No NOTA, but 2.83 lakh voters get to choose 584 rural reps next Friday

VISHNU NEOPANEY GANGTOK, 27 OCT:

The "None Of The Above" choice is not available to voters in rural Sikkim for the ensuing Panchayat elections in Sikkim. What they have instead is a plethora of options as they file into around 850 polling booths across the State next Friday to elect 584 new panchayat representatives (the remaining 563 having already been elevated to office uncontested). When contacted, the State

Election Commissioner, Nima Lhamu Yethenpa, explained that there are certain procedures and technicalities which need to be put in place to implement the Apex Court's directions to adopt the 'NOTA' option.

The concerned authority



for panchayat polls, the Rural Management & Development Department needs to bring in the required amendments to the concerned Act to begin this

This, clearly, is easier said than done, given that pancha-

yat election, despite slightly over 50% of wards having al-ready gone to the Sikkim Democratic Front uncontested, is a

in Sikkim. Voters in rural Sikkim, for instance, will be electing nearly 600 representatives on 03 November.

That said, the Commission has reportedly discussed the matter with the RM&DD and directed it that after the current election process is completed, the required amendments be brought to Sikkim Panchayati Raj Act to have the NOTA option included from the next election onwards.

For the ongoing exercise, the State Election Commission is neck deep in work at present to hold polls for 584 Gram and Zilla Panchayat wards (out of 1,038 Panchayat wards and 111 Zilla Panchayats) which need to go to polls. The rest have been won uncontested

SC allows Centre to withdraw force from trouble-hit Darjeeling

New Delhi, Oct 27 (PTI): The Supreme Court today permitted the Centre to withdraw seven of the 15 companies of Central Armed Paramilitary Forces (CAPF) from strife-torn Darjeeling and Kalimpong districts of West Bengal for deploy-ment in poll-bound states

of Himachal Pradesh and

Observing that law and order was a "state subject", a bench headed by Chief Justice Dipak Misra stayed the Cal-cutta High Court order restraining the Centre from relocating the para-military forces from the state's strife-torn districts and asked the state government to respond to the Centre's appeal

within a week.

The High Court had asked the Centre to allow all 15 companies of para-military forces to remain in the state.

The bench, which also comprised Justices A M Khanwilkar and D Y Chandrachud, said it would examine "under which jurisdiction, the High Court can ask central government to provide or not to provide

security forces".

"We will issue notice (to West Bengal govern-ment) let them file the reply. Meanwhile, we will stay the High Court pro-ceedings," the bench said, adding that it would examine the entire issue in a "holistic" manner.

Chamling leads SDF's panchayat campaign into South

The Sikkim Democrate The Sikkim Democratic Front campaign led by the party president, Chief Minister Pawan Chamling, for the upcoming panchayat elections reached South Sikkim today

Mr Chamling ad-dressed the public of Temi-Namphing and Barfung constituencies here at Lameytar in South Sikkim.

He highlighted that
the SDF has already se-

cured 52% of the pan-chayats uncontested by unanimous endorsement of the people and shared that the party was confident of sweeping the remaining 48% which will go to polls as well. He remarked that there was no opposition party strong enough to pose a serious challenge to the SDF in the State.

About the indepen-

dent candidates contest-ing against SDF candidates, he said that they were all from the SDF



party and were contesting as independents be-cause they failed to get a ticket from the party. He announced that such reb-el candidates should not expect a place back in the party even if they win in the election.

He called on the public to vote for candidates who can ensure development in their respective areas and come with a trackrecord of public service based on which SDF has selected its candidates.

"There were many

deserving candidates in our party but many did not get the ticket because there were others who

were even more deserv-ing. It was the right thing to do. We have to follow certain discipline and ideology while giving a responsibility to a person," he said.

"SDF party always follows rotation in dis-

tribution of party tickets and for this panchayat polls, we had to follow the population wise seat distribution and there

ervation therefore many deserving candidates got left out," he added.

Mr Chamling also accused the Bharatiya Janata Party in Sikkim of 'misleading' the people throughout eir election campaign. "BJP leaders are

playing the politics of caste and religion which should have no place in Sikkim," he said.

He pointed out how the Prime Minister was constantly applauding the developmental works of the SDF Government in Sikkim and asked the people

to contrast it against what BIP leaders of Sikkim were trying to project and draw their own conclusions.

"We approach the people on the plank of development," he said. The meeting was also ddressed by area MLA

Temi-Namphing, GM Gurung, and MLA Barfung, DD Bhutia.

priate space here, we will approach other places of Sikkim for school construction," Mr Singh informed.


The academy receives fi-nancial help from donations provided by individuals from various parts of country and across the globe as well.

It said constitution-al courts cannot remain "oblivious" to danger to lives of citizens as they are "at the zenith of pyramid" and there has to be some kind of arrange-ment to protect the lives of citizens.

Additional Solicitor General Maninder Singh, appearing for the Centre, said the government also takes decision in the interest of citizens to pro-

The law officer said if all the High Courts start ordering the Centre on deployment of forces, then a difficult situation would arise.

The bench, which posted the appeal of the Centre against the High Court order for further hearing on November 27, said the interim order allowing withdrawal

of seven companies of paramilitary force would remain in force till final adjudication of the case.

The apex court, on October 25, had agreed to hear the Centre's plea challenging the High Court order on with-

drawal of security forces.

The Calcutta High
Court had stayed the
withdrawal of Central Armed Paramilitary
Forces (CAPF) from the Darjeeling hills, the scene of unrest over the statehood demand, till October 27 after the state government approached it opposing the Centre's

It has been said that the Centre needed to deploy forces in the poll-bound states of Gujarat and Himachal Pradesh. Some forces also needed to be deployed along the borders of Jammu

and Kashmir and in the north-eastern states, it had said.

The high court had on In high court had on July 14 directed the Centre to deploy four more companies of CAPF in addition to the 11 that were already present in the hills then

The West Bengal gov ernment had written to the Centre seeking extended deployment of CAPF till December 25, but was told that of the 15 companies present, 10 would be withdrawn on October 15 and the rest by October 20.

The counsel for the central government had claimed that the situation in the Darjeeling hills had improved com-pared to July when the order on deployment of paramilitary contingents had been passed by the high court

No Country for Women

Repression of women remains disturbingly routine

 ${f A}$ ccepted, there is nothing new in what this piece Aheadlines. In fact, it is disturbingly routine. And yet, every once in while we collective dredge the bottom of the barrel when it comes to realities like this and hence arrive moments when we hold up the mirror and stare at our grotesqueness. In the present instance, the trigger is not another episode of misog-ynist violence but another reiteration of the disgusting straight face with which repression of women has been normalized in our country.

News arrived yesterday that the government of Madhya Pradesh has directed government schools there not to insist on the name of the biological fathers when rape victims bring their children for admission. Seriously? Schools are being administered by such louts that they insist that rape victims give the name of their rapists to their children? And this has been allowed to go on? (the MP govt's directions did, after all, come only now). And this, in all probability, will be held up as a progressive development. That is how regressive we remain as a country. And these practices continue because we remain stubbornly supportive of patriarchy and all its violent denials. So, we continue to ask for father's name for all documentations. Yes, some forms also accommodate the mother's name but it is still not an either-or choice. There is still no official document or identity you can acquire in our country solely on the basis of your mother's name. This is inexcusable because it perpetuates the belief that a woman follows the religion, community and nationality of the men in her life - father first and then the husband and has nothing to bequeath her children by way of official identity. When the idea of equal inheritance rights was mooted and passed, its essence was to end such misogyny but it has remained constricted to just a law on inheritance, not an attitude adjustment how the identity of women is seen and treated. Political and even public discourse in our country continues to see women primarily as daughters and mothers, very rarely as wives and never as friends, colleagues or equal partners. This is clearly a manifestation of a society that accepts male domination and is comfortable only when women are dependent, subservient and controlled. Check all these boxes and then they can also be respected.

So yes, there is something called Beti-Bachao, Beti-Padhao initiative underway across the country. But that, apart from sheer tokenism as has become rou-tine for the present dispensation in power, also fits in well with the showboating masculinities insistence that women be subservient and dependent. Seventy years since the nation became independent, we really should not be trying to save and educate our daughters, that should have been established on 15 August 1947 itself; by now we should have ensured that they were liberated. But we didn't. And we have not even kept them safe. They remain at risk not just from the depravity that walks too free anyone's comfort, but also stand exposed to the insensitive insistence of our obsolete and offensive laws and rules

Fats Domino: Rock 'n Roll's quiet rebel who defied US segregation

Rock'n'roll trailblazer Antoine "Fats" Domino has died, aged 89. With his beguiling smile, genial image and effervescent shuffle-boogie sound, it's hard to think of him as radical figure in American culture. Yet in the mid-1950s Domino was at the heart of a revolution that transformed western music and had profound social repercussions.
On May 4, 1956 Domino was head-

lining a rhythm and blues show at the American Legion Auditorium in Ro-anoke, Virginia. In keeping with the segregation laws of the day, whites and blacks were consigned to separate areas. On this occasion, African-American fans occupied the dance floor while 2,000 whites crammed into a balcony designed for about half that number. Some white fans tried to escape the crush by going downstairs to the less densely packed main floor where, as incredulous local journalists noted, they were spotted sharing seats and "actually dancing" with black rock and roll enthusiasts as Domino ran through an already extensive catalogue of hit songs.

The spectre of black and white bungsters defying southern segregation proved too much for some in the balcony, who began to hurl bot-tles down on the unexpectedly integrated scene below. After the show ended, an angry white crowd even pursued Domino and his fellow black performers back to the Dumas Hotel on Henry Street in the heart of Roa-noke's African-American community. Like other white southerners who opposed the spread of rock and roll music, the mob sensed that somehow this music - played by black and white musicians who drew on black rhythm and blues and white country and pop influences to craft a style that was adored by young black and white fans – represented a serious threat to the racial apartheid of the Jim Crow South. But it was too late. Thanks to Fats Domino and his fellow rock and rollers the integrated musical genie was out of the segregated bottle.

In 1950, the portly Domino had enjoyed his first hit with The Fat Man, a rollicking, good-natured ode to his amorous powers penned by his longtime collaborator, band leader and producer, Dave Bartholomew. With its pulsating piano and irresistible riffing horns, the recording pointed the way forward to what would soon become known as rock and roll.

But The Fat Man was only a hit on the rhythm and blues charts, which

essentially monitored the sales of recordings by black artists to over-whelmingly black audiences. Aside from occasional crossover hits by the likes of Louis Jordan and Nat King Cole, black artists rarely made much of an impression on the nominally white pop charts.

Within a few years, however, Domino was picking up significant sales among white audiences. In 1952, his number one rhythm and blues hit Goin' Home also made the pop charts, as did the deliciously maudlin Going to the River the following year.

By mid-decade, as Chuck Berry, Bo Diddley, Elvis Presley, Jerry Lee Lewis and countless other black and white acts secured major hits on both sides of the racial divide, Domino's career was in full swing. "A lot of people seem to think I started this business. But rock 'n' roll was here a long time before I came along," Presley told reporters in 1957. "Let's face it," he conceded, "I can't sing like Fats Domino can, I know that,"

Despite falling victim to the cover nenomenon, whereby white artists released versions of his new recordings hoping to capture the white pop market, many of Domino's classic tracks, among them Ain't that a Shame, Blueberry Hill, I'm Walkin' and Whole Lotta Loving, were major pop as well as huge rhythm and blues hits

By the end of the decade Domino was the most commercially successful of all black pop stars, earning some \$700,000 annually from live perfor-mances, record sales, publishing roy-

alties (he wrote or co-wrote many of his recordings) and appearances in a string of rock and roll movies such as The Girl Can't Help It, Jamboree and Shake, Rattle and Roll

CROSSOVER PRODIGY

In many ways Domino was a perfect crossover artist. His life and his music brought together many different strands in American culture. He was born of French Creole parentage on February 26 1928 in New Orleans, a city he celebrated in songs such as Walking to New Orleans and where he lived the vast majority of his life. He even survived Hurricane Katrina in 2005, when he had to be rescued by helicopter from the roof of his ru-ined home in the Lower Ninth Ward. He lost all his possessions in the flooding, including his National Med-al of Arts, which was later replaced by President George W Bush.

Domino was something of a child piano prodigy. He played local gigs from the age of 10, building up a solid local reputation before he signed to Imperial Records in late 1949 and began his incredibly productive relationship with Bartholomew. Stylistically, he was influenced by the rampaging boogie-woogie piano stylings of Albert Ammons and Amos Milburn, but he softened his sound with more ornate flourishes borrowed from Crescent City jazz legend Professor Longhair.

Similarly, the powerful horns that drove forward many of Domino's finest tracks, often with saxophonist Lee

Allen at the helm, were set against warm, honey-dew vocals that never quite lost their supple Creole intonation. He was also adept at reworking mainstream pop idioms (listen to Valley of Tears from 1957) and an enormous fan of country music. When he took Hank Williams's Jambalaya (On The Bayou) into the pop charts in 1962, the hybrid seemed to make

perfect sense.
By 1962, however, Domino's glory years were already behind him. Like many of his fellow rock and roll pio-neers, he struggled to meet the challenge posed by a whole host of ano-dyne teen idols in the early 1960s and then with the aftermath of the British invasion spearheaded by the Beatles in 1964. Yet his influence endured. The first record George Harrison ever bought was Domino's 1956 pop and rhythm and blues crossover hit I'm In Love Again, In 1968, the Beatles's Lady Madonna was essentially Paul McCartney's homage to Domino's seminal 1950s work.

In 1975, Ain't that a Shame reap-peared on John Lennon's Rock'n'Roll album, just as it had in the 1973 hit film American Graffiti, George Lucas's love letter to the teenage America of the late 1950s and early 1960s. It was an era to which Domino's music pro-vided a joyous soundtrack, while creating a musical legacy that ultimately transcends time and place.

As Britain's poet laureate Carol Ann Duffy put it in her 2003 tribute to the singer: "Dominus, dominum, domine, Domino!"



The world speaks the language of men, but after #MeToo women must find their voice

t will be gratifying to many women to see the spread of the #MeToo campaign, prompted by the revelations from dozens of women who have accused Holly-wood producer Harvey Weinstein of acts of sexual assault since the 1980s. Millions of women across the world have joined the campaign, breaking their silence on a shared experience of sexual harassment and assault.

The fact that it took a shared, global,

voice to begin talking about the sexism that still underpins our society shows how difficult it is for lone voices to stand against abuses of male power and privilege. This is not just about Weinstein or the film industry. If some of Hollywood's most influential women - among them Gwyneth Paltrow, Angelina Jolie, Ashley Judd, Reese Witherspoon - were compelled to stay silent for so long, what chance do most women have to speak truth to power? The recent murder of the Maltese jour-

nalist and blogger Daphne Caruana Galiz-ia, killed by a car bomb near her home, is another example of the difficulty and danger involved in pursuing the truth. Carua-na Galizia was an outspoken critic on her native island of Malta, using her blog to expose what she saw as the corruption all

Caruana Galizia also often drew attention to the problematic representation of women in Malta and the government's inability to endorse positive female role models, levelling criticism at a society in which women should be seen and not heard. In 2014 she drew attention to how

Malta had slipped to 99th place out of 142 in global rankings on gender equality, placing it below Azerbaijan, Bangladesh, Zimbabwe and Kazakhstan. Now Malta many, the only person, who dared to speak truth to power.

SHARED PAIN, SHARED SILENCE

Should we be surprised by the murder of a leading journalist, described by her fam-

ily as the outcome of a "long witch hunt"? Or to learn that dozens of Hollywood celebrities, and those they confided in, felt compelled to keep secret the sexual predations of a Hollywood producer?

Female voice has long been seen as dan-gerous, deviant, and and untrustworthy. My own work is often concerned with the careers of the first women in Britain

who made writing their profession, and who sought to make their voices heard in a male-dominated world.

Women like Aphra Behn, Eliza Hay-wood, Susannah Centlivre and Delarivier Manley wrote some of the first novels in England, Britain's first journalism, and the most popular plays of the century. Their work was widely read and hugely influential. But they were sneered at in their age on account of their gender. Women, many claimed, shouldn't write, and certainly shouldn't write for the public.

Virginia Woolf famously wrote that "all

upon the tomb of Aphra Behn, for it was she who earned them the right to speak their minds". But Behn herself conceded that the voice of professional writers was gendered male.

In the preface to her play, The Luckey Chance (1687), she requested "the Priviledge for my Masculine Part the Poet in me ... to tread in those successful Paths my



Predecessors have so long thriv'd in", before going on to note that: "If I must not, because of my Sex, have this Freedom, ... I lay down my Quill, and you shall hear no more of me ... because I will be kinder to my brothers of the Pen, than they have been to a defenceless Woman." Behn's words speak clearly to the gendered inequalities of the

professional literary marketplace.
In almost every work written by a woman that I read, the author is forced to publicly negotiate her relationship to ideas of truth. This is especially the case when that woman writes about her life,

and comments directly on the effects of the society in which she lives. One example is found in the memoirs written by the Duchess of Mazarin in the 1670s. Even though she was a powerfully-connected aristocrat, Mazarin addresses her reader directly to acknowledge the expectation that women remain silent: "I know the chief Glory of a Woman ought to consist in not making herself to be publicly talked

of. And those that know me, know like-wise, that I never too much pleasure in things that make too much Noise. But it is not always in our choice to live our own way."

Do women have any

more public credibility now than when Maza-rin wrote these words? A survey of US university undergraduates by Benjamin Schmidt

suggests not. Schmidt's database of responses draws upon 14m reviews from the Rate My Professors website to show the differing usage of words according to the gender of the academic reviewed. Positive terms like "smart", "inreviewed. Positive terms like smart, in-tellect", "genius" are far more widely used to describe male academics, while nega-tive terms like "bossy", "shrill", "strict" and "demanding" are far more often applied to those that are women.

TACKLING THE CAUSE,

NOT THE SYMPTOM
Earlier this year the UN launched a major campaign, #stoptherobbery, to address

the pay gap that leads women to be underpaid - robbed - on average 23% of their income compared to men performing the same work. It was an inequality that was also exposed with the recent publication of the salaries of the BBC's highest earners. Inequality is most visible when it can be measured in easily quantifiable ways, like the pay cheques people take home. Yet while the UN's campaign is laudable, it addresses a symptom of gender inequality rather than its cause.

The pioneering work of Australian feminist Dale Spender in the 1970s and 80s showeded how the world we live in is one described and negotiated through a male-centred language. This is a language in which "man comes to stand in for hu-manity", "words reserved for women are derivations/deviations from the word for men (actress, woman)" and in which we can immediately perceive sexual double standards in attitudes towards the same behaviour across the genders (for example in the linguistic equivalence of "stud"

How do women find equality in a world governed by a male-centred language, and the male-centred structures it upholds? Equal pay would help, but that won't change the root of the problem. The most important step is to find a voice. But that, it seems, is still proving hard, and history is set against us. How many more women will lose jobs, reputations, and even their lives in the struggle to make themselves heard?



KOLKATA, OCT 27 (PTI): A riveting contest is on the cards when England and Spain lock horns in the first-ever all- European summit clash of the FIFA Under-17 World Cup which will have a new champion Saturday after a record-breaking tournament.

After three weeks of high intensity and top quality football, only England and Spain remain in contention for the top honour. And both sides will be seeking their maiden title when they come out in front of the full-capacity 66,000-odd crowd at the Salt Lake Stadium tomorrow.

A goal feast can be expected from two
of the most aggressive sides in the tournament. While England have scored 18 goals
so far, Spain have 15 to their credit.
England are playing in their maiden fi-

England are playing in their maiden final in their fourth appearance while Spain have featured as losing finalists on three earlier occasions in 1991, 2003 and 2007.

It will be a repeat of the European U-17 Championship match in Croatia in May when Spain had emerged winners on a penalty shootout after a 2-2 stalemate in the regulation time and the Three Lions will be looking for revenge tomorrow.

A win for England will also herald an unprecedented year for their colts as their Under-20 team had won the World Cup in Korea earlier this year while their Under-19 side were the European champions. In its bid to wake up a "sleeping giant",

In its bid to wake up a "sleeping giant", the FIFA had allotted this U-17 World Cup to India in December 2013, but this edition is turning out to be record-breaking one in terms of most spectator attendance and number of goals.

With two matches -- the third place playoff and the final -- remaining, the total number of spectators from the 50 matches so far has already logged 1,224,027 which



is a mere 6949 less than the earlier record attendance of 1,230,976 in the first edition of the tournament in China in 1985.

With the Kolkata crowd expected to turn up in large numbers in the third place match between Brazil and Mali as well, this tournament is set to become the most attended of any FIFA U-17 or U-20 tournament.

It is likely to go past the 13,09,929 spectator mark that turned up in the 2011 Colombia edition of the FIFA U-20 World Cup

Cup.

This India edition is also set to become the highest scoring tournament with 170 goals from 50 matches so far, just two goals behind the earlier highest of 172 during the 2013 edition in the United Arab Emirates.

With three more goals from the remaining two matches, this edition will have the best goal average since the format was changed in 2007 to a 24-team affair from the earlier 16- team participation.

from the earlier 16- team participation.
On form, there is very little to differentiate between the two though England

may start slight favourites having shocked pre-tournament favourites Brazil in the semifinals while also having played all but one of their six earlier matches at the same stadium.

England also is the only unbeaten side in the tournament while Spain had lost to Brazil in their campaign-opener.

England's only blemish so far had been their inability to beat Japan in the regulation time in the pre-quarterfinals though they won through penalty shootout. Spain and England have now met three times in the final of European U-17 Cham-

Spain and England have now met three times in the final of European U-17 Championships. The 'La Rojita' were triumphant in 2007, before the Three Lions took their revenge three years later. The Spaniards once more emerged victorious in May, but only after a nail-biting climax.

In the European final, England had almost won the title but Spain grabbed an equaliser from the last kick of the match in the injury-added time before prevailing over their opponents in the penalty shootout 4-1.

Both sides enjoy possessing the ball for



long but Spain, famous for their tika-taka style, will no doubt have more possession as they have been doing all through the tournament.

There will also be some individual battles to fight between star England striker Rhian Brewster and his Spain counterpart and captain Abel Ruiz both of who have single- handedly taken their sides to the final

Brewster, who sent Brazil packing with his second hat- trick of the tournament, and Ruiz, whose double strike against Mali sealed a summit clash spot for Spain, have scored seven and six goals respectively and they are in the running for the Golden Boot Award.

England are expected to play their tried and tested 4-2- 3-1 formation with Curtis Anderson between the sticks behind the back four ably marshaled by captain Joel Latibeaudiere, Marc Guehi, Jonathan Panzo and Steven Sessegnon.

Coach Steve Cooper is expected to start with Tashan Oakley Boothe and George McEachran at the central midfield

while putting Callum Hudson Odoi and Philip Foden at the flanks. Morgan Gibbs White should be behind center forward

Spain, packed with players from famous academies of FC Barcelona and Real Madrid, started with 4-3-3 formation against Brazil and continued it till the pre-quarterfinal match against France. But coach Santiago Deni later changed it to 4-2-3-1 formation the same as England in the quarterfinals and semifinals.

Juan Miranda, Hugo Guillamon, Victor Chust and Mateu Jaume Morey have been the preferred back four for coach Deni while Cesar Gelabert, Antonio Blanco and Mohamed Moukhliss would be at the midfield to support center forward Ruiz and wingers Sergio Gomez and Ferran Torres.

Valencia starlet Torres has been in great form with his mesmerizing runs down on the right flank while Real Madrid youth team player Gelabert has been the assist master of his side. Ruiz scored both his goals against Mali in the semifinals from assists by Gelabert.

Rijiju inaugurates centre for disaster research at JNU

The shooter, though, managed to pull off good scores when he really needed them.

As luck would have it, an 8.1 in the 22nd shot for the bronze medal proved good enough for Amanpreet. In total, he shot 10 and above five times in the final.

This was India's first individual medal in the ongoing edition of the prestigious tournament.

When an airport shuts runway and halts flights for God!

THIRUVANANTHAPURAM, OCT 27 (PTI): Is there any airport in the world which closes its runway and reschedules flight operations for a centuries-old temple procession to pass?

The international airport in Kerala's capital may be the only one of its kind which has been stopping flight operations and rearranging flight schedules twice every year for several decades as part of the annual festivals of the famed Sree Pad-

manabha Swamy Temple here.

The flight operations to and from the airport here would come to a halt for five hours when "Aarattu," the ritual bath procession of temple idols, passes through its runway on the final day of the 10-day 'Painkuni' and 'Alpassi' festivals (celebrated during the Tamil months of Painkuni and

Alpassi months respectively) of the shrine. The airport issues a NOTAM (Notice to

The airport issues a NOTAM (Notice to Airmen), a notice containing information concerning the establishment, condition or change in any facility, service or procedure, among others, in airspace management, in this regard a week ahead of the procession, airport sources here said.

Armed CISF personnel stand guard on both sides of the runway when the idols pass to take a ritualistic bath in the nearby Shangumugham Beach crossing the airport premises.

After the 'holy bath', the procession

After the 'holy bath', the procession goes back to the temple through the same route in the night with an escort of people carrying burning 'theevettis' (traditional fire lamps).

As this year's 'Aarattu' procession, marking the culmination of the ongoing

'Alpassi' festival at the Lord Padmanabha Temple, would be held tomorrow evening, flight operations at the airport were scheduled to be cancelled between 4 and 9 p.m, airport authorities said.

According to the temple management, the procession moves through the airport runway as the area is part of the traditional 'aarattu route' through which it has been passing for several centuries to reach the beach.

The procession used to pass through the same route even before the airport was established in the year 1932, they said.

The temple issues special passes to participants in the 'aarattu' as it passes through the high security airport area, they added.

Thiruvananthapuram Airport Director

George G Tharakan said NOTAM is usually issued a week before the procession date, so that flight operators worldwide are aware of the need to change the schedule.

"I do not think, such a practise is followed anywhere in the world...The runway will be closed completely and all flight operations, both domestic and international, will be halted for five hours. It is time when modernity meets tradition," he told PTI.

Detailing the security arrangements, the director said, people are allowed inside during the procession based on the special passes issued by the temple management. "They give us a list of participants, to

"They give us a list of participants, to whom they issue passes. Only such persons are permitted inside airport premises. Strict security checks, both by CISF and Kerala police personnel will be carried out at the

entrance. CISF personnel guard the runway when the procession passes," he said.

Temple authorities would be requested to clear the airport premises completely by 8.45 pm after the procession returns and the NOTAM would be withdrawn and flight operations would resume by 9:pm, Tharakan added.

The procession carrying temple idols on decorated vehicles escorted by priests, members of the erstwhile Travancore Royal family, caparisoned elephants, police band and armed and mounted police personnel besides large number of devotees,

is a grand spectacle for onlookers.

The present head of Travancore Royal family, Moolam Tirunal Rama Varma would lead the procession carrying the ceremonial sword and wearing the traditional green cap, the royal symbols.

Pak govt revives plan to shift Army headquarters to Islamabad

ISLAMABAD, OCT 27 (PTI): The Pakistan government has revived plans to shift the General Headquarters (GHQ) of the country's powerful Army from Rawalpindi to Islamabad and the military would provide Rs 100 billion for the ambitious project, according to a top defence official.

Briefing the Senate Standing Committee on Defence yesterday, De-fence Secretary Lt Gen (retd) Zamirul Hassan said that 2,450 acres of land has been allocated for building a defence complex in Islamabad, the Express Tribune reported.

He also said that for this purpose 5,000 families would be relocated to a different place. Hassan said the defence complex would be built at a cost of Rs 100 billion and the money would be provided by the Army.

The plan to relocate the GHQ had been under study since 1970. However, the plan was shelved around October 2008 to 2009, at the instructions of then Army chief Gen Ashfaq Pervez Kayani, due to financial constraints.

In 2009, six terror-

ists wearing Army uni-forms launched a brazen assault on the General Headquarters, sparking an hour- long battle. Pakistani troops repelled the assault. Six soldiers four terrorists were killed during the fighting.

The powerful Army which enjoys considerable influence over policy decisions in Pakistan has ruled the country for much of its life since it gained independence 70 years ago. Briefing the panel on the eastern border, Lt Gen (retd) Hassan alleged that India has violated ceasefire along the Working Boundary and Line of Control 1,299 times in 2017.

Speaking about the security of Pak-Afghan porous border, he said the two neighbours share 2,611-kilometre long

"Pakistani military has 975 posts along the border, while Afghan se-curity forces have only 218 posts," he said. "On the other hand, there is no military post along the 650-kilometre- long border between the two countries in Balochistan."

The defence secretary told the lawmakers that 73 wings of the Frontier Constabulary were being raised for the manage ment of the Pak-Afghan

'If Pak fails to act against terrorists, US will get it donein a different way'

WASHINGTON, OCT 27 (PTI): The Trump administration has firmly told Pakistan that if it fails to take "decisive" actions against terror groups, the US will "adjust" its tactics and strategies to achieve the objective in a "different way", a State Department official today said.

Secretary of State Rex Tillerson has told Pakistan that it must take action against terrorist groups and dismantle their safe havens on its soil, State Department spokesperson Heather Nauert told PTI, a day after Tillerson concluded his maiden trip to Afghanistan, Pakistan and India.

'We have communicated our exto Pakistan numerous times that they must take decisive action against terrorist groups based within their own borders, Nauert said.
At a news conference in Geneva,

his last stop on the current foreign travel, Tillerson said the US had "a very healthy exchange of information on terrorists, which is what we really hope to achieve with Pakistan." Tillerson said the message to Pa-



Pakistan to do. We re asking you to do this; we re not demanding anything. You re a sovereign country. You ll decide what you want to do, but understand this is what we think is necessary. And if you don t want to do that, don t feel you can do it, we ll adjust our tactics and our strategies to achieve the same objective a different way."

Tillerson said that he would not characterise his direct discussions with the Pakistani leadership as lec-

"It was a very good and open exchange. In fact, we probably listened 80 per cent of the time and we talked 20 per cent. And it was important to me, because I have not engaged with Pakistani leadership previously. And, so my objective was to listen a lot, to hear their perspective," he said.
"We put our points forward. We

put our expectations forward in no uncertain terms. There has been significant engagement prior to my visit, and there will be further engagement in the future, as we work through how we want to exchange information and achieve the objective of eliminating these terrorist or ganisations, wherever they may be located. Tillerson said.

Tillerson described his commu-nication with the Pakistani leader-

ship as very frank and very candid. "We had the joint meeting with Prime Minister Abbasi and the full leadership team. And then I had a second meeting with Army General Bajwa and a couple of his close advisers, so we could have a more thorough discussion about some of the specifics," he said, adding that he thinks that it was a very open, candid and frank exchange.

"There's nothing to be achieved by lecturing, but we should be very clear about expectations and what we re asking.

And either people will step up and meet those expectations or they won t. We are going to chart our course consistent with what Paki-stan not just says they do but what they actually do," Tillerson said.

Noting that the future course of action would be based on conditions on the ground, he said the entire South Asia strategy is a condi-

tions-based strategy.
Pakistan Foreign Minister Khawaja Asif in a meeting yesterday with National Assembly Standing Committee on Foreign Affairs said that Pakistan will neither surrender to the US nor compromise on its sovereignty. Asif claimed that no specific "wish list" has been given to Pakistan by the US.

The US has given a list of 75 want-ed terrorists and pressed Islamabad for going tough on Haggani network.

Responding to a question on Asif comments, the State Department spokesperson said that Tillerson on his trip has put the US' "expectations" in front of the leadership of Pakistan. The spokesperson said that Tillerson during his visit to Pa-kistan told its leadership that America wants to work with Pakistan in a "positive way" because it is also in Islamabad's interest in long-term.

India-NKorea ties could act as conduit for communications: Tillerson

ENEVA/NEW DELHI, OCT 27 (PTI): India's diplomatic ties with North Korea could act as a 'conduit for communications', US Secretary of State Rex Tillerson has said amidst tensions between Washington and Pyongyang over the latter's nuclear missile tests.

India had informed the US that it has "minimal" trade with North Korea, and that there was a small Indian embassy in Pyongyang which should stay there so that some channels of communication remain open.

The issue figured during talks between External Affairs Minister Sushma Swaraj and Tillerson during his visit to India on Wednesday. Answering a question about India's refusal to close its embassy in Pyongyang, Tillerson said: "I think they just



indicated they think that office has a value as a conduit for communications"

Asked if he agreed with that assessment, he replied: "It could. It might", according to the transcription of Tillerson's interview in Geneva.

Trade between India and North Korea amounted to USD

130 million in 2016-17 but in the current fiscal year it stands at USD 10.95 million, according to official data. India banned all trade with North Korea, except food and medicine, from April, in line with UN sanctions over North Korea's nuclear tests.

Tillerson said the US wants to find new ways to partner with India and other likeminded countries in Asia.
"I had a very comprehensive

discussion on economic and security links with Prime Minister (Narendra) Modi, National Security Advisor (Ajit) Doval, and Foreign Affairs Minister (Sushma) Swaraj. It is essential that our two democracies work together to address the challenges facing our people.

"The US has had positive re-lations with India for 70 years

but it is never quite moved to that next level, and I think that is in part due to on both sides,"

President Donald Trump and North Korean leader Kim Jong- un have traded increasingly threatening and personal insults as Pyongyang races to-wards its goal of developing a nuclear- tipped missile capable of reaching the US.

Tensions have dramatically risen on the Korean peninsula after North Korea, early in September, conducted its biggest nuclear test, which its state-run KCNA news agency described as a hydrogen bomb.

Nuclear-armed North Korea in August fired a ballistic missile over Japan in a major escalation by Pyongyang amid tensions over its nuclear ambitions.

Taylor Swift and Joseph Khan released today.

The duo, who previously collaborated on "Blank Space," "Bad Blood," "Wildest Dreams," "Out of the Woods" and
"Look What You Made Me Do," teamed up to create "...Ready for It?," the second music video from Swift's forthcoming sixth studio album, Reputation (available Nov. 10).

Kahn has directed music videos for some of the biggest musicians in the world, including Christina Aguilera, Blink-182, Mariah Carey, Em-inem, Maroon 5, Shakira and what's Britney Spears.

Swift teased the first footage from her "...Ready for It?" music video via Instagram Monday. Kahn later tweeted it featuring some "homages" to anime: "Some obvious, some not so obvious."

The video, rumored to be inspired by scifi movies like Blade Runner 2049 and Ghost in the Shell, features a scene in which Swift stands on a platform that reads: "They're Burning All the Witches." In that moment, she strikes a pose—as if nailed to a cross—and then emits lightning.
