Avideo posteu on social included where one KL Timsina is seen writing an apology letter to a government doctor, Kanu Priya Rai who later asks the man to also hold his ears in apology has caused a stir in the state. After going viral on social media here over the past few days, today, some national TV news channels picked up the video and telecast it, projecting it as a case of official high-handedness and intimidation. Similar opinions are also being aired on comments threads.

The incident occurred on 07 Oct at Yangang Primary Health Centre and police personnel along with some others are also seen in the video. Following the incident, Mr Timsina is said to have taken ill and was admitted in a hospital. He was later arrested by the po-lice based on an FIR filed by the doctor and has been under police custody since, his bail petition being heard by the dis-

The doctor has alleged that Mr Timsina barged into the hall where a training was underway and started shouting at her and making demeaning and intimidating gestures. He was reportedly demanding that a patient known to him admitted at the Yangang PHC be attended to immediately.

Mr Timsina is said to have questioned the doctor, who is the Medical Officer of Yangang PHC, for not attending to a patient, a teenager who was suf-fering from fever and headache.

There is no clarity on what actly happened that day except for what it led to - the video footage showing Mr Timsina apologizing, therefore a large section of the public have expressed outrage against the doctor for humiliating Mr Timsina in public.

This also led to the Health department ordering a "thorough enquiry" into the incident by setting up a two-member committee comprising of DHS, Dr Uttam Pradhan and District Medical Superintendent-District Hospital, Namchi, Dr DC Sharma.

In a press release issued today, the Health Department informs that after conducting thorough enquiry involving speaking with those present at the PHC on the day and the public of the area, the enquiry committee found that Mr Tim-sina was a "habitual nuisance creator" and that the doctor was doing her duty of ensuring that the functioning of primary health facilities is not disrupted.

"She has done her duty by lodging FIR against Mr Timsina who obstructed public servant from performing her duty," the release states.

About the video, the department has said that it "is a misrepresentation of the actual fact to mislead and instigate the general public to malign the entire medical fraternity and doctors at large."

These news items are targeted towards tarnishing the image and reputation of the health system and the state doctors, the release adds.

Investigations are underway while Dr Kanu Priya Rai has been directed to join her duty at Yangang PHC, the Department has said. Further. it has also reiterated that in future anybody obstructing medical officers and staff in performing their duties will be dealt with strictly as per law. Meanwhile, the onlin

Meanwhile, space continues to rage over the incident and even political parties and politicians have commented on the issue, each strictly divided into two camps. Now that the case does not appear anywhere close being "settled" out of court, guess it will have to be for the lawyers and the courts to work out the sequence of events and context as close to what might have actually transpired that day at Yangang PHC.

State fails to file counter to POCSO convict's appeal in Supreme Court

GANGTOK, 16 OCT:

The state government has failed to file a counter affidavit to a spe-cial leave petition filed in the Supreme Court by Kumar Ghimirey of South Sikkim who was convicted on charges of sexually as-

saulting a minor in 2014.

The accused is serving a jail term at Namchi District Jail since he was arrested by Temi Police in 2014.

He had filed a special leave petition in the Apex Court challenging the judgment of the High Court. However, the state government has failed to file its response despite being provided

three opportunities.

The Apex Court, on
09 Oct, in its order has
said that, "Sole respon-

dent has not filed counter affidavit, despite last and final opportunity having been granted. Further opportunity is declined."

It has further directed the Apex Court Registry to process the matter for listing before the Hon'ble

Court, as per rules. It may be recalled that on 20 Feb 2014, Temi Police Station had registered a case against the accused under Sec-tions 376/ 511/ 341/ 342 of the IPC read with Section 4 of the POCSO Act for attempting to sexually assault a seven-year-old girl child while she was returning home from school. The High Court of Sikkim, apart from upholding the sen-tence, had also enhanced the prison term from sev-

In 294 Wards including 11 Wards of

For 348 Wards of West District, 136 candidates were uncontested with 211 contesting candidates. No nomination was filed from Orange Village Ward under Siktam Tik-pur GPU. In 31 Zillas of East, 05 candidates remained uncontested with 26 contesting

candidates.

IHRAO submits demand letter to five Banks at Rangpo

Organization [IHRAO]. Sikkim Unit, submitted a three-point demand letter to branches of five banks in the Rangpo area today, a press release informs.

National vice presi-dent, Chhotelal Prasad, national general secretary, Tanvir Ahamad Sikkim unit president, Ganesh Sharma, secretary

Santosh Gurung, publicity in-charge, Sanjay Agarwal, east district president, Haider Ali, Joint Secretary, Laal Babu Gupta, and member, Bimal Thakur, met with the management of Axis Bank, HDFC, State Bank of India, Central Bank of India and UCO Bank, Rangpo, and discussed the problems faced by the residents of the area due to poor ATM services in the area.

It is mentioned in the

release that five banks offer ATM services with claims of providing 24/7 services written on big boards but none actually

provide such service.

The Axis Bank ATM has been shut down for approximately four months while the CBI ATM is empty most of the time. UCO and HDFC Bank ATMs open only on alternate days. Villagers come to withdraw mon-ey from the ATM early in return empty handed because ATMs are cashless, the release alleges.

It is further mentioned in the release that the Rs 10 coin has also been creating problems in the market. The Banks are issuing the coin to the public but are refusing to take the coin back in deposits which has further led to the public feeling that the coins are dupli-cates. The IHRAO has de-

manded proper arrange ment for circulation of the Rs 10 coin.

on the letter, the orga-nization has demanded participation and active support from the Banks in community and social programmes.
All the five Banks



Keeping Minors Safe

Identify and punish the sexual predators, and then ensure safe spaces for the young

 \mathbf{T} his newspaper reported yesterday about the arrest of a 64-year-old on charges of having raped a teenager. Details of the case are not at hand, but the complaint contends that the child had been raped on multiple occasions by the accused. The trauma that she must have suffered and the frustration she must have experienced when no one noticed the repeated assaults will require careful long-term counseling for her to regain her composure and faith in others. One hopes that such assistance is being provided to her. What this incident also reminds us is that a majority of the rapes are committed by people known to the victim or having some form of power over her. This makes it difficult for the victims to report the incidents and has been known to be the cause why they are often advised to keep quiet about it even when they open up to someone. When it comes to minors, such advice has been made illegal under the provisions of the Protection Of Children from Sexual Offences Act. Under this new law, those who learn of minors being sexually molested or abused and still do not report the crime are held culpable of having abetted the offence. It is important that this provision of the law is more widely circulated and also enforced to ensure that the common instinct of "settling" the matter is not allowed. Children also need to be made aware of protections available to them and reassured that any behaviour they find uncomfortable will be stopped and penalised the moment they speak up. The series of POCSO Act awareness sessions at schools across the State have already led to students outing sexual predators who have been preying on them or their friends and now it is for the elders to ensure that these depraved individuals receive the punishment that they deserve.

While this approach ensure that the accused are identified and punished by law, the number of such incidents also demand that more is done to keep the children safe. The teenaged victim mentioned earlier is not the first minor to be so abused in Sikkim and there are many victims much younger than her who have also suffered abuse. While there are no fool-proof safety nets to protect our minors from sexual depravity that preys on them, there is too much wrong happening around us for the people and the government not to address the problem beyond what the law alone provides. Awareness is important, but what is also crucial is for the young to be provided safe spaces. Minors left unattended at home is the first aberration that strikes here. Most cases on sexual assaults on minors have been coming in from rural areas of late, and this is probably because that is where children are more likely left unattended and beyond earshot. An obvious re-quirement for the State is to have more crèches where working parents can leave their children under better care and vigil while they leave to earn their bread. The records suggest that a substantial number of crèches and ICDS Centres are already in place. The need is for more working and single parents to be informed about these centres and maybe even a rule promulgated which attracts some form of penalty on parents who leave minors unattended for extended periods of time. For the slightly elder children, neighbourhood clubs and community rooms can be considered. Has anyone noticed that there are none in Sikkim?
Even as these options are explored, NGOs and their

volunteers need to take a rest from funding agency awareness camps and workshops to actually spend some time in areas that need intervention – sensitization of parents about the predators who lurk in every locality. This is not about whipping up lynch mobs, but about getting parents sufficiently worried to recognise that children need stronger protection now and for neighbourhoods to also try and devise ways that the young are guaranteed safety.

How to combat racial bias: Start in childhood

Racial bias can seem like an intractable problem. Psychologists and other social scientists have had difficulty finding effective ways to

counter it – even among people who say they support a fairer, more egal-itarian society. One likely reason for the difficulty is that most efforts have been directed toward adults, whose biases and prejudices are often firmly entrenched.

My colleagues and I are starting to take a new look at the problem of racial bias by investigating its origins in early childhood. As we learn more about how biases take hold, will we eventually be able to intervene before

MEASURING RACIAL BIAS

When psychology researchers first began studying racial biases, they simply asked individuals to describe their thoughts and feelings about particular groups of people. A wellknown problem with these measures of explicit bias is that people often try to respond to researchers in ways

they think are socially appropriate.
Starting in the 1990s, researchers began to develop methods to assess implicit bias, which is less conscious and less controllable than explicit bias. The most widely used test is the Implicit Association Test, which lets researchers measure whether individuals have more positive associations with some racial groups than others. However, an important limitation of this test is that it only works well with individuals who are at least six years old – the instructions are too complex for younger children to emember.

Recently, my colleagues and I developed a new way to measure bias, which we call the Implicit Racial Bias Test. This test can be used with children as young as age three, as well as with older children and adults. This test assess-es bias in a manner similar to the IAT but with different instructions.

Here's how a version of the test to detect an implicit bias that favors white people over black people would work: We show participants a series of black and white faces on a touchscreen device. Each photo is

one side of the screen and a cartoon frown on the other.

In one part of the test, we ask participants to touch the cartoon smile as quickly as possible whenever a black face appears, and the cartoon frown as quickly as possible whenever a white face appears. In another part of the test, the instructions are reversed

The difference in the amount of time it takes to follow one set of in-structions versus the other is used to compute the individual's level of implicit bias. The reasoning is that it takes more time and effort to respond ways that go against our intuitions.

DO YOUNG CHILDREN EVEN

HAVE RACIAL BIASES?

Explicit racial biases have been documented in young children for many years. Researchers know that young children can also show implicit bias at the earliest ages that it has been measured, and often at rates that are comparable to those seen among adults.

Some studies suggest that precursors of racial bias can be detected in infancy. In one such study, researchers measured how long infants looked at faces of their own race or another race that were paired with happy or sad music. They found that 9-month-olds looked longer when the faces of their own race were paired with the happy music, which was different from the pattern of looking times for the other-race faces. This result suggests that the tendency to prefer fac-es that match one's own race begins

These early patterns of response arise from a basic psychological ten-dency to like and approach things that seem familiar, and dislike and avoid things that seem unfamiliar. Some researchers think that these tendencies have roots in our evolu-tionary history because they help people to build alliances within their

social groups.

However, these biases can change over time. For example, young black children in Cameroon show an implicit bias in favor of black people versus white people as part of a general tendency to prefer in-group members, who are people who share characteristics with you. But this pattern reverses in adulthood, as individuals are repeatedly exposed to cultural messages indicating that white people have higher social sta-tus than black people.

A NEW APPROACH TO

TACKLING BIAS
Researchers have long recognized that racial bias is associated with dehumanization. When people are bi-ased against individuals of other races, they tend to view them as part of an undifferentiated group rather than as specific individuals. Giving adults practice at distinguishing among in-dividuals of other races leads to a reduction in implicit bias, but these

effects tend to be quite short-lived.

In our new research, we adapted this individuation approach for use with young children. Using a custom-built training app, young chil-

dren learn to identify five individuals of another race during a 20-minute session. We found that 5-year-olds who participated showed no implicit racial bias immediately after the

Although the effects of a single session were short-lived, an additional 20-minute booster session one week later allowed children to maintain about half of their initial maintain about hair of their initial bias reduction for two months. We are currently working on a game-like version of the app for further testing.

ONLY A STARTING POINT

Although our approach suggests a promising new direction for reducing racial bias, it is important to note that this is not a magic bullet. Other aspects of the tendency to dehumanize individuals of different races also need to be investigated, such as people's dito be investigated, such as people's di-minished level of interest in the men-tal life of individuals who are outside of their social group. Because well-in-tended efforts to reduce racial bias can sometimes be ineffective or produce unintended consequences, any new approaches that are developed will need to be rigorously evaluated.

And of course the problem of racial bias is not one that can be solved by addressing the beliefs of individuals alone. Tackling the problem also requires addressing the broader so-cial and economic factors that promote and maintain biased beliefs and

onversation.com lbert Einstein attributed his brilliant mind to Albert Einstein attributed his brilliant mind to having a child-like sense of humour. Indeed, a number of studies have found an association between humour and intelligence.

Researchers in Austria recently discovered that funny people, particularly those who enjoy dark humour, have higher IQs than their less funny peers. They argue that it takes both cognitive and emotional ability to process and produce humour. Their analysis shows that funny people have higher verbal and non-verbal intelligence, and they score lower in mood disturbance and aggressiveness. Not only are funny people smart, they're nice

to be around. Evidence suggests that having a good sense of humour is linked to high emotional intelligence and is a highly desirable quality in a partner. Evolutionary psychologists describe humour as a "heritable trait" that signals mental fitness and intellectual agility to prospective mates. In studies of attractiveness, both men and women rate funny people as more attractive, and cite having a good sense of humour as being one of the most import-

sense of numour as being one of the most important traits in a long-term partner.

In psychology we use the term "positive humour style" to refer to people who use humour to enhance relationships and reduce conflict. This type of humour is associated with relationship satisfaction, extroversion and high self-esteem Having a humorous outlook on life is also a good coping strategy. It helps people better manage stress and

More negative humour styles, such as sarcasm, ridicule and self-defeating humour, do not offer the same benefits. Instead, they tend to alienate peo ple and are more often associated with depressed ood and aggression.

Not only do funny people make other people laugh, they also laugh more themselves. And neurobiology shows that laughter leads to brain changes, which may explain the link between humour and

Neuropsychological studies have found that experiencing positive emotional states, such as joy,

fun and happiness, increases the production of dopamine in the brain. Dopamine not only make us feel great, it also opens up the learning centres of the brain, which enables and sustains more neural connections. As a result, we become more flexible and creative in our thinking, and better at solving problems. It also boosts our working memory.

HUMOUR FOR SUCCESS

Evidence suggests that humour actually boosts perceptions of confidence, competence and status, making funny people very influential. Humour gets people to listen, helps communicate messages and aids learning. It is a powerful tool that many successful leaders use to enhance group cohesiveness and organisational culture. Studies of positive organisations suggest the more fun we have at work the more productive we are, and the less likely we

are to suffer hurn-out

The "broaden and build" theory also supports the idea that experiencing positive emotions through humour actually alters our thoughts, actions and physiological responses. It creates a virtual of the control of the c tuous circle effect that enhances well-being.

Research on the use of humour in education also supports the notion that humour is an effective aid to learning. Several studies have demonstrated that lessons that are delivered with humour are more enjoyable for students, and also enhance students comprehension and recall of the topic

Given the host of benefits that being funny brings, perhaps we could all benefit from joining a stand-up comedy workshop. It seems like the

smart thing to do.

Arunachal to take up small tea growers' plight with Centre

ITANAGAR, OCT 16 (PTI): Assembly today adopted a resolution to pursue the long pending issue of small tea growers of the state with the Centre.

The Supreme Court or-der of December 12, 1996 banning timber operation to check deforestation, had affected the tea growers to cultivate tea even in their own land.

The Assembly also

resolved to urge the Centre to constitute a joint committee comprising officials from the union government, state gov-ernment and Tea Board of India which would recommend measures to address the issues of registration of the small tea growers in a time bound manner, preferably within three months.

The Assembly adopted the resolution following a private member resolution brought by BJP MLA Gabriel Denwang Wangsu on the sufferings of the small tea growers of the state due to Forest Conservation Act, 1980 and the Supreme Court order. Wangsu lamented that

after the Supreme Court order, the Government of India had made mandatory for the tea growers to acquire NOC from the union Environment and Forest Ministry to get them registered with the Tea Board of India.

"No significant initia-tive has been taken so far to mitigate the problems of the small tea growers of the state as they are facing problem to get the NOC and register with the Tea Board for getting subsidy," Wangsu point-

Stating that Arunachal is the second largest tea producer among the northeastern states after Assam, Wangsu requested the government to initiate measures to simplify the process of obtaining NOC from the forest ministry.

Responding resolution, Deputy Chief Minister Chowna Mein informed that the issue was decade-old and unless the Supreme Court order is lifted, getting certificate from Tea Board would be difficult.

He said to encourage tea and rubber cultivation, the state government had made budgetary provision of Rs 10 crore each to the sectors

by giving the farmers subsidized loans.

The deputy chief min ister further informed that out of 3,410 small tea growers in the state only 62 were registered under the Tea Board.

Taking part in the discussion, senior BJP member C T Mein who is also a progressive farmer pointed out that the main problem faced by the tea growers are the Land Possession Certificate (LPC) which the Tea Board did not accept for registration. He said Tea Board provides subsidy to the tune of Rs 1.86 lakh per hectare

Tage Taki of BJP, participating in the discussion urged the govern-ment to pursue the Centre for getting relaxation in forest activities.

Planet Nine does exist in solar system: NASA

WASHINGTON, OCT 16 (PTI): The elusive 'Planet Nine' does exist, and may be 10 times the mass of the Earth and 20 times away from the Sun than Neptune, NASA scien-

Planet Nine could turn out to be our solar system's missing 'super Earth' - a planet with a mass higher than the Earth's, but sub-stantially lower than the masses of

ice giants Uranus and Neptune.

The signs so far are indirect, mainly its gravitational footprints, but that adds up to a compelling

case, they said.

"There are now five different lines of observational evidence pointing to the existence of Plan-et Nine," said Konstantin Batygin, a planetary astrophysicist at Cal-ifornia Institute of Technology



(Caltech) in the US

"If you were to remove this ex-planation and imagine Planet Nine does not exist, then you generate more problems than you solve. All of a sudden, you have five different puzzles, and you must come up

with five different theories to explain them," said Batygin. Six known objects in the distant

Kuiper Belt, a region of icy bodies stretching from Neptune outward towards interstellar space, all have elliptical orbits pointing in the same direction, researchers said.

However, these orbits also are tilted the same way, about 30 degrees "downward" compared to the pancake-like plane within which the planets orbit the Sun, they said.

Computer simulations of the

solar system with Planet Nine included show there should be more objects tilted with respect to the

The tilt would be on the order of 90 degrees, as if the plane of the solar system and these objects formed an "X" when viewed edge-on. Caltech graduate student, Eliz-

abeth Bailey, showed that Planet Nine could have tilted the planets of our solar system during the last

4.5 billion years.

In the study published in the

Astronomical Journal, researchers wondered why the plane in which the planets orbit is tilted about 6 de-

grees compared to the Sun's equator.
"Over long periods of time,
Planet Nine will make the entire solar-system plane precess or wobble, just like a top on a table,

Batygin said.

The last telltale sign of Planet Nine's presence involves the solar system's contrarians; objects from the Kuiper Belt that orbit in the op-posite direction from everything else in the solar system, researchers said.

Planet Nine's orbital influence would explain why these bodies from the distant Kuiper Belt end up "polluting" the inner Kuiper

Belt, they said.

"No other model can explain

the weirdness of these high- inclination orbits," Batygin said.

"It turns out that Planet Nine provides a natural avenue for their generation. These things have been twisted out of the solar system plane with help from Planet Nine and then scattered inward by

Neptune," said Batygin.
"The possibility of a new planet is certainly an exciting one for me as a planetary scientist and for all of us," said Jim Green, director of NASA's Planetary Science Division.

"This is not, however, the de-tection or discovery of a new planet," said Green.

"What we're seeing is an ear-ly prediction based on modelling from limited observations. It's the start of a process that could lead to an exciting result," he said.

Boat carrying Rohingya **Muslims** capsizes, killing at least 12

DHAKA, OCT 16 (AP): An overcrowded boat carrying Rohingya Mus-lims fleeing Myanmar capsized today in the Bay of Bengal near a Bangla-deshi fishing village, killing 12 people, including six children, police said.

Survivors of the capsizing told local officials that up to 65 people were on board and almost half of them were children, local police official Sheikh Ashrafuzzaman said.

He said villagers told police they recovered five bodies and at least

21 people survived.
Including today's capsizing, boat accidents have killed at least 184 Rohingya trying to reach Bangladesh.

Hundreds of thou-ands of Rohingya have fled Myanmar since August 25, when the mil-itary launched a crackdown decried by the United Nations as "ethnic cleansing."

Myanmar's military has said it launched clearance operations in response to terrorist attacks, but the UN and others have said Myanmar's response was disproportionate. The refugees have described wide-spread and indiscrimi-

Set for second term in power, Xi may eye unprecedented third

BEIJING, OCT 16 [PTI]: Firmly in the saddle to begin his second term with immense powers at this week's key Congress of the ruling Communist Party, Chinese President Xi Jinping nay set his sight for unprecedented third term, observers say.

The once-in-a-five-year Congress of the Communist Party of China [CPC], which will begin here from October 18, was expected to confirm the second five-year term of Xi in line with the convention of two terms for the top leaders, followed by the party since 2002, after which

During the 18th Congress, which was held around the same time five years ago, the then President Hu Jintao and Premier Wen Jiabao had overseen an orderly transfer of power adhering to the conventional two terms and handed over the power to Xi, who was then the Vice President.

Till then Xi, 64, a princeling as his father was former Vice Premier Xi Zhongxun, rose steadily in the party ranks maintaining a low profile

He was first elected as the General Secretary of the CPC during the

country, later firmed up his power base after the outgoing leader Hu handed over the coveted position of head of the military to Xi.

Starting his tenure with three powerful posts, Xi consolidated his position using the massive anti-corruption campaign against high rank-ing as well as middle and lower rung officials and top leaders. Over 1.34 officials have been punished in the anti-graft campaign.

was the consolidation of power of Xi specially enhancing his powers in the military that Premier Li Keqiang, 62 and other leaders who were elected along with him in 2012, took a backseat toning down their profile in public, observers say.

It is perhaps for the first time in 15 years, a Chinese leader will begin his second term after in power for five years, heading the three power

Hu was made the head of the

Central Military Commission [CMC], the overall command of the 2.3 million strong world s largest Chinese military midway through his first terms, where Xi virtually started his first tenure with it, which enabled him to clean-up the People's Liber-ation Army [PLA], purging over 40 top Generals and punished 13,000 other personnel in the anti-graft

campaign.
As the Party is set to begin its 19th Congress on Wednesday, all eyes are on whether Xi will follow another widely followed convention of the party to groom a successor

While the Congress is expected to further reinforce power base of Xi, who has already been named by the party as a "core leader" like party founder Mao Zedong and his successor Deng Xiaoping, observers say it is to be seen whether he will break the convention and pave the way for his third term.

For that the attention of Beijing-based diplomats and foreign media was on Wang Qishan, the 69-year-old close confidant of Xi who ruthlessly carried out the anti-graft campaign.

tirement age limit of 68 set for the CPC officials, Wang should retire as he already surpassed it. But it is to be seen whether he will continue for another term which will in turn pave the way for Xi in the 20th Congress to continue in power as he too will cross retirement age by that time

Or he could continue to be in power heading the powerful Central Military Commission [CMC] after 2022 by handing over post of general secretary and presidency to the

next generation leaders.

Also, the national and international attention will be on who the party is going to pick for the sev-en member Standing Committee which literally rules the country and whether there will be a hint for a

Currently, Xi is the only civilian in the 11-member CMC.

Xi was nominated to the committee during the second term of his predecessor, Hu. Observers say the hints to be watched in the 19th Congress will be whether any of the party leaders will be projected to be inducted into the CMC.

Israel says strikes Syrian anti-aircraft battery in response to fire

JERUSALEM, OCT 16 [AFP]: Israel's military said today it carried out an air strike on an anti-aircraft battery in Syria east of Damascus after it fired toward its planes.

Israeli planes were on what the military described as a routine reconnaissance mission over neighbouring Leb anon when an anti-aircraft missile was fired in their direction, a military spokesman said.

The planes returned safely, according to the



spokesman, adding it was believed the anti-aircraft battery in Syria was

destroyed. "We hold the Syrian

regime responsible for

the anti- aircraft fire and any attack originating from Syria," Israeli military spokesman Jonathan Conricus told journalists.

Israel's military said it had no intention to escalate the situation further.

Israel has sought to

avoid becoming more directly involved in the sixyear civil war in neighbouring Syria, though it acknowledges carrying out dozens of air strikes to stop what it calls advanced arms deliveries to Hezbollah.

group is backing Syrian President Bashar Assad's regime in the conflict.

Israel and Hezbollah fought a devastating war in 2006.

Today's strike comes with Russian Defence Minister Sergei Shoigu due to visit Israel later in the day. Russia is also backing Assad in the Syrian conflict.

CBI faces HC flak in missing JNU student case

New Delhi, Oct 16 (PTI): CBI to-day faced flak from the Delhi High Court for its "complete lack of interest" and not showing any result in its probe into the disappearance of INU student Najeeb Ahmed, five months after being handed over the investigation.

Najeeb (27), a student of M.Sc Biotechnology, had gone missing from the Mahi-Mandvi hostel of the Jawaharlal Nehru University (JNU) on October 15 last year following a scuffle with some other students, allegedly affiliated to the Sangh Parivar student wing Akhil Bharatiya Vidyarthi Parishad

(ABVP), the previous night.

A bench of Justices G S Sistani and Chander Shekhar said during arguments, it was "very unhap-py" with CBI after contradictions appeared in what was orally submitted in the court and what it has indicated in its status report.

The contradictions appeared on the issue of analysis of the calls and messages of the suspect students in the case.

When the court was told that the status report was prepared by an Inspector in CBI, the bench said as per its May 16 order, transfer-ring probe to the agency, an officer of rank not less than DIG has to supervise the investigation

"What sort of supervision is this? If this supervision by the DIG, then what would happen if there is no supervision? Does the DIG read what the Inspector has said in the report? He probably does not get time to read reports there (in of-fice). Let him come here and read it then" the court said.

The bench further said that "there is nothing on the status report (by CBI). There was more in the Delhi Police reports. We are saying there is complete lack of interest (by CBI). There is no result either way No result even on paper.

The bench said the CBI was "inviting these observations" by its own conduct and gave it time till November 14 to file a report stating what it has found after analysing the call data records of the nine students suspected of being

behind Najeeb's disappearance.

The scathing remarks by the bench came after CBI in its report said the calls and messages of the suspects were "being analysed", while in its oral submission it claimed that the call data records have already been analysed.

"Then why have you not said what you found in your analysis," an angry bench asked the CBI and warned that it would direct its DIG. who was to supervise the probe, to present in court. The CBI was also directed to

ove an application in the court of Chief Metropolitan Magistrate (CMM) for an early hearing of its plea, which has been adjourned to January 24, 2018, for seeking consent of the suspect students for a polygraph test.

The bench also gave directions

to the CMM not to give such long dates in pleas for polygraph tests, especially in such a matter where there is urgency, saying it would defeat the purpose.

The court told CBI that even

family members of the missing student can undergo polygraph, not just the suspects.

After over a month had passed since Najeeb went missing, his mother had moved the High Court on November 25 last year, seeking directions to the police to trace

The high court had immediately directed the Delhi Police to "explore all angles" and "cut across political barriers" to trace the young man, saying no one could just vanish from the heart of the national capital.

However, as the police were clue-less about Najeeb's whereabouts even after seven months since he went missing, the probe was handed over to CBI on May 16, 2017.

There months later in August when CBI failed to file a fresh progress report in the case, the high court had rebuked it, saying the probe was not transferred to the agency "for fun".

On September 6, the court again directed the CBI to take steps to trace


