#### Meghalaya signs host city contract for 39th National Games

SHILLONG, IAN 3 (PTI): Meghalaya today signed the Host City Contract with the Indian Olympic Association (IOA) today for hosting the 39th National Games in 2022, officials said.

The tripartite con-

tract was signed between the IOA, the Meghalaya State Olympic Association and the state government here.

Meghalaya had made the bid to host the 39th National Games after successfully co-hosting the South Asian Games last year, they said.

State sports director Matsiewdor W Nongbri said the masterplan of the 39th National Games will be submitted by January 2019.

She said a working group, headed by Sports Minister Zenith Sangma, has been formed apart from a Land Bank Com-mittee and Team Preparation Committee.

A cheque of Rs 4.5 crore was handed over to the IOA as bid money for the Games. The state gov-ernment had earlier paid Rs 50 lakh. The cost of the bid is Rs 5 crore, the officials said.

Urban Affairs Minister R V Lyngdoh, congratulating the team behind the signing of the con-tract, said it was befitting to celebrate the state's 50th year by hosting the

IOA secretary general Rajiv Mehta said the signing of the host city contract will ensure that the Games go as planned and on time.

An estimated 14,450 athletes and officials are expected to visit the state during the Games, the officials said

### Banks await Rs 15000-cr MTM loss on surging bond yields: Report

MUMBAI, JAN 3 (PTI): Continuing surge in the benchmark bond yields, which rose as much as 67 bps in Q3, will leave banks with a big hole in their treasury portfolios and result in mark-to-market (MTM) losses of Rs 15.500 crore for the December quarter alone, warns a report.

As much as 80 per cent of this over Rs 15.000-crore dent is slated to be absorbed by state-run lenders, further eroding their core capital, and government may have to rework its recapitalisation math because of

In the H1 of FY18, state-run banks had a pre-tax loss of Rs 5,624 crore and 80 per cent of the projected loss of Rs 15.000 crore will be borne by them, says an Icra report.

Banks had booked a whopping

Rs 1 trillion profit between the six quarters ending Q2 of FY18 follow-

ing a steady decline in bond yields after RBI cut interest rates.

Concerns over higher fiscal defi-

cit for FY18, wherein government has used 112 per cent of fiscal defi-cit target by November itself, has had the bond yields on fire for quite some time. This had the average Q3 yields at 7.33 per cent and peaked at 7.4 per cent in the last week of De-

cember.
"The 67 bps surge in yields on the 10-year government security in Q3 on the back of higher-than-budgeted fiscal deficit, is likely to result in MTM losses to banks on their investment portfolios in Q3 to the tune of Rs 15,000 crore for the system," Icra said in note

According to the agency, this is because banks have much lower cushion to absorb interest rate shocks, following the recent surge in bond yields on the available for sale portion of their G-Secs portfolio, the

As of Q2, public sector banks had a larger share of the AFS book with longer duration compared to their private sector peers, accordingly, they are likely to account for 80 per cent of overall MTM losses of Rs 15.000 crore, he said.

This comes on back of the state-run banks making pre-tax losses of Rs 5,624 crore in H1, and this projected MTM losses will further erode their capital ratios. In contrast, private sector players are relatively better placed to absorb the MTM loss-es with pre-tax profit of Rs 30,994 crore during the same period.

It also said with this unexpected

surge in yields and resultant losses, government may have to increase the capital it intends to frontload into the banks through recap bonds.

It can be noted that the steady decline in bond yields had resulted in windfall profits for banks, especially in the six quarters between Q4 of FY16 and Q2 of FY18, when banks booked a whopping Rs 1 trillion from treasury gain, much higher than their total pre-profit of Rs 51.105 crore.

While a part of treasury gains were also due to sale of non-core assets by banks given the profitability pressures, however the same is esti-mated to be under Rs 20,000 crore in overall treasury gains, which means that a large share of the gains is coming from their bond portfolios.

Of this Rs 1-trillion treasury gains, state-run banks had booked 74 per cent of or Rs 74,300 crore, thanks to their excess G-sec holdings. But, despite these sizeable

gains, they reported pre-tax losses of Rs 48,020 crore during the period.
As banks gradually booked prof-

its on their investment portfolios, yields on their investments declined to 7 per cent in Q2 from 7.9 per cent in Q4 of FY16, reducing the cushion to absorb MTM losses against adverse interest rate movements.

Decline in 10-year G-sec yields during Q4 of TY16 and Q2 of FY18 was supported by improved fiscal conditions and yields bottomed out at 6.2 per cent in Q3 of FY17 due to the surplus liquidity from note-ban.

Bond yields were but continued to remain below 7 per cent in H1. But, with the rise in crude prices and concerns on fiscal slippages, yields started to harden from September and continued throughout the December quarter and touched 7.4 per cent in the last week of December.

# Master plan for arsenic free water in WB

KOLKATA, JAN 3 (PTI): The West Bengal government has drawn up a master plan for provid-ing arsenic free water to all the affected areas but the people need to be sensitised on the issue, experts said at a discussion on dwindling fresh-

water resources.

The plan has been drawn up in consultation with the Arsenic Task Force, they said.

President of the Institute of Pubic Health Engineers K J Nath said at the discussion that most advanced and latest technologies have been used in the arsenic removal units attached to approximately 400 tubewells installed by the state government as part of the masterplan.

But many of these tubewells have various kinds of operational problems like damage to mega piped water schemes fed from arsenic free surface water sources (mostly the Hooghly river) by miscreants who cut pipe lines and steal valves. The locals have to be sensitised to take care of the projects, he said at a discussion 'Dwindling Fresh-Resources and nges of Fluoride Challenges and Arsenic Mitigation of Ground Water : Role of Innovative Technology' in

collaboration with Lehigh University, USA.
He advocated strict vig-

ilance by the law enforcing authorities and effective mass awareness campaign to sensitize the people.

Nath said the prog-ress in implementing the master plan has been slow because of financial crunch caused by drop in Central assistance and the resource crunch.

Delivering the key-note address, Arup K Sengupta of Lehigh University said to combat the problem of arsenic contamination in water, we must look at alternative sources of water for villages and districts

where the arsenic level is high.
"Transforming

wastewater into useful water through appropri-ate technology could be implemented as a solu-

tion," he said.

Recent epidemiological studies in the state, sponsored by the Arse-nic Task Force and supported by PHED/UNICEF, show that in South 24 Parganas district of the 7683 people examined in 57 arsenic-affected villages, the prevalence of arsenical skin lesion was found to be 4.6 per cent.

The study said in Nadia district, the same is found to be 15 per cent.

The Arsenic Task Force is an advisory body set up by the state government and comprise experts from different academic and research institutes of West Bengal and representatives various state and central government departments like pollution control board, health and family welfare, surface water investigation, GSI, Department of Science and Technology and the referral state-run SSKM Hospital.

It coordinates and interacts with various oth-er sectors for successful implementation of arsenic removal programmes in the state.

# Chinese personnel enter one km inside Arunachal: Sources Itanagar/New Delhi, Jan 3

(PTI): Chinese road-building teams entered around one kilometre inside Indian territory in Tuting area of Arunachal Pradesh last week but returned after being confronted by Indian troops, government sources said today.

The sources said the civilian teams came for track alignment activities and returned when confronted by the Indian troops, leaving behind various road building equipment including excavators. According to local villagers in Arunachal Pradesh, the Chinese team members included civilians as well as uniformed personnel.

The incident took place

on December 28, nearly four months after the end of the 73-day long Doklam standoff between Indian and Chinese troops in the Sikkim sector.
The sources said on Decem-

ber 28, Indian border patrolling personnel observed few Chinese civilians undertaking track alignment activity one kilometre inside the Indian territory in Tuting area.

They maintained there was "no face off" between the two sides and that the issue is being resolved through an established mechanism.

The government sources said the road building equip-ment are lying on the Indian side of the Line of Actual Control



According to local villagers in Arunachal Pradesh, Chinese soldiers were involved in road construction work in the area and that Indian security personnel intercepted them near Bising village under Tuting sub-The villagers said Indian sol-

diers confronted their Chinese counterparts and seized their road construction machines including two excavators

Nyomin Tekseng of Zido vil-

lage near the frontier and Pema Nyisir of Gelling village said that two excavators have been confiscated.

"The road cutting is also clearly visible from the right bank of Siang river at Gelling which is about 7-8 km by aerial distance from the site.

Indian and Chinese troops had pitched tents at the freshly cut road and had erected a boulder wall." Nvisir said.

The villagers informed a local policeman, who in turn alerted the ITBP deployed in Medog, near Bishing.
The ITBP personnel reached

the spot and asked the Chinese personnel to return.

There was reportedly an ex-

change of words but the Chinese ed to yield.

The Indian Army also sent a patrol to the faceoff site, where it continues to stay.

Though the site is part of the

ITBP's area of responsibility, there is a heavy deployment of the army in the region.

### Aadhaar not compulsory for rail bookings, but incentivising its usage voluntarily: Railways

New Delhi, Jan 3 (PTI): The Railways has said Aadhaar is not compul-sory for booking tickets for rail journey, but it is encouraged by the trans-port behemoth by promoting it on a voluntary basis by incentivising it.

In a written reply in

the Lok Sabha, Minister of State for Railways Rajen Gohain said there is no proposal to make Aadhaar number com-pulsory for booking tickets. However, as of January 1, 2017, requirement Aadhaar verification for booking concessional railway tickets for senior citizen has been introduced on voluntary ba-

The minister said in order to incentivise the

passengers for linking their Aadhaar ID and mobile number for booking of tickets, the present ceiling of number of tickets to booked by individual users every month on the website of Indian Railway Catering and Tourism Corporation(IRCTC) has been revised to 12 tickets.

This, he said was for those individual users whose accounts are verified through Aadhaar ID subject to condition that one of the passengers in the ticket to be booked is verifiable through Aadhaar.



#### Pending Issues Difficult Delhi or poor follow-up?

Any time the Chief Minister or other leaders, whether from the government or outside of it, visit Delhi and call on Ministers and leaders there, they submit memorandums which reiterate a substantial list of "pending issues" with the Centre. The list of demands has remained unchanged for a while, and this not because Sikkim is unimaginative, but because the demands have remained pending and hence continue to be petitioned for. Delhi has acquiesced to Sikkim's demands/ requests in too piecemeal a fashion - IT exemption for the Sikkimese and ST status for Limboos and Tamangs - are the only major demands that have been granted in a long while now, and these too after too many years of dithering and delaying. The list of demands and its follow-up has been so static that one does not even need to await an official communiqué any more before putting out a report on what Delhi was reminded about and received a patient hearing against. That is how routine the pending nature of Sikkim's demands has become!

One understands that the wheels turn slow in Delhi, and now that the current dispensation in office there is trying to reinvent the wheel itself, Sikkim will need to learn afresh how to get things moving in the Capital. But even as Sikkim and its representatives try and find their way around the new Delhi, a ques-tion that still needs to be asked is why Sikkim needs to keep returning to Delhi with "pending issues". At one level, the reason is simple - because Delhi needs to constantly be reminded about them since concerns of a State that sends only one MP each to the two Houses of Parliament are rarely a priority. There is nothing that Sikkim can do about that "tyranny" of slim representation. But there must be more reasons behind Delhi's easy amnesia on Sikkim's pending issues, for one the possible fact that Sikkim still does not have officers diligent enough to follow up on proposals which have even the PMO's backing. Once the politicians raise a demand with Central leaders and the same gets forwarded to the respective ministries, the bureaucracy comes into play and the files start moving. Files don't however move if there is no one pursuing them, and experience bears out that Sikkim officials rarely do so. What is worse, sometimes, they don't even respond to queries from the Centre. There have been enough instances even in the recent past when recalcitrance has underlined follow-up from Sikkim's departments.

Sikkim should have figured out by now that Delhi lacks the capacity and the time to figure out Sikkim's "issues". Most of the pending issues, however, need to be resolved by Delhi which lobs the ball back to Sikkim's court and expects a neatly packed and formatted solution to be recommended by Sikkim for enforcement by Delhi. In complicated matters, the State also needs to provide the supporting arguments and watertight justifications and a ready reckoner on Sikkim's special status and the leeway it allows. For more routine issues, sometimes it is as simple as placing the right proposal on the right table. Since this is clearly not happening as fluidly and as professionally as is required for new demands to be framed (since the old have been granted), what else can the elected representatives do but keep trooping down to Delhi to raise issues that are still pending even after everyone has cleared them in principle? Sikkim needs a bureaucratic machinery at home to troop through the doors that its leaders open in Delhi. Till that happens, an annual Delhi pilgrimage with a dusted list of pending demands will remain and constant feature.



# Why we shouldn't be too quick to blame migratory animals for global disease

Have you ever got on a flight and the person next to you started sneezing? With 37 million scheduled flights transporting people around the world each year, you might think that the viruses and other germs carried by travellers would be getting a free ride to new pastures, infecting people as they go.

Yet pathogenic microbes are surprisingly bad at expanding their range by hitching rides on planes. Microbes find it difficult to thrive when taken out of their ecological comfort zone; Bali might just be a tad too hot

for a Tasmanian parasite to handle.

But humans aren't the only species to go global with their parasites. Billions of animals have been flying, swimming and running around the globe every year on their seasonal migrations, long before the age of the aeroplane. The question is, are they picking up new pathogens on their journeys? And if they are, are they transporting them across the world? MIGRATORY ANIMALS

#### ARE THE USUAL SUSPECTS FOR DISEASE SPREAD

With the rate of zoonotic diseases (pathogens that jump from animals to humans) on the rise, migratory animals have been under increas ng suspicion of aiding the spread of devastating diseases such as bird flu, Lyme disease, and even Ebola.

These suspicions are bad for mi-grating animals, because they are often killed in large numbers when considered a disease threat. They are also bad for humans, because blaming animals may obscure other

important factors in disease spread.

Despite the logical link between animal migration and the spread of their pathogens, there is in fact surprisingly little direct evidence that migrants frequently spread pathogens long distances.

This is because migratory animals are notoriously hard for scientists to track. Their movements make them difficult to test for infections over the

vast areas that they occupy.

But other theories exist that explain the lack of direct evidence for migrants spreading pathogens. One is that, unlike humans who just have to jump on a plane, migratory animals must work exceptionally hard to travel. Flying from Australia to Siberia is no easy feat for a tiny migratory bird, nor is swimming between the poles for giant whales. Human athletes are less likely to finish a race if battling infections, and likewise, migrant animals may have to be at the peak of health if they are to survive such gru-elling journeys. Sick travellers may succumb to infection before they or their parasitic hitchhikers, reach their final destination.

Put simply, if a sick animal can't migrate, then neither can its

On the other hand, migrants have been doing this for millennia. It is possible they have adapted to such challenges, keeping pace in the evolu-tionary arms race against pathogens and able to migrate even while infected. In this case, pathogens may be more successful at spreading around the world on the backs of their hosts. But which theory does the evidence SICK ANIMALS CAN STILL

#### SPREAD DISEASE To try and get to the bottom of this

question, we identified as many studies testing this hypothesis as we could, extracted their data, and combined them to look for any overarching patterns.

We found that infected migrants across species definitely felt the cost of being sick: they tended to be in poorer condition, didn't travel as far, migrated later, and had lower chances of survival. However, infection affected these traits differently. Movement was hit hardest by infec tion, but survival was only weakly impacted. Infected migrants may not die as they migrate, but perhaps they restrict long-distance movements to save energy.
So pathogens seem to pose some

costs on their migratory hosts, which would reduce the chances of migrants spreading pathogens, but perhaps not enough of a cost to eliminate the risk completely.

But an important piece of the puz-

zle is still missing. In humans, travelling increases our risk of getting ill because we come into contact with new germs that our immune system has never encountered before. Are migrants also more susceptible to unfamiliar microbes as they travel to new locations, or have they adapted to this as well? GUTS OF MIGRANTS RESISTANT

# TO MICROBIAL INVASION To investigate the susceptibility of

migrants, we went in a different direction and decided to look at the gut bacteria of migratory shorebirds - grey, unassuming birds that for-

age on beaches or near water, and that undergo some of the longest and fastest migrations in the animal kingdom.

Most animals have hundreds of bacterial species living in their guts which help break down nutrients and fight off potential pathogens. Every new microbe you ingest can only colonise your gut if the environmental conditions are to its liking, and competition with current residents isn't too high. In some cases, it may thrive so much it becomes an infection.

We found the migratory shore-

birds we studied were exceptionally good at resisting invasion from ingested microbes, even after flying thousands of kilometres and putting their gut under extreme physiological strain. Birds that had just returned from migration (during which they stopped in many places in China, Japan, and South East Asia), didn't carry any more species of bacteria than those that had stayed around the same location for a year.

Although these results need to be tested in other migratory species, our research suggests that, like human air traffic, pathogens might not get such an easy ride on their migratory hosts as we might assume. There is no doubt that migrants are involved in pathogen dispersal to some degree, but there is increasing evidence that we shouldn't jump the gun when nes to blaming migrants.

# Three reasons to get your stress levels in check in 2018

It's difficult not to get stressed in our fast-paced lives. Whether you're working overtime, battling exams, or caring for a sick relative chronic stress has become a sick relative, chronic stress has become commonplace.

When we're acutely stressed, the fightor-flight system jumps into action, sending a surge of adrenaline through the body.
This product of evolution dramatically increases our reaction speed and once al-

lowed us to escape or fight a predator.

But our bodies are not designed to cope with ongoing activity of these stress

The psychological effects of stress such as irritability, loss of appetite, and difficulty sleeping – are obvious to anyone who has been under pressure. But stress also has subtle, underlying effects on almost every part of the body, including the heart, gut and immune system.

Here are just three reasons to get your stress levels in check this year.

1. YOU'RE AT RISK OF A HEART ATTACK

When activated, the fight-or-flight system causes blood pressure to spike and redirects blood flow away from non-essential

parts of the body and into the muscles.

Consistently high blood pressure or frequent spikes strain the coronary arteries serving the heart. Higher blood

slowly stiffen and become clogged, which impedes blood flow to the heart.

One study found people who were chronically stressed, either in their work

or home life, were more than twice as likely to have a heart attack than those who Another effect of stress on the cardio vascular system is hyper-re-

sponsiveness. When a person is suffering low but persistent levels of stress, their response to an added source of stress is much more intense than nor-

mal, leading to larger spikes in

heart rate and blood pressure Again, the increased blood pressure damages blood ves-

# sels and increases the chances of blockages and heart attacks. 2. YOUR BATHROOM HABITS

ARE UNPREDICTABLE
The same systems that increase blood pressure and heart rate during stress also nuse food to be digested more slowly.

The chemicals produced by the stom-

ach and intestines change when you're stressed. Food gets broken down in differ-ent ways and the body may have difficulty absorbing the nutrients from it. This can lead to constipation, diarrhoea and general intestinal discomfort.

Chronic stress has also been linked to

bowel syndrome and inflammatory bowel disease. While the reasons for this still aren't clear, it's thought that chronic stress causes bowel disease by increasing inflammation from intestinal immune cells called mast cells.

Treatment for these diseases usually revolve around managing the painful

uncomfortand able symptoms instead of ad-dressing the underlying cause. However some therapies, such as the hormone melatonin, work by reducing the effects of stress

# on the gut. 3. YOU'RE MORE LIKELY TO GET SICK

We've long known that stress makes peo-ple more vulnerable to catching minor illnesses but we've only begun to understand how stress affects the immune system over the past few decades.

The best examples of this come from a study of chronically stressed carers who look after patients with Alzheimer's disease, and another of medical students in the middle of their exam period.

This finding was applied in a 2008 study, where researchers took newly diagnosed breast cancer patients and enrolled them in a mindfulness-based stress-re duction program that focused on breath awareness, meditation and yoga.

After eight weeks of participation in the program, the immune systems of the women had all made a remarkable recovery, and were functioning just as well as a healthy person's immune system. The women also reported feeling much more optimistic about their future, as well as feeling more connected with their family and friends.

Interestingly, short bursts of acute stress can be beneficial to immune function, particularly of that associated with exercise. While solid evidence is still lacking in humans, mice received a huge ben-efit from frequent exercise while fighting off melanoma

In the end, it comes down to being aware of your stress levels, and what works for you to get your stress in check. You might be surprised at just how many of your bodily functions benefit from you being a bit more relaxed.

The agreement will safeguard the traditional rights of the largely tribal communities residing along the border which are accustomed to free movement across the land border, the state-

# No need to worry if name not in first NRC draft: Sonowal

sam Chief Minister Sarba-nanda Sonowal today said all those excluded in the first National Register of Citizens draft should not worry as no one will be discriminated against on the basis of caste and community and will be given opportunities to prove citizenship.

Sonowal also said that a mechanism has to be devised "humanely" by the central government on what to do with those who are found to be illegal immigrants after finalisation of the National Register of Citizens (NRC), a list of the state's citizens.

"There is no question of discriminating against any-one whether he or she is a Hindu, Muslim, Bengali or Nepali," Sonowal told PTI.

No one will be victimised on the basis of caste and com-



munity, he asserted.
"All will be treated equally and given opportunities to prove their citizenship so that their names could be incorporated in the subsequent drafts of the NRC," Sonowal said. The chief minister said the

NRC has given an opportunity to segregate the bona fide cit-izens from illegal immigrants and it is a "win-win situation"

for those who have been living under the stigma of "suspected illegal immigrants" for the last four decades

The government is working reasonably as per the Supreme Court order. Those who will be found to be illegal immigrants after the final list will also be treated humanely. A mechanism has to be evolved by the central gov-

them," he said.

The part draft of the NRC was published on the inter-vening night of December 31 and January 1 where names of 1.9 crore people out of the 3.29 crore applicants were incorporated.

The massive exercise aimed at identifying illegal immigrants in the state that borders Bangladesh is being carried out in Assam following a decision in 2005 after a se ries of meetings between the central and state governments and the influential All Assam Students' Union (AASU)

Assam, which faced influx of people from Bangladesh since the early 20th century, is the only state having an

NRC, first prepared in 1951.

The current exercise, started in 2005 under the then Congress regime, got a

major push only after the BJP came to power in the state with illegal immigration from

Bangladesh as a poll plank.
The Supreme Court, which is monitoring the entire process, had ordered that the first draft of the NRC be published by December 31 after completing the scrutiny of over two crore claims along with that of around 38 lakh people whose documents

were suspect.

Of the 3.29 crore applications submitted, there was confusion over the inclusion of 29 lakh people who had submitted certificates issued by 'gram panchayats' as proof of identity, after a Gauhati High Court order in February had deemed 'panchayat' certificates invalid, an official said.

The Supreme Court set aside the High Court order and upheld the validity of the certificates as identity proof if they were followed up with proper verification.

The apex court also asked authorities to stick to the original deadline for the publication of the draft NRC and include names of those whose

claims were verified. When the NRC was first repared in Assam way back in 1951, the state had 80 lakh

citizens then.

The process of identification of illegal immigrants in Assam has been debated and become a contentious issue in the state's politics.

A six-year agitation de-manding identification and deportation of illegal immigrants was launched by the AASU in 1979. It culminated with the signing of the Assam Accord on August 15, 1985, in the presence of then prime minister Rajiy Gandhi.

# Centre conspiring to drive out Bengalis from Assam: Mamata

AMODPUR (WB), JAN 3 (PTI): West Bengal Chief Minister Ma-mata Banerjee today accused the BJP-led central government of "hatching a conspiracy" to drive out Bengalis from Assam by "excluding" their names from the first draft of the National Register of Citizens (NRC).

The NRC of 1951 is being updated in Assam under the su-pervision of the Supreme Court to identify original residents of the state in order to check illegal

Its first draft was published on December 31 midnight.

Banerjee cautioned the Cen-

tre on the issue, saying it should not "play with fire".

"People have gone there (As-

sam) to work. In the name of NRC, they are planning to drive them out. I warn the BJP govern-



ment at the Centre not to play with fire. They should not follow the divide and rule policy," she said while addressing a meeting

here.
"This is a conspiracy of the central government to drive out

around 1.80 crore people from

the state," Banerjee alleged. She said that people migrate to other states for jobs which is their right. "Slowly, they settle down just like there are people from other states who are working and staying in West Bengal," she said.

She claimed that the Trinamool Congress is the only party which speaks for the cause of the people

'We will continue speaking for the people and if anything happens to them, we will not keep silent," she said.

The chief minister said that if trouble breaks out in Assam, it will have an effect on Bengal, but added "we will keep the Assamese residing in Bengal close to our bosom".

The first draft of the NRC has listed 19 million people out of the 32.9 million applicants as legal Indian citizens, in a massive exercise aimed at identifying illegal immigrants in the state that borders Bangladesh.

### Nepal govt for Upper House polls on Feb 8

SHIRISH B PRADHAN **KATHMANDU, JAN 3 (PTI):** The Nepal Cabinet has proposed February 8 as the date for conducting polls to the National Assembly to pave the way for formation of the new government after recent provincial and

parliamentary polls.

A Cabinet meeting headed by Prime Minister Sher Bahadur Deuba yesterday took the deci-sion on the date for polls to the upper house.

Deuba had proposed February 8 as the date for the election, during a meeting with Chief Elec tion Commissioner Ayodhee Prasad Yadav.

Yadav expressed his readiness to conduct the election for the Upper House on that date.
Out of 59 members of

the National Assembly 56 will be elected by an electoral college com-prising the chiefs and deputy chiefs of the 753 local units and members of the provincial assemblies. The remaining three will be nominated by the president on the recommendation of the government.

The EC has been maintaining that it could not allocate the seats under proportionate repre-sentation for the Lower House before conducting the election to the Upper House.

It is necessary to conduct the election to the Upper House to allocate seats for women and ethnic minorities, including Dalits, Yadav said.

The election of the new prime minister can take place only after the formation of the full house, which includes the House of Representatives and the Upper House, as per the constitutional provision.

However, the victorious Left alliance, comprising CPN-UML and CPN-Maoist Centre, has been demand-ing Deuba quit the top post at the earliest so as to pave way for election of the prime minister.

Deuba, has, however, maintained that he would not resign before the Upper House election takes place.

The president last week endorsed the ordinance related to the elec-tion of the Upper House that paves the way for the election of the prime minister.

CPN-UML chairman and former premier KF Oli is likely to be again elected to the top exec-utive post with the sup-port of CPN-Maoist Centre as the Left Alliance secured 174 seats in the 275-member Parliament

The Left alliance won 116 seats out of a total 165 under the first-pastthe-post system while Deuba's Nepali Congress bagged just 23 seats in the country's ly-concluded historic polls that many hope will bring much-needed po-litical stability to the Himalayan nation

### India, China committed to seeking mutually acceptable solution to boundary dispute: Govt

New Delhi, Jan 3 (PTI): India and China are committed to seeking a fair and mutually acceptable solution to the boundary dispute through negotia-tions, the government said to-day when asked whether a "high degree of mistrust" prevails be-tween India and its neighbours mainly due to border issues.

In a written reply to a question in Lok Sabha, Minister of State for External Affairs V K Singh gave a detailed response on India's border disputes with neighbouring countries, including Pakistan

Singh said there was no question of a "high degree of mistrust" mainly due to border disputes with Bangladesh, Bhutan, Myanmar and Sri Lanka and the issue was also not applicable in case of Nepal.

Singh said as far as China is concerned, the two countries have agreed to appoint Special Representatives to explore the framework for a boundary set-tlement from the political perspective of the overall bilateral relationship.

He also noted that the 20th

round of the Special Representa-tives-level talks were held here on December 22, 2017. The minister said that Pa-

kistan has launched attacks on India in 1948, 1965, 1971 and

"Pakistan also supported insurgency and terrorism in the State of Jammu and Kashmir and also aids and abets cross- border terrorism targeted against India which endangers security and stability not only of India but of the entire region. Pakistan covets territory of J-K which covets territory is an integral part of India," he asserted.

The minister's reply was to a question posed by senior Congress leader Mallikarjun Kharge about the details of border disputes between India and its neighbouring countries, includ-ing China and Pakistan, and also whether a "high degree of mistrust" continues between India and its neighbours mainly due to border disputes.
Singh also said that the gov-

ernment s consistent policy has been that it desires good neighbourly relations with Pakistan. "However, this necessarily requires an environment free from terror, hostility and violence."

# Nagaland saw a 'musical chairs' game on the CM issue in 2017

Коніма, Jan 3 (РТІ): Nagaland witnessed violence in 2017 over the issue of urban local bodies with women quota, high political drama over leadership in the ruling Naga People's Front (NPF) and simmering tension along the border with Assam.

Besides regular programmes of the government along with official functions, the year did not witness any major developmental activities.

Following the announcement of election to ULBs with 33 per cent women reservation in the fag end of 2016, various tribal organisations resorted to threatening women candidates and also dam-aging their houses starting January 2, 2017.

Nonetheless, angered over the state government's decision to go ahead with women reservation in ULBs, menfolk took to the streets on January 31 night in Dimapur resulting in killing two youths in alleged police firing, the SIT investigation report of which is yet to be

made public.

This was followed by van dalism and arson in Kohima and Mokokchung district where government offices were burnt on February 2 while the state was in

prolonged period of bandh.

Subsequently, the state government had to declare the February ULB elections as null and void but the unspecified public under the aegis of Joint Coordination Committee and Nagaland Tribes Action Committee, constituted specially to speak for the general public demanded Chief Minister Zeliang to step down from the chair.

Zeliang left with no option vacated the chair while the NPF brought in former minister and party president Shurhozelie Liezimitigate the burning tension in the state and he was sworn in as chief minister on February 22. However, despite a majority of MLAs preferring Liezietsu, his takeover was queered when Lok Sabha MP Neiphiu Rio's name was propped by section of NPF MLAs.

Thereafter, Liezietsu led the vernment smoothly.

But leadership crisis with-

in NPF legislators cropped after four months, when Liezietsu announced his willingness to contest the bye-election under 10-Northern Angami-I seat, which was vacated by his son Khriehu Liezietsu for him to become MLA and continue the chief ministership.

Zeliang along with 36 NPF MLAs camped at Keziranga in Assam to stake claim to form his government on July 8. While Governor PB Acharya gave an opportunity to Liezietsu to prove his majority in the assembly on July 19, but the latter did not make any move resulting in the dismissal of his government and installation of Zeliang as the chief minister for the second time.

Zeliang proved his majority in the Assembly on July 21 but the in-ternal crisis deepened with Liezietsu expelling and suspending 36 NPF MLAs supporting Zeliang and

The NPF dram continued even in the court of law and also the assembly Speaker seeking legal proceedings against each other, even to the extent of disqualification from Assembly.

While on the other hand the dissident legislators claiming to have the majority of the Central Executive Council of the party declared Rio as the new president of NPF. They also held the NPF general

convention in Dimapur on September 20 and submitted claims of party nomenclature and election symbol with the Election Commission.

However, the Election Com-

mission wrote back to NPF led by Liezietsu informing about the claims of Rio-led NPF and that the matter be solved through a general convention as per the provisions of the party constitution, which was complied on November 22.

Nonetheless, with onset of festive season and also state assembly elections scheduled for early next year, Zeliang and Liezietsu while leaving behind Rio, signed a mem-

orandum of reconciliation on December 8 to give up the bitterness but come together considering the fast approaching solution of Naga political issue and also complying with the directive of ECI.

The change of guard for two nes and also the final reconciliation also witnessed frequent reshuffle in the council of min-isters and also sacking of some unfavoured ministers and parliamentary secretaries. This not only hampered the functioning of government departments but all the developmental activities for the year were brought to a standstill.

Amid the NPF crisis, a new political party under the banner of Nationalist Democratic Progressive Party (NDPP) erupted in the state in May with members com-prising most of retired bureaucrats and headed by former Lok Sabha MP Chingwang Konyak.

The year gone by also witnessed simmering tension be-tween Nagaland and Assam on the border issue.

NSCN (K) 'chairman' Khaplang's death in June was deeply mourned by the state. He was replaced by the banned group's 'vice chairman' Khango Konyak.

On the long cherished aspiration of the people of the state for an early resolution of the Naga political issue, the Nagas and the state government renewed hope that solution is fast approaching to conclusion. The Centre's interlocutor R N Ravi during his visit to the state in July declared that solution of the decades old crisis is close by.

With assembly elections ap-proaching, Naga civil societies and tribal organisations have been de-"solution, not election" while the state government passed in the assembly a resolution appealing the central government to resolve the Naga political issue be-

fore the next general elections. In the technology era, Nagaland became the first state in the country to introduce and implement Radio Frequency Identity (RFID) based file management system.

#### Govt extends compulsory jute packaging for foodgrains, sugar

New Delhi, Jan 3 (PTI): The Cabinet Commit-

tee on Economic Affairs (CCEA) today extended the mandatory packaging of foodgrains and sugar products in jute bags for the year ending June 2018.

The move will help sustain the core demand for the jute sector and support the livelihood of the workers and farmers dependent on the sector in eastern and north-eastern regions of the country particular-ly in West Bengal, Bihar, Orissa, Assam, Andhra Pradesh, Meghalaya and

The CCEA has extended the mandatory packaging norms under the Jute Packaging Material (JPM) Act, 1987," as per the official statement.

As per the norms, it is compulsory to pack 90 per cent of foodgrains and 20 per cent of sugar

products in jute bags.

The decision also mandates, in the first instance, the entire re-quirement for packing of foodgrains would be placed in jute bags thus, making a provision for 100 per cent packing of foodgrains in jute bags subject to the ability of the jute industry to meet the requirement, statement added.

Jute industry is pre-minantly dependent dominantly on government, which purchases jute products worth more than Rs 5,500 crore every year. Considering nearly 3.7 lakh workers and approximately 40 lakh farmers are dependent for their livelihood on the jute sector, the government said it has been making concert-ed efforts for the development of the jute sector.

With a view to boost demand in the jute sector, government has imposed Definitive Anti Dumping Duty on import of jute goods from Bangladesh and Nepal with effect from January 5, 2017, which has provided scope for additional demand of 2 lakh MT of jute goods in the domesarket for the Indian

endar issued by UP Madrassa Board Registrar Rahul Gupta, the holidays during several non-Muslim festivals like Christ-mas, Diwali, Dusshera, Mahavir Jayanti, Buddh Purnima and Raksha Purnima and Raksha Bandhan have been increased.

On the other hand, 46 holidays given on Ramazan have been reduced to 42. Besides, 10 holidays at the discretion of madrassa managers have also been scrapped.

With the new arrangement, number of holidays in madrassas

to 86, as compared to 92 earlier.

Protesting against the decision, the Teachers' Association of Madaris Arabia today wrote a letter to Chief Minister Yogi Adityanath, demanding that he reconsider the move

"As per the new calendar, holidays will be given two days before the start of Ramzan. Earlier, it was given 10 days before Ramzan. It will create difficulties for madrassa students and teachers to reach their homes in time for the festivities," Diwan Sahab Jaman, general secretary of the association, said.

Contending that the new move would send a wrong message, he said, cancellation of 10 dis-cretionary holidays given by madrassa managers should be reconsidered.

# Cattle slaughter ban, GM & pollution issues kept environment ministry busy in 2017

New Delhi, Jan 3 (PTI): The Union environment ministry grappled with controversies triggered by its notification banning sale and purchase of cattle from animal markets for slaughter and a recommendation for commercial use of GM mustard besides high air pollution levels during 2017.

The ministry, which saw Harsh Vardhan taking over its charge in May from Anil Dave who died in office, also steered itself through the controversy that erupt-ed when Tamil Nadu insisted on holding the jallikattu (bull-taming) event against opposition by animal rights activists.

Tamil Nadu was brought to a standstill for almost a week in January due to protest by students, youths and other sections demanding immediate staging of jallikattu in Alanganallur, epicentre of the sport, and other places

Decks were finally cleared for an ordinance on jallikattu and the Prevention of Cruelty to Animal (Tamil Nadu Amendment) Act, 2017 finally received presidential

assent on January 31.

In May, and the ministry was again hit by another controversy when it banned the sale and purchase of cattle from animal markets for slaughter. It also prohibited practices cruel to animals including painting of horns and putting ornaments or decorative materials on them.

The environment ministry notified the stringent Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (Regulation of Livestock Markets) Rules, 2017 under the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act.

Amid growing protests, Harsh Vardhan said the new rules are very "specific" and aim to regulate animal markets and sale of cattle.

Reacting to the ban, the CPI(M)-led LDF government and the Congress-led UDF opposition in Kerala, where beef is consumed widely, at-tacked the Centre with Chief Minister Pinarayi Vijayan saying it is "not right that a government decides the choice of food of the people".

He also said that the Centre was destroying a sector which employees thousands of people while Mohammed Saleem, vice president of All India Iamiat-ul-Ouresh said if the government brought this law, they won't follow it.Amid these protests, the government finally said that it was "considering" making certain changes to the noti-fication to make it more "acceptable" but animal rights body PETA termed it a "dark

day" for animals. The year gone by also

witnessed large-scale profrom anti-genetically modified crop activists after India's GM crop regulator recommended the commercial use of GM mustard in a submission to the environment ministry.

In its submission, the Genetic Engineering Appraisal Committee (GEAC), the nodal regulator for Genetically Modified (GM) crop, has given a "positive" recommendation but "with certain conditions".

RSS-affiliate Swadeshi Jagran Manch (SJM) criticised the move saying allow-ing the commercial use of GM mustard would impact allied agri-activities while some other anti-GM activists asserted that in okaying the commercial use of GM mustard, the GEAC has "yet again proved" to be "unscientific and uncaring" to the health

The Centre for Genetic

Manipulation of Crop Plants South Campus, had submitted an application to the GEAC for the environmental release of GM mustard (Brassica juncea) hybrid DMH-11 and the use of parental events (varuna bn 3.6 and EH2 mod bs 2.99) for the development of a new generation of hybrids.

After widespread pro-tests, the ministry said that it was open to suggestions.
On the climate change

front, India also took part in the Conference of Parties -23 at Bonn in Germany which took place under the shadow of the announcement of US withdrawal from the "historic" Paris agreement, which was agreed by more than 190

President Donald Trump last year had announced that the US would withdraw from the Paris Agreement on cli-

mate change and renegotiate the deal arguing that countries like China and India are

benefiting the most.

However, despite the US's exit from the Paris agreement, India said that it is committed to the deal "irrespective" of the stand taken by any other country.

At the Bonn climate

conference. called for early time-bound ratification of second commitment period of the Kyoto Protocol (KP II) by developed countries to ensure the highest possible mitigation efforts under the UN Convention by all countries.

India also said that it considers climate change a 'major threat" and will play a "constructive" role in com-

#### US accuses Pak of playing double game on fighting terrorism

WASHINGTON/UNITED NATIONS, JAN 3 (PTI): Pakistan has been playing a "double game" for years on fighting terrorism. the US has said and made it clear that Islamabad will have to "earn' American aid worth millions of dollars by taking decisive action against militants operating from

The tough message from the US came af-ter an angry tweet from President Donald Trump on New Year's day that on New Year's day that America had been re-warded with "nothing but lies and deceit" by Pakistan in return for its over USD 33 billion aid in the last 15 years.
Soon after the pres-

ident's tweet, the White confirmed that the US had suspended its USD 255 million military aid to Pakistan.

US Ambassador to the UN Nikki Haley defended Trump's decision to block aid to Pakistan and said, "There are clear reasons for this. Pakistan has played a double game for years." "They

work with us at times, and they also harbour the terrorists that attack our troops in Afghanistan.

That game is not acceptable to this administration," Haley told reporters at the UN head-quarters in New York vesterday.

The Trump adminis-tration expects far more cooperation from Pakistan in the fight against terrorism, she said.

"Trump is willing to go to great lengths to stop all funding for Pakistan as they continue to harbour and support ter-rorism," Haley said.

The Indian-American diplomat said the aid is-sue was connected solely to Pakistan's harbouring of terrorists.

Department State Spokesperson Nauert, speaking at her daily news conference, described Pakistan as an "important partner" and said Islamabad must do more to combat terrorism.

The United States expects Pakistan to take decisive action against the Haqqani Network and other militants who are operating from its soil," said Nauert.

"Pakistan is an important partner. We have a lot of issues in that region. Pakistan knows that, we all know that, and we try to work carefully together on some of those issues. I don't want to say that Pakistan can do more, but Pakistan knows what it needs to do," she said.

Speaking about the US' decision to with-hold USD 255 million military aid to Pakistan, Nauert said the decision was taken in August and Pakistan would need to "earn" such assistance through sincere action.

"They need to earn, essentially, the money that we have provided in the past in foreign military assistance, they need to show that they are sincere in their ef-forts to crack down on terrorists," she said.

# India cancels \$500 ml defence deal, says Israeli arms firm

JERUSALEM, JAN 3 (PTI): A top Israeli arms firm has confirmed that India cancelled a USD 500 million deal to de velop Spike anti-tank guided missiles and expressed "regret" over the decision just ahead of Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu's first visit to the country.

"Rafael has now received an official notification from India's Ministry of Defence concerning the cancellation of the Spike deal," Ishai David, a spokesman for the Rafael Advance Defence Systems Ltd, told PTI here.

Spike, in use by 26 countries around the world, is said to have been selected by India after a long and rigorous process and after complying with all the defence procurement regulations.

"It should be emphasised the cancellation was

made prior to the signing of the contract and despite Rafael's compliance with all the demands," the company said in a statement.

"Rafael regrets the decision and remains committed cooperating with the Indian Ministry of Defence and to its strategy of continuing to work in India, an important market, as it has for more than two decades, to provide India with the most advanced and inno-

The company did not give reason for the cancellation of the deal.

The cancellation comes days before Netanyahu's fourday visit to India starting Jan-uary 14 and is likely to be taken up for discussion. Rafael's CEO would also be accompanying Netanyahu.

recently The company inaugurated its facilities in Hyderabad where the project pany sources said that it is 'designed to accommodate a number of other projects Ra-fael is engaged in with its Indian partners".

As per the original propos-al, India had planned to ac-quire the ATGMs for the Army at a cost of USD 500 million.

# Action against JuD, FIF not taken under US pressure: Pak Min

LAHORE, JAN 3 (PTI): Pakistan has acted against Hafiz Saeed-led Jamaat-ud Dawa and Falah-i-Insaniat Foundation not under "pressure" from the US but after "serious deliberations" Defence Minister Khurram Dastgir Khan said today.

Pakistan has banned Saeed-led JuD and FIF from collecting donations on Monday, after President Donald Trump ac-cused Islamabad of giving nothing to the US but "lies and de-ceit" and providing "safe haven" to terrorists.

The government has banned companies and individuals from making donations to the JuD, the FIF and other organisations on the UNSC sanctions list.

The Securities and Exchange Commission of Pakistan (SECP) issued a notification prohibiting the collection of donations by the JuD, the front organisation of banned outfit Lashkar- e-Taiba, as well as several other such organisations named in a list of banned outfits by the UN Security Council.

"We have taken against the JuD and the FIF not on the pressure of the Trump administration. We have initiated action against Saeed's organisations after 'serious deliberations'. It is not taken in haste," Khan told BBC Urdu.

## High-tech ship en route to resume hunt for MH370

KUALA LUMPUR, JAN 3 the final stages.
(AFP): A high-tech vessel "They (Ocean Infin-(AFP): A high-tech vessel run by a US exploration firm is en route to resume the hunt for flight MH370 in a new bid to solve one of aviation's greatest mysteries.

The Malaysia Airlines jet disappeared with 239 people on board in March 2014 en route from Kua-la Lumpur to Beijing after diverting from its

flight path.

No sign of the plane was found in a 120.000 square kilometre (46,000 square mile) zone selected by satellite analysis of the jet's likely trajectory and the Australian-led hunt - the largest in aviation history - was called off in January last year.

But it looks set to resume soon. Research vessel Seabed Constructor, leased by exploration firm Ocean Infinity, has set off from South Africa for the Indian Ocean with the aim of arriving in the search zone by mid-January, a source familiar with the matter said.

It is hoped by this time the Malaysian govern-ment and Ocean Infinity will have finalised a deal for the hunt to resume.

A spokesman for the company added: "The company are awaiting final contract award before the search recommences."

Ocean Infinity was one of three companies which had bid to resume the hunt.

The source, who de-clined to be identified, said that the firm had decided to send the Seabed Constructor, a Norwegian research vessel, to the outhern Indian Ocean so that it was ready to start searching in a window of good weather expected in January and February.

The vessel is carrying several autonomous submarines which can be launched from the boat to scour the seabed for fragments of the jet.

Australia's national science body CSIRO released a report in April suggesting the doomed plane was "most like-ly" north of the former search zone in an area of approximately 25,000 square kilometres.

Only three confirmed fragments of MH370 have been found, all of them on western Indian Ocean shores, including a two- metre wing part known as a flaperon.
