has the capacity of housing 150 light vehicles and 50 scooters/bikes.

This project sanctioned in 2010 was started after a study conducted by Central Institute of Road Transport [CIRT], Pune, which held that the highest daily traffic in the capital was observed at Deorali at 35,758 per day.



As informed by the officials, the cost of the project is Rs 1091.92

ing facility will help in decongestion of vehicles from the main road leading to the city. Similarly, the Namna-

ng walkway will render multiple options of facility for tourists and locals and is aimed at re-modeling the capital city with an ever growing footfall

of tourists and migration.

It may be recalled that the walkway was to be completed by 2013.

The project includes

the development of the covered walkway along with the various allied facilities along Namnang road with special rolled steel section and cantilever projections.

It also includes the provision of covered walkway for 450 meters with poly-carbonate sheet roofing and viewing deck.

Built at a 2200.58 lakh, one the main objectives this project is to facilitate working out the deficiency in civic amenities based on the geographical location, socio economic conditions and access of civic infrastructures.

This walkway in-cludes covered walkway [non-skid tiles], proper drainages [RCC drain with iron gratings], a restaurant and a commu-

nity toilet.

Minister NK Subba
also handed over the projects to the Gangtok Municipal Corporation [GMC].

Centre approves infra dev scheme for NE with 100 pc funding

New Delhi, Dec 15 (PTI): A new scheme for infrastructure development in the northeastern states with 100 per cent funding by the central government was today approved by the Union cabinet along with a capital investment subsidy amounting to Rs 264.67

The Union Cabinet, chaired by Prime Minis-ter Narendra Modi, also approved the continua-tion of the existing Non Lapsable Central Pool of Resources (NLCPR) scheme with funding pattern of 90:10 till March, 2020, with an outlay of Rs 5,300 crore to enable completion of ongoing projects, an official statement said.

The cabinet approved introduction of new the introduction of new central sector scheme of North East Special Infrastructure Development Scheme (NESIDS) from 2017-18 with 100 per cent funding from the central government to fill the gaps in creation of infrastructure in specified sectors till March, 2020.

The new scheme will broadly cover creation of infrastructure relating to water supply, power, con-nectivity and especially the projects promoting tourism, social sectors of education and health, the statement said.

The assets to be created under the new scheme of NESIDS will not only strengthen healthcare and education facilities in the region, but will also encourage tourism. thereby providing employment opportunities to the local youth.

The scheme will act as a catalyst in overall development of the region in the years to come, it said.

The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs, headed by the prime minister, also approved the capital investment subsidy amounting to Rs 264.67 crore to four industrial units in the North-Eastern Region, including Sikkim, un-der the Central Capi-tal Investment Subsidy Scheme (CCISS), 2007 of North East Industrial In-Policy (NEIIPP), 2007.

The CCEA has revised financial powers for approval of capital investment subsidy claims up to Rs 500 crore which will be now approved by the Minister of Commerce and Industry.

to the industrial units will not only provide incentives to the operational units but also boost confidence of existing investors as well as potential investors in the states of NER, another statement said.

Indian Army veterans, Mukti Joddhas recount 1971 war drill

KOLKATA, DEC 15 (PTI): Camaraderie and bonding were at full display today when the 'old boys' of the Indian Army and the Mukti Joddhas, who fought shoulder-to-shoulder to liberate Bangladesh in 1971, reunited to celebrate the 46th anniversary of the war with Pakistan.

Recounting tales of valour and courage at the Army's Eastern Command head-quarter Fort William here, the Mukti Jod-dhas (liberation warriors of Bangladesh) and war veterans talked of how they coor-dinated with each other to force the Pakistan Army to surrender.

Bangladesh celebrates its independence day on December 16 and India hails

the day as "Vijay Diwas".

"We had gone into the erstwhile East Pakistan on guerrilla operations much be-fore the formal war started on December 3 and trained young Bengali men for combat," said Brig. (retd) B K Ponwar, who was then a strapping young lieutenant aged 23.

Speaking enthusiastically about the courage of the Mukti Joddhas and support of local people, Ponwar said wherever the Indian Army evicted Pakistan Army personnel, they were greeted by slogans of 'Indian Army Zindabad'.

"The Pakistani Army had a storage of 30 days' ammunition and provisions when the war begun in the eastern sector, but

what they lacked was loyalty and conviction and thus lost the war," he said.

Speaking highly about the Indian cooperation all along their fight for liberation, Mosharraf Hossain, a Mukti Joddha and minister in the Bangladesh Cabinet, said that without the India, it would not have been possible to attain independence.

He spoke of how the Indian Army trained the Mukti Joddhas for a period ranging from just three days to three months to prepare them to take on the Pa-kistan Army, which committed genocide on the Bangladeshis.

Hossain, who was leading the 72-mem ber Bangla delegation to commemorate the Vijay Diwas, said a memorial tomb was being erected in Bangladesh to pay homage to the Indian soldiers and Mukti Joddhas who laid down their lives during the 1971 war. Lt Gen (retd) Mollah Fazie Akbar said

he joined the Mukti Joddhas at the age of 15, and shared stories of battles fought together with Indian Army personnel.

"While we were fighting for our liber-ation, the Indian Army was fighting for us and there stands out their greatness," said Bangladesh MP Abdus Shahid, who was also a Mukti Joddha, trained at Kailashahar in Tripura

He said Bangladeshi women greeted the Indian soldiers with food and pethas

ter the Pakistani forces were pushed out.

Brigadier (retd) A P Datta of the Indi-an Army said his family hailed from Sylhet district in Bangladesh and was at heart a

Bengali and Bangladeshi.
"We are neither Hindus nor Muslims, we are Bengalis. Never in the history has a war been fought on the issues of language and culture," he said.

Datta talked of how the Mukti Joddhas gave the Indian Army cover for landing and other operations like crossing rivers and building pontoon bridges and also provided crucial intelligence on the movement of the Pakistan Army.

This tournament will help us to improve our rela-tionship with the masses," Inspector General of Police, Darjeeling range, Manoj Verma told PTI.





Make Sex Safe, Not Dirty

Problems with banning condom advts from daytime TV

ecently, at the behest of the Advertising Standards Recently, at the penest of the Advertising of Broadcasting Ministry issued a guideline restricting the screening of condom advertisements on television between 10pm and 6am. This, one is told, to "protect" children from "indecent" content. There is a lot more that could be considered a lot more vulgar and indecent than these advertisements. In fact, a lot of what our leaders have been saying and which is then played on a spool across TV channels could be considered a lot more offensive than an advertisement, irrespective of how much skin it shows, which advises people to have safe sex. There is so much wrong with the latest move that most must have initially dismissed it as misreporting or "fake" news. But we are experiencing very weird governance nowadays and are playing along with a regime which has no patience for nuance and refuses to accept the difference between subjective and objective opinions. There are few things more repulsive than a leader branding another religion as evil or a copy-cat wannabe leader announcing a bounty on the head of an actress. But they are allowed to spew their venom and project their insecurities and stereotypes on impressionable minds (the "children" and the infantilized grown-ups, both) while a product which could not only keep the same audience protected, but also save their lives is somehow deemed too unsavoury and suggestive to be allowed on television during daytime!

While it is true that advertisements of premium condoms are not the only mode of information available to the young about safe sex, it is also a fact that their screening alongside "normal" advertisements makes conversations around safe sex easier. It would even be a good thing if certain advertisements click with the audience and interests couples into using them. The reverse is however not true. Get real moral policing agents, condom advertisements do not inspire couples to indulge in premarital sex or become promiscuous. The country was just about maturing to a level where condoms were not promoted anymore just as aids to ensure "hum do, hamare do" and were being projected and accepted as ways to ensure protected intimacy. But a gaggle of regressive mindsets is convinced that this cannot be. And this is dangerous, because the pushing of condom advertisements to the late-night slot is making sex a dirty word again and typecasting it as shameful and wrong. Such banality has never discouraged anyone, but the attitude we are allowing to return is going to make sex unsafe again. That is not advisable in a country where teen and unwanted pregnancies are already too high and termination of pregnancies already too unsafe.

As per a study recently published in The Lancet Global Health, an estimated 15.6 million abortions took place in India in 2015, with the majority of women taking pills at home without adequate counselling, according to a study which found that about half of the pregnancies in the country were unintended. This translates to an abortion rate of 47 per 1,000 women aged 15-49, which is similar to the abortion rate in neighbouring South Asian countries. If access to condoms or other modes of contraception were more accessible and talk about contraception more normalised, this would not have been the case. The same study also estimated the incidence of unintended pregnancy in India and found that out of the total 48.1 million pregnancies in 2015, about half were unintended meaning they were wanted later or not at all. And the government's priority is to run TV spots about condoms out of the screens?

With FCC's net neutrality ruling, the US could lose its lead in online consumer protection

The internet may be an international system of interconnecting networks sharing a rough global consensus about The internet may be an international the technical details of communicating through them – but each country man ages its own internet environment inde pendently. As the U.S. debate about the role of government in overseeing and regulating the internet continues, it's worth looking at how other countries handle the issue.

Our research and advocacy on in-

ternet regulation in the U.S. and other countries offers us a unique historical and global perspective on the Federal Communications Commission's Decem-

er 2017 decision to deregulate the internet in the U.S. The principle of an open internet, often called "net neutrality," is one of consumer protection. It is based on the idea that everyone – users and It is based on the idea that everyone – users and content providers alike – should be able to freely spread their own views, and consumers can choose what services to use and what content to consume. Network neutrality ensures that no one - not the government, nor corporations – is allowed to censor speech or interfere with content, services or applications

As the U.S. continues to debate whether to embrace internet freedom, the world is doing so already, with many countries imposing even stronger rules than the ones the FCC did away with. THE US AS TRAILBLAZER AND LAGGARD

Before 2015, many internet businesses in the U.S. discriminated against or blocked customers from particular legal uses of the internet. In 2007 Comcast illegally blocked its customers from sharing files between themselves. In 2009, AT&T blocked access to Skype and FaceTime apps on its network. In 2011, MetroPCS blocked its customers from streaming Netflix and all other streaming video except YouTube (possibly due to a secretly negotiated deal). In 2012, Verizon disabled apps that let customers connect computers to their mobile data service. There were many other violations of the principle of net neutrality, too.

Customers and regulators tried to control these discriminatory practices over many years of public deliberation and multiple court cases. In 2015, under the Obama administration, the FCC finalized the Open Internet Order, a set of rules barring internet service providers from speeding up or slow-ing down traffic based on its content or whether the companies posting it had paid extra to the company delivering the data. It was far from perfect – but nonetheless a giant leap forward.

In early 2017, after his inauguration, President Trump appointed Ajit Pai, a former Verizon lawyer, as the FCC chairman. Pai, an Obama appointee to the FCC who had voted against the Open Internet Order in 2015, has moved rapidly to undo it. He and some other comentators believe that customers will get better service from a less-regulated market, ignoring that the rules only emerged in the wake of problems and consumer complaints.

Pai's proposal has been criticized by former FCC Chairman Tom Wheeler as "a shameful sham and sell-out" to big telecommunications companies. A who'swho list of the people who invented the technologies



nd systems underlying the internet denounced Pai's policy as "based on a flawed and factually inaccurate understanding of internet technology."

Other countries are facing similar dilemmas about how to deal with today's digital realities, and are slowly and individually contributing to a patchwork of laws that differ from country to country. But many highly industrialized and rapidly developing countries share a general consensus that consumers and for civil society.

OPENING THE INTERNET BRAZILIAN-STYLE

Brazil's Civil Rights Framework for the Internet, enacted in 2014 and further refined in 2016, only allows internet service companies to prioritize certain types of traffic for technical reasons – such as overloaded networking capacity – or to allow network use by emergency services.

Yet, the country has been reluctant to enforce se rules and hold violators to account. Much like in the U.S., there is increasing concern that industry power has overwhelmed government regulatory agencies. Some of the largest telecommunications companies have been providing their mobile internet customers with preferential access to content on sites and services owned by business partners. Many Brazilian consumer rights groups are particularly alarmed because the companies receiving this privileged treatment are all large foreign corporations, including Facebook, WhatsApp, Twitter nd music-streaming service Deezer (the only non-U.S. company).

In addition, there are proposals in the works that would grant tens of millions of dollars in publicly owned telecommunications infrastructure to private companies for free. Brazilian internet freedom is further at risk because the country's teleco nications companies are planning to insist that its regulators align with the weakened U.S. rules

ACTIVE ENFORCEMENT IN EUROPE

The European Union approved strong rules in 2015, requiring companies that provide internet access to handle all traffic equally, leaving flexibility to restrict traffic when network equipment was operating at its maximum capacity. EU rules also allow traffic restrictions to protect network security and handle emergency situations.

In 2016, European Union electronic communications regulators detailed potential problems in agreements between telecommunications companies and content providers. And they explained that quality of service could vary, but no specific applica-tions should be discriminated against. tance of Europe's emphasis on proac-tively monitoring compliance with net neutrality rules, rather than waiting for violations to happen before reacting. This gives European residents much stronger consumer protection than exists in the U.S.

INDIA TAKES A STAND

India has taken similarly strong steps. In 2016, the Telecom Regulatory Authority of India approved rules stating that "no service provider shall offer or charge discriminatory tariffs for data services on the basis of content." In November 2017, the agency also issued "recommenda-tions on net neutrality," laying out rules of the road for internet service providers

that incorporate substantial protections against content and application discrimination.

Indian regulators are looking to balance consumer and corporate priorities in areas such as security, privacy and ownership of data. Moreover, they are considering adopting regulations to spur

competition in mobile data services.

Most importantly, Indian regulators make very clear that companies providing internet service should not do anything "that has the effect of dis-criminatory treatment based on content, sender or receiver, protocols or user equipment." This puts openness at the core of internet service, the sort of clear consumer protection that public interest advocates and academics have called for

THE U.S. ISN'T AN ISLAND
The U.S. internet industry is a powerful global force, with billions of users of its websites and online services all around the world. Further, the U.S. government has traditionally been a leader in developing policies that balance free speech, con-sumer protection and other civil rights with strong opportunities for research and business innovation - but this too is now in decline.

Net neutrality protections might not be so nec-essary if the broadband market were more competitive. But 29 percent of Americans have no options for getting high-speed wired internet service at home. Another 47 percent have just one choice

 and 20 percent have just two.
 The telecommunications industry continues to consolidate – though the U.S. Department of Justice is trying to block the pending AT&T-Time Warner merger. In this market with few providers, and many companies seeking profits by promoting their own content via their own networks, net neu trality protections will only become more important - not less so.

Lastly, legally speaking, policy and regulatory decisions made in the U.S. don't hold any direct power in other countries. However, domestic rules about the internet will indeed affect the global conversation around net neutrality. What the U.S. decides, through the FCC, the courts and potentially even through Congress, will determine whether U.S. leadership on the internet remains strong, or whether it will cede ground to other countries willing to protect their citizens.

Alabama and #MeToo's disruptive force

Roy Moore's electoral defeat in Alabama is an important victory for #MeToo.

Let's recall that the allegations about his preying on teenagers came to light amidst a wave of #MeToo-inspired charges. National attention to sexual harassment raised the profile of this state-level race.

The focus has now turned to

Donald Trump, as some members of Congress call for investigating multi-ple complaints of sexual misconduct against him. If their call gains traction.

it will be a remarkable development.

The words "movement," "uprising," and even "revolution" have been used to describe events over the past two months. As a feminist scholar, I see them as apt because of the un-precedented momentum and scale of the outcry.

There is also another term that quite precisely conveys what is hap-pening: "disruption." I borrow this term from technology and business writers who use it to describe an upheaval of institutionalized ways of doing things. In many ways, what we are seeing is a textbook case of cultural disruption.

MOVING 'RELENTLESSLY

UPWARDS'

According to the theory, disruptors are typically small actors who ask: Why should we do things the same way as before? They offer new and low-cost solutions to problems from below, moving "relentlessly up-wards" and "eventually displacing" established institutions. In our time, disruptions in the business world are mostly made possible by digital tech-nology, the best examples being Netflix, which used digital streaming to subvert network television, and Airb-nb, which directly connected home sharers with potential guests.

I see sexual harassment victims as disruptors because they use social media platforms to circumvent legal channels for pursuing justice. The current sea change began with little-known individuals using Twitter

and Facebook to share personal stories, echoing the "survivor speak-out model long championed by feminists of the anti-violence movement.

SHORT-CIRCUITING THE LAW

The scale of the viral #MeToo hashtag led journalists to investigate and publicize victims' stories. Effectively, this allowed a short-circuiting of the law. Lawsuits pose burdens of proof that are sometimes impossible to meet. How do you produce material evidence of unwanted touching or obscene words said in passing? So victims said: I need a different route to justice. By speaking publicly and shaming their harassers, victims have

disrupted legal channels of redressal

In court, you are innocent until proven guilty. But #MeToo has tilted public sympathy and power in favor of accusers by showing how widespread sexual coercion is. Taking accusers more seriously than those accused is a reversal of the principle of legal due process. Yet because those who are victimized have been so ill-served by legal burdens of proof, they are using the most effective alternative avail-able. And many in the public are, for now, trusting the investigation process followed by reporters and management and ethics committee

Some journalism outlets such as The Washington Post are using stringent investigative methods. Its reporters were not duped by false claims made by a sting operation. The pressure to be thorough and fair is very high, since the possibility of false accusations is real. This chaotic quality and the need for vigilance is reminiscent of other disrupted environments: Airbnb offers guests no guarantee of safety, and guests take on the risk of racism and sexual assault.

What remains to be worked out, after the dust settles, is a genuinely transformative solution to the problem of sexual coercion— one that goes beyond shaming and punishment to enabling perpetrators to take responsibility for the harm

they have caused. TARGETING SPECIFIC SECTORS

In the business world, disruptors typically take advantage of vulnerabilities in an industry or market. In this case, sexual harassment complaints are primarily effective in sectors where reputations matter, such as entertainment and politics. Media companies and political parties do not want to risk the public relations fallout from scandals. As a result, we see swift firings and resignations on the heels of allegations.

Yet media industries and politics, while being challenging environments for women, are not known to be the worst sites of gender-based abuse. The arenas considered historically unfriend-ly to women are male-dominated sectors such as construction and blue-collar trades, surgery and finance. The most troubling sectors, feminist scholars note, are those where private settings make abuse easier, such as domestic work or childcare, and service industries such as restaurants, where the pressure to seek tips make servsuccumb to customer requests. But harassers in these sectors are not celebrities and therefore less vulnerable to public shaming.

The term "disruption" is also

apt because it is a wholesale attack on an institution. Disruptors draw few distinctions between the valuable and less-valuable features of institutions, or the worst or least offensive perpetrators. The goal is to upend a system, or in this case, to root out a systematic problem. For instance, the distinctions between Democrat and Republican

party positions on women's issues seem less meaningful right now, as allegations against members of both parties spill out. The pent-up fury driving victims to come for-ward has meant dispensing with this distinction.

Finally, it is worth noting that the energy associated with this movement, as with many disruptors, is youthful. The driving force behind the movement against sexual harassment is young women, who, according to a Pew survey, most readily identify it as a widespread problem. This is not surprising; it is those in the age range of 15-35 years who are most frequently harassed, and the young are also the most avid users of social media platforms. Women in older age groups are, of course, also speaking out about past ex-periences of harassment and its very real effect on their lives and careers. But in the impatience and refusal of the status quo, we can distinctly hear a new generation's

The 60 MW Tuirial
Hydro Electric Power
Project (HEPP) has been constructed as a Central Sector Project and imple-mented by North Eastern Electric Power Corporation (NEEPCO), under the administrative control of the Union power ministry.

The Cabinet Commit-



tee on Economic Affairs (CCEA) cleared the project for implementation in July 1998 with commissioning scheduled in July 2006.

After the completion of about 30 per cent of the project activities, the work was totally sus-pended from June 2004 due to local agitation.

The work resumed in January 2011.

The remotely locat-

ed project faced various hindrances ranging from inadequate communication infrastructure, massive failure of the Power House slopes due to poor soil condition to lack of availability of skilled manpower.

Unit-I of the project was commissioned on August 25 this year, and Unit-II on November 28.

The project has been built at a cost of Rs 1,302

It is the biggest power project in Mizoram and will feed the entire energy to be generated to the state, which will help it achieve the Centre's ambitious and flagship Mission '24x7 Affordable Clean Power for All'.

The state's current demand of electricity is only 87 MW and this is being met by the state's mini power projects and availability of its share of power from central sector projects.

Mizoram will now be

the third power-surplus state in North East India after Sikkim and Tripura.

Drone regulations likely to be out in 2 months. savs Sinha

NEW DELHI, DEC 15 (PTI): The regulations for operating drones are likely to be ready within two months and would be the "best in class with appropriate constraints", union minister Jayant

Sinha said today.

The civil aviation ministry came out with draft rules for unmanned aircraft systems last month, seeking comments from the public.

'We have received over 100 comments. We are in the process of incorporating those in drone regulations that will be putting (out)... That should be coming through in next 30- 60 days," Sinha said at an event here.

The regulations would help in use of drones for "all kinds of applications and busi-nesses that you want to build", the Minister of State for Civil Aviation said in response to a query from a start-up entre-

preneur.
"I believe drone regulation that we will have will be best in class with appropriate constraints... We have to balance safety and security with what you want to do and those are good constraints to have," Sinha said.

At present, aircraft rules do not cover the use of drones as well as their sale and purchase. Aviation regulator DGCA had in October 2014 restricted the use of drones and unmanned aircraft system by civilians.

According to the draft rules prepared by the DGCA, drones would require unique identification numbers while nano drones, those weighing below 250 grams, would be exempt from seeking one-time approval, including the unique num-

ber requirement.

Drones have been classified into five categories, with those weighing up to 250 gram described as 'nano'.

Those weighing more than 250 gram and up to 2 kilogram would be classified as 'micro' while 'mini' would be those having weight of over 2 kg and less than or equal to 25 kg.

'Small' drones would be those weighing up to 150 kg and the ones above that threshold would be classified as 'large'.

"I have just heard his name and have never seen him fight. I will take great delight in handing Vijender Singh his first loss and left him beaten and broken in front of his home crowd.
"In fact I will tell you

Amuzu said his experience in the professional circuit will hold him in good stead against Vi-

Govt okays Rs 2,600 cr package for leather, footwear industry New Delhi, Dec 15

Catholic priests allegedly beaten up outside police station Station in MP

"They (members of the Catholic group) may have been manhandled outside the police station premises. If they come to us with a complaint that they were beaten up, we will surely book the accused," the po-lice officer said.

The group comprised ten Catholic priests and 32 others undergoing training for priesthood.

After police got information, they came to the spot and took 32 Catholic brothers (trainee priests) and two priests to the Civil Lines police station, Fr Rony said.

"When they reached the police sta-tion, they were beaten up by Bajrang Dal activists on the station campus. Hearing the news, four other priests rushed to the police station, but they were also thrashed and their car was set on fire," he claimed,

adding four more priests went to the police station and were assaulted too.

Police let off members of the Catholic

group around 3:30 am. They agreed to visit the police station today morning, Rony

"As promised they returned in the morning, and right now (around 3:30 pm) they (priests and others) are at the police station," he said.

Rony said the diocese was running a seminary at Barakala village in Satna district for the last 20 years and not a single person there had converted to Christianity. "We are being persecuted," he said.

Sub-inspector Sharma said a Catholic priest and five others were booked today for allegedly converting a Hindu man to Christianity using force and allurement at oomkar village. "We have booked (priest) M George

and five others on the complaint of Dharmendra Dohar, a local youth who claimed he was illegally converted on December 10." Sharma said.

Rony said he was not aware of who Do har was.

US regulators rollback net neutrality rules

WASHINGTON, DEC 14 (PTI):

US regulators today voted to rollback "net neutrality" rules that require internet providers to treat all traffic equally.

The Federal Communications Commission, in a 3-2 vote, adopted a proposal by Republican appointed chair-

man Indian-American Ajit Pai. The critics say the move is against the interest of the consumers and favours big corporate companies.

By doing so, the Republican-majority commission has reversed the 2015 "net-neutrality" ruled of the previous Obama Administration, which mandated upon all internet service providers to treat all traffic equally, without blocking or showing content.

The decision restores the longstanding, bipartisan light-touch regulatory framework that has fostered rapid Internet growth, openness, and freedom for nearly 20 years, the FCC said in a state ment after the voting.

Following detailed legal

and economic analysis as well as extensive examination



of comments from consumers and stakeholders, the Commission reversed the FCC's 2015 heavy- handed utility-style regulation of broadband Internet access service, which imposed substantial costs on the entire Internet

In place of that heavy-handed framework, the FCC is returning to the traditional light-touch framework that was in place until 2015, it asserted.

Moreover, the FCC also opted robust transparadopted ency requirements that will as facilitate effective government oversight of broadband providers conduct, it said.

"In particular, the FCC's action has restored the jurisdiction of the Federal Trade Commission to act when broadband providers engage in anticompetitive, unfair, or deceptive acts or practices," the federal commission said.

Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi described Democratic Leader Nancy Pelosi said FCC's radical, partisan decision to dismantle net neutrality "strikes a stunning blow" to the promise of a free and open Internet.
"With this unjustified and

blatant giveaway to big pro-viders, FCC Chairman Ajit Pai is proving himself an eager executor of the Trump Administration s anti-consumer, anti- competition agenda, she said.

Pelosi alleged that FCC's rule change process was marked by haste, secrecy and technical flaws from the start.

"This arbitrary decision was made without a single public hearing and over the firm opposition of Internet experts and technologists," she said.

"It is deeply disturbing that Pai's FCC has refused to take action to combat the threat of identity theft and fake comments in the agency record, and has refused to comply with FOIA (Freedom of Information Act) requests from the New York Attorney General's Investigation," Pelo

House Speaker Paul Ryan

welcomed the decision. "Despite its unassuming name, the Obama administration's net neutrality regu lation threatens the free and open internet that has done so much to advance modern society," he said.

The Trump administra-tion's action to roll back this egregious government overreach into the most innovative space will benefit all users of the internet, he said.

As Chairman Pai outlined today, the way to protect consumers is to put the Federal Trade Commission back on the beat to crack down on those who would abuse open access. This new plan of action will open new avenues for telemedicine, distance learning, and future innova-tions, Ryan said.

White House Press Secretary Sarah Sanders said the Trump Administration backs the FCC's move but also supports a free and fair internet.

KARACHI, DEC 15 (PTI): Forty-three Indian fish-ermen have been arrested and seven of their boats seized by Pakistani authorities for allegedly fishing illegally in the country's territorial waters in the Arabian Sea, officials said today.
The fishermen

arrested yesterday and have been handed over to the Docks police, a spokesman for Pakistan's Maritime Security Force (PMSF) said. "The Docks police

will now present them before a judicial magistrate who will most likely send them in judicial re-mand to jail," Commander Wajid Nawaz Chaudhary said.
The PMSF has arrest-

ed 144 Indian fishermen over the last one month for alleged illegal fishing in Pakistani waters.

With the latest ap-prehensions, the number of such arrests of Indian fishermen this year has gone up to over 400.

The spokesman said e Indian fishermen were arrested as the Pakistan maritime security forces were conducting exercises near Pakistan's Maritime border in the Arabian Sea.

"Speedboats and helicopters were used in the fishermen were spotted in our waters," Chaudhary said. He said the PMSA had

on November 10 arrested 55 Indian fishermen and seized nine fishing boats while on November 12 four boats were seized and 23 Indian fishermen arrested for allegedly entering into Pakistani waters.

He said on November 16 also the PMSA had ar rested a batch of 23 Indian fishermen and seized four Indian boats.

Poor fishermen from Pakistan and India are frequently detained for illegally fishing in each other's territorial waters since the Arabian Sea does not have a clearly defined marine border and the wooden boats lack the technology to

avoid drifting away.

In October the PMSA had arrested two batches of 50 Indian fishermen. On October 29, the Pakistan government had released 68 Indian fishermen from Malir jail as a goodwill gesture.

A total of 438 Indian fishermen were released in 12 days time in December 2016-January 2017 by Pakistani authorities from the Landhi and Malir jails in Karachi.
