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Train services disrupted due to heavy rains in north Bengal

JALPAIGURI, AUGUST
13 (PTI): North Bengal bound trains that origi-nated from Sealdah and Howrah were terminated at various stations as heavy rains in sub-Himalavan districts of West

Bengal led to a deluge.

Due to flood situation in Northeast Frontier Railway jurisdiction north Bengal bound bound trains originating from Sealdah and Howrah that were delaying en route had to be controlled, a statement issued by Eastern Railway said.

The statement said that 12343 Up Darjeeling Mail & 12377 Up Padatik Express were detained at Murarai and Chatra stations respectively. These trains had left Sealdah yesterday.

Similarly 12503 Up Bangalore Canton-ment-Kamakhya Express via Howrah was detained at Bansloi Bridge station and 14056 Delhi-Dibrugarh Brahmaputra Mail was detained at Sahib-ganj station.

13147 Up Uttarbanga Express and 13149 Up Kanchankanya Express had been short termi-nated at Malda Town and returning from there to Sealdah as passenger special trains. These trains had left from Seal-

dah yesterday.

Rajnath meets Gorkhaland leaders, appeals for end to Darj logjam



DELHI, AUG 13 (PTI): Home Minister Rajnath Singh today appealed to leaders of the Gorkhaland statehood movement in Darjeeling to call off their agitation and urged the West Bengal government to initiate dialogue with them, a Home Ministry official said.

During a two-hour meeting chaired by Singh here this evening, the leaders of the Gorkhaland Movement Coordination Committee (GMCC) submitted a memorandum to the Centre detailing

their demands.

The Home Minister appealed to the leaders to call off the indefinite shutdown in Darjeeling, which entered the 60th

day today.

He also requested the leaders to convince the youth on a fast-untodeath in the hills to end

their hunger strike, the official said.
Singh also appealed to

the West Bengal govern-ment to initiate dialogue with the Gorkhaland movement leaders to resolve their demands, the official said.

The BJP's Darjeeling MP SS Ahluwalia also attended the meeting.

Swaraj Thapa, a lead-er of the Gorkha Janmukti Morcha, said the Home Minister had told them that he was mindful of the sufferings of the people in Darjeeling.
"We urged him to

start the process for (creation of) a separate state.

The state is suppressing our democratic movement," Thapa said.

Sam can trick a smile on your face through is Magic

"I ENTERTAIN people who are go ing through a stressful day due to work or are simply bored. I use my magic tricks to take away their pain and troubles and to put smiles on their faces. When they smile and give encouraging comments, it absolutely makes my day," says local magician-illusionist, Sam Prasad, now growing in popularity as 'Sam, the Illusionist'.

Sam works at the High Court of Sikkim and devotes his spare time in learning illusion-magic tricks.

Hailing from Burtuk, the 24 year old performs his self-learned tricks on the streets after he logs out from office. He kicked off his magician ca-

reer by performing at functions and programmes. However, due to the lack of scope he stopped per-

forming commercially.

"People have however now begun appreciating and enjoying magic to the fullest. I don't charge anything now. I perform tricks for free because my motivation is to entertain people. Knowing that more than 50,000 people have successfully watched my magic tricks through Facebook feels absolutely ecstatic," he says.



Journey with magic, Sam says, began at the age of 15.

"One of my cousins gifted me a book on magic tricks and I was fully into it. I started doing tricks in front of my family and friends and now I do it in front of people," he says.

According to Sam, people were not fans of his magic tricks earlier.
"They used to stare at me and

most of them were critical of my talent. I think they took me for a crazy person," he shares.

Things have started to change

"People are more open now They appreciate my tricks and I feel happy to make them feel hap-

Sam does not do card tricks "I perform my tricks on cur-rency notes and other stuff. I think people are bored with card tricks. They are predictable," Sam adds.

"My future strategy would be venting more and more tricks in the days to come in a very innovative form. I want to upload it on Facebook and YouTube so that more people can see my tricks," Sam answers when asked about his future plans. A year ago, he had performed

on stage during the winter festival held at Gangtok. He is now invited to programs and stage shows to w his tricks.

"Hopefully, people will be more accepting of other career options like this. Sikkim has so much more talent. It would be disappointing to see people make choices out of societal pressure and not follow their passion," he adds.

Separated at Birth

On the eve of I-Day, remember the Partition

T wins, born 70 years ago, celebrate their Independence a day apart starting today. A combination of intolerance, politics and irreconcilable leadership differences split Pakistan and India making enemies out of fellow citizens and former colleagues and inciting a feud which keeps people apart to this day. The two nations are at daggers drawn and hold suspicions which sponsor the political and professional futures of the agent provocateurs who remain relevant because the hate sustains. A people who share a common history and draw identities from places which now lie in the neighbour's home which is now out of bounds for them for all practically purposes, have so completely bought into the seven decade old mischief, that they forget the common culture that they collectively fostered over several millennia.

That perhaps is the price one has to pay when politics is allowed to define identities and short-sighted politicians allowed to set priorities. When the partition happened in 1947, most of the displaced millions believed that it would be a temporary experiment; a mad scheme which would unravel on itself At that time, no one could fathom a Punjab divided into two nations or believe that so many could be permanently uprooted. The Partition holocaust, and of course it was one, was taken as a momentary wave of madness, and the exodus, a precautionary measure of temporary nature. In fact, it must have been this belief which convinced so many to leave their homes in the first place, the belief that they could return when the situation "normalised". Many even believed that people's movement between India and Pakistan would be free and frequent and that no permanent cleavage of ties was possible.

A cruel con was played on the entire Partition/

Independent generation and because the people-a section hurting over the Partition violence and struggling with the challenges of survival as refugees and the rest swept by jubilation of being free - forgot to remind their leaders and future generations of what it meant to be one people, the fiction of ingrained hate and reflexive paranoia took over.

The present generation of Indians and Pakistanis look at the Partition rather dispassionately and express no surprise that India claims Mohenjodaro or that Pakistan celebrates the Mughal empire or that our national anthem celebrates Sindh. Mohenjodaro sits in Pakistan and Pakistan technically holds only the periphery of the Mughal empire's spread and Sindh now sits in Pakistan. Partition remains something that most students receive only a superficial introduction to, and what they receive from mass-media only reinforces prejudice. 12.5 million people were displaced and up to a million killed in the Partition riots. The staggering numbers involved demand that all Indians and all Pakistanis study the Partition in more detail, not to hate each other more, but to realise that even the most genuine of people's movements can throw up a monster; that the culmination of 90 years of a struggle for freedom can deliver a madness which can take away all the joy. Our children need to study the Partition more so that they understand the horror of division and do not themselves make the mistakes that people continue to wilfully allow to this day. If they understand what the Partition did, they will perhaps not allow the politics of hate and the mechanisations of paranoia to decide their futures for them.



Why a new water decade is key to meeting the world's development needs

It was a rare success story among the mixed feelings that surrounded the conclusion of the UN Millennium Development Goals. Not all of the ambitious international targets, intended to improve the lives of the world's poorest people, were achieved on schedule by 2015. But on the issue of access to water, the results were remarkable

Instead of "halving, by 2015, the proportion of people without sustainable access to safe drinking water" the international community managed it by

2010. What does that mean? Since 1990, 2.6 billion people have gained access to an improved drink-ing water source. Better access to drinking water helped improve health, reduce poverty, and ad-

vance sustainable development across the globe.

Behind this success was the decision to declare 2005-2015 the International "Water for Life" Decade. Dedicating ten years to, among other things, providing access to water for millions of people proved to be a pivotal factor in making this target

During the decade, the United Nations General Assembly recognised access to water and sanitation as a human right. And in 2015, the UN General Assembly dedicated one of the new 17 Sustainable Development Goals - the successors to the Millennium Development Goals – solely to water. Specifically, the aim is to "ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all".

So yes, we have made great strides on the "water issue". And it may come as a surprise that, given the success of the last decade dedicated to water, a proposal for a new International Decade for Action on "Water for Sustainable Development" has been announced by the government of Tajikistan. But we are not done with water yet.

The proposal – part of a call for action adopt-

ed by representatives of national governments, civil society, and United Nations entities – will be brought before the next session of the General As-

sembly in September 2016. Why another water decade? Because water se curity and infrastructure are still a huge part of the development challenges we still face. Water relates

fundamentally to natural resources and social issues – eradicating hunger and poverty will depend heavily on our attitude to water

THE SANITATION CHALLENGE

The most glaring water-related challenge the world faces is access to sanitation services, that is, the safe disposal of human waste, from toilets and sewage systems to solid waste management, Today, more than 2.4 billion people do not have access to proper facilities. Poor sanitation is estimated to cost the world U\$\$260 billion per year – more than the entire GDP of Chile

Kenya, for example, loses US\$324 million annually because of sanitation. That's \$244 million due to premature deaths resulting from diarrhoea, \$51 million in health care costs, \$2.7 million in productivity costs from time absent from work and school as a result of diseases due to poor sanitation, and \$26 million due to productivity time lost looking for a place to defecate.

SCARCE SUPPLY

Water scarcity already affects millions of people around the world. Population growth, rapid urbanisation, more water-intense consumption patterns, and climate change are intensifying the pressure on existing resources. Developing countries in Africa and Asia will carry the main burden of this in-

crease in demand.

Many already suffer greatly from water stress or scarcity, and lack the infrastructure and knowhow to address it. Ethiopia, for example, is currently facing its worst drought in decades. More than 10 million people need to rely on food aid.

If we continue on our current path, the world may face a shortfall of 40% in water availability by 2030. Poor sanitation and water scarcity will only make existing regional challenges worse, and un-dermine our global efforts to advance sustainable development for all.

In short, water is a crucial factor in all aspects of social and economic development. This means that, on the positive side, water is an incredibly useful medium through which many global challenges can be addressed.

THE NEXT WATER DECADE
Declaring 2016-2026 the "Water for Sustainable
Development" decade will raise awareness of the critical state of water resources around the world and inspire more action. To that end, the current proposal has two main objectives.

First, the call for greater international cooperation on water-related issues. In line with the recommendations of the report from the UN Sec-retary-General's advisory board on water and san-itation, a "new international water architecture" is needed to make financing and implementation efforts more effective.

Second, the availability and accessibility of information is vital. Any success on this front depends on increasing our knowledge of the water situation worldwide, developing effective water management strategies, and ensuring that those who need this knowledge have access to it.

THE COSTS OF INACTION

This call for action is an important initiative. But it still does not adequately address the question of how to finance the Sustainable Development Goals.

Governments must invest in water infrastruc-

ture, protecting basins and ecosystems, treating wastewater and reducing pollution. As Director of the UN-Water Decade Programme on Capacity Development (UNW-DPC) during the "Water for Life" decade, I worked with national governments and regional partners from all over the world who are grappling with these issues. We were able to conduct more than 125 capacity development activities. But there are many more that could not be addressed because we didn't have the money.

Developing countries need new water manage-ment institutions and utilities, better knowledge of integrated water resources management and the capacity to protect water basins and ecosystems. This requires access to the best available sustainable practices, through training and partnerships. The necessary funds are estimated to be in the tril-lions between now and 2030. But the cost of inaction is higher.

Why aren't we more outraged about eating chicken?

ike a B-movie for a post-Brexit era, conlike a B-movie for a post-Brexit era, consumers in Britain may soon be unwillingly cast in the 2019 blockbuster, Attack of the Chlorine Chickens. If news headlines are to be believed, flocks of toxic fowl are waiting to storm Britain's shores lik mini featherless zombies as part of a US-HK trade deal

But before getting into a flap about the health risks of chlorine, we should maybe pause to consider why you would bleach a chicken in the first place. It is actually primarily to mitigate the disease risks from raising nearly 9 billion chickens in over-crowded environments with low standards of animal welfare.

However the failure to frame the chick-ens' welfare as anything other than a side issue poses important questions about the nature of our interactions with animals. Why are chickens so far down in the pecking order for moral concern? Would our reaction have been the same if the animal in question were a mammal? The moral outrage sparked by when horsemeat was found in beef burgers in Britain and Ire-land in 2013 would suggest not.

Despite the widespread symbolism of the cockerel across cultures, history shows that we've never really been concerned

Until the late 18th century, cock-throwing - tying a chick-en to a stake and pelting it with objects until it felt the sweet release of death - was an extremely popular pastime in Britain. Eventually outlawed on grounds of cruelty, research has drawn arallels between cock-throwing and the widespread appearance of chickens in modern video games, which are customarily killed or used for chicken-kicking competitions. I doubt there are many video games in which players beat up dogs for kicks.

So what is it about our attitude to chickens that encourages us to dis-regard their widespread maltreatment? Psychological research into people's beliefs repeatedly throws up the common perception that chickens are close to the bottom of the pile when it comes to cogni-

tive abilities.

Yet this assumption flies in the face of scientific evidence. Alongside characteristics associated with sentience in other species – such as pain perception or emotions - chickens communicate, show sensitivity to differing contexts and display personalities. This disconnect between



our perception of chickens and the reality of their mental lives is undoubtedly important. The more we see an animal as 'minded", the more likely we are to believe its welfare should be protected.

Psychologists used to believe that the

animals we consider to have a mind was determined mainly by social factors such as cultural background. However, we now know a range of factors, such as our age and sex, affect our willingness to attribute mental capacities to animals. For the majority of animals it also appears that simple familiarity helps – owning a pet typically increases the mental faculties we associate with that particular species

This is logical since the greater our contact with an animal, the more likely our chances of observing behaviour that we recognise as intelligent. And yet having a chicken in our clutches doesn't appear to help their plight. One study showed that, in a group of students, keeping chickens had no effect on the mental characteristics participants associated with them. Only by actively training the chickens in cognitive tasks did the students' attitudes begin to change.

NEW PERSPECTIVE

But why doesn't general contact with chickens alter our views on their brainpower? Our latest paper, published in Trends in Cognitive Sciences, argues that we should also consider how our own cognitive mechanisms influence our judgements about how intelligent an animal is. We are currently in the process of looking at how consistent people are when making

attributions of mind to other species.

Research already tells us that context and behavioural similarity between animals and humans are central factors in our psychological interpretation of animals' actions. We also know that mirror neurons

a type of brain cells that fire both when we perform an action or when we watch others perform the same action - are automatically activated when we watch both humans and other animals carry out similar actions to achieve an assumed goal. This means when we see a rat reach out to grasp a food item, our brain is activated using similar mechanisms to those we would use to interpret the behaviour of a human doing the same thing. These findings lend weight to the the-

ory that humans attribute cognitive abil-ities across species based on how they view specific behavioural events, such as grasping food or chewing.

Moving like a chicken might therefore

be a major disadvantage when you're being compared to other farmyard inhabitants such as cows or pigs. Despite spending time observing them, it would be harder for our brains to automatically "see" their behaviour and use it as a basis for

assuming some semblance of brainpower. So next time you read stories about "frankenchicken", maybe attempt to avoid snap judgements – your perceptions of chickens aren't based on their lack of brains, but rather on the constraints of your own.

At least 46 dead in Himachal landslide

SHIMLA, AUG 13 (PTI): A massive landslide buried two Himachal Pradesh roadways buses, killing at least 46 people and injuring several others at Kotpuri near Padhar on the Mandi Pathankot national highway today, officials said.

The toll could rise further as over 50 passengers were travelling in the two buses hit by the landslide, which was triggered by a cloud burst, they said. Some other vehicles may also have been hit by the land-slide, the officials said.

"Forty-six bodies have been recovered, and of these 23 have been identified," an official

operations were suspended late evening as there were apprehensions of more landslides, he said. The rescue work would resume tomorrow.

Teams of the National Disaster Response Force (NDRF), the Army and the police rushed to the spot and heavy earth-moving machinery was deployed at the gorge where the two buses lay buried under a heap of debris.

Chief Minister Vir-bhadra Singh visited the spot. He said that eight passengers were trav-elling in the Manali-Katra Volovo bus, of whom three lost their lives, while five were rescued and taken to the zonal hospital in Mandi.

200 Indian tourists stranded in Nepal floods



__ SHIRISH B PRADHAN KATHMANDU, AUG 13 (PTI): Nearly 600 tourists, including 200 Indians, have been stranded in central Nepal's popular tourist district Chit-wan due to flooding triggered by heavy rains that have claimed 49 lives, officials said today. Heavy rains have lashed Nepal for the past

three days causing flooding and landslides at sev-eral places in the Himalayan country.

The swollen Ranti river flooded several ho-tels in the Chitwan Valley, where the country's first national park is located.

Chief District Officer Narayan Prasad Bhatta said four rubber rafts have been sought from neighbouring Devghat to carry out relief operations.

Suman Ghimire, chairman of the Region-al Hotel Association, said the trapped tourists were being rescued with the help of elephants.

The home ministry has been approached for help, said a hotelier.

The meteorological department forecast that central and western plains were likely to receive heavy rainfall from this evening. The monsoon, it added, was gradually getting weaker in the eastern region and moving towards the

western region.

The death toll due to flooding and landslides across Nepal since Friday reached 49, officials said.

Thirty six people have been reported missing, they added.

Twenty one districts have been badly hit by flooding and landslides, The Himalayan Times reported, citing the lat-est data released by the home ministry. Of the 600 tourists

stranded in the Chitwan Valley, nearly 200 were from India and about the same number from other

countries.

More than 35,000 houses have been partially sumberged, about 1,000 damaged and close to 400 livestock have died due to the flooding, the ministry data showed.

Transportation the East West Highway, one of the longest in the Himalayan country, has been suspended after a pillar at a connecting bridge was washed away

in the flooding.

Maintain environmental flow of 15-20 pc in rivers: NGT to states

NEW DELHI, AUG 13 (PTI): The National Green Tribunal has directed all states to maintain a min-imum environmental flow of 15 to 20 per cent of the average lean season course in their rivers.

E-flow defines the quantity, timing and quality of water flow required to sustain freshwater and estuarine ecosystems, besides human livelihood.

A bench headed by NGT chairperson Justice Swatanter Kumar, however, said that if any state is unable to adhere to this average percentage then it may approach the Ministry of Environment and Forests (MoEF).

"We direct that all the rivers in the country shall maintain min-imum 15 per cent to 20 per cent of the average lean season flow of unable to adhere to this average percentage, in that event we grant liberty to that state government to move to the MoEF secretary who shall in consultation with the Ministry of Water Resources examine such a representation...," the bench

It also said that if it is desirable to fix any lower percentage than the percentage aforestated, then it will pass appropriate order.

The order came after the coun-for the environment ministry told the tribunal that it has completed study of six river basins --Siang, Tawang, Bichom, Subansiri, Dibang and Lohit.

It said the Ministry has recom-mended the minimum flow of the river to be 18 per cent of the averHowever, in some of the cases, it has stated to be even 20 per cent.

The tribunal also granted liberty to the petitioner in the case to approach the environment ministry if it has material with respect to any of the rivers where this direction is not being followed.

"If such representation is moved the same shall be disposed of by the committee headed by Secretary in the Ministry of En-vironment, Forest and Climate Change in accordance with law," the bench said.

The tribunal was hearing a plea filed by environment ac-tivist Pushp Saini seeking directions to the Centre and the states to maintain minimum environment flow in the rivers across the country to ensure their unin-

Stalking may lead to more serious crimes: activists

TRISHA MUKHERJEE New Delhi, Aug 13 (PTI): Ragini Dubey went to the police, as did Priyadarshini Mattoo. But their gruesome murders- over 20 years apart-indicate that when it comes to stalking, little has changed.

When Dubey, 17, refused the persistent advances made by Prince Tiwari, the son of a gram pradhan, little did the Ballia teen know that she would be stalked to death. She was killed on her way to school last week.

Mattoo, a Delhi law student whose rape and murder shook the country in 1996, too may never have imagined that her stalker would end up

even murder," warned Ranjana Kumari, Director of the Centre for Social Research here, as she emphasised that the problem needs to be dealt with at the initial stage itself.

"People think boys are only making advances, but it needs to be stamped out at that stalking level," she told

"The essential problem with stalking is that it is a bailable offence. The police complaint escalates the situation, and after getting bail, the offender does much more

harm," Krishnan said.

Alok Dixit of the Del-hi-based Chhany, a support centre for acid attack survivors, recalled an incident where a teenage girl in Bijnore was pursued by a 55-year-old man.
Once an FIR was filed,

the stalker was taken into custody, beaten up by the police and released with a warning. "After his release, he threw

acid on the girl," Dixit told PTI.

Low conviction rate is another problem, Krishnan noted. She said that often even police officials try to persuade complainants and their fami-lies to strike a compromise with the offenders.

The NCRB report shows out of the 1,220 men arrested for stalking, 1017 were given bail and only 203 were held in custody during the stage of investigation.

"Law will not have a deterrent effect unless it is followed by punitive action. It does not become effective in our soci-ety because law enforcement agencies do not take stalking seriously," Kumari said.

poor's legacy that lingers.

military establishment and warned that Pakistan may a face 1971 like situation if the prime minis-ters continued to be sent home unceremoniously.

"God forbid if Paki-stan sees 1971 like situ-

ation again.

But now time has come that humiliation of elected prime ministers should be stopped. I am no more afraid. I do not fear for my life. I need your support to ensure respect of the people's vote and civilian supremacy," he said. Sharif said he should be given a medal for overcoming terrorism, elec-tricity and gas shortages and unemployment.

On July 28, a five-member Supreme Court bench

disqualified 67-year-old Sharif for dishonesty and ruled that corruption cases be filed against him and his children, forcing the embattled leader out of office.
