### **Protest** march for passage of women's reservation bill

New Delhi, Dec 13 (PTI): With the winter session of parliament just two days away, varwomen organisations today rallied for the passage of women's reservation bill.

The organisations took out a solidarity march in the national capital, reminding the government to keep its widely circulated prom-ise of passing the bill in the parliament, at the

earliest.

The women activists said the NDA-led government's majority in the Lok Sabha was enough to fulfil the party's manifesto promise to pass the long-pending bill.

"The women of In-

dia are disgusted and appalled to see the govappared to see the government ignoring the bill even after three and half years of being in power. The present government needs to act on it quickly to regain people's trust," Ranjana Kumari, director, Centre for Social Re search said.

# Two-lane RCC bridge across Mantam sanctioned, State tells HC

GANGTOK. 13 DEC:

The state government has sanctioned a two-lane permanent RCC bridge to connect Upper Dzongu with the rest of the State across the Mantam lake. Following the Mantam landslide on 13 August last year which dammed the Rongyong Chu into a massive lake at Mantam, several villages under the three Gram Panchayat Units of Upper Dzongu like Sakyong-Pentong. Tingyong and Lingthem-Lingdem were cut-off, it may be recalled.

The proposal was sanctioned by the state government in principle after the High Court of Sikkim intervened and passed several orders to address the problems be-ing faced by people living

in Upper Dzongu. Today, the state gov-ernment, in follow-up to

earlier orders of the High Court, informed the Court that the government has sanctioned an amount of Rs. 49,05,75,000 for construction of an RCC bridge and said that necessary steps will be taken at the earliest to expedite

# Air of expectancy pervades Guj a day ahead of final phase of poll

An air of expectancy pervades Gujarat a day ahead of the second and final phase of Assembly polls after an acrimony-filled campaign for the key western state ended yesterday.

Plumes of dust raised by campaign vehicles have settled down and loudspeakers at election rallies have fallen silent after 49 days of frenzied electioneering by leaders of the ruling BJP and challeng-er Congress that seeks to reclaim power after being in the

opposition for 22 years.
The hustings this time were dominated by Prime Minister Narendra Modi, who powered the BJP's campaign in his home state, while Congress's president-designate Rahul Gandhi was the party's face in the elections.

"Never before I had seen both Prime Minister Naren-dra Modi and Congress president-elect Rahul Gandhi coming here so frequently, at times on the same day, to woo voters," said shopkeeper Raju Doshi. He somewhat misses the

hustle and bustle of the highoctane campaign.

"It was hard to miss a sin-

gle news ever since the campaigning began. It was pretty entertaining," he says.

The lull looks like a break from the routine after the

protracted cut and thrust of high-decibel electoral politics.

"It's a lull before the real storm," says Amit Patel, a student, summing up the the mood of the state ahead of the crucial vote that will decide the winner on December 18, the day the ballots are counted.
"The fight is likely to be close

given the aggressive campaigning by both the sides," says Patel. Many poll watchers have predicted a dead heat beveen the two parties.

From the common man on the street to those in the lobbies of think tanks, there is near unanimity that the contest is too close to call, though the two major contenders to power are confident of their victory.

The tone of the campaign, which began on a somewhat subdued note with the talk of development politics, assumed rare stridency which saw the protagonists in the electoral arena making personal attacks against each other.

The acrimony between political rivals peaked with Con-gress leader Mani Shankar Aivar's "neech aadmi" barb at the prime minister, who used it as a stick to beat the rival party with rally after election rally.

The dying moments of electioneering saw a rare row break out after prime minister Modi seemed to suggest that Pakistan was trying to meddle in the Gujarat elections through his predecessor Manmohan Singh.

Addressing a rally in Palan-pur on December 10, Modi claimed that some Pakistani officials and Manmohan Singh met at Congress leader Mani Shankar Aiyar's house over dinner on December 6, a day before Aiyar's "neech" jibe against him.

Shedding his usual taciturnity, Manmohan Singh issued a strongly worded statement against Modi and demanded

an apology.

"I sincerely hope that Prime Minister will show the maturity and gravitas expect-ed of the high office he holds instead of concentrating his energy solely on erroneously conceived brownie points.

"I sincerely hope that he will apologize to the nation for his ill thought transgression to restore the dignity of the office he occupies," he

pained and anguished" by the "falsehood and canards" being spread by the prime minister to score political points in what he said was a "lost cause" in Gujarat.

Gujarati pride remained the only constant in the rapid-ly changing election rhetoric of the BIP.

The party's campaign began with the 'Gujarat Gaurav Yatra' by the party and Modi repeatedly invoked the is-sue of injured Gujarati pride as he planned the end game, calling upon the electorate to 'avenge" the insult on the 'son

of Gujarat' by the Congress.

Whether the sense of Gujarati pride, which Modi appealed to, sways the voters in favour of the BJP, or the the prophecy of "zabardast" result by Rahul Gandhi comes true, will be known on De-cember 20, the day the electorate's verdict is announced.

# **Disaster Management in Times** of Climate Change

The two realities are best prepared for in tandem

Climate Change and Disaster Risk Management are relatively recent responsibilities shouldered on two departments in Sikkim – Climate Change to the Department of Science & Technology and Disaster Management to Land Revenue Department. The recognition of the two challenges as issues requiring round the year and official attention is welcome and maybe it is even time that the two developments were placed under the charge of a single authority. This would be worthwhile because it is now clear that a majority of the natural disasters in the future will be Climate Change triggered. It would thus make sense to make Climate Change Mitigation a part of disaster management. This, more so in the case of hill states like Sikkim which already flirt too often with natural disasters, the intensity of which will grow as climate begins to change more dramatically.

The impact of climate change is becoming increasingly evident in the polar caps and in the Himalayas. High mountain communities have noted that glaciers are retreating at unprecedented rates. The planet's extremities are canaries in the coal mines - alerting the rest of the world to the extent of the changes that are coming and we, because Sikkim holds that canary, should start getting more involved in the initiatives being undertaken to save the environment because that really is the only cushion to minimise climate

At the policy level, Sikkim has launched several measures aimed at preserving its environment and understanding where it stands on the climate change risk graph. These, however, remain typically [for Sikkim] top-down affairs and have come as government initiatives thus far. One doesn't see any private participation in drawing focus to the larger picture. Most NGOs and social organisations are involved in almost exclusively local issues like garbage disposal and plantation works. While these are also necessary, Sikkim needs more who communicate in specifics and undertake studies on climate change impact in the State. There has unfortunately not been any concerted effort in Sikkim on this front thus far. While most people are familiar with climate change, very few are aware of how it is manifesting in Sikkim. The closest that the State has come to studying this is aspect is in the committee (or was it as commission?) set up to study the glaciers of Sikkim. It is not clear what came of this study although some glaciers on high melt have been kept under high watch now. Events like an occasion al workshop-cum-orientation which announces that it will discuss climate change and disaster management do not really ever get into the specifics of climate change impact on Sikkim. Without making this change directly relevant to the people, efforts towards mitigation or management will remain funds-driven undertakings which, even if they are earnest, will remain

Climate Change manifests in both, subtle and overt ways, its slower encroachment not being noticed until it is too late and its more dramatic displays like GLOFs coming so suddenly and destructively that rescue and repairs distract from the causative factors. The dots are not connected and hence lessons are never learnt and preparation always compromised. Some years ago, an ambitious workshop-cum-orientation programme was held in Sikkim on "Climate Risk Management through Disaster Preparedness and Mitigation".
Followed up in earnest, it could have marked a change in attitudes if it had only succeeded in acquainting stakeholders and line department officials to how climate change has already impacted Sikkim. Then, perhaps management and mitigation plans could have been more than the copy-paste speculative drafts that remain in circulation. The main problem in Sikkim's handling of climate change and even disaster management plans is that most people engaged for it work on generalised blueprints prepared elsewhere. Such blueprints should be seen as suggested frameworks to be filled out with Sikkim-specific data, traditional knowledge base and local know-how to deliver management and mitigation plans which actually deliver.

# California fire damage to homes is less 'random' than it seems

In the midst of the many wildfire emergencies that have faced California this year, it can often seem that the way houses burn, or don't, is


The thing is, though, it's not. Fire-fighters and researchers alike have a pretty solid understanding of why some houses are more vulnerable to wildfire than others. The real challenge ultimately lies in whether those with the power to act on that knowledge will do so.

### AVAILABLE SCIENCE

It is commonly thought that it takes direct flame to spread a fire, but this isn't always the case. Small embers are instead often the culprits that begin house fires during wildfires. These small bits of burning debris can be lofted long distances by the wind. They can then end up igniting landscaping materials like combustible mulch, or enter homes through vulnerable spots – gutters teeming with debris, unscreened attic vents, open or broken windows, old roofs with missing shingles. Once there, the embers smolder and can ultimately catch a house on fire.

In California, iconic winds work to create ideal ember-driven ignition conditions. The Santa Ana winds in Southern California – known as the Diablo winds in northern part of the state – have generally followed fairly predictable seasonal and spatial patterns. "Red flag" fire warnings are often issued on dry days when the winds will be particularly fierce.
While humans can't really control

as much as we'd like to believe when it comes to disasters, we do have the ability to control where and how we

routinely maintained.

Researchers recommend what known as a "coupled approach" to home and building survival. This means the development and maintenance of an effective defensible space, as well as the careful selection of construction materials and correct installation to ensure that, for example, there are not gaps in siding or roofing that would allow embers to

Decision-makers also need to be willing to take on the most taboo top-ic of them all: recognizing that there are places houses simply shouldn't be built, or rebuilt, at all.

### (NOT) TOO URBAN TO BURN

Earlier this year, California had the first strong winter rains after many years of drought. Now, after a typi-cally dry summer, the state is experiencing a dry start to the rainy season, particularly in the south. At the same time, people have continued to build into places known to burn regularly. The result of this confluence of events has been fires deeply affecting many thousands of people up and down the

state. California residents are largely aware that not all fire is bad, and that many of our ecosystems thrive on regular fire. It's not something that we should, or ever could, hope to fully contain. Our only chance is learning, really and truly and finally learning, to live with it.

In that vein, the state must look long and hard at some of the steps that have been the hardest to take not building in places that are particularly fire-prone and matching building codes with a modern understanding of wildfire risk – if there is to be any hope of alleviating the human

suffering these fires cause.

We are being invited to free ourselves from the notion that wildfire destruction is random and unpre-dictable, and that therefore there is nothing to be done about it. As the fire season in California gets longer, the winds worsen and wildfires move into areas once deemed too urbanized to burn, maybe the knowledge about what makes houses burn can

finally be put to good use.

 $\mathbf{F}^{\mathrm{orget}}$  about today's modest incremental advances in artificial intelligence, such as the increasing Waiting in the wings might be a groundbreaking development: a machine that is aware of itself and its surroundings, and that could take in and process massive amounts of data in real time. It could be sent on dangerous missions, into space or combat. In addition to driving people around, it might be able to cook, clean, do laundry – and even keep humans company when other people aren't nearby.

A particularly advanced set of

machines could replace humans at

literally all jobs. That would save hu-manity from workaday drudgery, but it would also shake many societal foundations. A life of no work

and only play may turn out to be a dystopia.

Conscious machines would also raise troubling legal and ethical problems. Would a conscious machine be a "person" under law and be liable if its actions hurt someone, or if something goes wrong? To think of a more frightening scenario, might these machines rebel against humans and wish to eliminate us altogether? If yes, they represent the culmination of evolution.

As a professor of electrical engineering and computer science who works in machine learning and quantum theory, I can say that researchers are divided on whether these sorts of hyperaware machines will ever exist. There's also debate about whether machines could or should be called "conscious" in the way we think of humans, and even some animals, as conscious. Some of the questions have to do with technology; others have to do with what consciousness actually is.

IS AWARENESS ENOUGH?

Most computer scientists think that consciousness is a characteristic that will emerge as technology develops. Some believe that consciousness involves accepting new information, storing and retrieving old information and cognitive processing of it all into perceptions and actions. If that's right, then one day machines will indeed be the ultimate consciousness. They'll be able to gather more information than a human, store more than many libraries, access vast databases in milliseconds and compute all of it into decisions more complex, and yet more

logical, than any person ever could. On the other hand, there are physicists and phi-losophers who say there's something more about human behavior that cannot be computed by a machine. Creativity, for example, and the sense of freedom people possess don't appear to come from logic or calculations.



Yet these are not the only views of what conachieve it.

### QUANTUM VIEWS

Another viewpoint on consciousness comes from quantum theory, which is the deepest theory of physics. According to the orthodox Copenhagen Interpretation, consciousness and the physical world are complementary aspects of the same reality.
When a person observes, or experiments on, some aspect of the physical world, that person's conscious interaction causes discernible change. Since it takes consciousness as a given and no attempt is made to derive it from physics, the Copenhagen In-terpretation may be called the "big-C" view of con-sciousness, where it is a thing that exists by itself although it requires brains to become real. This view was popular with the pioneers of quantum theory such as Niels Bohr, Werner Heisenberg and Erwin Schrödinger.

The interaction between consciousness and matter leads to paradoxes that remain unresolved after 80 years of debate. A well-known example of this is the paradox of Schrödinger's cat, in which a cat is placed in a situation that results in it being equally likely to survive or die – and the act of ob-servation itself is what makes the outcome certain. The opposing view is that consciousness emerg-

es from biology, just as biology itself emerges from chemistry which, in turn, emerges from physics. We call this less expansive concept of consciousness "little-C." It agrees with the neuroscientists' view that the processes of the mind are identical to states and processes of the brain. It also agrees with a more recent interpretation of quantum the-ory motivated by an attempt to rid it of paradoxes, the Many Worlds Interpretation, in which observ-

ers are a part of the mathematics of physics.
Philosophers of science believe that these modern quantum physics views of consciousness have parallels in ancient philosophy. Big-C is like the theory of mind in Vedanta – in which consciousness is the fundamental basis of reality, on par with the physical universe.

Little-C, in contrast, is quite sim-

ilar to Buddhism. Although the Buddha chose not to address the question of the nature of consciousness, his followers declared that mind and consciousness arise out of emptiness or nothingness.

### BIG-C AND SCIENTIF-IC DISCOVERY

Scientists are also exploring whether consciousness is always a computational process. Some scholars have argued that the creative moment is not at the end of a deliberate computation. For instance, dreams or visions are supposed to have in-

spired Elias Howe's 1845 design of the modern sewing machine, and August Kekulé's discovery of the structure of benzene in 1862.

A dramatic piece of evidence in favor of big-C nsciousness existing all on its own is the life of selftaught Indian mathematician Srinivasa Ramanujan, who died in 1920 at the age of 32. His notebook, which was lost and forgotten for about 50 years and published only in 1988, contains several thousand formulas, without proof in different areas of mathematics, that were well ahead of their time. Furthermore, the methods by which he found the formulas remain elusive. He himself claimed that they were revealed to him by a goddess while he was asleep.

The concept of big-C consciousness raises the questions of how it is related to matter, and how matter and mind mutually influence each other. Consciousness alone cannot make physical changes to the world, but perhaps it can change the probabilities in the evolution of quantum processes. The act of observation can freeze and even influence atoms' movements, as Cornell physicists proved in 2015. This may very well be an explanation of how

### MIND AND SELF-ORGANIZING SYSTEMS

It is possible that the phenomenon of conscious ness requires a self-organizing system, like the brain's physical structure. If so, then current machines will come up short.

Scholars don't know if adaptive self-organizing achines can be designed to be as sophisticated as the human brain; we lack a mathematical theory of computation for systems like that. Perhaps it's true that only biological machines can be sufficiently creative and flexible. But then that suggests people should – or soon will – start working on engineering new biological structures that are, or could become, conscious.

# WB, Centre deny tapping Roy's phones, HC disposes of his plea

New Delhi, Dec 13 (PTI): The Delhi High Court today said there was no material to accept the claim of BIP politician Mukul Roy that his mobile phones were being tapped by the police of West Bengal, as the state and the Centre have

denied the charge.

Justice Vibhu Bakhru arrived at the finding after perusing the affi-davits filed by the Centre and West Bengal government which have "un-equivocally" denied any interception of the mobile numbers of Roy, who recently joined the BJP leaving the Trinamool



The Centre and state nt's affidavits contained letters of the UNion Home Ministry, DGP and IG of West Ben-gal, Kolkata Police Commissioner and CID of Kolkata stating that no such action has been authorised or taken.

"In view of the un-equivocal stand of the respondents (Centre and West Bengal), the court finds no material to accept that mobile num-bers of the petitioner (Roy) were being monitored," the court said.

It, however, granted

him liberty to approach it again if he gets any evidence to substantiate his apprehension that his phones were being tapped.

Roy had sought a CBI probe into the alleged tapping and surveillance of his mobile numbers by the state police.

After perusing the affidavits which were filed in sealed covers in response to the plea, the court said since there was no secret information in them, they will be taken on record.
Roy had alleged in his

plea that while he was in West Bengal, he always found that the local police were monitoring his movements.

The plea had claimed

that similar apprehensions were put on record by several other persons including Union minister and BJP leader Babul Supriyo.

# When Aiyar's 'neech' taunt reaches a Gujarat village

CHHAPI (GUJARAT), DEC 13 (PTI):
A winter afternoon in Chhapi has all the components that go into the making of an idvllic countryside.

The gentle warmth of the sun, a maze of alleys, women running household errands, men throwing furrowed looks at restless children and five young men staring blankly into the distance.

The buzz of the assembly elections only a day away seems distant.

The occasional goods train cuts through the somnolence only for the hush to descend again.

A young man idly takes out a newspaper, others peer into it. "Modi is a low caste: Mani Shankar Aiyar", screams the headline of the leading Gujarati language daily.

"See what this leader said. Ye theek nahi hai (this is not right)," says Bhavesh Kumar, carelessly folding the newspaper and throw-

ing it on a heap of cartons.

The other four men nod, quite uncaring of the twist the paper has given to the Congress leader's statement by linking it to Prime Minister Narendra Modi's caste.

Away from prime time news and its fulminating anchors, news that Aivar called Modi a 'neech aadmi' (low life) has finally reached Chhapi, which falls in Vadgam constituency of north Gujarat's Banas-kantha district.

The constituency votes tomor row in the second and final phase of the assembly elections.

The young men laugh on hear-

ing that the comment occupied prime time slots across TV channels, prompting the Congress to

suspend the senior politician.

Then, an element of seriousness sets in, the ennui giving way to searching questions and wor-ries about the future.

"If only this much time was spent discussing the lack of jobs even for qualified people like us," Bhawesh laments.



Bhawesh, a Dalit, is the son of a government school teacher. He runs a mobile repairing shop in the Chhapi village market, abutting the local railway station.

The 29-year-old has complet-

ed MA (Master of Arts) as well as B.Ed. (Bachelor of Education). "I had scored over 80 per cent

in the Class 12 board exam. Subsequently, I also completed the Primary Teachers Certificate (PTC) course. But then the government made TET (Teachers Eligibility Test) compulsory and my PTC course had no val-

ue anymore," he says.

TET was made mandatory for recruitment of teachers in many states after the enactment of the Right to Education Act.

"I have taken the test thrice but missed out for a few points. I don't like it here (running a shop) anymore," Bhawesh says, frustration writ large on his face.

After paying a rent of Rs 1,500

and other establishment costs, he is left with just Rs 8,000-9,000 ev-

He says the growing popularity of 4G high-speed mobile services has robbed him off a major source of income as people don't flock to him anymore to get songs or movies downloaded.

Kaushik Rawat, Bhawesh's

friend, seconds him.
Rawat's bloodshot eyes are a clear giveaway that he is inebriated, not very surprising in a dry state

with a flourishing black market. Rawats are classified as a Scheduled Caste community in Gujarat.

"Look at you, you are 29 and single. But alcohol has turned you into a 40-year-old. Who will mar-ry you now?" Bhawesh and Sanjay Thakore playfully admonish their friend, who works at one of the many diamond polishing units in Vadgam for a paltry pay.

The much-touted Gujarat mod-el of development seem to have skipped this part of Gujarat com-

pletely, the youths say.

"In dry state Gujarat, it's not alcohol, but jobs that seem to have dried up," quips Bhawesh.

They are not first-time voters

and elections do not excite them anymore Asked about their voting choices, the Dalits in the group say in a matter-of-fact tone that they choose Congress while Thakore says he supports the BJP, "knowing well" that in this Dalit-Muslim dominated area its prospects are not that bright.

The constituency is witnessing

a fight between Congress- backed independent candidate Jignesh Me-vani and BJP's Vijay Chakravarti. Congress' Manibhai Vaghela

won the last election but has with-drawn this time following the party's decision to back Mevani.

The results for the December 9 and 14 election will be announced on December 18.

Sony Norde and Ansumana Kromah still have hopes of making it into the squad despite training through pain on


the eve of the game.

# ADB slashes India growth forecast for 2017-18 to 6.7%

**NEW DELHI, DEC 13 (PTI):** The Asian Development Bank (ADB) today lowered India's economic growth forecast for the current fiscal to 6.7 per cent from 7 per cent, citing lingering effect of demoneti-sation, transitory challenges to GST and weather-related risks to agriculture. For 2018-19, India's GDP is projected

to grow by 7.3 per cent, slower than ADB's previous estimate of 7.4 per cent.

The downgrade in projection comes weeks after Indian economy reversed a five-quarter slide in GDP growth to clock a 6.3 per cent expansion in Ju-

ly-September.
In its Asian Development Outlook Supplement, ADB said growth is expected to pick up in the remaining two quarters of the fiscal ending March 31, 2018, as "the firms' compliance with the new goods and services tax (GST)"

Growth would also be supported by government efforts to improve balance sheets of state-owned banks, in part through an augmented bank-recapitalisation programme and a supportive global environment.

"However, owing to tepid growth in the

first half of 2017-18, the lingering effects of demonetisation in November 2016, transitory challenges of a new tax system, and some risks to agriculture stemming from a spotty monsoon in 2017", the economic growth forecast has been lowered,

For the next fiscal, the projections have been revised down "mainly because a fast-

er recovery in crude oil prices likely in 2018 will add fiscal pressure, and because private investment growth is expected to remain soft", it said.

ADB said inflation in India remained subdued in the first seven months of 2017-18, averaging 2.7 per cent, with low food prices and demand still not out of the woods because of demonetisation.

"However, inflation has picked up since July 2017 on a price uptick for food, especially pulses and vegetables. Fuel prices also inched up in response to rising global crude oil prices," it said.

The prices, ADB said, are expected to

increase further in the remaining months of the fiscal. Inflation is now projected to average 3.7 per cent in 2017-18, some-

what below the 4 per cent earlier forecast.
Prior to ADB, the World Bank reduced India's GDP growth forecast to 7
per cent for 2017-18, from 7.2 per cent estimated earlier, blaming disruptions caused by demonetisation and the im-plementation of GST, while maintaining at the same time that the economy would claw back to grow at 7.4 per cent by 2019-20.

The Organisation for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) has also cut its growth projections for India to 6.7 per cent for 2017-18.

Fitch Ratings on December 4 lowered its forecast for India's growth for the current fiscal to 6.7 per cent from the earlier projected 6.9 per cent, saying the rebound was weaker than

It also cut GDP growth forecast for 2018-19 to 7.3 per cent from 7.4 per cent predicted in its September Global Economic Outlook (GEO).

Moody's last month projected India's real GDP growth to moderate to 6.7 per cent in the current fiscal, from 7.1 per cent last year.
While GST and demonetisation have

undermined growth over the near term, real GDP growth will rise to 7.5 per cent in 2018-19 as disruption fades, according to Moody's.

According to Standard & Poor's, India's growth is among the fastest of all investment-grade sovereigns and projected real GDP expansion to average 7.6 per cent over 2017-20.

# 'Darkness before dawn': nukes, Russia ban leave Olympics reeling

SEOUL, DEC 13 (AFP): Holding the Winter Olympics in a little-known corner of South Korea was never an easy proposition, but a ban on Russia and the latent threat of nuclear war have left the hosts hoping that things can only get better.

With less than two months to go, a flurry of prob-lems beyond their control have created a perfect storm for Pyeongchang Olympics organisers as they

gear up for the Games at their mountainside HQ.

Not only has Russia, the top medal-winner at the 2014 Sochi Games, been barred over a major drugs scandal, but North Korea has staged a series of nuclear and missile tests while trading threats of war with the United States.

The Games have also been shorn of stars from the National Hockey League (NHL), which is snubbing the event after the International Olympic Committee refused to pay costs such as travel and insurance

"Dark clouds are hanging over the 2018 Pyeong-Chang Winter Olympics," the South's own JoongAng Daily said in an editorial this week.

Public enthusiasm appears limited in the host country, where Unification Minister Cho Myoung-Gyon warned that another North Korean military provocation could deliver a "fatal blow" to the Games.

But as the problems mount, organisers remain defiant. Lee Hee-Beom, president of the organising committee, told AFP: "Minister Cho has gone beyond his brief. I find it regrettable. Sport must be separated

South Korean President Moon Jae-In lamented that cross- border tensions were "higher than ever" before the Games -- but hoped it was like "the darkness before dawn". "It will be resolved in the end and this is only a matter of time," he added according to

Yonhap news agency.

Russia's team was barred by the IOC over a "systematic" doping conspiracy culminating at the Sochi Games, where officials are accused of secretly switching urine samples through a "mousehole" in the laboratory wall.

President Vladimir Putin protested the ban as "political" but said he had no intention of calling a boycott, leaving clean Russian athletes free to compete under the Olympic flag.

Meanwhile, the North's weapons tests and bellicose, sometimes personal, insults between Pyong-yang and Washington have sent tensions soaring on the peninsula and the wider region.

North Korea -- just 80 kilometres (50 miles) away om the venues across a heavily armed border cotted the 1988 Seoul Summer Games and is yet to confirm its participation in Pyeongchang.

It has not helped efforts to characterise the Games

as a "Peace Olympics".

"The double whammy -- North Korea and the IOC ban on Russia -- dealt telling blows to our efforts to make the Games a success. But these are beyond our control," said Yoo Jong- Sang, a professor of sports studies at Nambu University in Gwangju.

"As to these outside factors, we have nothing to do

but cross our fingers," he added.

At least the bad news stories have meant increased attention for Pyeongchang, which was previously so obscure that it was unfamiliar even to many Koreans.

Its name can also be confused with Pyongyang, so much so that a Kenyan delegate to a 2014 UN conference in Pyeongchang mistakenly flew to the North's capital, where he was interrogated for five hours be-

According to Marcus Luer, CEO of Malaysia-based sports marketing agency Total Sports Asia, "No publicity is the only bad publicity" for Pyeongchang.

Any major sporting event usually has "some controversial thing going on prior to it", he added.

"It comes with the territory. These events are so large, a lot of money is at stake, the world is watching... Once the Games are happening, assuming nothing crazy happens, the focus will be on the Games."

Organisers are also upbeat about ticket sales, which have improved since the Olympic torch relay began traversing South Korea in November.

As of Sunday, 586,300 tickets out of a total 1.18 million had been sold in South Korea and abroad, organisers said, or 49.7 percent.

About half of all Olympic tickets are normally sold in the last two months and during the Games, said PO-COG spokeswoman Lee Jie-Hye, so "we don't expect any problems with meeting the target".

Luer advised POCOG to focus on the job at hand, and

not be distracted by events swirling around the Games.

"At the moment, they just have to stay calm, focus on what they need to be doing and that is running the perfect Games. That is all they can do," he said.

"What happens prior to that around the world is really out of their control," Luer added. "Their job is to host the Games, their job is not to worry about politics.

### North Korea tells UN envoy it wants to prevent war

UNITED NATIONS, DEC 13 (AFP): A senior UN official returning from Pyongyang has said that North Korean officials had told him it was important to prevent war but offered no concrete proposal for talks.

"They agreed that it was important to prevent war," Jeffrey Feltman, the UN's political affairs chief, told reporters after briefing the Security

Council on his trip.
Feltman met with
North Korea's Foreign Minister Ri Yong- Ho and Vice Foreign Minister Pak Myong-Kuk during his visit to Pyongyang over the weekend -- the first by a high-ranking

UN official since 2011.

No followup meeting was agreed during the talks, but Feltman said he told the North Koreans that his visit should be seen as "only the beginning" of a new exchange.

"They listened seriously to our arguments," said Feltman, though acknowledging that "they did not offer any type of commitment to us at that point."

"I think they have to reflect on what we said with their own leadership," he added

The UN under secre tary-general for political affairs said he urged Pyongyang to "signal that it was prepared to con-sider engagement" with world powers and that the United Nations could

help.
"Time will tell what was the impact of our discussions, but I think we've left the door ajar,"

# Trump signs USD 692 billion defence budget

WASHINGTON, DEC 13 (PTI): Terming it a "momentous step", President Donald Trump signed a USD 692 billion defence budget which will give legislative authority to implement his South Asia strategy and authorise critical missile capabilities to confront North Korea's threats.

Trump signed the budget at the White House yesterday while noting that the National Defence Authorisation Act (NDAA) could not have come at a more opportune or important time.

The NDAA authorises USD 626 billion of the base budget resources for the Department of



Defence and the national security programmes of the Department of Energy, providing an additional USD 66 billion for Overseas Contingency

Operations. It approves USD 26.2 billion for shipbuilding, including multi-year procurements of Virginia class submarines, USD 10.1 billion to procure 90 Joint Strike Fighter aircraft and USD 2.2 billion for Army ground combat vehicles.

The budget would give legislative authority to implement his South Asia strategy and au-thorises critical missile capabilities to confront threats posed by North Korea.

Trump had sought a major role for India in bringing peace in Afghan-istan and ruled out a hasty withdrawal of troops from the war-torn nation while announcing his new Afghanistan and South Asia policy in August.
"This legislation rep-

resents a momentous step toward rebuilding our military and securing the future for our children," he said.

He rued that the mil-

itary had undergone a series of deep budget cuts in recent years that have severely impact-ed its readiness, shrunk capabilities, and placed substantial burdens on warfighters.

"Today, with the signing of this defence bill, we accelerate the process of fully restoring America's military might," he said, adding that this legislation will enhance readiness, expand and modernise forces and help provide service members with the tools that they

need to fight and to win.
"We will fight and win. But hopefully, with this, we won't have to fight because people will not be wanting to fight with us. It authorises funding for our continued campaign to obliterate the Islamic State. As you know, we've won in Syria, we've won in Iraq. But they spread to other areas and we're

they spread," Trump said.
"We've had more
success with the ISIS in the last eight months than the entire previous administration has had during its entire term,

Trump said.

NDAA-2018 approves missile defence capabilities to create maximum pressure on the vile dictatorship in North Korea, he said.

upgrades Ground Combat Vehicles, allows for the purchase of new Joint Strike Fighter aircraft, and paves the way for beautiful new Virginia-class submarines - the finest in the world," Trump said.

# US ready for talks with N Korea without preconditions: Tillerson

WASHINGTON, DEC 13 (PTI): The US is ready to talk to North Korea over its nuclear disarmament without preconditions, Secretary of State Rex Tillerson has said amid North Korean leader Kim Jong-un's assertion to make his country the "world's strongest nu-

The offer to North Korea comes amid crippling sanctions on the country and just two weeks after another provocative intercontinental ballistic missile test by the reclusive nation.

It also marks a shift from Tillerson's own previous comments that the US would not negotiate with North Korea and that it would only talk once the regime was ready to address its denuclearisation.

"We've said from the diplomatic side we're ready to talk anytime North Korea would like to talk, and we re ready to have the first meeting without precondi-

re ready to have the first meeting without precondi-tion. Let's just meet," Tillerson said. He was speaking on 'Meeting the Foreign Poli-cy Challenges of 2017 and Beyond' organised by the 2017 Atlantic Council- Korea Foundation Forum. "And then we can begin to lay out a map, a road-

map of what we might be willing to work towards,"

The offer stands in contrast to President Donald Trump's warnings that talks have failed and that Tillerson was wasting his time.

Tillerson said it was not workable to demand that

North Korea give up its weapons before talks begin.

"It's not realistic to say we re only going to talk
if you come to the table ready to give up your program. They have too much invested in it. And the President is very realistic about that as well," he said. in response to a question after delivering his

"Because we re dealing with a new leader in North Korea that no one s ever engaged with. And he clearly is not like his father nor is he like his grandfather, and we don t know a whole lot about what it will be like to engage with him," he said.

"I have to understand how do they process, how do they think. Because getting to an agreement, as all of us know, in negotiations means a willingness to talk about a lot of things," he said.

However, he then laid down one condition and said there should be a "period of quiet" in which such preliminary talks could take place.

"If there was any condition at all to this, it s that, look, it s going to be tough to talk if in the middle of our talks, you decide to test another device. It s going to be difficult to talk if in the middle of our talks, you decide to fire another one off. So I think they clearly understand that if we're going to talk, we have to have a period of quiet," Tillerson said.

North Korea, he noted, can't be treated like other

nuclear weapons states.

"Many people have asked the question of, well, why can t you live with a containment strategy? You lived with it with Russia; you lived with it with China; you lived with it with others," he said.

"The difference is that the past behaviour of North Korea, it s clear to us that they would not just use the possession of nuclear weapons as a deterrent. This would become a commercial activity for them. Because we already see elements of it in the commercial marketplace. And in a world we live in today where our greatest threats are nonstate actors, we simply cannot accept that," Tiller son said.

North Korea this year increased the pace of its missile programme. Since February, Pyongyang has fired off 23 missiles.

On November 29, the North Korean leader said that his country had achieved full nuclear statehood after what he said was the successful test of a new missile capable of striking anywhere in the United

Fears of a catastrophic conflict between the US and North Korea spiked as the leaders of the two nations taunted each other, with the US President calling Kim "Rocket Man."

## Democrat wrests Alabama Senate seat, outcome seen as setback for Prez Trump

WASHINGTON, DEC 13 (PTI): Doug Jones today became the first Democrat in 25 years to win a Senate seat from the staunchly Republican state of Alabama, defeat-ing President Donald Trump-backed candidate Roy Moore, whose cam-paign was dogged by allegations that he had sexually abused teenagers.

Moore's defeat marks
