 'Cross-Examina-tion of Witnesses' at the Conference Hall of Sikkim SLSA, Development Area in Gangtok today, a press release from the SLSA informs.

The programme was chaired by SLSA executive chairperson and High Court of Sikkim Judge, Iustice Meenakshi Madan Rai with High Court of Sikkim Senior Advocate, N Rai and SLSA panel advocate, UP Sharma as the resource persons.

In her address, Jus-e Meenakshi Madan Rai apprised the participants about the importance of cross-examination in a trial of case. It was stated that legal aid advocates must master the provisions of the Indian Evidence Act and

must be well versed with the procedural law to conduct trials effectively. Being well versed with the Evidence Act will aid the legal aid advocates to understand the pa-rameters within which cross-examination is to be conducted.

It was informed by Justice Rai that cross-examination is a powerful tool but the advocate must know how to use it. It was informed that while cross-examining a victim under the Protection of Children from Sexual Offences Act, 2012, legal aid advocates must be conscious about the presumptions under Section 29 & 30 of the said act. Further there should also be questions on public documents (such as birth certificates) which at times could be a

Dasain shopping, because of yearlong online discounts, has kind of lost its excitement and even Dhanteras acquisitions are projected to be dull this vear because of the double-whammy of demonetization and GST. Firecrackers have been banned in Sikkim since much before the Court ordered silence for Delhi so even that indulgence is out of the way. Meanwhile saffron boorishness has only acquired sidekicks and minions in Sikkim thus far, so at least the traditional excesses of Teohar can be expected to continue for some more years. So, expect the family get-togethers, parties and picnics. Thankfully, the kids still retain ome of their innocence so this remains a time when the children of Sikkim are especially excited. This, after all, is that one time when the elders remember that there are children around.

But here again we short-change the younger gen erations. After the mandatory new set of clothes and some rituals at home are over, the elders start indulging themselves. At least now we should wake up and recognise the

presence and requirements of Sikkim's young. #### IMF for three-pronged approach for structural reforms in India

The IMF has suggested a
three- pronged approach
for structural reforms in India
that includes reducing the number of labour laws, improving infrastructure and closing the gender gap among others.

Kenneth Kang, Deputy Di-rector of Asia Pacific Depart-ment, IMF said the favourable outlook for Asia was an important opportunity for India to push

ward with difficult reforms.
"As such, there should be three policy priorities in the area of structural reforms,"

Kang told reporters here.
"First priority is to address the corporate and banking sector weaknesses by accelerating the resolution of nonperforming loans, rebuilding the capital buffers for the public sector banks and en-hancing banks' debt recovery mechanisms," he said.

Secondly, Kang said, India should continue with the fis-cal consolidation through revenue measures, as well as further reductions in subsidies.

"And lastly, it's to maintain the strong momentum for structural reforms in addressing the infrastructure gaps, improving the efficiency of labour and product markets as well as furthering

agricultural reforms," he said.

Responding to a question on labour market reforms, Kang suggested reforming the market regulations in order to create a more favourable environment for investment and employment.

"There is a need to reduce the number of labour laws which currently number around 250 across the central and the state level," said Kang,

He said India should also focus on closing the gender gap which may help a great deal in boosting the employment op-portunities for women in India

"Improvements in infrastructure can be one important way to facilitate the entry of women into the labour force. But in addition, there is a need to strengthening the implementation of specific gender regulations, as well as to invest more in gender specific training and education," Kang said.

## What the Harvey Weinstein case tells us about sexual assault disclosure

xplosive reports from The New York Times and Explosive reports from the room some The New Yorker in recent days have revealed depetrated by high-profile Hollywood movie executive Harvey Weinstein. In the wake of these reports, a flood of disclosures from celebrities, including Angelina Jolie and Gwyneth Paltrow, has emerged.

The Weinstein case follows an emerging pattern of powerful men being outed for their sexually violent behaviour. In such cases, men have been able to abuse with relative impunity, despite many in the entertainment industry appearing to know or have suspicion of their behaviour.

These instances raise several pertinent questions about sexual violence and harassment. They include: why it's so difficult for victim-survivors to come

why they aren't believed when they do why we tend to see a flood of reporting once the case is broken

how men such as Weinstein are able to offend with impunity for so long

- and most importantly, what we can do to prevent such cases from reoccurring. 'WHY DIDN'T YOU SAY ANYTHING?'

Victim-survivors face a wide range of barriers to disclosing their experiences, regardless of the con-text in which the assault occurred. Commonly identified barriers include:

fear of not being believed

fear their experience will be dismissed or trivialized belief the incident wasn't "serious" enough to tell

fear of retaliation from the perpetrator

believing there was nothing that could be done

wanting to move on from or forget the incident

confusion about what happened

Many barriers are heavily informed by misconceptions and stereotypes about sexual violence. The narrow framing of "real" rape as involving extreme violence or physical force and penetrative sex, or that the perpetrator is a stranger, can prevent victim-survivors from speaking out or even identifying and labelling their experience as sexual violence in the first place.

Although victim-survivors face substantial barriers to disclosure, most eventually tell somebody about their experience. How that person reacts can be vital in informing what happens next.

Positive responses, such as an expression of be-lief and validation, can aid in recovery and encourage further disclosure and reporting to authorities. Negative responses, such as blaming the victim or disbelief, can shut down any further discussion or

power. This is heightened in Weinstein's case. As a high-ranking Hollywood producer, he was often in direct control of the careers of his victims, many of whom were young women.

It is reasonable to assume that many did not disclose for fear of losing their careers, or otherwise facing the wrath of a well-connected, wealthy and powerful man. Weinstein's position enabled him to reportedly buy the silence of several victims.

However, this is not to say these women did or said nothing in response to Weinstein's actions. It appears his behaviour was an open secret among women in Hollywood, who warned each other about him.

Rather than not disclosing, it would seem that Weinstein's victims were selective about who they told. Their disclosure practices sought to protect other women, rather than openly exposing their

The power disparity between Weinstein and his victims plays into a range of myths and stereotypes about women. Namely, there is a myth that women routinely lie about sexual assault as a form of revenge or – in the case of wealthy perpetrators – as a means of "gold-digging", attention-seeking, or advancing their own status

These myths are not borne out in the substantial research evidence on sexual violence. False reporting is rare. Victim-survivors are often blamed for their own experiences, routinely dismissed or disbelieved, and the criminal justice system is commonly encountered as a site of retraumatisation.

It is difficult to conceive what benefit vic-tim-survivors may garner from "false" disclosure in such circumstances. And perpetrators in a position of such cultural and economic power can overtly exploit this to facilitate and enable their offending with relative impunity.

Research has illustrated how perpetrators draw

on their position to silence victims, often by reinforcing the notion that no-one will believe them if they do disclose, or by threatening to destroy their reputation or livelihood.

Under these circumstances, it is unsurprising that many of Weinstein's victims did not disclose widely earlier. It is equally unsurprising that the initial media reports have sparked a flood of disclosures from women who Weinstein targeted.

In taking women's experiences seriously, this reporting – and the subsequent public outcry – has opened up a space for other women to disclose. It signifies to these women that they will be believed and taken seriously, with the weight of collective disclosure making it more difficult for their experiences to be dismissed or downplayed.

DISMANTLING CULTURES OF SEXUAL VIOLENCE Given that Weinstein's actions were an open secret for so long, this also raises questions of how he was able to continue offending with impunity.

Weinstein's position of power played a key role

here, and ensured that many of his victims were effectively silenced. However, it is also apparent that others within the industry condoned or at least tolerated his behaviour. It is vital that we imbue bystanders with the confidence and skills to interve

Weinstein's actions were further enabled by a cultural context that normalised abusive behaviour through references to the "casting couch" and ste-reotypes of the lecherous industry figure who "takes advantage" of young actresses as a matter of course.

Such attitudes normalise and rationalise the

occurrence of sexual harassment and assault, reframing it as acceptable. This can prevent potential bystanders from stepping in, and obscures the problematic nature of such behaviour. It is vital that we work to disrupt and challenge cultures that normalise sexual violence.

Finally, we must ensure women are able to disclose their experiences without fear of disbelief, blame or dismissal. Such systematic and widespread abuse might be avoided if only we were willing to e women, and listen when they do disclose.

## The truth about Easter Island: a sustainable society has been falsely blamed for its own demise

**F**ew places on earth are as well known for their so-called mysteries as Easter Island, also known as Rapa Nui. For a tiny island of 64 square miles, with its nearest neighbours some 1,300 miles away, it has seen

more than its fair share of controversy.

For a long while it wasn't clear whether the island's native population originated in Polynesia or South America. And how can we explain its apparent paradox: the design, construction and transport of giant "moai" stone statues, a remarkable cultural achievement yet one carried out on a virtually barren island, which seemingly lacked both the resources and people to carry out such a feat?

Anthropologists have long won-dered whether these seemingly simple inhabitants really had the capacity for such cultural complexity. Or was a more advanced population perhaps from the Americas, actually responsible – one that subsequently wiped out all the natural resources the island once had?

Recently, Rapa Nui has become the ultimate parable for humankind's selfishness: a moral tale of the dangers of environmental destruction. In the "ecocide" hypothesis popularised by the geographer Jared Diamond, Rapa Nui is used as a demonstration of how society is doomed to collapse if we do not sit up and take note. But more than 60 years of archaeological research actually paints a very different picture - and now new genetic data sheds fur-ther light on the island's fate. It is time to demystify Rapa Nui.

THE 'ECOCIDE' NARRA-TIVE DOESN'T STAND UP

The ecocide hypothesis centres on

two major claims. First, that the island's population was reduced from several tens of thousands in its hey-day, to a diminutive 1,500-3,000 when Europeans first arrived in the

early 18th century.
Second, that the palm trees that once covered the island were callously cut down by the Rapa Nui popula-tion to move statues. With no trees to anchor the soil, fertile land eroded away resulting in poor crop yields, while a lack of wood meant islanders couldn't build canoes to access fish or move statues. This led to internecine warfare and, ultimately, cannibalism.

The question of population size is one we still cannot convincingly answer. Most archaeologists agree on estimates somewhere between 4.000 and 9,000 people, although a recent study looked at likely agricultural yields and suggested the island could have supported up to 15,000.

But there is no real evidence of a population decline prior to the first European contact in 1722. Ethno-graphic reports from the early 20th century provide oral histories of warfare between competing island groups. The anthropologist Thor Heyerdahl – most famous for crossing the Pacific in a traditional Inca boat - took these reports as evidence for a huge civil war that culminated in a battle of 1680, where the majority of one of the island's tribes was killed. Obsidian flakes or "mata'a" littering the island have been interpreted as weapon fragments testifying to this violence.

However, recent research lead by Carl Lipo has shown that these were more likely domestic tools or implements used for ritual tasks. Surprisingly few of the human remains from the island show actual evidence of

injury, just 2.5%, and most of those showed evidence of healing, meaning that attacks were not fatal. Crucially, there is no evidence, beyond historical word-of-mouth, of cannibalism. It's debatable whether 20th century tales can really be considered reliable sources for 17th-century conflicts.

#### WHAT REALLY HAPPENED TO THE TREES

More recently, a picture has emerged of a prehistoric population that was both successful and lived sustainably on the island up until European contact. It is generally agreed that Rapa Nui, once covered in large palm trees, was rapidly deforested soon after its initial colonisation around 1200 AD. Although micro-botanical evidence, such as pollen analysis, suggests the palm forest disappeared quickly, the human population may only have

been partially to blame.

The earliest Polynesian colonisers brought with them another culprit, namely the Polynesian rat. It seems likely that rats ate both palm nuts and sapling trees, preventing the forests from growing back. But despite this deforestation, my own research on the diet of the prehistoric Rapanui found they consumed more seafood and were more sophisticated and adaptable farmers than previously

#### BLAME SLAVERS - NOT LUMBERJACKS

So what – if anything – happened to the native population for its numbers to dwindle and for statue carving to end? And what caused the reports of warfare and conflict in the early 20th century?

The real answer is more sinister. Throughout the 19th century, South American slave raids took away as

much as half of the native population By 1877, the Rapanui numbered just 111. Introduced disease, destruction of property and enforced migration by European traders further decimated the natives and lead to increased conflict among those remaining. Perhaps this, instead, was the warfare the ethnohistorical accounts refer to and what ultimately stopped the stat-

It had been thought that South Americans made contact with Rapa Nui centuries before the Europeans, as their DNA can be detected in mod-ern native inhabitants. I have been involved in a new study, however, led by paleogeneticist Lars Fehren-Schmitz, which questions this timeline. We analvsed Rapanui human remains dating aysed Rapanui numan remains dating to before and after European contact. Our work, published in the journal Current Biology, found no significant gene flow between South America and Easter Island before 1722. Instead, the considerable recent disruption to the island's population may have impacted on modern DNA.

Perhaps, then, the takeaway from Rapa Nui should not be a story of ecocide and a Malthusian population collapse. Instead, it should be a lesson in how sparse evidence, a fixation with "mysteries", and a collective amnesia for historic atrocities caused a sus-tainable and surprisingly well-adapted population to be falsely blamed for

their own demise.

And those statues? We know how they moved them; the local population knew all along. They walked – all we needed to do was ask.

## Last rites of cop killed in Darj shootout performed with full state honours

last rites of sub-inspector Amitabha Malik, who was killed when alleged supporters of GJM chief Bimal Gurung fired at a police team yesterday, was performed today with full state honours after his body arrived at his ancestral home in North 24 Parganas district.

The body was brought to the city airport in the afternoon from Bagdogra. Malik's wife accompanied the coffin.

It was later taken to his ancestral home at Madhyamgram in a hearse by road and subsequently to Nimtola crematorium at around 5 pm.

Malik was killed and four other policemen were seriously injured after allegedly Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) supporters, owing allegiance to its chief Bimal Gurung, fired at a police team at a forest area near Darieeling vesterday.

The police was on the trail to nab Gurung, who was suspected to be hiding there.

West Bengal Higher Educa-tion Minister Partha Chatterjee and Food Minister Jyotipriyo Mallick received the body at the airport and offered floral tributes to the slain policeman.

Both the ministers, along with other leaders and senior

police officials, accompanied the coffin to his ancestral home where gun salute was given by the state police in the presence of the DGP Suroiit Kar Purokayastha and other top officials.

As Malik's wife broke into

his family members. neighbours and a large number of people assembled at a club ground at Madhyamgram, where the coffin was kept for people to pay their last respect.

Chatterjee handed over a cheque of Rs five Lakh to the family of the deceased on behalf of Chief Minister Mamata Banerjee and assured the family that appropriate action will be taken against those behind his killing "Our son's soul will rest in

peace only if Bengal remains undivided and Darjeeling continues to remain a part of it." Malik's parents said.

Gurung has been on the run since August after cases under the Unlawful Activities (Prevention) Act were slapped against him for his alleged involvement in several bomb blasts in Darjeeling and its adjoining areas.

This is the first incident of violence after the 104-day long in-definite shutdown in the hills was called off on September 26 by Gurung, following an appeal by Union home minister Rajnath Singh.

#### Kejriwal's missing Wagon R found abandoned in Ghaziabad

New DELHI, OCT 14 (PTI): Delhi Chief Minister Arvind Kejriwal's creaky blue Wagon R, which was stolen from outside the Delhi Secretariat two days ago, has been found abandoned in Ghaziabad, the police said today.

The humble hatchback,

Kejriwal drove around in his early political career and which helped cement his position as the "aam aadmi", was being used by an AAP functionary before it was stolen.

The Delhi Police said

their counterparts in Ghaziabad got in touch with them regarding the car. "A blue Wagon R has been found abandoned by

Ghaziabad police and we think it is the chief minister's car," said a senior police officer.

The police are verify-ing its engine and chassis numbers.

Kejriwal had yesterday written a letter to Lt Gov-ernor Anil Baijal, saying the theft points towards the rapidly "deteriorating" law and order situation in the national capital.

The incident had outraged AAP workers, many of whom posted videos of Kejriwal using the car, especially on Republic Day in 2014, after he became the chief minister of Delhi

for the first time.

The car was witness to two assembly election wins in 2013 and 2015 and also to the party's poor performance in the Lok Sabha polls. It was "donated" to Kejriwal by Kundan Shar-

ma, a software engineer, in January 2013. However, when Kejriwal parted ways with his then party colleagues Prashant Bhushan and Yogendra Yaday, Sharma demanded that

the vehicle be returned.

Even after Kejriwal became the chief minister in December 2013, he refused to use an official car and preferred his old Wagon R.

The video footage showed a man riding a motorcycle without a registration number apparently to conceal his identity

Singh said the sketches of the suspects have been released to trace them and requested peo-ple to provide information on them if they have

## France's Audrey Azoulay wins vote to be next UNESCO chief

PARIS, OCT 14 (AP): UNESCO's executive board has chosen former French Culture Minister Audrey Azoulay to be the UN cultural agency's next leader over a Qatari candidate in an unusually heated race over-shadowed by Mideast tensions.

The US announcement this week that it's quitting UNES-CO rocked the multi-day election and heightened concerns about the agency's funding and future direction.

Azoulay succeeds outgoing Director-General Irina Bokova of Bulgaria, whose eight-year term was marred by financial woes and criticism over Palestine's inclusion as a member.

On Thursday, the US and Israel said they plan to pull out of the Paris-based organisation over its perceived anti-Israel bias.



45-year-old stage to chants of "Audrey! Audrey!" following her victory and said the response to UNESCO's problems was to reform the agency, not to walk away an understat-ed rebuke of the US and Israel.

"In this moment of crisis. I believe we must invest in UNESCO more than ever, look to support and reinforce it, and to reform it. And not leave it," she said.

In a short address, she also thanked "the Executive Board member states that gave me their trust" in her surprise 30-28 vote win yesterday over Qatari candidate Hamad bin Abdulaziz al-Kawari.

UNESCO's general as-sembly will have to sign off next month on the executive board's leadership pick, but it's seen as a formality. The new director will set

priorities for the organisation best known for its World Heritage program to protect cul-tural sites and traditions. The agency also works to improve education for girls, promote an understanding of the Holo caust's horrors, defend media freedom and coordinate science about climate change.

had started the week's voting with much less support but built up backing as other candidates dropped out and won a runoff earlier Friday against Egypt's candidate.

The vote was a huge blow to Arab states, who had long wanted to lead the UN Educa tional, Scientific and Cultural Organisation.
UNESCO has previously had

European, Asian, African and American chiefs but never an Arab one since the organisation was founded in 1945 following World War II to promote world peace through culture.

The agency's inclusion of Palestine as a member state in 2011 complicated this push, as did Oatar's diplomatic dispute with Arab neighbours over accusations of sponsor-

ing Islamic extremism. Azoulay will be the second French leader of the organisa-tion since Rene Maheu, UNE-SCO's director general from 1961-74. Azoulay's father is Moroccan and was an influential adviser to Moroccan kings so she does have a connection

the Arab world.
"UNESCO is going through a profound crisis," Azoulay told journalists on Friday after making it to the final vote. "As a response to these diffi-culties, France has chosen not to leave but at the contrary to invest more ... because we believe in multilateralism. We believe in universal values."

Jewish groups took issue with al-Kawari's candidacy, citing a preface he wrote to a 2013 Arabic book called "Jerusalem in the Eyes of the Semitic. He wrote "We pray to God to liberate (Jerusalem) from captivity and we pray to God to give Muslims the hon-

our of liberating it."

In March, the Simon Wiesenthal Centre wrote an open letter to German Ambassador Michael Worbs, chair of the UNESCO Executive Board, to criticise the organisation for accepting al-Kawari's candidacy.

Azoulay's late entry into the leadership race in March annoyed many UNESCO member states who thought that since France hosts the Par-is-based agency it shouldn't field a candidate. Arab intellectuals urged French President Emmanuel Macron to withdraw his support for her.

The voting process itself was highly politicised.

## California fire toll rises to 33, winds cause concern

AN FRANCISCO, OCT 14 (AFP): The death toll from California's wild-fires has risen to 33 as firefighters made some progress in containing the infernos but said intensifying winds were a

"We're not out of this emergency, not even said Mark Ghilarducci, director of the California Governor's Office of Emergency Services.

"But we are seeing some progress in areas the fires have impacted," Ghilarducci told a news conference. "We'll get ahead of these flames." California fire chief Ken

Pimlott said more than 9,000 firefighters were battling 17 large fires that have consumed a total of 221,754 acres (89,700 hectares) since Sunday.

An estimated 5.700 structures have been destroyed by the wildfires, up from 3,500 reported on Wednesday, CAL FIRE said on its Twitter account.

The death toll rose

to 33 with a 14-year-old boy's body reportedly being recovered in Mendocino county near his family's home

"It appears he was at-tempting to evacuate the area on foot when he was overtaken by the fire," the Mendocino County Sheriff's office told the Ukiah

Daily Journal.
Sonoma County officials earlier yesterday reported another death, which had brought the total to 32.

"We have had some Pimlott said.

#### N Korea readies missile launch ahead of US-S Korea drill: report

SEOUL, OCT 14 (AFP): North Korea is believed to be preparing to launch a ballistic missile ahead of an upcoming joint na-val drill by the US and South Korea, a news report said today, citing a government source.

The US navy said vesterday that a US aircraft carrier will lead the drill in the coming week, a fresh show of force against North Korea as tensions soar over the hermit state's weapons programme.

The move will likely rile Pyongyang which has responded previously angrily to joint exercises.

The Donga Ilbo daily, quoting a government source, said satellite pictures show ballistic mis-siles mounted on launchers being transported out of hangars near Pyong-yang and in the North Phyongan Province.

The US and South Korean military officials suspect the North might be preparing to launch missiles capable of reaching the US territory, the newspaper said.

This could be the Hwasong-14 inter-continental ballistic missile (ICBM) whose range could extend to Alaska, or Hwasong-12 intermediate-range missiles which Pyongyang threatened to fire towards the US Pacific territory of Guam in August, the report said.

Another possibility is that the North might be preparing to test a new Hwasong-13 ICBM, it added, that has a longer maximum range than the other two missiles and could potentially reach the US West Coast. A defence ministry

spokesman declined to comment on the report, saving: "We don't comment on any matters of military intelligence".

"We are keeping a close watch over North," he added.

The joint drills led by the USS Ronald Reagan aircraft carrier come after hectic US military hardware movements around the Korean peninsula in recent days

These follow a flurry of missiles from Pyongyang, which conducted its sixth and most pow-erful nuclear test last month in defiance of international sanctions

Yesterday the nucle-ar-powered USS Michigan submarine arrived at the southern South Korean port of Busan, just days after another nucle ar-powered submarine -- the USS Tuscon -- left after a five day visit.

Earlier this week the

US flew two supersonic heavy bombers over the Korean peninsula, staging the first night- time joint aviation exercises with Japan and South Korea.

Lawyer Karen Koehler
said the woman, who has not
been named, has asked police and prosecutor to "put a halt on the investigation".

A letter posted on the lawyer's website goes on to say the woman would not testify in any criminal proceedings against Nelly.

The woman "wishes she

had not called 911 because she believes the system is go-ing to fail her" and she "wants this to end", the letter added.

"We do not live in a society where a 21-year-old college student can feel safe enough to pursue criminal charges against a celebrity for an alleged rape".

It says: "She never wanted notoriety. She never wanted a dime from that man. She wants to go back to school and to graduate. And this she cannot do if she remains hidden in her room, crying her heart out". Nelly, a Grammy-winning

rapper, was arrested early on Saturday last week. He was booked into jail on suspicion of second-degree rape and released later that day. His lawyer, Scott Rosenblum, wel-comed news of the letter.

"Her reckless accusation once investigated thoroughly,



was exposed for what it was - a fabrication. A fabrication that has caused Nelly and his family to suffer emotionally and financially," he said.

"I am suggesting that Nelly seeks a public apology. I am further suggesting that Nelly considers whatever legal options are available to him Nelly thanks his fans for their avering loyalty.
