RBI to issue new fluorescent blue Rs 50 notes

Mumbai, Aug 18 (PTI): The Reserve Bank will soon introduce new fluorescent blue Rs 50 banknotes bearing the motif of 'Hampi with Chariot' that depicts India's cultural heritage.

RBI said it will shortly issue these Rs 50 denomination banknotes in the Mahatma Gandhi (new)

series.

"The new denomination of Hampi tion has motif of Hampi with Chariot on the reverse, depicting the country's cultural heritage. The base colour of the note is fluorescent blue," RBI said in a release.

Among others, the new notes will have designs and geometric pat-terns aligning with the overall colour schemes, both at the obverse and reverse, it added.

On the obverse/ front side, the note will have portrait of Mahatma Gandhi at the centre, denominational value in Devanagari script, micro letters RBI, India -- both in English and Devana-gari -- as well as the numeral "50".

The Ashoka pillar emblem will be on the right side of the obverse and an electrotype wa-termark and the number panel with numerals in ascending order on the top left side and bottom right side.

High transmission line over Tibuk and Zusing snaps, villagers raise safety concerns



WANGCHUK BHUTIA Mangan, 18 Aug:

After one of the wires of a high trans-mission line running across the vil-lages of Tibuk and Zusing of Mangshila in North Sikkim snapped on 17 Aug causing a power surge (probably upon coming in contact with the local electricity supply line) that fried televisions and refrigerators in some houses, the public of these areas are living in fear of

more damage to life and property.

The wire was part of the high transmission line of Teestavalley Power Transmission Ltd [TPTL] and is said to have tripped with the state LT line. The damaged wire also damaged the stand-

ing crop in the area, it is informed.
"The high transmission line of TPTL was commissioned earlier this year There is no clear picture of the cause of damage, maybe it is due to substandard work but this has been posing a threat to the lives of villagers here," said Shar-ba Dhoj Limboo of 4th Mile, Mangshila.

"The public have also stated that they are scared to send their children to Tibuk School in the rain. The situation has been brought to the knowledge of the District Administration. This is the second time that an HT line has collapsed. However, previously the line wasn't active unlike this time," said Panchayat President, Dilli Ram Limboo.

Mr Limboo has urged TPTL to resolve the problem.

"Fortunately, no one was walking on the footpath at the time of the incident. The noise of the explosion was also very loud. We saw flames and smoke at the time of the incident," said Suk Bahadur Limboo of Tibuk.

Following the incident, Sub Divisional Magistrate-Mangan, PW Lepcha, visited the spot on 17 Aug and held a meeting with the public and the Panchayat.

The SDM, while speaking to Sum-

mitTimes, said that within three days the Revenue Surveyor will assess the damage which the TPTL will have to compensate. The District Administration has directed the project developer to disburse the compensation within 15 days, the SDM added.

IndiGo cancels 84 flights over engine issues

Mumbai, Aug 18 (PTI): Budget carrier IndiGo on Friday can-celled 84 flights as it grounded more of its Airbus A320 planes over issues relating to availability of engines.

The InterGlobe Aviation-run IndiGo, which had grounded nine A320 neo (new engine option) planes due to issues regarding its Pratt & Whitney engines in June quarter, has grounded four more aircraft taking the total number of AOG

Of these, 11 aircraft (VT-IFC, VT-IXN, VT-ITB, VT-ITS, VT-ITF, VT-ITM, VT-ITP, VT-ITJ, VT-IFM, VT-ITO and VT-ITG) are grounded in Delhi, while one plane each has been grounded at Hyder-abad and Chennai, the sources said, adding 84 flights were can-

celled Friday.
IndiGo, which is the country's leading air carrier, however, released two statements to explain its position. It said there taining to the grounding of neos

In the first statement, Indi-Go said that its eight neos are grounded and it had already factored in the impact of the grounding of these planes in its July-September schedule.

Though no incident of violence has been report-ed since last night, the police and security personnel have been keep-ing a tight vigil, a senior police officer said.

The Gorkha Janmuk-ti Morcha (GJM), which is spearheading the ag-itation for a separate Gorkhaland, took out

rallies in various parts of the hills. They demanded restoration of internet services, which was cut off in the hills since June 18, besides an immediate withdrawal of security forces from Darjeeling.

The GJM activists and NGOs were seen distrib-uting food among the locals as food supply has been severely hit due to the prolonged shutdown.

Barring medicine shops, all other com-mercial establishments, schools and colleges remained shut.

11 million people affected due to floods in India: IFRC

GENEVA, AUG 18 (PTI): A "serious" humanitarian crisis is unfolding across South Asia where "devas-tating" monsoon floods have affected more than 16 million people, including over 11 million in India, the Red Cross

said today.

According to the International Federation of Red Cross and Red Cres-cent Societies (IFRC), over 16 million people have been affected by monsoon flooding across India, Ne-pal and Bangladesh with more than 400 deaths in the three countries.

"This is fast becoming humanitarian crises this region has seen in many years and urgent action is needed to meet the growing needs of millions of people affected by these devastating floods," said Martin Faller, Deputy Regional Director for Asia Pacific IFRC.

"Millions of people across Nepal, Bangladesh and India face severe



food shortages and disease caused by polluted flood waters," Faller said.

In India over 11 mil-lion people are affected by floods in four states across the north of the country. India's meteo-rological department is forecasting more heavy rain for the region in the coming days, the IFRC said in a report.

Around 74 more

deaths were reported yesterday from the deluge-battered areas of Bihar, Assam and West Bengal, taking the figure of flood casualties to 119 in Bihar

Flood levels have already reached record highs in Bangladesh. Flooding of major rivers such as the Jamuna has

surpassed levels set in 1988 the deadliest floods the country has ever faced, it said.

"More than one third of Bangladesh and Nepal have been flooded and we fear the humanitarian crisis will get worse in the days and weeks ahead," Faller said.

In Nepal, many areas remain cut off after the most recent destructive floods and landslides, on August 11 and 12.
"This tragic flooding

in Nepal has claimed at least 128 lives and 33 people are still missing," said Dev Ratna Dhakhwa Secretary General, Nepal Red Cross Society.

In Bangladesh, floods are likely to get much worse as swollen rivers from India pour into the low-lying and densely populated areas in the north and centre of the country. Over 3.9 million people have been affected by the rising flood waters, the report said.

Volunteers from Indian Red Cross and Ban-gladesh Red Crescent are working non-stop alongside local authorities to help their communities be safe and prepare for worsening floods, it said. IFRC released just over 320,000 Swiss

Francs (USD 330,000) from its Disaster Relief Emergency Fund (DREF) in late July to support the immediate needs of 25,000 of the worst affected people in eastern India over three months, it added.

Geneva-based IFRC is the world's largest humanitarian network. comprising 190 member National Societies that work to save lives and promote dignity around the world.

US approves USD 500million aid to Nepal

KATHMANDU, AUG 18 (PTI): The US has approved USD 500- million aid to Nepal to boost the country's transport and power sectors, including a second cross-border electricity transmission line with India.

The USD 500 million will be provided by the US government's Millennium Challenge Corporation (MCC), a foreign aid agency set up by the US Congress in 2004. It is independent from the State

Department and the USAID.

The Nepal government has committed to contribute an additional USD 130 million, the US embassy said in a state-

The compact - MCC's larger grant programme - includes two projects.

The electricity transmission project is designed to expand Nepal's power sector, which includes a second crossborder transmission line to facilitate electricity trade with India

The other project is designed to improve the road maintenance regime in The compact is likely to be signed by

both governments in September.
"I am pleased to announce the Millennium Challenge Corporation Board

of Directors' approval of the Nepal Compact," said its acting CEO Jonathan

"This compact with Nepal focuses on the power and transportation sectors to improve regional connectivity, spur private investment, drive growth, and reduce poverty," Nash said.

NHRC notice to Centre over plan to deport Rohingya immigrants

New Delhi, Aug 18 (PTI): The National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) has issued a no-tice to the Centre over plan to deport illegal Rohingya immigrants from Myanmar who are residing in various parts of India.

The Centre had said illegal immigrants like the Rohingyas pose grave se-curity challenges as they may be recruited by terror groups, and had asked governments to identify and deport them.
Taking note of the is-

sue, the NHRC said that today, the country has evolved a practical balance between human and humanitarian obligations on the one hand and security and national interest on the other.

Stating that "India has been home to refu-gees, for centuries", the Commission has held that from the human rights angle, its "intervention is appropriate" in the matter. "The National Human

Rights Commission has taken suo motu cognizance of media reports regarding the plans of the Government of India to deport about 40,000 illegal Rohingya immi-grants from Myanmar, who are residing in vari-

ous parts of India.
"It has issued a notice to the Union Home Ministry, through its Secretary, calling for a detailed report in the matter within four weeks," it said in a statement.

The NHRC observed that "refugees are no doubt foreign nationals but they are human beings and be-fore taking a big step, the government of India has to look into every aspect of

The Commission has also observed that the Supreme Court has consistently held that the fundamental right en-shrined under Article 21 of the Constitution regarding right to life and personal liberty, "applies to all, irrespective of the fact whether they are cit-izens of India or not".

"It (India) has continued to receive a large number of refugees from different countries. India is not a signatory to the 1951 Convention on Refugees and also the 1967 Protocol.

There is no new development pertaining to the grounding of neos. As mentioned in our June earning s call, there were instances where 9 neos were grounded due to inadequate spare engines. At present, 8 neos are grounded because of the unavail-ability of spare engines. These have already been factored in our revised schedule which was finalized in June and there are no additional flight cancellations on account of these neos,"

He has no alternative, but to depend on the forest for his needs. Why the policy framers can't comprehend the fact that villagers don't exploit the forest resources, but only share it in sustainable models refined over centuries, defies all logic. Maybe it doesn't, because, sadly for the peripheral States like Sikkim, policies are framed with dry statistics in mind by even drier officials. Local concerns are ignored and the colonial hangover sees to it that the natives need to be told what to do. So even though Sikkim and Himachal lost a lot of their forests to provide timber for the railway berths which never even made the climb to their towns, the locals are made to pay. All of a sudden someone realised that the forest cover was shrinking and the forests were made out of bounds for the locals who might have even protested when the plains denuded their hills. Since we sit on the lungs of the entire country, it is time that Sikkim and other states like it should be given a greater say in framing environmental policies. And no, the Forest Rights Act, at least in the form it is understood and implemented is not the way to go. The rest of the country, the section which ruined the environment, should listen to regions which have conserved well and lived responsibly.

The Dilemma of Sikkim Subjects

Protection of Sikkim Subject Certificates is the issue that is buzzing all around. We heard the Government's stand in the Chief Minister's Independence Day address. My Whatsapp is flooded with all sorts of comments from people of all shades. It is fun to go through these messages and get to know and understand how the people of Sikkim - rather Gangtokians - look upon it. Some com-ments are hilarious, some patriotic and rather nostalgic of the days gone by, but the one that struck me the most was a verse: "The world suffers a lot, not because of the violence of bad people but be-cause of the silence of good people". This convinced me to scribble some thoughts off the cuff.

I had a hand in many of the issues related to

the issue while in charge of Home Department and then as Chief Secretary. There were around 1.73 lakh recorded in the original Sikkim Subjects Register maintained as per 1961 Sikkim Subject Regulation. Mr NB Bhandari, when he was Chief Minister, announced a further 73,000 left out persons to be declared as Sikkim Subjects and the ball was lobbed in our court. We had a long discussion with officials of the Union Home Ministry arrived at the decision that the basis should primarily be the Sikkim Subjects Register as maintained by the Government of Sikkim. Two Deputy Secretaries from Home Department, GOS, were assigned for spot verification. Proper forms, as jointly drafted by GOS and MHA, were printed and spot verifications carried out. The entire process took a good one year. Around a dozen black tin boxes containing the filled-in forms were ferried from Gangtok to Delhi where the Home Ministry had established a small cell to further scrutinise the details. The final result was that around 10,000 persons were found as genuine left outs (those who had never bothered to apply for SSC even though they qualified to do so) and around 64,000 persons were deemed technical left outs (direct descendents of those whose names were in the Sikkim Subjects Register). These details were tabulated, okaved by MHA and sent back to the State Government here with due instructions that those in this list were considered Sikkim Subjects, rather Indians of Sikkimese origin and with instructions that certificates in this regards could

The people of Sikkim should remember that Sikkim Subject Certificates were the basis for Indian citizenship consequent upon the merger of Sikkim with the Union of India. So, for all practical purposes, 1,73,000 + 74,000 = 2,47,000 were Indians of Sik-kimese origin as in 1991/92 or so. The subsequent Government in its wisdom saw it fit to issue them Certificates of Identity rather than Sikkim Subject Certificates as was held by those whose names featured in the original Sikkim Subjects Register maintained in the Land Revenue Department.

Then came the Government notifications for is sue of COI to all the 74,000 persons, followed by the issue of COI based on the verification of 2,47,000 people referred to above.

Then the dilemma arose. SSC was so prized that one without it or a COI based on this document was without privileges at every step. The realization dawned on the people of its importance. Its value was further heightened after the 2008 Finance baram, in his wisdom, thought it fit to exempt all Sikkimese (Sikkim Subjects and their descendants) from Indian Income Tax. Importantly, he lucidly defined Sikkimese in no uncertain terms as never done before. It was a benchmark after Sikkim became part of the Union of India.

Globalization also caught on in Sikkim. With hydropower projects and the boom of pharmaceu-tical companies getting established here to take advantage of tax relief, influx has grown manifold. More might follow as the tax exemption has fur-ther been extended to 2027. In many instances, the people of Sikkim find themselves strangers in their own land. It is therefore understandable the peo-ple realise the need for protection of Sikkim Subjects. And while this was happening, some 30,000+ people were found to be holding fake SSCs of COIs, leading to the litigation now in the High Court. The Government is taking cognisance of the issue and digitization of the entire Sikkim Subjects record and COI holders is being considered. Understandably, people believe that many fake COIs have been crept in and proper verification prior to digitization is necessary. It is a daunting task no doubt, but it is an issue to be caught by the horns and some foolproof process established for issuance of COIs. When such emotive issues crop up and people

get charged, there is also a surge of people, groups and parties which want to hop on to the bandwagon. My simple advise to them would be to rise above personal gains and politics and find a just solution to this vexed issue in due consultation with the Government machineries. The Government, at the same time, should look upon them as messiahs of a just cause in the overall interest of the people of Sikkim and for the younger generation and generations yet unborn. I wish the programme all success and hold no ill-will towards anyone in this peaceful and rapidly developing State.

The Sikkim Subject is just one of the issues that needs addressing. There are many that have to be tackled with broadness of heart and I pray all issues of vital interest to our people are suitably redeemed with due participation of the people and the Government - especially since there is only a very slim opposition in the truest sense here. This collaboration is a necessity for any dynamic democratic set of polity. "Democracy is not just about ballots and votes, but also about public deliberations and reasoning, what - to use an old phrase - is often called 'government by discussion". The editorial "Government by Discussion" in SummitTimes dated 17 August 2017 is worth a read in this regard.

The other day, in another esteemed daily, I read an article on Kazi Lhendup Dorji by veteran jour-nalist Suresh Pramar. He was in his mid-thirties when he worked in Sikkim, I suppose, and must be in his mid-seventies by now. His fiery articles in his fortnightly (if I recollect right) used to put the bureaucracy on tenterhooks. Looks like he has mel-lowed down with age. He was a true journalist as journalists should be. As Secretary IPR, I had a hard time dealing with him. But I had very intelligent of-ficers like Rinchen Doma (initially in IRS, now IAS, but where, I don't know) and BPS Basnett, repatriated from India House, and they could handle all situations. Pramar writes that Kazi Saheb had no

intention to merge Sikkim with, but his colleagues forced him to do so. This speaks volumes. Kazi Saheb, as such, was not cut out to be a politician but circumstances put him in the arena. He was a gentle, soft-spoken person, rather meek among the Chanakyas of Delhi. Sikkim glided on, only to realize some 45 years later that we could have had a much better deal. Our greatest weakness is our meekness. We have still to learn to hammer-out our issues with the Pundits of North Block who are all Chanakyas of the first order. all Chanakvas of the first order.

But it is happy augury that the younger lot are coming up with more concern and with a sense of urgency. Combined with internet, social media is accelerating ideas and outreach. To learn that they are coming of age is heartening and now to guide them well so that they can thrash out the matter through discussions, interactions, arguments etc. without being violent. This is the order of the day that we must accept and respect. They may falter at times but they are moving now and nobody can

I agree that for many of the wrongs of the past, we, the people of the yesteryears, are to be blamed as well. It is not because we did not know, but our temperament of goody, goody people took a beating for which the present generations is bearing the brunt. Also, we were naive to the game played

by big powers.

Times have changed though. Opportunities are there in any field one wants to explore. Sikkim is doing exemplary developmental activities much to the envy of other States in the country and is destined to go very far. Here, however, I would like to stress that what we are doing with largesse from the Centre is only the tip of the iceberg. As the Ch-ogyal used to write in almost all files: "Good, but it could have been better." I never knew if there was any "Very Good!" So, we must have broadness of heart to give our younger folk a level playing field. Government's role is just to govern and sim-plify rules to enable the young to glide with ease We should be able to grasp well ahead and tackle criticism from any quarter with deftness before the matter bursts. If we cannot handle this mi-nuscule population whom we almost know all by name or at least face, it does not speak very well of us. We are blessed with a land rich in culture, natural grandeur and heritage. Every land needs its custodian. The custody of Sikkim rests with Sikkim Subjects for which a movement for its protection is called for by concerned citizens. I urge all right thinking people to support the cause without any

Why we keep playing the Generation Blame Game ... and why we need to stop

Successive generations' healthy disregard of the previous generation's tastes, habits and customs is a

necessary ingredient of human progress. But there is something about the current carving up of the population into ever smaller generational slices of entitlement and opprobrium – from baby boomers and Generation X to millennials and Generation Z - that borders on unhealthy obsession. Part of this is a growing awareness of a "shift in the demographic map".

This is particularly marked in the northern Hemisphere and is accompanied by other profound social, eco-nomic and cultural changes – rising economic prosperity and inequality and insecurity, declining political sup-port for state organised welfare, shifts in the make-up of family, decreased deference to hierarchy. Together these challenge how we live, work, consume, and care for and support each other.

Generational roles and expec-tations can no longer be taken for granted and we are no longer certain about where we stand in the emerging order. Anxieties abound – and projecting these onto imprecise categories of "age others" bolsters a vague sense of shared injustice among those of a certain age - and provides "generations" with another age group to blame. What this generation blame game misses, however, are the ways in which these dubious generational cat-egories mask the profound differences between the people swept into them

BACK TO THE 'BABY BOOM'

ly powerful, even if it remains relatively meaningless, over the last decade is the "baby boomer". This is applied loosely to those born during the post-World War II "baby boom" who came of age in the 1960s and 1970s. Commentators have cast the category in a variety of ways, but one of the most egregious examples of the rhetorical gymnastics required to construct the stereotype is Philip Inman's "secret baby boomer millionaires".

According to this, anybody who has an income of £35,000 a year and a work-based pension, enjoys retirement for a full 25 years and is in possession of housing asset wealth of £300,000 is – or will be – a millionaire baby boomer. The implication is that they are cossetted and in need of cutting down to size.

But there are, in fact, many factors that might impede the royal road to this exalted status in retirement that play out over a lifetime, from class, health and disability, to gender, race and ethnicity. These complications however, are conveniently effaced in the selfish boomer narrative

Recent research carried out by Karen Glaser and Debbie Price, president of the British Society of Gerontology, and others, points, for example, to a very deep and persistent gender division in retirement. The gender pay gap means that median income-earn ing women have considerably worse pensions than men, and if they take any kind of career break (to look after children or others), will be even worse off in retirement. This a gender issue,

not a generational one. Indeed, it isn't easy finding evidence of Inman's millionaire baby boomers nong the retirement income statistics of median income-earning women, and even harder among the three quarters of the female population who have taken "career breaks". But the problem is not just that real lives more often than not diverge from the stereotype of the protected baby boomer, but that the model of the coping, smug, self-sufficient retiree who does not need state support has come the policy archetype.

This has very pernicious conse-

quences when it comes to the generation currently entering care and de-pendency. Unlike baby boomers and millennials, this group doesn't have a label of its own in the public imagination, but gerontologists increas-ingly refer to the "fourth age"; people in deep old age, who, when crossing the threshold of independence can be abandoned into a wholly inadequate

system of social care.

Moreover, in the absence of family, neighbourly or state support, and in-adequate and inappropriate services (public or private), having financial resources doesn't necessarily help. Masking these age differences gives rise to a deep ageism that makes the state's abandonment of the fourth

GENERATIONAL 'WAR'

If the generation blame game masks difference, it also masks how overlapping experiences can act as the basis for intergenerational solidarity and resistance. As US cultural critic Margaret Morganroth Gullette observed, throughout the 1990s, a contrived war between baby boomers and the following Generation Xers, born in the 1960s and 1970s, was waged in media and political discussions. In this war of words, younger US citizens were taught that they should no longer expect the pay and rewards that the bloated and selfish

baby boom generation had.

The shattering of the American Dream to accumulate wealth over a lifetime happened under the cover of generational injustice. It wasn't blamed on economics or politics, but on older people. And the same talk of a "war" is now happening between

millennials and baby boomers.
What is entirely missed in the UK and Europe's more recent embrace of phoney generational politics is this general degradation of lifetime expectations for all. It is not, as the UK's most enthusiastic cheerleader of strict intergenerational accounting, the Intergenerational Foundation, would have us believe, that econom ic and social order will miraculously be restored once we have worked out the correct proportions of public and private wealth to which each generation is rightfully entitled. The real problem is that ordinary folk of all generations are being conned – and coached to blame it on each other.

The bench fixed the matter for hearing on August 22.

Prepared militarily, will act if N Korea launches missile'

The US has warned North Korea that it was prepared to meet any eventuality and will take "immediate specific actions" if Pyongyang launch es a missile attack against it or its allies. The US' strong assertion comes days after President Donald Trump pledged to answer further aggression from North Korea

with "fire and fury".

Speaking at a news conference jointly addressed by US Defence Secretary James Mattis, Japanese Foreign min-ister Taro Kono and Defence minister Itsunori Onodera, Tillerson said the country was prepared to meet any eventuality from the North Koreans, and sought to make it clear that use of the force was not the "preferred path-way" of the US. "We are prepared, we are



prepared militarily, prepared with our allies to respond, if that is necessary. That (military) is not our preferred pathway. That's been made clear as well," he said.

Defence Secretary Mattis said that the US would take immediate specific actions in the event of a missile launch towards US or its allies.

"In the event of a missile launch towards the territory of Japan, Guam, the United States, Korea (South Korea), we would take immediate specific actions to down," Mattis said. actions to take it

Responding to a question after the 'two-plus-two' US-

Japan talks, Japanese Defence minister Onodera said that in the event there is an attack on Japan, they will use assets available to them for the mis-

sile defence. "But should different circumstances occur, then we will solidify the relation that we have with the US with close communication. We will defend the country, and that is what we discussed to-

day," he said.

Tillerson said the North Korean regime should engage in diplomatic talks to bring better results, unlike in the past.

"So our effort is to cause them (North Korean regime) to want to engage in talks but engage in talks with an understanding that these talks will lead to a different conclusion than talks of the past. We will continue that

effort diplomatically, first and foremost," he said.

But, knowing that North Korea sits with a significant capability already within their grasp, I think it is only prudent that they fully understand the consequences, should they make a bad choice for themselves. And, obviously, there are consequences for others as well," Tillerson added.

According to Onodera, North Korea has plans to launch ballistic missiles to the waters close to Guam. It is also advancing on their efforts to launch ICBM-class ballistic missiles, miniaturising nuclear weapons to warheads.

"So for this threat of North Korea, at this meeting we agreed to increase the pressure and to strengthen the alliance's capability. The four of us confirmed the im-

portance of the unwavering US commitment to extend the deterrence," he said.

Observing that Japan and South Korea are on the front line against the North Korean threat, Mattis said the US recognises that any confrontation with North Korea would pose an immediate danger to its allies and their populations.
"The US-Japan ministe-

rial meeting is a reminder that each nation gains se-curity in concert with other nations. The international community is speaking with one voice. North Korea must stop its dangerous actions as we work to maintain security and denuclearise the Korean peninsula," he said.

"We are accelerating im-plementation of the 2015 guidelines for US-Japan defence cooperation and con-tinuing to realign US forces

in Japan and Guam. Our militaries are also cooperating in new ways. This includes our emerging cooperation in areas such as space and cvberspace, as well as ballistic missile defence and maritime security." Mattis said.

Mattis said the US and Japan will demonstrate the strength of their alliance by continuing bilateral activities and by enhancing cooperation with South Korea.

He said that the path of provocations and chosen by North Korea was not in the best interests of any nation.

"We call on North Korea to choose a better path than one of provocations and threats. Such a path is not in its own best interests nor in the best interests of any other nation," the Defence Secretary said.

Akhilesh suggests CBI probe into Gorakhpur hospital death

LUCKNOW, AUG 18 (PTI): Samajwadi Party pres-ident Akhilesh Yadav today suggested a CBI probe into the children deaths in a Gorakhpur hospital along with all the other ongoing probes to ascertain the reasons

leading to the tragedy.

"If the BJP govern ment so wants it should recommend a CBI inquiry into the children deaths in the BRD Medical College hospital... Along with other probes, the agency could also be roped in," he told reporters here.

Replying to questions, he said that the cause of the deaths will be known after the completion of inquiries, but the matters that are coming to the fore now smack of corruption somewhere causing breakdown in the supply of oxygen in the ward.

"Chief Minister Yogi Adityanth is not speak ing on this issue... The government is not even providing help to the victims," Yadav said.

The death toll in the BRD hospital since August 7 till yesterday was 71 due to various causes including encephalitis

Some of the deaths were alleged to have been caused by shortage of oxygen supply, a claim dismissed by the Uttar Pradesh government.

Describing Adityanath as "the digital chief minister of a new India", the former chief minister said he (Adityanath) was unaware of the reality and was instead embroiled in issues like namaz on the roads and Janmashtami functions in police stations. "The BJP has given a digital chief minister to Uttar Pradesh ... Just as things digital are not on the ground, he too is oblivious of the real things," Yadav said.

14 dead, 100 injured in two Spanish seaside city attacks

Drivers have ploughed into pedestrians in two quick-succession, separate attacks in Barcelona and another popular Spanish seaside city, leaving 14 people dead and injuring more than 100 others.

In the first incident, which was claimed by the Islamic State group, a white van sped into a street packed full of tourists in central Barcelona vesterday afternoon, knocking people out of the way and killing 13 in a scene of chaos and horror.

Some eight hours later in Cambrils, a city 120 kilo-metres south of Barcelona, an Audi A3 car rammed into pedestrians, injuring six civilians -- one of them critical and a police officer, author

Gunfire ensued during which police killed the five at tackers, some of whom were

wearing explosive belts.

Police said they were
"working on the hypothesis that the terrorists shot dead in Cambrils are linked to what happened in Barcelona".

Witnesses in Barcelona recounted how bodies were strewn along the famous Las Ramblas boulevard where



the driver went on a rampage as other people fled for their lives, screaming in panic.

The carnage in a city huge-ly popular with tourists from around the world is the latest in a wave of attacks in Europe vehicles have been used as weapons of terror.

As world leaders united in ondemning the carnage, the IS propaganda agency Amaq claimed that it was carried out by "soldiers" from the jihadist group.

Police announced the arrest of two suspects, identi-fied as a Spaniard and a Moroccan, but said the driver

"We're united in grief, Spanish Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy said in a televised address after rushing to Barcelona, the biggest city in Catalonia, a region in Spain's northeast whose separatist government is defying Madrid with a drive for indepen-

"Above all we're united in the firm intention to defeat those who want to take our values and way of life from

There were at least 18 na-

tionalities among the Barcelona victims who came from countries as varied as France, Venezuela, Australia, Ireland, Peru, Algeria and China, according to Spain's civil protec-

tion agency.

Belgium said one of its citizens had died in the Las Ramblas assault, while The Hague said three Dutch were injured and a Greek diplomat reported three nationals had been wounded -- a woman and her two children.

Las Ramblas is one of Barcelona's busiest streets, lined with shops and restaurants tourists and street performers until well into the night.

'When it happened I ran out and saw the damage," local shop worker Xavi Perez told AFP.

"There were bodies on the ground with people crowding round them. People were crying. There were lots of for-

Tom Gueller, who lives on a road next to Las Ramblas, said he saw the vehicle speeding along the boulevard.

"It wasn't slowing down at all. It was just going straight through the middle of the crowds in the middle of the Ramblas," he told BBC radio

In Cambrils, meanwhile, Markel Artabe, a 20-year-old restaurant worker, said he was on the seaside promenade when he heard what he initially thought were fireworks, but soon realised were gunshots.

"I saw a foreigner dead with a gunshot in the head. His friends were crying out 'help'. I also saw dead bodies that seemed to be terrorists because they were wearing explosive belts."

Spain, the world's third tourism destination, had unof extremist violence that has rocked nearby France, Belgium and Germany.

It had even seen a surge in tourists as visitors fled other restive sunshine destinations like Tunisia and Egypt.

But it is no stranger to ji-hadist attacks, having been hit by what is still Europe's est in March 2004, when bombs exploded on commuter trains in Madrid. killing 191 people in an attack claimed by Al Qaeda-inspired extremists.

Police said yesterday that one of the arrested suspects in the Barcelona attack was Spaniard born in Melilla, a Spanish territory on Morocco's north coast, and the other Moroccan named as Driss Oukabir.

The Spaniard was arrested in Alcanar, about 200 kilometres south of Barcelona, the scene of an explosion in a house late Wednesday that left one person dead and seven wounded and is believed to be linked to yesterday's assault.

The emergency services said a woman injured in the Cambrils attack has died, bringing the total to 14 in both attacks.

Sharif, sons fail to appear before anti-corruption body

LAHORE, AUG 18 (PTI): Ousted Pakistan prime minister Nawaz Sharif and his two sons today failed to appear before the top anti-graft body, which wanted to inter-rogate them over money laundering and corrup-tion charges revealed by the Panama Papers.

On July 28, a five-member Supreme Court bench disqualified Sharif from continuing in his office for possessing a work permit at the firm of his son in the UAE.

The court also or-dered the NAB to investigate money laundering and other corruption charges against Sharif, his children, son-in-law Safdar and federal finance minister Ishaq Dar, a relative of Sharif, in light of the report of the Joint Investigation Team.

The National Accountability Bureau (NAB) following a Supreme Court order had issued sum-mons to Sharif and his sons - Hussain and Hasan to interrogate them at its Lahore office over their offshore properties revealed last year by the Panama Papers leak.

A 10-member NAB team had reached La-



record the statements of the Sharifs, but they did not turn up before the office closed at 3 pm local time, a NAB official told

PTI.

"Sharif and his sons were supposed to join the investigation today here in Lahore office but we are informed by the office of Sharif that he is not coming. No reason has been given to us," the official said. He said the NAB

would issue second sum-mons to them in two weeks.

A leader close to the Sharif family denied receiving any summons.
"Nawaz Sharif and his sons had not yet received the NAB summons. Sharif will only decide whether or not to appear before the NAB after receiving the summons," Senator

But another leader of the ruling PML-N party said Sharif has decided not to join the investigation. He said Sharif will join the probe only after the Supreme Court decides his review petition against the court's verdict that disqualified him.

The 67-year-old three-time prime minister has denied any wrongdoing. Last week, Sharif held a defiant roadshow with thousands of supporters from Islamabad to Lahore to project his political strength after the Supreme Court verdict.
