WB Govt trying to end Gorkhaland movement: Bimal Gurung to SC

New Delhi. Dec 5 (PTI): Gorkha Janmukti Morcha (GJM) leader Bimal Gu rung today alleged in the Supreme Court that the West Bengal government was trying to "effectively end" the movement for a separate Gorkhaland by implicating its members

in false cases. Gurung's claimed before a bench of Justices A K Sikri and Ashok Bhushan that the state was proceeding in a "biased manner" against GJM members and there was an environment of "constant fear" in Dar-jeeling due to this.

Senior advocate P S Patwalia, representing Gurung, sought an investigation by an inde-pendent agency in the cases lodged against the party members as also in alleged extra- judicial killings by the police, maintaining that a fair probe was not expected from the state.

"We cannot expect a fair investigation. It is persecution. So probe by an independent agency is required," he said.

However, senior counsel A M Singhvi, appear-ing for West Bengal Po-lice, said there were dan-

gerous consequences of what the GJM leader was arguing before the apex court as there was a situation of public disorder.

During the hearing, Patwalia raised the issue of alleged violation of human rights and extra-ju-dicial killings by the state police and referred to a umber of such purported cases.

He claimed that a GIM supporter was shot dead by West Bengal Police in Sikkim and a case has been lodged against the police officials there. "GIM leaders are ar-

rested in false cases," he said, adding "they are trying to effectively end the movement".

"There is an environ-

ment of constant fear in the Darjeeling region as the police is looking for GJM members.
State is proceeding in a biased manner," he

Patwalia said the state cannot act like this as the movement for separate statehood was going on for long and the issue which Gurung has raised before the top court was of fair trial and fair inves-tigation of these cases.

The arguments remained inconclusive and would continue on December 8.

Gurung had earlier told the apex court that main flash- point of con-frontation was that the GJM had opposed the state government's move to make Bengali language mandatory in the schools in West Bengal.

The state police had

maintained that Gurung was absconding, not co-operating in the probe of cases lodged against him and playing "blatant pol-itics", claiming that Gu-

Air quality 'very poor', NO2-laced haze deepens worries

NEW DELHI, DEC 5 (PTI): Air quality in Delhi, 'very poor' since November 23, remained unchanged today, with high-level of nitrogen dioxide (NO2) across residential areas heightening the toxicity

of the haze.

The United Nations marked the day as the first international smog day. It is a moment to remember all of the people who have died prematurely, and avoidably, because of the air pollution, the Unit-ed Nations Environment Programme (UNEP) said in a statement.

The city's average Air

Quality Index (AQI) was 378 on a scale of 500, classified as 'very poor', marginally better than

yesterday's 390.

BJP state-unit has asked the HRDD to solve the issue within 10 days.

Source segregation of waste in process at Rangpo

Adaylong sensitization programme on the theme, "Source Segregation," was organized by Rangpo Nagar Panchayat as a part of its In-formation Education Communication [IEC] activities in coordination with Swachh Bharat Mission [Urban] at Mandi Bazar Municipal Ward in Rangpo on 28 Nov, a press release informs.

The area MLA attended the function as chief guest accompanied by Councilors, Municipal Executive Officer, Station Head Officer, staff of Rangpo Nagar Panchayat and the public of respective wards of Rangpo.

vironment Day]. He briefed the programme about the importance of composting bio-degradable waste [kitchen/ wet waste] at source by adopting the concept of Smart Bin technology and also detailed the procedures/ protocol for achieving Open Defecation Free status

Municipal during his Additionally, Executive Officer, session, announced that from 01 Nov this year, all Municipal wards under Rangpo Nagar Panchayat have begun source segregation. The wet waste is collected on Mondays. Tuesdays. Thursdays. Fridays & Saturdays while

the Dry Waste is collected on Wednesdays and Sundays, he informed.

Colour-coded bins [blue for dry waste and green for wet waste] provided by the State Mission Directorate for Swachh Bharat Mission [Urban] were distributed by the chief guest during the function

It may be mentioned here, the event in Rangpo is in consonance with various directives under the Swachh Bharat Mission-Urban. Ministry of Environment and Forest [MoEF] had mandated source segre gation of waste as compulsory under the Solid Waste Manag ment Rules 2016. The Mini of Housing and Urban Affairs [MoHUA] had also mandated compulsory source segregation of waste from 05 June 2017. Ever since the launch of Swa-chh Bharat Mission in India, the State Mission Directorate for Swachh Bharat Mission [Urban], UD&HD has been training and sensitizing the public, gov-ernment officials and elected representatives of the ULBs on source segregation of waste.

At present, Gangtok Mu-nicipal Corporation has started with source segregation of waste in Arithang ward. In the remaining ULBs, 200 sets of colour coded bins have been distributed for source segre gation of waste as a pilot project. The methodology being adopted in these ULBs is col-

week and wet waste-2 days a week. Frequency of collection of wet waste is more than dry waste because the dry waste can be stored longer than wet waste which immediately putrefies within 12 hours.

The pilot project will be later up scaled to all the households and wards as the main intention currently is to generate aware-ness on source segregation of waste and set example for others to follow, the release adds.

Further, it may be noted that source segregation is not limited to only households. Even commercial establishments, commercial establishments, government offices, educational institutes and any other establishment generating waste have to comply with the mandate by the government.

Sikkim Deserves More **Professional Promotion**

Just word of mouth will not suffice any more

 ${f A}$ quaint tourist festival concluded recently in Dzentourages and the handful who caught the news on local rags, it is unlikely that too many others knew of it or made the time to visit. There used to be a music fest of huge potential that was hosted in Mangan for some years until that too fell silent. The Maghe Mela attraction has lost its sheen even before it was leveraged for the tourism prospects it carried. The winter fest in Gangtok is so erratic that no one appears to even bother to promote it even among locals. Sikkim is now an Organic State for all intents and purposes, but this USP has still not been dovetailed into its introduction as a tourist destination. It should be obvious by now that left to the babus. Sikkim will continue to move from event to event, lacking the coherence and cohesion re-

quired to launch a collaborative promotion.

Tourism is all about promotion, which in today's information-age translates as advertisements. Without promotion in the right places, conveying the right message, tourism potential will remain but a tantalising prospect of the boom that could have been. Of course word of mouth plays a role in promoting a destination and flawless services go a long way in establishing tourism credentials, but for these factors to kick in, one needs the right promotion. More tourists land in Malaysia than the flights bring into India. We obviously offer a much more varied experience, and yet, even Tiny Malaysia beats us with the "Truly Asia" slogan [of much older vintage than the Incredible India tag line]. Tourism is booming in Malaysia, and if anything, the destination's increasing popularity has triggered even more aggressive advertising across all mediums, from television channels to websites to newspapers to magazines to facebook to wherever it is that a prospective visitor might look. They have obviously recognised the importance of promotion.

Promotion and planning have however been consistently ignored by Sikkim, most noticeable so in the tourism sector. When was the last time you saw a slick spot on TV, or a captivating spread in a magazine or newspaper or a sponsored message popping up on your Facebook feed tempting a prospective audience with a holiday in Sikkim? The State is lucky that enough people are smitten by the land and its people to keep arrivals high, save the hiccup of neighbourhood troubles.

Tourism has grown in the State despite a shoddy and extremely unprofessional approach to promotion. An increasing number of Sikkimese are investing in the hospitality industry, a huge number converting residential buildings into hotels. The number of des tinations has not increased by much in the recent past, so one is essentially looking at selling the same "points". What this means is that repeat-visitors will soon start tiring out and to ensure that businesses do not fail and the target numbers are achieved, Sikkim will need to promote itself much better. much more

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Women's NGOs are changing the worldand not getting credit for it

In contemporary global development circles, non-governmental organizations (NGOs) are now performing many more roles and activities than they did a few de-

NGOs work with governments, community groups and the private sector — to develop and implement programs, monitor and evalu-ate their progress and help train people working on those projects.

They're considered more nimble than

other institutions in accomplishing development goals, because they can reach the most vulnerable or disaffected people in a commu nity and find innovative solutions to problems.

Although their funding streams and institutional decision-making structures are typically multinational, NGOs' legitimacy, indeed, often rests on percep-

ns of them being "local" and "close to the people."

NGOs are increasingly taking on the respon sibility of implementing the gender equality and women's empowerment agendas of the global de-velopment sector.

But very rarely have researchers tried to understand or document the specific challenges and op-portunities that NGOs working on gender equality, or those that define themselves as feminist NGOs or women's NGOs, face — when participating in multiple-stakeholder projects like Canada's new

feminist international assistance policy. The United Nations' Sustainable Development Goals, adopted in 2015, and the Canadian initiative that includes \$150 million in funding for advancing the rights of women and girls, will undoubtedly increase the engagement of women's NGOs in a variety of activities

That means understanding the opportunities and constraints faced by women's NGOs in multiple-stakeholder projects is increasingly important.

WOMEN'S NGOS IN INDIA AND TANZANIA

We're basing our observations upon research conducted over the past decade in India, where wom-en's NGOs were involved in delivering urban basic services like water, sanitation and electricity, and in Tanzania, where women's NGOs helped deliver community health and microenterprise develop-

In both contexts, we found that women's NGOs played crucial roles in development projects, often mobilizing, organizing and building projects that otherwise would never have launched.

In India, for example, women's NGOs in the state of Guiarat mobilized local communities to participate in urban development projects. They helped form com-munity-based organizations to represent local interests and implemented community development projects uch as health services, adult literacy and child care.

Women's NGOs also conducted research to de-

termine whether local communities could afford to pay for basic urban services.

They negotiated subsidies, fair pricing and

flexible terms of payment with utilities on behalf of marginalized people. They arranged access to loans from microfinance institutions for households that could not cover the cost of water or elec-

And by insisting that water and electricity bills be issued in the names of female heads of h holds, women's NGOs strengthened women's access to property and housing.



The NGOs also educated stakeholders about ities of life for the urban poor, and shared lessons learned in one urban area with NGOs in other cities in India. In Tanzania, we studied the community partner role played by a women's NGO in a project delivering health and microenterprise services across East Africa.

The project, which brought together the Tanzanian government, public research and medical institutions, international charitable organizations, community-based organizations and beneficiaries, envisioned the establishment of community kitch-

ens across East Africa to produce probiotic yogurt.

The yogurt would be sold for profit and distributed for free to certain vulnerable groups, including children with nutritional deficiencies and peo ple living with HIV/AIDS.

WOMEN OPERATED THE YOGURT KITCHENS

Local entrepreneurs were offered loans, technical assistance and other training to start up the businesses. A women's NGO that had previously worked to reduce gender-based violence in Tan-zania helped local communities establish, operate and maintain the kitchens.

Before the idea of community kitchens was taken up by more financially and politically powerful proj ect partners, it was in fact the women's NGO that had proposed the idea of establishing yogurt kitchens that could be run by local women in keeping with Tanzani-

an dietary, cultural and consumer norms.

The four earliest community kitchens were run entirely by women. The economic empowerment of poor women in Tanzania was identified as one of the founding goals of the project because of the advocacy work done by the women's NGO.

In later years, the pilot project was expanded to include kitchens run by men.

The women's NGO provided training on probi-otic yogurt production, the health benefits of pro-biotics, financial accounting, entrepreneurship and the importance of combatting HIV/AIDS transmission and stigma.

Until 2012, when the women's NGO withdrew

from the project, community kitchen groups also received training on gender equality, the rights of women and girls and the links between violence against women and HIV.

WOMEN'S NGOS EASILY MARGINALIZED Common findings emerge from our research in In-

dia and Tanzania.

In both contexts, we found that women's NGOs had made vital contributions to the success of development projects, but they were easily marginalized and trivialized once those projects got off the ground. In India, after the success of the pilot projects,

the other partners declared that they would "go it alone" and no longer involve the NGO partner in delivering basic urban services. A similar pattern emerged in Tanzania. Once the project was well-established, it started to expand to include community yogurt kitchens run by men, as well as kitchens in other parts of Tanzania, Rwanda and Kenya. The women's NGO was forced out.

What's more, the gender equality training, identified initially as a key project priority in Tanzania, was discontinued entirely.

Although the contributions made by the women's NGOs were critical to the existence and success of the initiatives, they were often dismissed as supplementary and dispensable by the other partners. Because the NGOs' role of organizing, mobiliz-

ing and helping local communities participate in development initiatives was seen as a "natural" extension of women's care-giving work, it was easy for other partners to diminish and dismiss their contributions.

And because the other partners did not fully

appreciate the contributions of the women's NGOs, ey were unwilling to share credit for the success

HOW TO BOLSTER THE ROLE

OF WOMEN'S NGOS
We recommend several strategies to strengthen and validate the role of women's NGOs in development partnership projects. A memorandum of under-standing (MOU) that defines the specific roles and responsibilities of each partner should be an essen-

tial requirement for multiple-stakeholder projects.

The lack of such formal agreements entrenches the perception that the role NGOs play is not particularly valuable. But the involvement of partners with a wide range of views, sizes, structures and experiences underscores the importance of formalizing the role of women's NGOs. When the relationship among the different parties is formalized, construc-

tive debate can be encouraged among all partners.

The lack of a memorandum of understanding causes overlaps in function, weakens accountability and exacerbates conflict among partners. While it's possible for diverse institutions with different philosophies to work in an integrated way, it doesn't happen automatically or easily.

At a deeper structural level, advocacy work -

whether it's gender equality or community mobilization — must be treated as a non-negotiable pri-ority in global development partnership projects, instead of as a value-added or supplementary task.

WOMEN'S NGOS DESERVE RECOGNITION Our research has shown that women's NGOs play

integral roles in the projects they participate in.

It's unfortunate they must "justify" their long-term involvement in such initiatives, but it may be incumbent upon them to make their contributions to the project more visible to the different partners and to the development community at large.

Collecting, maintaining and analyzing data on a regular basis about key project impacts and outcomes will be crucial for making NGO contributions more visible and less dismissible

Collaborating with academics and other development professionals to publish and disseminate findings from such projects will also strengthen and validate NGO efforts. This article is one small contribution toward ensuring women's NGOs get the credit and support they so richly deserve.

Why remote Antarctica is so important in a warming world

ver since the ancient Greeks speculated a conti-Ever since the ancient Greeks Speculated a con-nent must exist in the south polar regions to bal-ance those in the north, Antarctica has been popularly described as remote and extreme. Over the past two centuries, these factors have combined to create, in the human psyche, an almost mythical land - an idea reinforced by tales of heroism and adventure from the Edwardian golden age of "heroic exploration" and pi-oneers such as Robert Falcon Scott, Roald Amundsen and Ernest Shackleton

Recent research, however, is casting new light on the importance of the southernmost continent, over turning centuries of misunderstanding and highlighting the role of Antarctica in how our planet works and the role it may play in a future, warmer world.

What was once thought to be a largely unchanging mass of snow and ice is anything but. Antarctica holds a staggering amount of water. The three ice sheets that cover the continent contain around 70% of our planet's fresh water, all of which we now know to be vulnerable to warming air and oceans. If all the ice sheets were to melt, Antarctica would raise global sea levels by at least 56m.

Where, when, and how quickly they might melt is a major focus of research. No one is suggesting all the ice sheets will melt over the next century but, given their size, even small losses could have global repercussions. Possible scenarios are deeply concern-ing: in addition to rising sea levels, meltwater would slow down the world's ocean circulation, while shifting wind belts may affect the climate in the southern



In 2014, NASA reported that several major Antarctic ice streams, which hold enough water to trigger the equivalent of a one-and-a-half metre sea level rise, are now irreversibly in retreat. With more than 150m are now irreversibly in retreat. With more than 150m people exposed to the threat of sea level rise and sea levels now rising at a faster rate globally than any time in the past 3,000 years, these are sobering statistics for island nations and coastal cities worldwide.

AN IMMEDIATE AND ACUTE THREAT

Recent storm surges following hurricanes have demonstrated that rising sea levels are a future threat for densely populated regions such as Florida and New York. Meanwhile the threat for low-lying islands

in areas such as the Pacific is immediate and acute.

Multiple factors mean that the vulnerability to

global sea level rise is geographically variable and unequal, while there are also regional differences in the extremity of sea level rise itself. At present, the consensus of the IPPC 2013 report suggests a rise of between 40 and 80cm over the next century, with Antarctica only contributing around 5cm of this. Recent projections, however, suggest that Antarctic con-tributions may be up to ten times higher. Studies also suggest that in a world 1.5-2°C warm-

er than today we will be locked into millennia of irreversible sea level rise, due to the slow response time of the Antarctic ice sheets to atmospheric and ocean

We may already be living in such a world. Recent evidence shows global temperatures are close to

1.5°C warmer than pre-industrial times and, after the COP23 meeting in Bonn in November, it is apparent that keeping temperature rise within 2°C is unlikely.

So we now need to reconsider future sea level projections given the potential global impact from Antarctica. Given that 93% of the heat from anthropogenic global warming has gone into the ocean, and these warming ocean waters are now meeting the floating margins of the Antarctic ice sheet, the potential for rapid ice sheet melt in a 2°C world is high

In polar regions, surface temperatures are projected to rise twice as fast as the global average, due to a phenomenon known as polar amplification. However, there is still hope to avoid this sword of Damocles, as studies suggest that a major reduction in greenhouse gases over the next decade would mean that irreversible sea level rise could be avoided. It is therefore crucial to reduce CO2 levels now for the benefit of future generations, or adapt to a world in which more of our shorelines are significantly redrawn.

This is both a scientific and societal issue. We have choices: technological innovations are providing new ways to reduce CO_2 emissions, and offer the reality of a low-carbon future. This may help minimise sea level rise

from Antarctica and make mitigation a viable possibility.

Given what rising sea levels could mean for human societies across the world, we must maintain our longstanding view of Antarctica as the most rem and isolated continent.

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Mizoram govt reschedules repatriation of Bru families

Mizoram government has re-scheduled the proposed repatriation of over 5,000 Bru families from six relief camps in Tripura to March next year, a senior state Home depart-ment official today said.

The official said that as per the earlier schedule, it was proposed that the repatriation would begin from December first week, but it was deferred to March as the Union Ministry of Home Affairs failed to release funds meant for the exercise

He said the proposal to commence the repatriation from March, 2018 would be



implemented on time only if for expenses to be incurred in the repatriation process.

The state government had for the expenses for repatriation to the tune of Rs 123 crore.

The Mizoram government officials identification in the Tripura relief camps during Novemyear, identified 32,857 people belonging to 5,413 families as bona fide residents of Mizoram and to be repatriated.

The proposed physical repatriation scheduled to commence from November 30 could, however, not take off due to different reasons including increase in the number of bona fide residents of Mizoram from 21,000 to 32,857, necessitating revision of the expen-

diture estimate.

Thousands of Brus fled Mizoram and migrated to Tripura after Bru militants gunned down a forest guard inside the Dampa Tiger Re-

The first effort to repatriate them in November 16, 2009 not only fizzled out due to the murder of a Mizo youth by Bru militants near Tripura border Bungthuam village three days before the commencement of the repatriation, but triggered another wave of exodus.

Even as a number of families have returned to Mizoram during the government-sponsored repatriation process as also on their own will, thousands of them remained in the Tripura relief camps making several fresh demands and conditions for their return.

If there is land, second airport near Kolkata can come up: Raju

KOLKATA, DEC 5 (PTI): Civil Aviation Minister Ashok Gajapathi Raju today said if land was available second airport near Kolkata was a possibility.

"Kolkata needs an alternative airport. If the West Bengal govern-ment gets a land, it can happen," he

said during a media interaction here. Currently, the city has one airport -- the Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose International Airport at Dum Dum on the suburbs.


Raju said land was a state subect and that a huge land was needed for an airport.

scheme, the government had said. Raju said on 20-25 routes under UDAN, the operators were not seeking a viability-gap funding as the routes were very promising.

Manipur: sexual relation now main reason for HIV transmission

IMPHAL, DEC 5 (PTI): Sexual contact has now become the primary cause for transmission of HIV/ AIDS virus in Manipur.

A 2016-17 survey by the Manipur AIDS Con-trol Society (MACS) said the virus is now transmitted through sexual re-lationship in 78 per cent of HIV/AIDS transmisn cases in the state.
While 15 per cent are

due to sharing of syring-es, the remaining 7 per cent are attributed to narent-to-child transmission, the survey said

"Penetration of HIV/ AIDS into the general populace has changed to sexual route over the last 10 years unlike earlier when the virus used to

spread through sharing of syringes among inject-ing drug users," MACS Project Director Valenti-na Arambam told PTI.

The state has 24.457 HIV/AIDS affected individuals till August 2017.

Arambam attributed the increase of HIV/ AIDS cases through sexual route to social stigma and fear of rejection by affected children born to

AIDS-infected parents.
HIV/AIDS in Manipu peaked during the late '90s and the early years of this century and a number of children born at that time are now adults and sexually active.

Such men or women do not reveal to their partners that they are HIV affected due to fear of rejection and the virus spreads, Arambam said.

Transmission of the disease through sharing of syringe is declining now because of intense cam-paign, she said adding that efforts are on to contain HIV/AIDS in the state.

"Manipur once topped all the eight North Eastern states (in-cluding Sikkim) in terms of the number of HIV/ AIDS affected patients is now occupying the fifth position," Arambam said. Three most affected dis-

tricts are Chandel, Ukhrul and Senapati and the Na-tional AIDS Control Organisation intends to launch an epidemiological investiga-tion in those places.

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Assam govt mulls recruiting 4,500 differentlyabled persons

GUWAHATI, DEC 5 (PTI): Assam Chief Minister Sarbananda Sonowal today directed the Social Welfare Department to finalize the selection criterion for filling up of nearly 4,500 posts reserved for differently-abled persons. According to an official release,

Sonowal insisted on clearing all va-cancies backlog of differently-abled persons in various government departments within December 20.

While chairing a meeting with representatives of associations of differently-abled persons, he said that all backlog vacancies be filled up through a special recruitment drive.

"Presently, there are around 4,419 vacant posts under PH category in different government departments and the number may go up as assessment of few other departments is still going on," the statement said.

Sonowal directed the Social Welfare Department to draw up a recruitment framework in consultation with the associations of differently abled.

The Chief Minister further asked the

Social Welfare Department to prepare a calendar for all the other government departments outlining the selection process for simultaneous recruitment throughout the state.

The representatives of the associations requested the Chief Minister to take steps for construction of a Rest House for different-abled persons in Guwahati.

Sonowal agreed to the demand and directed the Social Welfare Department to identify suitable land for the same.

Caste politics rule the roost in Gujarat polls

AHMEDABAD, DEC 5 (PTI): The caste factor is likely to remain at the core of Gujarat Assembly polls following the emergence of castebased movements, with major par-ties distributing tickets accordingly.

Both the BIP and Congress have kept the caste arithmetic in mind while given tickets for polls. The Patidars and Other Backward Classes (OBCs) have been given maximum tickets by both the main parties.

The BIP has nominated 50 Patidars this time, while the Congress has fielded 41 candidates from the community.

The ruling party has fielded 58 OBCs while the Congress has 62 such nominees.

The main opposition party has ven tickets to 14 Dalits while the BJP has fielded 13.

As per political pundits, this Assembly poll will be a battle to win that "extra four to five per cent

The BJP cannot afford to lose that while the Congress is trying its best to attract the castes which are 'angry' and can fill in that gap

in the vote share.

According to political analyst Achyut Yagnik, a mere swing of about four to five per cent would prove to be game changer for Congress.

However, he believes that though there is some possibility the Congress may win some addi tional seats this time, it is too ear ly to predict that it would come to power despite the support extend-ed by caste leaders - Hardik Patel, Alpesh Thakor and Jignesh Mevani

"If you look at the vote share in the elections of 2002, 2007 and 2012, Congress bagged around 40 per cent while BJP got 49 per cent each time. Now, even a slight swing four to five per cent would significantly benefit ngress," Yagnik said. He said "the caste factor is still at

the core of Guiarat's politics and tickets are also distributed accordingly."

Since the last two decades, the

BJP was enjoying support of the Patidars, be it urban or rural voters. But caste equations seem to have changed after Hardik Patel's agitation demanding reservation for Patidars, which triggered the rise of a counter agitation by OBC eader Alpesh Thakor.
When the BJP government was

busy placating them, Jignesh Meyani took up the cause of Dalits after the Una flogging incident and started

agitating against the ruling party.
While Thakor has already joined the Congress, Patel and Mevani moved closer to the oppo-sition party and appealed to their



communities not to vote for the BIP.

As per a rough estimate, the Patidars account for 11 to 12 per cent of Gujarat's six crore population. Though scattered across many sub-communities, the OBC population, including the influential Thakors in north and Kolis in central Gujarat and Saurashtra, ac-

count for around 40 per cent.

The BJP is fighting on all the 182 Assembly seats while the Congress has not fielded its candidates on six seats - five which were given to the Bharatiya Tribal Party and one seat where Mevani is contesting as an Independent.
Political analyst Ghanshyam

Shah feels the Congress has an upper hand at the moment.

However, he says, it will be pre mature to think that the entire Patidar community or the OBCs would vote for the opposition party.

"Ultimately, Hardik and Alpesh are leading an individual fight in some way. Though they have extended their support to the Congress, we should not conclude that all the votes of Patidars and OBCs would go the party," Shah said.

"However, looking at the cur-rent dynamics, the Congress is having an upper hand in comparison to the 2012 Assembly polls,"

Though the Congress has in-

directly supported Mevani by not fielding any candidate against him on Vadgam(SC) seat, Shah claimed that the Dalit vote swing would not leave any impact due to the marginal population.
"Dalits are scattered. They are

only seven per cent of Gujarat's population. Even in reserved seats. they account for only 10 to 11 per cent," he said.

Another political analyst Hari Desai feels it will be a challenge for the BIP to retain its loval vote bank of Patidars. However, he admits that Patels are not opening their cards despite being persuaded by Hardik Patel.

We can not conclude that all the Patidars would vote as per Hardik's appeal, because, those who are party workers and loyal, will ultimately go for BJP. But, it is clear that their loyal vote bank is drifting away after Hardik's agitation." he said.

Citing the vote share data, Desai claimed that a minor swing in the loyal vote bank of BJP would prove to be a windfall gain for the Congress.

This time, the Congress has fielded six Muslims while the BJP has not nominated anyone from the community.

According to the Election Com-

Gujarat polls, the BJP then received 47.85 per cent of the valid votes while the Congress garnered 38.93 per cent votes - a difference of 8.92

per cent between the two parties.
While the Congress is elated to see the new caste dynamics coming to its rescue, the BIP still believes that no one is leaving its ship.

"People from all communities, including Scheduled Castes and Scheduled Tribes are coming to Congress with a hope that we will bring a solution to their prob-lems. We firmly believe that Congress will form the government this time," Congress spokesperson Manish Doshi said.

However, the BIP feels this is not going to happen.
"These new caste equations

will not leave any impact," Gujarat BJP spokesperson Bharat Pandya

"It is a fact that when a social movement turns political, it loses its credibility. The same is happening with Hardik, Alpesh and Mevani. Gujarat never accepts people who talk negative," he said.

How Shashi Kapoor got his name!

know how Shashi Kapoor got his name? Kapoor was born as Balbir Raj but his mother did not like the name and began calling him Shashi or moonbeam - since he was obsessed with the moon and spent long hours watching it.

Shashi Kapoor was born to Prithviraj Kapoor and Ramsarni Kapoor on March 18, 1938 in then Calcutta. He was given the name Balbir Raj - in keeping with the Kapoor family tradition of adopting the word 'Raj' (or 'king') in its many variations.


But Ramsarni was less than happy with the name Balbir and thus changed it to Shashi.

This nugget of information extracted from the book "Shashi Ka-poor: The Householder, The Star", written by Aseem Chhabra and published by Rupa Publications last year.

Shashi Kapoor died in Mumbai yesterday at the age of 79 due to a kidney problem.

The book also says how Rai Kapoor used to call his brother 'taxi'. Raj Kapoor used the word 'taxi' to describe his brother when he was desperately trying to get dates from Shashi for "Satyam Shivam

While actors were queueing up to play the lead role in the film, Raj strongly felt that only Shashi could play his younger self in this somewhat autobiographical tale. So he looked at his brother s schedule and



coolly appropriated all the dates he had given other filmmakers.

His frenetic lifestyle, which

made a car his semi- permanent address, led to the nickname, "taxi', the book says.

According to Chhabra, Jennifer Kendal Kapoor maintained a strict watch over her husband's diet when she was alive.

"This is the reason why, unlike the other Kapoor men, Shashi Kapoor stayed slim for the longest time. It was also why a lot of those around Shashi would feel sorry for him," he writes. "I remembe

remember, when I worked with him, I would look at his food and say, 'What's wrong with you, Shashi Uncle?'" he quotes Neetu Singh Kapoor as telling him. "One orange he would have and thoda sa dahi (a little bit of yo-

gurt). That was his lunch. And he

would say, 'My wife will kill me if I eat anything more!"

Chhabra says the early works of

the 1960s and 1970s established Shashi Kapoor as a star of Hindi cinema, and then, several key films formed a part of his legacy.

"There is no actual count of many movies he acted in.

Many - such as 'Sammy and Rosie Get Laid', 'Jinnah' and 'Side Streets' - never got theatre releases in India. and a few - such as 'Siddhartha' and 'Heat and Dust' - have been forgotten today.

But the landmark films - 'Dee-waar', 'Kabhi Kabhie', 'Junoon', 'Kalyug', and even one of his first works, 'Dharmputra' - are still part of Hindi film history, and are definitely worth revisiting, if only to find the terrific, nuanced actor lurking inside that very attractive man!" he says.

'India's influence stops countries from raising Kashmir issue

WASHINGTON, DEC 5 (PTI): India's growing influence and economic power have enabled it impose a "gag order" on Kashmir with western countries being unwilling to raise the issue at the international level, including in the UN, 'president' of the Paki-stan-occupied Kashmir has claimed.

Masood Khan, a for-mer Pakistani Ambassador to the United Nations. is currently here for what he described as part of his effort to apprise the international community about the current situation in Kashmir.

He said India had veto on the talks between the two South Asian neigh-bours. "India has strategic alliances with certain countries.

Because of the lucrative deals that it offers to powerful countries in the West, it has practically imposed a gag or-der on Kashmir," Khan claimed yesterday at the thinly-attended Atlantic Council, a top American think-tank.

He alleged that because of India's increasing influence, "people (in Washington DC), in Brussels, in London or other world capitals don't talk about Kashmir, because this would have consequences for these countries. like in terms of econom ic transactions, and stra-

UN envoy arrives in North Korea as nuclear tensions soar

ficial arrived in North Ko-rea today for a rare visit aimed at defusing soaring tensions over Pyong-yang's nuclear weapons programme.

Jeffrey Feltman's vis-it - the first by a UN diplomat of his rank since 2010 - comes less than a week after North Korea said it test-fired a new ballistic missile capable of reaching the United States.

Feltman shook hands with a North Korean foreign ministry official after flying into Pyong-yang from Beijing on the

North's Air Koryo.

His trip comes a day after the United States and South Korea launched their biggest-ever joint air exercise - maneuvers slammed by Pyongyang as an "all-out provocation".

The five-day Vigilant Ace drill involves 230 aircraft, including F-22 Raptor stealth jet fighters, and tens of thousands of



troops, Seoul's air force

Feltman, the UN's under secretary general for political affairs, arrived in China on Monday as Beijing is one of the few transit points to North Korea in the world.

He met with a Chinese vice foreign minister while there. China, which is Pyongyang's sole major diplomatic and military ally, has called on the United States to freeze military drills and North Korea to halt weapons tests to calm tensions.

In the North, Feltman will discuss "issues of mutual interest and concern" with officials, UN spokesman Stephane Dujarric said, adding he was unable to say whether the envoy will meet the reclusive state's leader

Kim Jong-Un.
"The first step - that North Korea agreed to have (Feltman) visit - is a positive sign," Wang Dong, an international studies professor at Pe-

king University, told AFP.

"If the diplomatic effort is successful, then they will certainly be able to exercise some persuasion. It will be Feltman's first visit to North Korea since he took office five vears ago.

"After declaring that the country has achieved full nuclear statehood. the North is likely to repromise that... it will use its nuclear weapons only for defence purposes," Koh Yu-Hwan, a professor at Dongguk University in Seoul, told AFP.

The UN Security Council has hit the iso-lated and impoverished North with a package of sanctions over its in-creasingly powerful missile and nuclear tests. which have rattled Washington and its regional allies South Korea and

Pyongyang ramped up already high tensions the Korean Peninsula five days ago when it announced it had sucannounced it had suc-cessfully test-fired a new ICBM, which it says brings the whole of the continental United States within range.

Analysts say it is un-clear whether the missile survived re-entry into the earth's atmosphere or could successfully deliver a warhead to its target -- key technological hurdles for Pyong-yang. A Cathay Pacific crew flying from San Francisco to Hong Kong said they spotted what they believed was the missile, with one airline official saying the crew described seeing it "blow up and fall apart".

In recent vears. Pyongyang has accelerated its drive to bring together nuclear and missile technology capa-ble of threatening the US, which it accuses of hos-tility. US President Donald Trump has engaged in months of tit- for-tat rhetoric with Kim, pe-joratively dubbing him "Little Rocket Man" and a

"sick puppy".

In a new editorial today, North Korean state media blasted the joint US-South Korean drills as going "beyond the dan-ger line" adding the two allies were like "a group of tiger moths flying into fire only to perish in it".

As well as featuring the latest generation

year's war games involve simulated precision at-tacks on the North's military installations, including its missile launch sites and artillery units, Yonhap news agency said, citing unnamed Seoul sources.

Over the weekend Trump's National Secu-rity Adviser HR McMaster told a security forum that the potential for war with the North "is in-

creasing every day".

But some Trump advisers say US military options are limited when Pyongyang could launch an artillery barrage on the South Korean capital only around 50 kilometers (30 miles) from the heavily-fortified border and home to 10 million people.

Yemen ex-president killed as fighting shakes capital

SANAA, DEC 5 (AFP): Ye-men's ex-president Ali Abdullah Saleh was killed on 04 Dec as fighting raged between his forces and Iran-backed rebels. the insurgents and his party said, following the dramatic collapse of their anti-government alliance. Saleh, who ruled Ye-

men with an iron fist for three decades until 2012, had joined forces with the Shiite Huthi rebels three years ago when they took control of large parts of the Arabian Pen-



insula country including the capital Sanaa.

ravelled over the last week, with heavy fight-ing across the capital, and Saleh was reportedly shot dead by Huthi fight-ers after he fled the city.

His death could mark a major turning point in a conflict that has left thousands dead, led to one of the world's worst humanitarian crises and deepened tensions between Middle East rivals

Saudi Arabia and Iran President Abedrabbo

Mansour Hadi, the head of Yemen's internationally recognised govern-ment, moved to take advantage of the chaos by ordering an offensive to retake the capital.

Supreme Court allows Trump's travel ban to take full effect

Washington, Dec 5 (PTI): In a maior triumph for US President Donald Trump, the Supreme Court has backed his controversial travel ban targeting people from six Muslim- majority countries, asserting that its immediate enforcement can go into full effect pending appeal.

The travel ban is the third version

of a contentious policy that Trump first sought to implement a week after tak-

ing office in January.

As a result of the yesterday's ruling by the Supreme Court's, Trump's travel ban, which restricts travel to the US by people from Iran, Libya, Syria, Yemen, Somalia and Chad without bona fide connections to America, can take full effect while legal challenges proceed.

Seven of the nine judges lifted re strictions on the travel ban imposed by other courts earlier. Justice Ruth Bader Ginsburg and Justice Sonia Sotomayor said they would have denied the gov-

ernment's request.

The court gave no reason for its de-

cision, but said it expected lower court review of the executive orders to proceed quickly.

"Multiple government have conducted a comprehensive, worldwide review of the information shared by foreign governments that is used to screen aliens seeking entry to the US," US Solicitor General Noel Francisco argued in court papers.

"We are not surprised by today's Supreme Court decision permitting im-mediate enforcement of the President's proclamation limiting travel from countries presenting heightened risks of terrorism," White House spokesman

Hogan Gidley said after the order.

Trump's travel ban was challenged by Hawaii and American Civil Liberties Union in separate lawsuits. They argued that such a ban discriminated against Muslims.

"It is difficult to conceive of a more flagrant example of discrimination because of nationality," said Indian-American attorney Neal Katyal, who appeared for Hawaii.

New York Immigration Coalition Executive Director Steven Choi said it was entirely unacceptable and un-American to discriminate against people based on race or religion.

"Allowing the full enforcement of the Muslim ban will not make this country safer or greater. Nearly a year after we rallied at JFK in response to the first Muslim ban, we will continue to fight Trump's plan to turn bigotry into policy and resist this latest assault on our liberties just as we have every day since Trump took office," Choi said.

Michael S Glassner, executive director of Donald J Trump for President campaign committee, welcomed the

"From June 16, 2015 to this day, President Trump's immigration policies have always been about one thing: keeping Americans safe from people who seek to do us harm and attack our freedoms," he said.

"As promised, the President directed his administration to conduct a thor-

ough and appropriate review of immigration vetting procedures, in place under the previous administration, to ensure that terrorist attacks do not occur on American soil." he said.

"Now that the Supreme Court has ordered the lifting of restrictions on this ban, minimum security standards for entry into the US can be enforced," All Americans should take heart

that President Trump is fully commit-ted to Making America Safe Again, and will continue the fight to ensure their safety no matter what, Glassner said.

Omar Jadwat, director of the ACLU's Immigrants' Rights Project, said that it was unfortunate that the full ban can move forward for now.

"This order does not address the merits of our claims. We continue to stand for freedom, equality, and for those who are unfairly being separated from their loved ones. We will be arguing Friday in the Fourth Circuit that the ban should ultimately be struck down," Jadwat said.



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

The song, featuring Desi-igner, debuts at No. 28, besting BTS' first Hot 100 entry, the No. 67-peaking "DNA."

BTS breaks its own record for the highest-charting entry on the Billboard Hot 100 songs chart for a K-pop group, as "MIC Drop," featuring Desiigner (and remixed by Steve Aoki), debuts at No. 28. It marks the K-pop kings' first top 40 Hot 100 entry and the first for any K-pop

The track claims the honor of highest-charting Hot 100 hit by a K-pop group from BTS' first (and only other) Hot 100 entry, "DNA," which reached No. 67 on the chart dated Oct. 14.

The seven-member South rean boy band's new Korean mostly Korean language single launches with 9.8 million first-week U.S. streams and 45.000 downloads sold. according to Nielsen Music (The Hot 100 blends streaming, sales and radio airplay

Only one other K-pop act has charted higher than BTS on the Hot 100: South Korean rapper/singer PSY, led by his smash "Gangnam Style," which peaked at No. 2 for seven weeks in 2012. He add ed the No. 5 hit "Gentleman" in 2013 and the No. 26-peak-

ing "Hangover" in 2014. Helping spark first-week chart action for "MIC Drop," BTS performed the song on The Ellen DeGeneres Show Nov. 27. The act made its U.S. live-performance debut (with "DNA") on the American Music Awards Nov. 19.


