Women's Commission Chairperson shocked by stories of police atrocities in the Hills

KALIMPONG, 17 APR:
Rekha Sharma, the
Chairperson of the National Commission for Women, visited Kalimpong today to under-stand problems faced by women during the Gorkhaland agitation of last year which had lasted for 105 days.

After collecting com-plaints of the women here, she assured to forward these to the Cen-tral government and the President of India.

Many women who have been seeking justice came to meet her at Hotel Mayfair here near the District Magistrate's office. They could be seen lining up since 10 in the morning to call on the NCW Chairperson.
After hearing out

the horrors of police atrocity shared by the womenfolk, Ms Sharma remarked that it felt as if she was not even in 'Independent India'.

"After coming here, I don't think I am in India or Independent India, and I don't think police here is for people's as-



sistance. The police here is working like an agent, getting orders from getting orders from somewhere else. After hearing the stories, I can say that there is no democracy in the hills," she

that the District Magistrate of Darjeeling initial-ly refused to even meet her, and eventually did after her tweet about the snub went viral.

The Chairperson said that the DM Darjeeling had 'no answers' to her questions.

ATMs across the country go dry, govt steps in to allay fears

NEW DELHI, APR 17 (PTI): Unusual spurt in currency demand in states like Uttar Pradesh, Madhya Pradesh, Andhra Pradesh as well as poll-bound Karnataka led to dry ATMs in several parts of the country, sending the government scrambling to make contingency plans to cover the

The government said it suspects that Rs 2,000 notes were being hoarded and plans to increase -fold the printing of Rs 500 notes.

Within a month, it said, Rs 70,000-75,000 crore will be printed.

The Reserve Bank said the printing of currency has been ramped up in all the four note presses, and the shortage in some pockets is due to logistical issues.

ATMs of both public and private sector lenders in several cities were either not operating or showed no cash signs. a situation that officials insisted was not alarm-ing and did not warrant

I will definitely make it a point to reach these complaints to the central government and I will give these complaints to the President of India as well. The Central government will do something about it," she said further.

She added that if police committed the atrocities on their own behest then an inquiry should have taken place by now

When asked why she did not visit the hills during 105 days of strife, Sharma said that she was not allowed to do so, 'I was not allowed to come this time as well, I had to write a letter stating that if anything happens to me here, the state govern-ment would be responsible which I had forwarded to the Chief secretary along with the D.G, only then I was provided with the security' she said. IAF conducts drill close to China border

(U'KHAND), APR 17 (PTI): The ongoing nationwide mega-combat exercise of the Indian Air Force (IAF) began in Uttarakhand's Uttarkashi district today to examine the strategic preparedness of its infrastructure in the area

Though IAF officials maintained a distance from the media, sources said the exercise -- 'Gagan Shakti' -- began around 6.30 am at Chinyalisaur town, 230km from the

Indo-China border.
The first An-32 transport aircraft carrying IAF personnel landed at the Chinyalisaur airstrip around 7.15 am. The aircraft made a second landing at the airstrip at 7.45 am and a third at 8.01 am, the sources said

The exercise would continue in Chinyalisaur till Sunday, it added.

'Gagan Shakti' is said to be the IAF's biggest such exercise in decades, to check its operational preparedness with a fo-cus on dealing with all possible security chal-lenges, including from China and Pakistan.

The two-week drill started on April 8 and would continue till the 22nd of this month, officials had said.

Last Saturday, the IAF

conducted a maritime air operation in the western sea board to check its deep strike capability in the Indian Ocean Region

Law panel proposes tough legal framework for simultaneous polls

New Delhi, Apr 17 (PTI): Simultaneous elections to Lok Sabha and state assemblies can be held in two phases beginning 2019, provided at least two provisions of the Constitution are amended and ratified by majority of the states, the Law Commission said to-

day. Some provisions of Representation of the People Act will also have to be amended by a simple majority in Parliament, it said.

Putting up its working paper on holding simultaneous polls in public domain today, the law panel has sought the views of constitutional experts, political parties and other stakeholders before finalising its re-

interested Those in placing their views on the issue have been asked to submit their

stand by May 8.

According working paper, the second phase of simultane-ous polls can take place in 2024.

The document states that the leader of the majority party be elected prime minister or the chief minister by the entire house (Lok Sabha or state assembly) to ensure the stability of the government as well as the Lok Sabha or the assembly.

The document has proposed amending the Constitution (Articles (Articles 83 (2) and 172 (1) dealing with tenures of Lok Sabha and state assemblies) and the Representation of the People Act to extend the terms of state legislative assemblies to effect the move.

It suggests that in case a government falls mid-term, the term of the new government would

be for the remaining period "and not for a fresh five-year term".

"As an ahundant caution and in order to avoid a challenge (in the courts) to amendments on the ground of not having obtained ratification by majority of the states, such ratification could be obtained for the proposed (constitutional) amendment," the work-

ing paper states.

The states which are recommended to be covered under phase I are where assembly polls are due in 2021. These include Andhra Pradesh, Assam, Bihar, Madhya Pradesh and Maharash-

States which will come under phase II are Uttar Pradesh, Gujarat, Karnataka, Delhi and Punjab. To hold elections in these states with Lok Sabha polls, the terms of the assemblies

have to be extended.

Based on a sugges-tion made by the Election Commission, the working paper also says that a no-confidence motion against the government should be followed by a confidence motion. This would ensure that if the opposition does not have numbers to form an alternative government, the regime in office cannot be removed.

Chief Election Commissioner Om Prakash Rawat had a word of caution on simultaneous polls when he recently said that the legal frame-work required for holding of the two elections together would take a lot

of time to get ready.

"We cannot put the cart before the horse. Logistical issues are sub-servient to legal framework. Unless legal framework is in place, we don't have to talk about anything else because legal framework will take a lot of time, making con-stitutional amendment (changing) the law, all the process will take time, he said.

He had said once the legal framework is ready, the EC would deliver, EC is a creation of the Constitution. We have to perform willy-nilly, deliver the election, whatever way prescribed in the law, he had said.

Surrendered HP-C(D) militants get Rs 3 lakh each

AIZAWL, APR 17 (PTI): All the 114 militants arms on April 13, have received Rupees three lakh each as part of the rehabilitation package, a senior Home department official said.

The surrender of the Hmar People's Convention (Democratic) leaders and cadres followed the signing of the memorandum of settlement by the Mizoram government and the outfit in Aizawl on April 2 last.

The surrendered militants have returned to their respective villages, the official said.

The Hmar rebels had laid down 45 weapons, including four sniper rifles, one grenade launcher, nine AK assault rifles, one M-16 carbine assault rifle and 13 double-barrel guns.

They had also surrendered 2,892 rounds of ammunition, launcher shells and five radio sets on April 13. The surrendered weapons were hand-ed over to state Home Minister R. Lalzirliana.

Tourism for Sikkim, Not Gangtok Alone

Relax rules, improve roads and the industry will boom by itself

For a while now, tourism has been projected as the sector which could solve Sikkim's unemployment problems and deliver an economic model which will lead to a proliferation of self-employed/ satisfactorily employed and confident youth. Anyone who has seen the frenetic business that tourists generate in Gangtok will agree that this is a sector with staggering potential if the Gangtok traffic can be replicated to the remaining three districts as well. When Sikkim broke the 7 lakh mark in 2010-11 when 7.13 lakh tourist arrivals were registered, it began hosting more tourists than its resident population. Take a look around, most new constructions are for hotels and many old buildings are being refurbished for the hospitality sector, when till only a few years ago, most constructions used to be designed for tenants. This number dipped in the wake of the September 2011 earthquake, but that was a temporary blip and the numbers climbed again until a fresh Aandolan dried up the season last year. But the travel trade is recovering again and the approaching summer should be a good one for the industry.

The figures are undeniably impressive, and if the sector is provided some professional promotion and is backed by adequate infrastructure, will definitely multiply in even smarter clip. Tourism in Sikkim, few will contest, has essentially grown more from positive word-of-mouth promotion than any serious and organized attempt at promotion. This is also evident from the fact that tourist traffic is hogged by East district [read Gangtok] because it is the best connected even though it is the other three districts which offer more touristically satisfying holidays. For instance, of the 6.88 lakh domestic tourists who holidayed in Sikkim in 2010-11, 4.86 lakh visited Only Gangtok, with the remaining sliver being shared by the other three districts. The only reason why the real Sikkim received a minority share of tourist traffic is obviously because of lack of adequate promotion and infrastructural limitations. No matter how pretty a destination, it will not receive visitors if no one knows about it, just as irrespective of the appeal of a place, tourists will not come if the roads are unreliable.

To reinforce this point, one needs to go over tour ism statistics for the districts. North Sikkim cornered a substantial chunk of the tourist traffic [after East Sikkim], and broke the one lakh mark in 2006-07 when 1,07,865 tourists [East received 4.62 lakh tourists that year] made it there. This came in the wake of relaxations in travel restrictions to the district, opening of Thangu and Gurudongmar to tourists, improvements in services offered by tourism stakeholders there and the general improvements in roads and etiquette. The graph kept increasing till 2009-10 when 1.41 lakh tourists made it to North Sikkim. And then the North Sikkim Highway was littered with landslides and mon-soon disruptions through 2010 and 2011 with the latter year also receiving the Earthquake and the number halved to 65,564 in 2010-11 and fell even lower for 2011-12. Now, let's look at South Sikkim which was shunned by tourists, notching only 1,606 domestic tourist arrivals in 2006-07. It scratched the bottom of the barrel in tourist share, and in 2009-10, when Sikkim received 6.17 lakh domestic tourists, South Sikkim was visited by only 6,167. In 2010, however, as roads in North Sikkim started acting up, South acquired a new tourist spot in the form of the Siddhesvara Dham which added to the Guru Padmasambhava statue at Samdruptse and the reasonably developed tourism infrastructure at Rabangla. In 2010-11, South Sikkim recorded a ten-fold jump in tourist arrivals at 68,118, overtaking North Sikkim, and within sniffing distance of the consistently well-performing tourist destination of West Sikkim [which received 68,436 tourists]. South Sikkim now has the Tathagata Tsal at Rabongla added to its tourist destination bouquet, and with these, it stands to grow from a bystander to a major stakeholder of the tourism pie in Sikkim. And then there is the Rongli-Kupup-Gnathang sector which has grown impressively without anyone noticing. This growth happened with relaxations in permits and improvement in roads. A drive on that scenic route stuns not only with its landscape but also the number of hotels and homestays that have come up there. It could be argued that more tourists visit that area than even locals of Sikkim.

It is obvious that the tourism potential of the districts has barely been scratched thus far. With the required attention paid to promotion, road networks, travel arrangements and tourist-friendly regulations the districts can grow at least to the level of Gangtok in tourist arrivals. The benefits of such a growth are obvious and worth pursuing..

HAVE A STORY TO SHARE OR A COMMENT TO MAKE?

Bearing witness to Cambodia's horror, 20 years after Pol Pot's death

Twenty years ago, on April 15, 1998, Pol Pot, the leader of Cambodia's genocidal government during the late 1970s, died in his sleep at the age of 73. Born Saloth Sar, Pol Pot was never held accountable for the crimes committed during the three years, eight months and 20 days his Khmer Rouge government subjected the Cambodian population to a reign of terror. Almost 2 million people, one-fourth of the country's population, perished during this time from starvation, disease and execution.

In the search for truth and justice, many Cambodian survivors have looked to the U.N.-assisted tribunal currently in progress in the capital city Phnom Penh. Convened in 2006, the tribunal has entenced the head of the main Khmer Rouge torture center to life in prison.

The tribunal's second trial is nearing comple tion and is expected to result in life sentences for two additional high ranking Khmer Rouge leaders as well. At that point, the tribunal will mostly likely close its doors, and the U.N.-appointed judges and lawyers will go home. The tribunal is a classic example of "justice delayed is justice denied."

For the past 30 years, I have studied the legal, political and literary responses to the Cambodian genocide. It is the literary responses – accounts written by survivors themselves – that show how in breaking their silence and in speaking on behalf of those who died, they were able to seek justice and healing.

THE KILLING FIELDS

Two important texts, Haing Ngor's "A Cambodian Odyssey," published in 1987, and Vann Nath's "A Cambodian Prison Portrait," published 11 years later, reveal the extraordinary events that led to their writing and publication, as well as the authors' reasons for recording their literary testimony.

Before the Khmer Rouge took power on April 17, 1975, Haing Ngor was a successful gynecologist at a medical clinic in Phnom Penh. During the genocide, Ngor was arrested and severely tortured by the Khmer Rouge on three separate occasions. Each time, Ngor's wife Huoy nursed him back to health from the brink of death. Ironically, near the end of the genocide, Huoy died in childbirth, because Ngor lacked the simple medical equipment save her and their first child.

Ngor was able to survive the genocide. He was given refugee status by the American government and resettled in Long Beach, California, which has the largest population of Cambodians in the United States. However, he continued to be racked by guilt over not being able to save Huoy's life.

In the early 1980s, the first film about the Cam-

bodian genocide, "The Killing Fields," was made based on the book by New York Times war correspondent Sydney Schanberg, who reported on the Vietnam War from Phnom Penh. In casting the role of Dith Pran, Schanberg's Cambodian translator, Ngor was selected out of a crowd at a Cambodian

wedding in Los Angeles

Despite no previous acting experience, Ngor won the 1985 Academy Award for best supporting actor. Ngor's instant fame from wining the Oscar transformed him from an anonymous survivor into the world's most prominent witness of the Cambodian genocide.

Two years later, Warner Books published his 500-page literary testimony, "A Cambodian Odys-sey," which describes the conditions of extremity under the Khmer Rouge and specifically chronicles his relationship with Huoy, from the time they met prior to 1975 until her tragic death during the genocide.

Bearing witness to Huoy's senseless death was essential to Ngor's process of healing. His newly acquired status as an Oscar-winning actor provided him with the platform to affirm the truth of the Khmer Rouge's crimes. By identifying the victims and perpetrators of the genocide, he attempted to fulfill his responsibility to Huoy and his family members who died. In the book's introduction, Ngor states: "I have been many things in life: a medical doc-

tor ... a Hollywood actor. But nothing has shaped my life as much as surviving the Pol Pot regime. I am a survivor of the Cambodian holocaust. That's who I am.'

PRISON PORTRAIT

The second book that I want to highlight is "A Cambodian Prison Portrait," written by Vann Nath, a painter by trade before the Khmer Rouge takeover in 1975. During the genocide, Nath was arrested and sent to Tuol Sleng prison, where approximately 15,000 people were forced to confess to bogus crimes under torture and subsequently executed.

Nath was spared execution at the last moment in order to paint portraits of Pol Pot.

Within a year, the Khmer Rouge regime was removed from power by Vietnamese forces, and Tuol Sleng was transformed into a museum to show the world the atrocities that took place there during the genocide. As one of only seven prisoners known to have survived Tuol Sleng, Nath was asked to paint the scenes of torture and execution he had witnessed to be displayed at the museum.

Deeply traumatized by his year in captivity at Tuol Sleng, Nath later tried to rebuild his shattered life and opened a small coffee shop in downtown Phnom Penh. Two humanitarian workers who frequented the coffee shop befriended Nath and con-vinced him to tell his story, resulting in the writing and publication of "Prison Portrait," in 1998.

In 2009, Nath also served as a primary witness at the U.N.-assisted tribunal during the trial of Duch, the Tuol Sleng prison chief, who was eventually sentenced to life in prison. Similar to Ngor, informing the world of the conditions at Tuol Sleng fulfilled a deep responsibility to speak on behalf of those who suffered and died under the Khmer Rouge. By publishing their personal accounts, as I

found in my research, survivors attempt to fulfill a deep responsibility to speak on behalf of those who died. In doing so, they begin to assert some control over the traumatic memories that haunt their lives. These writers act against forgetting in the hope that the world will never allow another Pol Pot to try to silence the voice of the people

People who live in diverse neighbourhoods are more helpful - here's how we know

Whether or not diversity is a good thing is still a topic of much debate. Though many businesses tout the benefits of diversity, American political scientist Robert Putnam holds that diversity causes people to hunker down, creating mistrust in communities.

Empirical investigations into how

diversity affects communities are too few and far between to provide any definitive answer to the question. So, together with colleagues in Singapore and the US, we set out to examine this very question in a series of studies - the results of which were recently published in the Journal of Personali ty and Social Psychology.

There is indeed evidence that diversity creates mistrust in communities. But diverse communities also provide an opportunity for people from different racial and ethnic backgrounds to come into contact with each other, and we thought that these experiences would create a positive effect on people's identities: specifically, the extent to which they identify with humanity, as a whole.

A HUMAN CONNECTION

This is one of the biggest and broadest forms of identity, which a human being can comprehend. A number of spiritual and philosophical traditions have upheld that believing you share a fundamental connection with other human beings - regardless of race, religion, sexuality or gender - is the sign of a mature mind.

My colleagues and I thought that living in diverse neighbourhoods might create opportunities to come

into contact with different people again and again, thereby expanding a person's sense of identity. As a result, people living in diverse neigh-bourhoods should be more helpful towards others. We examined this possibility in five empirical studies.

In the first study, we took to Twit-

ter to analyse the sentiments of tweets across the 200 largest metropolitan areas in the US. This was a some-what basic, exploratory test of our hypothesis, using a large sample of data. In this

study, we found that the likelihood that a tweet mentions words which suggest positivity, friendliness, helpfulness, or social acceptance was higher in a more diver

OPENING UP

Encouraged by our findings, we then sought to examine how diversity of a zip code where people lived might affect people's likelihood to offer help in the aftermath of a disaster, such as a terrorist attack. We used data from a website that the Boston Globe set up, where people could offer help to those stranded after the 2013 Boston Marathon bombings.

After accounting for factors such as distance from the bombings, political diversity, religious diversity and the mean household income of these zip codes, we found that people who lived in more racially diverse zip to those in need after the bombings.

To take our investigation even further, we examined whether peo-ple living in more diverse countries would report that they had helped someone in the recent past. We used data from the Gallup World Poll in

2012, which asked more than 155,000 individuals in 146 countries to report whether they had helped stranger in the recent past. Again, we found that

they had helped a stranger in the past

EXPANDING IDENTITIES

These three studies seemed to provide converging evidence for our ideas, but we needed to understand whether this was because diversity expands people's identities. From a scientific standpoint, this presented a big challenge. It would almost be impossible to conduct a real experiment where we allocate people to live in different neighbourhoods and then check whether this had an effect on their level of helpfulness.

So instead we borrowed a tech-nique routinely used by social psychologist, called priming. Priming is a psychological method, used to activate a state of mind for people in an experiment. We primed people

to think about neighbourhoods that were either diverse, or not. We made this allocation randomly, then examined how this affected their willingness to help.

We also measured whether this simple procedure of priming also altered their identities. We used a survey measure developed by other psychologists, which measures how much someone identifies with all of humanity. In two studies, we found that imagining living in a diverse neighbourhood expanded people's identities, which in turn made them


more willing to help a stranger.

These results don't prove definitively that diversity is always a good thing. But they do offer an encour-aging view of some of the benefits which diversity might bring to com-munities, given the way that people's identities shift when they often encounter those who are different to

Some governments are already putting policies in place to make the most of these potential benefits. For example, in Singapore, each public housing apartment block maintains the same ratio of Chinese, Malay and Indian residents as exists in the wider population. This has prevented segregation and created diversity in neighbourhoods, which has led to a

better society for everyone.
In ancient Indian texts, sages exhort people to view the whole world as one family. Our studies show that this isn't a pipe dream – it's a real possibility

KATHMANDU/NEW DEL-HI, APR 17 (PTI): In a rare attack on a foreign mission in Nepal, a pressure-cooker bomb exploded outside the office of the Indian consulate in the country's eastern Biratnagar city damaging its wall but no one was

hurt, police said today.

The homemade device went off last night at Biratnagar, 200 kilometres from Kathmandu.

The bomb was triggered by an unknown group in an open space behind the building and created a small hole in the wall, the police said. However, Indian Embassy in Kathmandu has not yet issued any formal statement on the incident.

Spokesperson in the Ministry of External Affairs Raveesh Kumar in a statement in New Delhi said that Indian embassy in Kathmandu was in touch with the Nepal government over the incident and that the security authorities in that country were investigat-

ing the matter.

"A minor explosion took place along the rear

boundary wall of the camp office of embassy of India at Biratnagar, Nepal at about 20:15 hours on April 16. No one has been injured in the incident," Kumar said.

Sources in the security establishment in New Delhi said the explosion caused a hole of around 1 feet by 1.5 feet in wall of the consulate towards the secluded rear side of the office building. They said no one was in the office at the time of the conficient.

The camp office of the consulate was set up during the floods in Nepal and north Bihar.

Investigating officers suspect that cadres of a local political group have caused the blast. The party had called a general strike in Biratnagar vectorial

yesterday.

A senior officer of Nepal police said it was investigating to find out who caused the blast. The security around the blast site has been stepped up after the incident.

Biratnagar is the industrial capital of Nepal and 6 km north of the border of Bihar.

Football 'miracle' offers shared goal for war-torn Yemen

ADEN (YEMEN), APR 17 (AFP): A "miracle" winning streak has propelled Yemen's senior and youth football teams to the Asian Cup, catching the war-torn nation's attention and offering a common goal to a divided country.

Qualification is a first ever for the senior team, currently based in Qatar, and a rare achievement for the under-16s who still train in Yemen.

"Qualification has brought Yemenis together -- they're doing us proud," said Ahmed Sabahi, a fan in the southern port city of Aden

ern port city of Aden.
"All Yemenis are behind their team," he said.

Yemen's war pitting pro-government forces supported by a Saudi-led coalition against Iran-backed Shiite Huthi rebels entered its fourth year in March.

The conflict has left nearly 10,000 people dead, tens of thousands wounded and created what the United Nations says is the world's worst humanitarian crisis, rife with once forgotten diseases like cholera and diphtheria.

"We hope the team will honour Yemen and give Yemenis some relief," said Sabahi.

The senior team beat Nepal 2-1 on March 27, reaching the 2019 AFC Asian Cup to be contested in January-February in the Emirates -- for the first time in Yemen's history.

The U-16 tournament

is to take place in Malaysia in September-October. To build the youth

team, selectors travelled the length of the country, including war zones and sectors controlled by rival factions.

Ranked 125 in t

world by the sport's governing body FIFA, Yemen's senior team has never won a single match in the Gulf Cup against its neighbours since the competition was leaveded in 1070

launched in 1970.

Yemen's media used to congratulate the team for an "honourable defeat" if they avoided a hammering. Asian Cup qualification was hailed as nothing less than a "miracle".

Paradoxically, Yemeni football has benefited from the war, with senior players relocated to a training camp in Qatar, which has the most up-to-date facilities as it builds up to hosting the 2022 World Cub.

Abd al-Salam al-Saadi, a coach in Sanaa, sees another key factor: "The players have not been drawn into politics." Yemen's war has left infrastructure, homes, schools and ports in ruins. Dozens of stadiums have been bombed or turned into military camps for various armed factions.

For football fans back home, Yemen's successful qualification offers a glimmer of hope and a distraction from everyday life in what was the Arab world's poorest country even before the war.

It has "helped put a smile on the face of Yemeni youths, who need reasons to be happy and to forget", said Saleh Hanash, another fan in

India wins elections to key UN subsidiary bodies

UNITED NATIONS, APR 17 (PTI): India has won an election to a crucial non-governmental organisation committee in the UN after garner-ing the highest number of votes besides getting elected by acclamation to other subsidiary bodies

in five separate polls.

The UN's Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) held elections to a number of its subsidiary bodies here yesterday. The ECOSOC focusses on advancing the three dimensions of sustainable development economic, social and environmental.

Following the elec-tions, India's Permanent Representative to the UN Ambassador Syed Akbaruddin told PTI that the "results reflect, yet again, the broad support and many friends India has amongst UN members".

India topped the election to the Committee on Non-Governmental Organizations. In one round of secret balloting, the Council elected Bahrain, China, India and Pakistan China, India and Pakistan in the Asia Pacific States category and Brazil, Cuba, Mexico and Nica-ragua (Latin American and Caribbean States) to serve a four-year term beginning on January 1,

India got the highest number of votes at 46, followed by Pakistan (43), Bahrain (40) and China 39. Iran lost the elections, having got only 27 votes. The Council elected by acclamation 11 other nations to serve

the same four-year term.

The Committee on
Non-Governmental Organizations is a standing committee of ECOSOC and its main tasks include consideration of applications for consultative status and requests for reclassifica-tion submitted by NGOs consideration of quadrennial reports sub-mitted by NGOs in Gener-

al and Special categories.
India was also elected by acclamation to the Commission on Popula-tion and Development a term beginning April 16, 2018 and expiring in 2021. Under its terms of ref-

erence the Commission is to assist the Council by arranging for studies and advising the Council on population issues and trends, integrating population and development strategies and popula-tion and related development policies and programmes.

The Council elected India and Kuwait (Asia-Pacific States) by acclamation to the Commission for Social Devel-opment, filling outstanding seats for a four-year term beginning on the date of election.

Commission's purpose was to advise ECOSOC on social policies of a general charac-ter and, in particular, on all matters in the social field not covered by the specialised inter-governmental agencies.

India was among the 17 members elected by acclamation to the Commission on Crime Prevention and Criminal

The amnesty was extended mostly to drug of-fenders, as well as more than 50 foreigners and 36 political prisoners, according to a breakdown posted on Facebook by overnment spokesman Zaw Htay.

Around 200 others in Myanmar are facing tri-als linked to political activities, said spokesman Aung Myo Kyaw from the Assistance Association Assistance Associati for Political Prisoners.

"The government can help them by cancelling the cases from the courts," he told AFP.

Myanmar has freed thousands from its jails since a military junta ceded power in 2011 after five decades of brutal repression.

Hundreds of political prisoners were released shortly after the civilian government of former democracy activist Aung San Suu Kyi took office in 2016 following a sweeping election victory.

KENDRICK LAMAR MAKES HISTORY WITH PULITZER PRIZE WIN FOR DAMN

m apper}$ Kendrick Lamar has won the Pulitzer Prize in music for his revolutionary album, DAMN. This is first time in 102 years that a non-classical or jazz work has won the hop artist has received the prestigious accolade. award—it's also certainly the first time a hip-

On Monday, the Pulitzer board announced the historic news, calling the album a "a virtuosic song collection unified by its vernacular authenticity and rhythmic dynamism that offers affecting vignettes capturing the com-plexity of modern African-American life."

The 30-year-old's fourth studio album. which was released in April 2017, features 14 tracks, including "HUMBLE." "BLOOD." and "YAH."

Previously, the Pulitzer board has given out special honors to famous musicians Bob Dylan, Duke Ellington, George Gershwin, Thelonious Monk, John Coltrane and Hank Williams, but never a rapper and never in the music category.

The Compton-born superstar has won 12 Grammys, five for DAMN., and been nominated for 29 Grammys.

Lamar is known for his piercing lyrics, political statements and his fired-up (sometimes literally) performances.

In addition to several other winners, Mia Farrow's son Ronan Farrow Jodi Kantor, The New Yorker and the New York Times were also awarded a 2018 Pulitzer Prize for Public Service for their exposés on Harvey Weinstein and the resulting #metoo movement.

This is the 102nd year that the Pulitzer Prizes have been awarded for excellence in journalism and the arts.

ED SHEERAN IN TALKS FOR DANNY BOYLE'S MUSIC-THEMED MOVIE

Following bit parts in both Game of Thrones and Bridget Jones' Baby, British pop star Ed Sheeran is reportedly being considered for a role in Danny Boyle's next film. Although the as-yet-untitled movie is a musical comedy, it's unclear whether Sheeran will be contributing one of his Caribbean-inflected songs to the soundtrack, or whether he'll be solely in an on-camera role.

Boyle will reportedly be helming the next James Bond movie, currently titled Bond 25. So far, development on the upcoming 007 flick has been conspicuously slow-moving following the 2015 release of Spectre, which debuted to admittedly lukewarm re-views. Hopefully, the stylish Trainspotting director will be able to get the film series back on track. Boyle is writing the spy thriller along with John Hodge, but his mysteri-ous musical-comedy is expected to start shooting before the 25th installment of the long-running franchise. Currently, Boyle's putting the last polishing touches on his highly-anticipated FX melodrama Trust, which he's executive-producing and par-tially directing.

Boyle's musical comedy film is a closely-guarded secret, although Lily James (Baby Driver) is slated to star alongside Himesh Patel (from the British soap Eastenders) and Saturday Night Live stalwart Kate McKinnon, Producers include Tim Bevan and Eric Fellner from Working Title, along with Matthew James Wilkinson and Bernie Bellew. What exactly Ed Sheeran's role will be in the film, or how important it will be to the story is currently unclear.

Meanwhile, Grammy-winning artist Sheeran has be come a pop-culture staple, following the success of songs like "Shape of You", "Galway Girl," and "Castle on the Hill", particularly since he's apparently hell-bent on making the transition from pop to television and film. He's already made appearances on the Australian soap opera Home and Away (where he serenades Summer Bay residents with an impromptu performance of "Thinking Out Loud") and FX's historical drama The Bastard Executioner (where he appeared in a recurring part as a scheming, murderous protégé of a church elder, a performance the Telegraph not-so-nicely
